The farm relief section of the composite bill is admittedly an experiment, and is inteded to be used only in the present emergency. Under its provisions the Secretary of Agriculminister several plans in an effort to bring temporary relief to the farmer while a permanent program is being instituted.

The first relates to open market operations by the Federal Reserve banks; the second provides for the issuance of Treasury notes within certain defined limits; the third relates to the acceptance of silver aggregating two hundred million dollars in payment of debts owed by foreign governments; and the fourth authorizes a change in the gold content of the dollar or the remonetization of silver.

With such a program as this in operation, accomplishing three important steps in the President's program of ultimate national recovery, I have every hope that the farmer will once more assume his proper place in our economic structure, and that America will be well on its way to better times.

S. J. R. NO. 32 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGIS-LATURE OF THE STATE OF

Section 1. That Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as

to hereafter read as follows:
"Article VIII, Section 1-a: Three
Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for all State purposes; provided that this exemption shall not be applicable to that portion of the State ad valor-em taxes levied for State purposes remitted within those counties or other political subdivisions now receiving any remission of State taxes, until the expiration of such period of remission, unless before the expiration of such period the board or governing body of any one or more of such counties or political subdivisions shall have certified to the State Comptroller that the need for such remission of taxes has ceased to exist in such county or political sub-division; then this section shall become applicable to each county or political subdivision as and when it shall become within the provisions

The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, 1933, at which election all voters favoring said pro-posed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the


