# Payments Up To 33 Cents

Encouraging news to Deaf Smith county farmers is the statement from Washington to the effect that 1935 wheat adjustments payments have been fixed at 33 cents per bushel, four cents per bushel over the 1934 minimum of 29 cents.

Deaf Smith county farmers will be allotted approximately \$429,000 in this increase, something like \$52,000 over last year's adjustment payments

This increase will represent an increase of approximately \$14,000,-000 to wheat growers of the United States, and the total in payments will reach about \$115,000,-






