Takes Three Suits to Determine Ownership of Some Cattle

Quite a noted case was disposed of by Judge D. B. Hill at Farwell last week, which consumed nearly the entire week. It was the case of A. A. Hogan vs. the First National Bank of Hereford, and resulted in a judgment in favor of the plaintiff Knight and Slaton of Hereford represented the plaintiff and Carl Gililland of Hereford' Mr. Truelove of Amarillo, and Mr. Bratton, of Clovis, New Mexico, represented the defendant. An appeal will be taken. Witnesses in the case were from Deaf Smith, Randail, Potter, Oldbam, Parmer, Bailey, Limb, Swisner and Hale counties, Texas, and Curry county, New Mexico, and Kansas City, Missoury.

> If the pullets are confined, the, first thing to remember is that at least once a day they should have plenty of green food, such as cabbage, green clover, lettuce, alfalfa or sprouted oats. If they have free range, at this season they can, of course, get all the green stuff they

> Experience has shown better development and more eggs are secured from pullets when their meals are varied. That is having one meal a day consist of mash and the others of mixed grains in the litter

A good mash that will bring resu'ts is as follows:

100 pounds bran. 100 pounds ground oats or mit dlings (or 50 pounds each of ground oats or middlings).

100 counds cornmeal.

50 pounds beef scraps.

25 pounds of beef scraps will be sufficient if plenty-of milk or buttermilk is being fed. To each 100 pounds of the mixture there should then be added :-

A dry mash of this kind should be kept in hoppers where the birds can get it at all hours of the day as they feel the need of it. If the materials are made into a wet mash, the birds should be fed preferably at night, just a little short of what they will clean up. A full feed of mash in the morning has a tendency to make fowls sluggish and inactive.

A good grain ration can be made of equal parts by measure of wheat, oatsand whole or cracked corn. This should be scattered through a deep litter in the morning, thereby keeping the birds busy all day.

In addition to the regular foods given, you should have shell making materials, such as grit and crushed oyster stells, before the birds all the time. If this is not enough to insure hard shelled eggs, lime water should be used in making the mash. The lime water can be secured by placing a quantity of lump-lime in a barrel or vessel, filling it with clean water and using it after the lime has slaved and the insoluble portion settled.

Just a word of warning in conclusion. If you would have winter eggs from your pullets, you must examine the birds from time to time for lice. However, if at this time a good lice powder is thoroughly sift ed down among their feathers and a dust both is handy, they are not likely to be troubled much with vermin through the winter.





Hog Cholera

Friday, County Farm Demonstrator R. E. Mann, and Dr. R. M. Harkey, veterinary surgeon, were called to the Hereford Grove Stock farm to investigate the death of some hogs. Post mortem examinations were conducted in two cases, and both were pronounced undoubted cases of cholera. As several other hogs had recently died on this farm, full disinfecting and preventive measures were prescribed and inaugurated. As soon as the serum could be obtained Mr. Mann returned to the farm to supervise the inocculation of the entire herd and, we are informed that all precautions will be taken to prevent the spread of this destructive disease.

The hog industry means too much in Childress county to allow its destruction by this contagion, and all hog raisers are warned to use the greatest precaution and watch their herds closely .-- Childress Post.



about a cotton warehouse and marketing system. Their slogan has been co-operation and education. Those familiar with the work of that organization know that its members are in hearty accord with the movement to build warehouses. They have been building warehouses for years past. But they also know that it is going to take organization and persistent energetic effort to induce the people to hold cotton in the warehouses, It can only become a reality by showing the benefits to be derived. The farmer must be convinced that the expense of housing and holding his cotton plus the interest he is

compelled to pay for money borrowed to tide him over, is not in excess of the probable increase in the price of cotton during the same period. The farmer cannot afford to speculate. He must play the safe game. His big brother in business must manifest a true spirit of co-operation; that is, he must do as he expects of the farmer. He must make some sacrifice when to make money from their operation. Then, too, he must assist in getting the lowest possible interest rate on cotton as collateral, if stored in these

It would seem that a receipt issued under this law furnishes all the safeguards necessary. The banks have approved it, hence there are no objections except such as may be raised by the grower, the ginner and the warehouseman I shall not attempt in this article to answer the objections which have been raised. I do not believe the three samples which must not exceed 51-3 ounces each, or a total of one bound, would exceed the amount taken out of the bale under the present sampling method, without taking into consideration the benefit which comes to the grower and buyer from being able to get a fair correct sample and having the cotton completely covered. Indeed, the three samples taken are not lost to the buyer. One of them must be preserved by the ginner and eventually sold for the credit of the owner and the other two samples are given to the owner, one of which he must deposit with the cotton if stored and the other to be used by him as he sees fit.

It may be admitted that some extra expense over present methods is occasioned by the better wrapping and the sampling but this should not exceed
