

State issues final offer to secessionists

Americans reap benefits of low-inflation economy

Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON (AP) - The nation's unemployment rate sank to a near 24-year low of 4.9 percent in April as Americans reaped the benefits of a robust,

low-inflation economy. The stunning drop reported by the Labor Department today, from a seasonally adjusted 5.2 percent a month earlier, came despite a second month of modest growth in employer's payrolls. They increased by 142,000 jobs in April after a downwardly revised gain of 139,000 in March.

The rate, propelled by decreased joblessness for both whites and blacks, was the lowest since December 1973 when Richard Nixon was president and years before workers now in their 20s and 30s obtained their first fulltime jobs.

The stock market rose in early trading, shrugging off inflation worries.

"Our economy is now the strongest it has been in a generation," President Clinton told reporters before leaving the White House to dedicate the Franklin D. Roosevelt memorial.

The economy in 1997 has virtually exploded, with a decade-high growth rate of 5.6 percent in the first quarter and large additions to payrolls of 314,000 in February and 259,000 in January.

And the growth has been accomplished without a noticeable acceleration in inflation in consumer goods prices.

"This is an American worker's joy," said economist Allen Sinai of Primark Decision Economics. "This myth that the American worker is an unhappy camper went away eight to 10 months ago. There are plenty of jobs available and American workers have many more choices than any time in the last two decades.

Wall Street initially didn't quite know what to make of the report. Bond prices rallied at first in reaction to the smaller-than-expected payroll gain but quickly sank back. Stocks advanced, with the Dow Jones average of industrial stocks rising 45 points

to 7,021 in the first half hour. Separately, the Index of Leading Economic Indicators, released by the New York-based Conference Board, rose 0.1 percent in March, a sign of modest

but continued economic growth. Strong growth early in the year prompted the Federal Reserve to begin tightening monetary policy to pre-emptively quash inflation pressures before they emerge. It raised short-term interest rates by a quarter percentage point on March 25 and generally is expected to engineer a similar increase when Fed policy-makers

meet next on May 20.

Despite the relatively modest job growth for April, which is derived from a survey of businesses, signs of a booming job market abounded. At factories, the average workweek edged a tenth of an hour higher to 42.2 hours, matching the post-World War II low of January 1995. Overtime at factories inched to five hours, the highest level since the government's began tracking that figure

And some of the factors dampening the growth of employer payrolls were temporary, including heavy spring snows in the Northeast and Upper Midwest and flooding in Plains states. As a result, construction payrolls lost 44,000 jobs in April but could be expected to rebound later in the

Among demographic groups, the unemployment rate fell from 4.4 percent to 4.2 percent for adult men; from 4.7 percent to 4.4 percent for adult women; from 4.5 percent to 4.2 percent for whites; from 10.7 percent to 9.8 percent for blacks; from 8.8 percent to 8.1 percent for Hispanics, and from 16.4 percent to 15.4 percent for teen-agers of both sexes and all races.

The report showed average hourly earnings for non-supervisory workers fell a penny to \$12.14. That was up 3.6 percent from \$11.72 a year earlier.

Senate proposal cuts property tax less, but has fewer state tax hikes program," Armbrister said

AUSTIN (AP) - Texas homeowners would get less of a property tax cut but face fewer state tax hikes under a Senate proposal that's notably different from a House-backed plan to lower local school property levies.

The Senate proposal, released Thursday, would lower average property taxes for Texas residents and businesses from about \$1.47 cents per \$100 in property value to roughly \$1.30 per \$100 - a cut of 17 cents per \$100, according to fiscal analysis. That includes school taxes for maintenance and operation and taxes

for school debt. The overall cut would be about House total plan of \$5 billion every two years.

Texans in school districts with higher property taxes would see higher savings than those in districts with lower school property taxes, according to chief sponsor Sen. Ken Armbrister, D-Victoria.

The House plan would cut the average school property tax for maintenance and operation by about center. Voters should present their 60 cents per \$100 on residential property. It would cut the tax by about 24 cents per \$100 on business property. 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

Potent Trojans breeze to **Cuby Kitchens Classic title**

The Texas Trojans have a lot in common with the Chicago Bulls. They're nearly unbeatable when they're hitting on all cylinders.

Make no mistake about it, they were hitting on last weekend as they breezed to the 15-year-old championship in the Fifth Annual Cuby Kitchens Basketball Classic.

Just how impressive were the Trojans? Consider these numbers if you will:

- No team came closer than 13 points in their four game sweep.

- The Trojans averaged 80 points

- They allowed their opposition a

mere 53.5 points. The Trojans, who will be competing in the AAU championships this summer in Orlando, Florida, nailed down the 1997 Kitchens Classic by sailing through

four straight contests. Trojans 72, Am. Razorbacks 59

The Trojans, who sport four Whiteface standouts on their roster, claimed their 1997 title with an impressive effort against the Amarillo Razorbacks. The Trojans, thanks in part to excellent games from Slade Hodges, Cody Hodges and Chayse Rives, hammered out a 72-59 victory Shooters 49, Metro Stars 46 in the finals.

Slade Hodges paced the Hereford quartet in scoring with eight points. whisper of the girl's 15-year-old Cody Hodges and Rives chipped in championships this past weekend. seven points apiece.

in trouble with NCAA again DALLAS (AP) - Texas-El Paso's basketball coaching staff." In that troubled athletic program is in trouble case, the NCAA found the program again with the NCAA. UTEP was placed on probation for

five years Thursday after investigators found several violations that David Swank, chairman of the NCAA Committee on Infractions, characterized as relatively minor but rampant.

Swank said the violations concerned grade-average calculations, athletes' free use of departmental copying machines, overall institutional compliance and other

"In most cases, they were not willful or intentional, but there was a lack of paying attention to the rules," he said in a conference call. "The (academic eligibility) certification problems were widespread and extended over a number of years."

Most of the violations concerned competition by academically ineligible players. Sometimes the players were no longer in classes for which they had registered and thus were below the 12-class-hour minimum; in other cases, their grades were incorrectly calculated.

In one case, the NCAA said, the school learned in December 1995 that a male basketball player's grades were too low, but did not declare him ineligible until March 1996.

The NCAA said the violations were found in football, men's and women's basketball and women's rifle. In addition to probation, the school faces limits on athletic scholarships; forfeiture of games in which ineligible athletes competed; requirements that coaches and administrators attend NCAA compliance seminars; and recertification of athletic policies and practices.

UTEP president Diana Natalicio said she was surprised and disappointed by the penalties in light of actions already taken to correct what she conceded were systemic problems. She also said the school would appeal the penalties.

"I think we tried very hard to be responsive," she said, citing the departures of several administrators, the hiring of an assistant athletic director for compliance and other changes. "We may have been inept, but I don't think there was ever any evidence that anyone was trying to gain an advantage" on the field.

Karl Benson, commissioner of the Western Athletic Conference, said he could not comment on the fairness of the sanctions.

"I would say they're definitely severe, surprisingly severe maybe is a better way to say it," Benson said. 'The WAC stands ready to support UTEP .

UTEP was placed on three years probation in 1991 after the NCAA found what Swank described Thursday as "a rather casual attitude toward compliance by the men's

violated recruiting rules and that players received improper gifts from boosters.

"Problems still continued to exist," he said. "These resulted in the violations in this case, in a

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





Bush, who grew up in Connecticut, moved to Texas in 1948, represented the state in Congress and returned to Houston after losing his bid for re-election in 1992.



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

-- Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual when you write. Be sure to include a phone number and the best times to reach you.

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




