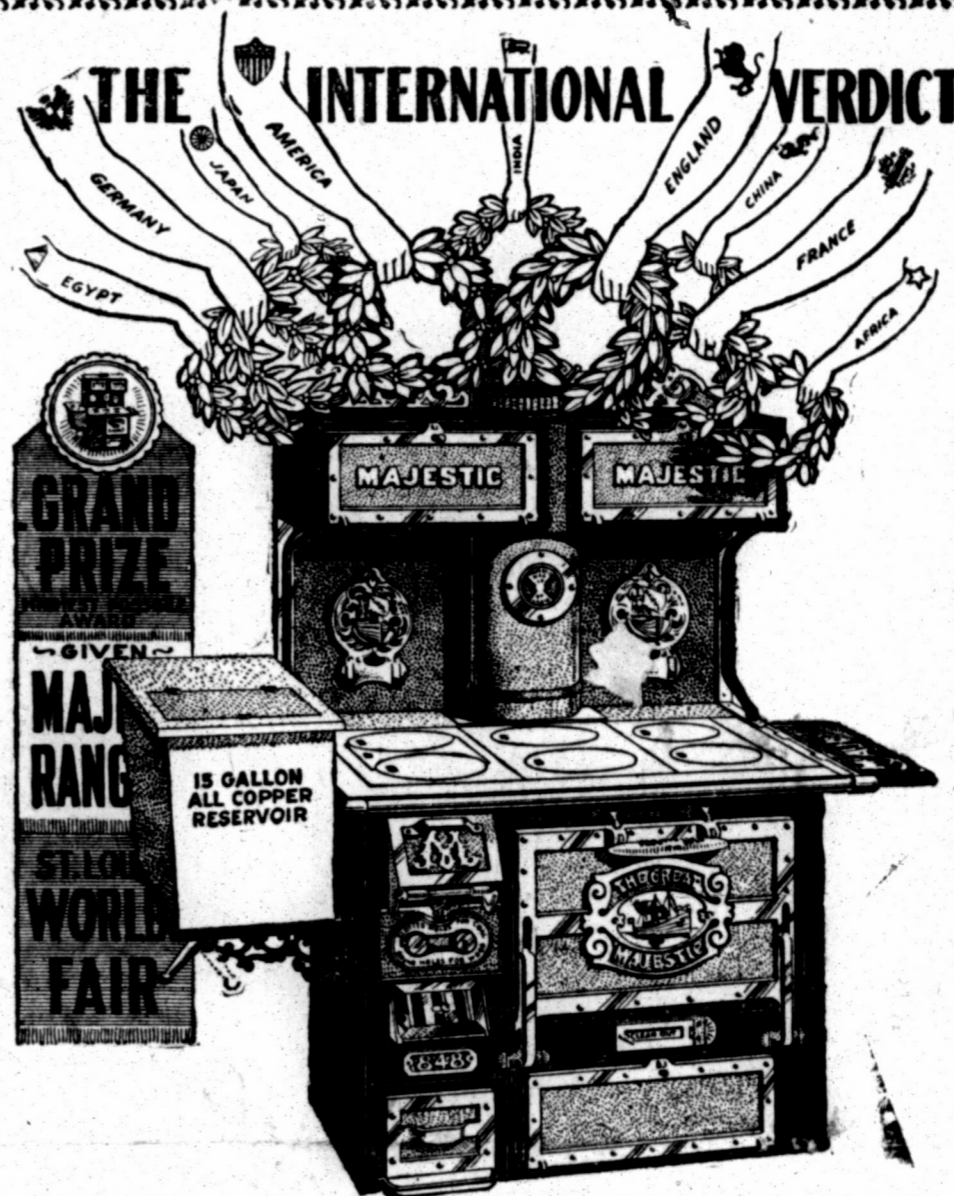

A Natural Market for Feed Stuffs.

Farmers Should Market Feed through Medium of Fat Cattle and Hogs.

In view of the abundant crops of feed stuff raised in our county and vicinity this year, the question of disposing of them to the best advantage naturally confronts us. They are crops that are not easily converted into ready money without quite a little expense to the farmer; for instance, kaffir corn and milo maize must necessarily be threshed, sacked and hauled to the railroad, and after this is done there is a ready market for probably only a small part of what the county produces.

With these facts in view, is it not possible that our farmers could feed their stuff to cattle and hogs and get just as much money out of it, get it all at one time and in a manner that would do them some good, without having to go the expense of threshing, sacking and hauling their grain to town?

To do this it has been suggested that the feeding of steers and hogs will produce this result with a reasonable certainty. The figures here submitted are made with this object in view and no other. It is contended by the writer that if the farmers of Donley county can market their crops through the medium of feeding cattle and hogs, they will have made their farms pay them and it is generally believed that this method of disposing of grain which we raise is the only solution of the problem now confronting us.

Let us suppose that a farmer had 80 acres of kaffir corn or milo maize. It is reasonable to suppose that he will raise one ton of heads per acre. This would give him about 80 tons of heads. Part of this he would naturally require for the feeding of his horses, stock, etc., until another crop is raised, say 35 tons. This would leave on his hands about 45 tons to be disposed of in some manner, together with his stalk fields or stalks if the crop is cut with row or broadcast binder. It is reasonable to suppose that he can buy good three-year-old steers at about 3c per pound and the following figures are made on that basis:

25 3-year-old steers, averaging 900 lbs. per head equals 22,500 lbs. @ 3c	\$675.00
25 steers fed 120 days on 30 lbs. of ground kaffir corn or milo heads per day equals 90,000 lbs. equals 45 tons @ \$6.00	\$270.00
25 steers fed 120 days 15 lbs. kaffir fodder per day, 45,000 lbs. equals 22½ tons @ \$2.00 per ton.	\$45.00
25 hogs averaging 150 lbs. each equals 3750 lbs. @ 2c per pound.	\$75.00
Interest four months on \$675.00 @ 10 per cent	\$22.50
Total	\$1087.50

The 25 steers should gain 2 pounds per day for the 120 days, making 6000 pounds to which add the original weight 22,500 lbs. making a total weight at the end

of the four months of 28,500 lbs. It is reasonable to suppose this beef should net 4c here which would amount to \$1140.00.

The 25 hogs running in the feed pens with the cattle should gain ¼ lbs. per head per day for 120 days or 2250 lbs., which add to the original weight 3750 lbs. when they were placed in the pen and we will have 6000 lbs. of pork, and as they were in the same pen with the cattle and the cost of all feed has been figured as against the cattle, there should be no charge as against the pork. It is reasonable to presume that the pork would bring 4c net which would amount to \$240.00, making a total of \$1380.00 received for the cattle and hogs. From this take the cost of the cattle, hogs, feed and interest on the money, \$1087.50 which leaves \$292.50, besides having sold the feed on the farm where it was raised at \$6.00 per ton for heads and \$2.00 per ton for the fodder.

The hogs in the first instance above are computed at 2c per pound when put in the pen after the cattle. The reason for doing so is that the writer, firmly of the opinion that every farmer in this section of the Panhandle can produce these hogs on his own farm at an actual cost of not to exceed 2c per pound by grazing them during the summer on either alfalfa or cow pea fields and such other stuff as they may pick up around the place.

If our farmers were fortunate enough to have cow pea hay or alfalfa hay to feed to their cattle instead of kaffir corn fodder, the ration of 30 lbs. of ground kaffir corn heads could be reduced and the result would be materially better as it would produce a much better ration for the production of beef, or if cotton seed meal was fed with the ground kaffir corn heads, the result would be materially better, but as the meal would have to be bought at something like \$25.00 per ton, it is a question of whether it would be any cheaper to do so.

We are firmly of the opinion that as we produce the best feeding cattle in the United States and have the most healthful country for hogs in the state of Texas, and as it has been demonstrated that kaffir corn when properly fed, produces equally as good results as Indian corn, that we should not only produce the feeders in our country but should finish the animal and make a greater outlet for surplus grain crops and make not only our cattle but our farms pay us.

The time is coming at no distant day when feeding will be an established business in the Panhandle, and the intelligent, far seeing,

It may be contended that there are some of our farmers who have not the steers to feed. This is probably so, but practically all of them now have some cattle or own some that they could use for a margin and we think we are safe in saying that either one of our local banks or any bank in Panhandle, for that matter, would be perfectly willing to furnish the purchase price of the steers provided a margin of as much as \$5.00 per head could be put into them by the farmer either in money or cattle that he may own.

We make this suggestion hoping that a few of our farmers may be able to profitably market the very large crop which they have raised this year.

That it costs some money to plant alfalfa is evidenced by the size of a check given The Martin-Bennett Co., one day this week by A. B. Clark of Lelia. The check called for \$27 and paid for one sack of seed—about 160 pounds. Mr. Clark will plant ten pounds to the acre, and will continue to sow alfalfa until he has 100 acres; at least that is his expressed intention. Mr. Martin says his firm has received about 2000 pounds of this seed, all of which has been ordered by local farmers. While the seed comes high the crop comes higher, and any crop which will bring \$40 per acre and upward each season is worth planting, no matter the cost of the seed. The Banner-Stockman is glad to see the spread of the alfalfa fever and hopes it may become epidemic in the strongest sense of the word.

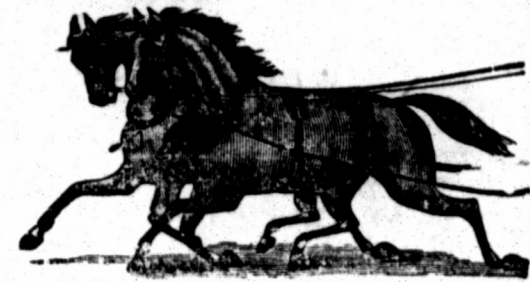

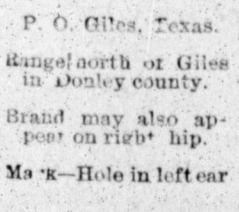
