



## Excellent increases in scores seen by board in TAAS report

A report showing students in Hereford schools made overall excellent increases in scores on academic achievement tests was one of several items presented to the Hereford Independent School District Board of Trustees at their regular meeting Thursday evening.

Nena Veazey, curriculum director and acting superintendent, showed the board several dozen charts indicating that in most grades at all schools involved in the annual TAAS testing, students had big improvements over the previous year's scores in math and reading with smaller gains in writing.

Some of the largest gains in math scores were shown in students moving from third to fourth grades where scores increased from 67 to 90 in one year.

### Other math gains were:

- 5th to 6th grade, 70 to 84;
  - 6th to 7th grade, 73 to 76;
  - 7th to 8th grade, 66 to 71;
  - 8th grade to exit level, 63 to 78;
  - Overall gains were 63 to 86.
- Reading gains included:
- 4th grade, 65 to 84;
  - 5th grade 74 to 84;
  - 7th grade, 72 to 76.

Additional results will be published later.

The board also accepted resignations of eight teachers and the hiring of a half dozen people including a new head band director and vocational director.

Patrick Finkbeiner has been hired as band director at the high school and his wife, Kim, was hired to fill an assistant band director positions. They come to Hereford from teaching positions with the La Porte Independent School District near Houston.

Ernie Eckert was also hired to fill the position of vocational director. He will move to Hereford from a

vocational position at Menard. He has 19 years educational experience.

Other new personnel include Melinda Robins, Bluebonnet; Nikki Self, junior high; and Donna Underwood, Tierra Blanca.

Resignations were accepted from Elise Allen, Stephanie Ducheneaux, Amy Holley, John Klattenhoff, Tamy Garrison, Lloyd Stebbins, LaDonna Stebbins and Lori Thompson. The contract of Kyle Mines was also "terminated for good cause."

### In other action, the board:

- approved a 10 year lease with the veterans associations at a cost of \$13,000 to be paid in 10 equal installments. This is for land on which agriculture students have their projects and is a continuation of a previous lease at the same price.

- accepted and rated "acceptable" a report on the alternative campus (SOAR), presented by Susan Robbins. Her report included graduation rates and goals which were met during the past year.

- gave the administration authority to negotiate contracts with the Region XVI Educational Service Center.
- gave final approval to a change in sick leave policies which allow personnel to request an additional 25 days when certain circumstances are involved.

- accepted a bid from Plains Insurance for student athletic insurance. The bid was \$30,720 and provides for no deductible. With a \$250 deductible the price would have been \$26,720 but Business Manager Don Minchew recommended the higher no deductible bid because the district paid about \$4,000 last year in deductibles "and we had a good year."

The lowest bid submitted came from Commercial Travelers at \$28,413 but Minchew did not recommend this bid because it did not include payment for "unusual and

customary charges" as did the Plains bid. Highest bid was \$91,209 from Life Insurance Co. of North America.

- several general reports were also presented to board members in their meeting packets.

- a request to purchase property from the school district was also taken under consideration and will be placed on the next meeting agenda for action.

GH Realty, acting as agent for Kaye Design, Inc., made the request to purchase property at Morean and Kingwood for construction of a private care facility.

The school district has been offered \$9,000 for the property which is part of an area on which the \$800,000 to \$1 million facility will be constructed. It is estimated such a facility will bring in another \$10,232 yearly in tax revenue to the district.

- heard a request from Lou Serrano on behalf of the Deaf Smith County Juvenile Probation Board for assistance with computer costs at the Youth Home.

He said the juvenile board members did not feel they could afford the \$320 per month fee to connect computers to the internet system now being installed. They were asking that the home be considered "like any other school" because the computers will be used in an educational environment.

Serrano also said the juvenile board was considering a daytime treatment program for some youths who would not have to stay overnight in the facility. Currently the home is planning a large expansion project which will triple the size of its classroom teaching area.

- approved minutes of previous meetings and ratified bills.

- learned from incoming Supt. Jack Patton, who will be on the job July 1, that budget workshops for the next school year will begin the latter part of July.

## Summit opening features economic achievements

### Yeltsin given center stage at kickoff banquet

DENVER (AP) - Eying a historic transformation of the annual Western summits, President Clinton has opened the door of the elite club of industrialized democracies to Boris Yeltsin, according to the Russian leader center stage at the kickoff banquet.

As the host, Clinton is determined to celebrate America's economic achievements and pitch the United States as a model for other nations. At the same time, though, he is paying special attention to Yeltsin by focusing this "Summit of the Eight" on finding ways the Russian president can share in the prosperity.

To help ease Russia's entry into the highest level of global political discussions, Clinton invited Yeltsin to give the opening address at tonight's dinner. Yeltsin will speak about Russia's uneven attempts to move from a Soviet command economy to a free-market system and offer his assessment of how the world's economies have progressed since last year's summit in Lyon, France.

Yeltsin will be the first of three leaders to meet with Clinton today. The others are French President Jacques Chirac and Italian Prime Minister Romano Prodi.

NATO's planned expansion eastward to the Russian border is on the agenda for all three meetings. Yeltsin is not happy about the absorption of former Soviet allies, which his spokesman, Sergei Yastrzhembsky, made clear as the Russian delegation arrived Thursday night.

"NATO expansion is not an issue at this summit," he said. But if NATO comes up, Yastrzhembsky said, "We're ready to share our position, one that is very well known."

For his part, Chirac would like to see Romania invited to the alliance. The Czech Republic, Hungary and Poland are now the three U.S. choices for invitations, which will be issued at a NATO summit in Madrid, Spain, in two weeks.

The shaky peace accords in Bosnia-Herzegovina are another delicate topic. Clinton is likely to urge Yeltsin to pressure Serbia to accelerate a return of refugees and to apprehend war criminals in the Balkans.

He plans similar pitches to Chirac and Prodi. The result may be a unity statement at the banquet asserting a

new resolve to see Bosnia through the peace promised in the Dayton Accords of 1995.

Chirac, on the other hand, may press Clinton on faltering peace efforts in the Middle East. Having met in Paris with Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak, the French leader is expected to warn Clinton that stability in the region is jeopardized.

German Chancellor Helmut Kohl has brought a proposal for a World Environmental Organization, a new U.N. agency that would oversee international environmental agreements.

Clinton's first head-to-head meeting in Denver was with Japanese Prime Minister Ryutaro Hashimoto. Their talks Thursday were complicated by Japan's soaring trade surplus; the U.S. deficit with Japan skyrocketed 5.1 percent in April to \$4.8 billion.

White House spokesman Mike McCurry said Clinton reminded Hashimoto that trade imbalances had

been "a source of real damage" to U.S. relations with Tokyo in the past.

On his arrival, Clinton announced a trade breakthrough - a deal reached at 4 a.m. Thursday in Washington that will allow the United States to monitor Japanese deregulation efforts in high-tech industries.

The achievement symbolized Clinton's stance at the summit.

"We have chosen to reach outward, not to be afraid of competition, to embrace the possibilities of the global economy, and to make sure it works for ordinary American citizens," he said in a speech Thursday staged in front of jumbo satellite dishes at the National Digital Television Center, a symbol of the information age.

Dismissing any argument that U.S. efforts to open markets with 200 trade agreements was ill-advised, Clinton said "we should be doing more of it, not less of it. We ought to bear down and charge into the future and embrace the rest of the world."

## Monthly check dips; yearly total still up

The City of Hereford received a June sales tax rebate of \$76,433 from the state comptroller's office. This month's check is for the 1.5 percent sales tax collected on April sales and reported in May by businesses filing monthly returns.

The check was slightly less than the \$77,769 reported a year ago, but the year-to-date total of \$500,682 is still ahead of the \$499,779 reported at this time last year.

Deaf Smith County received a check for \$27,213 on its half-cent sales and use tax. This compares to a total of \$28,579 in June of 1996. The year-to-date total is \$168,984, slightly below the \$169,473 collected by this time last year.

John Sharp, state comptroller, reported that a total of \$161.6 million in sales tax payments were issued in June to 1,089 Texas cities and 117 counties.

"So far this year, Texas

allocations are running 5.5 percent ahead of those for the first six months of last year, once again indicating that our economy is continuing its strong, steady climb," Sharp said.

The City of Houston again led all cities with a rebate of \$19.8 million, which was 4.7 percent higher than last year. Dallas was next at \$12.8 million - a 2.3 percent increase.

In this area, Lubbock collected \$1.8 million on its 1.125 percent sales tax - down about one percent from last year. Amarillo's 2 percent tax reaped a rebate of \$2.7 million. This was down 2.8 percent from a year ago.

## Bush exercising fingers signing bills -- more than 1,000 now law

AUSTIN (AP) - Gov. George W. Bush is nearing the end of his part of the state's biennial legislative process and has until Sunday to sign bills into law or veto them.

The governor announced the signing of nearly 100 new state laws on Thursday. Bills approved during the 1997 Legislature become law without his signature if he does not act on them by Sunday.

Of the 1,487 bills lawmakers passed before adjourning June 2, Bush had signed more than 1,000 by Thursday and had vetoed four. Lawmakers also passed 15 proposed constitutional amendments that don't require the governor's signature before going to voters later this year.

The next regular lawmaking session is scheduled to begin in January 1999. No special sessions are expected before then.

Bush spokeswoman Karen Hughes said the governor and his staff are looking over bills as quickly as possible. She said most of those that will be signed will be acted on by Friday.

"Everywhere you go in the governor's office, you see stacks of bills," Ms. Hughes said. "We've been meeting twice a day to go over bills and debate bills and discuss potential vetoes."

Among bills signed Thursday was a measure to give phone customers legal recourse against phone

companies that takeover their service without permission, a practice called "slamming."

The new law takes effect Sept. 1. It will allow the Texas Public Utility Commission to fine a company up to \$5,000 a day for each violation. If the slamming occurs repeatedly, the commission could revoke the company's right to do business in Texas.

Federal law already prohibits a service change without written customers' authorization. Putting the ban into state law means Texans can go to the PUC - which regulates the phone industry in Texas - rather than the Federal Communications

## Temperature soars

## REGIONAL

**DALLAS** - Southern Baptists continued to hammer away at "immoral ideologies" by adopting a resolution opposing the practice of companies giving health benefits to same-sex partners of employees. One day after officially urging its 15 million members to boycott Disney, Southern Baptists overwhelmingly approved a non-binding resolution condemning what it called a "strategy to promote acceptance of the idea that homosexual relationships are morally equivalent" to heterosexual marriages.

**DALLAS** - A new law that calls for deadbeat parents to admit on a marriage license that they owe back child support is just the latest legislation that barks at delinquent parents but never bites, advocates say.

## NATION/WORLD

**WASHINGTON** - Cigarette taxes would rise by 20 cents a pack under a tax bill approved by a Senate tax panel, an increase that would be used to expand health coverage for uninsured children and to scale back proposed higher taxes on airlines tickets.

**NEW YORK** - An exuberant Andrew Lloyd Webber took to the stage and sang a song that was cut from "Cats" as his celebrated feline musical became the longest running show in Broadway history.

**TAMPA, Fla.** - It took jurors less than four hours to convict three friends of manslaughter for removing a stop sign from an intersection where three people were killed the following day. Now a judge will decide whether the friends who admitted to stealing road signs "for a rush" should get a new trial amid claims that prosecutors manipulated evidence and forced a key witness to lie.

**WASHINGTON** - At the driver's license bureau, the welfare office and the corner mailbox, Americans signed up as voters in record numbers last year - then stayed home from the polls in droves.

# Dispute over depots causing GOP rift

## Fate of defense spending bill threatened by controversy

**WASHINGTON (AP)** - Even as the White House is threatening to veto next year's defense spending bill because of a nagging dispute over Air Force depots, the controversy is causing a rift among House Republicans.

In an unusual move Thursday, Rep. Saxby Chambliss, R-Ga., publicly criticized his party leader, House Majority Leader Dick Army, after the Texas Republican intervened at least temporarily on the side of Air Force depots being closed in Texas and California.

Army has drawn the ire of members of the Congressional Depot Caucus, who are backing a plan to compel the Air Force to close the Texas and California depots and send their work to surviving depots in Georgia, Oklahoma and Utah.

After an independent base-closure commission in 1995 recommended the shutdown of Kelly Air Force Base in San Antonio and McClellan AFB in Sacramento, Calif., the Clinton administration responded with a plan to shield thousands of jobs there.

The privatization-in-place plan drew howls of protest from congress-

sional Republicans who accused the White House of subverting the base-closure commission's intent. Supporters contend the panel's language gave the Air Force the leeway to privatize the bases' workloads by allowing private contractors to bid on their work.

The Depot Caucus managed to insert in next year's defense spending bill a measure by Rep. James Hansen, R-Utah, that would end the privatization effort. They also obtained a commitment from Army not to allow amendments that would strike Hansen's language from the bill.

However, faced with being unable to bring the defense bill up because of brewing controversies on several fronts, Army agreed Thursday morning to allow an amendment challenging the Hansen measure.

That drew the swift ire of the Depot Caucus, Chambliss in particular.

The Georgia lawmaker, whose district includes a depot that would benefit from the Kelly and McClellan closures, accused Army of going back on his word.

"What this represents is poor leadership on the part of the majority leader," said Chambliss, who had a heated argument with Army off the House floor Thursday afternoon. "I told him I was disappointed that he made a commitment to us and that commitment was not honored - and I was extremely disappointed, to say the least."

In an interview, Chambliss said Army told him during their argument that he was "being whipsawed by both sides."

A Republican aide offered a differing assessment. "It's Georgia pork versus Texas pork," the staffer said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

Informed of Army's successful intervention, House Speaker Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., attempted to block the amendment but eventually relented. Asked about Gingrich's role in the controversy, Army said with a smile: "I don't remember."

The author of the law that set up the past base-closings rounds, Army has been a vocal critic of the White House's decision to spare Kelly and McClellan. He has accused the

administration of politicizing the base-closings process and said Congress won't authorize future rounds until Kelly and McClellan are closed.

An Army spokeswoman didn't return a call seeking explanation why he intervened on behalf of the Texas and California bases.

Said Chambliss: "I think he's getting a lot of pressure from the Texas delegation, both on the Senate side and the House side. How much that factors into this decision, I don't know."

Even as the House Republicans were feuding, Kelly and McClellan defenders were heartened by the White House veto threat made by Vice President Al Gore during an afternoon meeting with the bases' supporters.

"The veto threat to people who are looking at the big picture and wanting a defense authorization bill is going to, I think, put more pressure on the Depot Caucus to do something that's fair to everyone," Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, R-Texas, said after emerging from the White House.

# Two-year suspension given in TAMU hazing; criminal trials to come

**COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP)** - One of nine Texas A&M students who have been waiting to hear their punishment for involvement in a hazing incident has been informed he has been suspended from school and can't reapply for two years.

Federal laws don't allow university officials to release the names of those involved in disciplinary hearings or say what sanctions were handed down against them.

But the attorney for Dusty Hugh Boyd, 22, said the student was informed Thursday of the suspension.

"They said he's ineligible to apply until 1999," Bryan lawyer Jim James told the Bryan-College Station Eagle. "At that time, an intake coordinator will determine whether it's appropriate for him to return to school and other admission requirements must be met."

The university said it was in the process Thursday of informing all nine students of the actions taken against them.

All served as upper class advisers to the Fish Drill Team, a precision rifle team made up of freshmen.

They were suspended from the Corps in March pending the resolution of multiple charges pursued by the university administration. They were charged as part of a 61-count indictment returned in early May by a Brazos County grand jury.

Each participated in administrative hearings during May and June, including Boyd and Javier Chapa, 21. Those two cadets asked for an open hearing May 22 at which 40 onlookers sat in. The others asked for closed hearings.

Boyd was charged in criminal court with three counts of assault causing bodily injury and three counts of hazing. He's accused of punching and striking three freshmen in the face, head, stomach and body.

Officials said new charges of violating student rules may be issued in coming weeks. The officials declined to elaborate, but said additional charges of hazing discovered during the hearing process have been referred to the University Police Department for investigation.

James said Boyd's letter from Texas A&M doesn't stipulate what specific violations Boyd was found to have committed.

He and five others are accused of ordering a freshman to cut his own arm with a knife.

James, who represents two other cadets, said Thursday afternoon that he had spoken only with Boyd, who would have been a senior but will not be able to complete his education at the university at least until 1999.

James also represents Chapa and Jason Hanson, a 21-year-old who was charged with five counts of assault and six counts of failing to report

hazing. Hanson was the only senior among the nine.

Three others charged in the recent high-profile incidents - Luis A. Torres, 20; Grayson Alexander Hoffman, 20; and Zachary Todd Hoffman, 18 - were scheduled to appear in court at 8:30 a.m. today to enter a plea.

These three cooperated with Brazos County Attorney Jim Kubovick's case before a grand jury, according to court documents. Each was charged with one count of hazing and assault.

Their attorney, Rick Davis, declined to comment on the criminal case and on the punishment assessed by the school.

Travis Bryan, the attorney representing the remaining three cadets, couldn't be reached for comment Thursday.

His clients include Christopher Scott Monk, 19, charged on nine counts of assault and nine counts of hazing; Kyle Raymond Jud, 19, charged with six counts of assault and six counts of hazing; and Austin Poskey, 19, charged with three counts of assault and three counts of hazing.

Monk is accused of kicking a student in the ribs and groin, stomping on his hands and hitting him in the head with a helmet. Jud is accused of smearing blood on a cadet and writing the word, "Death."

# Opportunity Plan offers educational assistance

As costs increase each year at colleges and universities across the country, many families find it difficult to pay for a student's educational expenses. Thanks to the generosity of citizens in Hereford and other Panhandle towns, area students have a source of assistance right in their own backyard.

The Opportunity Plan, Inc. of Canyon provides low-interest loans and scholarships to help students attend the college or university of their choice.

Established in 1954, the program has provided financial assistance to more than 9,000 students. A total of \$2,700,000 is currently on loan to area students. During 1996, a total of \$120,000 in scholarships was awarded through The Opportunity Plan.

Three student loan divisions have been established by Hereford civic groups and individuals through The Opportunity Plan to benefit local students.

In September of 1964, trustees of the Jim Hill Estate established the Jim Hill Memorial Loan Fund. More than 80 students have borrowed from this student loan fund since its inception.

The Hereford Division of the program was established in March of 1972 and has assisted more than 155 students with their educational expenses.

The third loan division which benefits Hereford students is the Emil W. Dettmann Memorial Division. It was established in 1981 by Mrs. Audine Dettmann. Five students have received assistance from this division.

John Aikin of Hereford serves as vice president of The Opportunity Plan board of directors. Mrs. Dettmann also serves on the board, along with fellow Hereford residents Carolyn Baxter and Bonnie Wuerflein.

Loans awarded through the Opportunity Plan carry an interest rate of seven percent. Payments on the loan are deferred and interest is not charged until after graduation as long as the student continues to attend school on a full-time basis. The program has maintained a repayment rate of 98 percent on its loans.

Although slamming arose from the heated competition among long-distance companies, the bill applies to both local and long-distance services. Competition in the local telephone

market is just starting in Texas and is expected to increase over the next few years.

The PUC has until Nov. 1 to develop rules on how telephone companies must get clear authorization from a customer before switching service. The bill permits several methods of authorization, including written notification.

A company could take over a phone line if a customer requested the change by phone and the call was placed from the affected phone line.

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# Evidence that estrogen benefits brain supported by recent study

**BALTIMORE (AP)** - Women who take estrogen long after menopause cut their risk of developing Alzheimer's by 54 percent, according to the largest study so far on possible links between the hormone and the disease.

Of the 45 percent of 472 women who had taken estrogen orally or through skin patches, only nine developed Alzheimer's. Of those who did not take estrogen, 25 developed the disease, researchers found.

The 16-year study, from Johns Hopkins Medical Institutions and the National Institute of Aging, appears today in the journal *Neurology* and supports existing evidence that estrogen can benefit the brain.

"We found that women in our

study on estrogen replacement therapy had a 54 percent reduction in their relative risk of developing Alzheimer's disease," said Claudia Kawas, a Johns Hopkins' associate professor of neurology and a co-leader of the study.

The long-term health information on the women was gathered for NIA's Baltimore Longitudinal Study of Aging.

The study is the largest so far to examine the beneficial link between estrogen therapy and Alzheimer's, the irreversible brain disorder that kills about 100,000 people every year in the United States.

Production of estrogen, the female hormone, drops sharply after women

reach menopause. The study concluded that there may be several mechanisms by which taking estrogen may reduce the risk of Alzheimer's disease.

Among them: It may stimulate growth of nerve cells; inhibit levels of the fatty acid apolipoprotein E, which is closely linked to heart disease and Alzheimer's; act as an antioxidant; and increase levels of acetylcholine, an important transmitter of nerve messages in the brain.

Previous research has found that estrogen protects against heart disease, fights brittle bones, decreases the risk of colon cancer and may even help women live longer.

But research also has suggested that women taking estrogen might be at higher risk for breast and uterine cancer if they have family histories of those diseases.

Researchers have long suspected that lack of estrogen might play a role in the onset of Alzheimer's.

"The brain is a major target for estrogen, as important as the breast, bones or the cardiovascular system," said neurologist C. Dominique Toran-Allerand of the Columbia College of Physicians & Surgeons, who wasn't involved with the research. "So it is not surprising that replacing estrogen in post-menopausal women would have beneficial effects."

In August 1996, a study published in *The Lancet* found that women taking estrogen long after menopause appear to be at least one-third less likely than other women to develop the mind-destroying disease.

More than 4 million Americans suffer from Alzheimer's disease, which robs its victims of their memory and the ability to care for themselves, and eventually kills them.

## Hints from Heloise

Dear Heloise: Please send me the remedy for sprucing up a stainless-steel kitchen sink that has become very dull. — Grace Ellison, Long Beach, Calif.

I'm sorry I can't send you the information directly but am happy to print it for you and everyone else who asks the question.

Baking soda does a good job of cleaning stainless steel because it's safe to use and nonabrasive. Just sprinkle some baking soda on a damp sponge or dishrag and rub the sink, using a circular motion. You can then wash with a mild liquid dishwashing detergent and hot water. Rinse well and dry with a clean soft cloth.

For very stubborn stains, you can buy stainless-steel cleaners, which are found in the cleaning aisle of your local supermarket. Please be sure to read and follow the package directions carefully.

When your sink is clean, just dribble a couple of drops of baby oil

or mineral oil on a paper towel and buff the sink to make it shine like new.

Keep your sink looking good by frequently cleaning it with a damp cloth and drying with a clean soft cloth.

A reminder: Never let foods like mustard, mayonnaise, salt, vinegar and lemon juice sit in the sink because they can corrode the stainless steel.

## Johnson beats Texas again

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) - Randy Johnson is hard to please.

The Seattle star limited Texas to four hits in seven innings and didn't allow an earned run in a 2-1 victory Thursday night. Johnson (11-1) struck out six and only walked one in winning his seventh consecutive game.

Yet, Johnson called the effort in 88-degree heat a B-minus.

Texas couldn't stop Johnson, but the weather almost did. He tired quickly in the early going, regained his strength, and lasted 101 pitches before he turned the ball over to Bobby Ayala, who earned his fifth save.

"The weather zapped me the first couple innings," Johnson said. "I felt tired, then the adrenalin got me going. I'm not a robot out there. That's probably the least number of pitches and innings this year, but I was really beat. The heat was draining."

"My arm and back were tired. I was happy to get out of the game with the lead. That was about my B-minus stuff."

Johnson, now 12-3 for his career against Texas, also beat the Rangers 5-0 in May.

"Michael Jordan is great under pressure and that's the way I want to be," Johnson said. "(Manager) Lou Piniella looks to me in crucial situations and I like to think I succeeded a lot in those situations."

"After losing two games to San Francisco, this is a big win for us against a divisional rival. What better way to start a four-game series than with a win here?"

In the only other American League game Thursday night, the Anaheim Angels beat the Oakland Athletics 4-3.

Piniella got just what he wanted from Johnson in the series opener. "If you want to start out with a win, there's no better guy to have out there than the guy we had out there tonight," Piniella said. "He's the best pitcher in baseball, and I know there are a lot of talented pitchers."

Paul Sorrento, who threw out a runner at the plate in the seventh, and Jay Buhner homered as the Mariners beat Texas ace Ken Hill (4-5).

"I knew I couldn't give up much because I was going against Randy," Hill said. "He beat us at their place and threw the ball well. He can dominate a game. We fought hard and

had our chances."

Sorrento connected in the second inning for his 11th homer. It was his seventh home run at The Ballpark in Arlington, tops among Rangers opponents.

Buhner hit his 18th homer in the seventh, a 393-foot shot into the left-field stands that made it 2-0.

Texas got an unearned run in the seventh, helped by an unusual play.

Juan Gonzalez singled with one out and Will Clark followed with a looper down the left-field line that rolled near the stands. Rob Ducey, who had been sent into the game as a defensive replacement, picked up the ball and tried to throw, but he lost control and the ball fell into the stands.

Gonzalez was given home plate, and Clark, who got credit for a double, took third on Ducey's error.

But the Mariners held the lead with a double play. Dean Palmer hit a grounder to third baseman Russ Davis, who threw to Sorrento at first for the out. Clark then tried to break home, but was nailed on Sorrento's throw to catcher Dan Wilson.

Texas manager Johnny Oates said

Johnson was not as overpowering as usual.

"It didn't look like he was throwing as hard as he did earlier this year," said Oates, ejected in the sixth for arguing a play at first base when Jose Cruz Jr. beat out a hit.

### Angels 4, Athletics 3

Garret Anderson drove in the tying and winning runs with a one-out single in the ninth inning as Anaheim beat Oakland to end a five-game losing streak.

Mike James (4-2) allowed three hits over two innings for the victory - the Angels' 11th of the season in their final at-bat - despite giving up an unearned run that put the A's ahead 3-2 in the top of the ninth.

Darrin Erstad opened the ninth with a single off Buddy Groom, and Oakland closer Billy Taylor struck out Dave Hollins. But Taylor (2-4) walked Orlando Palmeiro and hit Jim Leyritz to load the bases. Mike Mohler then gave up Anderson's game-ending single to left-center field.

Oakland took a 3-2 lead in the top of the inning when Rafael Bournival scored from second base on Leyritz's fielding error at first base.

## Giants enroute to '93 repeat?

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - San Francisco manager Dusty Baker is starting to see similarities between this year's squad and the 1993 Giants team that won 103 games.

That club was led by 20-game winners John Burkett and Bill Swift, and this year's team has featured another pair of dominating pitchers - Shawn Estes and Mark Gardner.

Estes, in his first full major league season, allowed one run on three hits in 7 1/3 innings as the Giants beat the Los Angeles Dodgers 5-2 Thursday night for their fifth straight victory.

Estes (9-2) struck out seven and walked three. He allowed only an infield single by pitcher Pedro Astacio in the third, Billy Ashley's fifth homer in the seventh and a

single by Brett Butler in the eighth.

Estes' victory came one night after Gardner improved to 8-2 with a decision over the Seattle Mariners.

"I told Gardner he caught up with me, so I had to get another win," Estes said. "I think Gardy is pitching the best out of all of us right now, and that gives me someone to compete with."

Baker likes that kind of fraternal rivalry.

"Like Burky and Swift, they kind of play off each other," Baker said. "Next time it's Gardy's turn to get to nine wins. But the main thing is just to win."

In other National League games Thursday, Colorado beat San Diego 8-4, and the New York Mets edged Pittsburgh 7-6.

Estes, who has won his last five decisions, struck out the side in the fifth and got 11 outs on grounders. Other than Ashley's homer and Butler's single, the Dodgers hit only two balls into the outfield off the left-hander.

"All year he's been fabulous," said Bill Mueller, who hit one of the Giants' three homers. "His composure is just so great right now, and his maturity."

Dodgers manager Bill Russell said his hitters accomplished little against Estes.

"We ran into an excellent pitcher who shut us down," Russell said. "He was really very poised out there and had very good control of all his pitches. He showed a lot of confidence out there."

J.T. Snow had an RBI double in the fourth, the first hit off Astacio, and the Giants added three runs in the sixth on a leadoff homer by Stan Javier and a two-run blast by Mueller.

Javier has homered in three straight games for the first time in his career. He has four homers this season, all in the last seven games. Mueller's homer was his second of the year.

Barry Bonds added a solo homer, his 13th of the season, in the eighth.

"I told Barry it's nice to feel like him for a couple of days. It's a good feeling," Javier said. "But I have to

go back to reality. I'm a line drive hitter."

Astacio (3-6), who has lost six straight decisions to tie a career worst, allowed four runs on three hits in 5 2/3 innings. He struck out six and walked five on a blustery night that had some fielders shivering in the wind.

### Rockies 8, Padres 4

At San Diego, Andres Galarraga hit his second three-run homer in 24 hours as Colorado beat the Padres for its first two-game winning streak since winning three straight from May 31-June 2.

Galarraga's 20th homer capped a five-run inning that gave Colorado a 5-2 lead. On Wednesday in Denver, his three-run homer in the ninth forged a 9-9 tie in the Rockies' 10-9 victory over Texas.

Larry Walker, leading the major leagues with a .416 average, went 2-for-5. He had an RBI double in the fifth and a two-run single in the ninth.

Roger Bailey (8-5) was the winner and Danny Jackson (1-4) took the loss, the Padres' fifth straight and 11th in 14 games.

At New York, Jason Hardtke had a one-out single in the ninth inning - the second baseman's first hit of the season - as New York sent Pittsburgh to its third straight loss and eighth in 10 games.

Dale Sveum hit a three-run homer off Mets reliever John Franco (1-1) in the top of the ninth, tying it at 6. Earlier in the inning, Hardtke was wiped out at second base while trying to turn a game-ending double play.

In the bottom half, Ricardo Rincon (2-4) walked Todd Hundley and Carl Everett with one out. Hardtke followed with a single into right-center.

Everett doubled twice and drove in three runs as the Mets took a 6-1 lead after six innings.

Konstantinov and Mnatsakanov remained comatose and in critical condition at Beaumont Hospital in Royal Oak. Mnatsakanov was undergoing surgery late Thursday night to stabilize his spine, which was injured in the accident, hospital spokeswoman Colette Stimmell said.

Nathalie Tauziat of France was also in trouble when the rain came, dropping the first set of her quarterfinal to Natasha Zvereva of Belarus.

ROSMALEN, Netherlands (AP) - Richard Krajicek routed Germany's Hendrik Dreckmann 6-0, 6-3 to advance to the quarterfinals of Heineken Trophy tournament.

On Friday, Krajicek plays Martin Damm, a Czech who ousted Chris Woodruff 6-1, 6-7 (7-3), 6-1 in this grass-court tuncup.

Top seed Michael Chang plays his quarterfinal Friday against No. 8 Francisco Clavet of Spain.

### BASKETBALL

DURHAM, N.C. (AP) - Tracy McGrady, who is attempting to make the jump from high school to the NBA, has signed a six-year, \$12 million deal with sporting goods manufacturer Adidas.

That contract precedes a likely multi-million dollar contract the 6-foot-8 swingman will sign with the

team that selects him in next week's NBA draft. McGrady is expected to be a lottery pick.

NEW YORK (AP) - Seven players, including Ronnie Fields and Cory Carr, have withdrawn their names from consideration after having declared as early entry candidates for the June 25 NBA draft.

Fields, a guard, played last season for the Rockford Lightning of the CBA after having left Farragut Academy in Chicago following the 1995-96 season. Carr, a guard, will return for his senior season at Texas Tech.

FRESNO, Calif. (AP) - Fresno State announced that an internal investigation has found no evidence of point-shaving by its basketball players. The report did concede that the university lacks the subpoena or investigatory powers of the federal government.

The FBI and a federal grand jury are investigating allegations that Bulldogs guards Dominick Young and Chris Herren shaved points at the behest of gamblers last season.

### FOOTBALL

SANTA CLARA, Calif. (AP) - Free agent cornerback Rod Woodson expects to sign with the San Francisco 49ers within the next two or three weeks, and he told other NFL teams that he's no longer considering their offers.

The timetable for signing with San Francisco has been delayed while the 49ers clear room under the salary cap for Woodson, a seven-time Pro Bowl player in 10 seasons with Pittsburgh.

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## New Fox, Liberty network may compete with ESPN

NEW YORK (AP) - Fox Sports and Liberty media are close to acquiring 40 percent interest in Cablevision's sports properties to create a national sports network that would compete with ESPN, published reports said today.

The deal, estimated to be worth

\$850 million, would combine Cablevision's seven regional sports channels and its Madison Square Garden properties with sports channels owned by Fox-Liberty in cities like Los Angeles, Atlanta, Washington and Dallas.

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# Insurance of same-sex partners condemned by Baptists' action

DALLAS (AP) - Southern Baptists have wrapped up their annual three-day convention, hammering away at "immoral ideologies" to the last.

One day after officially urging its 15 million members to boycott "gay-friendly" Disney, Southern Baptists overwhelmingly approved a non-binding resolution Thursday that condemned corporate policies extending health benefits to same-sex partners of employees.

Southern Baptists called same-sex benefits a "strategy to promote acceptance of the idea that homosexual relationships are morally equivalent" to heterosexual marriages.

The nation's largest Protestant group grabbed headlines Wednesday by urging a boycott against Disney. The denomination opposes the entertainment giant's "anti-Christian and anti-family" direction.

Thursday's resolution - which passed without discussion and through a show of hands of the more than 12,000 delegates - notes the increasing number of businesses, including Disney, offering same-sex benefits.

It also calls upon business leaders "to treat employees living in

homosexual relationships in a manner commensurate with the love of Jesus Christ."

"We love the homosexual," said Vickey Johnston of Brownsville, "but the act of sin, we hate that sin."

In other business Thursday, Southern Baptists adopted resolutions against gender-neutral Bible translations and for a ban on the cloning of humans.

Several convention-goers called the gathering a success, while noting the Disney boycott overshadowed events.

"It's been good. It's been very harmonious, peaceful, challenging," said the Rev. Tommy Turner, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Boaz, Ala., calling correct the Southern Baptists focus on missions and evangelism.

The resolution on translating the Scriptures comes on the heels of complaints that led the International Bible Society to scrap its gender-neutral translation of the New International Version of the Bible.

Conservative Southern Baptists had objected to what they said was capitulation to feminism and political correctness.

The International Bible Society,

which sponsors translations of the most successful modern English Bible translation sold in the United States, had planned to publish a version that changed "men" to "human beings" or "people."

The Southern Baptists resolution urges Bible publishers and translation groups "to continue to use time-honored, historic principles of biblical translation and refrain from any deviation to seek to accommodate contemporary cultural pressures."

Regarding advances in genetic technology, Southern Baptists called on Congress to ban the cloning of human beings in the United States and work toward international policy to make human cloning illegal around the world.

While recognizing the importance of genetic research, the group voiced its opposition to the use of prenatal genetic testing for the purpose of abortion decisions. It also called for federal legislation against providing human embryos for experimentation.

The Rev. Richard Land, president of the convention's Christian Life Commission, said his panel has called for a biogenetic regulatory commission answerable to Congress to set rules for private and public laboratories.

# Court rules for county officials

DEL RIO, Texas (AP) - Two Republican candidates in Val Verde County have prevailed against a state court challenge of their elections.

State District Judge Stephen Ables ruled Thursday that there was no proof that ineligible military mail-in ballots unfairly influenced the voting, as Democratic candidates claimed.

The ruling upholds the results of the controversial November election won by Republican sheriff candidate D'Wayne Jernigan and Republican county commissioner candidate Murry Kachel.

The decision brings Jernigan

closer to becoming the first Republican sheriff in Val Verde County's 112-year history. Kachel, who since the election has admitted he once was a Ku Klux Klansman, has declined the commissioner's post.

The long-running election dispute divided the Del Rio community and focused national attention on Val Verde County, as politicians from Austin to Washington jumped into the fray.

"The time has come to forgive each other," Jernigan said after the judge's ruling. "We need to join together to make this the best county

in the U.S. ... Thank God for an answer to prayer."


Sheriff Oscar Gonzalez Jr., one of the two Democrats who filed the lawsuit, said he wasn't surprised at the judge's decision since a crucial ruling on evidence Monday essentially prevented him from presenting a case.

"We knew what to expect from the three-day kangaroo session that we had in his court," Gonzalez said. "We're going to let the federal system resolve this issue."




