We learn from Chas. L. Cyrus, the grain buyer, that the volume of grain which is being unloaded from wagons here at present is something worthy of mention. Mr. Cyrus tells us that he, alone, has purchased about 20,000 bushels of wheat to date this season, the average price paid being about 65 cents. All this, we are told, weighed out 60 pounds to the bushel, was of uniform grade and is in great demand for exporting. Mr. Cyrus makes all his shipments to Galveston, where they go out to all parts of the globe to feed the nations.

The above 20,000 bushels does not include what has been purchased by other buyers.

#### SANTA FE'S PLANS

##### Through Traffic To Be Brought By The Way of the Pecos Valley

Austin, Sept. 10.—The Santa Fe has not only planned to obtain a direct line to Galveston from the West by building the cut-off from Brownwood to Texico, but it will also soon be in position to abandon that part of its transcontinental division which runs by way of La Junta and Trinidad, Col., so far as its through business is concerned, and establish a new route by way of Amarillo. The new line which the Santa Fe is building between Willard, N. M., and Texico will soon be completed and will be used as a link in the new transcontinental route which is to supersede the LaJunta line. The latter route has always been very expensive to operate on account of the heavy grade. The new line is of low grade and the expense of operation will be greatly lessened. The tract has been laid from Willard to Texico and as soon as the necessary surfacing and finishing levels can be done it will be placed in operation. It connects with the Pecos & Northern Texas division of the Santa Fe at Texico and the latter connects with the Southern Kansas at Amarillo. The new route will be obtained by using these three roads, obtaining northern connection with the old main line of the Santa Fe at Wichita, Kan.

The Southern Kansas as a preliminary to the establishment of this new transcontinental line through Texas, asked the railroad commission some time ago for authority to straighten its line by building from Panhandle direct to amarillo instead of using other tracks from Washburn into Amarillo. The railroad commission refused to sanction the proposition. It is said that the Santa Fe will apply to the legislature for the necessary authority.

In this connection it should be stated that the Hereford Country has furnished its full share of these exhibits. Shipment after shipment of our peaches, apples, plums, wheat, oats, Indian corn, etc., etc., have been made, all of

which will be conspicuously displayed and labled, Hereford, Texas. It is planned to take the exhibits through Missouri, Illinois, Iowa and other northern states, which will require about two months time.

**It Can Be Done.**  
Since the BRAND editor arrived in the Panhandle four years ago, he has often heard the wild assertion that a man cannot make a living for himself and family on a quarter section of plains land, in a few instances old settlers being guilty of the impropriety. However the past two or three years, have caused such declarations to come less frequent, and before another year comes and goes, we doubt if it will ever occur again.

We have an instance called to our attention this week which is so rich in silent praise for the Panhandle that we can't refrain from telling about it for the special benefit of those who have been misled in the matter.

Seeing Christian Sailer, who owns only a quarter section of land northeast of town, hauling in his wheat and oat crop, we become anxious to ascertain just what his crop would amount to. So we proceeded to spring a few questions on him, from which we learned that from his 160-acre farm he is now selling about 1500 bushels of oats and 1100 bushels of wheat, at 35 cents and 65 cents, respectively. At a reasonable estimate, it cost Mr. Sailer \$340 to grow and harvest his crop, which, subtracted from \$1240, the total amount received, leaves a cash balance of \$900.00 on the credit side of the ledger.

After his five years residence in this country, during which time he has not only paid for his land, but built up a nice bank account, it would be a difficult undertaking to convince Mr. Sailer that one can't do well on a quarter section.

### LARGE GRAIN ELEVATOR

Structure With Storage Capacity Of 35,000 Bushels Will Be Erected at Early Date

A BRAND representative called at the large grain warehouse of L. R. Bradley, R. W. Baird and J. O. Bradenbaugh this week and found the first two named gentlemen busy storing the large volume of grain which they are buying at present.

These gentlemen authorized us to state that they will begin the erection of a large elevator as soon as they can procure the services of mechanics and arrange the usual details. They have purchased the lots located between their present warehouse and the Hereford Lumber Co., and lying along the side of the Pecos Valley right-of-way, the promise coming from Avery Turner, vice-president of the road, that he will have a siding put in for their benefit.

This is the first decided step towards the flouring mill which was mentioned in the BRAND a few weeks ago. While the mill may not follow the immediate completion of the elevator, Messrs Bradley and Baird tell us that as soon as the prospects for the next crop show up to their satisfaction, the work will be begun on a flouring mill which will in every way be commensurate with the demands of this end of the plains country. We look upon this as one of the most valuable enterprises which have yet come to Hereford. Knowing the promoters as we do, we have no doubt but that after this season the citizens of Deaf Smith and Castro Counties will feast on bread produced by the sweat of their own brows.

The storage capacity of the elevator and its adjuncts will be from 35,000 to 40,000 bushels.

should be given to the fact that the paper is yet in its infancy. It takes time and money to make a good daily paper. Commenting upon the situation the publication above referred to says:

For the period of nearly seven weeks the Daily Panhandle has made its regular appearance. We have demonstrated beyond the shadow of a doubt that we are able to print and produce a creditable daily newspaper. In fact there is not a better paper than the Daily Panhandle published in any city of the United States of the size of Amarillo. This fact taken into consideration, we believe we are entitled to more liberal patronage than we have so far received.

It is readily admitted by men who observe and know things when they see them that at this time there is not an individual enterprise which can do more for Amarillo and the surrounding country than a first class daily newspaper. There are those, of course, who can see nothing except dollars in hand, but life is too short to waste time on such cattle. Mr. Cox tells us that it is his intention to sow at least 200 acres of wheat this fall and much more of the five sections will be put in cultivation as soon as labor and money can prepare the land.

If you will lend me space in your valuable paper, I will give my views and experience with this grand and glorious plains country of ours. In the first place, I feel very grateful to the law makers of this state for so framing their laws as to permit me to file on four sections of this deep, rich soil which, by the sweat of my brow, I have developed to a point so that it is profitable to me and at the same time, no detriment to the state. I compare this country favorably with other portions of the United States where I have made farming a business. I once cultivated a farm for four years which was worth \$75.00 per acre. For the past six years, I have raised as much feed per acre here as I did on that \$75 land.

What tempted me to write this article is that I regret to see so many of the old settlers bartering away these lands for less than half their true value. I am getting to be a pretty old man. Have passed through sixty-six winters; still I may live to see our lands selling readily for \$60.00 per acre. Some may say "Just listen to that old crank", nevertheless, remember that for the next five years this country will develop more than it has in the past fifteen years; and with this increased development must necessarily come a corresponding increase in land values. I have had considerable experience in the milling business—have handled a great deal of wheat and will say that the wheat produced here is of the best quality I have ever seen and the yield fully as good.

When I first came here, a great many of the people told me this was no fruit country, but I found it only imaginary with them. I set out peach trees six years ago and have had peaches four years. I think this is one of the best fruit countries I know of. I have out between five and six thousand shade and fruit trees and have never watered one of them.

### Should Read The Law.

"We learn that the treasurer of Potter county deposits the money of the people of Potter county in one bank only. Why should he do so, that's the question?—Does that one bank do more towards furthering the interests of the people of Potter county than any other bank? We think not. Are the owners of that bank more public spirited, broader minded, more liberal and more able to take care of the public funds than any other or all other banks? We know they are not. There is a reason, however, for the county treasurer's peculiar favoritism or partiality. It may be purely personal, but there is a reason. The Daily Panhandle wants to know the reason. If it is valid all is well and good. If it is purely a matter of choice with the treasurer, it is high time that such an official is relegated to the ranks of the common privates out of official commission."—Daily Panhandle.

THE editor of the Daily Panhandle should either read the laws of our state or should remain silent on questions about which he is in doubt. The matter of placing the funds of a county in one bank or another bank is in no way left with the county treasurer, as under the late law the funds are placed with the institution

offering the highest rate of interest. So under the circumstances, the Daily Panhandle will be compelled to overlook the actions of the county treasurer and bank in question, as they are acting in good faith in the compliance with the law.
