

Midland Reporter. by the terrific advance in cost of the various materials used in the making of a newspaper. And the suggestion was made that the newspaper publisher was handlcapped in not having ways to recoup the ordinary merchant has, because the price obtained for the paper and the price obtained for the advertisinf ca mot be charged at will, as in the case of the average merchant. The article is quite interesting and illuminative and says in part;

"The price of practically every item employed in making newspapers has gone up since the European war started in August 1914, the increase ranging from 1 per cent in some cases to 3,000 per cent in others. The making of war munitions and clothing for the men in the trenches has taken up much may terial necessary for printing out of the domestic trade that uncertain and prohibitive prices are now the rule. Here are some examples;

As a result of advances in raw ma terials, linotype metal which retailed at \$7 a hundred pounds before the war. has jumped to about \$15.25/

Stereotype metal which sold eighteen months ago for about \$8, now brings about \$18.25.

These prices are by no means stady. but the trend of the market for the last year and a half has been constantly upward, with occassional fluctations.

Leather elting has jumped between 30 and 40 per cent since hostilities started.

Printing rol ers, composed chiefly of glue, glycerin and molasses, have also felt the uplift movement advancing about 10 per cent.

Wool blankets and felt used in the packing of printing presses have been greatly influenced by the European demand for wool, and New York jobbers greater than in 1914.

Stereotype blankets have advanced in about equal proportions.

Rubber blankets, also used in packing bave advanced about 10 per cent.

Metol, a chemical which is indispensable to the art department of a news paper, has advanced from an anti-bet lum price of about \$4 per pound to \$50. Increases of 1,000 to 3,000 per cent are common all through the chemical section of the newspaper plant.

Gum arabic, used in making stereotype matrices has increased 100 per cent since 1914.

"Wrapping paper and twine used in the circulation work have also doubled in price, due to the increased difficulty in shipping

Some makes of printing presses have been raised 10 per cent in price.

On type founders' supplies, leads, furniture and brass rule, the chief effect has been felt in reduced quality discounts Rule brass has advanced 60 per cent in raw material, but the type founders have boosted their price only about 20 per cent.

Steel's advance has been noted in the increased cost of autoplate machines and printing presses. Steel for chases has almost doubled in price.

News ink has gradually moved up to to 25 per cent over former prices, so that a quality which sold for \$50 eighteen months ago now rings \$100.

Linseed oil, which has been sold as low as 42c per gallon is now quoted at 78c to 80c. All oils and rosin have experienced similar advances.

Soft coal is another essential to the operation of a newspaper plant the cost of which has increased over 30 per cent. This is not due to the war, but to the higher mine costs, plus the recentle increased freight rates.



BETTER CULTIVATION NEEDED

The soil of this section is exceedingly rich and fertile in all the elements cessary for the production of a big crop except the one element of humas or getable matter. This is needed not only for plant food but for its mechanical fect on the soil as well. This soil bakes and becomes hard after a rain and evaporation is rapid.

This country needs a greater use of the turning plow that plows deep and turns the soil entirely over covering all trash and stubble deep, where it decays. Where this method is used the use of the packer will be necessary to prevent blowing. Land plowed deep and then listed will stand dry weather much better than land that is just stirred with a disc. The land will be improved in quality. Land cultivation in this way will stand almost indefinite cropping here owing to the fact that moisture is the binding element in crop production and there is lots of votes although he and his little leeching or washing of soil elements. He also had with him a cotton stalk bearing 87 bols and forms. This was an average stalk out of a 3 acre patch, which it is estimated will yield threefourths of a bale to the acre.-Tahoka

#### Prohibition Election Ca "Comme

Because it is now only a misdemeanor to "bootleg" in Floyd county, and because of the fear that for this reason Floyd county might become the haven of some who follow this business for a livelihood, the Commissioners' Court of Floyd county has called an election for September 9th to vote on the question of prohibition. Open saloons have been banded for many years and it has been a misdemeanor to sell whiskey.

However, some few years ligo, the legislature made it a penitentiary offense to sell liquor in counties, which voted for prohibition. For this law to be effective it was necessary to vote of August, 1916. R. W. BAIRD, pro subsequent to the passage of the law. Most of the counties of the state are now operating under this law and hundreds of bootleggers are serving or have served a term in the penitentiary from counties having the advantage of the law.

It has not been a matter of common knowledge that bootlegging is not a felony in this county, but of late the fear has grown that the fact would probably become widespread and that Floyd county's jail might be over-populated with illicit distributors of liquor, When this fact wa sbrought to the attention of the Commissioners' Court. the election was called immediately.



tacks which the owner may not be able to diagnose, he can hardly by any possibility do wrong in giving a dose of finseed oil, but will, on the contrary,in 99 per cent of cases, prepare the way for the professional veterinarian. The observant stockman will often make a good guess as to the nature of an illness where such prominent and unmistakable symptoms as hoven are not pres

"The veterinary surgeon will be glad to hear all that he has to say as to the history and symptoms observed, without accepting his statements as a diagnosis. If a message, telegraphic or verbal, is to be sent-and one would like to say here that a written one is always preferable it should contain the leading symptoms, as noted by the attendant or owner, and not a mere assertion as to what may be the matter.

"The opposite error is the more frequent however, and a message saying: 'Cow very bad; come at once,' is typical of the summons one gets to attend at some hill farm miles away, where nothing is procurable, that the practitioner does not carry with him. How often has the writer been burdened with a heavy kit for calving, and a battery with which to cope with milk fever, only to find them all useless in the presence of a case of garget, or red water, or perhaps a broken leg! Messengers arrive with no knowledge whatever of the case about which they are sent; the least intelligent person is selected as a messenger, because his time is of little

"When an animal is observed to be ill the owner should always have in his mind the possibility of infection, and while waiting for professional guidance value of cattle, even beef cattle, it will be conceded that it is quite worth while to have in mind certain precautions to be taken immediately in a case of sudden illness of individuals in the herd. The suggestion mad here is unquestionably a valuable one, as no harm can be done by giving a dose of linseed oil, while on the other hand, it may be all the aid that an ailing animal will require.- Iowa Homestead.

remove it if practicable to a building or yard where isolation is possible, cleansing and disinfecting the manger and stall after moving the food. Such a precaution may arrest the spread of disease and disaster, while the time lost if subsequently proved unnecessary, is the merest trifle.

"A sick animal should not be worried by everyone about the place examining it in order to offer his 'opinion' and advice, but kept quiet when the owner or responsible person has decided upon what course to persue. There are certain things to be noted and mentioned when sending for a veterinary surgeon, which may enable him to select from his armamentarium instruments or medicines likely to be required. The stockkeeper should know that the tem-

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
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
