## Police start crackdown on car tags

Beginning at 12:01 a. m. today, city police officers, highway patrolmen and sheriff's officers will have their eyes peeled for vehicle owners driving with out-dated license plates.

Don Brush, chief of police, said all law enforcement agencies will start enforcing the law immediately after it becomes

effective. He asked the public to cooperate in getting new tags on their vehicles.

"The new tags are supposed to be on display on the car," Brush said, "and this does not mean in the glove compartment, in the trunk or under the seat. but in plain view."

Anyone caught driving a ve-

hicle without 1971 tags will be subject to fine of \$5 to \$200 and possibly a late registration fee by the county tax assessor-col-

lector. Brush said his officers will give citations for failure to meet the tag requirements and the fine will be handled by the corporate judge.

Nell Miller, tax assessor-collector, said Wednesday nearly 10,000 tags had been sold, but an estimated 11,000 to 12,000 was expected to be reached by closing time Wednesday.

Mrs. Miller said some 2,000 tags were sold during the first two lays of this week, hiking the overall total to about 10,000.

Twenty minutes after the Stanford quarterback was chosen No. 1 in the NFL draft of college seniors, President Billy Sullivan of the Patriots was on the phone to the Downtown A.C. Plunkett was staying there as the guest of athletic director Rudy Riska. While Sullivan was on one phone, Plunkett was on the other one talking to Coach John Mazur and the Boston press via a beeper hookup.

In the mid-40s Sullivan was a lieutenant at Annapolis and handled the U. S. Naval Academy sports information office with eclat. The hookup to the Boston press could have been Billy's idea.

Knowing he couldn't turn off his own Boston press, Sullivan asked for Riska.

"Rudy," said Sullivan, "I'm president of the Boston Patriots and the commissioner (Pete Rozelle) wants Jim Plunkett to come to the draft meeting as soon as possible."

"He can't," replied Riska in mild alarm. "Jim's on the other phone talking to Boston writers and he's got about six phone calls from California waiting. He's due in one hour for a press brunch and TV interviews at a

steak house. "I can't have Jim disappoint the people we invited, and I know he wouldn't want to disappoint anybody. I'm sure the commissioner will understand. We'll try to get him to see the commissioner at the draft meeting by two o'clock."

Sullivan understood, and Riswho had kept Plunkett ur der cover in bustling New York for almost 20 hours before people knew where he was, asked:

"Did I say the right thing?" "You sure did," was the consensus of five other men in the room, one of whom was an uninvited agent and a certified public accountant.

"Aleuts have just as much to tell and show as Eskimos," she said. "But people only know about Eskimos, never about Aleuts."

Before the Russians and Americans discovered the Aleutian Islands, rich in fish stocks and sea otter pelts, Aleuts were known as great fishermen and hunters. During World War II. American military installations were established on some Aleutian islands and some villages were destroyed in Japanese bombing raids,

"The Army moved into Unalaska and destroyed our fishing grounds," said Mrs. Shapsnikoff. "We have no place any more . . . The Army and Navy came and used the land, then the oil companies came in and they pumped their oil right out in the bay. We have to go a far way now to get fish."

"The white men are a help to us in some ways, but a lot of our land around Akutan is being taken," he said.


Today the men in Unalaska work for good salaries, said Mrs. Shapsnikoff, but "it's not like in the old days when men had time to spend with their fam-
