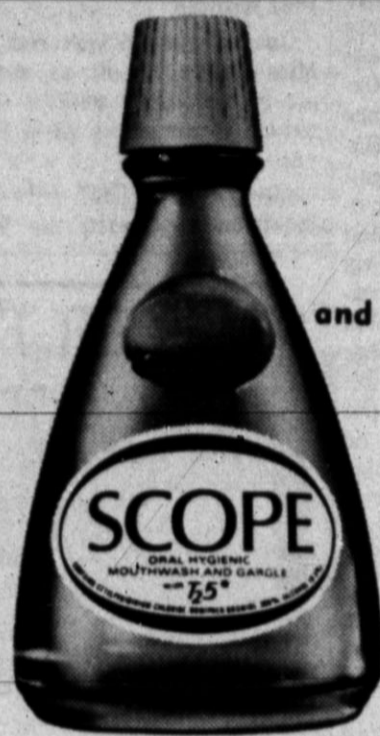

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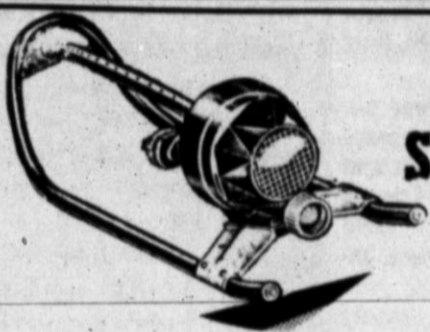

Snakes Alive

Snakes Alive!! This is a year for rattlesnakes from all the reports we hear. Many area people have already killed a number of snakes and one rancher said not one of the ten he has killed has rattled. Above all remember that there are no rules that apply to poisonous snakes and that the snakes don't go by any set of rules. So please inform yourself to at least recognize a poisonous snake and what to do if a snakebite occurs.

Kill the snake for examination to determine whether it is a poisonous species, remembering the characteristics of poisonous snakes described. Also, the pain and swelling will begin almost immediately following the bite of a poisonous snake, (except coral snake.) Observe teeth marks created.

If a snake bite occurs; 1) remain as calm as possible. (Can you imagine being calm.) Avoid unnecessary movement and avoid moving the affected arm or leg. Do not drink stimulants as it makes the blood circulate faster. 2) Tie a constricting band 2 to 4 inches above the bite between the wound and heart. The band should not be too tight and it should be loosened every 15 minutes for about 2 minutes. 3) Make incisions after sterilizing the bite area. We have bulletins for the asking on Poisonous Snakes in Texas, L-354, which give complete details. 4) Apply suction to the cuts. 5) Get medical aid immediately.

Every car should have a snakebite kit. Learn how to use it. Avoid places where snakes are common.

A very interesting bulletin has come to my desk. It is Minigardens for Vegetables, a USDA Home and Garden Bulletin, No. 163. "You'd like to be a gardener, but you live in a room, an apartment or a townhouse and you think you have no place for a garden. But if you have a window, a balcony, or a doorstep you have enough space for a minigarden."

from the first paragraph of the bulletin: This would be a good project for young people who would like to grow something. Small tomatoes can be grown in 10 inch pots. Half-bushel baskets also work well if there's enough room. This is at least a different idea of gardening.

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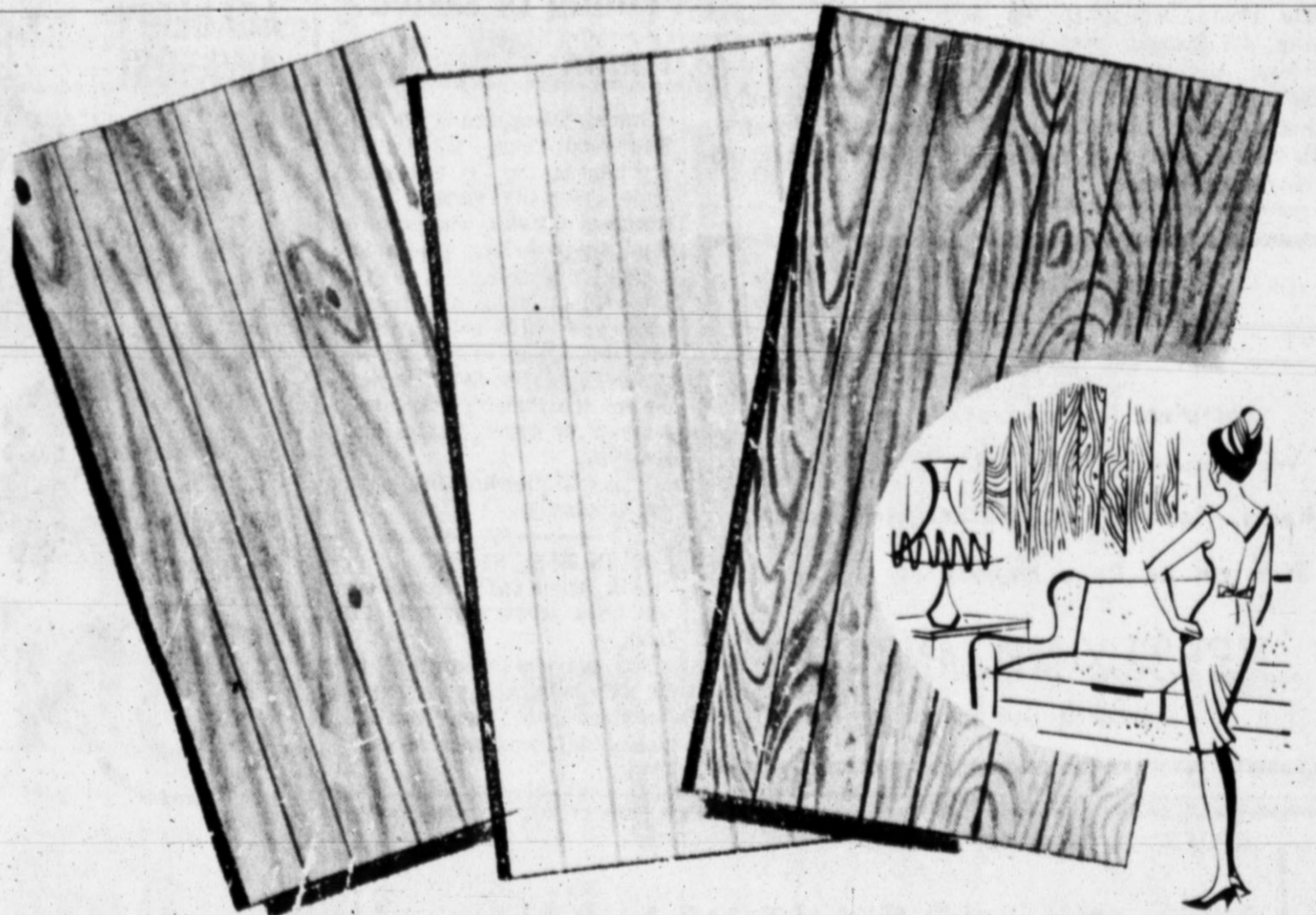

"But... The windmill produces no water and even if it did the 'KEEP OFF THE GRASS' sign would scare the thirsty away."

Well, Mr. Nunnally, we quite agree... It is a beautiful little park, and we're also happy to report that all has been rectified... or will be in the near future. We will endeavor to explain.

The windmill, as you no doubt know, was secured by the Beautification Committee of the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce and we presume the placing of the sign thereon was also the work of the committee. However, problems cropped-up concerning the proposed drinking fountain. Some real... and some imaginary.

The project, which was thought to be relatively inexpensive, apparently is going to cost around \$400. The primary reason for the heavy expense for such a little project, according to Hereford's Mayor Jim Sears, is that a drainage pipe from the fountain to the city sewer system must be installed as well as a water supply pipe. You know, it's not cricket any more to run the waste water out on the grass... and perhaps not sanitary either.

Then of course, comes the problem of parking. Parking is prohibited on the Santa Fe parking lot for any reason other than to do business with Santa Fe. However, the Santa Fe problem did not deter the ladies long. A little talking with the proper people and Santa Fe officials consented to remove the "No Parking" signs in deference to the wishes of the people of Hereford. They too, wish to allow the thirsty travelers to have a drink in "The Town Without a Toothache."

As for the "KEEP OFF THE GRASS" sign... well, no one ever pays attention to that anyway... and besides, there is a brick walkway from the parking lot to the windmill.

Now I may have over-simplified the problem and the ultimate solution... and perhaps on purpose. This is a true modern saga of the sea, the fascinating story of a woman and three men, none with deep-sea experience, who sailed a small yacht ten thousand miles to the South Seas and back. The voyage brought them harrowing challenges of

wind and storm, and the special camaraderie of adventure — not limited to the sea itself but including the dangerous entrances to South Seas atolls and harbors as well, the retracing of some of the fantastic paths of O'Brien's White Shadows in the South Seas, and duels with sharks and tides. The crew was enchanted by Polynesians as they sailed from island paradise to island paradise, from Nuku Hiva to Tahiti.

As the Alkane set out from California, the narrator demanded to be treated as a full member of the crew, with no special privileges because of her sex. She hauled sail, stood watch, and shared the suspense of mast-cracking winds. When new foods came her way, she invented recipes, which are included in the book. All the crew shared such diversions as skin-diving, catching stray fishnet floats, and manipulating the sextant.

On the islands, Janet's husband, Benzo, spent much time with the children, observing and studying them and their freedom and lack of delinquency. And in a spiritual sense the voyage was a success: All the crew found answers to some of the more compelling questions of their lives.

This book is not merely a romance of surf-lulled islands; it has practical value for all who plan or hope to go sailing. There are lists of stores (food, drugs, and other supplies), detailed menus, shipboard hints. Many can learn from the mistakes of Janet and the crew, even prepare themselves for the psychological hazards of being alone on the sea. But these are extras. Basic is the pull of the sea itself, curving against the long horizon, drawing four human beings on to dazzling adventure, self-knowledge, and fulfillment.

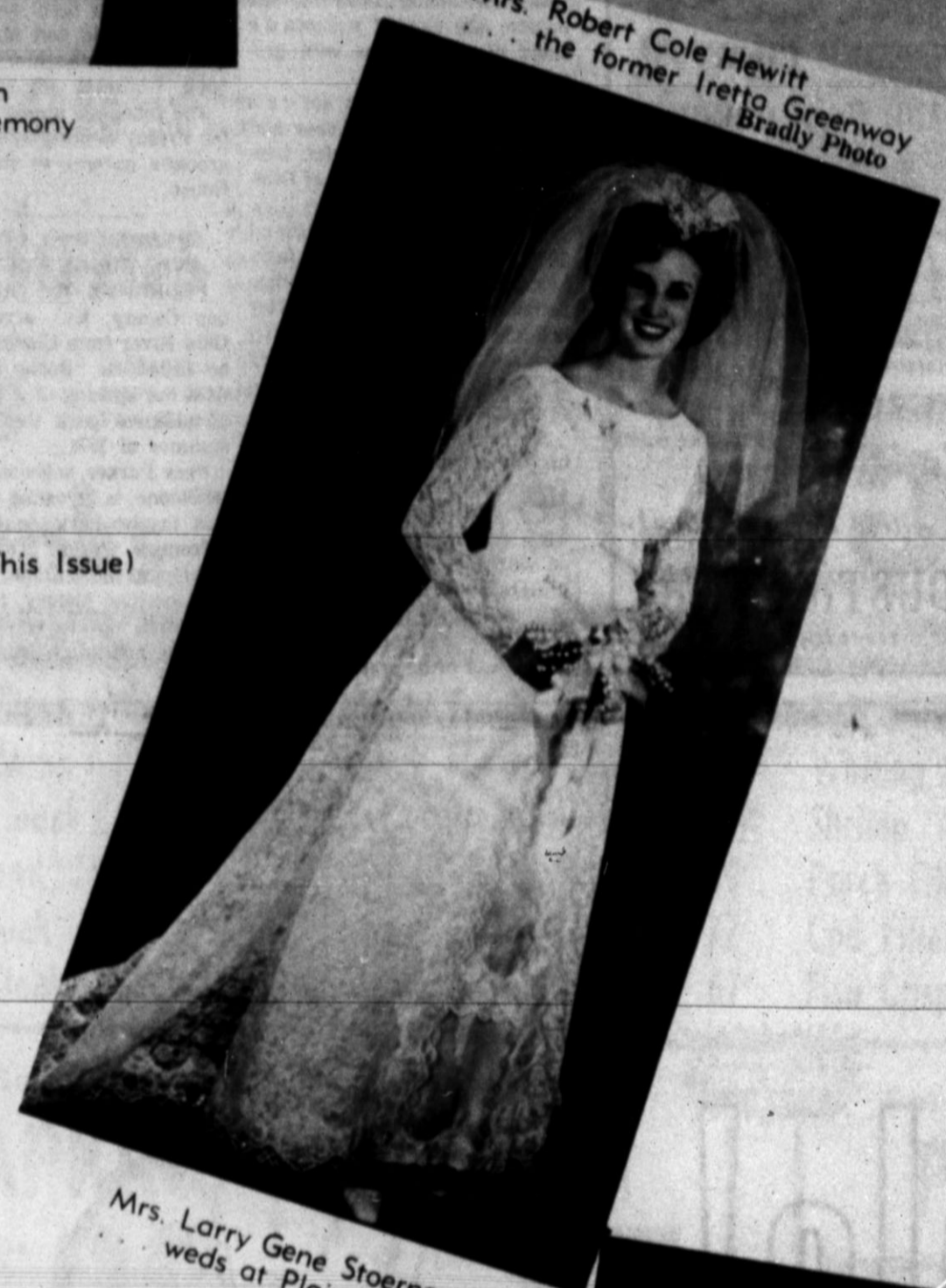

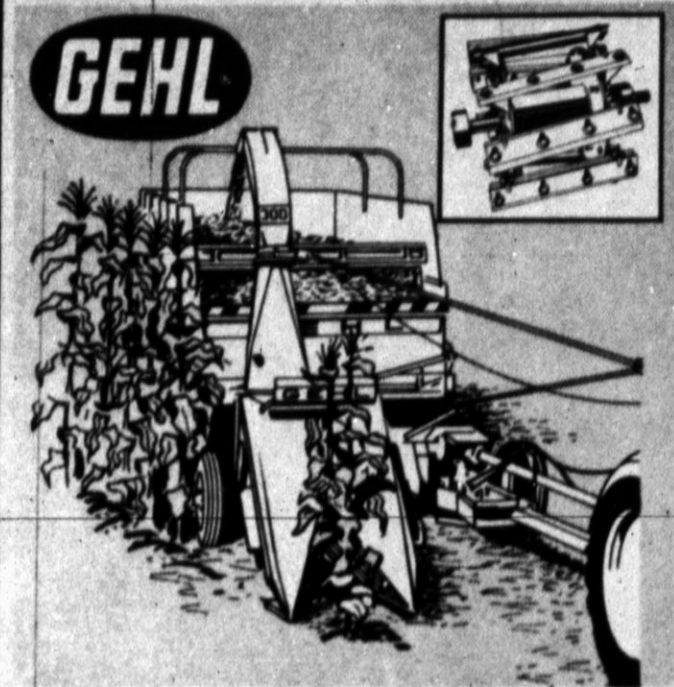

As a part of the divisions new task, the battalion has been conducting clear and sweep operations just south of the Demilitarized Zone (DMZ).

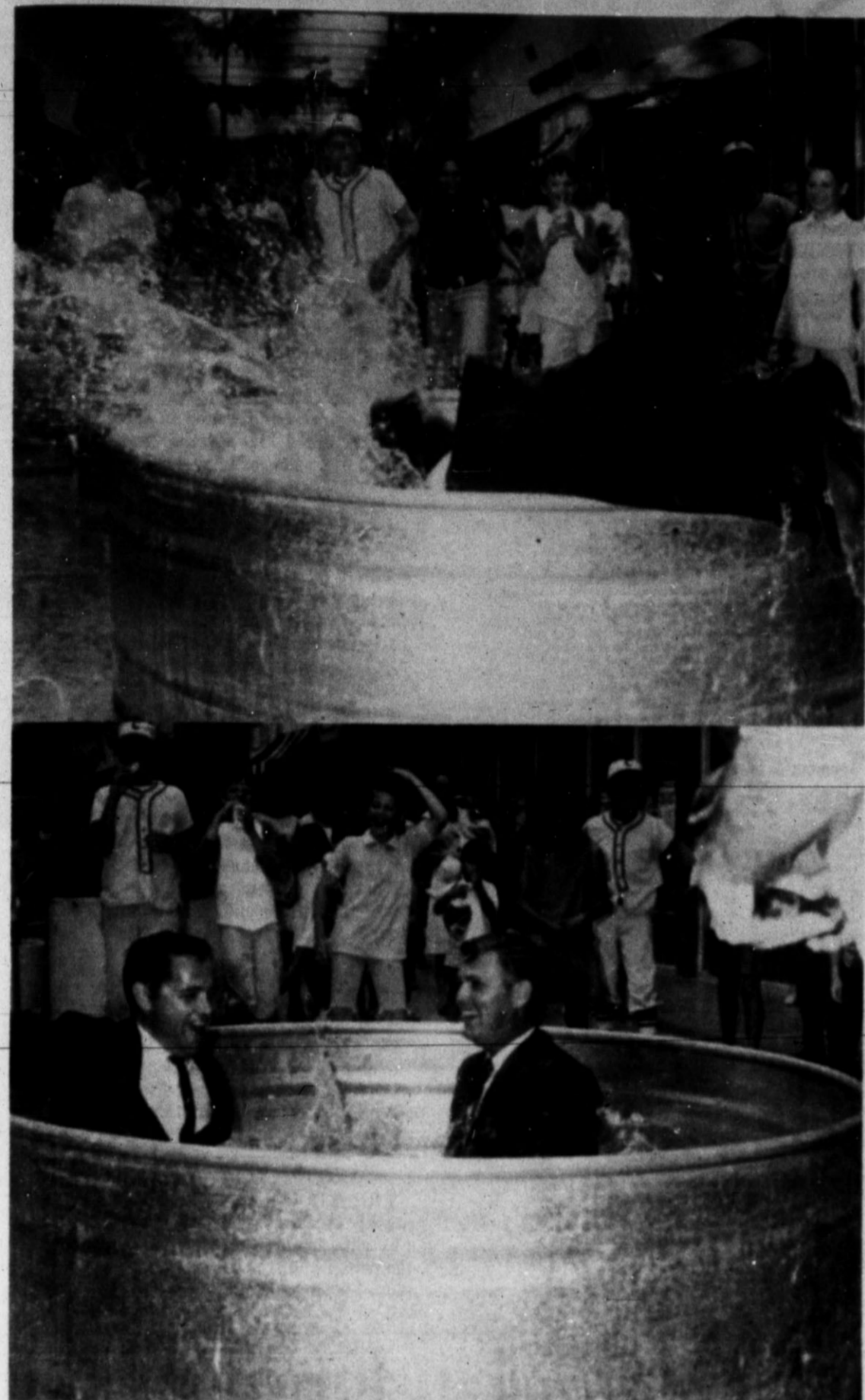

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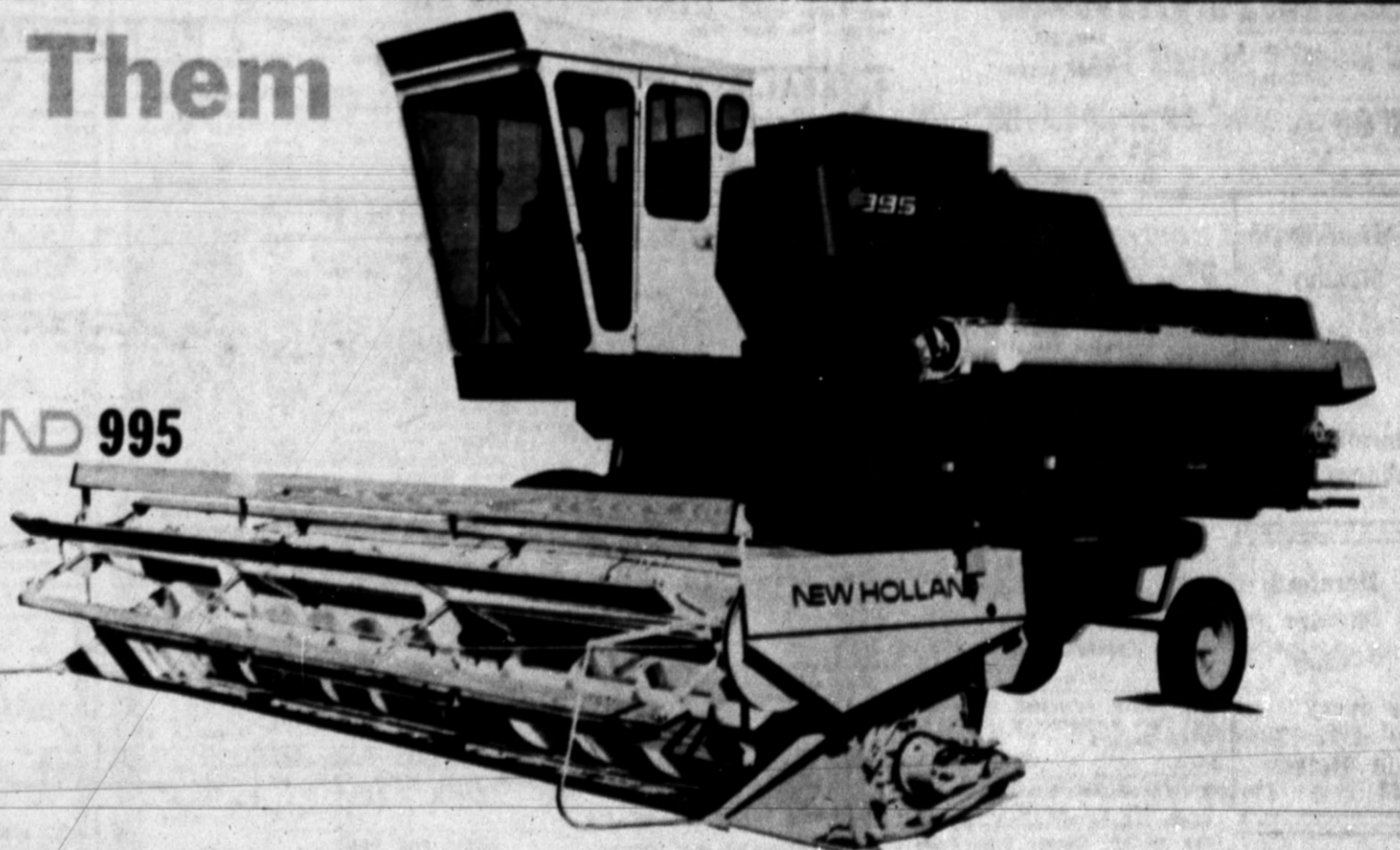

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Concerning Veterans

EDITOR'S NOTE: Veterans and their families are asking thousands of questions concerning the benefits their Government provides for them through the Veterans Administration. Below are some representative queries. Additional information may be obtained at any VA office.

Q — I have just been discharged from the Army after service in Vietnam. While I was still there a representative of the Veterans Administration told us about our veteran benefits. He also mentioned different deadlines for applying for these benefits.

A — You have 120 days after separation from service to convert your SGLI policy. Nearly 600 commercial insurance companies have been approved by the VA to handle converted SGLI policies.

Q — I am eligible for vocational rehabilitation training from the Veterans Administration because of injuries suffered in Viet-Nam. However, I understand that I will receive only \$110 a month for vocational training compared with \$130 a month for regular G. I. Bill training. Why the difference?

A — The "difference" is that in addition to the \$110 a month subsistence allowance you will receive while undergoing vocational rehabilitation training, your tuition, books, fees and other costs normally associated with your training will also be paid by the Veterans Administration.

Q — My brother received an honorable discharge from his Korean Conflict service. He later received a bad conduct discharge from his Post-Korean service. Does this bar him from all veteran benefits?

A — No. Benefit entitlement earned during your brother's honorable wartime service is undisturbed by his subsequent Post-Korean service provided there was a break between the two service periods.

the Post-Korean G. I. Bill is eight years after your separation from service.

Q — Is it true that a veteran with a service-connected disability can obtain up to \$10,000 National Service Life Insurance? I am a World War II veteran and have a 10 per cent disability.

A — To receive up to \$10,000 National Service Life Insurance coverage a veteran must have been discharged after April 24 1951, and must apply for this insurance within one year after the Veterans Administration notifies him of his service-connected disability rating.

Q — I have a G. I. loan on my home. I want to borrow money on my equity in the home for my children's college education. Is it necessary to obtain the approval of the Veterans Administration for such a loan?

A — No. However, a G. I. loan cannot be obtained for his purpose.
