GUS JACQUES IS DEAD

Expired Suddenly at Hotel Denver in Clarendon Saturday Night—Just From Hospital

Gus Jacques, formerly a respected citizen and business man of Clarendon but latterly a citizen of Dalhart, and county treasurer there died at Hotel Denver this city, Saturday night. As told in these columns last week H. B. White went down to Ft. Worth to accompany Mr. Jacques to Clarendon, he having been in a hospital there for a month taking treatment for Bright's Disease. A brother, T. L. Jacques of Dalhart, also went down for the same purpose. The party arrived in Clarendon Saturday on the delayed train shortly after noon. Mr. Jacques was feeling well except being tired from the trip and went over to the hotel. He spent the afternoon there and ate a hearty supper. Sometime after supper he went to the toilet, and about 10 o'clock when another guest visited the toilet he found Gus dead on the floor. Physicians were summoned but to no effect except to pronounce his death due to a form of apoplexy, succeeding his long siege of kidney trouble. The remains were shipped to Dalhart Sunday and there interred.

Gus Jacques was once well known here. In the old days of railroad shops he was a central figure in Clarendon, and he only left here when the division point was removed. He was about 59 years of age. About two years ago he married at Dalhart, his wife dying about a year later. He was a good-hearted, whole-souled spirit, and

numbered his friends only by the scope of his acquaintanceship. The Banner-Stockman extends sympathy to his relatives, in which we are joined by all the people of Clarendon who ever knew him. Peace to his ashes!

settlement. However those people most interested in the matter should and doubtless will, not let him bear the expense alone.

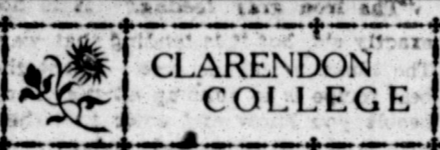
Hallowe'en Entertainment

BIG SUIT FOR DAMAGES

A. R. Letts of Clarendon Sues J. K. Zimmerman of Hall County for \$162,000.

The Letts-Zimmerman land matter has again presented itself in the courts. Mr. Letts has filed suit in the Federal court at Fort Worth for \$162,000 damages against Mr. Zimmerman. The features of the case are somewhat familiar to local readers, Letts' claim being that he contracted to buy a large body of land from Zimmerman in Hall county, and afterwards the land was sold to other parties and his contract ignored. The Ft. Worth Record prints the following notice of the suit:

J. K. Zimmerman, a wealthy land owner and ranchman of the Panhandle section and a temporary resident of this county, is made the defendant in a damage suit for \$162,000, which was filed Thursday afternoon in the United States district court.

The plaintiff in the suit is Arthur R. Letts of Clarendon and the suit grows out of the alleged failure of Zimmerman to carry out a contract for the sale of certain ranch lands in the Panhandle section.

Zimmerman is one of the most prominent ranch and cattle owners of the Panhandle, his holdings being principally in the counties of Hall and Briscoe. Several years ago he sold one of his ranches in the Panhandle section to Swift & Co., the price being something like \$1,000,000.
