Chairman Harrison informs The Brand that, a fact not generally understood is that the present fifteen cent road tax is sufficient to take care of the bond issue and practically all other old road indebtedness, leaving the new fifteen cent tax free with which to maintain the roads.

The opposition to this important measure is laying great stress upon the present financial crisis. Mr. Harrison points out that in the first place the additional tax to be imposed is ridiculously small in nearly every instance, re than covering the tax a great majority of the voters would have to pay.

Another point by Mr. Harrison is that this slight additional tax would not be payable until 1922, unless all signs fail, the financial strain will be torgotten and money much easier.

Another question raised by Mr. Harrison: "If YOU intended to purchase a farm one of the first things you would inquire about would be whether there was a good road leading past it. wouldn't you? And wouldn't that have a lot to do with the price you would be willing to pay for that farm?"

While The Brand does not believe in burdening the people at any time with unnecessary expense, and especially in times like these, at the same time it believes that false economy is worse than anything else, and that to defeat a moderate tax like this one, when good roads touch the very vitals of the agricultural, live stock, commercial and transportation problems of the entire community, would be false economy in the highest degree. House Bill No. 361 and Senate Bill No. 193, carrying respectively \$3,000,000.00 and \$4,000.00.00 appropriations for the general benefit of the public schools of Texas, are both meritorious measures. The common purpose of each is laudable. Scarcity of available money will not permit, at this time, the approval of both. That there will not be sufficient money coming into the State Treasury to give all the aid needed to our public schools is a matter I deeply regret. Therefore, I do now hereby approve House Bill No. 361, appropriating \$3,000,000.00 to supplement the Available School Fund, and do now hereby disapprove and veto Senate Bill No. 193, appropriating \$4,000,000.00 to further aid certain public schools, for the following reasons:
