## A Modern Exemplification of Christ's Greatest Miracle--Feeding the Multitude--on the Fourth of July in Clarendon.

### Arrangements Completed for Fourth

Clarendon Now in Position to Entertain Largest Crowd in the City's History.

The 4th of July arrangement committee report that they have things well in hand and have only a few minor duties to perform to finish the work of arranging for the feeding and comfort of the visitors that will be in our town on that day. This has been a herculean task and the committee deserve credit for the manner in which they have performed the work set for them to do. Beef enough to feed at least several thousand people has been procured, with bread, pickles, etc. in proportion. On the eating proposition, at least, those who visit Clarendon on that day will have no complaint to make, and we hardly think they will have any kick coming against any of the program.

The baseball committee has spent some time in trying to obtain the best teams possible to entertain the crowd on the Fourth, and has made arrangements to have the Amarillo and Childress teams here on that day. These teams have the reputation of being among the best in Northwest Texas, and lovers of the national sport will have an opportunity of witnessing a rattling good game of ball no doubt.

Members of the arrangement committee have received notice from parties at Amarillo to the effect that the entire town expects to be in Clarendon on the Fourth. As Clarendon makes a specialty of celebrating the 4th of July and has done so since the town was first organized it is thought this year's crowd will be the largest in the history of these celebrations. We want to assure those from out of town that if they conclude to visit us they will be accorded a hearty welcome, the town will be their's

on that day and if they go away feeling that they have not been properly entertained the feeling will be caused by a torpid liver and not by lack of effort on the part of our town people to see that they have a good time.

Mrs. Frauks, who has been seriously ill the past few weeks, is reported rapidly getting well.

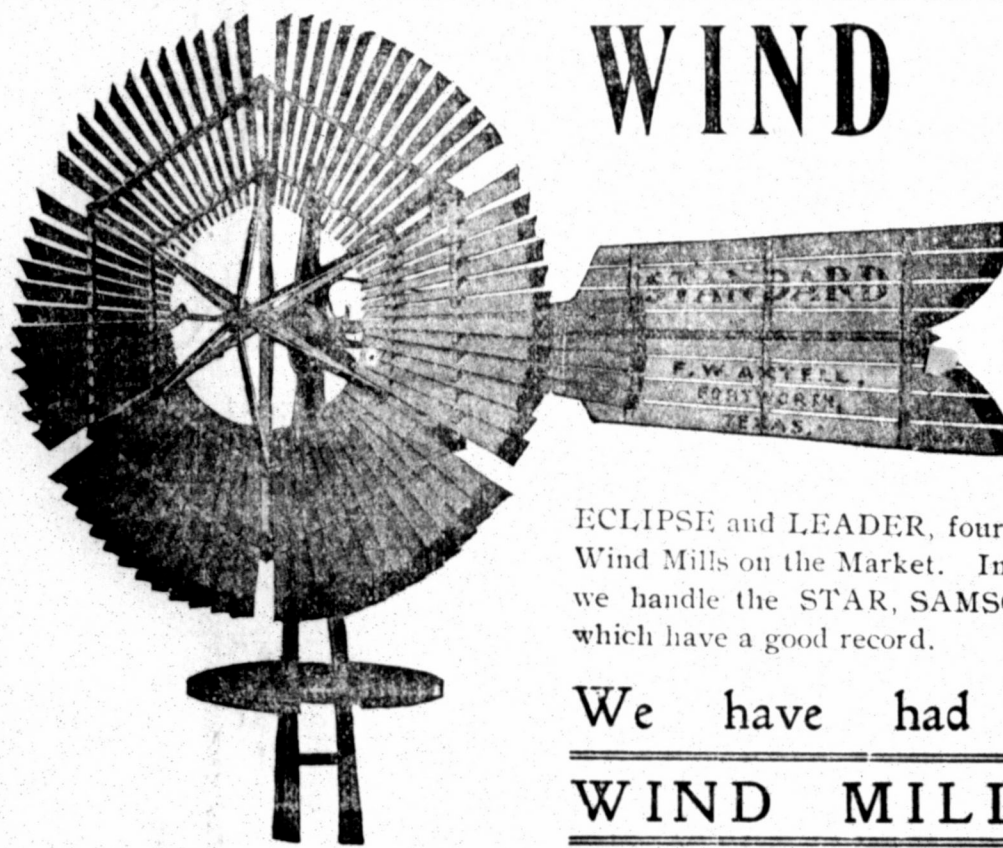
#### Tournament for Fourth of July.

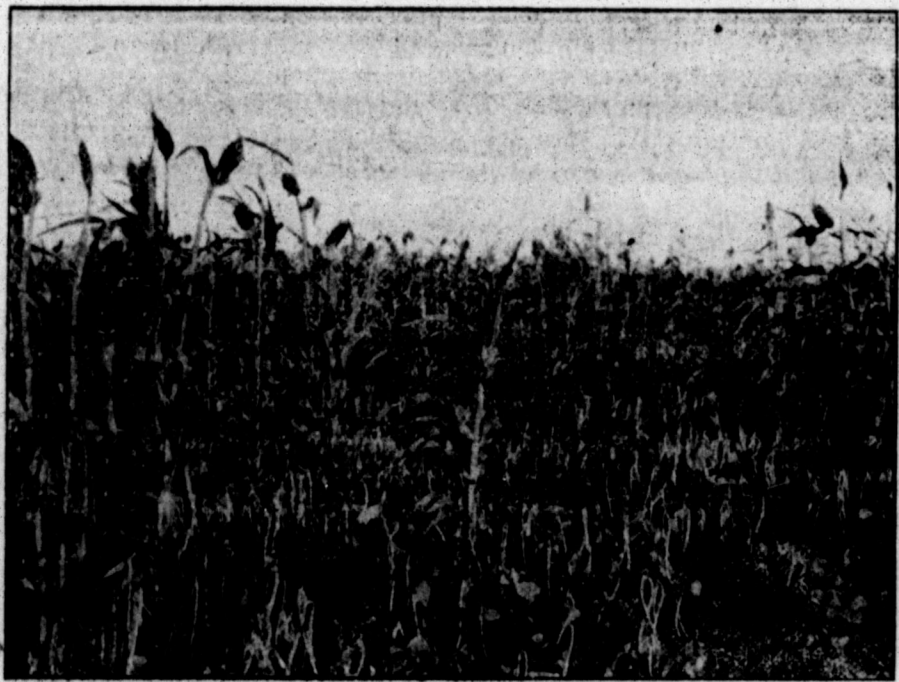


## JOSIER JOINS THE CLUB

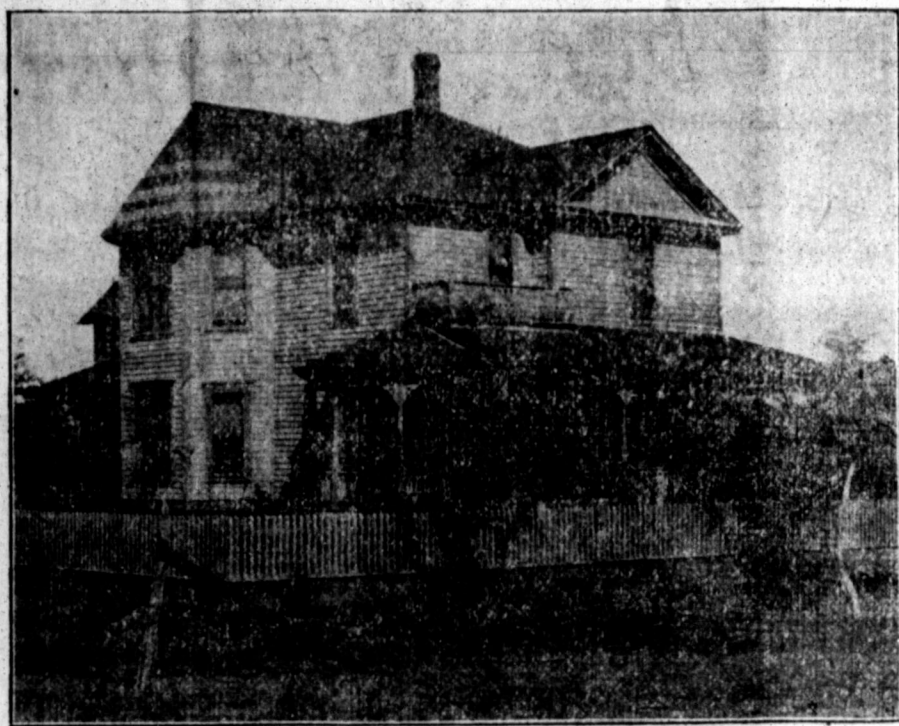

**Panhandle Farmers' Congress.**

Arrangements are well under way for the sessions of the Panhandle Farmers' Institute, which will occur at Amarillo on the 11th and 12th of August. The program will be among the most notable of any gathering in the history of northwest Texas, and will include papers and addresses from men of national reputation. At the same time the list of topics will include subjects with which the people of the Plains country have daily association, including fruit growing in all its phases, soil methods as embraced in the Campbell theory, small fruits, grains suitable to the prairies, the planting and growth of alfalfa as a commercial crop, feeding cattle, cotton growing, hogs, etc. Interspersed with these will be addresses by men who are familiar with the conditions that surround us, forming an experience meeting of priceless value not only to the newcomers but to those who have lived on the flatness for years and still have a few things to learn. Reduced rates will be given on all the railroads, practically one fare, and Amarillo will see that her guests are hospitably entertained. The program committee will complete its labors in a few days and their announcements will be watched with interest.

**Seed and Plant Introduction.**

No less than 1,429 selected kinds of seeds and plants were introduced from foreign countries and established in the United States last year. These include 350 date suckers representing 42 varieties, 19 varieties of grapes from Russian Caucasus, 33 varieties of mangoes of recognized superiority from central India, 157 bushels of berseem from the valley of the Nile, 2,000 pounds of the famous new barley from Moravia, 200 trees of the hardy Vladimir cherry from Russia (distributed in the northwest), and many others.—Secretary Wilson.

## The Summer Normal.

The Summer Normal now being held at this place is making satisfactory progress and much interest is being taken by the teachers.

From the best information obtainable, it seems that the Panhandle Summer Normal is one of the largest in the state except the summer session of the state school.

The total enrollment to the present date is 76.

Under the law governing the normal teachers cannot enter later than next week, and be entitled to take the examination.

The teachers who have been enrolled this week are Miss Mary Macateer from Dickens county; Misses Marion Russell and Ethel Roland from Amarillo and Miss Lucy Martin from Clarendon.

The normal so far has not received the attention from the citizenship that its importance demands. Especially are the local teachers and the various pastors of the churches invited to be present at the meetings.

The hour of meeting is 8 a. m. and the session continues until 12:30, the daily sessions lasting half the day, the afternoon being given to study.

So industrious is this body of students that they have voted a Saturday session also, giving six days to work each week. Fears are being entertained by some of our more patriotic members that the glorious Fourth will not be given as a holiday.

Prof. Ballard from Gray county is a new arrival at the normal. He spent the summer here two years ago and evidently thinks well of Clarendon as a place to spend his vacation.

Miss Gabie Betts and Miss Miller were visitors Thursday. Miss Sherman was a visitor the first of the week.

The Globe Confectionery invited the teachers down to sample their ice cream, the first of the week. A large number of them accepted the invitation and praise the treatment received. The teachers are ready to accept other invitations of a similar kind.

Prof. W. A. Thompson has been handling the subject of physical geography for Prof. Haynes this week and Prof. W. E. Reeves has been trying his hand at the teaching of civil government.

Arrangement have been made whereby Miss Gabie Betts is to give some special work in primary methods the first of next week. Miss Betts is well prepared to do this class of work and it will be of much interest to the teachers.

Misses Nora Talley and Iva Martin were calling upon the different classes on Thursday.

Mr. N. C. Duggins, out side of the faculty, is the oldest teacher in attendance. As the great majority are ladies we would hesitate to say which is the largest, which the smallest, and which the prettiest teacher in attendance.

A certain town in Michigan is a satisfying place of residence for the two editors of that place. Not long ago the people got together and decided the town needed pushing. As a preliminary step, the promoters agreed to recognize the importance of the two local weekly newspapers. It was realized that while every man, woman and child in town might write a letter to outsiders concerning the advantages of their community, or that five or ten men might be sent out to travel and talk up the town, its newspapers, if properly backed, would do fifty times as much.

That town had two weekly papers. The meeting voted to raise \$100 apiece for them, and the editors pledged themselves to get out "boom" issues. They did so, devoting three pages to the history of the town, its growth, its advantages and needs. Every item that might prove of use to manufacturers or business men was inserted, and all information that homeseekers might desire was given at length. The editors more than earned their money. When they had their matter in hand a second public meeting voted to buy and send out 5,000 copies of each paper, mailing them to merchants, manufacturers and others in various states. In addition to this, 500 families agreed to buy five copies each and mail them away.

The result has been just what was looked for by the level-headed men who started the movement. That wolverine town of 3,000 inhabitants is being talked about today in a dozen states, and its postmaster, mayor and the editors are being flooded with letters of inquiry. It has been visited by men who wish to establish some line of mercantile business, by people searching for work and for homes. The results have come quickly and are more than satisfactory. Had a hundred men gone East, West, North and South and talked for weeks they could not have created half the stir.—Western Publisher.

### ARRESTED AT ROSWELL.

Dealer in Pecos Valley Lands Charged With Subordinating Perjury.

B. L. Tallmadge of Chicago, one of the largest land and immigration operators in the country, who has been dealing in Pecos valley lands for some time, was arrested at Roswell on a charge of subordination of perjury. The particular instance was that in which it is alleged that Tallmadge had certain land proved upon for his benefit by an agent. The arrest was caused by Grosvenor Clarkson, who is actively engaged in looking after the business of the United States land office here.

The preliminary hearing is set for Saturday, July 1, before United States Commissioner Karl A. Snyder. Tallmadge was placed under \$5,000 bond, which he readily gave.

Hon. W. W. Gatewood, Richardson Reid and Mr. Hervey have been engaged to defend him.

Tallmadge makes no attempt to screen anything and openly states that every land transaction he has taken part in here has been straight and according to law.

It is said that the arrest of Tallmadge is the opening gun in a campaign of general prosecution of alleged fraudulent entries in government lands. It is also claimed that the prosecution here will be a parallel to the prosecution of alleged land frauds in Utah, Oregon and Montana.—Fort Worth Record.

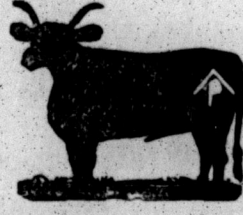

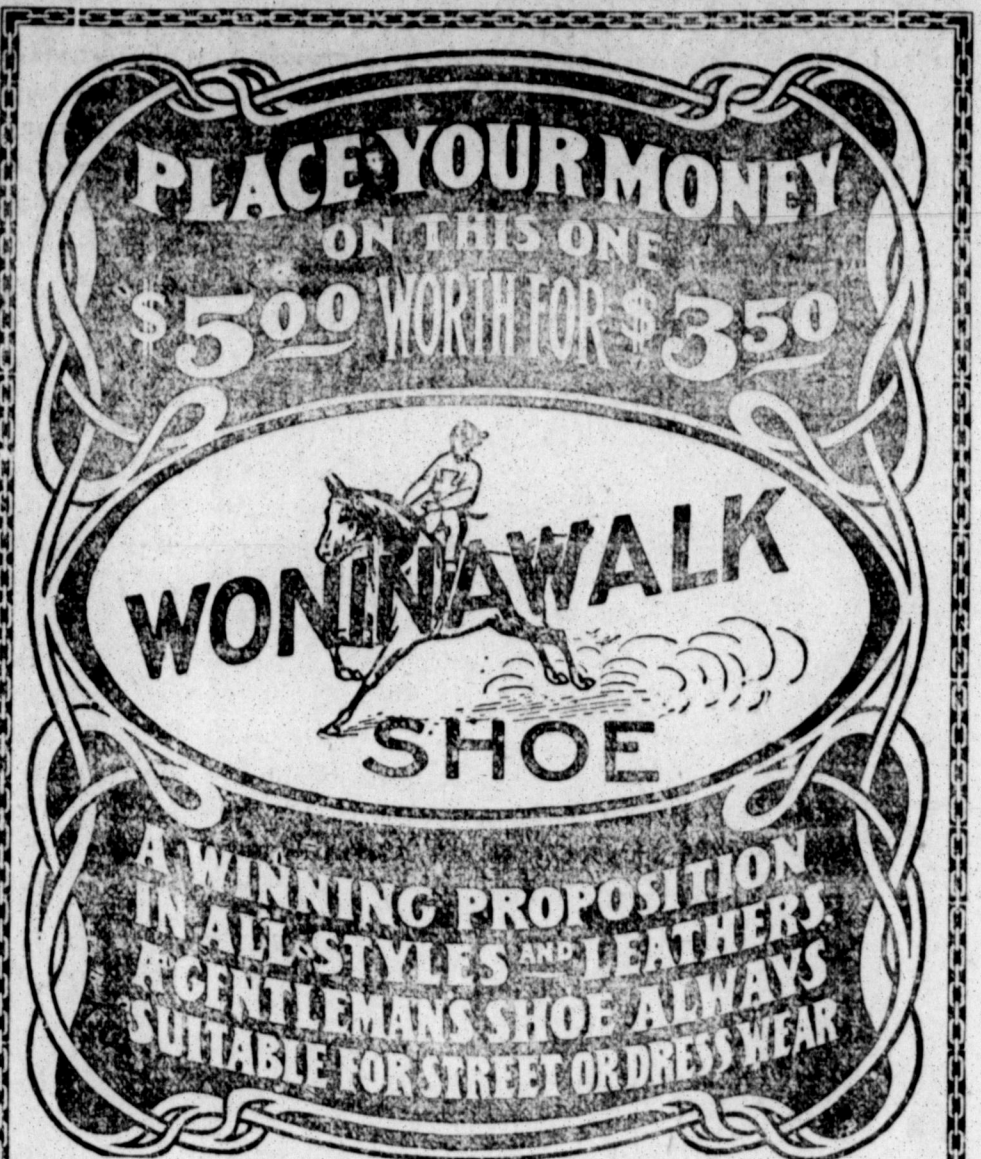
