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### What Our Exchanges Think

SUBSISTENCE HOMESTEAD

The Texas senate got into an argument over "subsistence homesteads" yesterday. A bill sponsored by Lieutenant Governor Witt would authorize issuance of &5,000,000 of bread bonds to be used as a revolving fund to enable destitute heads of families to purchase farms. Such loans would be limited to \$1,000 at five percent.

Proponents of the plan would "take unemployed men off the city streets and relief lists and give them jobs making a living for their families from the soil."

That, as anyone will agree, is a laudable ambition, and sounds

But Senator Tom DeBerry of Bogota asked a pertinent question. "If the plan be sound," he remarked, "you must say agriculture is remunerative. Now I ask you, is it or is it not? Why did the

farm boy go to town? Then the plan is unsound." Between these extrme views lies some middle ground that might be tenable. Undoubtedly many unemployed men, given a thousand dollars to invest in land, buildings, equipment and seeds, could make a living therewith; but most of them would fail miserably because of inexperience or one of the thousand and one one risks that the farm-

er must take. The principal objection to such a plan, however, is two-fold: It would help too few people and such help would be too long delayed. The need is immediate and the needy are numerous. Five million dollars would help only 5.000 families, whereas tens of thousands must

Undoubtedy the farm holds out the promise of a bar many men. Most farmers could testify that the "bare" is taken advisedly. Even a bare living would be irrisistible lure to most jobless men of families. But what could be done for them while the "subsistence homestead" was being brought into production? It would take months to get them started, and meantine hungry mouths must

Washington has little business telling Texas how long it is good for telling Texas children to work. If anything, we ought to be more interested in our own children than Washington is. But that same principle, if pushed to its logical jumping-off place, would take a great

deal of Federal activity with it into oblivion. There is not much abuse of child labor in Texas—except in the cotton field. Even there, it is the compulsion of economic distress and not the cruelty of parents or employers which is to blame. If the little folks picked no cotton, they would eat less buscuits and sorghum Picking cotton, even at a comparatively early age, may be better than starting out in life on the dole. Much depends upon the circumstances. But constitutiontl amendments can't be considerate of circumstances.—Dallas Journal.

Statistics compiled by Federal and State labor departments, confirmed by national private agencies, including the American Federation of Labor, showed that the great army of unemployed numbered 14,000,000 last March. The consensus of estimates made by such sources up to mid-September was that about one fourth of that vast horde of disconsolate individuals had been restored to gainful employment through the operation of the National Recovery Act.

On October 9 about 3,000,000 employers of two or more persons throughout the country received a questionare from President Roosevelt wit ha message which read: "Two months ago I invited you to enter into an agreement with me to aid industrial recovery by shortening hors and increasing wage rates. The time has come to take stock. The information here requested is necessary to determine the

progress we have made.' Employers were asked for comparative figures on employment and pay-roll totals for the two pay periods ending July 15, 1933, and October 14, 1933. These results, to be available only to sworn employees of the Census Bureau and treated as strictly confidential, will disclose the actual situation. The extent to which additional efforts must be put forth and preparations for feeding and clothing and housing those unfortunates not yet absorbed into industry will then be known, and Americans must act accordingly. Despite depleted local treasuries, this terrible task confronts us and is utterly unavoidable.—NRA New.
