At Last the Denver has Recognized the Need of Better Passenger Facilities for our Town and a new Depot is the Result

Stock News.

Dick Walsh arrived from Denver Tuesday morning.

J. S. Wynne bought of McElroy & Buntin 125 yearling steers at \$12.50. They were delivered here and branded this week.—Panhandle Herald.

The National Live Stock Commission Company place an ad with us this week to which the attention of shippers is directed. The National "is the old reliable," and renders the best service to shippers.

A deal has been pending for some weeks whereby J. E. McCombs of this city buys a big slice of the Lee Dyer ranch near Goodnight. The consummation of the trade only lacks the proper preparation of the papers.

The wolves are committing some depredations among calves near Beverly. S. J. Jackson lost three cows, and more than a dozen calves have fallen prey to lobo wolves. The JA people have also lost some stock from these marauders.—Amarillo Herald.

Gathings & Van Eaton on Monday shipped two loads of extra fine dehorned steers to Kansas city and one load of horned steers to St. Joe. The cattle were smooth and fat and should have brought not less than \$4.25 to \$4.50 according to the judgment of local cattlemen, but brought on the market \$3.95. They averaged 1160 pounds. Mr. Gathings accompanied the shipment.

Geo. M. Bugbee, who used to be in the cattle business but who is now kaffir-corning down in Hall county and inspecting mud-cats out of Deep Lake for amusement, was here this week. Our reporter sized him up as ripe for an interview but he flatly said he didn't know a darned thing about the cattle business; he used to think he knew a little but since the markets got shot to pieces against his predictions he didn't pretend to know a beef steer from a bull frog.

The Priddy-Reeves Realty Co. this week sold the P. R. Stephens ranch near Goodnight to W. A. SoRelle, of Bosque county. The ranch consists of seven sections of patented land, and included in the sale was about 300 head of cattle, all work stock and tools. The consideration amounted to something like \$30,000 and possession will be given at once. Col. Stephens will move to Clarendon, while Mr. SoRelle will also locate in this city in all probability in order to place his family convenient to our schools.

Donley County Peaches and Advertising.

E. E. Baldwin, local agent for The Denver, is an enthusiastic member of the Donley County Improvement Club, and takes an interest in the affairs of the town and county quite unusual in railroad employes, who as a rule have troubles enough of their own. One of Mr. Baldwin's duties is to send in to headquarters twice a week a crop report for the county, and such other information as to public improvements as might prove of value to the officials. To our personal knowledge the making of these crop reports with Mr. Baldwin is a matter of considerable pride and he makes efforts to see that true and correct reports alone reach headquarters. The information in these reports is disseminated by the officials in such manner as to be of most benefit to the county.

Along with a recent report Mr. Baldwin sent General Passenger Agent Glisson a box of peaches from the orchard of F. N. Page, samples of the present large and very fine crop, with the compliments of the Improvement Club, in response to which favor Mr. Glisson wrote:

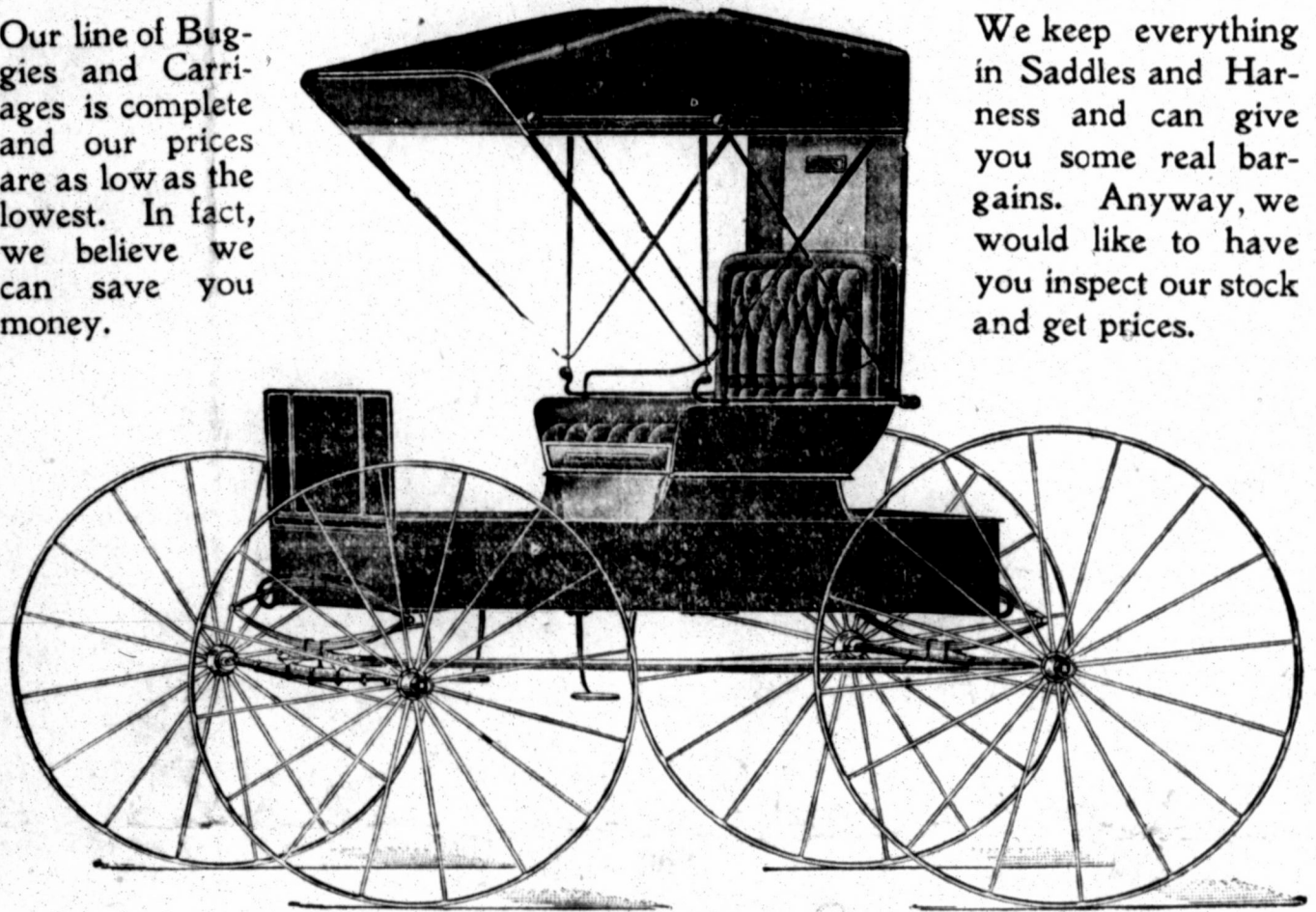

Forty acres of the crop made seventy-five bushels per acre, the remainder did not yield so much. Mr. Rawlings tells us his outfit often threshes from four to five thousand bushels of oats or twenty-five to twenty-eight hundred bushels of wheat a day. We were struck with the great improvement made in threshing machinery since we were a boy, when we had to take a ten foot pole with each end hitched to a rope and tied to a mule to drag off the straw from the machine. Mr. Rawlings goes next to the J. M. Myers crop. He says he has threshed only one crop of wheat that made as low as eighteen bushels per acre.—Quanah Observer.

Holland's Magazine.

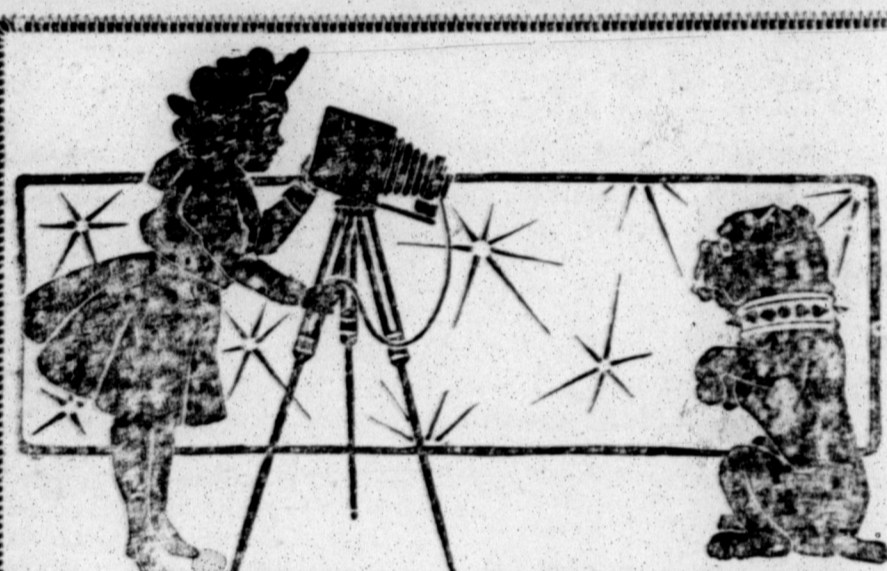

The Summer Normal.

Delayed from last week.]

Since our last report the work of the normal has been going prosperously forward toward its close which will occur July the 29th. The teachers are working with a will to secure the much coveted state certificate at the closing examinations.

The total enrollment in the normal is 83. The last to join were, Miss Wine, Mrs. Crockett, Miss Clark, Mr. J. S. Graves and Miss Mary Baker, making the largest enrollment of any normal ever held in Clarendon, or the Panhandle.

Some subjects are finished and new ones have been taken up. Dr. Burkhead has finished grammar and is now presenting the subject of composition and rhetoric. Prof. Haynes has finished physiology and is now taking up the subjects of reading, writing and spelling.

Prof. J. S. Graves has opened a writing school for the benefit of the teachers. He is one of the finest penmen in the state. His class will meet at evenings at five o'clock, and he will be glad to accept students from the outside who wish to take a ten days course. The class will meet in the college.

Many visitors have called within the last week or so but we have not been able to keep tally on their names. Prominent among the visitors were, Dr. Clyde, W. H. Cooke, Miss Gabie Betts, Prof. W. T. Johnson and Rev. Dickey.

Dr. Clyde, President of Sherman College, made an impressive speech before the teachers on the importance of the profession of teaching. He emphasized the fact that teachers should enter the profession with the intention of making it a life work, as it is one of the most important that a person can enter.

Rev. W. P. Dickey was called and took the position that while teaching is an important calling there is one still higher for every young lady, and that is the call to matrimony. His speech was well received as fully 90 per cent of the teachers are young ladies. The young men fully agreed with the speaker.

Miss Gabie Betts recently delivered her first lecture in a course of 3 or 4 that she will deliver on the subject of primary methods. The lecture was on the subject of primary reading and was full of good suggestions on this class of work.

A delegation of 5 or 6 of the teachers attended the reunion at Canyon City on Wednesday.

Prof. Silvey has been giving his classes a number of tests in the various subjects in mathematics in order to stimulate them to more accurate work. Failures have resulted in most cases of from 5 to 10 per cent. While these are not final, they serve as pointers as to the final outcome.

There are some excellent young teachers in attendance upon the normal who have not yet engaged their services for the coming year. Boards of trustees seeking good teachers will do well to make the facts known to the conductor, or any of the instructors in the normal.

To Teachers And Patrons Of The Public School.

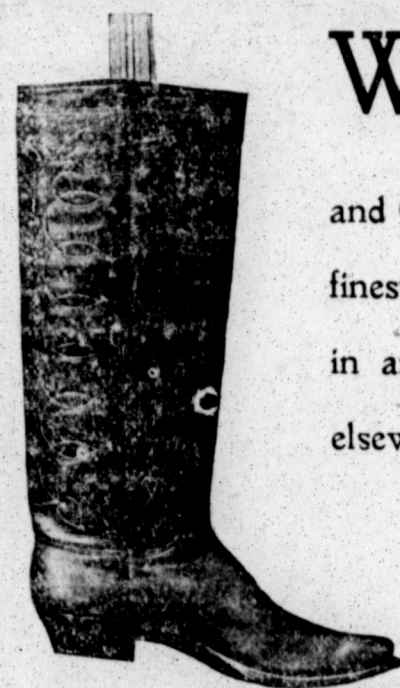

KANSAS CITY MARKET REPORT

Special to BANNER-STOCKMAN.

Kansas City, Mo., July 17.

Receipts of cattle on the local market show a material increase the past week over those of the former week. With the increase in supply, came a wide range in quality, from the lowest classes of steers and shee to topky kinds. The increase was mostly on the quarantine side and range offerings in the native division. Prices have declined 15 to 25 cents, showing the entire advance of the former week wiped out. Fancy heavy heaves were scarce and values were not fairly tested. The top was \$5.65, while offerings were plentiful at \$5 to \$5.50. Plain half fat kinds were not wanted. Mixed steers and heifers sold about steady with the range during the preceding week. Stockers and feeders were dull at 10 to 15 cents lower prices. Veal calves strong. Western grades are beginning to come, but the quality is poor. Following the liberal supply of last week close to 16,000 cattle were in the pens today. A few over 8,000 were in the quarantine division. The quality was only fair to good, including a large per cent of plain western cows that brought \$2 to \$2.50. Fat steers were scarce, only a few bringing above \$5. Native heifers brought \$4 to \$5. The market averaged 10 to 15 cents lower and closed with a number still unsold. Good cows brought \$3.25 to \$4.30, veal calves \$6 to \$5.50. Good choice light weight stockers were in demand, but other kinds were not wanted. A large number were plain western grades.

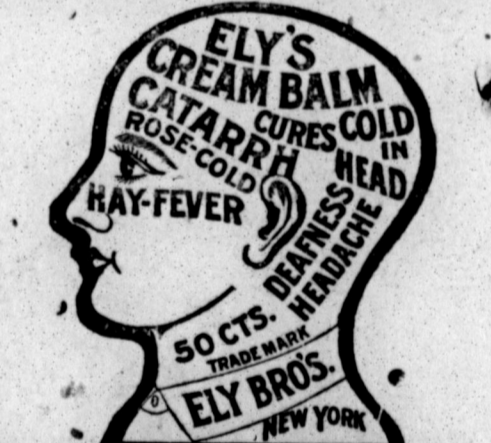
