





than is required for essential op-erations. Some operators, because of changes in their business since the first application was made, need less mileage now. Others have cut mileage through joint action plans and

other conservation methods. Many allowances for gasoline have already been cut since review of quarterly operations started, but until the change in OPA regulations, there was considerable time between review of certificates and the recall of exoess coupons.

Present procedure makes any gasoline coupons representing gallonage in excess of the certificate holder's revised needs expire at the time a revised certificate is issued. These coupons must be surrendered immediately to the ODT district office.


