"We need progressive legislation that must be rooted deep in an altered public attitude toward crime and the criminal," says Associate Justice Joseph W. Proskaur, Appellate Division of the Supreme Court of New York, in an article on "How Shall We Deal With Crime?' in Hurper's Maga-"Dean Pound has sagely pointed out that the law does not lead, but follows public opinion .

"The law has a two-fold purpose-to protect society and to reclaim the offender. For the accomplishment of both it is vital that we should understand the manifold causes of economic pressure, of economic distress, of mendisease, of emotional illness. of physical ailment, which often combine to create what we loosely call the criminal tendency . . The law must take counsel with

In the light of these words the tragic futility of much of our criminal legislation becomes apparent. We pass laws against inanimate instruments used to comderstand that laws against an in-strument, harmless in the hands Brand. Boy Grows Pork At Low Price

Crowell,-Making two pigs weigh of feeding and producing pork thereby for a feed cost of 5 2-8 cents per pound is the achievement of Daniel Callaway, 4-H club boy in Foard county. They weighed 19 and 20 pounds respectively at five weeks of age when he started feeding, and at the conclusion of the demonstration topped the scales at 220 and 260 pounds.

They were put on wheat pasture at the start and fed all the ground wheat and corn they would eat, mixed with one pound of protein supplement per pig per day. For the first two weeks they were fed three times a day and after that twice daily. The cost of the feed as given by Fred Rennels, county agent, was \$28.05, the selling price was \$55.20 and after deducting the original cost of the pigs, Daniel had \$19.15 left for his labor.
