

Hereford man donating kidney

'Something I need to do,' says Robert Cadena

Why is Robert Cadena giving his sister a kidney?

"It's something I need to do, and want to do," Cadena said as he sat close to his younger sister, Gloria Cuellar, in the living room of her Hereford home.

Because of his decision, Mrs. Cuellar will receive her brother's kidney on Friday during surgery in Lubbock's Methodist Hospital.

When doctors began searching for a suitable person to provide a kidney for Mrs. Cuellar, they turned to her family.

Cadena was a perfect tissue and blood match to his sister.

Of the six genes that are matched, Cuellar's sister made a good candidate with three genes matching. But though she was a good choice, Cadena was better.

'Robert had all six of the same genes that they test. My sister only had three," Mrs. Cuellar said.

"I just knew it was going to be Robert," she continued. "I knew before anyone was tested. I think (it's) because we have always been close."

Cadena is next to last among the nine children in his family, while Mrs. Cuellar was the youngest daughter.

If he hadn't matched, Mrs.

Cuellar would not have been out of luck -- any of the other brothers and sisters could have been tested for the kidney transplant.

As it was, only three were tested before doctors decided on Cadena.

The 27-year-old Mrs. Cuellar

has had problems with her kidneys since she was 16 years old.

"I had kidney failure and have had to be on dialysis since August," she said, because her kidneys were only working at 8 percent capacity.

She drives herself to and from

Amarillo three times a week for the three-hour dialysis procedure.

"It is always so tiring, but I know I have to do it," she said. "I'm just so glad I will get a new kidney and not have to go for dialysis anymore."

Cadena has never been hospitalized, but he said he is looking forward to the opportunity to give his sister another chance at a long and happy life.

"I prayed about this, and accepted it," he said. "There was no question that I had to do it."

Although his wife and children are a little apprehensive, they know he is making the right decision, he said.

"I see someone so young and think it is sad that she may not be here until she grows old," he said.

"My children are afraid that something might happen to me or my one kidney. They are small and do not quite understand what I'm doing. They are just worried about

Cadena said that he is nervous about the risk of surgery. "Needles scare me the most," he said with a laugh.

He also said he has given more blood in the last month than he ever has in his life.

Cowgirl Hall of Fame directors 'victims of own success' as doors to close soon

Hereford will give up a national treasure on March 28 when the National Cowgirl Hall of Fame and Western Heritage Center closes its doors, and the entire museum contents are moved to Fort Worth.

The announcement of the move has caught the attention of local residents. "We've had great response from the publicity the media gave us," said Wenonah Barringer, office manager.

"We have had so many calls and requests for tours that I feel most everyone who really wants to see the hall will have a chance," said Barringer.

Interested citizens have just a week and a half to tour the center again, or to see it for the first time. The hall closes on March 28 and vans are scheduled to arrive the next day to load up all the exhibits, displays and memorabilia for the move to Fort

For Margaret Formby, a founder and former president of the hall, and other people here who nurtured it the past 21 years, these are bittersweet times. As reported in The New York Times, "the founders are almost victims of their own success."

Translated, that means they've made it into a great museum and research center for women of the West, but they realize it could be much, much more.

"We began to feel that we were doing a little bit of disservice to the women of the West," says Roger Eades, a former chairman of the CHOF fame board. "They have a story to tell, and we're such a small town, we were not able to get that

But that is a humble statement. The museum has been telling its story well, with great attention to honorees and to the detail of the displays. It's just that a center with a \$60,000 annual budget in a small town can't get the national attention that a national museum deserves.

The annual "Rhinestone Roundup" induction ceremonies drew some publicity around the country, and the hall's association with the debut of the Cowgirl Restaurant in New York City--and later one in Santa Fe-helped spread the word.

When the local board decided two years ago that the museum had outgrown Hereford's ability to support it, directors entertained offers from 29 cities and six amusement parks. They settled on Fort Worth.

With the wealth of the Bass and Moncrief families and the Burnett-Tandy Foundation and opportunities for more exposure, it was and is very promising.

Kit Moncrief, the new president, said recently that the board plans to construct a \$5 million, 20,000-squarefoot structure in the cultural district near Kimbell Art Museum. It will have space for 20,000-square-feet of expansion in the future. Architect David Schwarz, who designed The Ballpark in Arlington, has been hired to draw the plans.

Formby, and others, had been reluctant to move the gallery to Fort Worth for storage, since the the new facility may not be completed for three years. However, the new board recently explained it needed the collection so the design team will know exactly what they're working with and can plan the floor space for the new structure

There have been some ruffled feelings during the transition, but Formby says "those have been ironed out, and I'm very optimistic about the future of the hall.

Formby feels sad that the museum is leaving but pleased to know that the hall's yearly attendance, around 2,000, will surely grow--perhaps to 100 times that. In the cultural district of Cowtown, the yearly visits might even outpace the 274,000 mark set last year by the National Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City.

Dixie Moseley, a 1982 honoree and former trick roper and rodeo clown, says the induction event in Fort Worth last year "was nice, but it sure wasn't the same." The Hereford ceremonies "were more like a big family gathering." She recalls that honorees would stay in private homes, singing and swapping stories late into the night. "In Fort Worth, it's the big city way.'

Not all the honorees have doubts about the move. Betty Solt, a Roswell, N.M., barrel racer, and Georgia Mae Ericson, historian and board member, are pleased with the new board and its plans, according to quotes in a Houston Chronicle article.

And Moncrief, the new president, was quoted in the same story as saying some of the doubts come from "a case of seller's remorse." She said any problems have to do with growing pains. "We want this to be a top-notch

Country holds breath over GM strike talks

DAYTON, Ohio (AP)--Talks training sessions and maintenance resumed Friday between General Motors Corp. and union leaders over automaker's North American operations.

The two sides last held informal talks Wednesday.

"Our priority remains to reach an equitable agreement as soon as possible so we can resume supply to our customers," said GM spokesman Jim Hagedon. He wouldn't comment

The company and union officials met for more than 10 hours Friday before talks ended for the night. It was unknown if any progress had been made and talks were expected to resume Saturday, Vena Estridge, a trustee with United Auto Workers Production at dozens of other parts bargaining table.' plants was affected.

"It is my hope ... to reassert our authority and responsibility and get us into a pro-active posture of identifying problems and fixing them. I want it communicated ... in the strongest possible terms, my continued commitment and our commitment as a board to openness and accountability.'

Polunsky noted he had "done everything possible to solicit outside scrutiny," calling in state auditors to go over the system's books and the Texas Rangers to oversee the department's own internal affairs investigation of the VitaPro scandal.

"Hopefully we'll close some of the loopholes that had been open in the past," board member John Franz

As an example of the get-tough financial policy, Polunsky bristled at discretionary spending of \$63 million in department money by state judges who refused to discuss the expenditures in open meetings.

"I have some problems with the fact we are granting funds to be used by public agencies and there is this black hole where what is done is in secret," Polunsky said.

State District Judge Larry Gist of Beaumont, who heads the Judicial Advisory Committee, noted the judicial branch specifically had been exempted from the Open Meetings Act. He insisted, however, there was no wrongdoing by judges.

"I just don't want you to think we'll be like bandits in the night,' Gist said. "That won't happen."

In the telephone plan, a phone system would have been installed at state jails and substance abuse treatment facilities for use by inmates. The state would have collected revenue from each call.

Dole changes strategy, seeks agreement on key legislation

WASHINGTON (AP)--In a change of strategy, Sen. Bob Dole is ignoring Republican rival Pat Buchanan and turning his attention to reaching bipartisan agreements on key legislation.

If that means reaching out to President Clinton then so be it, says the Senate majority leader.

"I like campaigning but I'm anxious to get back to work. ... I think it's in our interest to get something done. ... If we don't accomplish anything, I think it hurts us both," the GOP presidential front-runner told reporters Friday.

Dole was heading out on the campaign trail again today, with stops in Wisconsin and Illinois, in advance of Tuesday's big four Midwestern primaries.

But, with the nomination all but locked up and Buchanan his only

remaining major rival, Dole has come close to pronouncing the race a done

Buchanan continues to taunt Dole and says he will stay in the race until the GOP convention in San Diego in August, so the Dole campaign has decided to ignore him.

"Our focus is on Clinton now, not on Buchanan. He is increasingly becoming an afterthought in the Republican process," said a top Dole aide, who spoke on the condition of anonymity.

Polls show Dole far ahead of Buchanan in the four states holding primaries on Tuesday--Michigan, Ohio, Illinois and Wisconsin--as well as in California, whose primary is March 26.

Dole rearranged his schedule to put him in Washington most of next week. With the exception of spending a few days in California, his primary campaign travel is almost at an end.

One move underscoring the change of strategy: Dole's efforts to breathe new life into a proposal to give the president power to veto specific items in spending measures, a power sought by both Clinton and congressional Republicans but mired in partisan

Dole also reached out on Friday to resolve remaining differences on a balanced budget plan. "This is not a game," he said during a tour of a Honda auto plant in East Liberty,

Ohio. "We're prepared to do it now, even though it's an election cycle. A lot of time will be left until November as far as politics is concerned."

While acknowledging that appearing to reach out to Clinton could pose certain political risks for him, Dole set the end of April as a loose goal for seeing if Republicans and Democrats could work together.

After that, he told reporters aboard his campaign plane, "It's going to get tougher and tougher."

The line-item veto, part of House Republicans' "Contract With America" agenda, was approved in differing forms by both houses of Congress but has been stalled for months in a conference committee created to write a final version.

let's have a slow, soaking one that will last over four or five days." Forecasters have a theory for the current arid condition: Too few sunspots and a troublemaking Pacific

current off South America. The sunspot phenomenon--which occurs every 22 years--and the "La Nina" current could combine to create a drought rivaling the Dust Bowl in the 1930s and the catastroph-

ic three-year dry spell of the '50s. "There is a proven correlation between the sunspot cycle and dryness in the Central Plains area," said Patrick Eynon, a meteorologist with WeatherData, a private forecasting service based in Wichita, Kan. "And we have found that the

affects our weather patterns here in North America." Sunspots change their polarity every 11 years, a phenomenon known as the "Hale Cycle." The end of the complete cycle every 22 years seems to bring dry weather, Eynon said.

Scientists can't explain it, but some say the change might affect the way sunlight heats the Earth. The La Nina cycle is the opposite

of its sibling, El Nino, which brings wet weather. La Nina causes high-pressure systems that weaken storms or chase them away from the central United States, Eynon said.

That means the drought is being felt from Texas to Nebraska, he said Farmers are especially worried.

"The land is prepared, but we certainly don't have enough moisture right now to get it up and going," Chandler said. "It is getting critical to where they can't wait for a rain. They almost need to go ahead and dry-plant and hope for rain."

The drought also is shrinking area lakes, which are at 70 percent to 80 percent of normal levels, according

The National Cowgirl Hall of Fame was created by Deaf Smith County chamber of Commerce in 1975. During planning sessions for the first all-girl rodeo here, the chamber board asked if there was a national cowgirl hall. Inquiries turned up negative, so three women were inducted into the hall at

the rodeo. After that, a board of directors was formed, bylaws written, and a non-profit corporation founded. Mrs. Formby came on the board as a director the next year and has been the driving force behind the center.

Study shows business degree requirements falling

NEW YORK (AP) - The personnel needs of business and the ability or willingness of colleges to fill them is often a no-man's land of cultural warfare. Two different cultures. Two strongly held views.

But are their interests more alike than contrary? Maybe.

The National Association of

Scholars is set to release Tuesday a study showing a vast deterioration in degree requirements at the nation's top colleges, including a wholesale bandonment of English composition. The NAS study of broad, general

education requirements traces a steady decline since 1914 in core skills necessary in a competitive steady decline since 1914 in core marketplace. Educators often respond curricula requirements, with fewer that it is their job to teach life skills mandatory courses and prerequisites,

and less math, science and foreign

The NAS, an association of administrators, professors and graduate students, is alarmed that the deterioration represents a threat not just to the business world but to the entire leadership capability of America.

The danger for America is 'especially severe, absent a recovery of responsibility among the institu-tions examined," said Stephen H. Balch, NAS president. It is within these walls, he said, that leaders are nurtured.

In business personnel departments, meanwhile, companies say they discount academic performance, school reputation and teacher recommendations. This was verified last year in a survey released by the Census Bureau.

At the top of the Census Bureau list of desired qualities were attitude, communications skills and work experience. Schools can't do much about experience, and maybe little about attitudes, but they can teach communications.

But do they? Even before the NAS study, Professor E.D. Hirsch wrote "Cultural Literacy: What Every American Needs to Know." A bestseller a few years ago, it sent a message that people can't communi-cate if they don't share basic knowledge.

Hirsch contends that three decades of de-emphasizing content in schools leaves students unaware of facts needed to understand the world and

"Where is Oslo?" for example. Basic

This sounds like the very thing business is complaining about. It sounds like the very same thing the scholars are complaining about. Both seem to be increasingly upset with the quality of education and the product it produces

The NAS study is a devastating commentary. It studied the structure, content and rigor of requirements for a Bachelor of Arts degree at 50 highly regarded colleges for the years 1913, 1939, 1964 and 1993. And was shocked.

It found that just before World War I some 98 percent of the 50 schools required English composition, administrated by their English departments. The requirement was down to 86 percent by 1964, and to 36 percent in 1993.

Get braced for more.

Rhetoric, the skill of using words effectively in speech and writing, was a distinct general education requirement in one-third of all schools in

communicate with other people. 1914. By 1993, these requirements had entirely disappeared.

Could this explain why communications skills are so eagerly sought by companies? Perhaps it's their rarity, or at least the teaching of them, in and era sometimes referred to as the age of communications.

It is also a world of science and technology - of computers, and research and medical marvels. It is the space age too, which demands calculations of thrust and distance and weight to near-infinite precision.

In 1914, traditional mathematics was required by 82 percent of schools. It eroded to 12 percent by 1993. Physical and biological science requirements dropped from 90 percent in 1914 to about one-third in 1993.

Maybe the scholars and business are more alike in their thinking than is quickly evident.

Perhaps the erosion documented by the NAS also identifies some of the problems faced by business in finding good employees and future leaders? The evidence seems to say

Oldest astronaut getting set for sixth trip aboard shuttle

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) -It might seem remarkable that a man nearly old enough to collect Social Security would toil away in a profession that demands 12-hour days and a willingness to lay down one's

Remarkable for most people, that is. Certainly not remarkable for Story Musgrave.

Of all the obstacles he might face, age seems among the least formidable for the 60-year-old dean of NASA's astronaut corps.

Assigned in January for a record sixth space shuttle flight, he'll be 61 the oldest space traveler ever - when Columbia blasts off late this year on a 16-day voyage.

So why does he continue to defy the years despite the significant demands and dangers of being an astronaut? How does he do it?

Musgrave pauses a moment to formulate his response, rubbing the top of his bald head with the palm of his hand. He leans forward in his chair and speaks carefully, hoping his words will resonate for others his age.

"I do believe that if you've got reasons to be young and you've got reasons to live, then you're going to be young and you're going to live,"

"It is my belief that if you have very strong reasons for living, that is going to get into the physiology and the biochemistry. If the organism feels and senses, 'I've got a calling here,' it's going to live up to it."

In Musgrave's case, the theory appears to have worked. He claims his mind is sharper than ever and he can curl 150 pounds with one arm. NASA has told him not to expect a seventh shuttle flight, but Musgrave says he could handle several more missions.

Flying in space, he explains, requires a different balance of physical and mental skills than, say, boxing or baseball, arenas where fellow Texans George Foreman and Nolan Ryan have pushed traditionally

accepted limits of age and achievement by performing well in their mid-40s

Where athletes rely largely on their bodies, space voyagers benefit more from mental dexterity and the knowledge that can only come with experience, he says.

Believe it or not I think I'm about peaked right where I am now," he says. "There is absolutely no question in my mind that in my 60s will do a much better job than I did at 50 because I've been in space a few

Because the Russians prefer younger cosmonauts and NASA astronauts have rarely flown more than three or four times, the list of older space travelers is brief. The current record is held by shuttle astronaut Vance Brand, who flew in

1990 at age 59. Shuttle commander Kenneth Bowersox, who as pilot of shuttle Endeavour watched while Musgrave and three other spacewalkers repaired the Hubble Space Telescope in 1993, said Musgrave's legacy will be his devotion to a career that has consumed half his life.

'I think he has stuck with this program because he loves it and because he believes in what we're doing," Bowersox said.

"He probably loves this job more than anybody in the (astronaut) corps," said Milt Heflin, who served as lead flight director during the Hubble mission. "He loves it from a philosophical standpoint. ... It's a 100 times."

Musgrave, who lives in Houston was part of NASA's 11-man astronaut class in 1967, two years before Neil Armstrong set foot on the

He worked for 16 years on the ground, helping to design Skylab and parts of the fledgling space shuttle, including the suits that astronauts now wear during spacewalks.

He finally made it into orbit as part of Challenger's 1983 maiden voyage. It was during that flight that Musgrave and astronaut Don Peterson conducted the first shuttle spacewalk. He flew again in 1985, 1989 and 1991 before he was picked for the mission he likely

will be remembered for - the Hubble repair flight.

Musgrave led a team of four spacewalkers who accomplished the most complex and delicate feat ever attempted in orbit while correcting and improving the \$1.5 billion telescope's blurred vision.

At 58, Musgrave conducted three of a record five spacewalks during the flight, and he made it look easy.

'It was an amazing thing to watch,"

The rejuvenated Hubble has yielded new clues to the age and origin of the universe. For NASA, the high-flying repair yielded a boost in public confidence that helped the agency preserve funding for its beleaguered space station program.

Musgrave is hopeful that Hubble might eventually help humans find their place in the universe.

"It's the bridge. It is tending to bridge the gaps between cosmology and philosophy, astronomy and theology," he says. "Not that we can do that yet, but it's kind of rubbing on that. You're kind of seeing where the bridges might be.

Because of that kind of reward, Musgrave says, he has been able to accept the significant possibility roughly one chance in 100 - of death with each launch.

"I accept the risk. I accept it intellectually, knowing exactly what it is, and I face up to it and I accept it," he says. "I don't like it, but I will accept it and I would accept it to go

He also accepts that flight No. 6 will be his last. That passage, however, but considers Lexington, Ky., home, doesn't necessarily mean retirement for the surgeon, mathematician, computer analyst, poet and philosopher.

He'll probably remain with NASA, "back in the trenches" as he likes to say. He admits the transition will be difficult, but it appears he will handle it with the same ballet-like grace he demonstrated during the Hubble

'In putting it down I will know ... that it really was my calling, that I was dedicated to it, that I transcended all other things concerning it in trying to achieve perfection," he says. "I will know that I did that."

AUSTIN (AP) - The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission is not immune to a lawsuit filed by a company forced into bankruptcy when the state ended its auto emissions testing program, a federal

judge ruled Friday.



If you're one of those people who never got around to touring the National Cowgirl Hall of Fame, you really ought to make that visit before it closes March 28. A story in today's paper details the events which led to the move and outlines prospects for the new home in Fort Worth.

Margaret Formby, a former president and the driving force behind the Hall, explained this week that the building is included in the transfer to the new board in Fort Worth. This was a disappointment to me, because I envisioned the building being kept as a historical site and being used for some worthwhile purpose.

Before the recent primary day, I heard someone say the Republican race was one of the dirtiest campaigns on record.

Not even close! Jim Hudson, Perryton publisher, recently wrote a column which explained that earlier in our nation's history, no subject, no charge or no insult was off limits.

Hudson gave some examples. For instance, Federalist John Adams was running against Democratic Republican candidate Thomas Jefferson in 1796. There was no incumbent President because George Washington had decided not to seek another term.

This campaign started off with the Federalists distributing a pamphlet that charged Jefferson with being a dangerous radical. They also said he cheated his creditors and was cowardly when facing British troops during the Revolutionary War.

Not to be outdone, the Jefferson supporters fought back. They started

King George III of England to start a new American monarchy with Adams as King.

In the final days of the campaign, it looked as if Jefferson might win. Adams supporters pulled out the final stops and started a rumor that Jefferson had just died. Communications were slow in those days. Adams went on to be the second president, winning with a narrow 71 to 68 electoral college vote.

In a race for Congress in 1828, John Randolph, a powerful member of the House said this about his opponent: "He is a man of splendid abilities, but utterly corrupt. Like a rotten mackerel by moon light, he shines and stinks.

In the Presidential campaign of 1884, Grover Cleveland was accused of fathering a child out of wedlock. His opponents would organize hecklers to populate crowds at his campaign rallies. The hecklers would shout, "Ma, Ma, where's my Pa?"

Eventually, the Cleveland supporters would shout back, "Gone to Washington!"

Mud-sling campaigns have not been confined to this country, continues Hudson. In 19th century England, John Montague was running for Parliament. In a campaign debate he predicted that his opponent, John Wilkes, "would either die on the gallows or of a loathsome disease."

Wilkes quickly shot back, "That depends, my lord, on whether I embrace your politics or your mistress!

The tradition of the political putdown is even older than American politics. In ancient Greece, the philosopher Aristophanes was asked what he thought of a young man seeking political office.

He replied, "He has all the characteristics of a popular politician--a horrible voice, bad breeding and a vulgar manner.'

don't vote because advance polls or exit interviews publicized before the closing of voting make them believe their candidate has no chance, so why bother voting at all?

I see no validity to polls at all -if you doubt me, poll 100 people five times with the same basic questions worded five different ways and you'll

have five different sets of results. I think many times people lie to pollsters to throw off their results. Other times I think the pollsters

themselves skew the results by limiting who they poll -- you know, skipping ugly, elderly men in favor of shapely young women, or whatever.

3. To combat apathy at the polls, we need to have locally contested races -- and I don't mean general election races only, although that is a good place to start.

I think every position up for election -- from president on down -should have more than one candidate.

I would encourage local residents of both parties to consider running for elective office and would encourage the county chairmen of both parties to seek out men and women who could represent the interests of the local party and serve the community through a public office.

I don't mean there should be on the ballots "token" candidates thrown in to appease special-interest groups, or people picked by the party who have such radical ideas or obvious biases that nobody would vote for them.

I mean viable, qualified candidates who could do the job if elected and would want to serve if nominated.

Just because someone at the local (or county, or state, or district) level is doing a good job doesn't mean that person should not be challenged by someone else who could do just as good a job.

Contested races are a reminder to elected officials that they are employees of the public and not gods lording their power over the public.

(By the way, I think the same is true for the school board, city commission and hospital board, all of which have elections in May and which are, or will be, holding filing for candidates.)

I think the voters will continue to be cheated out of a true voice in our democratic process unless we do something to level the playing field for all of us. Otherwise, voter turnouts will continue to be low and interest in the process nonexistent.

Study shows death increases risks of suffering heart attack

By DANIEL Q. HANEY **AP Science Writer** SAN FRANCISCO (AP)

Heartache can be a heart stopper. A study finds that the death of a loved one is a powerful trigger of heart attacks.

Researchers discovered that the risk of suffering a heart attack is 14 times higher than usual on the day following the death of a "significant person" - a parent, child, grandparent or other close relative or friend.

"Potentially there are other life events stressful enough to cause heart attacks, but the death of a significant person is one that will universally cause extreme distress," said Dr. Murray A. Mittleman of Deaconess Hospital in Boston.

The search for the triggers of heart attacks has become a hot subject of research. It was pioneered by Dr. James E. Muller, a member of the Deaconess team, who found that simply climbing out of bed in the morning sharply increases the risk of an attack.

In recent years, these and other researchers have identified several emotional and physical events that can touch off heart attacks in people who already have underlying heart disease. They include bursts of anger, physical exertion, sex, even earthquakes.

findings Thursday at a cardiovascular epidemiology conference sponsored by the American Heart Association. The researchers interviewed 1,774

Mittleman outlined the latest

heart attack patients shortly after their heart attacks. Among other things, they were asked about the number of deaths of close relatives and friends

over the previous six months. For the entire group, there was an average of less than one death a day over the six months - six-tenths of a death daily, to be exact. However, it turned out that nine of the patients had experienced deaths of loved ones on the day before their heart attacks about 14 times more than would be expected.

Nine more people suffered heart attacks on the second and third days after the deaths. Assuming all 18 were triggered by the deaths, this means that about 1 percent of all the heart attacks studied were touched off by other people's deaths.

Considering that 1.5 million Americans suffer heart attacks annually, other people's deaths could trigger more than 10,000 heart attacks each year.

"Everyone has heard anecdotes of things like this. This suggests that the death of a significant other increases your risk of a heart attack," said Dr. Aaron R. Folsom of the University of Minnesota.

Mittleman said he hopes future research will sort out ways to lower the risk to the newly bereaved, such as providing better social support or giving beta blockers, drugs that blunt the effect of hormones released

during stress. For now, he said, the biggest





When Maceo Baston raised his arms to signal for a timeout, college basketball fans immediately thought of Chris Webber.

Baston was called for a technical foul in the closing seconds for calling a timeout his team didn't have Friday night - just like Webber did in the 1993 NCAA championship game - as Michigan was eliminated from the NCAA tournament with an 80-76 loss to Texas.

Brandy Perryman hit two free throws with 3.2 seconds left to seal the victory for the Longhorns, right after Michigan's Louis Bullock drove for a layup to bring the Wolverines to a 78-76 deficit.

But Baston then signaled for a timeout, and the Wolverines were called for a technical foul. Bullock tried to stop Baston from calling the timeout, grabbing his arms. Baston, realizing his gaffe, tried to wave to the official that he really didn't want the timeout, but it was too late.

Michigan coach Steve Fisher dismissed Baston's mistake.

"The timeout didn't have anything to do with the game. Texas just beat us, they played a little bit better than we did," Fisher said. "If you have that as your story line, it should be a sidebar in the last couple of para-

graphs.
"You could see the expression on the kids' faces when Maceo took the timeout," Fisher said. "In the heat of battle, things happen. He had a terrific, terrific game and he wanted

it to go on. We all did." The 10th-seeded Longhorns (21-9) will meet No. 2 seed Wake Forest in 3-3. Sunday's second round at the Bradley Center. The Demon Deacons, playing for 14 minutes without ailing center Tim Duncan, still beat Northeast Louisiana 62-50 in the opening round.



For over 30 years, Poison preventing poisonings among children under 6 years of age, but accidental poisonings can happen to anyone, according to the Poison Prevention Week Council.

Chamberlain said that even the most observant parent can be distracted, and a child can quickly find a poisonous substance. Adults must make sure that household chemicals and drugs are stored away from children at all times.

Safety packaging on oral prescription drugs has reduced the number of accidental ingestion fatalities. Also, deaths due to household chemical products have

"Poisonings can also happen to older people who cannot read labels or who fail to follow instructions," Chamberlain said.

The best way to prevent accidental poisoning is to survey the home for dangerous chemicals, and be sure that all medicines and household cleaners are stored out of reach of children.

Chamberlain urged people to contact their pharmacist if they have a question about medications/or other

"We're the health care professionals who are trained to be experts in this area," he said. "We're always anxious to prevent a tragedy.'

It is critically important that a professional be notified as soon as possible in the event of poisoning. The National Poison Control Center operates a toll free hotline 24 hours a day, every day of the year, and should be contacted at 1-800-764-

This number should be posted beside every telephone along with 911 and other emergency numbers.

Is your diet complex or does it contain complex carbohydrates?

Eating enough grain products such as breads, cereals, pasta and rice every day can add protein, carbohydrates, vitamins and minerals to your

When you look at the USDA Food Guide Pyramid, the three food groups that have complex carbohydrates are breads, cereals, pasta and whole grain; vegetables; and fruits.

Choosing a diet with plenty of grain products is encouraged by the Dietary Guidelines for Americans, just revised by the Department of Agriculture and the Department of Health and Human Services. The guidelines recommend that Americans eat at least six servings of grain products, such as breads, cereals, pasta and rice, with an emphasis on whole grains.

Whole grains are natural sources of complex carbohydrates, dietary fiber, and other food components linked to good health. These foods are generally low in fats, and by choosing the suggested amounts, you are likely to increase carbohydrates and decrease the fats as well as calories

Dietary fiber is found in wholegrain breads and cereals, dry beans and peas, vegetables and fruits. Eating foods with dietary fiber is important for proper bowel function and can reduce the symptoms of chronic constipation, diverticular disease and hemorrhoids. It may have benefits in prevention and treatment of chronic diseases such as cancer of

the colon, diabetes and coronary artery disease.

Do most people eat enough fiber

In a recent USDA nationwide survey of consumer knowledge and attitudes about diet and health, eight to 10 thought it was important to eat foods with adequate fiber. Five of 10 thought they were getting enough fiber, perhaps because they had been trying to increase fiber and had now achieved their goal.

However, recent food consumption studies show both men and women get about half the amount of fiber recommended by some nutrition experts (women get about 11 grams and men about 15 grams per day.)



CHESS OR CALVIN BALL

n the game of business the customer is king. In the game of chess the objective is to capture your opponent's king. In both games, you lose when your competitor captures your king.
You can also compare the game of business to chess in

other ways. Players have the same opportunity to move and find a position of strength. They can also plan their strategy far into the future. In addition, if you make a stupid move it's likely that your opponent will take advantage of it.

Unfortunately, the similarity ends there. The real-life game of business is more likely the game of Calvin Ball. Bill Watterson, the creator of the Calvin and Hobbes cartoon strip, conceived the game of Calvin Ball for Calvin and his imaginary tiger pal Hobbes. The only rules are: 1) There are no rules, and

2) You can't play the same way twice.

Calvin chess

Maybe we should call the new game of business Calvin Chess. Opportunities still exist to capture "King Customer" and good strategies can still pay off. However, in Calvin Chess the pieces no longer have fixed moves and if you don't move quickly your opponent may make there of four moves while you're thinking. In Calvin Chess you not only have to manage resources and strategies, but you also have to manage velocity.

The old business rules no longer apply. The best practices of today become the mediocre models of tomorrow. Wal-Mart president and CEO, David Glass, summed it up in a recent speech to the National Retail Federation. He said, "All concepts of doing business are changing," Indeed they are.

to the National Retail Federation. He said, "All concepts of doing business are changing." Indeed they are.

How can small businesses survive? How do you compete in a mega-competitor world? How do you overcome economies of scale, billion dollar buying power and marketplace momentum?

It may not be as difficult as you thing. It its not impossible as some anti-big business experts would lead you to believe. Actually, smaller businesses have some very strategic advantages. For example, no big company can be closer to their customers, no large firm can adapt strategy as quickly no mega chain can change firm can adapt strategy as quickly, no mega chain can change operational tactics daily and intelligence is not related to size.

Here are some thoughts for beating your competitors in the new game of Calvin Chess. Remember, you're in charge and you can

change the rules.

Ignore conventional business practice. Become ruthless and make changes. Don't accept "we've always done it that way" as an answer for anything. Reinvent, raise your aim, get out of your rut and push the envelope. You may have to work harder, but keep your focus


Turner said that three sprinklers run simultaneously three times in a 24-hour period for three to six minutes at a time.

Turner can also run sprinklers by hand when the need arises.

"We don't want to saturate the ground or make it muddy," he said. We just want to keep it moist and prevent dust from stirring up. That is why we may run a set three times within 24 hours."

According to Turner, the Texas Cattle Feeders suggest using 1/2 - 3/4 gallons of water per square yard. That is what Beef Tech is shooting for.



WTA&M nursing students to conduct farm research

The West Texas A&M University Division of Nursing faculty members and graduate students are conducting research in four Panhandle counties

to create greater awareness about farm health.

The WTAMU nursing group will conduct interviews with 650 far women to determine their level of awareness and concern about a variety of health and injury risks. Telephone surveys of farm/ranch households in Deaf Smith County will begin March 25.

The telephone surveys will include questions about womens' health issues, family farm operations and family injuries within the last 12 months. Lana Starke, coordinator of farm studies and instructor of nursing, estimates the phone survey will last between 30 and 45 minutes. Calls will be made on Saturdays and weeknights. "We will be talking to women because they have a greater awareness of health matters and are in charge of their family's health," Skarke said. "We want to encourage those who receive a phone call at a time that is inconvenient to reschedule.

Skarke expects the group will find more injuries occur than are reported. After completing the surveys, the Division of Nursing plans to conduct

small group interviews.

Finally, the WTAMU faculty members hope to organize a coalition of women in each county that will meet regularly to distribute educational information, promote behavior changes and encourage healthy practices. WTAMU faculty members participating in the project also hope the research will increase opportunities for WTAMU nursing students to

work in rural areas while gaining hands-on experience. The WTAMU study was prompted by a national study that found farmers and farm workers account for 14 percent of work-related deaths while representing less than 2 percent of the U.S. population and work force, Agriculture is ranked one of the three most dangerous occupations in the United States, according to a 1989 study by the National Coalition for Agriculture Safety and Health.

The Division of Nursing will also conduct studies in Gray, Carson and Swisher counties. The Southwest Center for Agricultural Health, Injury Prevention and Education (SW Center) is sponsoring the project along with WTAMU. The SW Center is one of seven Centers established by the National Institute of Occupational Safety and Health. The SW Center serves Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Texas.

AP Newsfeatures Writer SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) - In these tawny hills high above city traffic, the road comes to a dusty end, marked by hexagonal caution signs that say, "Worm Crossing."

The worms don't really cross the road. Why would they want to?

Probably no worms on the planet have such an easy life as the 75 million earthworms that reside here at Canyon Recycling, which produces a material to improve the soil of gardens and lawns, like fertilizer. Actually, the worms do the

The worms are fed the leftovers of chewed-up branches and other green waste that would otherwise clog

landfills and create odors. With the help from the microbes that inhabit their digestive tract, the worms defecate what are called worm castings. This worm manure makes excellent soil or soil additives, holding moisture better, making nutrients readily available for plants.

The science is not new. Vermiconversion, or using earthworms to convert waste into soil additives, has been done on a relatively small scale for some time.

"But nobody's done it on a large commercial scale," says John Beerman, the general manager of the operation.

The soil additive is marketed in the form of mulch or compost or vermicompost, either in bulk or in bags. A 55-pound package sells for

Canyon Recycling, which was started in January 1994, now handles 100 to 125 tons of green waste a day. "The worm that we use is Eisenia

foetida, which is the Midwestern redworm or the red wiggler,"
Beerman says. "They're a very active
worm, very prolific, have a great
appetite and live up to 10 years, which is quite amazing."

The more you feed them, the faster

they grow. Canyon's 75 million worms are out in the 20 windrows, each 20 feet wide and 250 feet long, that constitute the farm. There is a pound of worms for each cubic foot of windrow.

Since wriggly worms are tough to count, worm growers deal in worm weight, measured by the pound. When pressed, Beerman says, "You'll get about 1,000 worms per pound."

Africanized honey bees get bum rap

washington (AP) - When the fearsome marauders constantly those dread "killer bees" began hunting for human victims that media heading northward from Brazil a quarter-century ago, headlines buzzed with undocumented tales of terror.

It's been 5-1/2 years since the creatures - technically, Africanized honey bees - first crossed the Rio Grande into the United States, and they have not lived up to their billing.
"Africanized honey bees are

"I'm wearing gloves now all the time, when I used to handle bees with bare hands," William Vanderput of Pharr, Texas, told Agricultural Research. "The Africanized bee is unpredictable; you don't know when Department study of the killer bees or what provokes them. These bees are moody."

Vanderput said the invasion has raised his costs by as much as 25 percent. He uses the recommended method of minimizing Africanization - routinely replacing the queen bees in a colony with queens that have not bred with the killer bees.

USDA researchers at Weslaco, Texas, are using the Mexican experience to test chemicals that might keep the killer bees away from humans. The best they've found so far are common mosquito repellants.

But there's a catch: The chemicals have to be sprayed in a fine mist directly onto the bees. "Just spraying your clothes didn't do any good, said entomologist Anita Collins.

Jose Santos Rodriguez, who manages 1,600 bee colonies in Allende, Nuevo Leon, Mexico, says the killer bees force him to wear a veil and gloves, but he isn't scared. He's even found something good to say about the hybrids: "People who used to steal some of my honey don't anymore."

WASHINGTON (AP) - Boosting the yield of forage in alfalfa fields can be as easy as interseeding sweet sorghum or a sorghum-Sudangrass

A study by Agricultural Research Service scientists found that interseeding raised forage yields by 45 percent on high-value land near Ames, Iowa, and by 28 percent on land of lesser quality near Chariton,

"With that much extra yield, we calculated a farmer could break even with production costs when the forage's value was \$47.70 per ton at the central Iowa site or \$50.16 in southern Iowa," said Dwayne R. Buxton, a plant physiologist with the

Growing pure stands of alfalfa would require a value of \$63.46 and \$71.03, respectively, for the farmer to break even, Buxton said.

The higher yields were accomplished without commercial nitrogen fertilizer, even while conserving soil. But adequate soil moisture is necessary for sorghum to grow in established alfalfa or reed canarygrass, Buxton said.

Also considered essential to successful interseeding was a power slot mulcher to prepare a narrow sorghum seedbed and to apply a band of herbicide.

Grown by itself as an annual row crop, sorghum may produce heavily but fail to protect soil from erosion well as alfalfa and other cool-weather crops.







Know kind of wall before hanging objects

wall you're hanging it on. Most interior walls are plaster or wallboard over wood or metal studs, or some type of masonry.

Hollow Walls: On the Stud On a hollow wall, it's best to attach an object to a stud whenever possible.

Use a common nail or a wood screw long enough to go through the fixture and wall and well into the stud. For a screw, first drill a pilot hole slightly smaller than the screw's diameter.

- Attach boards that will carry light loads with masonry nails or cut nails. Because these nails tend to split

CAUTION: Wear safety goggles when fastening to masonry walls. Drive out masonry or other hardened nails with a hardened steel hammer or light sledge. They snap easily when not struck properly and can chip a cast-iron hammer, causing flying metal particles.

- To attach an object to a solid masonry wall, drill a pilot hole the length and diameter of the anchor. Use a carbide-tipped bit in a variable-speed, half-inch electric drill. Clean out the hole before tapping in the anchor.

- Use a plastic or fiber plug or a plastic anchor for a light load and a lead anchor for a heavier one. For heaviest loads, use an expansion shield.

- If a fastener is to carry a heavy load, don't install it in the mortar between masonry blocks.

Home office offers unique opportunity

Early predictions were that working at home would give people more scope to be themselves. To a degree, that's true. But more than that, one magazine editor says, the attending technology has created a new worker category: One who works any time, any place the mood strikes.

Just how much freedom one can have while working at home depends a great deal on the task.

'You can read at the beach," Paul Cornell says. "But if you are doing computer work, you need a work surface."

As manager of behavior and environmental research for Steelcase Inc. in Grand Rapids, Mich., Cornell studies what makes for an optimum

something to be said for work space to call your own at home.

"It can be made off-limits to the kids, it puts you in the mood to work, it separates work space from family space, and you gain some privacy,' he says. "A common theme is 'leave me alone.""

Beyond privacy, desirable features in a home office are adequate lighting and ventilation and correct height for the work surface and chair. When using the keyboard, for example, your forcarms should be roughly parallel to the floor. A chair that tilts and supports the lower back also is a plus, but the executive desk is a dinosaur.



Pairs skaters Meno and Sand get set for World competition

Jenni Meno and Todd Sand, the reigning U.S. national champion pairs figure skaters, are among the competitors this week in the World Figure Skating Championships. ABC has coverage of the pairs, men's, ladies' and ice dance finals Thursday and Saturday.

Skaters from California to China travel to Alberta, Canada, this week to compete for the top titles in the World Figure Skating Championships.

"You use the same programs you use through the year, so you're kind of building for (this) all through the skating season.

A lot of work goes into creating a routine for a skating event, Meno says.

"We get in the rink at 8:30 a.m. and skate until 1 p.m. We spend time doing our lifts on the floor, and in the gym working with weights and working on our stamina. And part of the year we take ballet lessons.

After finding music to skate to, the couple starts working with their coach and a choreographer.

"We try to present our programs as a complete package. We don't try to emphasize one element or one part of our skating," Sand says.

This package concept even includes

"We have someone design (each costume) so it fits the music and the way we skate and it doesn't distract from our skating," Meno explains.

Méno and Sand have learned there are special elements pairs skaters need to take into account.

"We have to have every step and every finger matching," Meno says.

"If you're a single skater and you're going too slow and need an extra push, you can adjust. But if one of us adjusts and the other didn't know about it, you've got a problem," Sand adds.

Sand also says communication is a big factor in pairs skating.

Not just talking, either. I also mean the look and how we relate to each other and to the audience. We really take that seriously," he says.

"We skate very much to each other instead of performing to the crowd, Meno adds. "I think there's something between us when we're skating."

There's something between them off the ice, too. In fact, they were married

"I think for us it's worked out well," Meno says. "I think we know each other so well and we've learned a lot about each other since we've been married. It's nice in competition being out there with someone you care about and knowing they're there for you if you fall down or if it doesn't go the way you want it to."

Weather's Wonders

The weather is one of the hottest topics around. People discuss all types of weather from winter's chilliest times to the dog days of summer. Here are some weather facts that may surprise you.

THUNDER STORMS •Lightning strikes somewhere on the Earth more than a hundred times each second.

•Each year, more than a hundred people are killed by lightning in the United States.

•A lightning bolt can reach 50,000 degrees Fahrenheit, which is five times hotter than the surface of the sun.

 Since sound travels much more slowly than light, you always hear thunder after you see

lightning. To find out how many miles away a storm is, count the seconds between the time you see the lightning and hear the thunder, and divide the number by five.

•More thunderstorms happen in Daytona Beach, Florida than in any other U.S. city.

SNOW

•No two snowflakes look exactly the same, but they all have six sides.

•In the United States, the heaviest snowfalls occur when the temperature is between 24 and 30 degrees Fahrenheit.

·Since Eskimos are always around snow, they have more than twenty different words for snow in their vocabulary.

•Snow that has survived at least one year is called firn.

•In a large snowflake, there could be hundreds of ice crystals.

RAIN

•A large cloud may contain more than a billion raindrops, and each raindrop is made up of about a hundred million tiny water droplets.

•When rain comes down, it is actually the sky returning to Earth the same water that evaporated from the land and sea.

 Rainbows are formed by sunlight shining on drops of rain. Rainbows can only be seen when the sun is behind you and low over the horizon.

 Tornado winds are the strongest, most violent winds on earth.

•The center of a tornado can reach speeds of about 400 miles an hour.



The program follows Beauty as she gives birth to cubs and later teaches them survival and hunting skills.

The program also compares the life of a leopard to the other side of the beauty spectrum, the warthog, and looks at the survival techniques a mother warthog teaches its piglets.



Bonnie Hunt, an alumna of the Second City comedy troupe, stars as Bonnie Kelly, a small-town news reporter who must adjust to city life when she gets a job in Chicago, in *Bonnie*, airing Sundays on CBS.

In each episode, Hunt uses her improvisational skills when her character interviews real people on the streets in "live" reports for the station.



Biography profiles a saint on his well-known feast day

Where does fact end and legend begin where St. Patrick is concerned?

A&E Network's Biography makes a game attempt to answer that riddle in "St. Patrick: The Man, the Myth," airing Sunday, March 17, on the cable

What few facts are known about Patrick are taken largely from his "Confessio," a work that may have been prompted by a personal scandal he endured or simply may have been written near the end of his life.

What is known is Patrick was born into an aristocratic family in Romanized Britain during the late fourth century (the exact location is another subject for debate, but the program builds a convincing case for the western coast of Wales).

The wealthy family into which he was born probably was Christian primarily as a matter of convenience, since they assimilated most of the ways of the region's Roman conquerors. Patrick's grandfather was a minor noble and ordained priest; his

father, a church deacon and tax collector for Rome.

When Patrick was 15, he committed some mysterious "sin" that would come back to haunt him. Charles Doherty of Dublin's University College argues that, since he was a teen-ager, it may have involved "a sexual indiscretion or irregularity."

Only a year later, Patrick was abducted by barbaric Celt raiders and forced to work as a shepherd in Ireland for six years. He escaped back to his family, but returned to Ireland as a missionary.

His success there provoked a rival cleric to make public Patrick's youthful indiscretion, whatever it was. His fate after that scandal is unknown; from all practical evidence, he vanished from history.

Biography also includes engaging accounts of the colorful and often violent legends Irish bishops would have scribes attach to Patrick's life centuries later for political purposes. What emerges at the end of the hour, however, is the portrait of a very human and very conflicted individual.


