## DALLAS TRADE EVANGELS HERE

Forty Five Minutes Stop—Three Speeches—Brass Band—Souvenirs and Smiles.

Capped, penanted, tagged and badged, the trade evangelists from the great city of the Southwest—Dallas—stopped for just forty-five minutes in Hereford Tuesday afternoon. The train arrived promptly on schedule and the boosters detrained at the depot, took up a line of march up Main street to the court house, led by their big band. In the district court room, Mayor W. M. Knight made a short welcome address. Secretary Babcock of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce then introduced Harry L. Seay of The Southwestern Life Insurance Co., who made a rapid fire talk of some 12 minutes, telling in that short time why Dallas was the logical trade center for all Texas. The Dallas part of the audience was then excused that they might visit the merchants of the town, while those remaining heard Col. McKamey, representing the Texas State Fair, talk about stock farming, silos and the Fair. Both speakers invited everybody to visit Dallas.

It had been planned to take a lot of these boosters out to see the irrigation wells, but the time being so short and the fact that the roads were muddy for autoing, prevented. We believe Hereford gave the evangelists of trade a welcome that they appreciated and will long remember. It remained for E. C. Myrick, gent's furnisher, to put one by that Dallas bunch. By the handy touch of Mr. Darnell, advertising expert, the windows had been decorated with a display of furnishings and a big card announced the fact: "Everything in this window was bought in Dallas." This is what plucked the enthusiastic chord of trade in the hearts of the Dallas delegation. Another big banner, hung in front of the door, which could be seen and read across the block, also brought a round of applause.

The graduating class of the Hereford High School also played on the hearts of the trade angels. They stood at the foot of the marble stairs in the court house and as the men came down presented each with a large, button hole bouquet of carnations. This is the Thirteenth Annual Trade Tour by the Dallas business men. This trip covers 1,821 miles, going as far west as El Paso and as far north as Amarillo. In their itinerary prospectus, the Story of Dallas in a Nutshell is told:

Population, 120,594; post office receipts, \$847,323.00; number of factories, 305; total output of factories, \$41,848,455.00; number of jobbing houses, 318; total jobbing business, \$180,455,000.00; bank deposits, \$36,284,570.00; bank resources, \$46,149,177.00; freight business annually, 2,567,203 tons; Dallas has the greatest State Fair in the world or anywhere else, with over 600,000 paid admissions; Dallas has 30,107 telephones; Dallas has 146 long distance telephone circuits; Dallas has 138 miles of electric interurban railway in operation, and 123 miles under construction; Dallas has 99 daily passenger trains; Dallas has 114 electric interurban trains daily; Dallas has 262 telegraph circuits, radiating from it as a center;

Dallas has 9 railroads; Dallas has the longest concrete viaduct in the world, 5,884 feet long; Dallas leads the world in the manufacture of harness and saddlery; Dallas leads the world in the sale of agricultural implements and gin machinery.

## IRRIGATION DEPARTMENT

Irrigation and Civilization Go Hand in Hand.

By I. T. Matthews, Irrigation Specialist.

The basis of human activity depends primarily upon the acquisition of food and raiment. Therefore, the lands which have been most productive of these, in the history of mankind, have been the most populous and the most highly civilized. If we turn to the chronicles of three thousand years ago we may read of the amazing riches of the promised land, whence the Canaanites were banished to make place for the chosen people, newly come from Egyptian bondage, and in all we read there will be impressed upon our minds the one thought of the amazing productivity of those lands where there was the proper blending of sunshine, of soil and of water.

The irrigation activities in the Tierra Blanco Valley, although in its infancy, in climate, in productive soil, in cultural practices, typify and duplicate the riches of the farm lands of the promised land. Therefore, it is well for us seriously to weigh these facts, for when we know the lines on which nature has marked the course of our destiny the easier will it be to follow that course.

Before history opened descendants of Ham settled in Egypt, and the overflowing of the waters of the Nile suggested irrigation, and irrigation led to the use of the mind, and hence civilization was born. Somewhere near the same time the children of Shem came down from Armenia to the banks of the Euphrates and the Tigris and there began the practice of irrigation and civilization found a new seat. Abraham led his flock to the westward from this region, and the Hebrews camped on the grounds of the Canaanites, were then taken captive in Egypt, returned to Canaan, overthrew the occupants and established the historic Palestine with irrigation of the soil as the foundation of industry. Sons of Japheth found their way to India, began the practice of irrigation, and civilization sprang up inevitably, for irrigation alone produces the first germs of civilization. Other sons of Japheth had gone to the west and peopled Europe, Greece, Rome, Spain, Germany, France and Britain, but they lived the wild life because they did not practice irrigation. The products of the ancient world that set it aside in tradition and history as symbols of riches and prosperity were: grains, pasturage, live stock, dairy products, fruits, cotton, wool, garden vegetables, etc. The things that marked the riches of the ancient world were: what man eats, what he wears, what he decorates himself with, what he uses for ornamentation, what he protects himself from the elements with, what he feeds to his domestic animals, what he uses as standard of measure. In each of these lines Tierra Blanco Valley with irrigation, not only can produce everything required, but produces the identical things that made famous the nations of old. This fertile valley, on the plains of the new world, with practical twentieth century methods will produce, plums, peaches, cantaloupes, watermelons, pears, apples, quinces, grapes, berries and vegetables, including practically everything known to the American table, also wool, cotton, butter, honey, barley, corn, wheat, alfalfa, beef, swine, sheep, chickens

and turkeys. The irrigated area is spreading rapidly, and the time is near at hand when this valley will have half as great an area of irrigated land as had all ancient lower Egypt when the fame of its riches encompassed the earth.

## GOOD RAINS VISIT HEREFORD

After Long Wait for Moisture, the Plains Get Big April Showers and Sam Dunn Loses Barrel of Fish.

Last Saturday the first shower for some months visited this community. A few light-shows had fallen during the winter, just enough to keep a little moisture in the ground and to keep the wheat waiting. On Sunday afternoon and at night another bigger and better shower fell; in fact, a good rain, measuring one quarter inch. Again, Tuesday evening, just at night fall, another and still a better rain visited the county. This was accompanied by some hail, but no damage is reported. This shower measured nearly one half inch. But for a real good soaker and a great variety of weather, Wednesday was the big shower day as well as show day for the weather department. Rain fell intermittently during the morning, starting out early with a good shower. In the afternoon, more rain came accompanied with big flakes of snow. This mixture of snow and rain lasted for nearly an hour. Water was running everywhere and the streets presented a sloppy condition, not seen here in April in several years. The total precipitation was 1.45 inches.

The scholastic population of Deaf Smith county is 637 according to a report just issued by the State Department of Education, and the total apportionment at \$6.81 per capita is \$4,363.45 for the 1912-13 term. All of our school children are whites. The total number of school children over seven and under seventeen years of age in Texas is 1,017,133, and 812,896 are white and 204,237 are colored. The males number 515,603 and the females 501,530. The total apportionments are \$6,967,361 for the state.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Authorizing the Issuance of Bonds for the Purpose of the Construction of the Necessary Buildings for the University of Texas and Also for Buildings of Various Institutions, and Authorizing Improvement Bonds for the Purpose of Navigation, Irrigation, Construction of Bridges and the Maintenance and Operation of Public Warehouses.

(S. J. R. No. 18.) SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION.

To be entitled A Joint Resolution proposing and submitting to a vote of the people of Texas an amendment to Sections 49 and 52 of Article 3 of the Constitution, authorizing the issuance of bonds and the levying of a tax to pay the interest and sinking fund on same for public improvements.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas.

SEC. 1. That Sections 49 and 52 of Article 3 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows, to-wit:

Section 49. No debt shall be created by or on behalf of the State except to supply casual deficiencies of revenue, repel invasion, suppress insurrection and defend the State in war or pay existing debts, and no debt created to supply deficiencies in current revenues shall ever exceed in the aggregate at any one time five hundred thousand dollars. The Legislature, however, shall have power to authorize the issuance of bonds to be approved by the Governor for the purpose of purchasing additional ground and erect necessary buildings for the University of Texas, including a medical department, an Agricultural and Mechanical College and all departments and activities of a complete university of the first class. The revenue received from the permanent University fund shall be available for the payment of interest on these bonds and for the creation of a sinking fund for their redemption at maturity and the Legislature shall also have power to issue bonds for the construction of necessary buildings for State institutions. The Legislature shall also have the power to authorize the issuance of bonds secured by lien on the real property of the penitentiary system to be approved by the Governor for the purpose of constructing buildings and making permanent improvements.

Section 52. The Legislature shall have no power to authorize any county, city, town or other political corporation or subdivision of the

State to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid of or to any individual association or corporation whatsoever or to become a stockholder in such corporation, association or company; provided, however, that under Legislative provisions any county, any political subdivision of a county, any number of adjoining counties or any political subdivision of the State or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas and which may or may not include towns, villages or municipal corporations upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such district or territory to be effected thereby in addition to all other debts may issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit in any amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of such district or territory, except in case of improvement of rivers, creeks, and streams, in building of levees to prevent overflows, in which case the bonded indebtedness may be for an amount not to exceed one-half of the assessed valuation of the lands of the district to be reclaimed; and, except, further, that the total bonded indebtedness of any city or town shall never exceed the limits imposed by other provisions of this Constitution, and levy and collect such taxes to pay the interest thereon and provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof as the legislature may authorize and in such manner as it may authorize the same for the following purposes, to-wit:

(a) The improvement of rivers, creeks and streams to prevent overflows and to permit of navigation thereof or irrigation therefrom or in aid of such purposes.

(b) The construction and maintenance of pools, lakes, reservoirs, dams, canals and water-ways for the purposes of irrigation, drainage or navigation or in aid thereof.

(c) The construction, maintenance and operation of bridges and macadamized, graveled, sandy clay, or clayed sand or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof.

(d) The construction, maintenance and operation of public warehouses or in aid thereof.

SEC. 2. The foregoing amendment to Sections 49 and 52 of Article 3 of the Constitution of Texas shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this State for adoption or rejection at a special election hereby ordered for the third Saturday in July, 1913, the same being the nineteenth day of said month. All voters on this proposed amendment at said election who favor its adoption shall have printed or written on their ballots the following:

For amendment to Sections 49 and 52 of Article 3, of the Constitution, authorizing the issuance of bonds for the University of Texas, Agricultural and Mechanical College, State Penitentiary System, and other public improvements and building of warehouses for agricultural products. Those voting against its adoption shall have written or printed on their ballots the following:

Against amendment to Sections 49 and 52, of Article 3, of the Constitution, authorizing the issuance of bonds for the University of Texas, Agricultural and Mechanical College, State Penitentiary System, and other public improvements and building of warehouses for agricultural products.

Previous to the election the Secretary of State shall cause to be printed and forwarded to the County Judge of each county, for use in said election, a sufficient number of ballots for the use of voters in each county on which he shall have printed the form of ballot herein prescribed, for the convenient use of the voters.

SEC. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue his necessary proclamation ordering this election, and have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of the State. The sum of five thousand (\$5,000) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any fund in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of publishing said proclamation and printing of tickets and necessary blanks to use in said election.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Prescribing Qualifications for District Judges of This State and Prescribing Their Tenure of Office.

(S. J. R. No. 11.) A JOINT RESOLUTION.

Amending Section 7, Article 5, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to the creation and formation of judicial districts, the terms of office of judges of the district courts, and the times of holding courts.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas.

SEC. 1. That Section 7, Article 5, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 7. The State shall be divided into as many judicial districts as may be necessary, to be created by law, which may be increased or diminished by law. For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a general election, one or more judges,

each of whom shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall have been a practicing lawyer of this State, or a judge of a court in this State for six years next preceding his election; who shall have resided in the district in which he was elected for two years next preceding his election, who shall reside in his district during his term of office; who shall hold his office for a period of four years, and shall receive for his services an annual salary of three thousand dollars, until otherwise changed by law. Court shall be held by a district judge at the county seat in each of the several counties at such times and in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall provide for the holding of the district court when the judge thereof is absent, disabled or disqualified from acting. The district judges who may be in office when this amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment.

SEC. 2. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at an election to be held on the nineteenth day of July, 1913, at which election all voters favoring this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment of Section 7, Article 5, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to district judges and district courts," and all voters opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against the amendment of Section 7, Article 5, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to district judges and district courts."

SEC. 3. The sum of five thousand dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated to pay expenses for carrying out the provisions of this resolution.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Providing All State District, County and Precinct Officers Within this State Shall be Compensated By the Payment of A Fixed Salary.

(H. J. R. No. 47.) A JOINT RESOLUTION.

Of the Legislature of the State of Texas, proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State, adding to Article 16 thereof a new section to be known as Section 58, providing for the tenure and compensation of district judges.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas.

SEC. 1. That there be added to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas a new section to be known as Section 58, which shall read as follows:

Section 58. All State, district, county and precinct officers within the State of Texas shall hereinafter be compensated by the payment of a fixed salary, to be provided for by the Legislature.

SEC. 2. The Governor of the State of Texas, as directed by the Constitution, make publication of the proposed amendment in the manner and for the time as required by the Constitution, the amendment to be voted upon by the qualified electors of this State at the general election to be held on the nineteenth day of July, 1913, the returns of which shall, as provided for in the Constitution, be made to the Secretary of State, the result ascertained and proclamation made as provided for in Section

1, Article 17, of the Constitution. There shall be written or printed on the ballots to be used at such election "for the adoption of Section 58, Article 16, as an amendment to the Constitution, providing a salary compensation for certain officers and fixing their term of office at four years;" and also "against the adoption of Section 58, Article 16, as an amendment to the Constitution for certain officers and fixing their term of office at four years;" and those opposing the adoption of said amendment shall erase the language "for the adoption of Section 58, Article 16, as an amendment to the Constitution, providing a salary compensation for certain officers and fixing their term of office at four years," by running a pencil or pen through the same.

SEC. 3. The sum of five thousand (\$5,000) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to pay the expenses of carrying out the provisions of this resolution.

Observes San Jacinto Day.

San Jacinto Day was observed in Hereford only by the three banks and the postoffice, the remaining closed all day. The general delivery window at the postoffice was open for only a short time, many had forgotten about the day when

some 700 Texans "licked the stuffin' outin'" of double that number of brave, Mexican soldiers under Santa Anna, the self-styled "Napoleon of the West." Gen. Sam Houston led the Texas volunteers to a quick and complete victory.

The battle of San Jacinto was fought in the afternoon of April 21, 1836, 77 years ago. On the previous day the two armies had taken up their positions about a mile apart. Gen. Houston had been on the march from point to point, avoiding an engagement, evidently waiting for reinforcements. This became annoying to many of his men and officers, and he thus gained the title of "The Texas Fabian." It was in this famous battle that Erastus Smith, one of Houston's trusted scouts, played such an important part. It was he who burned Vincent's bridge and thus cut off the only quick avenue of retreat. Smith was nearly dead and from this, he had been dubbed Deaf Smith. In after years, when the Texas legislature was carrying out new counties in the state, it sought to perpetuate the name of this hero by naming one of the biggest and best counties in the Panhandle in his honor; hence the name Deaf Smith county.

## Burying Whole Peach Orchards in Order to Escape Frost.

According to the current issue of Farm and Fireside, the burying of entire peach orchards for protection against late spring frosts is a common practice in the inter-mountain fruit valley of eastern Colorado. In areas where not more than one full crop in seven or eight years has been previously harvested, annual yields are now to be counted on. A net return of \$25 from each peach-tree is not uncommon. The following extract shows how peach-trees are buried:

"Irrigation facilitates the task of burying the trees. Just before a hard freeze is due in the late fall, the Colorado orchardist digs a trench to each peach-tree which he expects to 'lay down' and turns on the water, allowing it to run until the soil about the roots is thoroughly soaked. He then can undermine the trees and bend them down with little difficulty. They are held to the ground by a heavy plank or by ropes until a covering of hay is spread over them and a layer of dirt shoveled on top of that. Two inches of dirt have been found sufficient protection in thirty-below-zero weather.

Orchards are left prostrate and covered up until the last bit of danger from frost in the spring has passed. In the higher localities this danger period is not over before the tenth of May. When the hay and dirt are finally removed, a mass of pink blossoms greets the eye of the orchardist. He will tell you it is the prettiest sight in the world. Sometimes if the

"After raising the tree, a brace is applied and left against the trunk through the summer. An orchard of trees all propped in this manner, their branches all leaning one way and showing more foliage and fruit than on the other presents a novel picture to the Colorado tourist.

"I have been told that peach orchards subjected to this burying treatment were short-lived. The past season I saw one weighted down with big, luscious Elberta peaches. It had been buried for ten successive winters and had yielded six full crops."

**Raises White Milo Maize.**

Perhaps the best solution to the feed problem for the Panhandle may be simply solved by the adaptation of certain grain forages to the soil and climate. Milo maize and kafir with some sorghum have been the main stays so far, but there are other grain feed stuffs that may do better. White milo is one of them. As a test, last year Dan Shane and his neighbor, P. W. Smith, who live some 7 miles northeast of town, each planted 10 pounds of white milo seed, covering about two and three fourths acres, the seeding being done the last week of May. The entire crop was mature and ready for the harvester the last week of August, about 90 days' growth. They had no irrigation, but cultivated the fields in a common sense way. Mr. Shane had his crop threshed and the yield was 35 bushels to the acre. Mr. Smith left his crop in the bundle, but both men say that his crop was as good as the other. With the scant rainfall of last season, the Brand considers this a remarkable record, and suggests that this white milo may be able to withstand the drouthy conditions better, and, in as much as it matures from 20 to 30 days earlier than the ordinary milo, that the farmers would do well to plant a few acres this season.

Proposed Amendment to the Constitution of This State Authorizing the Issuance of Bonds for Improvement Districts, and Also for the Operation of Public Warehouses for Storing, Handling, Classing, Measuring, Weighing, Elevating and Loading Agricultural Products.

(S. J. R. No. 4.) JOINT RESOLUTION.

A Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to Section 52, of Article 3, of the Constitution of this State.  
SEC. 1. Be it resolved by the legislature of the State of Texas, that Section 52 of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:  
Section 52. The Legislature shall have no power to authorize any county, city, town, or other political corporation or subdivision of the State, to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid of, or to any individual association or corporation whatsoever, or to become a stockholder in such corporation, association or company, provided, however, that under legislative provision any county, any political subdivision of a county, any number of adjoining counties, or any political subdivision of the State or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, and which may or may not include towns, villages, or municipal corporations, upon a vote of a majority of the resident taxpayers voting thereon, who are qualified electors of such district or territory to be affected thereby, in addition to all other debts may issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit in any amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation are qualified electors of such district or territory, except that the total bonded indebtedness of any city or town shall never exceed the limits imposed by other provisions of this Constitution, and levy and collect taxes to pay the interest thereon, and provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof, as the Legislature may authorize, and in such manner as it may authorize the same for the following purposes, to-wit:  
(a) The improvement of rivers, creeks and streams to prevent overflows and to permit of navigation thereon, or irrigation thereon, or in aid of such purposes.  
(b) The construction and maintenance of pools, lakes, reservoirs, dams, canals and waterways for the purposes of irrigation or in aid thereof.  
(c) The construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof.  
(d) The construction, maintenance and operation of public warehouses for storing, handling, classing, measuring, weighing, elevating and loading agricultural products. Provided the Legislature may establish such means and agencies as may be necessary for accomplishing the purpose of this amendment and if a State warehouse commission be provided for, their term of office shall be fixed by the Legislature.  
SEC. 2. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for submitting this amendment to the Constitution to the qualified electors of the State of Texas on the third Saturday in July, same being the 19th day of said month, and the amendments proposed to Section 52 of Article 3, as above indicated, shall be voted upon separately.  
Those favoring the amendment to authorize road or other public improvements by a majority vote, shall have written or printed on their ballot: For amendment to authorize road and other public improvements by a vote of a majority, and those opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballot: Against amendment to authorize road and other public improvements by a vote of a majority.  
Those favoring the issuance of bonds for the construction of public warehouses shall have written or printed on their ballot: For the amendment authorizing the issuance of bonds for the construction of public warehouses for agricultural products. Those voting against said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballot: Against the amendment authorizing the issuance of bonds for the construction of public warehouses for agricultural products.  
SEC. 3. The sum of five thousand (\$5,000) dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication, proclamation and election.
