Koelzer finds work 'exciting'

"The daily grind," or "the rat race." That's how many, if not most, people describe their jobs. But Betty Koelzer's not one of them because she says her job is "exciting."

Koelzer is a social worker with Deaf Smith County Home Care Services, a job that she's been holding since September 1998 after moving over from a position as social worker with Hereford Regional Medical Center.

Now, although social work is not a job that is normally seen as exciting, Koelzer said it is exciting to her because she is helping people, and that to her is the most exciting job around.

Koelzer is a Betty-come-lately to her profession, having earned a bachelor's degree in social work from West Texas A&M University in 1996.

Before enrolling in college, Koelzer held a variety of jobs, including a stint as a photographer with the *Hereford Brand* for about two years before leaving the paper in 1970.

After leaving the newspaper, she worked for four years as a legal secretary for Thomas & Burdette law firm, then operated Koelzer Photography for nearly 10 years before closing the business in 1985 and starting to college.

Koelzer said she shut down the photography business for several dif-

ferent reasons.

"Family matters that came up was the final impetus, but I also wanted to try something different. My daughter talked me into going to school," Koelzer said.

"She'd say, 'Mom, you ought to go to school,' and I'd say, 'Why?' She'd say, 'Why not?' and then I thought, 'Well, why not?'"

"Finally in 1991, at 58 years old, I entered school, and I'm still going,"

she said.

Although Koelzer has already earned some credit toward a master's degree, she still has not made up her mind if she will pursue the advanced degree.

"This fall they'll open a master's program in social work at WT," a program that had been lacking at the school, she said. Students who wanted to earn a master's in social work would have to go to the University of Texas at Arlington or New Mexico Highlands University in Las Vegas. The new program at WTAMU will be jointly administered by the Canyon school at UT-Arlington.

Koelzer is a native of the Panhandle, having lived in Groom, Pampa and Amarillo before her parents, Charlie and Mary Carney, purchased a farm and moved to Hereford in 1948.

She graduated from Hereford High School in 1950 and married Werner Koelzer, now a "semi-retired" automotive parts salesman, about three months after graduation.

The Koelzers have a son, Tom, who lives in San Diego, Calif.; and three daughters, Kathy Gray of Sacramento, Calif., and Jeanie Grace and Barbara Wait, both of Atlanta,

Ga.

Since completing college and beginning her social work career, Koelzer said she particularly enjoys the home health social work more than she had expected.

"I like going into homes and seeing where the people live and seeing how they live. I enjoy getting to know them more personally than at a hospital," she said.

Most of her clients are age 65 and older and "many are living on Social Security income. Medication is one of the biggest problems for them because they often can't afford the medication they need. So my job is trying to help them locate what they need," she said. "I try to find sources, other sources."

She contacts other local agencies, such as the Deaf Smith County Social Services, and the hospital indigent program for help in locating the medication.

Also, she said local churches often provide help and doctors often will give samples.

She also said she believes her age helps in doing her job.

HERE WE GO AGAIN U.S. 385 work set to begin

If everything goes as expected, the familiar construction signs will go up again next week on U.S. Highway 385 (25 Mile Avenue) as the state highway department begins a repair project.

The latest U.S. Highway 385 construction project kicks off Tuesday! Well, the actual construction won't begin for a couple more weeks, but preparations will start early.

"Several years ago we went through it (U.S. 385) and replaced the right-hand lanes with concrete because there are so many trucks passing through Hereford and now we have the same problems with harsh trucks tearing up the middle lanes," said Tonya Detten, Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) public information officer in Ama-

rillo.

"Tons of grain trucks pass through 385 so we decided to go through the whole (roadway)," she said. "As many know, concrete is the best surface for heavy trucks to drive on and it's more weather-resistant than asphalt."

"The expected life of concrete is 30 years and asphalt is only 6-7 years. It is a lot more expensive, but worth it in the long run," Detten said.

The project, which is 1.9 miles in length, is estimated to take 256 working days, or 15

Visitors to Tuna rewarded

A near-capacity crowd in Hereford High School Auditorium took a trip to Tuna (the third smallest town in Texas) Friday night and were introduced to that town's entire population by Raymond Girard and David D. McKnight Jr.

Amarillo Little Theatre's current Touring Production of "Greater Tuna" was sponsored by Hereford Community Concert Association.

Girard and McKnight turned in superb performances as they played the 20 residents, both male and female, of Tuna in the play written by Jaston Williams, Joe Sears and Ed Howard.

The play is a two-hour wacky look at a day in the life of small town. Scenes progress through the day from the sign-on of radio station OKKK with its news anchors Thurston Wheelis and Arles Struvie, to a visit to Hubert Funeral Home by Aunt Pearl and her favorite nephew Stanley, to bedtime in the Bumiller household with father Hank, mother Bertha, the twins Stanley and Charlene, and little Jody.

Girard and McKnight, aided by a series of lightning-fast costume changes, alter their personalities and mannerisms to accommodate the diverse range of characters.

Girard's strongest roles were the female characters of Bertha Bumiller and her aunt,

Pearl Burrus.

McKnight portrayed a diverse range of characters, both male and female, giving each a distinctive voice and mannerisms.

The audience laughed in appreciation of the red-neck humor throughout the play. They especially seemed to appreciate the irony of the Tuna Smut Snatchers Association's attempts to "clean up" the dictionary at the high school by removing such offensive words as "hot," "clap" and "knocker."

Most scenes induced laughter and both actors did an excellent job of delivering the punch lines. But mostly they made us laugh at ourselves as we saw some all-too-familiar personalities in the characters.

The two-man cast received backstage support from director Loren Strickland, assistant director/stage manager Julie Yock and crew members Larri Jo Starkey, Amy Gilliland, Jeff Jarnagin, Keith Jones and Gregg Dunlap.

The play proved to be a funny hit and will undoubtedly continue to draw larger-than-average audiences as it continues its tour schedule Feb. 25 in Goodwell, Okla.; March 10 in Tucumcari, N.M.; April 7 in Canyon; April 8 in Lamesa; and April 14 in Vega.

Bush, McCain to soldier on no matter who wins in S.C.

GREENVILLE, S.C. (AP) — Invigorated by his cross-party campaign appeal, John McCain declared "we've already won" the South Carolina battle for the Republican presidential nomination. Rival George W. Bush was brimming with confidence that a Southern victory would get his campaign back on track.

Both candidates have made it clear they'll march on regardless of the results of today's primary, but the outcome was being closely watched because of the impact it could have on elections coming soon in such key states as Michigan and Virginia.

Polls were all over the map, but a couple of late surveys suggested Bush had developed an edge. Neither candidate would concede an inch and both stumped to the last minute.

McCain said he's sensing intensity from backers that means the turnout would be large, to his benefit. "We're going to have a huge turnout," the Arizona senator said. "We're going to win because everybody is going to turn out."

Bush countered that with the heft of a far superior organization, a lot more money, the backing of virtually all of the GOP establishment and a sharp assault that sent the polls into disarray.

"I'm going to win here," the Texas governor

declared. "You mark my words."

The campaign opened with Bush the presumptive favorite, but McCain began charging after a landslide win two weeks ago in New Hampshire sent his poll standings soaring.

Bush then unleashed a sharp assault, bashing McCain in a barrage of television ads and hundreds of thousands of direct mail pieces. After initially firing back, McCain pulled his attack commercials and ended the South Carolina campaign running only positive spots.

Conservative commentator Alan Keyes was only a blip in the polls.

McCain wrapped up his campaign with a series of high-energy rallies, and said the enthusiasm he's seeing will send voter turnout to record levels.

Turnout held the key because of sharply differing strategies the two candidates adopted. Polls showed Bush leading among Republicans, while McCain appeals to independents and some Democrats. The primary was open to all voters.

Critics argued that Republicans shouldn't allow Democrats to help settle a family fight, but McCain said he was following in the footsteps of Republican icon Ronald Reagan.

"If you only get the votes of your party, you are resigning yourself to permanent minority status," he said.

months. "Fifteen months is the expected time it will take for the construction to take place," Detten said.

Holmes Construction of Amarillo was selected as contractor with the low bid of \$2.9 million.

For most businesses located along the highway, construction means a slump.

"I think the north end will be faster, but the farther south, it could get harder and more difficult (with more traffic and businesses)," Miles Smith, Holmes Construction project coordinator said.

TxDOT and Holmes Construction have learned from the mistakes made during the last construction on U.S. 385 and are focusing a lot of attention on businesses.

"Our plan is to go door to door before the construction starts and tell businesses 'you know this is what we plan to do ...,' and some may need special arrangements, like getting between certain areas or getting in from side streets to their businesses," Holmes Construction environmental coordinator Daniel McFaul said.

Along with keeping businesses happy, TxDOT and Holmes Construction plan on keeping drivers in good spirits, as hard as it may be.

"One advantage of this project that we didn't have before are the (stop light) cameras. I can move them, focus them just in on the traffic and not the construction equipment, so traffic can move freely," TxDOT traffic controller Robin Frisk.

Don Day, TxDOT area engineer, apologizes for disrupting the public last time and says they have new solutions to keep Hereford drivers happier and make it easier on them to drive.

"We're disrupting the public, but this time not as much. We learned our mistakes last time and will fix them this time," Day said.

The main question last time was 'Why not tear up the road in sections instead of all at once?'

To every question there is an answer or at least a solution:

"Yes, this time they're doing it in sections. For every 600 feet of construction, there will be 1,300 feet between (that will not be torn up). That was one more thing we did wrong last time," Day said.

"We are here to serve the public, that is the bottom line. Our jobs wouldn't be here if weren't for the public," McFaul said.

In addition to the U.S. 385 construction, minor maintenance on U.S. Highway 60 will begin this summer. According to Detten, it will be road patching, which she said will be a minor inconvenience and will only take a few days — nothing like Highway 385 construction. This will begin sometime after April 15, due to weather conditions.

CANYON — Don Taylor has joined the Office of Business Resources (OBR) at the T. Boone Pickens College of Business at West Texas A&M University.

consulting. Dr. John Cooley, dean of the Pickens College, said Taylor's expertise and national celebrity made him a perfect fit for newly created OBR post.

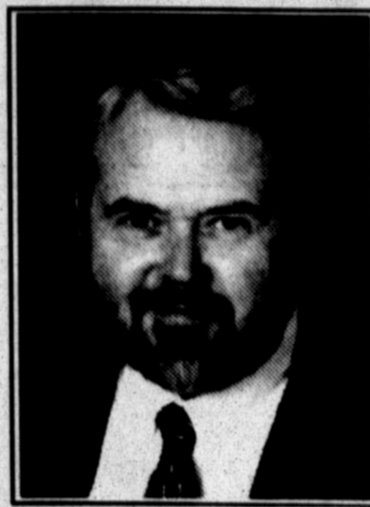

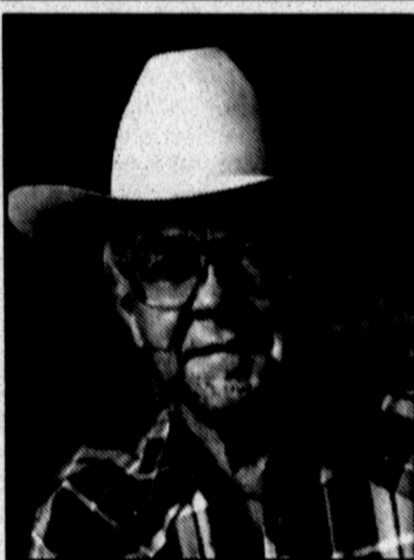

Hereford agribusinessman to be honored by university

A long-time Hereford agribusiness leader will be named a "Distinguished Agriculture Alumnus" by the Texas Tech College of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources.

Distinguished alumnus awards are presented to former Texas Tech agricultural students who have distinguished themselves in their business and community affairs and who have been recognized by their contemporaries.

Dave Hopper, who will be honored Monday, has been involved with various agricultural ventures for most of his life. While in his early 20s, Hopper was a member of the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association and was on the Texas Tech National Intercollegiate Championship Rodeo Team in 1955. In 1957, he earned the title of National Intercollegiate Bareback

Throughout his college career, Hopper remained interested in agriculture, obtaining a bachelor's degree in agricultural economics in 1955 and a bachelor's degree in agricultural education in 1957.

Since graduating from Texas Tech, Hopper has served on various committees for the Texas Cattle Feeders Association, as well as being a charter member of the American National Cattlemen's Association.

Hillary's idea merits further examination

In New York, Senate candidate Hillary Clinton ... burst out of the blocks with a proposal to change U.S. law so consumers could have unrestricted access to low-cost prescription drugs sold in Canada.

Like her or not, she hits an issue worthy of debate.

Because of government price controls, Canadians pay one-third less than Americans do for prescription drugs.

President Clinton recently proposed ... adding \$35 billion to Medicare to pay for prescription drugs, which are vital to the health and survival of senior citizens but are not covered by Medicare.

If the president's proposal succeeds, it will create a huge new market for drug makers because Medicare will enable more seniors to buy prescription drugs.

Prescription drugs are hugely profitable, and industry consolidation ... will reduce market competition.

Drugs would not be sold for less in Canada unless it was still profitable for companies to do so. The argument can be made that U.S. consumers pay more so Canadians can pay less.

That does not fly in the free market, and the drug companies do not use that pitch. Instead, they hide behind a 1988 U.S. law that restricts reimporting drugs. The measure, the *New York Times* reports, was intended to ensure that only FDA-approved drugs could be sold in this country.

Mrs. Clinton says most drugs sold in Canada use the same ingredients and are manufactured in the same factories under the same controls as those sold domestically.

If that is true, then the 1988 law should go and the so-called free market should be allowed to work. Or drug manufacturers should lower prices in return for the privilege of providing drugs, at a smaller profit, to millions of older folks. ...

Bush already has lost

It doesn't matter who comes away with the most votes in today's South Carolina primary, there's already one big loser.

George W. Bush.

A month ago, Republicans were getting ready to buy new outfits, reserve hotel rooms and limousines for Jan. 20, 2001, as they knew they'd be celebrating the inauguration of President Bush.

In fact, it looked like there would be a popular demand to call of the election in November and just proclaim him President George II. However, like those heady days of 1991 when President George I was basking in approval ratings of 91 percent, something happened.

New Hampshire. The nation's first primary election, when the votes begin to count, showed Bush that he doesn't need to be buying new furniture for the Oval Office just yet. Arizona Sen. John McCain scored a landslide victory in New Hampshire, and Bush found himself in a real fight for the Republican presidential nomination.

The South Carolina primary, where Bush was the overwhelming favorite just a month ago, is a dead heat, according to most political surveys, and it forced the governor to do something he didn't have to do in two previous campaigns: sling mud.

In his campaigns against Ann Richards and Garry Mauro, Bush maintained the high road, letting his opponents root around in the mud. However, in South Carolina, the Bush campaign has used negative advertising and so-called "push polling" in an effort to beat back McCain. He also began to pander to some of the most extreme elements in the Republican Party, showing a willingness to do just about anything for a vote.

Maybe enough of the mud stuck on McCain that South Carolinians will go return to the Bush camp; however, in the slinging some of the mud also stuck to Bush.

Part of Bush's attractiveness in Texas, as well as in the early going of the presidential campaign, was his refusal to be just another politician by engaging in negative campaigning. Granted, against Richards and Mauro, Bush didn't have to get negative (he had plenty of surrogates who could do it for him,

letting him stay above the fray), but after the New Hampshire debacle, the governor decided he had to draw the line in South Carolina and if going negative is what's needed, so be it.

Maybe getting negative will do the trick for Bush; however, he now looks like just another politician.

With Bush showing his colors as just another politician, the national press corps likely will do what the Texas press corps has never done — take a long, hard look at the Bush record, including some highly questionable business dealings and his apparent willingness to trade on the family name for personal advancement.

His foray into the oil industry in the mid-1970s was a failure, but in 1986 he was bailed out by Harken Energy, which made him a company director and holder of about 1.5 million shares of company stock. He also received a salary as a "consultant," although it's never been clear exactly what consulting he did because not long after the merger he moved to Washington, D.C., to help with his father's presidential campaign. In 1990, Harken landed an exclusive offshore contract with the Persian Gulf nation of Bahrain, even though the company had not ever done any offshore drilling.

After the Bahrain deal was made public, the Harken stock jumped in value and Bush sold about 60 percent of his holdings for nearly \$850,000. About a week later, the company reported a \$23 million quarterly loss, information that Bush, as a member of the Harken audit committee, would have had. Some observers contend Bush's activities amounted to illegal insider trading.

By showing himself to be just another politician, Bush may win an election but lose his reputation.

AG files lawsuit over automobile repair claims

AUSTIN — Texas Attorney General John Cornyn last week filed lawsuits against 16 insurance companies, alleging they underpaid policyholders on auto repair claims.

Named in the lawsuits are State Farm, Allstate, Farmers, USAA, Progressive County Mutual, Farm Bureau, State and County Mutual, Travelers, Trinity, Nationwide, Old American County Mutual, Home State County Mutual, Sentry, Maryland Casualty, Consumers County Mutual and CNA insurance companies.

The lawsuits allege the companies violated Texas law by taking illegal deductions for "betterment" or depreciation on some of their policyholders' repair claims.

"Deduction for betterment or depreciation on policyholders' auto repair claims has been an industry custom in Texas," Cornyn said.

"But the personal auto insurance policy does not allow it. Several companies have informed us that they have recently stopped reducing claim payments for betterment, and I applaud this step.

"However, I intend to make sure that policyholders get the refunds they are entitled to and that all companies play by the same rules."

"Betterment" is an insurance industry term for increasing the value of a vehicle by paying to repair it with better or newer parts.

The standard Texas auto policy does not allow for such a deduction, and a recent Austin Court of Appeals opinion indicates that these deductions are not permitted.

The lawsuits ask the court for permanent injunctions to end all betterment-related practices by these insurance companies against their policyholders, and ask for civil penalties to be paid to the state of up to \$10,000 per violation of the Texas Insurance Code.

Under the terms of the proposed injunction, each insurance company also would be required to refund its policyholders all money deducted for betterment or depreciation on auto repair claims, plus interest.

State paychecks threatened

Employees of the State of Texas could shoulder a \$109 million increase in health-care costs if a proposal being considered by the Employees Retirement System board of trustees is adopted.

If the proposal is approved by the retirement system board in April, higher rates could go into effect in September for the 521,600 people covered by the state's health plan.

Gary Anderson, director of the Texas Public Employees Association said the proposal would increase prescriptions and doctor visit co-payments, wiping out the \$100 a month pay hike state employees received from the Texas Legislature in 1999.

"It is inequitable now to place the burden on state employees when their salary increases have been minimal, making them simply incapable of absorbing the increase," Anderson said.

Report details accident

A Nuclear Regulatory Commission report says an industrial accident at the Comanche Peak nuclear plant Oct. 6 could have been worse and could have exposed employees to high levels of radiation, *The Dallas Morning News* reported last week.

Plant workers were lifting a 40-ton pump motor out of the reactor area when an electrical hoist failed, causing the motor to free-fall 30-40 feet.

A random link of chain lodged in the hoist and stopped the motor before it fell onto the reactor coolant pipe system.

The plant was shut down for routine maintenance at the time of the accident.

No one was injured, and the public was never in danger, the report said.

Other highlights

• The Texas Legislature provided school districts with \$1.35 billion for property tax relief last year, but a survey of school districts by the Texas Education Agency showed that 369 of the state's 1,035 districts increased their tax rates for the 1999-2000 school year and that 290 districts left rates unchanged.

• U.S. District Judge Melinda Harmon of Houston ruled Feb. 11 that the state law barring out-of-state shipment of alcoholic beverages directly to consumers violates the interstate commerce clause of the Constitution.

Root canal not a pleasant experience

The deed is done, or at least nearly. The tooth is nearly finished. Let me tell you, this was no easy task.

For those of you who don't know, one of the good local dentists persuaded me I needed a root canal.

Things had to get really bad before I broke down and actually went through with it.

I quickly realized I had taken the first-class express to white-knuckle city. Bound and de-

termined not to show any sign of my ever increasing trepidation, I closed my eyes — tightly — and grabbed the arm rests.

Nothing shy of new upholstery will eliminate the fingernail marks.

I really can't say I felt the needle for the first shot of anaesthetic. I probably didn't feel any of the others, except the one that went into the palate. It really didn't hurt, I had just screwed myself up so tight it seemed like a big deal.

As the whirring of the drill began, I tried to concentrate on the country music coming from the speakers. Like the conversations of the dentist and the assistant I couldn't remember a single note, much less a song.

Before long, something caught my attention and I opened my eyes long enough to see him tell me to just motion with my left hand if I felt anything. He continued. I closed my eyes again.

At some point I twitched and he asked me

if could feel it and I nodded. He obligingly delivered another dose of deadener and continued.

A few days later the pain had lessened, but I still knew it was there.

Managing groundwater key to economic future of Texas

There's an old saying: "You never know the worth of water 'til the well runs dry." With Texas in its third major drought in four years, soon we all may be learning just how valuable a reliable water supply is to growth and economic survival of the Lone Star State.

It's a harsh lesson agriculture already has had to learn. And, with more and more public water supplies rationing water this year, urban areas may be forced to look elsewhere for reliable water resources.

What is becoming increasingly evident in Texas is the necessity to develop new and innovative ways to manage our groundwater that ensures fairness and equity — to both agriculture and urban needs.

For decades, many landowners believed their property right interest in groundwater was best protected by Texas' rule of capture — they could pump as much water as they could use, as long as it was not wasteful or malicious.

But if you look at underground water pumping as sipping from a straw, a farmer or rancher sips from a relatively small straw. For example, on a practical level, a midsize city uses a pipe ranging up to 60 inches in size to withdraw groundwater and pumps 365 days a year. An average farmer or rancher uses an 8-inch pipe only seasonally.

Historically, most landowners had essentially equal ability to withdraw water from a common supply. However, with the advent of new technology and explosive population

growth, we are seeing situations where those with the biggest straw are using the rule of capture to defend their right to withdraw as much water as they choose. As the Texas Supreme Court recently pointed out in the *Ozarka* case, "... we are reluctant to make so drastic a change as abandoning our rule of capture and moving into the arena of water-use regulation by judicial fiat." It is arguable that the court is quietly urging the Legislature to do something about underground

water. Farmers and other agricultural groups have recognized that the rule of capture has served the industry well, but may need a review to ensure that agriculture and individual landowner rights for water under their property are protected in this changing environment.

New to the Texas landscape is "water ranching," the term used in situations where someone buys land solely for the water beneath it. When land becomes valued because of the water beneath it, as has happened with the petroleum industry, landowners may start exploring different areas to conserve and use their underground assets.

Landowners may want to "pool" their water rights to obtain leverage. Further, there may be good economic reasons for landowners who are considering marketing their groundwater to lease such water rather than sell it outright. As Texas' population grows, so will the demand for water — and the price.

Well the next appointment is made and I'll be there. But, let me say this — for this one tooth I have used more pain killers than I did after two C-sections, two ingrown toenail removals, and a tonsillectomy at the ripe old age of 34, all combined.

He better finish next time, or I'm going to have to buy stock in a major drug supplier.

Next time I'll opt for the rusty pliers.

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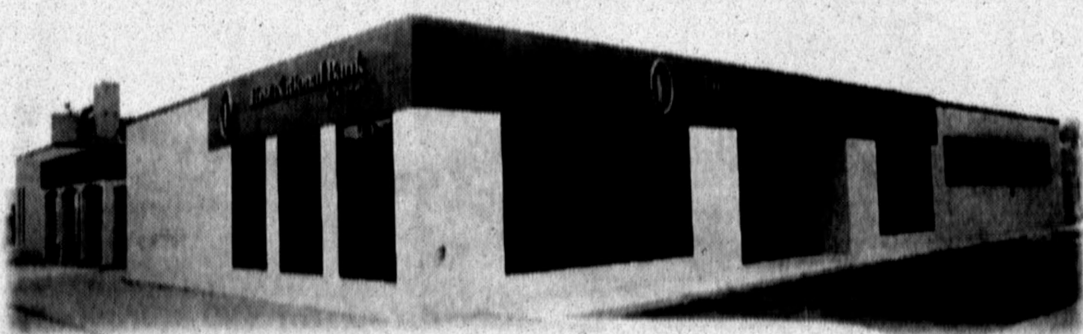

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Bradley finds McCain basking in insurgency glow

A strange thing is happening to Bill Bradley on the way to the coast-to-coast primaries on which he has staked his challenge to Al Gore for the Democratic presidential nomination. There's a Republican in his path.

gain attention or make headway after New Hampshire.

McCain was his unlikely partner at a New Hampshire reform rally little more than two months ago, but things have changed. While Bradley contests Gore for traditionally Democratic votes, he is in a sort of shadow contest with McCain for independents and cross-over Democrats.

"John McCain, he's moving in the polls, he's even getting some Democratic support," Bradley said in San Jose, Calif., where the primary is open to voters from either party to mark their preference for president.

He then recited McCain's positions against abortion rights and gun control as among the reasons Democrats should not cast ballots for him.

He went to Columbia, S.C., where the Republican action is, to accuse both McCain and Bush of bottom-fishing for votes by refusing to condemn the flying of the Confederate flag over the state Capitol.

But while McCain has gained polls in the national polls against Bush, Bradley has slumped farther behind Gore — a deficit of about 40 percentage points in the latest surveys. He is far behind in the polls in California, biggest of the March 7 prizes, and he has fallen behind in New York, his pro basketball home next door to his New Jersey political base.

Bradley was the rising challenger in the fall, his climb against Gore reshaping a one-sided Democratic campaign into a contest against the vice president who once seemed all but nominated. He forced Gore to reorganize, to declare himself the underdog and adopt tactics to fit that role. The drama was Democratic.

Trounced in Iowa, Bradley took the offensive in New Hampshire, accusing Gore of campaign lies, of misrepresenting his own record, of campaign finance misconduct in 1996 that would enable a Re-

publican to clean house against him in 2000, and of dissembling on abortion. But even when he was right it went wrong. Bradley said Gore's claim to a career-long commitment to abortion rights was untrue. The vice president was forced to concede the point, although the candidates do not differ on the issue now. He and Bradley both promise to defend a woman's right to choose abortion.

But it proved a costly point for Bradley. NARAL, the major abortion rights group, endorsed Gore on Tuesday, backing a presidential primary candidate for the first time, and

criticizing Bradley for raising the issue.

"We reject attempts to use this issue as a political wedge to divide pro-choice voters," said Kate Michelman, president of NARAL. Bradley said he was stunned, given his commitment to abortion rights.

There has been no letup in the Democratic campaign, but Gore is back to the front-runner strategy — slap the

challenger but do not share stages with him unless it is unavoidable.

It was Gore who started the debate-a-week challenges, later upped to twice weekly combined with an agreement to end television ads, which the lesser-known Bradley disdained.

After New Hampshire, Bradley became the debate devotee, writing Gore that for "the unprecedented national primaries in March" they should appear together to reach the millions of voters involved.

There will be contests in 16 states on March 7, and six more a week later.

Now the Gore campaign is disinterested. No point in giving a rival a platform. He and Bradley will debate in New York on Monday night, and in Los Angeles on March 1. But both those appearances were set weeks ago, when they fit the Gore game plan.

Bush. There's a pause in the Democratic race, while the Republicans are competing in primaries each week, making them the focus of campaign attention. A challenger trying to catch up needs attention, and that is a problem for Bradley.

When the Democrats do start up again, McCain could take away votes that might otherwise be Bradley's in open primary states, where voters from one party can cast ballots in the other's contest.

Bradley said "the first national primary," on March 7, when Democrats in 16 states vote or caucus, would be his arena, and had claimed a sendoff toward it when he came within 4 percentage points of Gore in New Hampshire on Feb. 1.

The former New Jersey senator said running that close to "the entrenched power" of a vice president should be considered a victory in defeat, and that he would be the stronger for it in the primaries ahead.

It's been a difficult three weeks since then for Bradley. He had climbed in the pre-season polls, then lost to Gore by a 2-to-1 margin in the Iowa caucuses, and narrowly in New Hampshire.

Bradley has been unable to

Applications and rules may be picked up at the school counselor's offices in Friona, Bovina, Lazbuddie, Farwell, Dimmitt, Adrian and Vega.

To be considered, applica-

tions must be fully completed, have not attachments other than to the photo and two required letters of recommendation, and must be received at the offices of WTRT, Box 1737, Hereford, 79045, no later than April 3.

DSEC scholarships

The Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative will award five \$2,000 scholarships to eligible applicants whose parents are active members or employees of the cooperative.

Applicants may be either traditional high school graduates or students who wish to continue their education after

an extended absence.

The deadline is March 10.

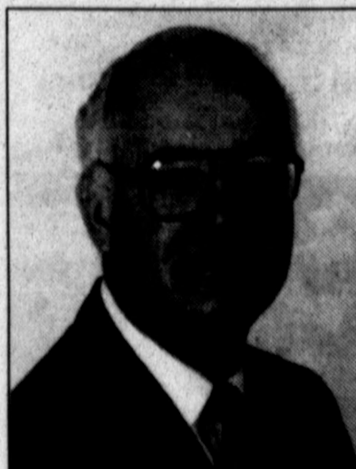

Some thoughts on trout--and the worry of statewide drought

Rainbow trout will be the featured attraction for the spring KidFish event at the Aquatic Park Pond in Hereford. The kids' big fishing day is tentatively scheduled for Saturday, March 25.

Stocking of trout by Texas Parks & Wildlife Department provides a back-to-basics fishing opportunity for youngsters who should enjoy an excellent chance to land some fish. You don't even have to have gear to take advantage of KidFish. Boys and girls need only show up and register and TP&W fisheries personnel will provide them with a loaner rod and reel--even hooks and bait.

Generally, it's fairly easy for the kids to catch rainbow trout using kernel corn, salmon eggs or power bait. Every effort is made so that delivery of fish for stocking will be close-enough to fishing time that the trout should be hungry and ready to bite.

During KidFish event hours only youngsters will be allowed to fish, and they won't have to have a license or trout stamp.

At the conclusion of KidFish, angling is open to the public, subject to state regulations. Individuals 17 years of age and over will then need a Texas fishing license and the \$7 Texas Freshwater Trout Stamp.

Additional trout fishing opportunities will also be available in other Panhandle cities. Locations and approximate stocking dates include the Medical Center North pond in Amarillo on March 27, and the Stilling Basin at Lake Meredith on March 31.

Rainbow trout are cold water fish, but due to the depth and cool temperature of the waters at the Aquatic Park Pond, there's a chance that some of the trout that aren't caught during spring KidFish could survive well through the spring to provide some angling surprises locally.

Drought remains a pervasive concern for Texas as we head into the spring months. Portions of West Texas are in the seventh year of below-average rainfall, and many Texas cities are looking at the need to initiate drought contingency plans to deal with water supply shortfalls.

At the end of the last *La Nina* cycle we saw periods of above-average rainfall that helped some areas to recuperate. Another such rebound will be needed to help much of the state this year.

Moisture shortfalls are naturally a concern to people and agriculture in Texas, and they also have an adverse impact on the state's wildlife resources. All of that is being taken into consideration by the 16 regional planning groups that are struggling to come up with new water plans under the auspices of Senate Bill 1, a sweeping water reform law passed in recent years.

Andrew Sansom, executive director of the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department, says the ongoing drought "underscores how important it is that we make plans now for the long haul, and that we include fish, wildlife, and the environment in planning for future water needs."

TP&WD filed a report to the Joint House Appropriations and Senate Finance Committee on impacts of the current drought. According to the report:

* Impacts of long-term dryer-than-normal conditions are becoming evident in South and West Texas, where hunters in some areas reported deer in very poor condition this winter. Significant numbers of deer have been killed along highways, where they have been attracted to the forage on highway right-of-ways after running out of forage in their regular areas

of habitat.

* Although drought has begun to impact wildlife in some areas, no adverse economic impacts to hunting and fishing activities can be attributed to current conditions. Sales of hunting and fishing licenses are up 6.6 percent from last year.

* Nesting habitat for grassland and ground-nesting birds such as quail and turkey may be reduced this year due to drought conditions. Nesting success for pheasants in the High Plains could also be impacted if there isn't sufficient late spring and early summer moisture to enhance hatching.

* Although normal volumes of water have been flowing from Texas rivers into the Gulf of Mexico, if the drought continues less fresh water will flow into coastal bays and estuaries, causing higher salinity that could affect production of shrimp, crabs, oysters, and red drum.

* Many state reservoirs are already below normal levels, some alarmingly so, necessitating reduction of demand by municipalities. In the local region, Lake Mackenzie near Silverton and White River Lake at Crosbyton are two examples of reservoirs in dire need of large quantities of inflow from rainfall events. If the statewide drought continues, the spring spawning activities of some fish will be affected. Should timely rainfall and runoff occur and return reservoirs to normal levels, resultant vegetation growth could enhance spawning.

* Revenue at many state parks is 19.4 percent ahead of last year at this time, due to mild weather. Drought impacts are beginning to show, however. The worst problems are in West Texas, where drought is in its seventh year. Visitation to state parks and its corresponding revenues could fall drastically if the drought continues through the summer. TP&WD figures show that during the drought of 1996 state park visitation declined 18 percent from previous years, and a similar drop could be expected if this year's drought persists.

UIL to hear school appeals

■ Harlingen, San Benito school districts threaten to sue if appeals are denied

The UIL has scheduled a Tuesday hearing on their appeals, and the two schools have hired an attorney for any possible legal action if the appeals are denied.

The UIL announced recently that San Benito, Harlingen, and Harlingen South would move to District 29-5A, joining Corpus Christi Carroll, Corpus Christi King, Corpus Christi Moody, and Corpus Christi Ray.

UIL officials were honoring a request by the Valley districts, Harlingen and San Benito included, that they not be part of nine and 10-school districts, UIL Athletic Director Charles Breithaupt said.

Before the 1998 realignment, the Valley had the state's largest 5A districts -- one with nine schools and the other with 10. The school districts at that time also had

threatened to sue, but school officials were appeased by the creation of three Valley districts with six teams each.

The recent realignment created two all-Valley districts, 31-5A and 32-5A, with eight teams each. That meant grouping Harlingen and San Benito with Corpus Christi schools.

"Having our children transported in the middle of the night through the King Ranch area is a danger our children don't deserve," said Joe D. Gonzalez, superintendent of the San Benito Consolidated Independent School District.

Besides safety, Gonzalez said, school officials are concerned about lost school time, since many sports competitions are held on weekdays.

The Harlingen and San Benito school districts are protesting the realignment and are threatening to sue if they're taken out of a district with other Rio Grande Valley teams and placed into a district with four teams more than 100 miles away.

Former president says son 'can measure up'

MIDLAND, Mich. (AP) — Four days before the state's Republican presidential primary, former President George Bush told a group of mid-Michigan voters Friday that his son "can measure up to your standards."

Texas Gov. George W. Bush is locked in a tight race with U.S. Sen. John McCain of Arizona, who the elder Bush did not mention by name during his remarks at a Midland County GOP party breakfast.

A poll conducted Feb. 8-11 showed McCain ahead of Bush. Of 600 voters likely to participate in the primary, which is open to Democrats, independents and Republicans, 43 percent favored McCain to 34

percent for Bush. Last month, McCain trailed Bush by 34 percentage points in Michigan. Last week's poll, by East Lansing-based Mitchell Research and Communications Inc. for The Detroit News, had a margin of error of plus or minus 4 percentage points. The poll showed McCain was drawing his support in Michigan from independents, moderates and Democrats. The elder Bush said those voters helped his son overwhelmingly win re-election to the Texas governorship in 1998. The governor defeated Democratic state land commissioner Garry Mauro 69 percent to 31 percent.

Students prepare for JASON

CANYON — For the past few months, thousands of school-age kids from throughout the Panhandle have spent many hours trying to unravel the mysteries of deep space and the deep blue sea — equal parts of this year's JASON Project curriculum.

All the hard work will pay dividends Feb. 28-March 10 at West Texas A&M University, where about 9,000 students in grades 4-9 are expected to participate in the advanced you-are-there telecommunication portion of the internationally acclaimed project.

Each year the JASON Project takes millions of el-

ementary and middle school students worldwide on scientific "expeditions" without taking them from the regions in which they live. The fun begins in classrooms, where JASON-trained teachers put the pupils through a curriculum to ensure they will be well versed in scientific principles relevant to the expedition. Funded locally by the Amarillo National Resource Center (ANRC) and administered by WTAMU, this year's project is titled "Going to Extremes: Space and the Deep Ocean."

The expedition culminates annually at about 40 Primary Interactive Network Sites (PINS) through the United

States, Bermuda, the United Kingdom and Mexico, where the students watch the expedition live and even control live-feed video cameras and communicate with on-site scientists. Last year, WTAMU was one of three Texas PINS.

"The question this year is 'Why does man go where he cannot live?' The reason, of course, is to learn," Treasure Brasher, WTAMU project coordinator/physics instructor, said. "The fact that the world is as populated as it is does not mean there are no more frontiers or areas for exploration."

Entire classes from schools

throughout the Panhandle will take turns visiting WTAMU's Alumni Banquet Facility for one-hour segments of the interactive program. The project will compare the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's Aquarius Underwater Laboratory in the Florida Keys and NASA's International Space Station as research platforms that enable humans to go beyond their physical limitations to explore the unknown.

The public is invited to two free showings of the JASON Project at 9 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. March 4 in the WTAMU Alumni Banquet Facility.

Texas woman faces execution next week

GATESVILLE (AP) — A 62-year-old woman who prosecutors say killed two of her husbands and buried them in her yard claims she is a victim of years of domestic abuse and pleaded with Gov. George W. Bush on Friday to spare her from execution next week.

"I'm asking you to let me live," Betty Lou Beets said, her voice cracking in a plea broadcast on ABC's "Good Morning America." "I'm asking for mercy. And I'm asking for that compassion and I'm praying you will allow it for me."


Beets, set for death by injection Feb. 24, would be only

the second woman executed in Texas since the Civil War and the fourth in the nation since the Supreme Court allowed capital punishment to resume in 1976. There are nine women on death row in Texas and 50 nationwide.

Foes of the death penalty have said cases like Beets' are a test of Bush's "compassionate conservatism." The issue has also received renewed attention since Gov. George Ryan of Illinois — a Bush supporter — suspended all executions this month after the release of 13 inmates from that state's death row over the past two decades.

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







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Care givers support group provides forum for dealing with many emotions

A support group for care givers meets every Tuesday at 5:30 p.m. in the library of King's Manor with Shelly Moss, director of social work, as facilitator.

"Caring for an elderly parent or loved one with physical limitations and/or dementia can be an overwhelming and sometimes thankless task," Moss said.

This support group provides a forum in which to deal with the many emotions that come with watching a loved one suffer a debilitating illness or face the limitations of aging.

According to Moss, the group welcomes anyone who is:

- Witnessing a parent, spouse or loved one experience the losses that aging or a debilitating illness can bring; such as sight, physical mobility, mental capacity, memory and ultimately loss of independence.

- Grieving these losses for, and with, the loved one.

- Grieving the loss of the former relationship. For example, the parent you once relied upon for emotional and perhaps even financial support, now looks to you. This role reversal can be emotionally traumatic for both parties.

This same situation can exist between husband and wife. The husband who took care of the financial responsibilities, had the oil changed in the car and fixed the kitchen faucet may begin to look to the wife to take care of these things.

- A primary or secondary care giver for a loved one in a private home, assisted living setting, or a nursing home.



Role reversal -- the parent you once relied on now looking to you for support -- can be emotionally traumatic for both parties.

- Facing the decision of placing a loved one in a nursing home setting.

- Experiencing difficulty juggling the responsibilities of a home, job, children and providing care for a loved one. This juggling often results in feelings of inadequacy or perhaps even guilt in dealing with these different roles.

"Healing often begins with voicing what is in the heart. The wounds are soothed by hearing

others express emotions so like one's own," Moss said. "Many care givers have unrealistic expectations of themselves and even the loved one they are caring for."

Moss compared the responsibilities of a care giver to a physical wound.

"A physical wound that is stitched before it has drained will become swollen and infected. It is no different with an emotional wound. The injured person must have the opportunity to express the extent of their pain and to

receive validation (an acknowledgment that their pain was/is real). Once expressed the healing process can begin. If not, the wound superficially healed can turn into a deep scar that reveals itself in the form of anger and depression," she said.

The care group is open to the community and there is no charge.

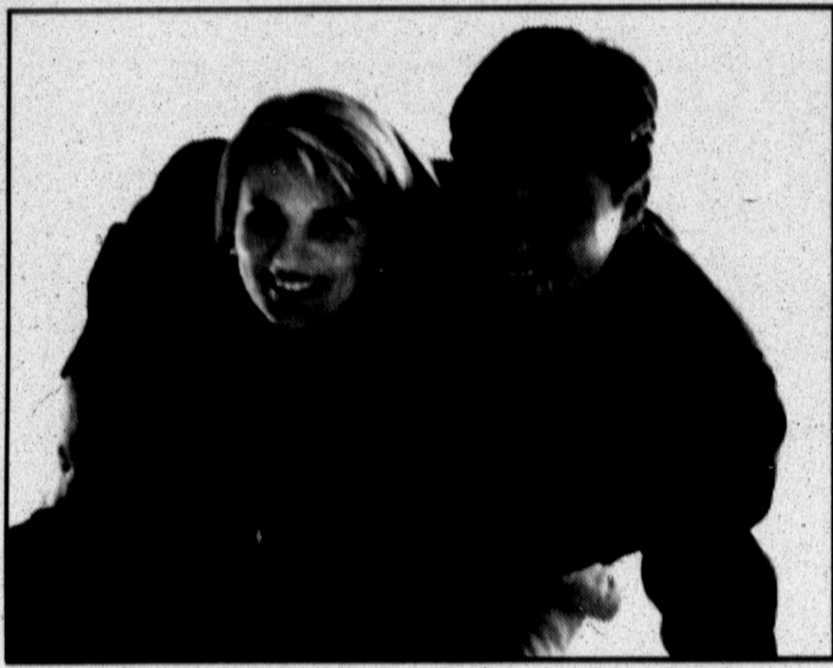

The Dangers of Sharing Contact Lenses

We warn our kids about many things: "Cover your mouth when you sneeze! Brush your teeth after meals! Don't share your comb or brush."

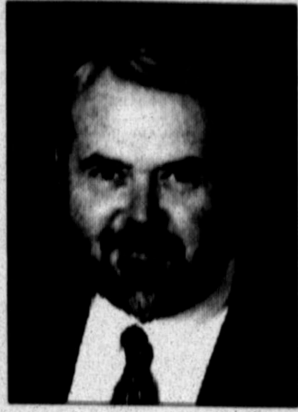
Well, there's another "don't" to add to this list: Don't swap your contact lenses with anyone, even if they're only for color. Just because the contacts are not prescription lenses doesn't mean they are safe to share. Your teenagers wouldn't want to swap toothbrushes, would they?

Personal hygiene or cosmetic items should not be shared. The main reason for not sharing: It's a good way to get an eye infection. Each person's eye has a different bacterial makeup, or flora. By using someone else's contacts, a child could contract an infection like conjunctivitis (inflammation of the eye membrane). Tell your children about the perils of swapping and reinforce to them the importance of keeping their lenses clean and disinfected.

Risk Versus Reward Why Winners Win

To win without risk is to triumph without glory. - Pierre Corneille. You've heard the old saying, "nothing ventured, nothing gained." It is true. When we seek any reward - fortune, fame, or excellence - we place ourselves at risk.

As a baseball fan, I love to watch power hitters like McGuire and Sosa bring the crowd to its feet with a long drive over the fence. Yet, all home-run record holders failed more often than they succeeded. Their lifetime records of strikeouts are two or three times greater than

their home run totals.

While the thrill of winning is enticing, to many people the risk of losing is just too threatening. Many people are afraid to step up to the plate in the game of life. They would rather forego any potential reward than strike out. They rationalize their action by saying, "I may not have won, but I didn't lose either."

The result is what I call the "mediocrity mentality." This describes folks who settle into a comfort zone somewhere between success and failure. They just get by. The epitaph on their gravestone might truthfully read, "Dead at 25, buried 85."

If we were honest with ourselves, we would all admit there are times in our lives when we settle into the "mediocrity mentality." Times when we've traded the challenge of excelling for the comfort zone of safety.

What ultimately separates winners from whiners is how much time we spend in the comfort zone. When we won't risk failure for an exciting and worthwhile reward, we've already failed. For when we fail to try, we lose in life.

I've seen some winners over the years that had good reason to stay in the comfort zone. They were poor, lacked education, had a family history of losing and they had failed once already, etc. They could truly justify their loser's limp.

Some went on to achieve greatness. They became winners because they tried again.

A winner's profile

There are several characteristics you'll find present in winner's lives. They were not born with these characteristics, they developed them by spending time out of the comfort zone. They were not content

with the "mediocrity mentality."

• **Winners develop a positive core of confidence.** No outside negative force can erode this internal positive. When bombarded with negative input, winners focus on past successes instead of past failures.

• **Winners wind their own clock.** The road to success begins when you become fed up with not achieving what you earnestly desire from life. Winners do not depend on someone else's signal or encouragement to get started. They take the first step on their own, and every step from that point on becomes less difficult.

• **Winners value facts over feelings.** In the comfort zone, people only do what they feel like doing. Winners set aside their emotional feelings and focus on the facts. When winners don't feel like doing something, they know that action always overcomes feelings.

• **Winners look up.** Psalms 121:1 says, "I will lift my eyes unto the hills, from whence cometh my help." Look up. It is hard to get down when you're looking up.

• **Winners prepare for challenge.** When the going gets tough, the tough get going. They plan. They practice. They prepare. They focus on the results they want rather than the barriers. When you're prepared, the challenge is often not nearly as great as you anticipated.

• **Winners dare to be different.** The reason so many people never climb the ladder of success is because of the crowd at the bottom. They don't want to leave the majority. Winners know that being different is neither good nor bad - just different.

Between the Covers

Yesterday, Rebecca and I had lunch with Jan Tortoriello, assistant coordinator of the Texas Panhandle Library System and Marie Howe, Dimmitt librarian. We had just finished a training session on databases available to public libraries on the Internet, so the table conversation naturally drifted toward technology.

In reference to the frustration, stress, and even fear felt by librarians, Jan asked the question, "Is it just our age?" We blame age for aches, pains, stiffness of both mind and body, forgetfulness, and myriad of other maladies which beset us. Can we blame age for yet another bump in our road?

This last week or two, well actually the last year or two, one of the big issues in the library world has been technology. Whether this is news to you or not, unless you have traveled in library circles and worked on the front lines, you probably are not aware of the stress level of many librarians.

When I say technology, I mean computers and all they do for us and to us. The potential seems endless, the possibilities limitless, and their usefulness to our society immeasurable. How could a true librarian not want to take advantage of such a wonderful resource?

The downside, the upside for a few, is that this is uncharted territory. No one has traveled it before us to tell us how to proceed. As our luncheon discussion progressed, the uncertainty of going "where no librarian has gone before" became the focal point of the frustration.

Something like what every pioneer throughout history must have experienced, we find that there are so many unanswered questions. They are unanswered because NO ONE knows. While librarians are a curious lot (curious in the sense of wanting to know, rather than curious in the sense of being strange - well, some may be a little strange), we are presented with challenges of a different sort than we are accustomed to.

And, to add to the frustration, many times technology

professionals are unsure of how new strategies will work, or they talk in a different language with such lightening speed that it's difficult, if not impossible, to understand or even stop them to ask for clarification. Then, just when we think we have a tentative grip on things, technology changes, and what we now know is outdated and obsolete.

Of course, there is always the uncertainty inherent in any transition time. I have heard it called "being in the nowhere between two somewheres." It is not a comfortable nor secure place to be. What if we fail to keep up? What if we go through all the work to obtain grants for technology and have no idea how to use it? Will the skills I learned in the workshop I

attended last week stay with me until we have the equipment in place to practice our new knowledge? Just a few of the many, many questions that cannot be answered until we walk through this.

Another factor in the ongoing struggle is the re-organization of the Harrington Library Consortium. HLC has for years been our "daddy," taking care of us in our ever-changing world with our increasing dependence on technology to better serve our public. The Texas Panhandle has been a cutting-edge leader in cooperation and automation through HLC, known throughout Texas. In so many respects we ARE the trailblazers in these areas. Now, because of financial constraints, Harrington is moving toward turning the technology end of the business over to the individual libraries. Oh, boy!

I suppose this is also the frustration in many other fields, but perhaps we feel it more keenly because of our mission, and it is all so inter-

twined with our reason for being. We are taking advantage of every opportunity to keep up with technology and make the latest available to our patrons. That's what we consider our job to be - to make as much information as accessible as possible, to as many people as possible, in the best way possible. No small task, but it is part of our goal to meet the needs of the community we serve.

Lest you think I am complaining, let me assure you that we are very excited about the future. We have the tight cooperation and help of the other Panhandle libraries of the Harrington Library Consortium and the Texas Panhandle Library Systems, as well as the Texas State Library and Archives Commission, with which to meet the challenges and take advantages of the tremendous opportunities of our time.

Not only that, but we also live in an outstanding community of library supporters. You have been patient with us as we have tried to bring the Internet into our information collection. Sometimes we have had to make some tough decisions and have generally had good cooperation from you, our patrons.

Maybe age does have something to do with the anxiety we sometimes feel as we look to the future. Younger librarians who have had computer training in school, and know no other way to do things, take all the changes in stride. We'll take one step at a time and make it, working together. All libraries are about in the same boat. I think it's a good boat to be in.

If you come in the library and we are a little unsure of how to help you with Internet stuff, please bear with us. We are committed to serving you. And, if Rebecca looks a little frazzled, excuse her. Her job as head honcho requires that she bear the bulk of the load.

Feral dogs cause stockmen problems

Dogs are not always cute, loveable or wanted, something shown by the number of animals abandoned near rural dwellings.

Often these dogs are already vicious when they are dumped, or they rapidly turn vicious as they return to a feral, or wild, state. Because dogs, by their nature, are pack hunters, uncontrolled animals quickly form packs, which can kill livestock and even attack people.

Residents living on the fringe of city limits are frequently the target of both feral dogs and dogs allowed to run loose, especially at night.

"We've had a number of in-lamb ewes attacked by wild dogs," said Lisa Huffaker, whose home is just outside the city limits. "Some of the dogs have collars and we only see them at night. Some belong to some of the businesses that supposedly use them as property watch dogs. Most are strays that apparently attack because they are hungry."

Huffaker said a county deputies lives not far from her and he has had a problem with wild dogs as well.

"We've counted as many as nine dogs running our sheep," Huffaker said. "We've had to start pinning them all at night. We've added extra fencing, but sometimes the dogs still manage to get in."

Huffaker's sheep haven't been the only victims of the pack of feral dogs. Her border collies, which are used to herd and protect the sheep, and her pet miniature collies have also been hurt.

Hereford Animal Control Officer Xavier Frausto said individuals living near the city limits can borrow live traps then bring the animal to the shelter for disposal.

"Residents living farther out in the county should really invest in their own live traps if they are having problems with wild dogs. Owners can still bring the dog to us and we will destroy it, humanely," he said.

Frausto discourages the use of poison traps because they can often attract family pets and other animals not causing problems. Poison traps also have very specific warnings and regulations.

Livestock owners often resort to deadly force — that is, killing the attacking animals — but this too, has its restrictions.

"Land and property owners have the right to protect their property, including livestock," Deaf Smith County Deputy Scott Ward said. "But it still needs to be done in a safe manner."

Ward said anyone choosing to shoot an animal needs to know and understand the laws and know when to use them.

"Anytime someone shoots at something in the direction of another building, house or property, the shooter can be charged with deadly conduct, even if a person or the building is not harmed," Ward said.

The Huffaker's, like others who have seen livestock harmed by wild dogs, are ready to protect their stock to the fullest extent of the law.

Livestock owners can file charges in civil court for compensation of wounded or killed livestock, if they can prove

the owner of the dog. This is often impossible when dogs have been dumped or wear no identification. There is very little which can be done in criminal court.

Ward said dog owners can be criminally charged under the vicious dog statutes, if the owner has been warned repeatedly. Usually livestock owners take care of the matter before numerous attacks have been made.

"I don't have a problem with someone shooting a dog ... which is damaging livestock," Ward said. "If you start the job, you need to finish it. Don't leave a dog wounded and don't leave the carcass by the roadside."

Ward said dumping an animal can result in misdemeanor fine on charges of cruelty to animals. County residents can still bring unwanted pets to the city pound, at no cost.

State law requires that all dogs and cats, even those living in the country, must be vaccinated against rabies. The owners must be able to show proof of current vaccinations if the animal bites someone.

"Failure to comply with the law is a Class C misdemeanor. Owners can and will pay the fines as well as the quarantine costs if an animal bites someone," Ward said.

If an animal bites someone, even with proof of vaccinations, the animal will have to be quarantined, he added.

The only way to prevent the unwanted pets is to have all pets spayed and neutered," Frausto said. Spaying and neutering also help curb wandering which often leads to an animal attacking livestock.

Ranchers send cattle to feedyards early

Dry winter crushes cattlemen's hopes

WICHITA, Kan. (AP) — Dry weather means Kansas ranchers who saw strong cattle prices and bought light-weight cattle with the hope of grazing the animals on winter wheat pastures have had to send much of the herd to feedlots.

"Cattle were brought in to western Kansas with hopes of wheat pastures that never materialized," said Steve Hessman, hay reporter for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's office in Dodge City. "Those cattle then ended up in feedlots."

In January, 2.29 million head of cattle were in feedlots across the state, compared with just 2.11 million for the same month a year ago, according to Kansas Agricultural Statistics.

Industry observers expect

the February feedlot count, to be released Friday by the USDA, to also be high.

"The lack of wheat pasture has had an impact on the industry this winter," said Todd Domer, spokesman for the Kansas Livestock Association. "Fortunately, the costs of grain in feedlots is pretty economical at this point, so it probably hasn't been a big economic loss for producers in that situation."

So far, the dry winter has had a minimal impact for livestock producers in Kansas, said James Mintert, an agricultural economist at Kansas State University.

"Wheat grazing is not as predominant an activity in Kansas as it is in Oklahoma," he said. "It has had an impact on wheat grazing, but that is not unusual. There are a lot of years when wheat grazing in Kansas isn't very good."

It is uncertain how widespread the practice of wheat

grazing is in Kansas, since no government agency keeps track of such things for this state. But many wheat farmers with livestock operations graze their winter wheat over the fall and winter months, taking the cattle off in time — typically by early March in Kansas — to still harvest a good wheat crop.

"The winter impact of dry conditions will be different than it will be during the grazing season, and obviously we came into winter somewhat dry," Domer said.

Kansas cattlemen are coping with it because they are used to feeding cattle during the winter, he said.

"If by late April and May it is still dry, then you are going to see a huge impact on the industry," Domer said.

Meanwhile, the dry conditions around the region — coupled with higher feedlot numbers — have cut into surplus hay supplies in the state. Large semi-load lots of Kansas hay have been shipped as far as West Virginia, Tennessee and Kentucky, Hessman said.

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Leon's deft *Little Richard* captures lightning in a bottle



He proved himself as one of the Temptations in NBC's TV movie on the Motown marvels last year. Now Leon pulls out all the stops in his portrayal of a flamboyant showman and Rock and Roll Hall of Famer in *Little Richard*, airing Sunday on NBC.

Biographical movies can be a dicey proposition. Too often, they either respect their central figure to death, turning him into a stuffed and mounted museum piece, or they take outrageous liberties that reduce a person's life to mere tabloid fodder.

Happily, *Little Richard*, which premieres Sunday, Feb. 20, on NBC, is a glittering exception.

Under the strong directorial hand of Robert Townsend, actor Leon (*The Temptations*) gives an electrifying performance as one of the most eccentric and influential figures in the world of American music.

Little Richard himself served as an executive producer on the project, but this TV movie takes a refreshingly honest approach to its quirky title character. Opening during a 1957 concert tour in Australia, where Richard receives what he believes to be a sign from God to leave rock 'n' roll, the movie then flashes back to his turbulent childhood in Macon, Ga.

Flamboyant even as a child, young Richard — one of 12 children — amuses his sisters by dressing in drag and pretending to be his loving mother, Muh (Jennifer Lewis), to the disgust and disapproval of his father, Bud (Carl Lumbly).

Richard receives some measure of pride and happiness from singing in his Macon church, but after his minister angrily accuses the boy of profaning his sanctuary by playing secular rock in the deserted hall, Richard overhears Bud admitting that he is ashamed of his son. Stung and shaken, Richard immediately leaves home for Atlanta, where a series of happy circumstances eventually propels him into his musical career.

The real Richard, who has complained in the past that his musical accomplishments were largely overlooked for a number of years, says he really didn't care whether his story was told in a dramatic TV movie instead of a documentary.

"I just wanted it told, and it didn't matter which way," the 67-year-old singer admits. "I just wanted to see it

while I'm still here. My friends like Elvis ... (and) Jimi Hendrix, who was my guitar player, these people will never see these things. I wanted to see the reaction of the public while I'm alive."

And that public reaction is likely to be very positive, given the top flight entertainment Townsend and his cast have crafted, punctuated by some first-rate musical excerpts. But it's Leon's subtle yet spot-on impersonation of the central figure that most people will be talking about.

Last season, the actor played another famous singer — David Ruffin of the Temptations — in another NBC movie, but he emphasizes that the two jobs were very different experiences.

"With David Ruffin ... it was a very smooth, very elegant kind of performance, something that was very restrained. My hair didn't move," he says with a chuckle.

"From a number of performances I did in *Little Richard*, I can tell you that there's no way I could imagine doing a full set like that. I'm all over the place, jumping and spinning on the piano, and it's just amazing. Little Richard's style of singing in itself is enough to get you overworked!"

Yet Leon somehow doesn't let the effort show, fully embodying the character with all his eccentric ties and wide-eyed attitude yet somehow making all that weirdness become an integral and even oddly logical part of an unforgettable human being.

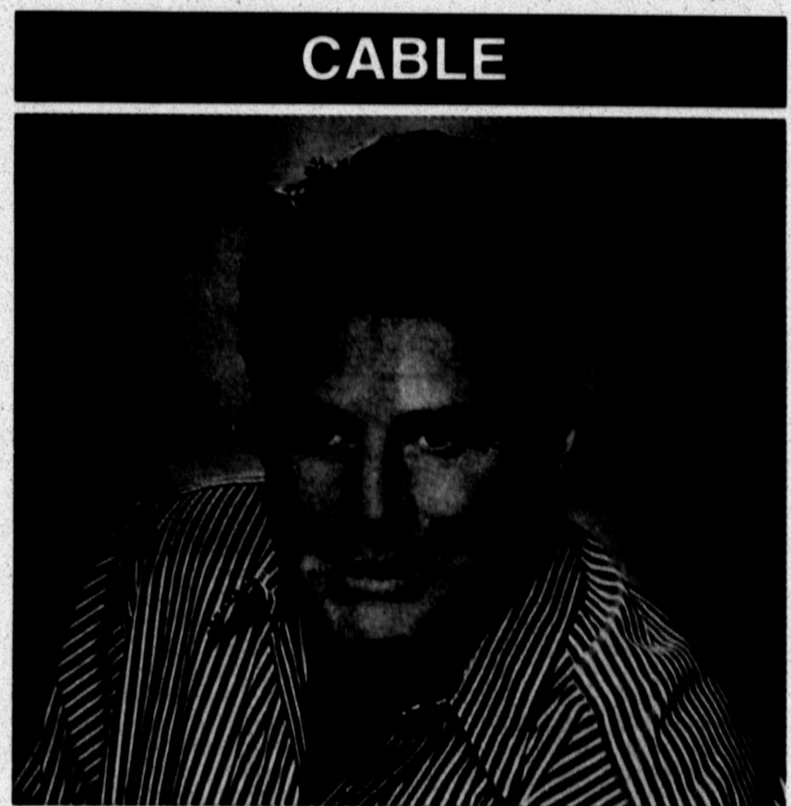

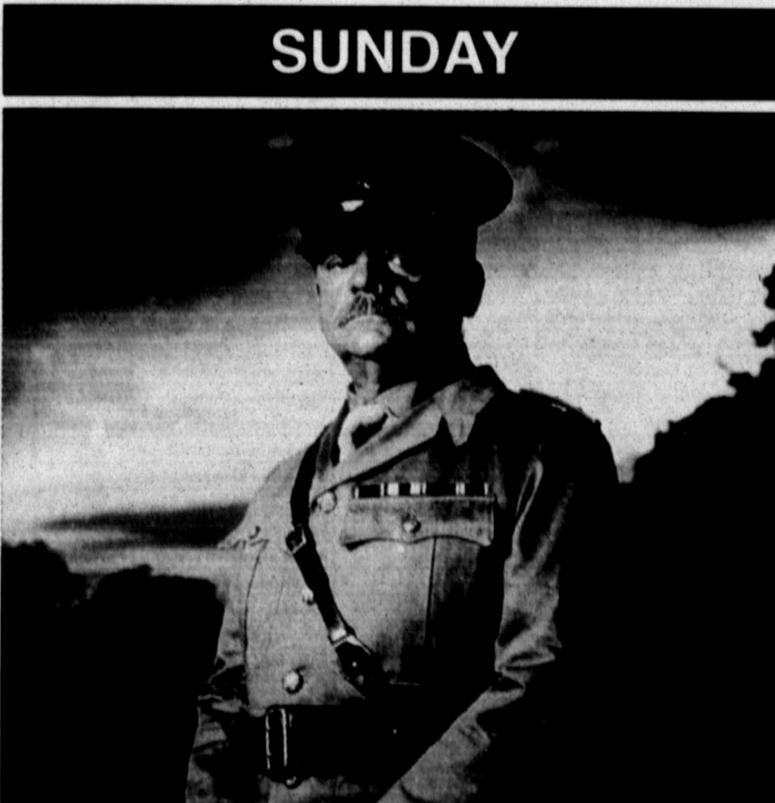

The best in music scheduled to attend the Grammys

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If you're not a big fan of MTV or VH1 and don't frequent your neighborhood record store, *The 42nd Annual Grammy Awards* telecast provides a convenient way of catching up on who's who in today's music scene.

No matter the genre, diversity is the key word, with performers in almost every type of music vying for their respective statuettes at the ceremony, which airs Wednesday, Feb. 23, on CBS.

"Because the Grammys have a diverse approach to music," producer Ken Erlich says, "it's pretty amazing to have Whitney Houston find herself next to (Luciano) Pavarotti (or) have Garth Brooks find himself next to the Backstreet Boys."

Houston, Carlos Santana, Britney Spears, Faith Hill, Will Smith and the Backstreet Boys are among the artists scheduled to perform. All the show's performers are Grammy nominees.

"We've got 14 acts moving across that stage over three hours," Erlich

says. "With four minutes an act, more than half (of the show) is performance (driven)."

"There's also that breakthrough performance we try for every year. We're looking for another moment this year where someone who isn't a household name, the next day is."

The best new artist category is always a good source of breakthrough performers, and it's a real mixed bag this year, with nominees in pop, rap, rock and blues. "There is a lot of diversity," notes blues newcomer Susan Tedeschi. "You've got Kid Rock, Macy Gray and the girls, Britney and Christina (Aguilera), and me."

Not that Tedeschi would refuse a chance to perform during the Grammys, but certain situations would give her second thoughts.

"The only thing that would make me feel funny," Tedeschi says, "is if they made me get up there with someone else. I heard a rumor that they wanted me up there with Kid Rock. What the hell am I going to do with him? I'm there for the music, not for the hype of it."
