Population Research Puts County In Lead

For State

Deaf Smith County virtually eads the 254 counties in the state of Texas in percentage of annual population in-crease according to a survey recently completed by the Un-iversity of Texas.

A report entitled "Popula-tion Estimates for Texas Coun-ties" prepared by the Population Research Center of the university's Department of So-ciology estimates the county registered a 7.1 percent annual population increase for the past five years.

This report placed Hereford second only to Randall County (south Amarillo and Canyon) in the annual percentage of growth for all counties in the state. Figure for that county was 7.7 percent.

Estimates compiled at the university pegged this county's for proposed water and sewer population as of April 1, 1965, at 18,866, as compared to 13,187 persons counted in the 1960 federal Cropland Signup

The estimated increase of 5, 679 in the county's population since 1960 makes the county one of only four counties in the state USDA Programs with an annual percentage of six percent, according to the





Cancer Society commented that 'It would be both foolish and cruel to arouse hopes before they can be justified—but there is good ground for cautious optimism about the prospects for the conquest of leukemia."

-RECENT research has yielded findings which suggest that viruses may have a causal role in human leukemia. If leukemia is caused by a virus, the chance is heightened of finding a prechemical treatment, or a combination of the two.

TO HELP meet the urgent demands on this research front Dr. Mims pointed out that the American Cancer Society grants more funds to leukemia and retype of cancer.

As of March 1, 1965, there were 83 grants for research related to leukemia for a total of \$2,500,831. This brings the Society's support of leukemia re-search to almot \$15,000,0000 over the last eight years.

"More needs to be done," Dr. Mims emphasized. "If leukemia is caused by a virus, we must identify it. If a test to diagnose leukemia before the disease shows symptoms, is possible, it must be discovered. Most vital of all: if a preventive vaccine or curative form of treatment is possible — we need it as quickly as it can be found."

In summing up, Dr. Mims de-clared that "Cancer Research holds out perhaps its brightest promise in investigation of leukemia. But that very research demands unremitting support financially. Just when leukemia will be conquered none of us can say. But contributions to the ACS Crusade Against Cancer here in Hereford will bring the day measurably closer.

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


A call for 31 male nurses to enter the Army and Navy in April May, June, and July arrived at the same time as the quota for physicians.

THE STATE draft director pointed out that the number of men in the state's 1-A pool was reduced from 100,000 at the end of August 1965 to 51,000 at the end of February 1966.

During the same period, he said, the number of men classified as students rose from 85, 000 to 104,000. At the end of January, there were 106,000 men classified in 2-S as students, the first material reduction in the pool since October 1964, when the number was 74,000.

"From October 1964," Colonel Schwartz said, "to January 1966, the student pool rose steadi ly from 74,000 to 106,000. Then, this pool was reduced by 2,000 in one month."



Bean Salad Has Extras

When she goes to a church a pretty safe guess that Mrs. Ira Ricketts will be asked to bring a dish of her special bean salad. Those who sample it agree that it has an .. extra something" and Mrs. Ricketts doesn't mind telling her secret.

Basically, she makes it by a recipe which is generally used, iations. First, here is the ori-

THREE-BEAN SALAD

1 No. 303 can red kidney beans (this is where one change will be made)

1 small green pepper, finely chopped 1 small onion, finely chopped

4 cup sugar 1 tsp. salt

½ tsp. black pepper cup vinegar cup salad oil

Drain liquid from all beans. Place beans in a glass bowl and mix in the pepper and onion. Combine the other ingredients and put over the bean mixture. (Another change will be made here). Mix well and refrigerate until ready to serve.

This is best if mixed a day before serving so the vegetables will be marinated. For a crisp texture, thinly sliced celery may be added. This recipe serves 10 or 12.

NOW FOR MRS, Ricketts' changes. First she uses, instead of the red kidney beans, a pint jar of pinto beans which she cans herself. They are shelled beans, mature but not dried. Or she says dried pintos may be soaked and boiled without sea soning, and substituted.

Second, she mixes the sauce to pour over the beans, and heats it to boiling instead of pouring it on cold. She has found by experience that this salad, if kept in the refrigerator, will remain crisp and good for as long as two weeks "and maybe longer; I haven't kept any longer than that."

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
