That it costs some money to plant alfalfa is evidenced by the size of a check given The Martin-Bennett Co., one day this week by A. B. Clark of Lelia. The check called for \$27 and paid for one sack of seed-about 160 pounds. Mr. Clark will plant ten pounds to the acre, and will continue to sow alfalfa until he has 100 acres; at least that is his expressed intention. Mr. Martin says his firm has received about 2000 pounds of this seed, all of which has been ordered by local farmers. While the seed comes high the crop comes higher, and any crop which will bring \$40 per acre and upward each season is worth planting, no matter the cost of the seed. The Banner-Stockman is glad to see the spread of the alfalfa fever and hopes it may become epidemic in the strongest sense of the word.


