Specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture point out that shortages of rainfall are likely to occur frequently in this territory and that it is essential that live-stock farmers carry over feed reserves as insurance against dry weather and stunted crops.

Hopperdozer Collects Grasshoppers

No modern implement of warfare terrorizes the enemy more than the hopperdozers, built according to plans recommended by the United States Department of Agriculture, terrorizes grasshop bers. Ten bushels of grasshoppers were captured in two hours on one farm in Morgan County, Ind., by the use of a hopperdozer built by the county agent in order to control a serious outbreak of the pests. Continued use of the device has resulted in the control of vast hordes of the insects which have done considerable damage on many farms in the county, The catcher is about 15 feet long and 6 feet high. Near the bottom is a trough leading into a big screen cage at the back. The device was drawn by two horses over a clover field after the erop had been cut. The agent reports that at times the pests were so thick as they jumped into the catcher that they presented the appearance of a cloud. LOCO AND PROHIBITION

Loco weed has been the cause of considerable loss of livestock on the ranges of the southwest. Since prohibition went into effect it has been found that loco weed and raisins, in certain proportions, fomented and clarified, forms a drink that causes one to love his mother-in-law or rob his own hen roost. Now comes a report from Denver that a bug has been discovered in eastern Colorado that destroys loco weed and experiments are being made in its propagation. Thus another apparent oasis is turned into a mirage.

New Force Starts Corn-Borer Clean-up.

-Fort Sumner (N. M.) Review.

In the next few days the United States Department of Agriculture will open a field labratory near Scheneetady, N. Y., for the purpose of conducting a survey of European corn-borer conditions in that State. A force of about 25 inspectors will be thrown in the field and a complete survey will be made as quickly as possible. All material collected will be sent to the laboratory, the exact locatiou of which has not yet been decided upon, for determination as to whether or not it is European corn-borer or native species. The infestation in New York is not. nearly so widespread as that in Massachusetts, but it is none the less serious, and calls for energetic measures. Actual clean-up work can not be begun until after frost, but before that time information will be gathered to show what area the clean-up must cover.





The "Sixty-five Year Midget."

In 1854 and the two following years the wheat crop over rather a wide area was severely damaged by a little insect called the wheat midge. The loss in New York alone was estimated at \$15,000,000. As a result, many farmers in that State abandoned the growing of wheat. The farm journals at that time were full of discussions of the midge. But for years subsequently the wheat midge was not particularly troublesome, Gradual-'v ly, both farmers and entomologists forgot about it or remembered it only as one of the pests that used to be. And so it went on for more than 60 years, until very recently. Then the wheat midge gave evidence that it isn't out of business.

Entemologists of the United States Department of Agriculture say that there is considerable midge injury in New York. Pennsylvania. Maryland. West Virginic, and Virginia. During all these 60 or more years, of course, the midge has been present, but in such small numbers as not to be noticed particularly. Because it was, not doing any very serious injury, no thoroughly systematic study was made of the insect. The department experts are inclined to believe that several species are included under the name of wheat midge. Such life history data as are available do not seem to harmonize sufficiently for one species. The probability is, they think, that conditions are very rarely favor-able for all of the species at the same time and, until such a universally favorable season occurs, the midge does not inflict enough damage to be particularly noticeable. The department, through the Bureau of Entomology, is undertaking a systematic study of life history together with other in-

"The daughter of the farmer or of the man from a small town is given a clean lodging place in the girls' hote with board at a low cost. Many girls would not be able to successfully combat the economic conditions of which they are ignorant when they come to the cities without the aid of the Salvation Army.

Thousands to Cities

"Thousands of such young people flock into the cities each year. They are employed in clothing stores, five and ten cent shops and telephone offices. In many cases the wage paid is insufficient for their needs. "The Salvation Army steps into the

breach at such times and extends a helping hand."

The Salvation Army owns in Texas two rescue, two maternity and two children's homes. In addition the erganization has four workingmen's hotels and two industrial stores. The rescue, maternity and children's homes are at San Antonio and El Paso.

The girls' hotel at Dallas maintained by the Salvation Army now accommodates 25 girls, according to Lieutenant Colonel George Wood in his report for the year ending March 31, 1919. These girls, Mr. Wood declares, are given clean rooms and wholesome meals much below the cost for the poorest kind of board and room obtainable in Dallas The home is at 1718 Corsicana street.
