## Gangsters and Court

Last week here in the District Court there were conted three men, Hunter Russel, Erwin Spicer and John Kernes and given a two year sentence each for robbery of the Wichita Valley Depot at Goree. Spicer and Russel had previously received sentences at Graham and Seymour, being convicted of burglary there, so their sentence received from the District Court here made to run concurrently. Kerns was convicted here for the first time and will serve that time. These men plead quilty before the Judge. In signed confessions Russell admitted being implicated and participating in 42 robberies in 25 West Texas towns. Kerns confessed to 41 robberies in 27 towns. Spicers confession implicated to 58 robberies in 29 towns. Spicer and Kernes are in jail in Abilene now awaiting the action of the Grand Jury there on numerous robberies committed in Taylor county. As yet these men have not been indicted in all the counties in which they committed robberies. By pleading quilty they may hope to get most of their sentences to run concurrently and satisfy the State for their crimes with sentences in the Penitentiary ranging from two to fifteen years. It will cost the State from \$10,000 to \$30,000 to try and convict these men of the crimes which they have confessed to. In acknowledging their implications in these crimes, it was with the understanding that their sentences were to run concurrently, that is serve all the time, say twenty five, two year terms in two years. One or two more burglaries means nothing to them. Without their confssions, it would be a hard matter to get the evidence necessary for a conviction and so they were in a position to acknowledge their crimes, serve the accumulated sentences out as quickly as possible, and rid themselves of the fear of ultimately being brought to trial after one or more of the sentences had been served. By being tried quitly by a Judge, juries being dispensed with in such cases the public takes but very little interest in such cases, but it is the duty of the press to present the facts to the people, and as such we say that in bringing these men to trial, the state has ridded West Texas for a shoort time of a small crime wave and has pictured for those with criminal inclinations the prospect of satisfying the state for heir crimes and the lesson that crime does not pay. The cost of the sow was about \$16 and at weaning time the pigs will be worth \$2.50, a low price considering that they are high bred stock. The sows were bought on time, so in many cases the increase will more than pay for the original cost of the sow and the upkeep Hogs, multiply more rapidly than any other farm animal and five litters in two years is not uncommon. Hogs are an ideal method of cleaning up after cattle in their feed lots. Cattle of feed usually spill a portion of their ration from the feed troughs and much of the feed that passes through the digestive tract of the animals whole. Hogs following cattle can be fattened at practically no cost at all. Hogs around a dairy can be fattened on the waste of the dairy. 




