## \$150,000 IN BUILDINGS

Courthouse, High School Building and New Church Will Require Large Expenditures

The work on the new church to be resumed at once, a big force putting up the walls of the high school building, and another laying the foundation for a \$125,000 courthouse, there is really "something doing" at Hereford.

The Deaf Smith Courthouse will be the only marble finished county building in the state. The exact extreme dimensions are 128 ft. 6 in. by 127 ft. 10 in., and 61 ft. in height, and as the picture shows, is without a tower. The building is a copy of some of the government structures now being erected in several places.

The basement contains a large exhibit room, boiler room, tool room, fuel room, public toilet, men's rest rooms, ladies' rest room, surveyors office and record room, dead record room, justice of the peace's office, public and private, and four unassigned rooms. The first floor has the county clerk's office, county court room, judges offices with private room and record rooms, commissioners consultation room, school superintendent's private and public offices, tax assessors, tax collectors and sheriff's private and public office and ladies' retiring rooms.

The second floor contains the District Court room with gallery on line with third floor, district clerk's room and record room, grand jury room, witness rooms, attorney's private and public room, consultation rooms, jury retiring rooms, court stenographers office, female witness retiring room and janitors room.

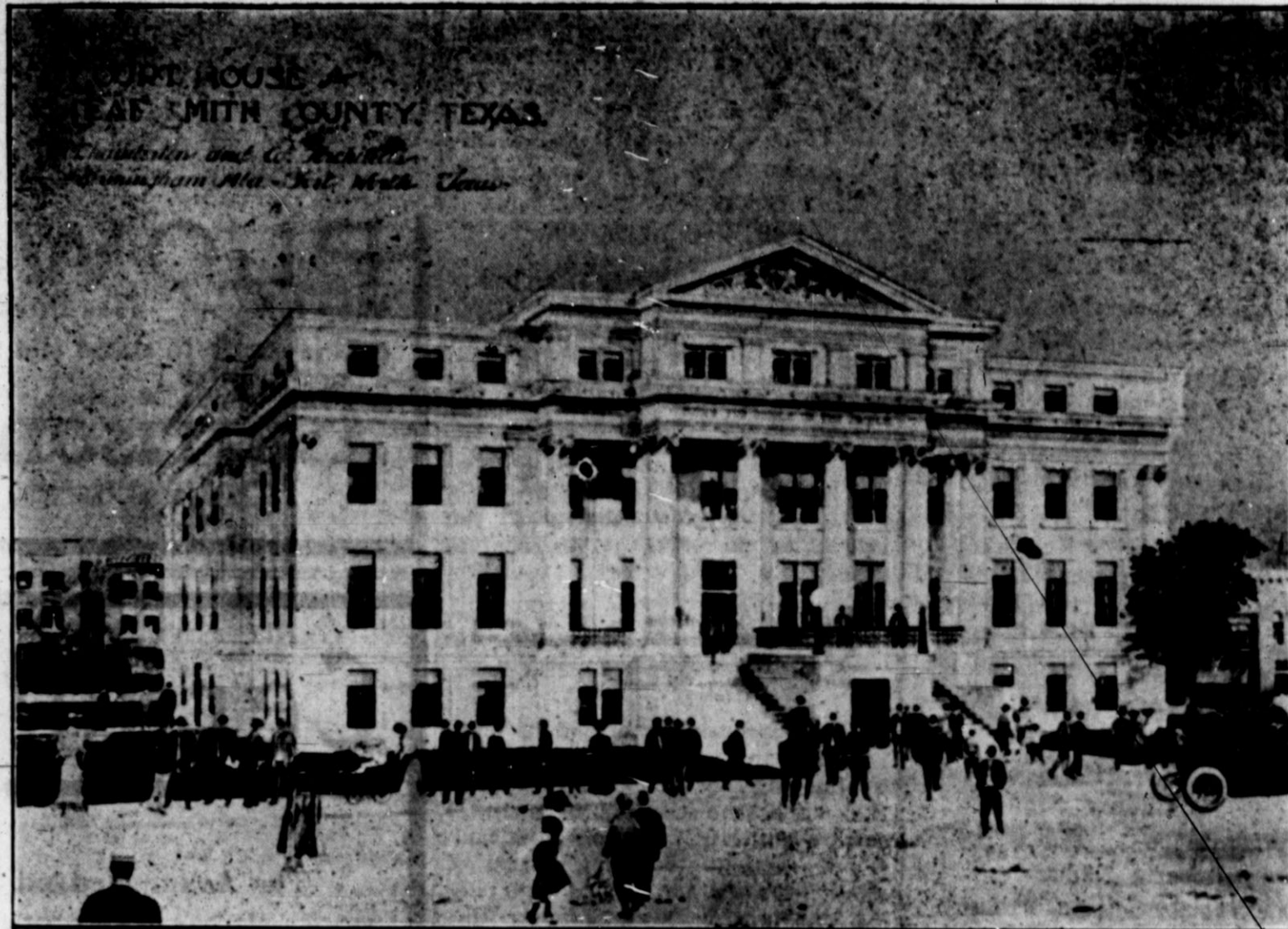
On the third floor will be jury rooms and toilet, sleeping rooms with bath, and three unassigned offices. The building will have public and private phones, will be electric lighted, steam heated. An electric vacuum system of cleaning will be installed. The furniture in every office will be convenient and modern. The walls will be of brick and concrete with marble facing. The floors will all be of reinforced concrete, the window and door frames of plate steel. The main rooms, halls and corridors will have a wainscoting of marble, many of the floors tiling.

Hereford and Deaf Smith will have the best and prettiest building in Texas.

The high school buildings will contain 14 rooms and an auditorium with a seating capacity of 600 persons. The basement will contain a play room and dining room, separate rest rooms for boys and girls, furnace and storage rooms. The first and second floors will be devoted to class rooms and executive offices, the auditorium in the third story. The building will be constructed of red brick and will be substantially built.

The church property of the Disciples of Christ, (Christians), will be the largest church building in Western Texas or the Panhandle. It is a pressed brick veneer structure and will be modern in every point. The basement contains, Sunday school, assembly room, dining room,

kitchen, entries, furnace rooms, men's club rooms with toilet and bath. The main floor contains the main auditorium, two vestibules, two stair entries to second story and basement, executive office, two dressing rooms and baptistry fountain, ladies' rest room, library, two cloak rooms, six Sunday school rooms. The second floor has provided for a gallery with a large seating capacity, and when opened, will bring the church total sittings up to 1250. In this story are also additional Sunday school class rooms. On the third floor is a large class room and ladies' parlor and work room. The entire building will be ceiled in a modern pattern of stamped steel. The art glass windows, many of them of memorial design takes up over 1200 square feet of wall surface. The two fronts will each be ornamented with four large columns. When completed the building will be a classic structure and the best of its kind.

## Will Finish Church

## IRRIGATIONISTS VISITS HEREFORD

Make Investigation of Condition and Report Favorable on Water and Soil

As a result of the visits of W. L. Rockwell of the irrigation bureau of the U. S. Department of Agriculture and of E. P. Fuller, independent expert from Portales, the irrigation projects now on foot were given a heavy impetus and put a whirl of talk in motion.

Messrs. Rockwell and Fuller examined carefully the McDonald well 2 miles south of town and both pronounced it a big success. The former test of 750 gallons with a temporary outfit was eclipsed by the new pump and gasoline motive-power by a flow of 1060 gallons per minute without cessation for a period of 10 hours. The pump has continued at that rate every day this week and the water is being used to irrigate a field of oats.

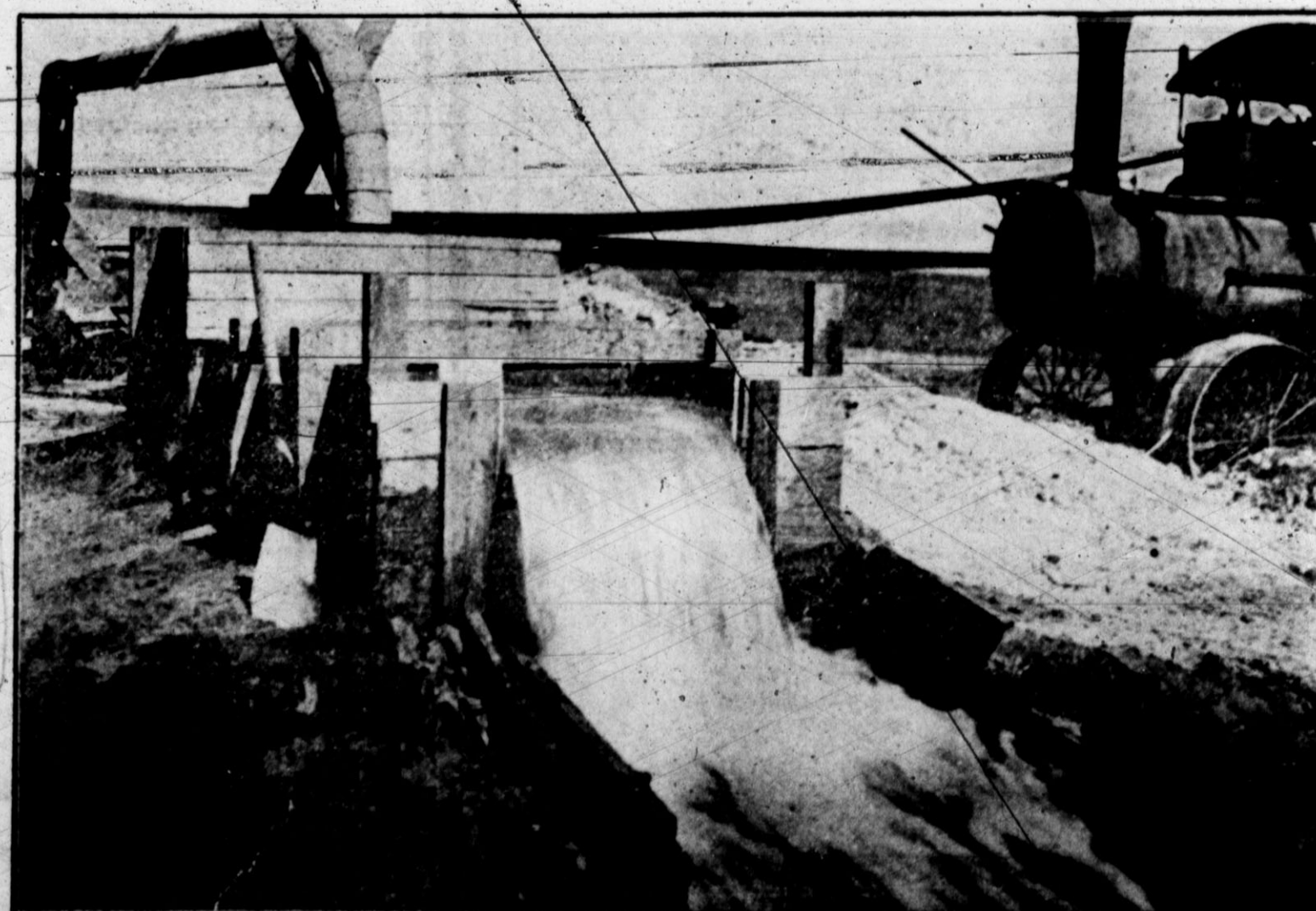
Mr. Rockwell also visited the plant of the Warren-Barcus on the Creek 6 miles east. This outfit is taking the water from the ordinary flow of the Creek and with a turbine wheel of large capacity was discharging 2000 gallons per minute. These two demonstrations were revelations to both gentlemen. Mr. Rockwell also made an examination of the soil and subsoil, as well as the water itself. With the analysis which Mr. McDonald already had of the water, Mr. Rockwell was able to pronounce both the soil and water of first quality and condition for irrigation. "I have seen nothing in the west or southwest that beats your irrigation possibilities around Hereford," he said. "I had no idea of the water supply of the Plains and your rich soil is certainly a gold mine for crops of all kinds."

The expert made a close examination of the alfalfa growing on the farms of Warren-Barcus, Bradley, Sulphur Park and Callup. He found the plants in one or two fields highly inoculated with nitrogen producing bacteria, which are beneficial to the growth of the alfalfa plant itself and also to the use the plant made of the bacteria, and advised growers to plant only inoculated seed or to sow inoculated soil over the ground. He further told how to prepare the soil for alfalfa seeding, and subsequent irrigation.

As a result of the visits of these gentlemen, several more are planning to install pumping plants.

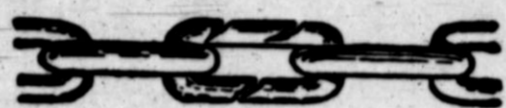
## Public Highways

The ravages of the boll weevil in Texas are estimated at millions of dollars, but the mud hole has been a more costly foe to the producer than the boll weevil. The Federal government has spent over a million dollars in trying to find a way of eradicating the boll weevil, but we do not have to spend money to learn how to eradicate bad roads—build good ones.

The boll weevil in destroying cotton decreases production and consequently increases the price of the remaining products, but bad roads levy their deadly toll against the producer and destroy the value of the remaining roads. A chain is no stronger than its weakest link, and a mud hole or a hill between a farm and town reduces the carrying capacity of the wagon to the level of the bog or grade.



The improvement of public highways add three times their cost to adjoining property, and every argument that applies to the improvement of private property will apply with multiplied force to the improvement of public property, and especially to public highways, as every farmer must use the public roads.



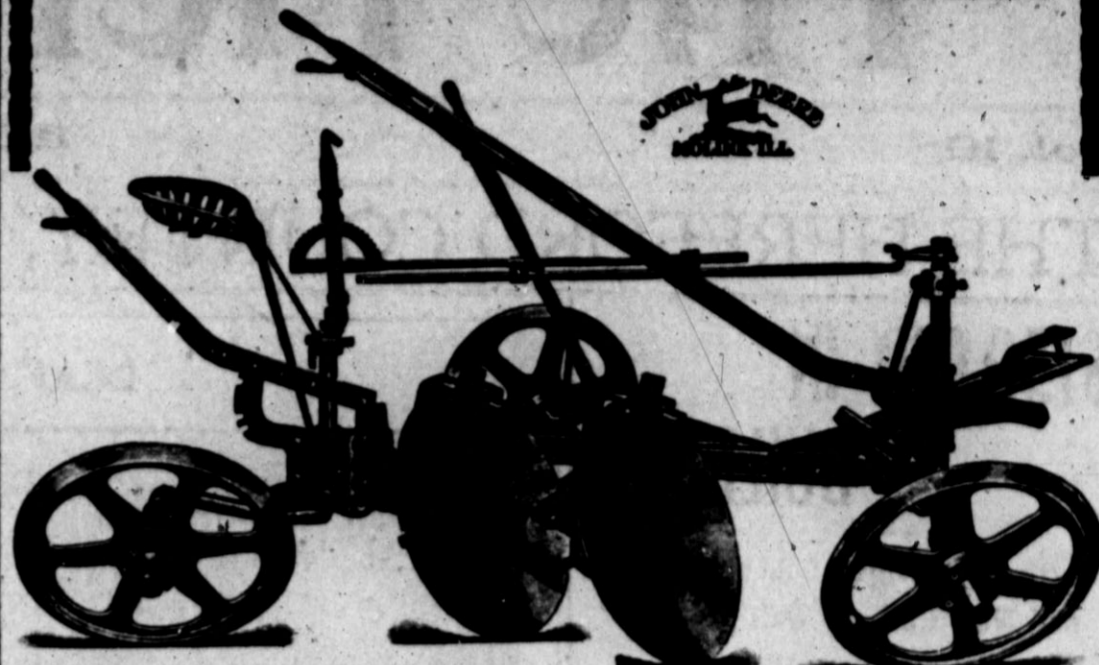

**Ashamed of Texas.**

Several years ago at Temple, Texas, a gentleman from Tennessee stopped at a train and inquired for a first class hotel, one where it would be safe to stay for a day or two. A porter at hand told him that he would be safe anywhere.

The next day, the visitor happened to meet the city marshal. The stranger cautiously told the man with the silver badge that he was in serious trouble. (Always tell your troubles to the policeman.) Said he, "I thought before I landed in Texas that the people were dangerous and that I would need a brace of pistols for protection. But I find the people are actually civilized and my pistols are a burden to me. What'll I do with them?" In another case, not so many years ago, came to the attention of others, when a young but aspiring school teacher came from Kentucky.

Why should a man be ashamed to teach the children of Texas? Are they less apt? Is the work among them degrading? Do they remove some of the honor from the heads of young professors by their uncivilized presence? "Ashamed of Texas!" What do real live Texans think of that? Can you find any one who is ashamed of Travis, of Bowie, of Deaf Smith, of Houston of the heroes of the Alamo and San Jacinto? Can you find any one who is ashamed of the work of Austin, the statesman and of the labors of Lamar the scholar? "Ashamed of Texas!" What braver men could the world produce than the Texas sons who marched under the Stars and Bars? What men have brought greater honor to their state than the Texans in the halls of Congress? What state has a more glorious history, a more happy present, or a more prosperous future? Her progress in the industrial arts, her business acumen, her wholesome laws, her educational advantages, all give her first magnitude in the galaxy of states.

"Ashamed of Texas!" Those who are uninformed should study the history of the great state. In fact, no man can claim to be educated unless he knows something of his country. And he who would teach the bright boys and girls should at least know something of the state from which he draws his stipends.

Unwarranted attacks by disparaging remarks coming from those who are ignorant of the history and resources of a state is received with forgiving pity by those who know.

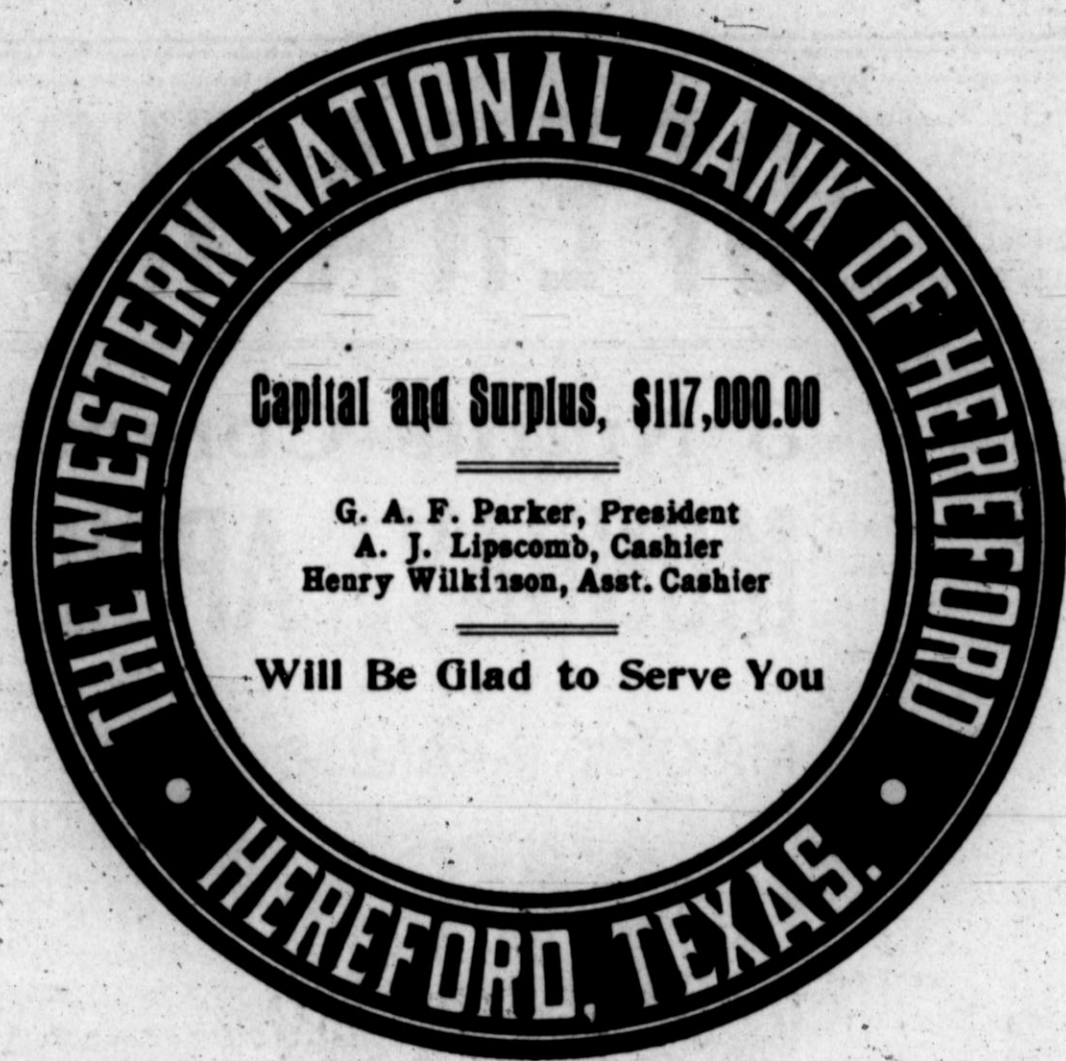

# HEREFORD HARDWARE



**Ordinance No. 43.**

An Ordinance prohibiting and defining vagrancy in the City of Hereford, and providing a penalty punishing same.

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Hereford; that, the following persons found in the City of Hereford are and shall be punished as vagrants, viz:

(a) Persons known as tramps, wandering or strolling about in idleness who are able to work and have no property to support them.

(b) Persons leading an idle, immoral or profligate life, who have no property to support them, and who are able to work and do not work.

(c) All persons able to work, who have no property to support them, and who have no visible or known means of a fair, honest and reputable livelihood. The term "visible or known means of a fair honest and reputable livelihood" as used in this Section, shall be construed to mean reasonably continuous employment at some lawful occupation for reasonable compensation, or a fixed and regular income from property or other investments, which income is sufficient for the support and maintenance of such person.

(d) All able-bodied persons who habitually loaf, loiter and idle in any place in this city for the larger portion of their time without any regular employment and without any visible means of support. An offense under this paragraph shall be made out whenever it is shown that any person has no visible means of support, and only occasionally has employment at odd jobs, being for the most of the time out of employment.

(e) Persons trading or bartering stolen property, or who unlawfully sell any vinous, alcoholic, malt, intoxicating or spirituous liquors.

(f) Every common gambler or person who for the most part maintains himself by gambling.

(g) All companies of Gypsies, who, in whole or in part, maintain themselves by telling fortunes.

(h) Every able, bodied person who shall go begging for a livelihood.

(i) Every common prostitute.

(j) Every keeper of a house of prostitution.

(k) Every keeper of a house of gambling or gaming.

(l) Every person who shall abandon his wife, or child, or children without just cause, leaving such wife or child or children without support, or in danger of becoming a public charge.

(m) Every able bodied person who lives without employment or labor, and who has no visible means of support.

(n) All persons who are able to work and do not work, but hire out their minor children or allow them to be hired out and live upon their wages, being without other means of support.

(o) All persons over sixteen years of age and under twenty one, able to work and do not work, and have no property to support them, and have not some known, visible means of a fair, honest and reputable livelihood, and whose parents are unable to support them, and who are not in attendance upon some educational institute.

(p) All persons who advertise and maintain themselves in whole or in part as clairvoyants or fortune tellers of future events, or as supernatural knowledge with respect to present or future events, transactions, conditions or happenings.

(q) Any person who unlawfully solicits orders for intoxicating liquors. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars.

**Ordinance No. 48.**

An Ordinance to prohibit the driving of any vehicle on or across any

fire hose in this City, and providing a penalty for its violation.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Hereford; that any person who shall drive any buggy, wagon, automobile or any vehicle of any description, across or upon any fire hose, or hose of any sort belonging to the City of Hereford, when such hose shall be in use at a fire, sprinkling the streets, out for inspection, for practice by fire department, or at any time when such hose may be on any street or streets in this City for any purpose, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not less than Five Dollars nor more than Two Hundred Dollars.

# WHO IS YOUR NEIGHBOR?

Question Answered in Most Effective Way by the Good People of District No. 1.

Last Monday morning fifteen men who live in school district No. 1, this county, banded themselves into a peaceful mission and visited the farm of Mrs. Hartness who lives one mile south of the Wyche school house, where the combined force did a big day's work.

The men plowed and harrowed 50 or 55 acres, planted 30 acres, and the work required 9 disc harrows, 2 cultivators, 2 planters, 2 drag harrows, and 56 head of horses and mules. The men carried their own dinners and feed for their teams. Mrs. Hartness and her two daughters prepared hot coffee for the men but they had also brought the coffee from which to make the beverage. The good citizens of that neighborhood have agreed among themselves to put the entire crop of 140 acres in crop, and see that it is properly cultivated and harvested. The men while there also employed a man to repair the windmill and put it in good running condition. Mrs. Hartness is a widow and besides her two daughters whom she has kept in school, has two small sons, one of whom has been sick. Her neighbors have taken it upon themselves to lend their assistance and the day's work told about, is only a sample of the kind of neighbors one may find in School District No. 1, Deaf Smith County, Texas and the Hereford country.

### Ordinance No. 49

An Ordinance to require obstructions to be removed from sidewalks within the fire limits, prohibiting the placing of any obstruction upon the sidewalks in fire limits and providing a penalty for its violation.

1: Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Hereford; that it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, owning, operating or controlling any business house or building of any sort within the Fire Limits of the City of Hereford to allow any post, bench, sign, display of any goods, wares or merchandise, or obstruction of any sort to remain on or upon any sidewalk in front or adjoining any such building after being notified to remove same by the City Marshal.

2: It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, owning, operating or controlling any business house or building of any sort within the Fire Limits of the City of Hereford to place any post, bench, sign, display of goods, wares or merchandise, or obstruction of any sort on or upon any sidewalk in front of or adjoining such building.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding One Hundred Dollars.

An Ordinance to prohibit waste water, etc., to be allowed to run into streets, etc., and providing a penalty for its violation.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Hereford; that it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, owning or controlling any livery stable, hotel, butcher shop, or any other place of business or private residence, to run or permit to be run any waste water or slops of any kind, from such place into or upon any street, alley, sidewalk or any other place, so that the same may become a nuisance or foul, stagnant and offensive, and any person violating this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not exceeding One Hundred Dollars.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Hereford; that it shall be unlawful for any person to throw, place, conduct or deposit, or allow his child, agent, servant or employee to throw, place, conduct or deposit, in or upon any street, alley, gutter, sidewalk, yard, lot, ground or other place or premises in this City, public or private, and putrid or unsound beef, pork or other meat, fish, hides of any kind, or any filth, offal, excrements, melon rinds, vegetables, bones or slops, urine, dish water, or any other unwholesome liquid, or substance, or thing of any sort whatsoever, or matter liable to become offensive, or allow any such matter to remain on, in or about any premises owned or controlled by him, her or them, and any person violating this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding One Hundred Dollars.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Hereford; that any person who shall, without first having obtained permission from the owner, stick, paint, mark or stamp upon any house, fence, wall, pavement, telephone post, telegraph post, electric light post, or any other object not his own, any written, printed or other notice, sign, circular, poster or advertisement, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding Fifty Dollars.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Hereford; that any person or persons in this city who shall throw or cast any stone or other missile upon, against or at any person, or any property of any description not belonging to him or her, or shall throw from any rubber shooter or other contrivance, any bullet or other missile at any person or against any property not belonging to him or her; or shall cut, hack or deface, remove, pull down or otherwise injure any building, fence, railing, awning post, telegraph or telephone wire or post, electric wire or post, shade tree, tree or shrub of any sort, ornament, monument, bulletin board, sign, show frame, fruit stand, platform, bridge or other thing not belonging to or under control of him or her; or shall cut, hack or remove, or otherwise injure any ornament, tree, shrub, plant or flower, or any part thereof belonging to any public ground, park, square, street, or other public place; or shall deface, remove or otherwise interfere with the names of streets, numbers of houses, street lamps, water hydrants, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding One Hundred Dollars.

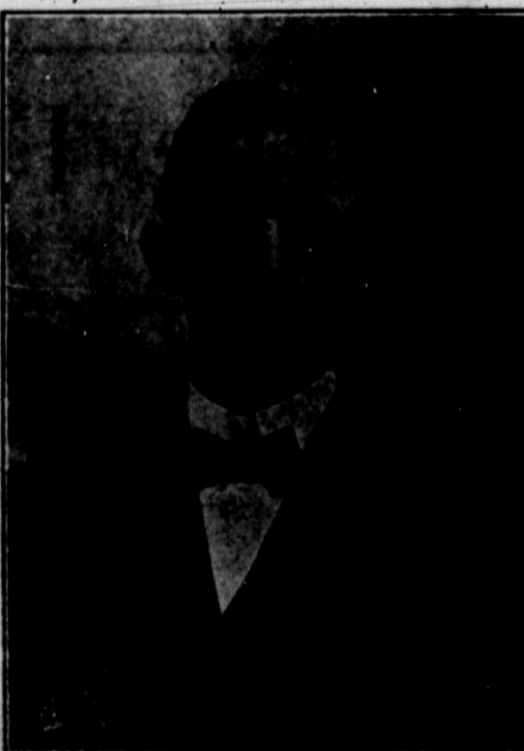

In discussing the cost of transportation the Texas Commercial Secretaries' Association says that, as a rule, the producer pays the freight to the factory or market and the consumer pays the freight from the factory to the point of consumption. Texas has comparatively few factories, and the cost of transportation is, therefore, of paramount importance in fixing the value of our articles of production and consumption. We have our methods of transportation, viz: Public Highways, Railroads, Waterways and Pipe Lines.

**Public Highways.**

We have 121,500 miles of public highways in Texas with only 2,000 miles classed as improved public roads. The average cost of hauling freight over the public highways of Texas is 43 cents per ton per mile.



**43 Cents Per Ton Per Mile.**

The average cost of hauling freight over the public roads of the United States is 23 cents per ton per mile. As a producer the farmer gets the same price for his products whether hauled over good roads or bad roads, and as a consumer the farmer pays the same price for merchandise whether he hauls it over good roads or bad roads. The farmer receives the benefits of good roads, but pays the penalty of bad roads.

The Texas farmer in 1908 raised 3,000,000 tons of products. It cost approximately \$17,000,000 to haul these products to town. By improving our public highways to the government average we can reduce the cost of transportation one-half and save \$8,000,000 per annum.



**Mud Road Tax \$8,000,000 Per Annum.**

The Texas farmer pays in State and county taxes, all purposes, \$7,000,000 per annum, which is a million dollars less than the bad roads tax. The money paid to support of government continues to circulate; it is not destroyed. But the tax levied by the mud hole is lost as completely as if it were destroyed by fire.



**Fire Losses \$4,000,000.**

The fires of Texas last year burned \$4,000,000 worth of property while the bad roads loss was \$8,000,000.

Bad roads cause an unnecessary and useless waste of time and money, increase illiteracy, destroy society and encourage pauperism in the community.
