Killed Johnson Grass.

Waco Times Herald: Elmer Stovall, a well known farmer of the Robinson neighborhood, has astonished his neighbors by completely ridding a farm of Johnson grass in two years and now has a fine crop of cotton growing on fifty acres of land recently set thick in this dread pest. He never missed a crop either.

Mr. Stovall accomplished his task by breaking the land in July and August last year, and turning two or three hundred head of sheep in. He kept turning the grass land back and forth with middle buster, and the roots kept coming nearer the surface as the sheep nipped it, and the pest was soon under control at light expense. Work of making a crop on fifty

acres of land cost Mr. Stovall just \$55, or little over one dollar an acre and this where Johnson grass had been growing luxuriantly a little while before. It seems almost incredible, but it was done by work at the right time and in the right manner. This experience should be worth much to the farmers of this section, some of whom have come to regard Johnson grass as a pest which cannot be gotten rid of without years of work and the expenditure of large sums of money.

There were shipped from McLean this week forty-nine cars of the Rowe cattle. Twenty-seven cars were shipped out on Monday and twenty-two on Wednesday. —McLean News.

TEXAS BAPTISTS CONVENE

Convention Now Being Held at San Antonio—Big Attendance Reported.

San Antonio, Nov. 5.—Hundreds of ministers of the Baptist denomination from all over Texas are here today for a ministerial conference, preceding the general convention of the church, which opens Thursday. Rev. Jeff D. Ray of Waco, who has been chairman for many years, will preside over the conference. The principal matters to be brought before the general convention will relate to state, home and foreign missions, and the educational institutions of the Baptist church in Texas.

Of these there are many, including Baylor university at Waco, Baylor Female college at Belton, Howard-Payne college at Brownwood, Decatur college at Decatur, Burselon college at Greenville, East Texas institute at Rusk, Canadian academy at Canadian and Goodnight college at Goodnight. All these institutions are under the direction of the Baptist educational commission. A report will also be made upon the Baptist memorial sanitarium at Dallas, which will soon be completed at a cost of \$150,000. About 2,500 delegates are expected at the general convention, and it is expected that the unofficial visitors will swell the number to at least 5,000.

Reno Made Good.

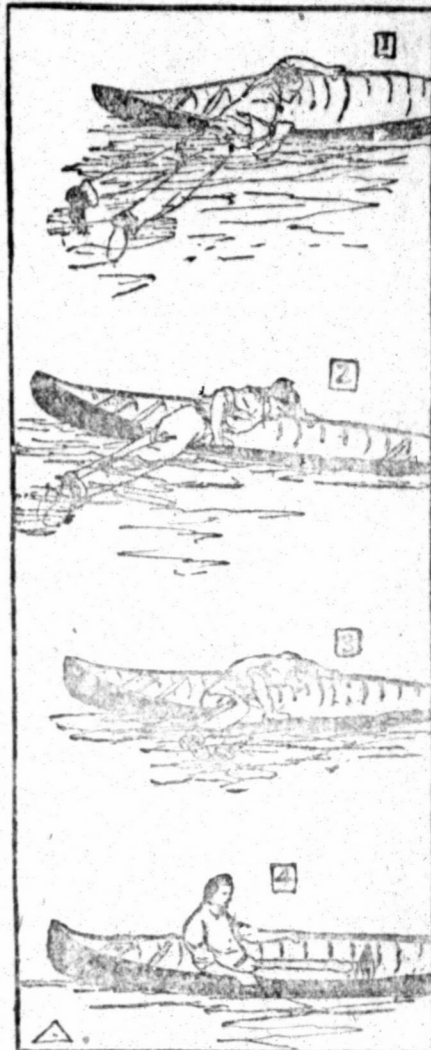

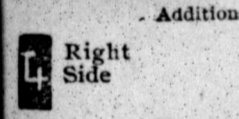

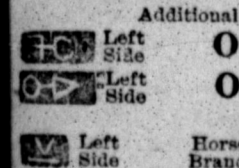


P. O. Clarendon, Texas. Range on Salt Fork in Donley county. Mark—Underslope left ear.

"Thou, therefore, that teacheest another, teachest thou not thyself? Thou who gloriest in the law, through thy transgression of the law, dishonorest God."

Some of us know, Some of us do not know, But all of us should know When we violate the Law and become Subject to a Penalty
