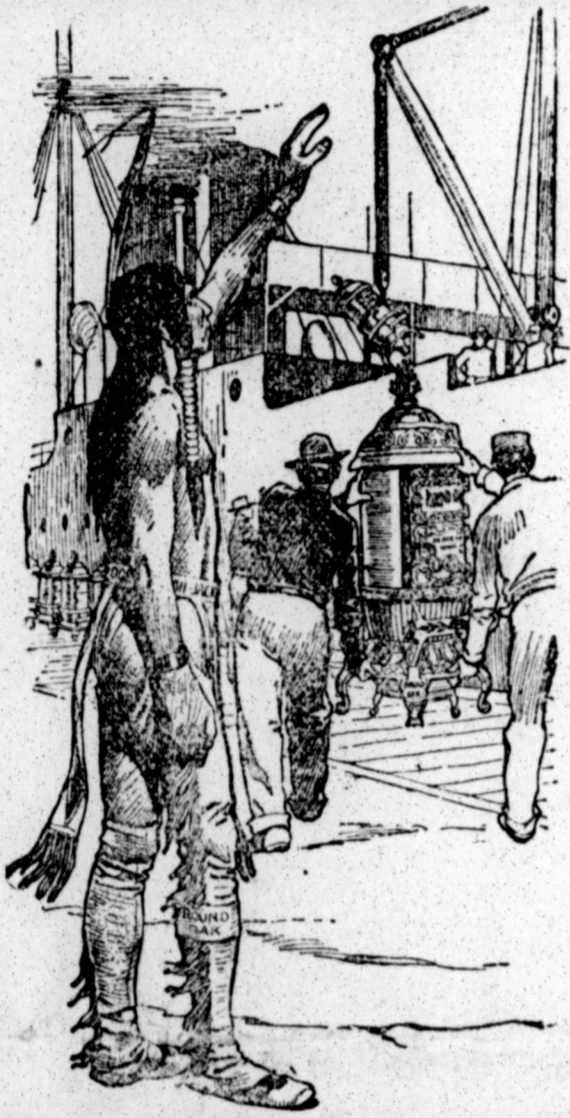

Harry Weatherly was in from Paloduro Tuesday. In conversation with a Banner-Stockman representative Mr. Weatherly said that the JA boys had purchased in the last few weeks about 500 head of yearlings, \$12 and \$13 being the ruling price while \$14 was the highest price paid.

Mr. J. S. Jefferies was in from his farm near Boydston Saturday and made this office a call, giving us an item of stock news which will be of interest to every stock farmer and will also serve as an object lesson to many who are complaining about the low price of cattle and the short market for feed. Last November Mr. Jefferies bought 40 head of calves, half steers and half heifers. He fed them through the winter and grazed them all summer, seeing that they were at all times well cared for. He sold them last week to Chas. Harris for \$28 around. The calves were from the old J. D. Jefferies herd of high grade Heretords. Now the moral is plain, to-wit: Don't raise scrubs, and give your stock the best attention, raising plenty of feed to keep them in proper condition. There is always a market for the best class of stuff at a good price when scrub cattle or half fat graded cattle are going begging. Mr. Jefferies is of course well pleased with his success and tells us he is now in the market for a hundred head of good, high-grade yearlings. He expects to do as well with them as he did with his last bunch.

Clarendon boasts of either the most modest or the richest set of cattle shippers in Northwest Texas. Every week a representative of the Banner-Stockman will approach one or more of our shippers with the question, "What did those fat cows you shipped Sunday bring?" and the answer almost invariably is "Oh, I lost heavy on that shipment. There is no money in buying cattle for market." As we said before these men are either making a lot of money and do not want to make the editor feel bad by boasting of the fact or they have a big wad buried in some nice, cool sequestered corner where they can reach it handily after losing heavily on every shipment. 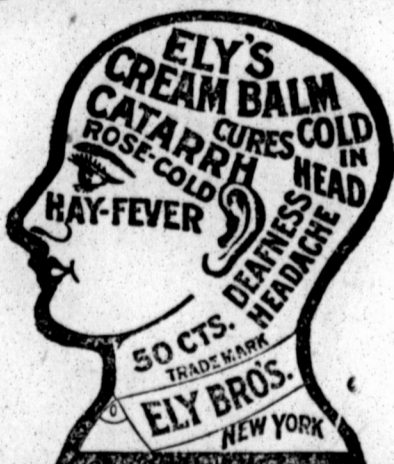
Getting a First Client.

Horses Stolen.

Well, your Uncle John and step daughter Miss Kate E. Barnes left Alanreed at noon Nov. 12, over the Rock Island and reached St. Louis, about 8 a. m. Nov. 14. Our traveling companions were Mr. Woodley, wife and little daughter of Shamrock, Texas. Your Uncle John had lived in Texas over 30 years but had never been in Oklahoma or Indian Territories, before this trip, Oklahoma Territory, Kansas and Missouri generally have fine crops, good houses and barns, farm machinery, good cattle and horses and seem prosperous. Lots of cotton is grown in Oklahoma on the same parallel of latitude as in Gray and Donley counties in Texas. Cotton seemed to yield from 4 to 5 to 6 bale per acre. In Kansas there is considerable acreage in wheat, also in Missouri. Corn in places yielded from 30 to 100 bushels per acre. When we got to St. Louis up there was so much smoke and fog that we missed the pure ozonized air that permeates and vitalizes the Panhandle. On Monday, Tuesday and Thursday we took in the world's fair and on Wednesday and Friday saw the city of St. Louis. I put in 36 hours of strenuous sight seeing and blistered my feet and then probably saw less than 10 per cent of the exhibits.

In the world's fair grounds there are over 1,200 acres and 1576 buildings. Transportation building covers 16 and Agricultural building over 20 acres. All the nations of the world are there in their national costumes and the Igorrotes are principally clothed with climate and sunshine. We realize "that the half has never yet been told."

Broadway, the principal street in St. Louis, is 28 miles long. The world's fair is about 10 miles west from Eads Bridge. You can take a Delmar Garden street car at Levee and go 13 miles—at a fare of five cents—to Woman's Magazine building and see St. Louis and world's fair spread out in vast panoramic view.

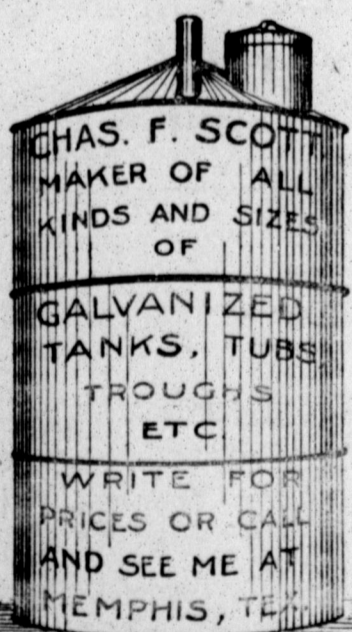

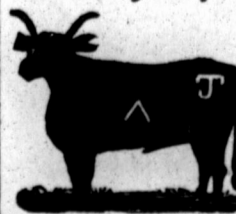

COTTON GROWING IN PANHANDLE.

Panhandle Farmers are Urged to Burn the Stalks in the Fields.

The Banner-Stockman is in receipt of the following from Oswald Wilson, state statistical agent. On account of the Panhandle having no weevil pest the eyes of the whole lower country are now upon this section and it behooves our farmers to take all necessary precautions to keep the weevil from spreading to this territory. Mr. Wilson says:

"The work of the U. S. Department of Agriculture in Northwest Texas along the Fort Worth & Denver railway this year in the development of the cotton industry has been of the greatest value. Not only has the acreage increased but the yield per acre and the quality of the staple improved.

"Special Agent Bentley reports that there are farms in each county from Wise to Donley that will make one bale per acre. Samples sent in show a better staple, longer and stronger than made in the black land belt.

"As predicted in the spring, the boll weevil has gone east, and despite all efforts nearly one-fourth of Louisiana has become infested this year. During the month of October 1500 miles of new territory has become infested, and they are half-way from the Sabine to the Mississippi river.

"If the proper efforts are put forth I do not believe that the boll weevil will ever become a serious pest in the Panhandle of Texas, and that the counties along the Fort Worth & Denver railway will become the most important cotton producing section of the South.

"If fall cleaning of the fields is essential in the weevil infested districts it is doubly so in your section to prevent the weevil from getting a start. Pass resolutions in your Farmers' Institutes and urge upon every farmer to clean up his fields this fall.

"Dr. Hunter says that there is absolutely no question but that the weevil will spread until it reaches the Atlantic Ocean, and that it will never be exterminated. If you can keep it out of your section your lands will become the most valuable agricultural lands in the Union." OSWALD WILSON, Fort, Worth, Tex., Nov. 12, 1904.
