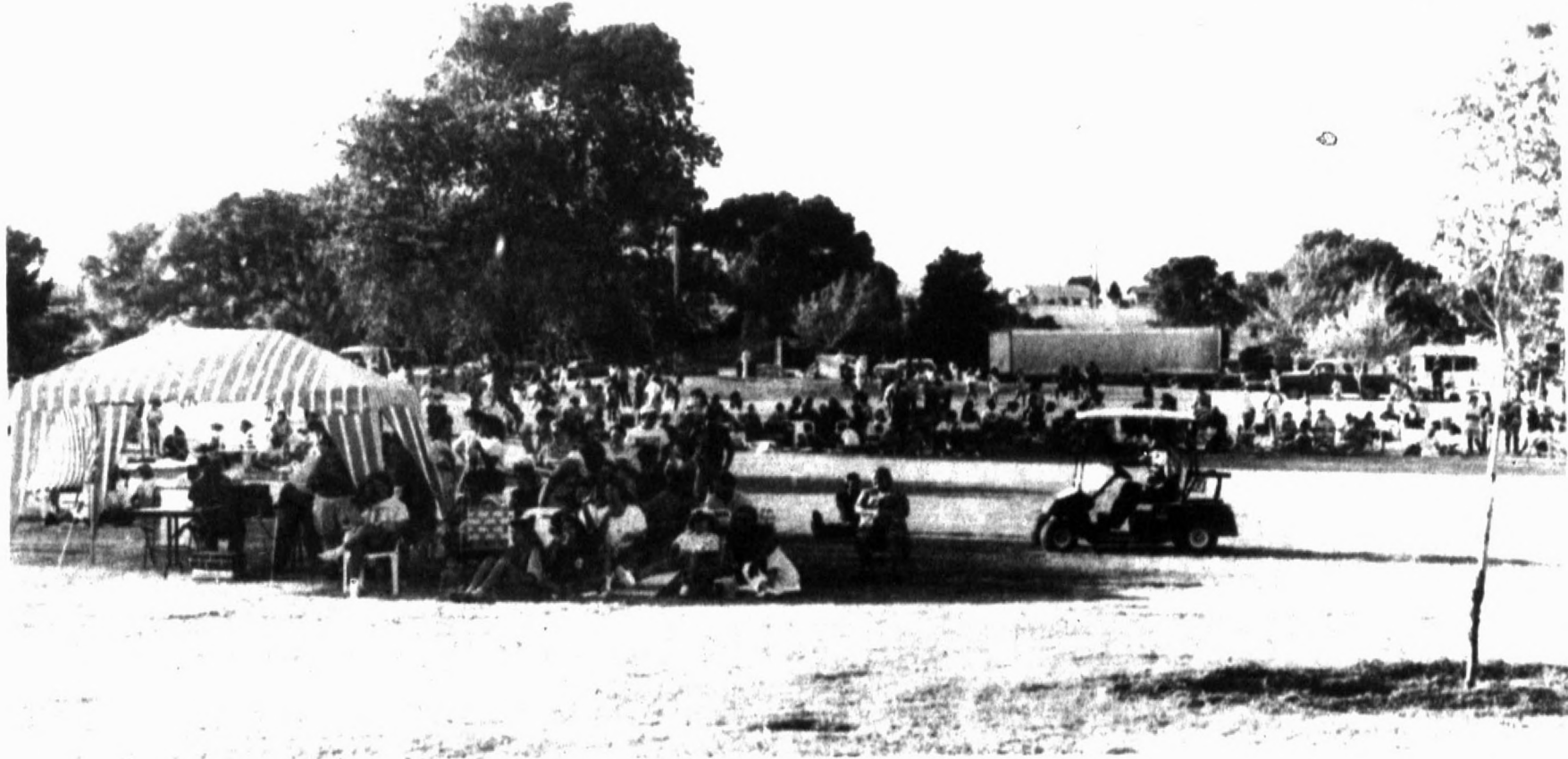

## Clinton, Miyazawa optimistic as economic summit gets started

TOKYO (AP) — As world leaders gathered for their annual economic summit today, President Clinton and Japanese Prime Minister Kiichi Miyazawa expressed optimism about concluding a broad trade agreement that would resolve a contentious dispute between the world's two biggest economies.

Both Clinton and Miyazawa said progress was being made in last-minute talks aimed at forging a broad framework agreement that the United States believes will help reduce America's \$80 billion trade deficit with Japan.

This is Clinton's debut at the annual gathering of capitalism's premier club — the Group of Seven — which opens three days of formal discussions on Wednesday.

There were extremely low

expectations for any results from this year's summit, given the host of economic problems facing the global economy and the weak standing of the participants.

However, a U.S.-Japan trade deal, or even significant progress toward one, could change the tone of the gathering.

"The negotiations have not been free of difficulty but some significant progress has been made," Clinton said at a joint news conference following talks with Miyazawa.

"Both of us are determined that a proper framework must be put in place," Miyazawa told reporters.

Even if the two sides do reach agreement, Miyazawa is facing elections in two weeks that very well could end his party's 38-year grip on power. "The implementation of the agreement to a new government

in a clear recognition of political realities," Clinton was scheduled to hold discussions with Japanese opposition leaders immediately following his talks with Miyazawa.

Clinton and four other summit leaders — British Prime Minister John Major, German Chancellor Helmut Kohl, and newcomers Italian Prime Minister Carlo Azeglio Ciampi and Canadian Prime Minister Kim Campbell — arrived today in bright sunshine.

French President Francois Mitterrand, the dean of the group, was scheduled to fly into Tokyo Wednesday, only hours before the summit formally opens with elaborate arrival ceremonies at the ornate Akasaka Palace.

The administration had hoped to use Clinton's trip to Tokyo to pressure Japan to make its markets more open and set goals for increasing foreign imports by negotiating a

broad framework agreement.

However, those talks were considered at an impasse until Miyazawa wrote Clinton last Friday offering a compromise proposal.

Clinton praised Miyazawa's offer as a "very good letter" and said he believed progress was being made in narrowing the remaining differences.

Talks also were being held on a second divisive trade issue — a seven-year effort to rewrite the rules of global trade. The leaders at the economic summit have pledged repeatedly to wrap up these discussions, being held under the auspices of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade.

GATT General Director Peter Sutherland sent a stark message Monday, saying the summit nations must make headway to have any chance of completing the talks, which involve 114 nations, by a Dec. 15 deadline.

Speaking to reporters in Geneva, Sutherland said progress was critical "if the G-7 are serious about attacking the root of chronic long-term unemployment, about reigniting growth and prosperity."

Russian President Boris Yeltsin was scheduled to meet with the summit leaders on Friday to discuss the status of a promised \$28.4 billion Russian aid package.

## Violent inmates receiving furloughs despite '89 vow

DALLAS (AP) — In 1989 state prison officials vowed to limit the release of violent inmates on furloughs.

But four years later, as state officials work to restructure the criminal justice system, the practice continues, causing concern and protest by some crime victims and law enforcement authorities.

Inmates are being released, some for up to seven days and unsupervised. The Dallas Morning News reported in a copyright story Tuesday.

The program extends to such inmates as Melvin Lee Fountain, who in January traveled unsupervised to Central Texas for three days for his father's funeral. Fountain is serving a 30-year sentence for the beating death of a Lufkin woman. He returned to prison without incident.

But critics of the program wonder how many inmates are like Fountain, and do return without committing other crimes.

Nell Myers, founder and chairwoman of People Against Violent Crime, the first victims' rights group in Texas, says the organization opposes all furloughs.

"The normal citizen never knows about these things. They never know who's walking on the streets next to them or sitting next to them in the restaurant," Ms. Myers said.

Prison officials defend their use of furloughs as a tool in helping inmates maintain family ties and secure work and housing in preparation for impending release.

"They're going to be out in a year anyway... and you have to ultimately get this person back in the workforce if they're not going to return to crime

and other people are not going to be victimized," said Texas Criminal Justice Board Chairman Carol Vance.

Vance says current furlough policies are just, as long as good judgment is exercised in who is released.

"You don't want it to be a boondoggle for some prisoner," he said.

## Rain continues to fall along Mississippi

PERUQUE, Mo. (AP) — Flood-weary Midwesterners and National Guardsmen fought high waters from low-lying areas in East Dubuque, and prayed for clear skies.

Another round of downpours Monday fed the flood from the already rain-swollen river, breaking more levees, forcing more evacuations and destroying precious crops. Additional storms were forecast at least through the end of the week, contributing to the region's worst flooding since 1965.

In West Alton, residents and Guardsmen worked through the night stacking sandbags atop levees protecting the town. Troops also have been called in to help in flooded areas of Iowa and Illinois.

A little upriver at Peruque, a levee was breached Monday and 11 rural homes had to be evacuated. Most streets were under water in Peruque, Kampsville and other small Missouri

communities along the river.

In Illinois, about 450 residents were evacuated Monday from low-lying areas in East Dubuque.

Some of the worst flooding was in Davenport, Iowa, where the Mississippi appeared to have crested at 22 feet. That level was unchanged from Sunday and 6 inches short of the record set in 1965.

"When is it going to end?" Victor Cardoso asked as he operated pumps keeping water from underground power lines downtown.

Electrician Tom Werner said he didn't mind manning the pumps at FirstStar Bank. "Might as well be here doing this since I can't go fishing," he said.

Towns along the river's tributaries also were inundated. Along the scenic Rock River in Moline, Ill., flood waters have entered Grace Dorbeck's living room.

Hundreds of local residents took to Veterans Park on Sunday to eat, drink and not do much else.

Thousands turned out that night to watch a fireworks display commemorating Independence Day and the significance of the nation's 217th birthday.

The annual celebration drew families throughout the day to eat picnic meals and play games or sit in the sun.

When the entertainment began at 7 p.m., the crowd increased, drawn by good music, cold watermelon and sunny skies.

Wes Klett, chairman of the organizing committee that arranged the affair, said the free watermelon ran out early, partly due to large crowds and partly because about 30 percent of the shipment was inedible.

By the time the fireworks began at sundown, Klett estimated, the crowd had grown to several thousand people.

"It looked to be about like it was the first year," Klett said of the crowd, adding that the first crowd was about 6,000 to 7,000 people.

Not all those watching the fireworks went to the park, Klett said. Some just parked there and stayed at their cars, while others lined nearby streets or parked in empty lots or parking lots near the park.

Before the sun set, families listened to songs by a number of performers.

Many family groups brought umbrellas, lawn chairs, volleyball

nets and other play toys.

Despite the large crowd at the official party, there were still enough people bring their own firecrackers to keep the Hereford Fire Department hopping.

Fire Marshal Jay Spain said his volunteer department received 110 fire calls during the four-day July 4th holiday, all of them caused by fireworks.

The last four days there's been 394 man hours put out by the volunteer firefighters on fireworks calls, Spain said.

While most of the blazes were grass fires caused by errant fireworks, we had a couple of structures burn, Spain said, including a barn on North Progressive Road. A pickup also was destroyed by a fireworks-related fire.

Although the law calls for those who start fireworks fires to pay for the damages — plus the costs of fighting the fire, injuries and damaged equipment — Spain said he did not catch any of perpetrators.

While there were no injuries to firefighters battling the blazes, Spain said his equipment sustained damages.

"We've got one (fire truck) in the shop," he said, with a split manifold burned out brake linings and charred wiring. That damage will cost the department \$300 to \$400 to repair.

In addition, another truck had a flat tire, which costs \$25 to repair.

Spain said there were times Sunday that firefighters were out fighting six different fires at once when additional calls came in that had to be left burning because of lack of personnel.

## Injuries, deaths mar celebrations

A horse stunt rider died after attempting a trick known as the "death drag" in front of thousands of people at a Fourth of July rodeo, and fireworks accidents killed two people, including a 3-year-old girl.

In New York City, a blimp crashed into an apartment building, and across town, firefighters rescued a couple from an 11th floor apartment set ablaze by fireworks.

Kate Nielsen, 18, died Monday, a day after the botched horse riding stunt at the Festival of the West in Golden, Colo.

Nielsen had draped herself over the side of the animal for the stunt, but the horse fell and she couldn't free one leg from a stirrup as it took off again.

Nielsen, a member of the Westernaires horse riding club, was kicked repeatedly in the head and dragged by the horse.

In Chicago, 3-year-old Miata Dixon and her mother were watching neighbors light fireworks when a rocket streaked across the street, hit her in her eye and lodged in her head. The girl died Monday.

No one has been charged.

In Frammingham, Mass., 27-year-old Timothy Guertin, father of two, was killed Sunday when a fireworks rocket exploded in his face while dozens of people watched outside his family's home, police said.

One of the rockets Guertin lit failed to ignite. When he leaned over to examine the tube, it exploded.

"Every year we talk about fireworks and the safety involved," police Lt. Wayne McCarthy said. "This is a classic example that they're very dangerous."

Elsewhere, an errant rocket ignited other fireworks that then shot into a crowd at Bristol, Tenn., injuring 15 spectators Sunday, two seriously.

In Southern California, fireworks fans gathered that destroyed the top floor of a South Gate apartment building and might have sparked a 60-acre brush fire that threatened several homes before being controlled.

In New York, investigators were trying to determine what punctured the airship Bigfoot, sending it crashing into a Midtown Manhattan building.

## World/Nation

**TOKYO** - President Clinton, heading to Tokyo for his first economic summit, vows to work with America's rich allies to tune up a global economy that is producing far too few jobs. But wide disagreements and weak leaders raise serious questions about just how much Clinton and his summit partners will be able to accomplish.

**SARAJEVO**, Bosnia-Herzegovina - While 75 tons of diesel fuel is stockpiled just a few miles away, doctors and nurses at Kosevo hospital conduct surgery by daylight to save electricity and sterilize equipment over a wood stove. Sarajevo's main medical center may shut down within days because of a Bosnian Serb fuel blockade. It is not the first time in 15 months of civil war that Sarajevo has been pushed to the brink of collapse by attacking Serbs, but aid workers say the latest stranglehold is one of the worst.

**WASHINGTON** - Federal Reserve policy makers once keen to hike interest rates probably will hold off in the face of new evidence that economic growth paused in June, analysts say.

**LOS ANGELES** - When Professor Juan Enrique Luco received a heavily padded brown envelope with an unfamiliar return address in his mail, he immediately telephoned police. They called in the bomb squad. The package was taken to a soccer field and X-rayed. No bomb was found. Such jitters are more common at universities around the country since two researchers were maimed last month in explosions linked to a single bomber.

**TYLER** - The death last month of an Angelina County woman in a Lufkin hospital may have been caused by the mysterious illness that has killed several people in the Southwestern United States, health officials say. If that's confirmed, the woman would be the first known Texas victim of the hantavirus outbreak that has already claimed 21 lives.

# TDCJ member agrees with protests

## Paroled child-killer placed in San Antonio home

**SAN ANTONIO (AP)** - People protested in front of Raul Meza's house, saying they don't want a convicted child killer living in their neighborhood. They carried placards Monday and

walked single file; some stopped in front of Meza's house to taunt him.

Among the protesters was San Antonio attorney Allan B. Polunsky, who serves on the Texas Board of Criminal Justice. He promised to do

all he could to keep Meza from living in San Antonio.

Meza, who was released from prison after completing a 30-year prison sentence for the rape and murder of an 8-year-old Austin girl in January 1982. He got good-behavior time, allowing him out early.

"This decision is flawed and needs to be reversed," Polunsky said. "He should not be in San Antonio very long, maybe until the end of the week. Whatever it takes to remove him from our community, I will do."

Officials of the state Pardons and Paroles Division last week placed Meza, 32, in the San Antonio house purchased by his mother, who lives in Austin.

Earlier attempts to move him to El Paso and Uvalde were aborted after complaints from officials in those cities.

Meza, who is being monitored electronically, is confined to his house unless he is on official parole business, said Jesus Zapata, regional supervisor of the Pardons and Paroles Division office in San Antonio.

Meza also must attend sex-offender counseling and is subject to random drive-by checks by parole officials, Zapata told the San Antonio Express-News.

The state had no choice but to release Meza because his "good time" and his time served equal his original sentence, Zapata said. Those two conditions fulfill requirements for mandatory release under a state law that no longer exists.

Hutchison will not distract her when she takes office.

"I don't think it's going to be a hindrance at all," she said. "My objective is to ... be as open and honest and as cooperative as I possibly can be with the district attorney and the grand jury."

A native of Pittsburg, Texas, Ms. Whitehead is a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Southern Methodist University with a master's degree from East Texas State.

She was elected to the Longview City Council in 1987 and 1990.

She has served as vice president of the Good Shepherd Medical Center, and has served on the East Texas State board of regents and the Texas Municipal League board. She and her husband, lawyer R. Laughton Whitehead Jr., have three children.

Ms. Whitehead's appointment gives Democrats six of the seven top statewide offices.

She said she will seek election to a full, four-year term as treasurer next year.

# Job-seekers deceived by ads from St. Louis

**SAN ANTONIO (AP)** - Cash-strapped job seekers who turn to the classified ads looking for legitimate job opportunities may be getting duped, say officials with the Better Business Bureau.

Nancy Foley of San Antonio responded to one ad, which promised extra earnings by stuffing direct mail brochures in envelopes for an advertising company.

"Are you looking to earn extra money?" stated the advertisement in the clerical-secretarial section. Ms. Foley sent \$39 for the required materials, but she received nothing in return.

"I'm sorry to say I sent them the money. It's fraud, plain and simple," she said.

Ms. Foley complained to the Better Business Bureau in San Antonio, which forwarded her complaint to St. Louis, Mo., where the alleged company, Direct Advertising of North America, is based.

John Flotron, a trade practice consultant for the Better Business Bureau for eastern Missouri and

southern Illinois, says Ms. Foley's complaint is not the first about the company.

"I've received over 300 complaints about this (company)," he said.

In its literature, the company claims to do advertising for about 20 national corporations, including Target Stores, Flotron said.

"According to the companies that have been contacted (by the Better Business Bureau), none of them are affiliated in any way with D.A.N.A.," he said.

Complaints of the bogus want ads have surfaced in cities across Texas, California, New York, Florida, Illinois and Missouri, he said.

Although the D.A.N.A. ad is not presently running, the envelope-stuffing operation is just one of several misleading "job" offerings that creep into newspaper want ads across the country, Flotron said.

Better Business Bureau officials warn that job listings that require fees generally are not legitimate.

"The system is broken ... and we won't tolerate it," said T.C. Calvert of the Southwest Community Empowerment Center.

Calvert led the crowd in chanting, "Hey, hey, ho ho, Meza's got to go!"

Protesters chanted that Meza should be housed next door to members of the Pardons and Paroles Board.

"My sons (9 and 13 years old) don't come out to play alone anymore," said Adela Espitia, 38, who lives next door to Meza. "My son had a back bedroom but now he sleeps in the living room."

Traffic on the normally quiet Hays Street has increased since Meza moved in, Espitia said. Motorists often slow down and point at his house, she said.

Zapata, who did not attend the rally, said he understands the community's concern, but that Meza "has our support and encouragement." His office will attempt to find work for Meza, he said.

After the hourlong protest on Hays Street, the rally moved inside Antioch Baptist Church.

Organizers said they plan to rent a bus and go to Austin to protest before the Pardons and Paroles Board.

"We all know government can't solve all our problems, but sometimes it adds to our problems," Bexar County Judge Cyndi Krier said.

# Mayor of Longview to take over office of Texas treasurer

**AUSTIN (AP)** - Former Longview Mayor Martha Whitehead will be sworn into office as the new state treasurer today amidst a grand jury investigation of the agency.

Ms. Whitehead, mayor of her city for the past two years, has promised to make the Treasury more efficient and says she will run for the office in 1994.

Gov. Ann Richards appointed the 52-year-old Democrat to the treasurer's job on June 18 to succeed Republican Kay Bailey Hutchison, who was elected June 5 to the U.S. Senate.

"We're going to do what the treasury does best, which is the management of the state's investments," Ms. Whitehead said.

"She is a dynamic leader," Richards said. "As the mayor of Longview, she has proven that she knows how to make government work."

# Former Perot backers organize against him

**DALLAS (AP)** - He came, he saw and he conquered. Ross Perot, with his southern drawl, butch haircut and famous pointer sticks, enchanted the American people last year with his on-again, off-again, on-again run for president.

But one year later, the captivation has turned to criticism for many former Perot supporters.

Joyce Shepard of New York has formed one of several anti-Perot groups that have popped up around the country since last year's election.

"We call ourselves DUPEd - Disenchanted United People For Equality and Democracy," Ms. Shepard told The Dallas Morning News. "His logo is the eagle; ours is the turkey, because that's what he made out of us."

Some one-time backers of the Dallas billionaire voiced similar complaints during his 1992 presidential campaign. But this year, unhappy former loyalists are going a step further by organizing anti-Perot networks.

Roger Lindholm of Arizona publishes a newsletter for ex-Perot volunteers called "We Stand United-Everywhere." Tom Wing of Illinois prefers United We Stood.

Perot aides downplay the groups, saying the critics are a disgruntled minority, many of whom are angry at being passed over for paid staff jobs with United We Stand America, the organization of Perot supporters.

"Anytime you've got an organization this size, you're going to have people who are dissatisfied," said Perot spokeswoman Sharon Holman. "I think it's part of the growing pains."

Though no specific numbers have been provided, anti-Perot groups report legions of members. And their leaders say they can have an impact,

particularly if Perot is preparing for another presidential run in 1996.

"Our goal is to help America realize that Ross Perot is all talk and no action," Ms. Shepard said.

Ms. Shepard and other critics said their movement picked up support after they spoke out recently on national television, denouncing the Perot organization's "dictatorial" and "authoritarian" methods.

Lindholm, who left the Perot organization after a dispute in October, said his Arizona newsletter is one of a half-dozen nationally being distributed by ex-volunteers.

He said dissenters agree with Perot's complaints about deficit spending and special-interest politics, but no longer believe that the Dallas businessman is the proper spokesman for their views.

"I think personally United We Stand will not be around by the end of the year," Lindholm said. "He's going to find out there's a lot more 'dissension' out here than he thinks there is."

## Man experiments five years to imitate taste of top secret recipes

NEW YORK (AP) - As a true-blue American given the chance to get in on just one top-secret secret, you would choose the recipe for the special sauce on a Big Mac, right? Or maybe for Snickers bars?

Sit back. Hog Heaven is here. In "Top Secret Recipes," Todd Wilbur speaks to the cravings of the masses who have made wealthy the makers of Big Macs, Snickers and 40 other yummys, including Reese's Peanut Butter Cups, Kahlua Coffee Liqueur, Aunt Jemima Maple Syrup and Kentucky Fried Chicken Original Recipe Fried Chicken.

It takes work, of course, to make this food at home. But it took five long years for Wilbur to figure out recipes that imitate the taste and appearance of popular brand-name foods.

The hardest item to nail down for the 29-year-old Wilbur, who's not a professional but says he's been cooking since age 9, was the filling for his version of Hostess Twinkies. (He provides a detailed drawing for getting the cream into the cake.)

"I did a lot of the sleuthing for this by reading ingredient labels," Wilbur says, adding that on Twinkies the

listing for natural and artificial flavors didn't leave him many clues.

"Obviously it had vanilla, but there was something else," which turned out to be lemon flavoring, he says.

To find the key to Wendy's chili, he bought some, dumped it in a sieve and rinsed off the sauce. The surprise ingredient was celery.

His biggest disappointment? He couldn't perfect Oreos. The white filling was satisfactory, he says, but the fudgy, slightly burnt taste of the cookies eluded him.

He considers his best recipe his Mrs. Fields Chocolate Chip Cookies. They are made, he says with all due immodesty, from "the best chocolate chip cookie recipe ever put to paper."

He thought the base of Mrs. Fields Peanut Butter Dream Bars tasted like a cookie, so he called a store and asked. Sure enough, an employee told him, crumbled cookies.

Otherwise, he says, he contacted no companies, and none has contacted him.

"I did not swipe, heist, bribe or otherwise obtain any formulas through coercion or illegal means," he writes in his foreword.

In fact, he says, the companies

should be flattered.

Burger King spokeswoman Cori Zywtow agrees.

"There are 1,023 ways for a customer to order a Whopper," she says. "Hats off to Todd for trying to re-create one of the ways."

With 700 million Whoppers sold a year, the company isn't exactly worried that home cooks will take over the business.

Neither do candy companies need worry: They sell 3 billion pounds of candy a year to sweet-toothed Americans.

Still, Wilbur is climbing some best-seller lists with his \$10 Plume paperback and having a great time in the process, even fooling Regis Philbin in a televised taste comparison.

Wilbur quit his job as a television reporter in Allentown, Pa., about a year and a half ago to work on the book. He may never go back.

"Top Secret Recipes: The Sequel?"

"That might be a possibility. That might very well be a possibility," he says.

After all, this is a man whose eyes go dreamy when he recalls eating frozen Ding Dongs as a child, picking off the chocolate icing.

"Oh, man ..."

## Twins gain revenge on Tigers with 13-3 rout

Everyone seems to be getting even with the Detroit Tigers as they make their second trip around the American League.

The Minnesota Twins became the latest, routing the Tigers 13-3 Monday night at the Metrodome. The revenge factor exists because the Tigers mauled the Twins at Minnesota in late April, outscoring them 45-10 in sweeping a three-game set.

The Tigers were the talk of baseball back then, and they still are for a different reason. Detroit has dropped 13 of 14 games and, dating back to the sixth inning of a game June 22 they led 7-3 in Baltimore, have been outscored 113-44.

"We had our bats going. Maybe it was the beginning of a little bit of a payback," Dave Winfield said. Winfield and Brian Harper, who

drove in four runs, connected for Minnesota's first consecutive home runs in more than a year.

Winfield hit a two-run homer in the third inning and Harper followed with a home run for a 5-3 lead.

Winner Scott Erickson (5-9) gave up 11 hits and three walks in seven innings. David Wells (9-4) lasted only 2 1-3 innings and was tagged for six runs on seven hits.

**Rangers 5, Brewers 4**  
Juan Gonzalez hit a two-run homer in the eighth inning that sent Texas over Milwaukee at County Stadium.

Gonzalez hit his 21st home run off James Austin after Rafael Palmeiro singled with one out against Graeme Lloyd (2-1).

Mike Schoöler (3-0) won. **Athletics 6, Indians 5**  
**Indians 6, Athletics 2**  
Rickey Henderson led off both

games with home runs, and Oakland split its doubleheader with Cleveland at the Coliseum.

The Elias Sports Bureau, baseball's statistician, said the only other instance it could find of a player leading off both games of a doubleheader with home runs was Harry Hooper of the Boston Red Sox on May 30, 1913, against Washington.

Henderson extended his major league record of leadoff home runs to 61. Mike Aldrete's two-run homer broke a sixth-inning tie in the opener.

Albert Belle homered twice in the second game for the Indians. Felix Fermin also connected for his first home run since April 1990.

Mark Clark (4-3) was the winner in the second game and Jeremy Hernandez got his fifth save. Curt Young (1-1) was activated from the

disabled list earlier in the day and left after 4 2-3 innings with soreness in his left shoulder, the same injury that sidelined him.

Burkett (13-2) won his 13th consecutive start, allowing all four runs and scattering 10 hits in seven-plus innings. The Giants have scored 40 runs in his last four starts.

"It's just one of those things," he said with a shrug. "But, hey, if they give me 10 a game all the way, I'll take it."

Will Clark had three hits for the Giants, including his sixth home run of the season. Willie McGee went 4-for-5, hitting a three-run double in the Giants' five-run first inning.

"With the kind of team we have, our pitchers can relax and throw the ball," McGee said. "Everybody's contributing, everybody's hitting and when that happens, everybody loosens up. The pressure's not on one guy."

In other games, Atlanta beat Florida 9-7, Philadelphia beat Los

Angeles 9-5, St. Louis beat Houston 10-4, Cincinnati beat Pittsburgh 6-4, San Diego beat New York 12-7 and Chicago beat Colorado 10-1.

**Cardinals 10, Astros 4**  
Donovan Osborne (7-3) earned his fifth victory in six decisions and Gregg Jefferies had three hits and drove in three runs for visiting St. Louis, which avoided a four-game sweep and stopped Houston's four-game winning streak.

Greg Swindell (6-8) gave up six earned runs and 10 hits in five innings.

**Cubs 10, Rockies 1**  
Rick Wilkins homered twice off Willie Blair (3-6), giving him 16 this season, and Mike Harkey (6-2) allowed five hits in eight innings as visiting Chicago gained a four-game split.

## Ryan must learn how to throw all over again during comeback

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) - It might as well have been a public park, abandoned in the heart by all but the most die-hard sandlot players.

They were throwing along the base path in the empty stadium.

With one wearing Nike shorts, a tank top and a tan, the other in a cap and an old baseball style shirt with Nolan Ryan's image on the back, they looked a lot like two little kids who longed to pitch in the big leagues.

That's pretty much what was going on, except the elder kid was 46, one of the best pitchers ever. And Nolan Ryan really was trying to make it back to the game.

Ryan took another baby step toward finishing his career on the active roster when he began late-stage rehabilitation with Rangers roving instructor Tom House on Friday at Arlington Stadium.

It was the first of an indefinite number of private sessions for a very public man.

There was only the sound of airplanes, the wind hitting pulleys on the empty flagpoles and the drawl we've all come to know as well as our best friend's voice.

And, afterward, more hope than ever this season that Ryan will be back, maybe sometime this month.

He threw 90 pitches, which might sound like a lot, but as House pointed out, it was more like a game of catch than real pitches.

And barring any more setbacks, it will be realistic to start thinking about Ryan being back soon.

"We have not defined time and plans yet," Ryan says. "It's too early to tell."

House says they are looking to be in a simulated game by the All-Star break and work out every day for a while for Ryan to "rediscover the feel of what it's like."

It's sort of like being a rookie again, learning mechanics again, House said.

Or, as only The Express would put it, "seeing the same railroad track from a different direction."

Sure, something could go wrong, and that's when he really starts to

worry, Ryan said. If anything goes wrong at this stage, he would be working against the clock and probably would not be back.

He has thought about that unfriendly option.

"And that would make it the worst year of my life," Ryan said. "I've thought about it on several occasions."

But hope is in more than an improving hip and actually throwing a baseball again.

This face looks a lot different than the one seen in Alvin, Texas, just before a Memorial Day ski-fin accident.

This face is a most familiar one - at peace, in control, the lines of frustration and anxiety receding.

The fm-sliced foot is no longer an issue, and Ryan says he's getting confident with the way the hip feels.

Now he's being extra cautious about doing too much. Ryan speculates he had been overdoing it and finally sat down with Dr. John Conway and figured out how much was too much.

Ryan said it's easier to keep himself from pushing too hard to get back - a good sign - because hope and progress have alleviated some panic over the approaching All-Star break, now less than two weeks away.

"At this point, four extra days is not a big thing," he says.

"The key is how long it takes to get consistent with my delivery. I'm disappointed I'm not further along."

Mainly, he means with his mechanics. Of course, you'd think it would be second nature to a guy like Ryan, like finding his way through his house in the dark, the delivery as consistent as sunrise on the ranch.

But that's not the case.

House pronounced Ryan ahead of schedule physically, even though the schedule has been rather loosely defined from the beginning. It's the mechanics that need work.

"My job is to not let him fall into any bad habits," House said.

At this stage, even Ryan can slip into bad habits, House said. He is as vulnerable as a kid right now.

Kids have no mechanics. Middle career guys can rely on their strength to get them through when they are reacquainting themselves with the game. Older guys have weaker and more stressed body parts, thereby likely to skip certain aspects of mechanics to compensate in various areas.

So on Friday, Nolan, Mr. Intensity, would get instructions from House, then throw 25 Nolan's way.

"And I say, OK, if you want to do this right ..." said House, after Ryan pushed too hard in the wrong direction.

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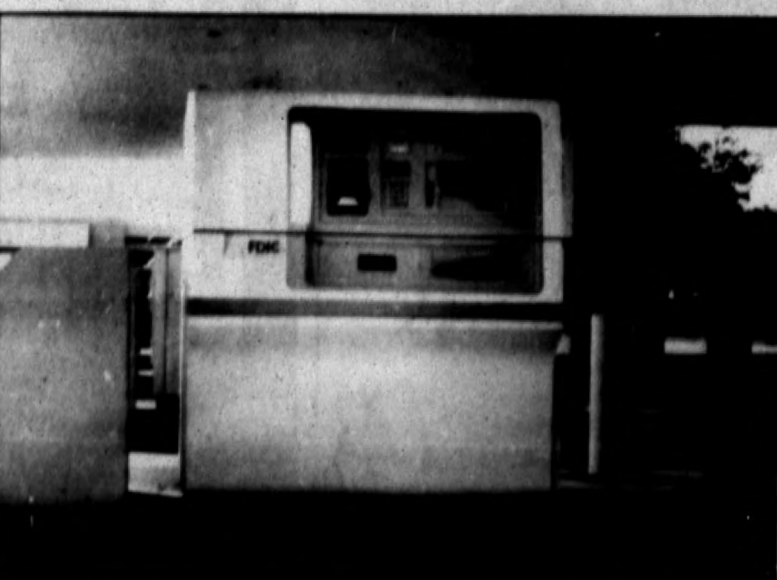
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## British tabloids are bored by Sampras

LONDON (AP) - This year's Wimbledon champions had little chance to savor their victories. Steffi Graf got sick and Pete Sampras got no respect. While Graf left town because of a stomach problem and missed the Champions' Dinner, Sampras may have felt ill when he saw some of the headlines describing his four-set triumph over fellow American Jim Courier.

"It's Pete Samprazzzz," cracked the Daily Mirror. "Bored on the Fourth of July."

"Samp-Prazzzzz," blared the Daily Star. "Big Bore Pete is Chimpily the Best."

While some commentators praised Sampras for his smooth, serve-and-volley game, the prevailing opinion was that Sunday's match and the players were dull and uninspiring.

"It is hard to embrace a young man with the demeanor of a gloomy robot," the Daily Express said of Sampras.

"Sampras, claiming his inheritance on an unrivaled stage, should have been the stuff of legend," wrote columnist Michael Calvin in the Daily Telegraph. "He conspired with Courier, his childhood friend, in reducing a game of infinite variety to the level of tractor-pulling."

The Guardian said, "It is true that the absence of atmosphere at the final was partly that these two young men... do not inspire much passion in the ordinary spectator... They do not have John McEnroe's magnificent torment nor (Andre) Agassi's flair for self-promotion."

Graf, meanwhile, was reported recovering at home in Germany after missing Sunday night's traditional dinner with stomach troubles.

"I think it was the effect of all the painkilling pills she took during the tournament," Graf's father, Peter, was quoted as saying in the Evening Standard.

Graf said his daughter played with terrible pain in her right foot during the tournament, flew home to Germany for treatment and received an injection just before beating Jana Novotna in the final for her fifth Wimbledon title.

Graf has suffered from an inflamed tendon in her right foot since the French Open last month. Peter Graf said the injury was worse than previously acknowledged.

"She was more injured than people knew, and, if it was up to me, she wouldn't have played Wimbledon," he told British newspapers. "I wanted her to pull out. I was more concerned about her being able to play two years from now than winning another title."

"This was the most pain you have seen her in. It shows how brave she is and how much Wimbledon means to her. If it was any other tournament, she wouldn't have done it."

## Gardendale woman moves in on male-dominated world of stock car racing

GARDENDALE, Texas (AP) - Fast cars are not just for men anymore.

Stephanie Olssen of Gardendale found herself in the driver's seat of a Nova last season, racing against aggressive men who often bumped her off the track.

"One of the racers sent me out on purpose," she said. "A man doesn't like being beat by a woman."

Olssen's husband had drag raced for years when he decided to try and find an advertiser for his car. He approached Dr. John Bray, an allergist in Midland. But Bray was only interested in advertising with a stock car, Olssen said.

"We joked about me driving," she said. "I said, 'I can do that.' It wasn't planned; it just happened. I'm sort of everyone's guinea pig, being the woman."

Though some of the men don't take kindly to a woman driver, many are very supportive, Olssen said.

"I think if (women) are qualified and can stand the pace, it's fine, said Gary House, a member of the Permian Basin Racing Association board of directors. "It's the same thing for men."

This is Olssen's second season racing at the Twin Cities Speedway and she has moved up from the street stock call to super stock, in which she drives a Chevrolet. She had never even been in a race car before her introduction to the sport. Now she can barely tear herself away from it.

"It's hard to stop, once you get started," Olssen said. "A lot of people like the rush. I have a hard time leaving the track and my sponsor. Every time Dr. Bray gets excited, I get excited."

Whether she gets first or last place, Olssen receives a lot of publicity because she is the only woman on the track, she said. Though most women can handle the cars as well as men, she said driving a race car requires more strength because there are no power brakes or steering.

The first time she drove, Olssen said she was so scared she couldn't stop shaking. Even now, Olssen continues to feel nervous when she races.

"If you're too scared, you'll get hurt," she said. "On my first lap, I totaled my car."

Driving requires intense concentration, and racers must maintain it throughout every second of a race. Without that kind of focus, they may find their cars bashed against the side rail.

"Being trapped in the car is almost claustrophobic," said Steve Moulton, a racer and sponsor. "It's a real eerie feeling. You may think you're going real fast, but then someone will blow by you."

High speeds and avoiding collisions aren't the only concerns of

the driver. Bigger cars in higher classes of races require a lot of time and money. Without a sponsor, some cars would not make it to the track each week.

While maintenance of smaller cars is fairly inexpensive, required safety features add up. All around, larger cars are more expensive to maintain.

"It's called cubic dollars," Moulton said. "The more money spent, the faster you go."

Moulton races a Pinto in the mini-stock class. He bought the car for \$4,000 and spends \$1,500 each year in gas and maintenance. Usually 50 percent of maintenance costs are covered by the sponsor.

Not even prize money contributes to the cost of the car. The most that local racers can win is \$125. Last-place finishers get between \$25 and \$75.

"You have to love the sport to do it because the money is not there,"

House said. "Part of the reason I stopped racing for a long time was because it took too much money away from the household."

For most of the racers, Twin City races are not stepping stones for bigger ones; they are just an opportunity to have fun and bring the family.

"I don't dream of bigger races," said Marcus Bailey, a racer and member of the PBRA board of directors. "I pay \$12 to drive from 6 p.m. to 12. You can't have that much fun for so cheap anywhere else."

Racing has become a family sport. Spectators, young and old alike, love to pick their favorite racer and follow him or her throughout the season, House said.

"My real fans are the kids," Olssen said. "They just love me. They'll run up and hug my legs, or they'll point to me and say 'That's her. That's her.'"

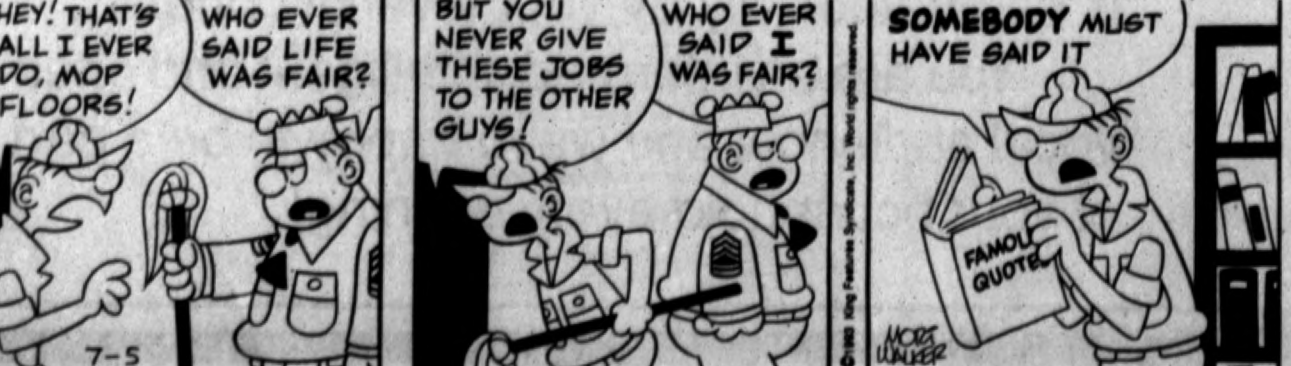

## How much do you know about your choices?

Food fads come and go. So it's no surprise that consumers in search of good health are confused about wise food choices.

When it comes to foods that may help ward off disease, how much do you know? To check your nutrition savvy, take this true/false quiz developed by the Therapeutic Foods Nutrition Council.

1. Garlic has been shown to lower blood cholesterol levels.
2. Boiling vegetables is the best cooking method for vegetables.
3. Pasta is a good source of beta-carotene.
4. EPA, a substance found in salmon and tuna, appears to help the body protect against heart disease.
5. Oriental mushrooms contain compounds thought to stimulate the immune system and inhibit blood clotting.
6. Oat bran and psyllium are rich in soluble fiber.

8. Calcium may help to lower blood pressure.

Research in nutrition and medicine has proven there are a plethora of

foods that, through their nutritional value, may help to treat or protect against a variety of diseases. Vitamin supplements do the job, too.

### ANSWERS:

1. True-Studies have shown that garlic can lower blood cholesterol in individuals with high blood cholesterol levels.
2. False-Steaming vegetables, not boiling them, is the best cooking method; steaming helps to retain nutrients.
3. False-Beta-carotene is found in dark orange and dark, leafy green vegetables. It is converted by the body into vitamin A.
4. True-EPA, an essential fatty acid, appears to help protect against heart disease.

5. True-Shiitake and Reishi mushrooms are thought to contain compounds that stimulate the immune system, inhibit blood clotting, lower cholesterol and inactive virus.

6. True-Oats, oat bran, psyllium and guar gum are good sources of soluble fiber, a type of fiber that helps lower total blood cholesterol and LDL-cholesterol levels.

8. True-Studies have shown that calcium may help to reduce high blood pressure.

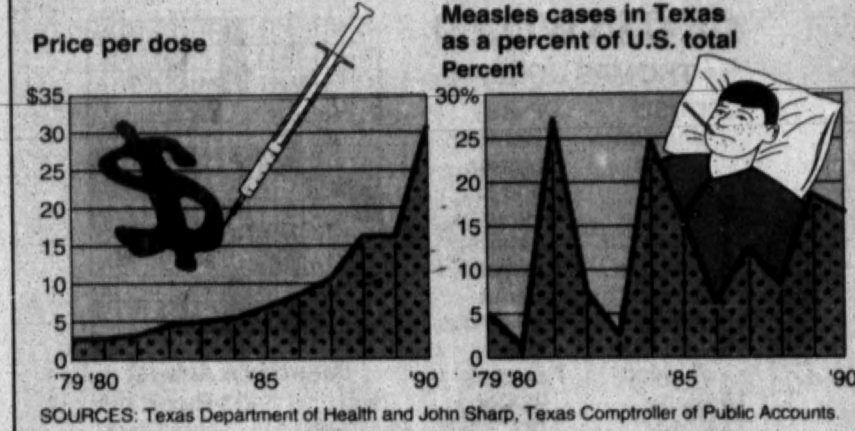

### Measles vaccine cost rises 1,000%

The cost of a single measles immunization has risen from \$2.62 per dose in 1977 to \$30.66 in 1990, an increase of 1,070 percent. The vaccine, known as MMR, also prevents mumps and rubella. There were 4,000 cases of measles in Texas in 1990, or 16.6 percent of the national total of 26,600.



## Who owns the land?

It still surprises many people, but big corporations from the big city don't own America's farms. Only 3 tenths of one percent of farms are owned by non-family corporations.

Farms, especially farms that grow crops, are overwhelmingly owned by individual and family-farm businesses in the United States 86.6 percent of all U.S. farms are owned by individuals. The next largest farm ownership group is family partnerships with 9.6 percent. Family corporations with fewer than 10 stockholders own 2.9 percent of U.S. farms.

Families own 99.1 percent of the farms in the United States. All the other ownership types - non-family corporations, government units, non-profit groups and miscellaneous types own just 0.9 percent of U.S. farms. And there is no visible trend away

from individual/family farm ownership in the United States. The trends that are visible include increasing numbers of small farms owned by families that earn most of their income off the farm, and an increase in the number of large family-owned farms as more middle-sized family farms are bought out by expanding family farms.

However, the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) reports that the largest share of farm product sales (38.2 percent) is still produced by moderate-sized family-owned farms that average about 1,200 acres, less than \$1 million in assets and about \$50,000 in net farm income before family living expenses.

## Follow guidelines for breast cancer screening

About 182,000 women in the United States will be diagnosed with breast cancer in 1993, with an estimated 46,000 dying of the disease. Yet, fewer than one-third of American women follow the recommended guidelines for breast cancer screening.

The American Cancer Society recommends that all women between 40 and 49 should have a mammogram every one to two years, and after age 50, every year. It is also recommended that women perform monthly breast self-exams and have clinical evaluations at least every three years after 20 and every year over 40.

A mammogram can detect a small tumor up to two years before you or your doctor will feel it. Finding a lump early significantly improves a woman's chance of successful treatment.

According to Debra Saunders, manager of clinical applications for LORAD Corp., pioneers in state-of-the-art mammography equipment, "New technology means less radiation dosage, making mammograms safer than ever. In addition, recent advances have reduced the time and cost associated with mammograms, making it more accessible for women."

Before receiving a mammogram, a woman must choose a reliable mammography facility. "The two most important factors for obtaining a safe, accurate mammogram are quality of the equipment and experience of the staff," says Saunders. "Also, the mammography unit should be dedicated for mammograms only." The National Cancer Institute recommends asking the following questions before making an appointment.

-Does the facility use machines

specifically designed for mammography?

-Is the mammography machine calibrated at least once a year to make sure its measurements and doses are correct?

-Is the person taking the mammogram a registered technologist certified by the American Registry of Radiological Technologists or licensed by the state?

-Does the facility perform at least 10 mammograms each week as part of its regular practice?

-Is the radiologist who reads the mammograms specifically trained to do so?

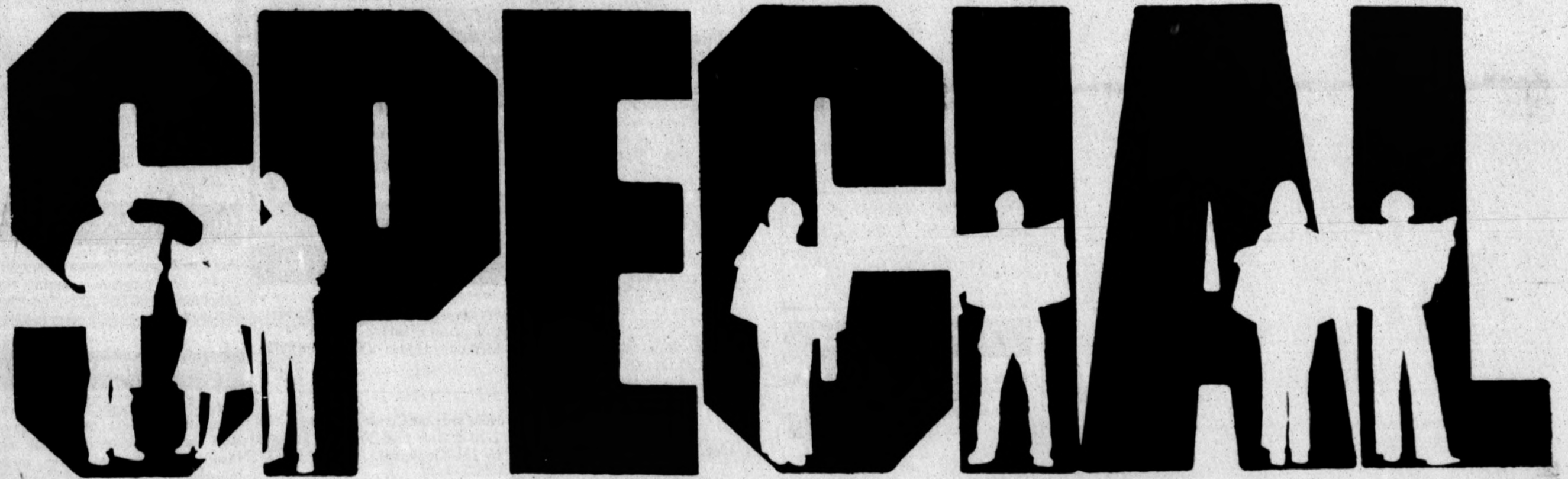
The answer to each of these questions should be yes.

The American College of Radiology (ACR) runs a voluntary accreditation program in which accredited facilities have had their equipment, staff and procedures evaluated and approved. ACR provides an updated list of its accredited facilities to the National Cancer Institute each month. To check whether a specific facility is accredited, or to get information about an accredited facility in your area, call the Cancer Information Service at 1-800-4-CANCER.

If a mammogram detects a suspicious lump, a biopsy, or extraction of the affected tissue, is performed. Today, biopsies are more sophisticated than those of a few years ago.

Technology makes it possible for women to receive mammograms at a fraction of the cost and danger of those from 10, and even five, years ago. Early detection and diagnosis are a woman's most reliable weapons against breast cancer.
