## FOUR MORE **PUMPERS READ**

Walker-Perkins Company Installing Irrigation Wells On Large Tract of Land.

Four more big irrigation wells for Hereford are now about ready to convert gasoline power into refreshing showers on the Walker-Perkins tract west of town. This company has been busy with a large force of men for some weeks and have put in four wells. These wells are equipped with the standard irrigation pit pumps, the same as used in California, where they are, manufactured. The engines are of the latest and improved type of Fairbanks-Morse distillate using engines. Two wells are now running and from 1,250 to 1,600 gallons per minute are being obtained. The pits to all these wells are 70 feet deep and 6x6 feet, cased or curbed at top and bottom for 12 feet; at the top concrete is used. The company's four wells have the following specifications:

Well No. 1 .- Depth of well 160 feet; size of engines 40 H. P.; gallons per minute 1,250:

Well No. 2.- Depth of well 170 feet; size of engine 50 H. P.; number of gallons 1,600.

Well No. 3.- Depth of well 165 feet; size of engine 40 H. P.; number of gallons 1,500.

Well No. 4.-Depth of well 171 feet ; size of engine 50 H. P.; number of gallons 1,600.

All of these wells are equipped with a No. 6 Byron-Jackson pump. Mr. Walker states that all the wells will be running next week and that he would be glad to have friends and especially visitors in the city to see the wells in operation.

### Cost of Irrigation

Fletcher Rogers who has been a San Bonita, Texas, in the extreme southwestern portion of the State for the past year and is fully acquainted with the conditions there, is telling about the cost of irrigation in that impressed that he said: "I never section. The irrigation has a lar reservoir in which water is im pounded, the water coming from the Rio Grande in flood time. If necessity arises, the big pumps on the river are started and the water furnished direct to the farmers thru to look over the irrigation possibilithe ditches. The farmer pays an annual fee of \$10.00 per acre for all sorts of truck, for cotton \$6.00 per acre and for corn \$4.00 per acre. The land must be cleared of brush and leveled at a cost of \$20 per acre. The company land sells for \$150.00 per acre and the buyer must clear the land, the company putting the water to his line. Other lands not owned by the company sell for \$100 per acre. Mr. Rogers thinks Hereford land very slow in not taking hold of the irrigation proposition here, when the water can be obtained so easily and at such reasonable cost. He states that land around San Bonita without water is got worth more than \$6.00 per acra. thus making the water contract cost \$144 per acre.

"Not the least interesting sights is the generous flow of water the huge pumps are able to maintain. The newer wells are being equipped with heavier engines, for instance on the Gough place the engine is a 70 horse power Bessemer and on the Baskin-Hester place one of the same size. The Gough well discharges at the rate of 1,500 gallons per minute and looks not unlike the sluce-way to an old fashioned mill.

"There are now between twelve and fifteen wells in actual operation and with those contracted for and under way there will probably be at least 40 wells in the vicinity of Hereford by the first of the year.

"The fact that a syndicate of East Texas people is putting a league of land under water is an example of the wide-spread interes and energetic manner in which the proposition is being handled."



If we kill all the flies others will take their places pocc tempo. The mayor of Amarillo said the other day that if Amarillo should kill all their flies in one day, the next would bring a million more unless their breeding places were destroyed. Canyon has inaugurated a "fly killing campaign," prizes amounting to \$10 being offered by a lumber company. This is all right as far as it goes, but they should offer a prize to the boy who would find a clean privy or a clean stable in the town.

Scraping the City.

The Commission has set about clearing the streets of obnoxious weeds and has employed J. P. Wood to scrape the gutters and streets with a road plow or scraper. This machine takes up a lot of weeds, but there are many corners and nooks and places where the plow cannot be pulled. The work done, however, will be a long step in 'ridding the town of weeds.

The nuisances of any town are weeds and flies. Both are the direct result of pure and unadulterafed laziness; official inactivity of the c'ty authorities or the shameful negligence of the citizens. 


Precinct Conventions To Be Held.

## PUMPING PLANT IRRIGATING PLAN

Any combination of machinery used to pump water may be termed a pumping plant, but an irrigating plant means more than a hole in the ground and a machinery equipment. A successful irrigating plant must deliver large volumes of water continuously at the lowest possible cost. The whole unit must show efficiency from the bottom of the well to the engine driving the pump. The well must be properly drilled, screened and developed. The pump must be of a type suitable to conditions under which it operates. The engine must operate on cheap fuel and develop its rated power under local conditions. Why Not "Recall" the Law.

Every law must be interpreted before it can be executed; somebody must do the interpreting. This cannot be left to sheriffs and other ministerial officers; it cannot well be left to juries for they are unskilled in such matters and from might come a new interpretation with each new case and each new set of twelve. It is customary for the court to decide what the law is and leave the facts in each case to the jury. Could

anybody suggest a better mode? As for recalling the judges, let the people recall their obnoxious laws instead. They, and not the judges, make the laws, and thus they are responsible for them. Having made laws and constitutions, and now discovering that they think these are bad and they do not like them, the great reform (according to some orators) would be to recall the judges who interpret. It would be no more childish and unreasonable to break the mirror, because it reveals a smudge on one's face. Keep the mirror, for its truthfulness and usefulness; go and wash the face.

But the judge may be incompetent or mistaken, or even corrupt. Conceivably, he may be either. If he is in fault, opportunity for recalling him comes at the end of his elected or appointed term; meanwhile, every State constitution provides orderly means for removing him. - Insur-


