

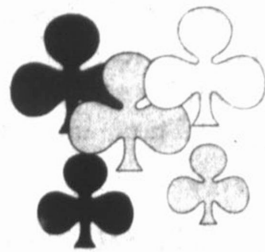

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## Hereford man donating kidney

'Something I need to do,' says Robert Cadena

Why is Robert Cadena giving his sister a kidney?

"It's something I need to do, and want to do," Cadena said as he sat close to his younger sister, Gloria Cuellar, in the living room of her Hereford home.

Because of his decision, Mrs. Cuellar will receive her brother's kidney on Friday during surgery in Lubbock's Methodist Hospital.

When doctors began searching for a suitable person to provide a kidney for Mrs. Cuellar, they turned to her family.

Cadena was a perfect tissue and blood match to his sister.

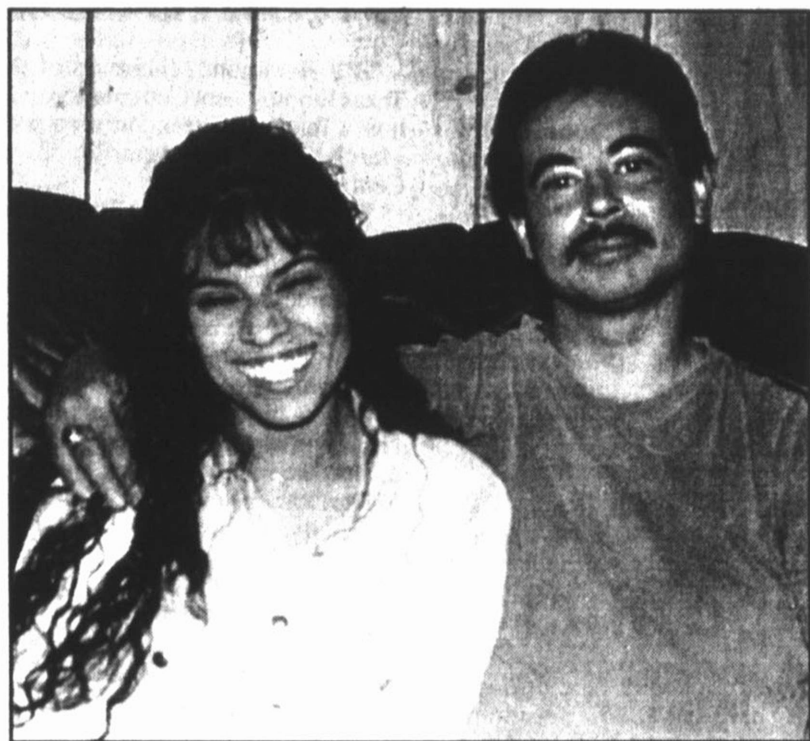
Of the six genes that are matched, Cuellar's sister made a good candidate with three genes matching. But though she was a good choice, Cadena was better.

"Robert had all six of the same genes that they test. My sister only had three," Mrs. Cuellar said.

"I just knew it was going to be Robert," she continued. "I knew before anyone was tested. I think (it's) because we have always been close."

Cadena is next to last among the nine children in his family, while Mrs. Cuellar was the youngest daughter.

If he hadn't matched, Mrs.

Cuellar would not have been out of luck -- any of the other brothers and sisters could have been tested for the kidney transplant.

As it was, only three were tested before doctors decided on Cadena.

The 27-year-old Mrs. Cuellar

has had problems with her kidneys since she was 16 years old.

"I had kidney failure and have had to be on dialysis since August," she said, because her kidneys were only working at 8 percent capacity.

She drives herself to and from

Amarillo three times a week for the three-hour dialysis procedure.

"It is always so tiring, but I know I have to do it," she said. "I'm just so glad I will get a new kidney and not have to go for dialysis anymore."

Cadena has never been hospitalized, but he said he is looking forward to the opportunity to give his sister another chance at a long and happy life.

"I prayed about this, and accepted it," he said. "There was no question that I had to do it."

Although his wife and children are a little apprehensive, they know he is making the right decision, he said.

"I see someone so young and think it is sad that she may not be here until she grows old," he said.

"My children are afraid that something might happen to me or my one kidney. They are small and do not quite understand what I'm doing. They are just worried about me."

Cadena said that he is nervous about the risk of surgery. "Needles scare me the most," he said with a laugh.

He also said he has given more blood in the last month than he ever has in his life.

## China won't give up use of force against Taiwan

TAIPEI, Taiwan (AP)--Dashing Taiwan's hopes for eased tensions, China Saturday dismissed as "baseless" a Pentagon report that it had assured the United States it had no plans to invade the island.

"China has never promised to give up the use of force," Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesman Shen Guofang said Saturday in a nationally televised interview. He was asked about a Pentagon spokesman's statement Thursday that the Chinese had told the U.S. government no invasion was planned.

Taiwan has demanded that China cancel its next round of war games, designed to quash independence sentiment in the weeks before Taiwan's first direct presidential elections. China regards Taiwan as a renegade province.

While Shen said China wanted peaceful reunification with Taiwan, he added: "If Taiwan declares independence or if foreign forces encroach on Taiwan," China "will

use whatever methods are necessary to protect our country's sovereignty and territorial integrity."

Saturday's statement seemed likely to renew anxieties among Taiwanese following China's announcement of another round of war games even closer to outlying Taiwanese islands than before. The Pentagon statement had helped to steady Taiwan's stock market.

Taiwan said Saturday that Chinese forces appear set for yet another exercise after the one starting Monday. But an official said there were no signs China would invade.

The zone staked out by China for the latest exercise comes within 11 miles of Taiwanese islets--even closer than those now going on and due to end Wednesday.

After those end, China appears to be planning yet more exercises in an attempt to "force us into talks" about reunification, said Shih Tze-chung, an official of the National Security Bureau.

## \$1.5 million in capital credits due DSEC members Tuesday

They had recorded more than 30 Southern Gospel albums that included such hits as "He Came Back," "Lord, Don't Move That Mountain," "Sending Up Some Board" and "Antioch Church Choir."

The group has an unusual sound combining piano, bass, percussion and harmonica.

## Prison system policies under fire

HOUSTON (AP)--The Texas Board of Criminal Justice, stung by fallout from a \$33.6 million contract it did not approve, voted Friday to tighten spending policies as part of a 12-point program the board chairman said was intended to regain administrative control of the prison system.

In another vote, the board indefinitely scrapped plans drawn up by the legislature to install telephones for about 20,000 inmates at some prisons. The rejection came after a number of crime victims complained about extending privileges to convicts.

The prison system's spending practices have come under fire amid disclosures that proper state purchasing practices were not

followed when the agency agreed to buy up to \$33.6 million worth of VitaPro, a soy-based meat substitute fed to inmates.

"It's possible there are more problems related to financial transactions," Allan Polunsky, the prison board chairman, said.

Federal and state authorities are investigating the contract and former prison chief James A. "Andy" Collins, who prison officials now say not only pressured the system to buy it but also to serve it once a day. Collins went to work as a \$1,000-a-day consultant for VitaPro while he technically was still on the state payroll.

He later quit the consultant's job but the entire deal is now the subject of suits and counter-suits involving

the state and Montreal-based VitaPro Foods Inc.

"There are certain aspects of the agency that trouble me," Polunsky said. "There are certain issues that have come up recently and still may come up in the future that lead me to believe that we need to exercise more control over the administration."

"And we're going to do whatever we need to do to accomplish that."

Polunsky's program, passed quickly without dissent by the nine-member board, centralizes purchases under department directors, requires direct board action for any transaction over \$1 million, sets up

special board committees for various prison administrative areas and institutes a formal ethics program for administrators.

For the next two months, a special committee on purchasing will revise agency purchasing guidelines, will review and may veto any purchases over \$50,000.

In addition, the full board, which previously met every other month, now will meet every month "to ensure we have this situation under control," Polunsky said.

## Cowgirl Hall of Fame directors 'victims of own success' as doors to close soon

Hereford will give up a national treasure on March 28 when the National Cowgirl Hall of Fame and Western Heritage Center closes its doors, and the entire museum contents are moved to Fort Worth.

The announcement of the move has caught the attention of local residents. "We've had great response from the publicity the media gave us," said Wenonah Barringer, office manager.

"We have had so many calls and requests for tours that I feel most everyone who really wants to see the hall will have a chance," said Barringer.

Interested citizens have just a week and a half to tour the center again, or to see it for the first time. The hall closes on March 28 and vans are scheduled to arrive the next day to load up all the exhibits, displays and memorabilia for the move to Fort Worth.

For Margaret Formby, a founder and former president of the hall, and other people here who nurtured it the past 21 years, these are bittersweet times. As reported in *The New York Times*, "the founders are almost victims of their own success."

Translated, that means they've made it into a great museum and research center for women of the West, but they realize it could be much, much more.

"We began to feel that we were doing a little bit of disservice to the women of the West," says Roger Eades, a former chairman of the CHOF fame board. "They have a story to tell, and we're such a small town, we were not able to get that out."

But that is a humble statement. The museum has been telling its story well, with great attention to honorees and to the detail of the displays. It's just that a center with a \$60,000 annual budget in a small town can't get the national attention that a national museum deserves.

The annual "Rhinstone Roundup" induction ceremonies drew some publicity around the country, and the hall's association with the debut of the Cowgirl Restaurant in New York City--and later one in Santa Fe--helped spread the word.

When the local board decided two years ago that the museum had outgrown Hereford's ability to support it, directors entertained offers

from 29 cities and six amusement parks. They settled on Fort Worth.

With the wealth of the Bass and Moncrief families and the Burnett-Tandy Foundation and opportunities for more exposure, it was and is very promising.

Kit Moncrief, the new president, said recently that the board plans to construct a \$5 million, 20,000-square-foot structure in the cultural district near Kimbell Art Museum. It will have space for 20,000-square-feet of expansion in the future. Architect David Schwarz, who designed The Ballpark in Arlington, has been hired to draw the plans.

Formby, and others, had been reluctant to move the gallery to Fort Worth for storage, since the new facility may not be completed for three years. However, the new board recently explained it needed the collection so the design team will know exactly what they're working with and can plan the floor space for the new structure

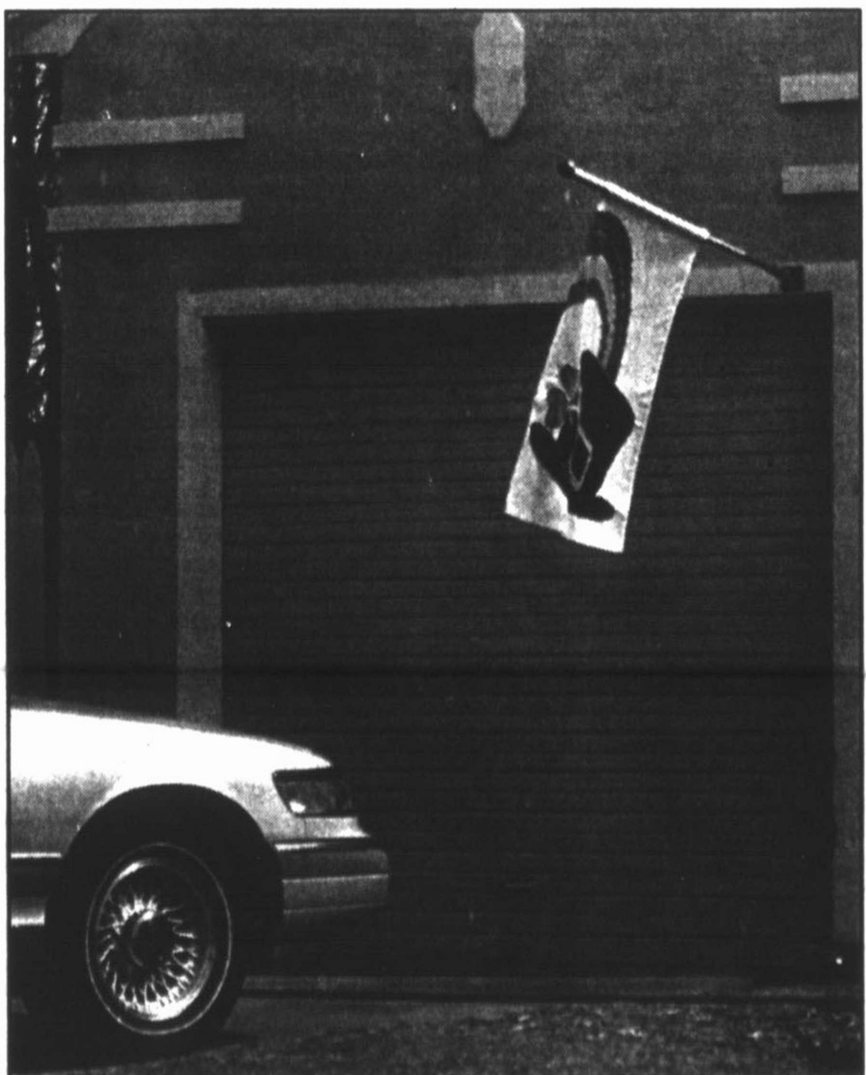
There have been some ruffled feelings during the transition, but Formby says "those have been ironed out, and I'm very optimistic about the future of the hall."

Formby feels sad that the museum is leaving but pleased to know that the hall's yearly attendance, around 2,000, will surely grow--perhaps to 100 times that. In the cultural district of Cowtown, the yearly visits might even outpace the 274,000 mark set last year by the National Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City.

Dixie Moseley, a 1982 honoree and former trick roper and rodeo clown, says the induction event in Fort Worth last year "was nice, but it sure wasn't the same." The Hereford ceremonies "were more like a big family gathering." She recalls that honorees would stay in private homes, singing and swapping stories late into the night. "In Fort Worth, it's the big city way."

Not all the honorees have doubts about the move. Betty Solt, a Roswell, N.M., barrel racer, and Georgia Mae Ericson, historian and board member, are pleased with the new board and its plans, according to quotes in a Houston Chronicle article.

And Moncrief, the new president, was quoted in the same story as saying some of the doubts come from "a case of seller's remorse." She said any problems have to do with growing pains. "We want this to be a top-notch (See COWGIRL, Page 2A)

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# Study shows business degree requirements falling

NEW YORK (AP) - The personnel needs of business and the ability or willingness of colleges to fill them is often a no-man's land of cultural warfare. Two different cultures. Two strongly held views.

Business indicates that candidates for jobs come to them without the skills necessary in a competitive marketplace. Educators often respond that it is their job to teach life skills

rather than just job skills. But are their interests more alike than contrary? Maybe.

The National Association of Scholars is set to release Tuesday a study showing a vast deterioration in degree requirements at the nation's top colleges, including a wholesale abandonment of English composition.

The NAS study of broad, general education requirements traces a steady decline since 1914 in core curricula requirements, with fewer mandatory courses and prerequisites,

and less math, science and foreign languages.

The NAS, an association of administrators, professors and graduate students, is alarmed that the deterioration represents a threat not just to the business world but to the entire leadership capability of America.

The danger for America is "especially severe, absent a recovery of responsibility among the institutions examined," said Stephen H. Balch, NAS president. It is within

these walls, he said, that leaders are nurtured.

In business personnel departments, meanwhile, companies say they discount academic performance, school reputation and teacher recommendations. This was verified last year in a survey released by the Census Bureau.

At the top of the Census Bureau list of desired qualities were attitude, communications skills and work experience. Schools can't do much about experience, and maybe little about attitudes, but they can teach communications.

But do they? Even before the NAS study, Professor E.D. Hirsch wrote "Cultural Literacy: What Every American Needs to Know." A best-seller a few years ago, it sent a message that people can't communicate if they don't share basic knowledge.

Hirsch contends that three decades of de-emphasizing content in schools leaves students unaware of facts needed to understand the world and

communicate with other people. "Where is Oslo?" for example. Basic stuff.

This sounds like the very thing business is complaining about. It sounds like the very same thing the scholars are complaining about. Both seem to be increasingly upset with the quality of education and the product it produces.

The NAS study is a devastating commentary. It studied the structure, content and rigor of requirements for a Bachelor of Arts degree at 50 highly regarded colleges for the years 1913, 1939, 1964 and 1993. And was shocked.

It found that just before World War I some 98 percent of the 50 schools required English composition, administered by their English departments. The requirement was down to 86 percent by 1964, and to 36 percent in 1993.

Get braced for more. Rhetoric, the skill of using words effectively in speech and writing, was a distinct general education requirement in one-third of all schools in

1914. By 1993, these requirements had entirely disappeared.

Could this explain why communications skills are so eagerly sought by companies? Perhaps it's their rarity, or at least the teaching of them, in and era sometimes referred to as the age of communications.

It is also a world of science and technology - of computers, and research and medical marvels. It is the space age too, which demands calculations of thrust and distance and weight to near-infinite precision.

In 1914, traditional mathematics was required by 82 percent of schools. It eroded to 12 percent by 1993. Physical and biological science requirements dropped from 90 percent in 1914 to about one-third in 1993.

Maybe the scholars and business are more alike in their thinking than is quickly evident.

Perhaps the erosion documented by the NAS also identifies some of the problems faced by business in finding good employees and future leaders? The evidence seems to say yes.

## Oldest astronaut getting set for sixth trip aboard shuttle

"There is no end. There is no beginning. There is only the infinite passion of life." - Federico Fellini.

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) - It might seem remarkable that a man nearly old enough to collect Social Security would toil away in a profession that demands 12-hour days and a willingness to lay down one's life.

Remarkable for most people, that is. Certainly not remarkable for Story Musgrave.

Of all the obstacles he might face, age seems among the least formidable for the 60-year-old dean of NASA's astronaut corps.

Assigned in January for a record sixth space shuttle flight, he'll be 61 - the oldest space traveler ever - when Columbia blasts off late this year on a 16-day voyage.

So why does he continue to defy the years despite the significant demands and dangers of being an astronaut? How does he do it?

Musgrave pauses a moment to formulate his response, rubbing the top of his bald head with the palm of his hand. He leans forward in his chair and speaks carefully, hoping his words will resonate for others his age.

"I do believe that if you've got reasons to be young and you've got reasons to live, then you're going to be young and you're going to live," he says.

"It is my belief that if you have very strong reasons for living, that is going to get into the physiology and the biochemistry. If the organism feels and senses, 'I've got a calling here,' it's going to live up to it."

In Musgrave's case, the theory appears to have worked. He claims his mind is sharper than ever and he can curl 150 pounds with one arm. NASA has told him not to expect a seventh shuttle flight, but Musgrave says he could handle several more missions.

Flying in space, he explains, requires a different balance of physical and mental skills than, say, boxing or baseball, arenas where fellow Texans George Foreman and Nolan Ryan have pushed traditionally

accepted limits of age and achievement by performing well in their mid-40s.

Where athletes rely largely on their bodies, space voyagers benefit more from mental dexterity and the knowledge that can only come with experience, he says.

"Believe it or not I think I'm about peaked right where I am now," he says. "There is absolutely no question in my mind that in my 60s I will do a much better job than I did at 50 because I've been in space a few times."

Because the Russians prefer younger cosmonauts and NASA astronauts have rarely flown more than three or four times, the list of older space travelers is brief. The current record is held by shuttle astronaut Vance Brand, who flew in 1990 at age 59.

Shuttle commander Kenneth Bowersox, who as pilot of shuttle Endeavour watched while Musgrave and three other spacemen repaired the Hubble Space Telescope in 1993, said Musgrave's legacy will be his devotion to a career that has consumed half his life.

"I think he has stuck with this program because he loves it and because he believes in what we're doing," Bowersox said.

"He probably loves this job more than anybody in the (astronaut) corps," said Milt Heflin, who served as lead flight director during the Hubble mission. "He loves it from a philosophical standpoint. ... It's a passion."

Musgrave, who lives in Houston but considers Lexington, Ky., home, was part of NASA's 11-man astronaut class in 1967, two years before Neil Armstrong set foot on the moon.

He worked for 16 years on the ground, helping to design Skylab and parts of the fledgling space shuttle, including the suits that astronauts now wear during spacewalks.

He finally made it into orbit as part of Challenger's 1983 maiden voyage. It was during that flight that Musgrave and astronaut Don Peterson conducted the first shuttle spacewalk. He flew again in 1985, 1989 and 1991 before he was picked for the mission he likely

will be remembered for - the Hubble repair flight.

Musgrave led a team of four spacewalkers who accomplished the most complex and delicate feat ever attempted in orbit while correcting and improving the \$1.5 billion telescope's blurred vision.

At 58, Musgrave conducted three of a record five spacewalks during the flight, and he made it look easy.

"It was an amazing thing to watch," Heflin said.

The rejuvenated Hubble has yielded new clues to the age and origin of the universe. For NASA, the high-flying repair yielded a boost in public confidence that helped the agency preserve funding for its beleaguered space station program.

Musgrave is hopeful that Hubble might eventually help humans find their place in the universe.

"It's the bridge. It is tending to bridge the gaps between cosmology and philosophy, astronomy and theology," he says. "Not that we can do that yet, but it's kind of rubbing on that. You're kind of seeing where the bridges might be."

Because of that kind of reward, Musgrave says, he has been able to accept the significant possibility - roughly one chance in 100 - of death with each launch.

"I accept the risk. I accept it intellectually, knowing exactly what it is, and I face up to it and I accept it," he says. "I don't like it, but I will accept it and I would accept it to go 100 times."

He also accepts that flight No. 6 will be his last. That passage, however, doesn't necessarily mean retirement for the surgeon, mathematician, computer analyst, poet and philosopher.

He'll probably remain with NASA, "back in the trenches" as he likes to say. He admits the transition will be difficult, but it appears he will handle it with the same ballet-like grace he demonstrated during the Hubble spacewalks.

"In putting it down I will know ... that it really was my calling, that I was dedicated to it, that I transcended all other things concerning it in trying to achieve perfection," he says. "I will know that I did that."

## Judge says state agency can be sued by company

AUSTIN (AP) - The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission is not immune to a lawsuit filed by a company forced into bankruptcy when the state ended its auto emissions testing program, a federal judge ruled Friday.

Tejas Testing Technology sued the commission last year after the Legislature repealed a law setting up the testing program for which Tejas was contracted.

The program had been required by federal lawmakers, who said the state could hundreds of millions of dollars in highway funds if it did not take steps to monitor and reduce auto emissions.

Tejas said it spent more than \$130 million to set up testing sites before its contract was canceled. The company is seeking \$229 million in damages from the state.

But officials from the TNRCC said the commission had sovereign immunity from all money damage

claims arising from contract relationships.

U.S. Magistrate Alan Albright on Friday said the state pursued Tejas for \$8.8 million when it filed bankruptcy. He said that move waived the agency's immunity.

"The practical effect of the judge's recommendation is that the state will have to come into federal court before a jury and justify its action," said Tejas President Brad Laughlin.

Laughlin said the company has asked for a Sept. 30 trial date, but no date had been set.

The TNRCC didn't immediately return calls Friday about the judge's ruling.

## Herd golfers doing well in tourney

The Hereford boys' and girls' golf teams were in good shape after the first day of the Hereford Invitational at Pitman Municipal Golf Course.

The Herd girls were third and the boys were fourth after Friday's round. The tournament was to conclude Saturday.

The Herd boys were fourth but only five strokes out of the lead. Andrews and Clovis (N.M.) set the pace at 312, and Caprock shot 315 to sneak between the leaders and Hereford at 317. The Hereford B team was right behind: fifth at 321 in the 14-team field.

The Hereford girls were third at 353 - only one stroke behind Borger but a daunting 18 strokes behind leader Andrews (335).

Hereford coach Stacey Bixler seemed pleased.

"We're off to a good start," he said. "Both boys and girls are in the top four. In the boys, 312 is leading it and we're at 317. In girls, Andrews is leading it (by a wide margin) but Borger is only one stroke ahead of us."

The Herd girls were led by Jami Bell and Krista Beville, who both shot 85 and tied with three others for fourth in the medalist standings. Andrews' Misty Cathey led the way with a 79.

The other Hereford girls on the A team were Amy Killingsworth, 90; Jacque Bezner, 93; and Stephanie Bixler, 95.

The Hereford boys were led by Keith Riley, whose round of 75 tied him for fourth in the medalist standings. The others on the A team were: Jeremiah Baros, 78; David Sims, 80; Tom Munoz, 84; and Justin Griffith, 85.

The boys' B team was led by David Farr and Heath Henderson, who both shot 77 and tied for ninth on the medalist list. The others on the B team were: Greg Reinart, 82; Cody Sargent, 85; and Cal Wallace, 89.

## Pampa holds off Herd for 12-7 win

A great play by a Pampa second baseman killed a Hereford rally in the sixth inning Friday, and the Harvesters went on to a 12-7 victory in the Canyon ISD Classic IV baseball tournament.

Hereford went to bat in the top of the sixth inning trailing 8-4. The first five Herd batters reached, though, and Ronald Torres and Tanner Murphey drew back-to-back bases-loaded walks to move the score within 8-6.

Wade McPherson came up - still with the bases loaded - and hit a hot grounder through the pitcher's legs, Herd coach Pete Rodriguez said. However, the Harvesters second baseman Hancock stopped the ball, stepped on second and threw to first for a double play.

Hereford scored a run on the play,

pulling within 8-7, but it wasn't enough. Pampa got the next out, scored four more runs in the bottom of the inning, then retired the Herd 1-2-3 in the top of the seventh.

"If that thing gets through there we score two runs and we've still got (runners on) first and third with no outs," Rodriguez said. "That guy made a great play."

Hereford dropped to 4-8 on the year with one more game in the tournament (Saturday) before starting District 1-4A play at Randall, at 4:30 p.m. Tuesday.

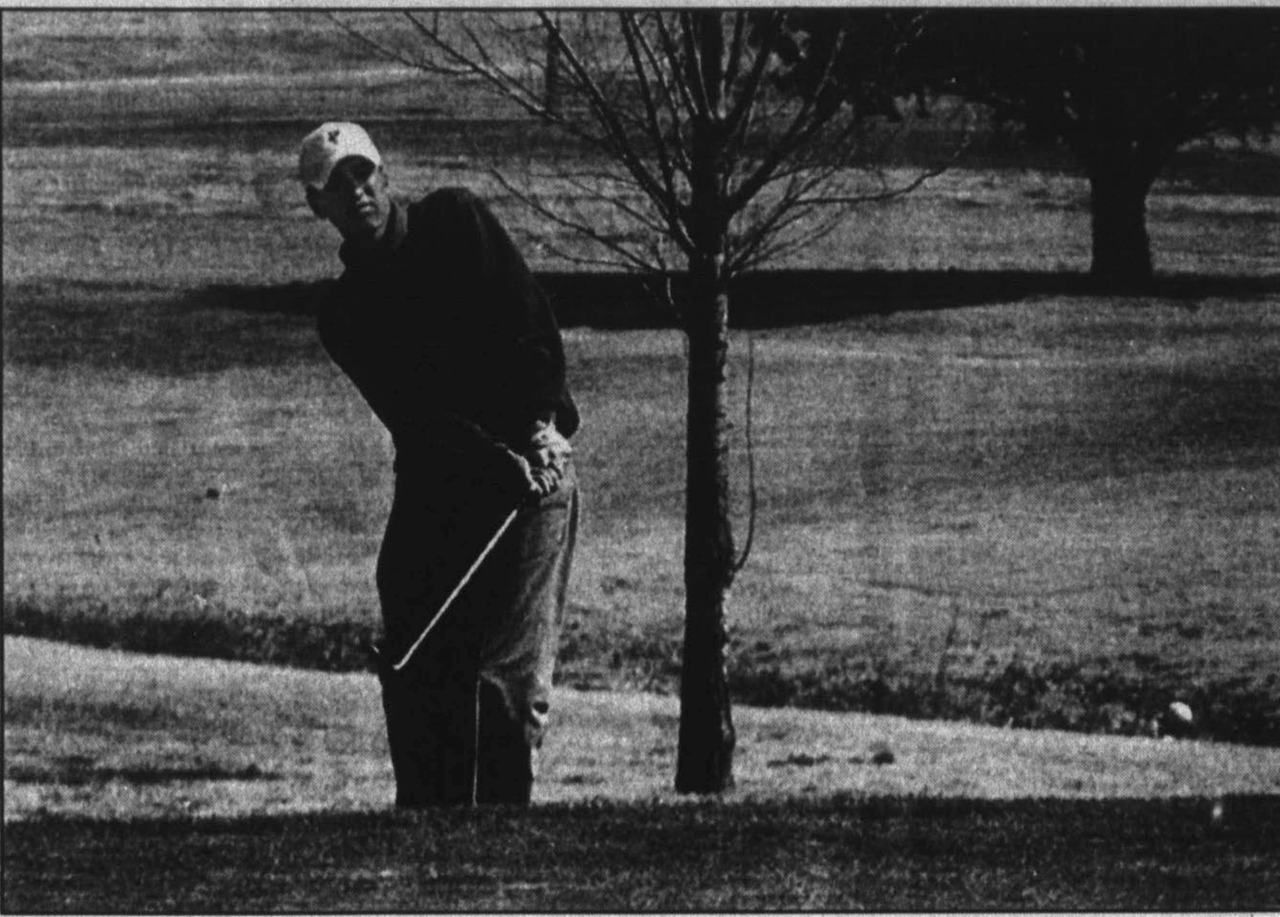
Pampa and Hereford played to a 1-1 tie after three innings. Both scored in the second - Hereford's run came when Dustin Hill singled home John Marty Galan, who had been hit by a pitch.

The scoring came more quickly in the next three innings. Hereford took a brief lead with one in the fourth when Nathan Gavina singled and Galan doubled him home.

## Longhorns upset Michigan

When Maceo Baston raised his arms to signal for a timeout, college basketball fans immediately thought of Chris Webber.

Baston was called for a technical foul in the closing seconds for calling a timeout his team didn't have. Friday night - just like Webber did in the 1993 NCAA championship game - as Michigan was eliminated from the NCAA tournament with an 80-76 loss to Texas.

Brandy Perryman hit two free throws with 3.2 seconds left to seal the victory for the Longhorns, right after Michigan's Louis Bullock drove for a layup to bring the Wolverines to a 78-76 deficit.

But Baston then signaled for a timeout, and the Wolverines were called for a technical foul. Bullock tried to stop Baston from calling the timeout, grabbing his arms. Baston, realizing his gaffe, tried to wave to the official that he really didn't want the timeout, but it was too late.

Michigan coach Steve Fisher dismissed Baston's mistake.

"The timeout didn't have anything to do with the game. Texas just beat us, they played a little bit better than we did," Fisher said. "If you have that as your story line, it should be a sidebar in the last couple of paragraphs."

"You could see the expression on the kids' faces when Maceo took the timeout," Fisher said. "In the heat of battle, things happen. He had a terrific, terrific game and he wanted it to go on. We all did."

The 10th-seeded Longhorns (21-9) will meet No. 2 seed Wake Forest in Sunday's second round at the Bradley Center. The Demon Deacons, playing for 14 minutes without ailing center Tim Duncan, still beat Northeast Louisiana 62-50 in the opening round.

In Saturday's games, Massachusetts played Stanford, and Marquette met Arkansas in the East; Connecticut played Eastern Michigan and Princeton played Mississippi State in

the Southeast; Utah played Iowa State and Kentucky faced Virginia Tech in the Midwest; and Purdue met Georgia and Syracuse played Drexel in the West.

Michigan's loss was the third in five games in this year's first round for the Big Ten, which nearly had its second straight disastrous NCAA. But Iowa finally gave the league something to be proud of by rallying from 17 points down in the second half for a 81-79 win over George Washington in Tempe, Ariz.

"It doesn't get any better than that. It has to go down as one of our greatest comebacks ever," said Iowa coach Tom Davis, now 9-0 in first-round games in the tournament.

The Big Ten had six of its seven entrants beaten in the first round of last year's tournament.

Also on Friday, Indiana was eliminated by Boston College 64-51 in the Southeast Regional. On Thursday, top-seeded Purdue survived a scare from No. 16 seed Western Carolina.

BC's win gave the Big East a 5-0 record against this year's field. Connecticut, Syracuse, Villanova advanced Thursday to the second round, where they will be joined by the Eagles and Georgetown, a 93-56 winner over Mississippi Valley State.

Danya Abrams scored 22 points, and the Eagles scored the final 10 of the game to upend the Hoosiers for the second time in three years at Orlando, Fla.

Meanwhile, the Atlantic Coast Conference, the winningest league in NCAA tournament history, recovered from an 0-3 start and finished the day 3-3.

Santa Clara's win over Maryland left it up Wake Forest, Georgia Tech and North Carolina to uphold the league's tradition, and each came through.

Wake Forest beat Northeast Louisiana 62-50 in the Midwest Regional at Milwaukee, Georgia Tech defeated Austin Peay 90-79 in the Southeast Regional and North Carolina beat New Orleans 83-62.

In other games, New Mexico beat Kansas State 69-48 and Texas Tech edged Northern Illinois 74-73 in the

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# NFL stands for 'National Floating League'

PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP) - This was supposed to be the meeting at which the NFL owners took on franchise free agency. With five franchises either discussing moves or having already made them in the last year, the issue was regarded as needing immediate attention. Instead, the owners did what they do best - put off all major decisions.

"I'm exhausted, and we accomplished nothing," Buffalo Bills owner Ralph Wilson said.

"We waste an hour and a half discussing whether to have championship games at a neutral site when there's just one team for it. Do they really think if Buffalo fans make it to the final, they'll want to go to Sacramento?"

Maybe not, but the way things are

going, some team will want to move there and the NFL will be unable to keep it from going because the league fears an unfavorable court decision could result.

"The NFL stands now for 'National Floating League,'" Wilson groused this week.

The owners arrived last Friday and Saturday hoping that their annual week in the sun would give them a chance to find some common ground on franchise movement and revenue sharing.

Instead, it rained for the first two days, and the owners modified chop block rules and initiated another experiment with instant replay.

Action on franchise moves turned out to be no action at all.

The official line was that this was meant to be a working meeting in which committees could study the

problem and report back at a later date.

One later date will be next month, when Houston's move to Nashville probably will be approved. Another will come in May, when Seattle's move will be discussed.

"We had nothing really pressing that had to be done now," commissioner Paul Tagliabue said. "This was a good time to step back and discuss what we have to do."

"Everyone agrees we have to stop franchise movement, just like everybody agrees there should be peace in Bosnia," Tagliabue said. "That doesn't make it an easy thing to accomplish."

The problem is the courts, and since Tagliabue is a lawyer, he's all too aware of how costly and futile court fights can be.

Despite lawsuits between the league and the Raiders and the league

and the Cowboys, the NFL backed down a year ago in the face of threatened suits on the Rams' move from Southern California to St. Louis. That came after Tagliabue held that the Rams didn't follow the guidelines for moving and the owners voted it down.

Tagliabue did claim victory on the Browns' move to Baltimore by guaranteeing Cleveland would get a team back by 1999 and leaving the Browns name and team colors in Cleveland. And there is sentiment among a lot of owners to draw a line on the proposed move of the Seahawks to Los Angeles.

The Oilers will be in a new stadium in Nashville in 1998, playing either in Memphis for two seasons or playing out the final two years of their Astrodome lease in Houston.

There's a referendum in Cincinnati on March 19 to raise the sales tax by

a half-cent to fund a new stadium. If that doesn't pass, the Bengals become a candidate to move to Cleveland.

The Glazer family, which owns the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, is seeking a new stadium there and "keeping our options open." During the meetings, the Glazers spent a good deal of time with Neil Austrian, the league's president, and Roger Goodell, a senior vice president.

Those are the kind of meetings that Tagliabue was talking about.

"Sometimes it's what you don't do that's important," said the Raiders' Al Davis, whose legal victory in his move to Los Angeles in 1982 set the court precedent the

league so often cites as leaving it unable to stop relocations.

Up to a point, Davis is correct. "It was," Tagliabue conceded, "a different kind of meeting. There was a lot of intense work, but it was done out of the public eye."

No one disputes that. And no one disputes that the league's television ratings reflect an interest greater than any major sport.

That may not last forever if franchises continue to be perceived as vagabonds.

"We're pushing the fans around," said New England's Robert Kraft. "If we don't do anything, the ripple effect will be tremendous."

# SWC Classic ends with style

"It's hard to see an old friend die," Ball said. "Particularly when the old friend passed away out of neglect."

The 20th and last Dr Pepper Southwest Conference basketball classic ended with two great games.

Forever, the trivia questions will be: Who won the last men's and women's tournaments? Answer: Texas Tech and Texas A&M.

Who scored the last points? Answer: Sonny Alvarado of Texas in the men's game and Lana Tucker of Texas A&M in the women's final.

A dying conference is not a fun thing to be around. People were hugging people and saying their goodbyes. There was a great guy like Bo Carter of the SWC hustling to help everyone even though his job ends in June. It felt strange walking away from press row for the last time knowing there would be no more games to report.

The question keeps coming up: Could the league have been saved?

Maybe, if athletic directors and chief executives officers a decade ago had taken an exploratory peek over the horizon.

This has been hashed and rehashed. But Ball, a publicist for Dr Pepper who has been around the SWC all of his life, made a good point.

"It would have been interesting to see what Steve Hatchell could have done if he had become commissioner a lot earlier," Ball said. "He's a great idea guy. Maybe he could have kept a breakup from happening."

Indeed, Hatchell, the first commissioner of the Big 12 which comes on line in July, came aboard too late as SWC commissioner to do much good. You may have noticed the men's final on Saturday was nationally televised by CBS. This was a Hatchell deal, as was getting the women's finale on Prime Sports.

Hatchell spent his week flying to Kansas City for the Big Eight tournament and back to Dallas for the SWC finale. Hatchell in his Big Eight days was hugely responsible for making the tournament the success it has enjoyed.

Oh, there was one pushy Big Eight person, forgetting Hatchell's earlier ties with the league, who came up and tried to explain this and that about the tournament and how Hatchell might want to use those ideas in the Big 12.

"I know," Hatchell said. "I was

the one who started those ideas for the Big Eight tournament."

Next year the Big 12 tournament which could include Texas A&M, Texas Tech, Texas, and Baylor will be in Kansas City. We say "could" because the format still hasn't been worked out for either the men's or the women's tournament.

In the past, the Big Eight Conference has held its women's tournament at another site, Salina, Kan.

Hatchell is hoping the same site can be used for both tournaments. It has worked well in the SWC where the league got over 14,000 for the men's title game and over 8,000 for the women's finale.

Dr Pepper is working on a sponsorship deal with the Big 12 in basketball similar to the one it has with the SWC.

It already has nailed down the sponsorship for the Big 12 championship football game in December when the champions from the north and south divisions meet in St. Louis at the Trans World Dome.

Dr Pepper only last week went to St. Louis and reserved 900; that's NINE HUNDRED hotel rooms for its sponsors and guests for the week. Dr Pepper, once a big player in the SWC, will be one of the big players in the Big 12.

"The midwest area is a big customer base for us," Ball said. "It's a natural tie-in."

Tickets for the basketball tournament in Kansas City are going to be hard to get for the average fan unless they make their purchases through their schools, which get allotments. The Big 12 tournament will be a very big box office deal as will the Big 12 championship football game.

Fans who are used to walking up to the Reunion Arena box office and making last minute purchases won't be afforded that luxury next year.

Big 12 championships of any kind will be a very hot ticket.

Six Southwest Conference teams made the NCAA basketball playoff party this week. Access may not be as easy next year.

Two men's teams and four women's teams were invited to what TV commentators call "The Big Dance."

But the big four from Texas will be competing with eight more brothers and sisters for the NCAA gravy in 1997. It will be harder to get bids, although

the Big 12 will be a much more powerful conference and have bigger power (RPI) ratings.

SMU, TCU, and Rice will be competing with more members in the far-flung Western Athletic Conference.

And if Houston thought it was tough getting a bid this year, wait until they

get into the bigtime basketball league of Conference USA.

An uncertain, more lucrative, exciting new world is ahead for the SWC lame duckers who were in Dallas for the final time last week.

"It was fun," Ball said, "what there was of it."

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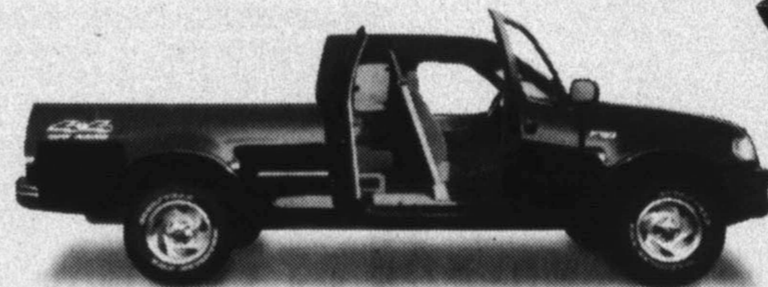

## Poison Prevention Week focuses on reduction of accidental deaths

National Poison Prevention Week will be observed March 18-23, according to Rita Chamberlain, R.Ph., director of the pharmacy at Hereford Regional Medical Center.

Each year victims of poisoning rank in the thousands and unfortunately many of the victims are children.

### Legion will be 77 years old

All veterans and their wives are invited to attend the observance of American Legion 77th birthday on Thursday at 7 p.m. in the Post Home in Veterans Park.

A covered dish dinner will be prepared by American Legion Post 192 and Auxiliary.

For over 30 years, Poison Prevention Week has focused on preventing poisonings among children under 6 years of age, but accidental poisonings can happen to anyone, according to the Poison Prevention Week Council.

Chamberlain said that even the most observant parent can be distracted, and a child can quickly find a poisonous substance. Adults must make sure that household chemicals and drugs are stored away from children at all times.

Safety packaging on oral prescription drugs has reduced the number of accidental ingestion fatalities. Also, deaths due to household chemical products have decreased.

"Poisonings can also happen to older people who cannot read labels or who fail to follow instructions," Chamberlain said.

The best way to prevent accidental poisoning is to survey the home for dangerous chemicals, and be sure that all medicines and household cleaners are stored out of reach of children.

Chamberlain urged people to contact their pharmacist if they have a question about medications or other substances.

"We're the health care professionals who are trained to be experts in this area," he said. "We're always anxious to prevent a tragedy."

It is critically important that a professional be notified as soon as possible in the event of poisoning. The National Poison Control Center operates a toll free hotline 24 hours a day, every day of the year, and should be contacted at 1-800-764-7661.

This number should be posted beside every telephone along with 911 and other emergency numbers.

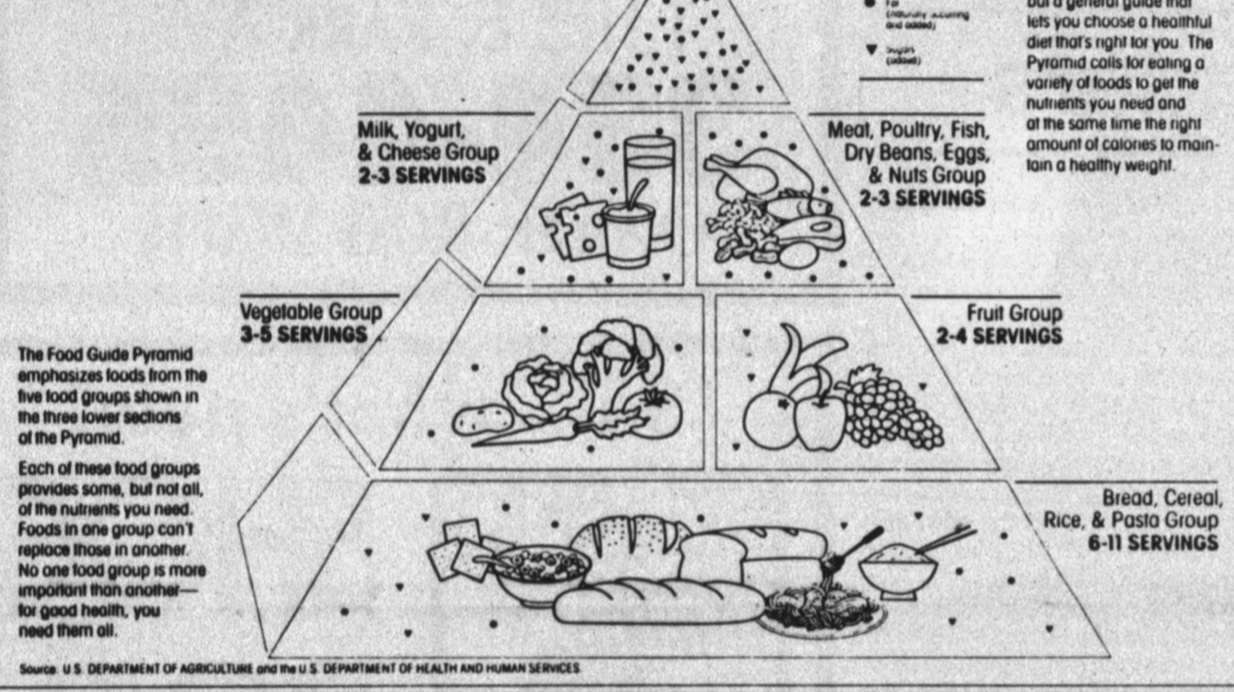

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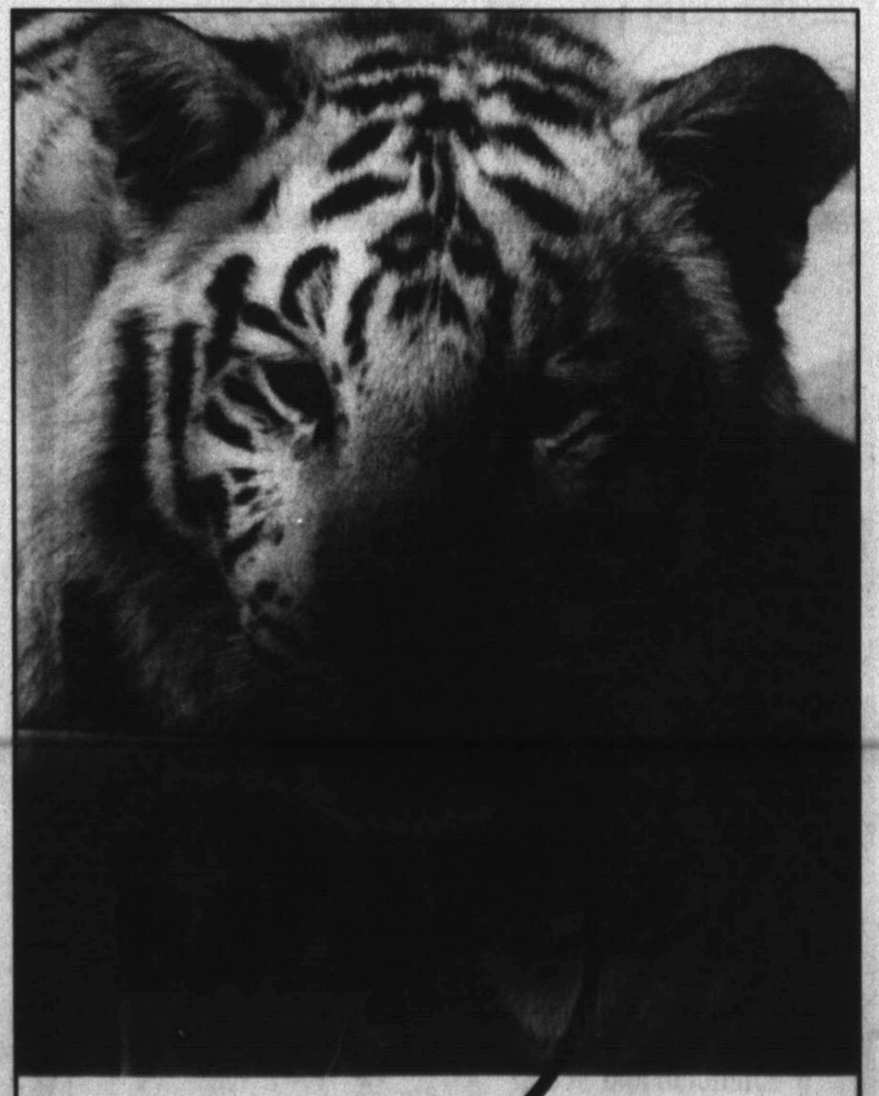

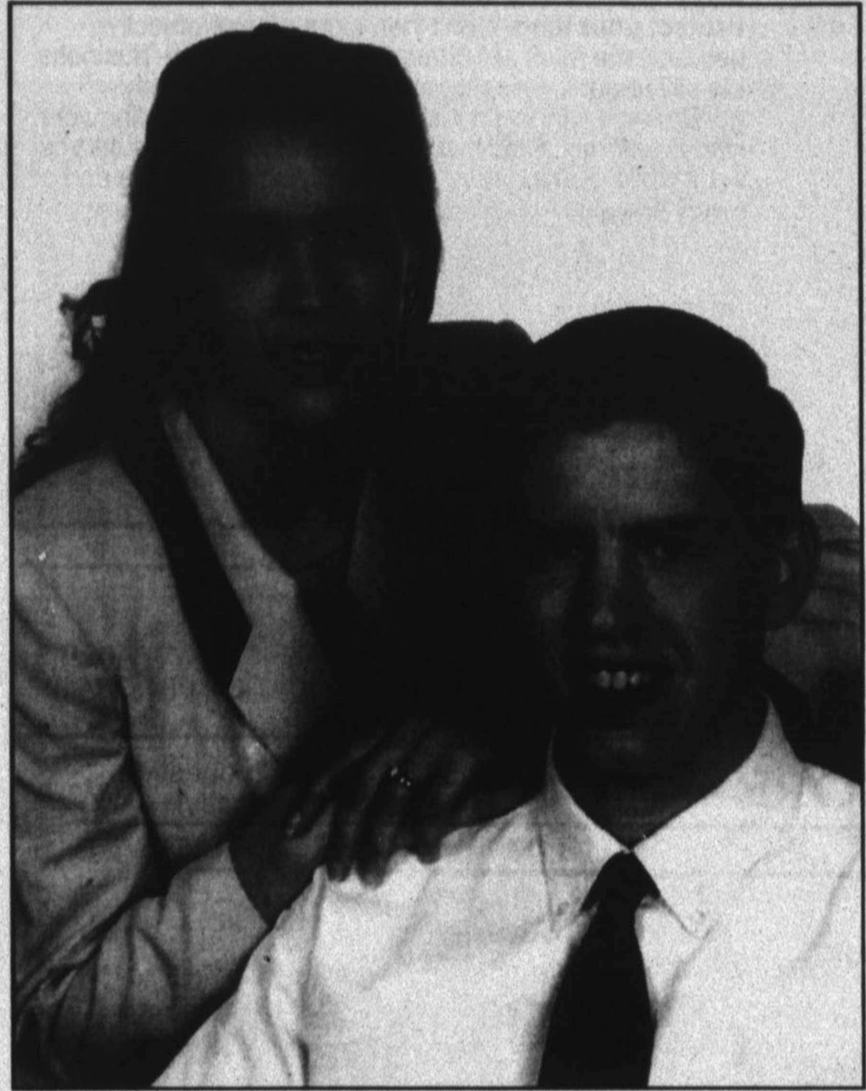

3. Fill out an application and provide necessary information as requested on the application form.

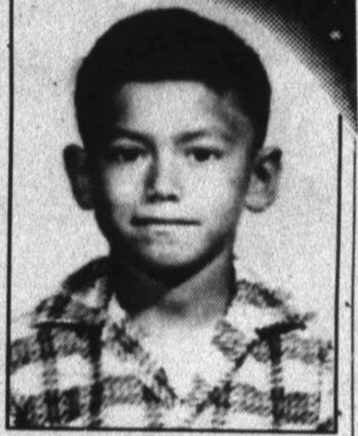

## Extension News

Is your diet complex or does it contain complex carbohydrates?

Eating enough grain products such as breads, cereals, pasta and rice every day can add protein, carbohydrates, vitamins and minerals to your diet.

When you look at the USDA Food Guide Pyramid, the three food groups that have complex carbohydrates are breads, cereals, pasta and whole grain; vegetables; and fruits.

Choosing a diet with plenty of grain products is encouraged by the Dietary Guidelines for Americans, just revised by the Department of Agriculture and the Department of Health and Human Services. The guidelines recommend that Americans eat at least six servings of grain products, such as breads, cereals, pasta and rice, with an emphasis on whole grains.

Whole grains are natural sources of complex carbohydrates, dietary fiber, and other food components linked to good health. These foods are generally low in fats, and by choosing the suggested amounts, you are likely to increase carbohydrates and decrease the fats as well as calories in your diet.

Dietary fiber is found in whole-grain breads and cereals, dry beans and peas, vegetables and fruits. Eating foods with dietary fiber is important for proper bowel function and can reduce the symptoms of chronic constipation, diverticular disease and hemorrhoids. It may have benefits in prevention and treatment of chronic diseases such as cancer of

the colon, diabetes and coronary artery disease.

Do most people eat enough fiber daily?

In a recent USDA nationwide survey of consumer knowledge and attitudes about diet and health, eight to 10 thought it was important to eat foods with adequate fiber. Five of 10 thought they were getting enough fiber, perhaps because they had been trying to increase fiber and had now achieved their goal.

However, recent food consumption studies show both men and women get about half the amount of fiber recommended by some nutrition experts (women get about 11 grams and men about 15 grams per day.)

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# MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

## CHESS OR CALVIN BALL

In the game of business the customer is king. In the game of chess the objective is to capture your opponent's king. In both games, you lose when your competitor captures your king.

You can also compare the game of business to chess in other ways. Players have the same opportunity to move and find a position of strength. They can also plan their strategy far into the future. In addition, if you make a stupid move it's likely that your opponent will take advantage of it.

Unfortunately, the similarity ends there. The real-life game of business is more likely the game of Calvin Ball. Bill Watterson, the creator of the Calvin and Hobbes cartoon strip, conceived the game of Calvin Ball for Calvin and his imaginary tiger pal Hobbes. The only rules are: 1) There are no rules, and

2) You can't play the same way twice.

### Calvin chess

Maybe we should call the new game of business Calvin Chess. Opportunities still exist to capture "King Customer" and good strategies can still pay off. However, in Calvin Chess the pieces no longer have fixed moves and if you don't move quickly your opponent may make there of four moves while you're thinking. In Calvin Chess you not only have to manage resources and strategies, but you also have to manage velocity.

The old business rules no longer apply. The best practices of today become the mediocre models of tomorrow. Wal-Mart president and CEO, David Glass, summed it up in a recent speech to the National Retail Federation. He said, "All concepts of doing business are changing." Indeed they are.

How can small businesses survive? How do you compete in a mega-competitor world? How do you overcome economies of scale, billion dollar buying power and marketplace momentum?

It may not be as difficult as you think. It is not impossible as some anti-big business experts would lead you to believe. Actually, smaller businesses have some very strategic advantages. For example, no big company can be closer to their customers, no large firm can adapt strategy as quickly, no mega chain can change operational tactics daily and intelligence is not related to size.

### Change the rules

Here are some thoughts for beating your competitors in the new game of Calvin Chess. Remember, you're in charge and you can change the rules.

- **Ignore conventional business practice.** Become ruthless and make changes. Don't accept "we've always done it that way" as an answer for anything. Reinvent, raise your aim, get out of your rut and push the envelope. You may have to work harder, but keep your focus

on being quick and smart. Find ways to serve your customers better with less. Learn to love change. Believe you can. Henry Ford said, "Whether you think you can, or think you cannot, you're right." Walt Disney said, "It's fun to do the impossible."

Both of these men changed the world they lived in. Both made their customers happy. You can, too, if you be come convinced you can.

**Leave your comfort zone.** Changing the rules always makes us uncomfortable. Courage on the battlefield does not mean that we don't experience fear and anxiety. Rather, courage is entering the battle despite those feelings.

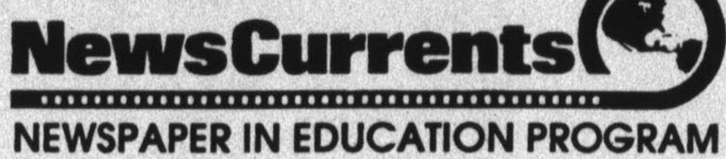
Ask yourself these questions: "If I don't serve the customer more effectively, who will?" and, "If I don't do it now, when will I?"

**Protect your king.** Don't lose sight of your objective because the rules are changing. Calvin Chess - business - is still about pleasing customers. You can only guarantee a winning position when you're protecting your king - customer. Stay focused on achieving the results you want while working hard to please your customers and press onward.

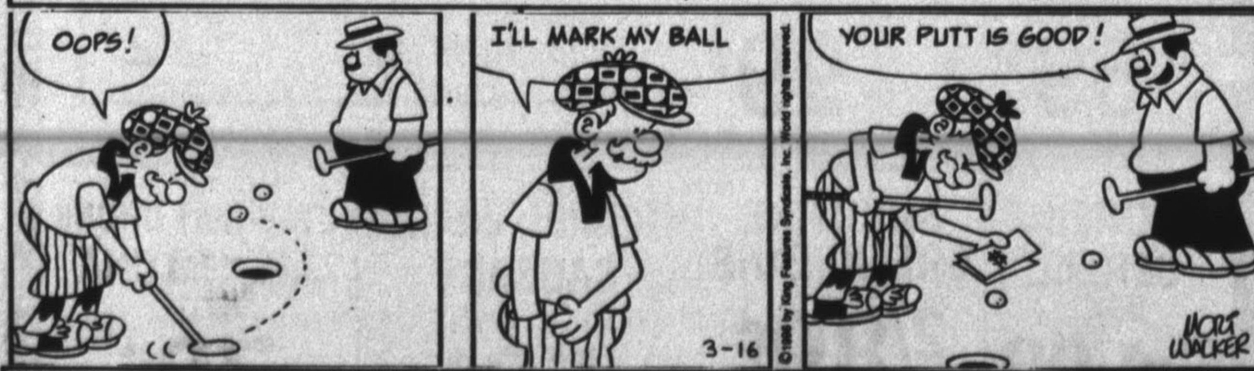

## Red Cross Update

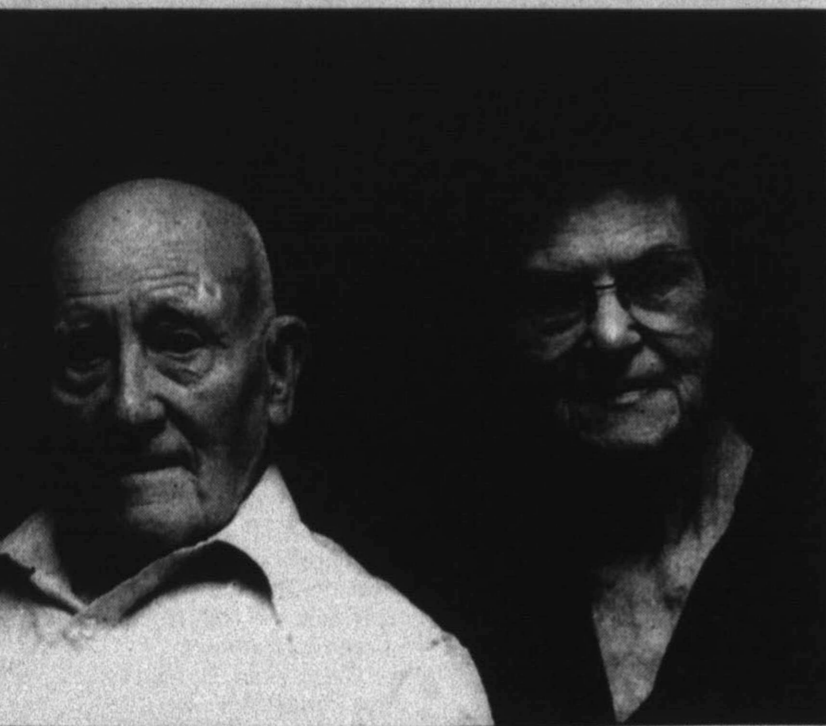

There were 3,929 Red Cross workers helping the 3,600 families who applied for assistance.

The Red Cross has assisted 548 families after the Weyauwega, Wis., train derailment. The Red Cross is meeting emergency needs such as clothing, infant care items, health care items, and food. The Wisconsin Central, LTD, is providing help through a contribution to the Red Cross.

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## WTA&M nursing students to conduct farm research

The West Texas A&M University Division of Nursing faculty members and graduate students are conducting research in four Panhandle counties to create greater awareness about farm health.

The WTAMU nursing group will conduct interviews with 650 far women to determine their level of awareness and concern about a variety of health and injury risks. Telephone surveys of farm/ranch households in Deaf Smith County will begin March 25.

The telephone surveys will include questions about women's health issues, family farm operations and family injuries within the last 12 months. Lana Starke, coordinator of farm studies and instructor of nursing, estimates the phone survey will last between 30 and 45 minutes. Calls will be made on Saturdays and weeknights. "We will be talking to women because they have a greater awareness of health matters and are in charge of their family's health," Starke said. "We want to encourage those who receive a phone call at a time that is inconvenient to reschedule."

Starke expects the group will find more injuries occur than are reported. After completing the surveys, the Division of Nursing plans to conduct small group interviews.

Finally, the WTAMU faculty members hope to organize a coalition of women in each county that will meet regularly to distribute educational information, promote behavior changes and encourage healthy practices. WTAMU faculty members participating in the project also hope the research will increase opportunities for WTAMU nursing students to work in rural areas while gaining hands-on experience.

The WTAMU study was prompted by a national study that found farmers and farm workers account for 14 percent of work-related deaths while representing less than 2 percent of the U.S. population and work force. Agriculture is ranked one of the three most dangerous occupations in the United States, according to a 1989 study by the National Coalition for Agriculture Safety and Health.

The Division of Nursing will also conduct studies in Gray, Carson and Swisher counties. The Southwest Center for Agricultural Health, Injury Prevention and Education (SW Center) is sponsoring the project along with WTAMU. The SW Center is one of seven Centers established by the National Institute of Occupational Safety and Health. The SW Center serves Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Texas.

## California firm really 'digs' its earthworms

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) - In these tawny hills high above city traffic, the road comes to a dusty end, marked by hexagonal caution signs that say, "Worm Crossing."

The worms don't really cross the road. Why would they want to?

Probably no worms on the planet have such an easy life as the 75 million earthworms that reside here at Canyon Recycling, which produces a material to improve the soil of gardens and lawns, like fertilizer.

Actually, the worms do the producing.

The worms are fed the leftovers of horticulture, the leaves and grass and chewed-up branches and other green waste that would otherwise clog landfills and create odors.

With the help from the microbes that inhabit their digestive tract, the worms defecate what are called worm castings. This worm manure makes excellent soil or soil additives, holding moisture better, making nutrients readily available for plants.

The science is not new. Vermiconversion, or using earthworms to convert waste into soil additives, has been done on a relatively small scale for some time.

"But nobody's done it on a large commercial scale," says John Beerman, the general manager of the operation.

The soil additive is marketed in the form of mulch or compost or vermicompost, either in bulk or in bags. A 55-pound package sells for \$7.

Canyon Recycling, which was started in January 1994, now handles 100 to 125 tons of green waste a day.

"The worm that we use is Eisenia foetida, which is the Midwestern redworm or the red wiggler," Beerman says. "They're a very active worm, very prolific, have a great appetite and live up to 10 years, which is quite amazing."

The more you feed them, the faster they grow.

Canyon's 75 million worms are out in the 20 windrows, each 20 feet wide and 250 feet long, that constitute the farm. There is a pound of worms for each cubic foot of windrow.

Since wriggly worms are tough to count, worm growers deal in worm weight, measured by the pound. When pressed, Beerman says, "You'll get about 1,000 worms per pound."

Each worm is morphaditic or hermaphraditic, which means it carries both male and female sex organs. This makes reproduction convenient.

"This is perfect because every worm they meet is a potential mate," Beerman says. "They can't miss. They really just sit around and have sex and eat."

An adult earthworm will lay one or two cocoons a week and out of those cocoons can come one to 10 earthworms. It may take 10 days for that cocoon to hatch and another 30 days for those worms to become mature enough to start laying cocoons.

"So if things are really going right, between the time an earthworm is born to the time it can hatch more earthworms is about 60 days."

The laboratory experts say if

everything is perfect you can double your earthworm weight every 60 days. But for the men who have their hands in the windrows like Beerman, there is a certain conservatism.

He figures that the doubling occurs every 120 days.

Canyon Recycling has a vermiculture operation here for replacement worms and a reproductive facility in Yelm, Wash., where the sole aim is worm production to supply future operations.

"Up there," Beerman says, "we'll have from 25,000 to 100,000 pounds of worms depending on the time of year and how many we've harvested. We just delivered 5,000 pounds from Yelm to Temicula, Calif., where we're starting another vermiculture operation."

"We can't make enough earthworm castings to meet our demand here," he says.

"We put a price of \$10 a pound on these earthworms. Most of the time sellers would want more than that. They would want \$15 to \$25 a pound."

In his conservative way, Beerman figures he feeds his 75,000 pounds of earthworms about 15 to 20 tons of green waste every day. "And we harvest that much out every day. Now when we expand the herd (yes, herd), we want up to 100,000 tons."

Canyon Recycling was the beneficiary of the failure of another earthworm operation. North of nearby Escondido, the Fallsbrook Sanitary District had an efficient operation which pre-dated Canyon's by five years. They blended green waste with sewer sludge, that evil-smelling leftover after sewage has been treated.

They fed the mixture to the worms and "they did a phenomenal job of taking care of that waste," Beerman says. But the project was doomed by its own success.

"The communities began growing up around the sewage facility and some developers put up houses adjacent to the sewage treatment plant."

This created odor problems and the resulting public outcry forced the operation to shut down.

So Canyon Recycling bought the Fallsbrook herd.

"We don't do sludge here," Beerman says. "We are not permitted to and we will probably never do any. But there are other sites in the city that we are looking into and also other areas in California."

Besides the worm operation, Beerman's company uses huge, noisy grinders to chew up and compost cruder mixes, which are then sold back to the city and landscapers as mulch and cogeneration fuels.

Behind all this was a state law which required municipalities to divert 25 percent of their solid waste away from landfills by the end of 1995. They did this, but that was the easy part - cans, newspapers, glass - or it was material that had to be recycled anyway, like concrete, asphalt, wallboard.

"By the end of the year 2000, cities have to come up with another 25 percent of landfill diversion," says Beerman. "The next 25 percent is going to be much harder to achieve. That's where outfits like Canyon Recycling come in. We're a zero discharge entity. We are 100 percent recycled. We don't bury anything."

"Nothing is wasted."

## Africanized honey bees get bum rap

WASHINGTON (AP) - When those dread "killer bees" began heading northward from Brazil a quarter-century ago, headlines buzzed with undocumented tales of terror.

It's been 5-1/2 years since the creatures - technically, Africanized honey bees - first crossed the Rio Grande into the United States, and they have not lived up to their billing. "Africanized honey bees are actually a far cry from the image of

the fearsome marauders constantly hunting for human victims that media hype has created," Hachiro Shimanuki writes in the March issue of Agricultural Research magazine.

"What is true is that they are more defensive and generally will sting more - with less provocation - than the European-descended honey bees that are common in the United States."

The hybrids are causing some

problems for U.S. farmers. They are harder to transport to fields and orchards because of their temperament. They don't store as much honey as the more-common European varieties. In fact, an Agriculture Department study of the killer bees in Mexico discovered that if they are overly disturbed in their hives they will leave and take their honey with them.

Farmers in Texas, Arizona, New Mexico, California, Puerto Rico and St. Croix, Virgin Islands, are having to learn to live with the hybrid bees. There is no way to wipe them out without killing the European bees that are essential to agriculture.

More than 90 crops - about \$20 billion worth a year - require pollination by honey bees. "One mouthful in three of the U.S. diet directly or indirectly involves bee-pollinated crops," USDA notes.

USDA scientists found that swarms of feral bees became Africanized very quickly when the hybrids moved into Mexico. In 1988, none of the sampled swarms were Africanized; in less than three years, nearly 100 percent were.

Less than six years after Texas was invaded, the bee population is highly Africanized. And beekeepers there are having to deal with it.

"I'm wearing gloves now all the time, when I used to handle bees with bare hands," William Vanderput of Pharr, Texas, told Agricultural Research. "The Africanized bee is unpredictable; you don't know when or what provokes them. These bees are moody."

Vanderput said the invasion has raised his costs by as much as 25 percent. He uses the recommended method of minimizing Africanization - routinely replacing the queen bees in a colony with queens that have not bred with the killer bees.

USDA researchers at Weslaco, Texas, are using the Mexican experience to test chemicals that might keep the killer bees away from humans. The best they've found so far are common mosquito repellants.

But there's a catch: The chemicals have to be sprayed in a fine mist directly onto the bees. "Just spraying your clothes didn't do any good," said entomologist Anita Collins.

Jose Santos Rodriguez, who manages 1,600 bee colonies in Allende, Nuevo Leon, Mexico, says the killer bees force him to wear a veil and gloves, but he isn't scared. He's even found something good to say about the hybrids: "People who used to steal some of my honey don't anymore."

## Agriculture Briefs

WASHINGTON (AP) - Boosting the yield of forage in alfalfa fields can be as easy as interseeding sweet sorghum or a sorghum-Sudangrass hybrid.

A study by Agricultural Research Service scientists found that interseeding raised forage yields by 45 percent on high-value land near Ames, Iowa, and by 28 percent on land of lesser quality near Chariton, Iowa.

"With that much extra yield, we calculated a farmer could break even with production costs when the forage's value was \$47.70 per ton at the central Iowa site or \$50.16 in southern Iowa," said Dwayne R. Buxton, a plant physiologist with the ARS.

Growing pure stands of alfalfa would require a value of \$63.46 and \$71.03, respectively, for the farmer to break even, Buxton said.

The higher yields were accomplished without commercial nitrogen fertilizer, even while conserving soil. But adequate soil moisture is necessary for sorghum to grow in established alfalfa or reed canarygrass, Buxton said.

Also considered essential to successful interseeding was a power slot mulcher to prepare a narrow sorghum seedbed and to apply a band of herbicide.

Grown by itself as an annual row crop, sorghum may produce heavily but fail to protect soil from erosion as well as alfalfa and other cool-weather crops.

In the five-year tests, erosion loss on the sloping land near Chariton was

more than 14 tons per acre when sorghum was grown as a row crop. Interseeding held erosion to less than 1 ton.

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) - The widely used fumigant methyl bromide will remain available to California farmers at least through 1997.

A bill extending the March 30 deadline for using the chemical is awaiting Gov. Pete Wilson's signature. The state legislature completed action on it last week.

A 1984 law gave chemical firms until 1991 to complete health-risk studies of pesticides.

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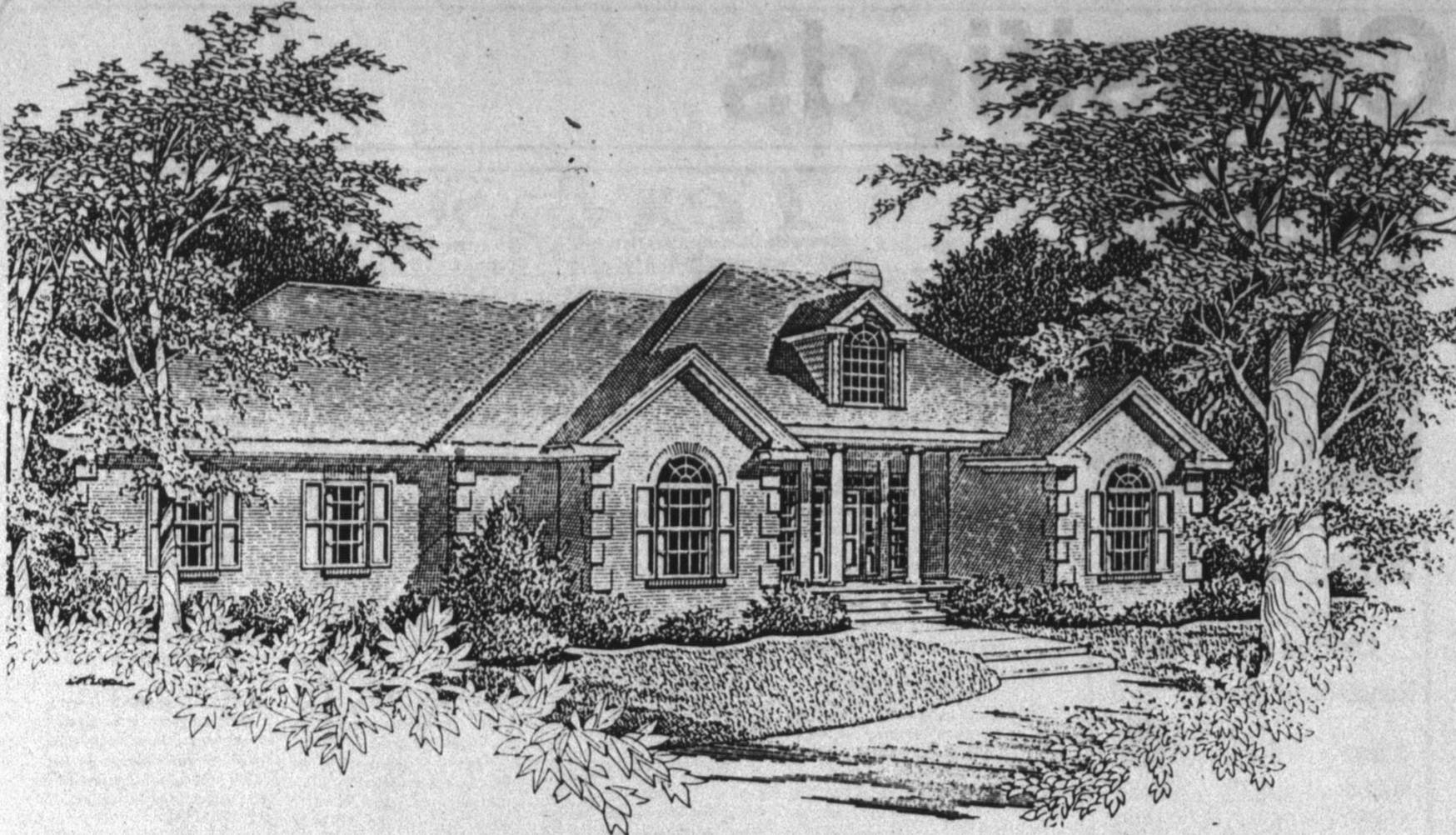

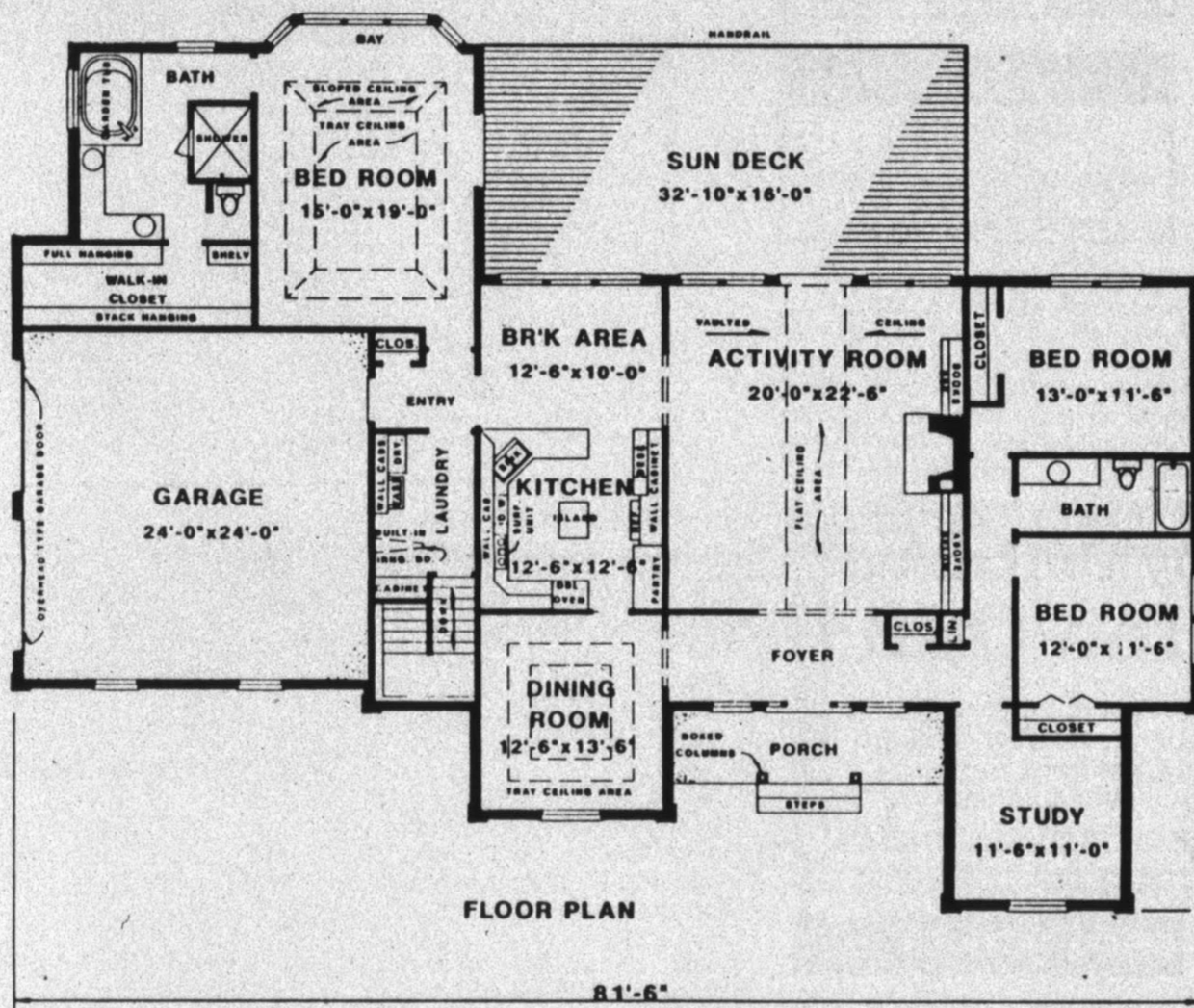

## Home office offers unique opportunity

Early predictions were that working at home would give people more scope to be themselves. To a degree, that's true. But more than that, one magazine editor says, the attending technology has created a new worker category: One who works any time, any place the mood strikes.

Just how much freedom one can have while working at home depends a great deal on the task.

"You can read at the beach," Paul Cornell says. "But if you are doing computer work, you need a work surface."

As manager of behavior and environmental research for Steelcase Inc. in Grand Rapids, Mich., Cornell studies what makes for an optimum work environment. He says there's

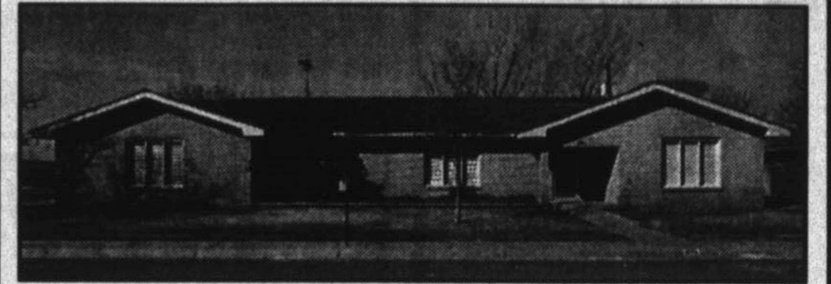
something to be said for work space to call your own at home.

"It can be made off-limits to the kids, it puts you in the mood to work, it separates work space from family space, and you gain some privacy," he says. "A common theme is 'leave me alone.'"

Beyond privacy, desirable features in a home office are adequate lighting and ventilation and correct height for the work surface and chair. When using the keyboard, for example, your forearms should be roughly parallel to the floor. A chair that tilts and supports the lower back also is a plus, but the executive desk is a dinosaur.

"People tend to like wraparound desks, such as a U-shape, an L-shape or a shallow C," Cornell says.

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## Know kind of wall before hanging objects

How you hang an object depends on how heavy it is and the kind of wall you're hanging it on.

Most interior walls are plaster or wallboard over wood or metal studs, or some type of masonry.

### Hollow Walls: On the Stud

On a hollow wall, it's best to attach an object to a stud whenever possible.

- Use a common nail or a wood screw long enough to go through the fixture and wall and well into the stud. For a screw, first drill a pilot hole slightly smaller than the screw's diameter.

- Secure a heavy object with a lag

bolt - a heavy-duty screw with a square head. Drive it in with a wrench. Or use a hanger bolt - one end is threaded like a wood screw, the other accepts a nut.

- Use a sheet metal screw to fasten to a metal stud. Drill through the wall up to the stud. Dent the metal with a punch. Then drill a small pilot hole.

### Hollow Walls: Between Studs

For a hollow wall between studs, the more fasteners used, the better. For all but the lightest loads, use at least two fasteners.

- To determine what length hollow-wall fastener to use, you need to find the wall's thickness. Drill a small hole, insert a 6-penny common nail head first. Pull the nailhead against the inside of the wall. Mark

the nail where it comes out of the wall. Then pull out the nail and measure the distance.

- Use plastic anchors only for very light loads.

- For medium loads, install hollow-wall anchors. Drill a hole the same size as an anchor, insert it and tighten the screw to flatten the end of the anchor against the inside of the wall. Then take out the screw and attach the object to the anchor.

- Toggle bolts will hold even more weight. Put a bolt through the fixture, screw the spring-loaded wings onto the bolt, then drill a hole and slip the wings through it. When the wings spring open, tighten the bolt to pull the open wings against the inside of the wall.

### Masonry Walls

- Attach boards that will carry light loads with masonry nails or cut nails. Because these nails tend to split

wood, first drill a hole in the board for each nail.

CAUTION: Wear safety goggles when fastening to masonry walls. Drive out masonry or other hardened nails with a hardened steel hammer or light sledge. They snap easily when not struck properly and can chip a cast-iron hammer, causing flying metal particles.

- To attach an object to a solid masonry wall, drill a pilot hole the length and diameter of the anchor. Use a carbide-tipped bit in a variable-speed, half-inch electric drill. Clean out the hole before tapping in the anchor.

- Use a plastic or fiber plug or a plastic anchor for a light load and a lead anchor for a heavier one. For heaviest loads, use an expansion shield.

- If a fastener is to carry a heavy load, don't install it in the mortar between masonry blocks.

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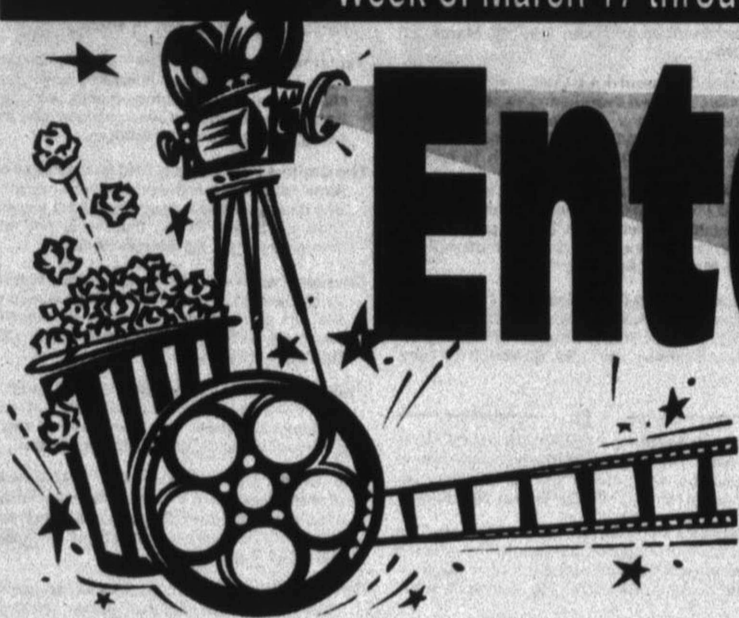

Pairs skaters Meno and Sand get set for World competition



Jenni Meno and Todd Sand, the reigning U.S. national champion pairs figure skaters, are among the competitors this week in the *World Figure Skating Championships*. ABC has coverage of the pairs, men's, ladies' and ice dance finals Thursday and Saturday.

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Skaters from California to China travel to Alberta, Canada, this week to compete for the top titles in the *World Figure Skating Championships*.

Like most of the competitors, Meno and her partner, Todd Sand, begin training way in advance. In a way, Meno says, they prepare for this all year.

"You use the same programs you use through the year, so you're kind of building for (this) all through the skating season."

A lot of work goes into creating a routine for a skating event, Meno says.

"We get in the rink at 8:30 a.m. and skate until 1 p.m. We spend time doing our lifts on the floor, and in the gym working with weights and working on our stamina. And part of the year we take ballet lessons."

After finding music to skate to, the couple starts working with their coach and a choreographer.

"We try to present our programs as a complete package. We don't try to emphasize one element or one part of our skating," Sand says.

This package concept even includes their costumes.

"We have someone design (each costume) so it fits the music and the way we skate and it doesn't distract from our skating," Meno explains.

Meno and Sand have learned there are special elements pairs skaters need to take into account.

"We have to have every step and every finger matching," Meno says.

"If you're a single skater and you're going too slow and need an extra push, you can adjust. But if one of us adjusts and the other didn't know about it, you've got a problem," Sand adds.

Sand also says communication is a big factor in pairs skating.

"Not just talking, either. I also mean the look and how we relate to each other and to the audience. We really take that seriously," he says.

"We skate very much to each other instead of performing to the crowd," Meno adds. "I think there's something between us when we're skating."

There's something between them off the ice, too. In fact, they were married last July.

"I think for us it's worked out well," Meno says. "I think we know each other so well and we've learned a lot about each other since we've been married. It's nice in competition being out there with someone you care about and knowing they're there for you if you fall down or if it doesn't go the way you want it to."

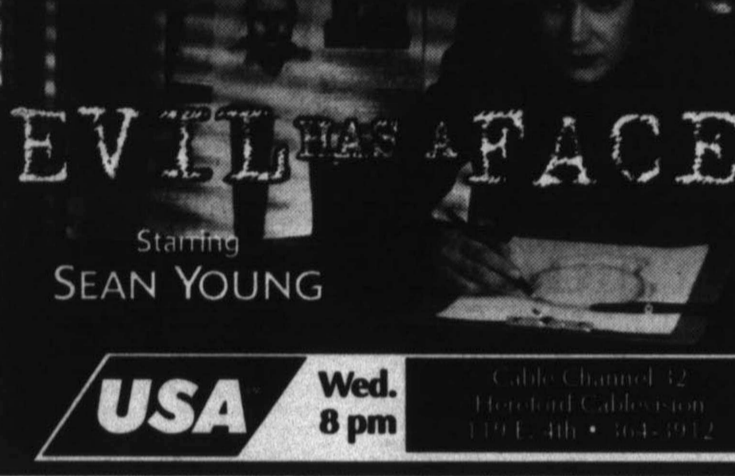

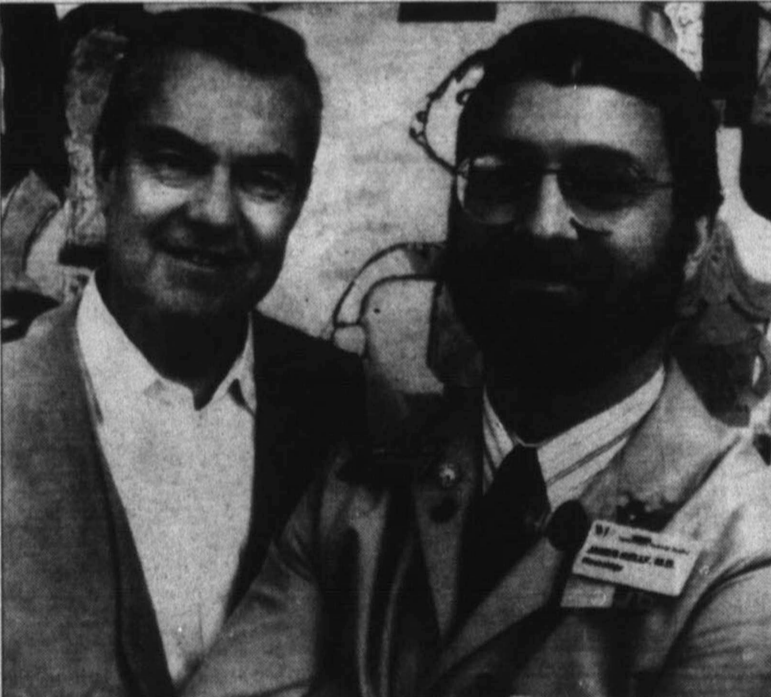



Stafford says her co-star Michael Damian, who portrays Danny, is an angel and has helped her adjust to the fast pace of daytime. "He's an incredible human being," Stafford says.

*I Love Lucy* (1951-57) and *The Andy Griffith Show* (1960-68) each went off the air when they were No. 1 in the ratings.

Working in daytime is hard, and Stafford has grown to appreciate some of the other actors and actresses in the field. She is quick to point out two of the best on her own show.

"There are so many great actresses on daytime. Jess Walton (Jill) is fantastic," Stafford says. "Melody Thomas Scott (Nikki) is terrific, and she is highly underrated."

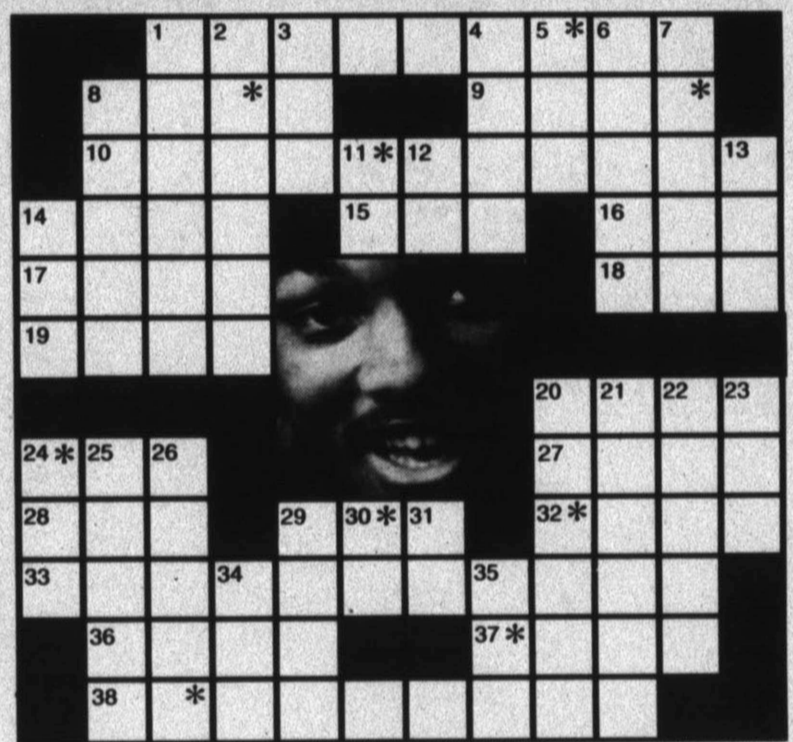

"Those things can just switch you to say, 'You know what? It's time for me to go, people,'" he said. "I've done all I wanted to do here."

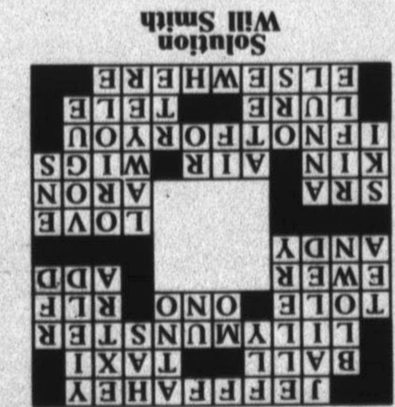
