In his autobiography Bismarck virtually accepted responsibility for three wars, and reflectively asked himself-his dismissal and humiliation by the present Emperor doubtless having stimulated philosophical meditation and sincere heart-searching-whether the German people had been made happier by the fruits of these three victorious and brilliant campaigns. Bismarck did not develop his theme and left the question unanswered. Today, tragic events are furnishing the answer.

German unity and federation were great forward steps. In all probability, time and tide would have brought about unity and federation without much bloodshed and sacrifice. But Bismarck was impatient and militaristic, He believed in blood and iron. He would not wait, and he perhaps thot that it would be courting disaster to wait. He was certain that successful war with Prussia's rivals or hereditary enemies would quicken nationalism and facilitate unification. The event fully justified him, but-

There were some things Bismarck, the junker and conservative, did not foresee. He overlookel Nemesis. He failed to reckon with the moral forces of the world. He did not sufficiently take into account the arrogrance, blindness and greed of the military caste, the virtual certainty, that it would go to extreme lengths and sow fatal trouble for the nation,

Bismarck himself told us in his noirs that he had great difficulty restraining the zeal and lust of the ex conquerors of France in 1870.

They say that the merchants, that is to say, only a comparative few have enough enterprise about them to put in either awning lights or cluster standards. Let the people carry lanterns if they wish to prowl around after sun-down.

They say that there is nothing better for a town in the way of advertising than well lighted streets. Hereford should be well lighted. Main Street will have to be lighted either by the City or by the individual owners of property. The cheapest way is for each merchant or property owner to have two or three ceiling or awning lights for each 25-foot building, the fixture so placed as to give a maximum light to the street; that is, about 18 inches from the outer edge of the awning. each block on one side. I, J. E. Crouch, City Clerk of the City of Hereford, Texas, in pursuance of the hereinafter set out resolution, do hereby give notice by publication of same, of the matters and things therein contained, which resolution is as follows.

Resolution of the City Commission of the City of Hereford, determining the necessity of levying an assessment against the property, and the owners thereof, abutting upon streets hereinafter named for a part of the cost of improvfor the hearing of the owners of said property concerning the same and directing the City Clerk to give notice of said hearing as required by Section VIII of Chapter 11 of of Texas, as passed by the Thirty-first Legislature.

WHEREAS, the City Commission has heretofore, by resolution, ordered the improvement of Main Street, bound-In the south by First Street and on the North by Fift's Street; Sampson Avenue, bounded on the south by First greet and on the north by Fourth Street; Second Street, bounded on the west by Miles Avenue and on the east by ampson Avenue; Third Street, bounded on the west by Miles Avenue and on the east by Schley Avenue; and Fourth w Street bounded on the west by Miles Avenue and on the east by Schley Avenue, by paving the same with a six inch base of native composition and a two inch asphaltic concrete wearing surface, and the building of curbs on either side of said streets when found necessary, in accordance with the terms of said resolution; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Section II of Ordinance-No. 107 entitled "An Ordinance to Carry into effect, Chapter 11 of Title 22 of the Revised Statutes of Texas, authorizing cities and towns which have accepted the benefits thereof to improve the streets, highways, and public places thereof," after advertising for bids, the said work of improving said streets between the said points above named has been let to F. P. McCormick, of Kansas City; and WHEREAS, a contract has been entered into between the said city and the said F. P. McCormick, on the 4th day

of May, A. D. 1917, for the performance of said work; and WHEREAS, the said F. P. McCormick has duly given bond for the performance of said work, and for the majortenance of same, and the Consulting Engineer of the City of Hereford has in accordance with Section II of Ordinauce No. 107 of the City of Hereford filed his report with the City Commission as to the cost of said improvements and as to all other matters required by the City Commission.

NOW, THEREFORE, Be it resolved by the City Commission of the City of Hereford That the report or statement filed by the Consulting Engineer, having been duly examined, is hereby approved

Be it further resolved that part of the cost of said improvements shall be assessed against the abutting property upon the streets so to be improved and the owners thereof, and that the total cost of said improvement shall be paid

shall be paid by the owners of property abutting upon said streets named to be improved; in the following manner: The owners of the property abutting upon said streets named to be improved shall pay the whole cost of installing concrete curbs in front of their respective property. An amount equal to two-thirds of the whole cost of said improvements shall be paid by said property owners, and shall also be assessed against them and their respective parcels of land abutting upon said streets, and said assessed ment shall be made against the owners of property abutting upon said streets to be improved and their property in ac-

Not only does the liquor traffic make this enormous draft on the food supply, but it makes a corresponding draft on the money supply, and in turn destroys the producing power in field and factory, and the fighting capacity of every man it touches. Europe is starving and America is facing such food shortage as we have never known before. Purely as a war measure the liquor traffic must be wiped out. It will be immaterial whether prohibition is brought about by executive proclamation or legislative enactment. As commander in chief of the American army and navy, President Wilson undoubtedly has the authority to close every brewery, distillery and saloon, and to stop immediately the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors. Even the mayor of a city can do this when an emergency arises; how much better right the President of the United States has to do this in the face of such conditions as now confront us. Our judgment is that President Wilson and the Cabinet will act favorably on the recommendation of the Council of National Defense. It seems that the President could hardly afford to ignore the recommendations of the Council for National Defense which was created at his instance and request.

A third approach would be for Congress to exercise its right under the General Welfare and Common Defense clauses of the constitution. Under this, Congress undoubtedly could prohibit the manua tacture of foodstuffs into alcohol directly and could prohibit, also, the sale of such drinks.

Because we have ordinarily left to the police power of the states the regulation, control and suppression of the liquor traffic, many good people overlook the fact that the United States can deal directly with the traffic. The liquor traffic is an outlaw, still legalized in some cases, but outlawed in more than half of the states by the exercise of their power, and outlawed by Congress in Porto Rico, Alaska and the District of Columbia, and excluded from the mails, and in large measure now, from interstate commerce. Patriotism now demands that the American people finish the job of destroying John Barleycorn. That they will do so, we do not for a moment doubt. A drunken soldier cannot fight; a drunker man cannot produce either in field or factory. The people need bread more than they need booze. No man is a patriot who now stands with booze against the common welfare and common defense of the United States.

Prohibition, once enacted, will become permanent. The whole country will hail national prohibition as the dawning of a new day. Before the war ceases, the beneficent effects of prohibition will be so apparent in the economic, social, commercial and moral realms that it will be impossible to induce the American people to return to the policy of the licensed saloon and a debauched public

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION, PRO-VIDING FOR, AND RELATING TO THE CREATION OF CONSERVATION DISTRICTS

Senate Joint Resolution No. 12.

Proposing to ammend Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto at the end thereof another section to be known as Section 59, declaring the conservation and preservation of all the natural resources of the State of Texas are public rights and duties; providing for the creation of conservation districts, declaring such districts bodies polite and corporate, defining the authority of such districts, and conferring upon the Legislature authority to pass laws with reference thereto; declaring that the Legislature shall have authority generally to legislate for the purpose of conserving the natural resources of the State; fixing the time for the election for the adoption or rejection of said proposed constitutional amendment; making certain provisions for said election and the ballots thereof

and the methods thereof; directing the issuance of the proclamation therefor prescribing certain duties of the Governor of the State and making an appropriation to defray the expenses of said election.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1 That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be ended by adding thereto at the end thereof another section to be known as Section 59, and which shall read as follows:

Section 59a- The conservation and development of all of the natural resources of this State, including the control, storing, preservation and distribution of its sterm and flood waters, the waters of its rivers and streams, for irrigation, power and all other useful purposes, the reclamation and irrigation of its arid, semi-arid and other lands needing irrigation, the reclamation and drainage of its over-flowed lands, and other lands needing drainage, the conservation and development of its forests, water and hydroelectric power, the navigation of its inland and coastal waters, and the preservation and conservation of all such natural resources of the State are each and all hereby declared public rights and duties; and, the Legislature shall pass all such law as may be appropriate thereto.

(b) There may be created within the State of Texas, or the State may be divided into, such number of conservation and reclamation districts as may be determined to be essential to the accomplishment of the purposes of the amendment to the constitution, which districts shall be governmental agencies and bodies politic and corporate with such powers of government and with the authority to exercise such rights, privileges and functions concerning the subject matter of this amendment as may be conferred by law.

(c) The Legislature shall authorize all such indebtedness as may be necessary to provide all improvements and the maintenance thereof requisite to the achievement for the purpose of this amendment, and all such indebtedness may be evidenced by bonds of such conservation and reclamation districts, to be issued under such regulations as may be prescribed by law and shall also, authorize the levy and collection within such districts of all such taxes; equitably distributed, as may be necessary for the payment of the interest and the creation of a sinking fund for the payment of such bonds; and also for the maintenance of such districts and improvements, and such indebtedness shall be a lien upon the property assessed for the payment thereof; provided the Legislature shall not authorize the issuance of any bonds of provide for any indebtedness against any reclamation district unless such proposition shall first be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying voters of such district and the proposition adopted.

Sec. 2- The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held for such purpose on the Third Tuesday in August, A. D. 1817, the same being the 21st day of August, A. D. 1917; At said election the vote shall be by official ballot which shall have printed or written thereon the words "For the amendment to Article 16 of the constitution of the State of Texas providing for conservation district, the creation of such districts and their government and regulation," and also the words "Against the amendment to article 16 of the constitution of the State of Texas providing for conservation districts, the creation of such districts and their government and regulation." All voters favoring this proposed constitutional amendment shall erase the words "Against the amendment to Article 16 of the constitution of the State of Texas providing for conservation districts, the creation of such districts and their government regulation," and those opposing it shall erase the words "For the amendment to Article 16 of the constitution of the State of Texas providing for conservation districts, the creation of such districts and their government and regulation," which said erasures shall be made by making a mark with pencil; or pen through said words: All ballots cast as above provided shall be counted as cast for or against this proposed amendment, and if a majority of the votes cast shall be for the amendment it shall be declared adopted; if a majority of the votes cast shall be against the amendment said amendment shall be lost. All the provisions of the general election laws as amended and in force at the time said election is held shall govern in all respects as to the qualifications of electors, the methods of holding such election and in all other respects as far as such election laws can be made applicable.

Sec. 3- The governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4- The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of such proclamation, publication and election.


