Gin Ready If farmers will co-operate, the Hereford gin will be ready for use this fell, prepared to work at full pacity. That was the import of letter received here this week from E. Cook, president of the Guthrie Cotton Oil company. Said Mr. Cook, in part:

With more than fifty plants new in operation or under construction, Hereford's irrigation season has begun with an indication of great prosperity in store for those who are taking advantages of the unlimited possibilities of the shallow water region. Several new have been installed and a nu of new families, attracted by the shallow water, have moved here this winter to begin the truck farming season soon.

Several thousand dollars worth of truck and garden produce was shipped from here last year, and a survey made this week of a tion reveals that this amount will probably be raised in 1928.

On a forty acre tract, most common size for the truck farm, s small plant such as is now used by the majority of people here costs about \$1,000, and supply about 500 gallons of water per minute.

According to L. Baskin, one of the leading exponents of the truck farming and irrigation industry here, a forty acre tract is as much as one man should try to handle elone. He recommends that the larger plants, where 80 to 160 acres are under irrigation, should be cut up into smaller tracts, with a family to each tract. Water for these smaller tracts can all be furnished from the one large pump. This method is especially good for farms nearer town, Mr. Baskin







From the March Drygoodsman

February selling has further emphasized the importance of printed fabrics both in cotton and silk lines.

In the silk lines, printed flat crepes, crepe de Chine radiums, and pongees are outstanding. The small to medium' patterns are particularly favored in the wash silks, with more attention given to the larger patterns in the flowered thin materials.

Celanese and rayon voiles have established a place for themselves in all piece goods departments. The popular selling numbers are the prints, particularly in floral designs.

In cotton goods lines, of course, prints are receiving first attention. Printed voiles, batiste and dimity are all very important. The medium and larger floral patterns seem to be favored in voiles while the small patterns are favored in other prints.

The plain wash fabrics that are selling, include suitings, cotton broadcloth, plain colored voile, natural and colored pongee.

Rayon material of all kinds continue to increase in importance, printed rayon crepes in small patterns are selling. Novelty rayon and cotton fabrics are also good.

In woolen goods lines, lightweight tweeds and sport coatings are especially good. The lightweight tweeds are used for dresses, suits, ensembles and coats. The tan, grey and blue patterns predominate. In the sport coatings, novelty patterns and tweed effects are good.

Kasha cloth and broadcloth are important for coats and ensembles. High colored woolens are selling, with emphasis on such shades as canary, pink, light blue, apple green, rose, heliotrope and scarlet.

Plaid flannels in Scottish patterns are selling for children's wear.


