





THE RHODES KILLING

A Childress Paper's Report of the Shooting of John Rhodes by Fred Dewey.

Sunday afternoon at 5:10 o'clock there occured one of those sad tragedies that seem unavoidable. And this one is peculiarly sad on account of the family connection of the parties interested.

At that Hour W. F. Dewey, an engineer on the Denver road, shot and killed John Rhodes at a point on the railway side track a little way west of the coal sheds. There were no eye witnesses to the shooting, so far as is known at present, and what words, if any, were passed is known only to the defendant.

The evidence at the preliminary trial Monday afternoon did not bring out anything of importance, save that deceased had uttered some words of slander against the daughter of Mr. Dewey. Also that there was found on the body of deceased a pistol, but which had not been fired or drawn.


