WOOD WORK

Retired county worker transforms scrap lumber into 'old' furnishings

Fallen wood fencing scattered along back alleys, old cedar posts tossed into roadway ditches come to life in the hands of a retired Deaf Smith County maintenance worker.

Jack Nunley spends his excess time transforming weathered, scarred, broken and damaged scrap wood, once considered fit only for the dump or a local bonfire, into fashionable furnishings.

The furnishings, because of the weathered material used to make them, resemble many turn-of-the-century pieces which were commonly found in outlying ranch houses.

Nunley, who used to take care of maintenance needs at the county museum, county courthouse and other county buildings, says he has always enjoyed doing wood work, but he got into this hobby through his daughter.

"My daughter saw one of these pieces at some clip joint and told me she wanted one," Nunley said. "After I made her one, it just seemed to keep going."

One of his first pieces was sold to a local gift shop and several unique birdhouses are on display at the Deaf Smith County Public Library.

Nunley designs and creates replica cabinet pieces, tables and bird

houses which can be used indoors or out.

Motioning to his pile of supplies, Nunley recognizes the durability of his work. "Even if someone wants to leave it on their porch, it's not like the weather is going to hurt it any." Pieces replicate the original items

as close as possible, but Nunley uses deck screws in place of nails or wooden pegs, which were used in the early days of the century. For hinges he tries to stay with ones fashioned to look like wrought iron. Fasteners, though, remain much like ones use on original pieces of prairie

urniture. Fasteners are simply crossbars on a screw, or more commonly known as outhouse latches.

Nunley supplements the authentic aura of the pieces with chicken or rabbit wire, or pieces of tin, which he sometimes adds as decoration to the occasional piece.

He works on pie safes, jelly cabinets and shelves as he feels like it.

"This is probably the most ready-made stuff I've ever had on hand," he said. "I've been out of supplies for a while, but now I've got enough to keep me busy for a year or so."

"None of them ever turn out the same. They're all unique. I just make them as it comes to mind," he said.

If he should ere or be undecided about how something looks, all he has to do is ask his live-in critic, his wife, Helen.

"He'll ask about a door or something and I'll tell him what I think. Sometimes I'll help him haul the fencing, but it's his thing. It's what he enjoys doing," she said.

Helen keeps him on track with

N.E.W.S. Stand is a place where young people can get together with some recreational activities. And, it's a place where biblical principles are taught.

That is how Eddie Aguilar defines the facility for junior and senior high youth which held its grand opening last Monday in Sugarland Mall.

Eddie and his wife, Sandra, have been actively involved in teen ministry for nine years and have had a vision of just such a facility for the last seven years. Now their dream has become reality. The couple serves as teen pastors for Good News Church which had a growing youth group that was attracting youth from other denominations.

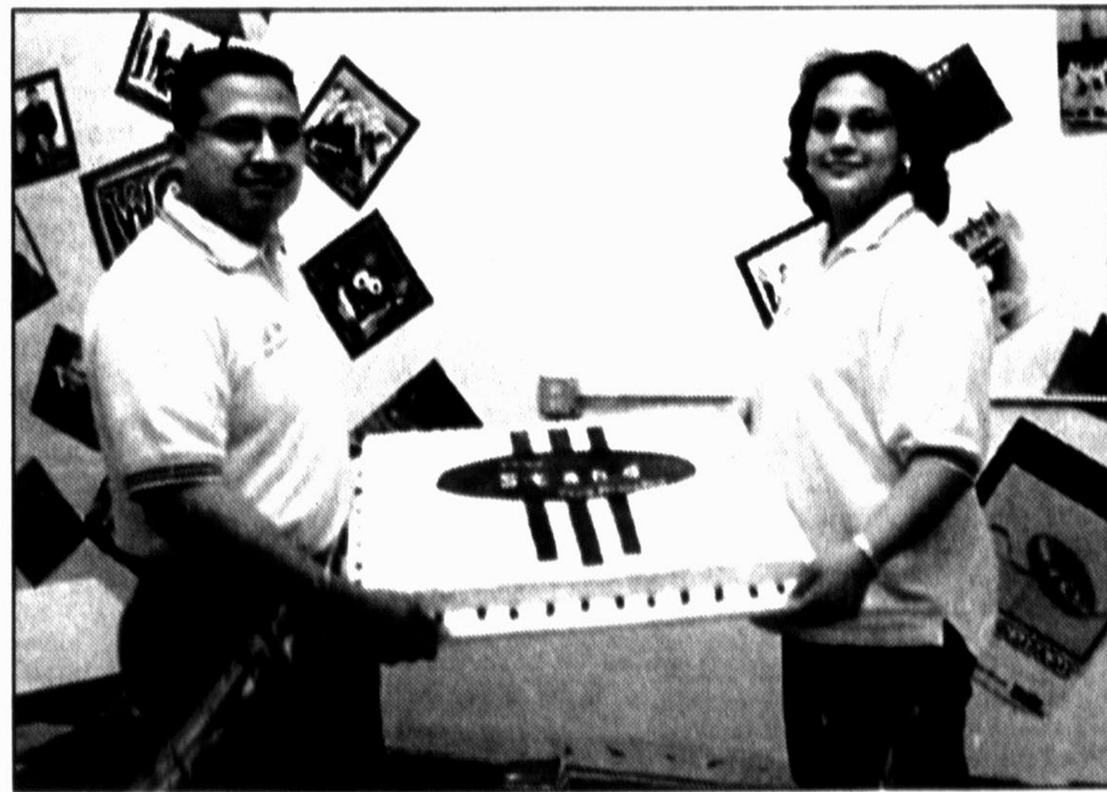
In order to spread their teen ministry to youth of all denominations and those with no religious affiliation, the couple has sought help from "partners" throughout the community who financially help support the building and keep the doors open.

"We incorporate God in everything, but we don't teach a denomination,"

Sandra said. "More than anything we try and take them back to biblical basics and foundations with morality because they go together and so many people today have lost their moral values or they never had any. We like to teach them things they can use every day. We keep the presentations short because we want them to leave with something."

N.E.W.S. Stand is open from 7-9:30 p.m. on Monday and Wednesday.

teach biblical principles and things that will help them through life," Eddie said. "One of the main things we teach is the power of choice and that the choices you make today can affect you for the rest of your life."

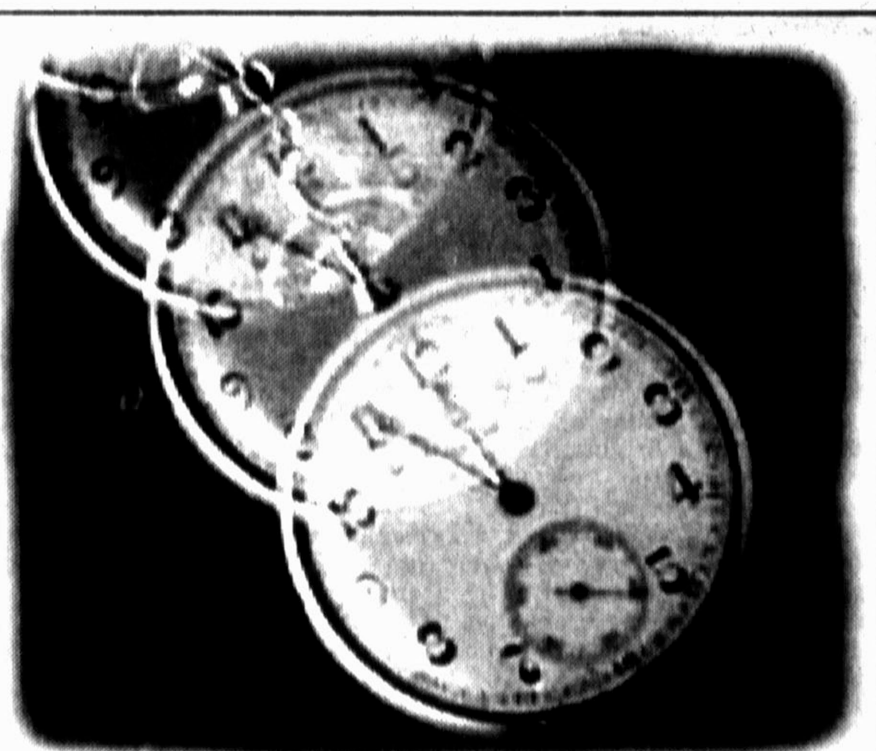
The rest of the night is open for the youth to visit and fellowship together and enjoy the recreational activities. There are ping pong and Foosball tables, an area for skate boarding and roller blading complete with ramps, and a

snack bar. Music is always included and contemporary Christian music is played.

The present location was acquired last October and the youth did much of the work on the building. Plans are in the works for more work in the immediate future.

IT'S THAT TIME OF THE YEAR

The annual ritual of moving clocks an hour ahead happens this weekend when daylight-saving time begins.

The official changeover occurs at 2 a.m. Sunday, though most people will likely adjust their clocks and watches before going to bed Saturday.

Those who forget to spring forward could be late for church, work or other events.

Daylight-saving time lasts until Oct. 29.

Safety officials say this is also a good time to install fresh batteries in smoke detectors.

Some parts of the country don't observe daylight-saving time. Those include Arizona, Hawaii, the part of Indiana located in the Eastern time zone, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands and American Samoa.

Light snow falls in region

Light snow was falling in the Texas Panhandle on Saturday morning as a strong upper-level low spinning over southern Arizona continued to send pieces of energy into West Texas.

Widespread showers and thunderstorms occurred across most of the South Plains and Panhandle, with light sleet or light snow mixed with the rain in northern sections. Hereford received about 0.11 inch of precipitation by early morning.

Hail ranging from pea-size to marble-size was reported in many of the stronger thunderstorms.

A cold front extended from the Oklahoma border southward into southern West Texas.

At 4 a.m., temperatures across West Texas ranged from the 30s in the Panhandle to 60 in the San Angelo area. Winds were mostly from the north at 15 to 25 mph with occasionally higher gusts. Wind chills were in the teens and 20s.

and add things to grab a teenager's attention, like graphic design," Eddie said. "We also plan to add two basketball courts for three-on-three basketball."

All teens coming to the N.E.W.S. Stand are carefully supervised. A group of single adult leaders compose the ministry team which assists the Aguilars. Every member of the team wears a bright yellow shirt with their name embroidered on it so they can be easily identified.

"We have a sign-in sheet on a table at the front door and everybody who comes has to sign in and out so that if a parent calls we can tell who is there or what time they left. That way we can verify who was or wasn't there and that covers us and also covers the kids who come," Sandra said.

N.E.W.S. is an acronym for north, east, west and south. "That's the way we pray for teen-agers, from all directions," Eddie said. "And 'Stand' we took from scriptures throughout the Bible where it talks about no matter what you go through you need to stand on your Christian principles."

Award-winning troupe from HHS to stage play

An award-winning company of young players will present a special performance of Hereford High School's UIL one-act play "The Diviners," a drama by James Leonard Jr. at 7 p.m. Monday in the HHS auditorium.

Admission, which will be by donation, is open to the public.

The HHS company was named alternate in a close District 3-AAAA UIL one-act play contest at the Amarillo College Concert Hall Theater last week.

At that contest, Dumas High School and Caprock High School were selected to advance to area competition, with Hereford awarded alternate should one of the other two schools be unable to compete.

Contest judge C. Lee Turner of Prairie View A&M said the plays presented by Hereford, Dumas and Caprock were all topnotch, the competition very close and "any of the three performances could win state on any particular day."

Turner praised the condensation of the play by the HHS company to meet the 40-minute format allowed by UIL, and the efforts of the actors in relating the story.

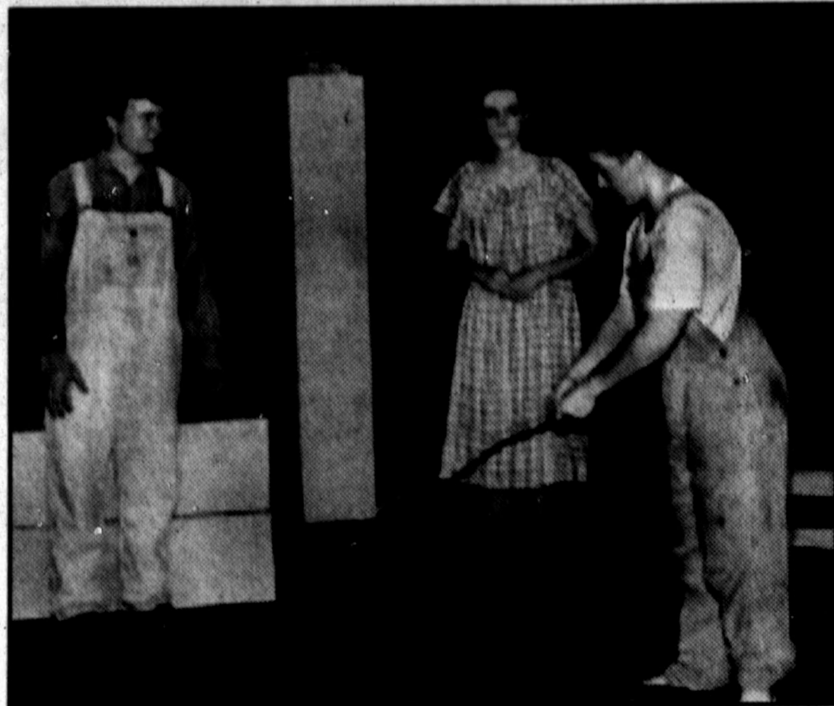
Two members of the HHS company were named to the District 3-AAAA All-Star Cast and one received an honorable mention.

Brendon Edwards, a junior, was named to the All-Star Cast for his main character role of Buddy Layman. Last year, Edwards was awarded an honorable mention to the All-Star Cast for a brief appearance in the play "Harvey."

LaNita Dotson, a senior, was selected to the All-Star Cast for her portrayal of Buddy's sister and principal caretaker, Jennie Mae Layman.

Sophomore Amy Bell, in her second year of UIL one-act play performing, was chosen for an honorable mention to the All-Star Cast for her portrayal of the cynical Luella Bennett.

"The Diviners" takes place in the homes, fields, and public gathering places of the mythical southern Indiana town of Zion, population 40. It's a small rural community of good and simple people who live amidst houses and farms along a river. The play unfolds around homes, and the neighborhood cafe and dry

goods store.

The cast of characters includes Buddy Layman (Brendon Edwards), an idiot-boy who lost his mother to the river, and who possesses a rare gift for "divining" water with a water witching rod. Ironically, while Buddy can find water and predict weather, he is deathly afraid of the water, given what happened to his mother. His aversion to water means he goes without much-needed washing, and though he is a gentle and simple character, his mental state makes him a challenge to those around him.

Jennie Mae Layman (LyNita Dotson) is Buddy's sister. She does her best to look after her brother, despite his eccentric character, and tries to fill-in for the mother both have lost, but she also yearns for a taste of life for herself without the burden of constantly caring for Buddy.

Ferris Layman (Jay Crawford) is the father of Buddy and Jennie Mae, and the local mechanic. Although he can fix broken-down bicycles and machines, he can't seem to come to grips with the state of his family in the absence of his wife and the children's mother, and almost despairs of dealing with Buddy.

C.C. Showers (Darren Sliney) is what some might consider a backsliding preacher. Showers, looking to abandon the life of a man of the cloth, comes to the Layman home seeking work outside the realm of preaching. While he religiously pursues some other identity, he can't escape being labeled as a preacher in the presence of religion-hungry folks in Zion.

Norma Henshaw (Ammie Wharton) is the owner of the Hoosier Dry-Goods store, and a true believer. Norma convinces a host of local folks that C.C. Showers is indeed a preacher sent on a mission and will bring the boy, Buddy, to the Lord. She reads things that aren't there into every word and action of the former preacher and Buddy.

Darlene Henshaw (Amariah Rodriguez) is Norma's niece, but entertains none of the strict notions of conduct held by her aunt. She is a young lady with her own dreams

about the "good-lookin' preacher"—or other men who might prove interesting.

Goldie Short (Angela Morris) hears all of the talk about events, real and imagined, that circulate through the village of Zion because they get discussed at her Dine-Away-Cafe.

Basil Bennett (Brigham Brown) is a farmer, and the local doctor of sorts. He has long advised Ferris Layman that he needs to take measures to help his son, Buddy, who suffers from wild itching due to maladies stemming from his aversion to any contact with water.

Luella Bennett (Amy Bell) is the wife of Basil, and a doubter. Her reaction to the arrival of the backsliding preacher, Showers, is predictable, given her character. She warns that Showers may simply be a con man.

Melvin Wilder (Toby Meeks) and Dewey Maples (Seth TeBeest) are farmhands who have their own observations on the occurrences and people around Zion, from Buddy's water-divining ability to Darlene's interest in men and dancing.

Members of the technical crew for "The Diviners" include Mark Harrell, Sarah Artho and Barrett Abernethy, and alternate is Terence Wilhelm.

nure Spreading, Mariscal Body and Paint, and Juanita's Burrito. Five other partners joined the ministry during the recent grand opening.

"We are able to form something like this by getting together with youth pastors from other churches. When you are able to work across the religious lines and denominations, you are always going to come out on top," Eddie said.

"We hear people in the community say 'You can't make a difference,' but we still feel a difference can be made," Sandra said. "By teaching these principles and going back to biblical basics, we as a community, a city, a state, and as a country, will begin to see a difference in what many have called a decaying generation."

her vivid memories of the way things looked when she was growing up.

"This was all we had. Of course, I remember them. Now it has become a fad," she said.

For Nunley, the hardest part of keeping his craft going is finding the raw materials. He admits he has scrounged the last few fences he's brought home and he often agrees to pick up someone's old fence when he can find it.

His favorite wood to work with is cedar. He says it's already weathered, it won't split, insects don't bother it and it just looks authentic.

For now he likes building the unusual pieces, like the coffee table with horseshoe handles, but he has his eye on other ideas, such as tin woodman made from various vegetable and juice cans.

He doesn't bother with craft shows or flea markets. He has all he can keep up with just word of mouth and curbside sales.

At some time he might approach a museum that might need an authentic looking piece, but for now he's just happy doing the pieces as the mood hits him.

"It keeps me off the streets and out of trouble," he laughs. "It's just something fun to do."

WTRT scholarship applications taken

West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative is accepting applications for scholarships that will be awarded in May.

The 2000 scholarships are open only to students whose parents or guardians are WTRT members or to students who are WTRT members themselves. Applicants must also be either high school seniors who are candidates for graduation this spring, have completed high school or have received their GED.

The scholarships are open only to eligible, qualified applicants from the Hereford, Friona, Bovina, Farwell, Lazbuddie, Dimmitt, Adrian and Vega school districts. Scholarship monies will be disbursed in increments per semester.

An official application form, accompanied by two letters of recommendation, and a wallet-size photo must be submitted. One of the letters of recommendations must be from a teacher, principal or counselor from the high school that the applicant attends or attended, or from a college/trade school instructor if the applicant is enrolled.

In Hereford, applications may be picked up only at the WTRT offices on U.S. Highway

385 South.

Applications and rules may be picked up at the high school counselor's offices in Friona, Bovina, Lazbuddie, Farwell, Dimmitt, Adrian and Vega.

To be considered, applications must be fully completed, have not attachments other than the photo and two required letters of recommendation, and must be received at the offices of WTRT, Box 1737, Hereford, Texas 79045, no later than Monday.

Forest service still wary

■ Fire danger remains high in some areas; Deaf Smith County to remove its burn ban

Recent moisture has dampened the extreme fire danger on the High Plains, but has yet to douse the fire risk. While the ground is saturated and spring green-up is beginning to occur, there still remains a heavy load of dead, fire-prone vegetation.

"The fire danger is still extremely high," said Les Rogers, regional fire coordinator for the Texas Forest Service. "The pastures are not greening up and there's still quite a bit of dead fine fuels (grass)."

Another concern is saturated soil. While the high soil moisture has helped lower fire danger, it has created a potentially dangerous situation for firefighters. Should a fire occur in the middle of a field, firefighters run the risk of getting their engines stuck and possibly being unable

to escape the fire. Rogers continues to ask residents to be cautious.

The recent moisture has reduced the ease of accidental fire starts, a major cause of wildfires this season, and created conditions that allow wildfires to be controlled by local resources.

Deaf Smith County Fire Marshal Jay Spain said the county commissioners will vote to lift the no-burn policy at their April 10 meeting.

"We're lifting the burn ban (in Deaf Smith County) because things are greening up pretty quick around here, especially since we had rain a couple of weeks ago and we're supposed to get a lot more rain this weekend," Spain said.

"Fires will not start as easily and will not burn as intensely as before," says Tom Spencer, fire risk assessment coordinator for the Texas Forest Service. "There's still the presence of fine dead fuels (dead grass), and there could still

be some fires. But with green-up now under way, its presence will buffer that of the dead fuels, making fires easier to contain."

"It's wet out there now, but the ban has a purpose, we don't put it into effect for the fun of it. It's dry out there and we need something to prevent these fires. The driest months are January, February and March," Spain said.

Texas Forest Service resources, which have been staged in Amarillo since January, were demobilized Saturday. Both single engine air tankers and the air attack aircraft were released as well as the overhead team.

On the High Plains, the Texas Forest Service and its aircraft responded to 23 fires on more than 61,000 acres. Rogers says roadside fires, careless trash burning and escaped control burns have been the primary causes of fire this season.

According to Spain, grass fires caused by careless burning have been the most destructive this year. "The main fires we have seen this year have been grass fires. They're mainly all caused by people burning trash and particles fly from the trash barrel and onto the dry grass and catch it on fire."

Deaf Smith County has had

more acres burned this year due to the grass fires than in the past several years.

"Deaf Smith County has probably had about 2,000 acres burned this year by grass fires. That's the most acreage burned in several years," Spain said.

With spring in the air and a forecast calling for more normal weather patterns, including rain, the High Plains will begin to see blossoms of fire relief. But until then, Rogers urges residents to continue to practice fire prevention.

Who's to blame for the fires?

"The three main causes of these fires are man, woman and child - so basically ourselves," Spain said.

Area immigrants to be focus of project

As one of the many residents who have immigrated to the Texas Panhandle since World War II, Stepanova will be part of "New Faces of the Panhandle," a program designed to educate and celebrate regional cultures.

Kathleen Ebell, an English instructor at West Texas A&M University, hopes to help Panhandle residents gain a better understanding of these and other cultures through "New Faces in the Panhandle."

"New Faces" will culminate Thursday-Saturday when immigrants and refugees who have settled in the Panhandle since World War II come together to share and celebrate their cultural and historic heritage. Groups represented will include Hispanics, Indians, Kurds, Laotians, Koreans and Anglos.

"To share, understand and educate the public about new faces in the Panhandle will teach our children and remind us adults to value our freedoms and fulfill our aspirations as the immigrants and refugees in the Panhandle have done," Ebell said.

Panhandle students will begin preparing for the April event through an interactive website, www.utcis-ueb.wtamu.edu. The website contains statistical, cul-

tural and historical information on various ethnic groups.

"Teachers can use the website to develop social studies, English, history and other lessons," Ebell said. "The students planning to attend the April events will prepare a series of interview questions for the panelists."

The three-day event will begin with a lecture on the history of U.S. immigration and ethnicity presented by Dr. Pete Peterson, WTAMU history professor. The presentation begins at 6:30 p.m. Thursday at the Amarillo Public Library, 4th and Buchanan streets.

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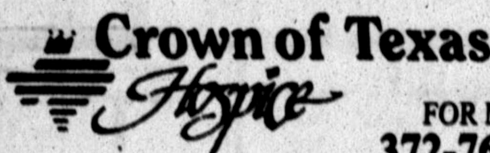

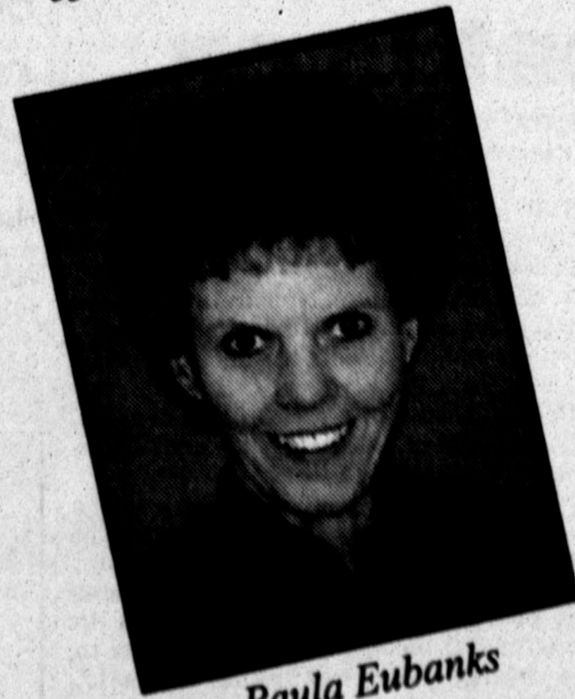

CARA called big land grab

The Conservation and Reinvestment Act (HR 701) is not all its supporters claim. Property rights advocates have denounced it from the beginning as nothing more than a huge government land grab. At issue is the \$1 billion per year land acquisition trust fund. Money that would be used to buy private property for the proposed new parks and recreation areas which the promoters claim are badly needed.

Rep. Don Young, R-Alaska, a former champion of private property rights, is the author and, in a desperate attempt to gain support for his bill, has added portions of HR 798 as a compromise with Rep. George Miller, D-Calif.

Mr. Young's Republican colleagues do not look upon his legislation favorably. In fact, Rep. Ralph Regula, R-Ohio, chairman of the House Interior Appropriations Committee, has been a vocal critic of the bill, citing the \$12 billion backlog in maintenance facing the existing national parks and forests.

Federal and state governments already control 40 per cent of the United States, prompting representatives of several state Farm Bureau chapters to denounce HR 701's bankroll to remove more land from the tax rolls. Federal agencies are quick to tell local officials that they will see no difference in tax receipts because of the Payments In Lieu of Taxes paid to the affected counties.

Unfortunately, those payments amount to only about 60 per cent of what was lost. Can anyone guess where the difference will come from? If you guessed that the remaining landowners will foot the bill you may go to the head of the class. As to the claim that the government will only buy property from "willing sellers," let it be known that the government is capable of turning most anyone into a "willing seller."

Well, then, if property owners won't benefit from HR 701, who will? Ah, the sportsmen, you say. Not so fast. The animal rights activists are eyeing this legislation very closely. They have their sights set on private property and once it is under government control they will lobby to eliminate hunting on that property.

Even more troubling, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has aided and abetted the animal rights organizations by illegally supplying them with grant money to promote their anti-hunting and fishing agendas. The money, by the way, came from the Federal Aid Program, Pittman-Robertson, Dingell-Johnson excise taxes that sportsmen pay to improve hunting and fishing opportunities.

In a case of extreme irony, Mr. Young, as chairman of the House Resource Committee, has spent considerable time investigating the misuse of the funds by the USFWS. He estimates that over \$45 million has been illegally spent by Fish and Wildlife officials.

As a result of what John Dingell, D-Mich., calls "curious spending" habits of the Service, members of Congress and conservation groups, including the Texas Wildlife Association, are calling for the resignation of its director, Jaime Clark.

Mr. Young and Mr. Dingell are sponsors of HR 3671, The Wildlife and Sport Fish Restoration Programs Improvement Act of 2000, which they hope will correct the spending problems of the Service. The legislation found unanimous support in the House Resource Committee.

The original idea behind CARA was to help states like Texas shoulder the burden for the cost of infrastructure and environmental cleanup due to off shore oil drilling. Currently, royalties from the drilling go directly to the U.S. Treasury since the it occurs in federal waters. Unfortunately, all the states wanted a piece of that \$4 to \$5 million dollar pie, hence the present situation with HR 701. By trying to be all things to all interests to gain support for his bill, Mr. Young has created nothing more than a huge pork barrel.

Money corrupts system

The 13 people who've been active candidates for the Democratic or Republican presidential nominations during the past year received nearly \$291 million in donations through Feb. 29.

The campaign contributions ranged from about \$2.1 million to Bob Smith, who dropped out of the GOP race last fall and announced plans to run as an independent, to \$50.6 million for apparent Democratic nominee Al Gore to a whopping \$75.2 million for apparent GOP nominee George W. Bush.

Even Arizona Sen. John McCain, who touted campaign finance reform as his issue during his run for the GOP nomination, pulled nearly \$36 million into his campaign warchest.

Public opinion surveys find voters are becoming more and more cynical about the way moneyed interests are manipulating the political process, yet nothing is being done to stop the torrent of bucks flowing into the coffers of both major political parties.

The amounts may vary, but the corporate political action committees (PACs) have released the spigots and the money is flooding to Democrats and Republicans alike.

It's as if the Democratic donkey is standing the bank of a deep river and the Republican elephant is standing on the opposite bank. They are drinking separately from the river, but the water is from the same source.

The tidal wave of corporate money that has flooded the political system in this country is corrupting the very fabric of our political process.

The American people, while invoked incessantly by the politicians of both major parties, are being pushed farther and farther away from their elected representatives.

To whom do our elected representatives owe their allegiance?

To the people who struggle every day only to find themselves falling farther behind. Or, do our elective representatives owe their allegiance to the corporate honchos who fill the campaign treasuries.

When the sugar industry wants less-strict enforcement of pesticide rules so the sugar growers won't have to worry about polluting the fragile wetlands, who will have the lawmaker's ear? Will it be sugar industry, which has poured hundreds of thousands of dollars into the lawmaker's campaign coffers, or will it be the manatees, alligators, egrets or other endangered species threatened by the pesticides that are destroying their habitat?

When the petrochemical industry wants to get around the clean air rules, who will the south Texas lawmakers hear? Will it be the petrochemical industry whose PACs have pumped huge sums of money into the lawmakers' campaign warchests or will it be the people, mostly poor, who live near the plants?

The oil industry wants to open up the Alaskan National Wildlife Refuge for development, regardless of the damage the development would pose to the fragile tundra, the migration pattern of the caribou and nesting areas of a variety of migratory birds.

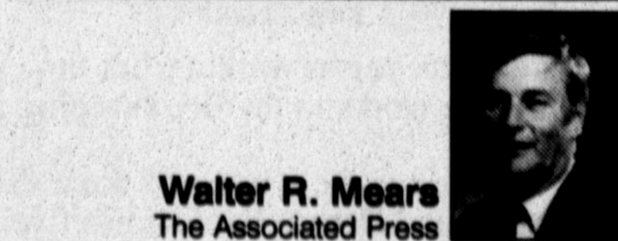
Who will the lawmakers hear? The voice of Big Oil and its huge campaign contributions or the voice of those who oppose the development but who don't have Big Oil's deep pockets?

More than 20 years ago, when U.S. Rep. John Breaux, now a U.S. senator from Louisiana, joked that his vote couldn't be bought but it could be rented, it was considered funny.

It's not funny now.

Energy: When supplies are low, the heat is on

A Republican president demanded action to make the United States independent of foreign oil — by 1980. Instead, dependence on foreign oil increased, and still is.

A Democratic president declared the moral equivalent of war on the same front. He lost.

Now President Clinton, claiming he talked himself blue in the face but no one would listen, said Americans and Congress, should take a lesson from the latest oil price hassle and commit the nation to develop new, more efficient, high-tech energy sources.

And congressional Republicans are accusing his administration of failure to produce an energy policy against the latest episode in this long-playing series, the tripled oil prices that

are expected to ease now that OPEC has agreed to increase production by more than 7 percent.

"I've done a lot more than the Congress has," Clinton said in the last and longest answer at his news conference on Wednesday.

Nobody has done much. Nobody does, once the crisis is over or the price crunch is eased. "You know, I have talked until I was blue in the face about this for years and ... I felt like the tree falling in the forest, if no one hears it did it fall and make a sound, you know?" he said in a mix of overstated images.

Energy policy has not been a major priority of the Clinton administration. Clinton did propose more than doubling, to \$439 million, federal spending on efforts to develop new, renewable energy sources as alternatives to oil, along with tax incentives and subsidies to encourage energy efficiency, more, he said, than Congress has been willing to do.

"I hope very much that this is a little bit of a wake-up call for all of us and that we can put this on the front burner and get some action," Clinton said.

State health department tracking TB

More than 1 million people in Texas are infected with tuberculosis, according to the Texas Department of Health.

Highest risk groups include people born in a foreign country, substance abusers, those with HIV infection, inmates in correctional facilities, people with diabetes and the homeless.

Stopping or slowing tuberculosis in Texas acts as a firewall for 18 other states, especially among migrant workers, said Charles Wallace of the health department's Tuberculosis Elimination Division said.

Texas supports a tracking and TB treatment completion project called TB-Net that follows migrant workers from clinic to clinic.

Tuberculosis usually can be cured with multi-month regimen of antibiotics.

Anti-child abuse effort begins

Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services last week launched a statewide media campaign to prevent child abuse and neglect.

New television advertisements point parents to an Internet site, itsuptoyou.org, which includes parenting tips, local resources, activities for children and parents and volunteering opportunities.

"We need parents to know 'it's up to you' to make a difference in your child's life," said Marla Sheely, public information officer for the agency. "Looking at the research, it's obvious what areas this campaign must target."

In 1998, the most frequently confirmed form of abuse or neglect was neglectful supervision with 18,817 cases. The second highest category was physical abuse with 13,460 confirmed cases.

The number of Texas children dying from abuse and neglect declined 21 percent from 1998 to 1999, the agency reported.

Specifically, 171 Texas children died of abuse and neglect during fiscal 1998 and 135 in fiscal 1999. The state's fiscal year ends Aug. 31.

Anyone who suspects a child is being abused or neglected can call the state's toll-free hotline, 1-800-252-5400.

Court hears school prayer case

Texas Attorney General John Cornyn on March 29 presented oral arguments before the U.S. Supreme Court in *Doe v. Santa Fe Independent School District*.

Cornyn asked the court to uphold the school district's policy of allowing a voluntary student message during pre-game ceremonies of home varsity football games in which the student can choose whether or not to include a prayer.

Trainees will get state jobs

State agencies have 800 unfilled computer tech positions.

To address the shortage of qualified applicants, the state Comptroller's office plans to "grow its own" by opening the new Texas Information Technology Academy in late June.

Twenty to 30 students will receive entry-level pay for 12 weeks while training, and in exchange will sign a two-year commitment to work for a state agency.

Regent's case revisited

Brazos County District Attorney Bill Turner and Matthew Paul, a state prosecutor, urged the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals to reinstate the conviction of former Texas A&M University regent Ross Margraves.

Margraves, a Houston lawyer, was placed on four years' probation after using an A&M aircraft for a \$1,435 trip to his son's college graduation in Baton Rouge, La., in 1993.

A decision by the 14th Court of Appeals set aside Margraves' 1996 felony conviction for misapplication of state funds.

• Thomas "Hollywood" Henderson, a former All-Pro linebacker with the Dallas Cowboys, drew the winning ticket in a \$28 million Texas Lottery in March. Henderson is a community activist in Austin.

• Christine Schmidt, a University of Texas chemical engineering professor, has developed a new "biomaterial" of plastic and sugar that could be used to heal damaged tissue better and faster.

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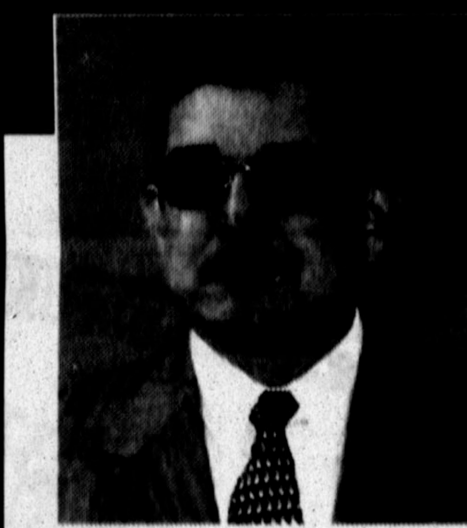

Cox has been with the Fed-

These reports receive extensive attention from leading publications, including *The Wall Street Journal*, *The New York Times*, *USA Today*, *Los Angeles Times*, *Forbes*, *Fortune* and *Business Week*, reaching an audience of more than 200 million. He is a regular contributing columnist for *Investor's Business Daily* and for the Internet-based think tank, *IntellectualCapital.com*.

"Getting a leading economist whose policies help de-

termine the economics of this country is quite a coup for the Investment Series," Anne Macy, WTAMU assistant professor of finance, said.

Cox's visit to Amarillo and Canyon is being co-sponsored by the First National Bank of Amarillo, with coordinating assistance from WTAMU's Finance Association and Students in Free Enterprise.

The precedents don't point that way.

Richard M. Nixon's energy independence plan grew out of a crisis far more difficult than the latest price jolt — the shortages, gasoline lines and soaring costs of the Arab oil embargo of 1973. The crisis passed, and Watergate soon undid the Nixon presidency anyhow.

Instead of ebbing, oil imports increased, costs soared, fuel fueled inflation, and when Jimmy Carter took office in 1977, he made energy solutions his priority, and did win conservation and efficiency action, despite which prices surged again and the gas lines returned.

Through it all, once the crisis ebbed, the issue did, too, and U.S. reliance on imported oil kept increasing. In 1973, the United States depended on imports for 37 percent of its oil consumption. In 1990, Congress declared that 50 percent dependence on foreign oil would be the peril point for national security.

The United States now imports 56 percent of the oil it consumes, and the government forecasts that will go up to 65 percent over the next 20 years.

Not that conservation and efficiency steps didn't register. Since the 1973 energy crisis, automobile mileage requirements, new technologies, increased use of natural gas and conservation incentives have improved energy efficiency by 30 percent, by government estimate.

Increasing demand and decreasing domestic production have led to the steady rise in import reliance.

Republicans argue that more domestic production is the key to less dependence, and accuse the administration of getting in the way with environmental restrictions on oil and gas exploration on public lands. They also want tax breaks to encourage small producers to get back into the business many of them left, broke, after oil prices fell to near record lows two years ago. There have been demands from the Northeast, where heating oil costs multiplied, for the use of oil from the strategic petroleum reserve to ease prices.

Rep. Dick Army of Texas, the House Republican leader, said Americans are paying at the gas pump for eight years of "a Clinton-Gore anti-energy policy."

Sen. James Inhofe, an ardent Clinton critic on all fronts and an advocate of offshore and public lands oil drilling, said the lack of an energy policy didn't start here. "We tried to get a national energy policy under President Reagan, under President Bush and certainly under President Clinton," the Oklahoma Republican said. "We have not been able to do it."

In the House, Republican Rep. George Gekas introduced a bill to create a commission to find a way to energy independence within 10 years.

"We are calling our bill the NRG, the National Resources Governance Act," Gekas said. "NRG. Energy. Do my colleagues get it?"

Not yet. And if the past is a guide, not soon.

Hereford High School students know how to win at rodeos.

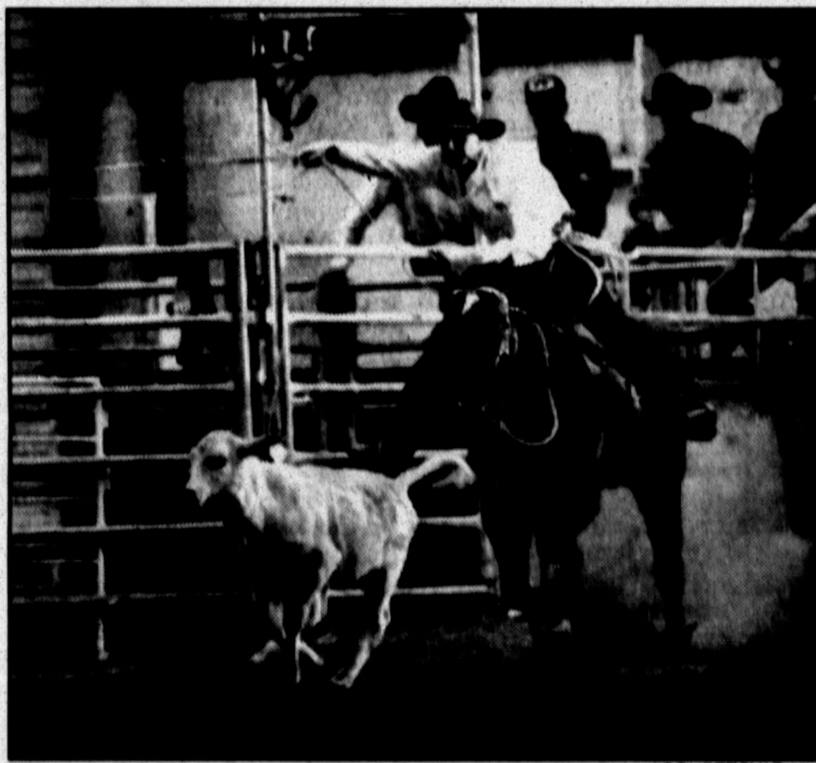
Last weekend, in Childress, four HHS students placed in rodeo events at the second Tri-State High School Rodeo of the spring semester.

■ Berkman sent back to New Orleans

HOUSTON (AP) — Lance Berkman is headed for Triple-A New Orleans to start the season but at least he left a positive impression.

Berkman hit a solo homer in the ninth inning Friday night to rally the Houston Astros to their eighth last at-bat victory of the spring and they remained unbeaten in two games at new Enron Field with a 6-5 victory over the New York Yankees.

"As much fun as it is, it's still a business and things like that are out of my control," Berkman said. "We've got a great bunch of guys down there and while it's fun to be in this ball park, as soon as I get down there, I

know I'm going to enjoy playing with those guys."

Berkman led the Astros with seven spring training homers and Ricky Ledee led the Yankees with seven homers this spring, including the first ever in Enron Field on Thursday night and he hit another Friday that gave New York a 5-4 lead.

"It seems easy to hit the ball out of here," Ledee said. "The ball really seems to fly. During batting practice, you saw a lot of balls go out. I think this is going to be a good hitter's ball park."

Trailing 5-4 after Ledee's homer, the Astros tied it in the eighth on Julio Lugo's sacrifice fly and won on Berkman's homer off Mike Stanton (0-1). Doug Henry (1-0) pitched the ninth for the victory.

The Astros new home has

agreed with Jeff Bagwell. He went 3-for-4 in Thursday's opener and he was 2-for-3 Friday with two RBIs.

After going hitless Thursday night, Yankees catcher Jorge Posada hit a solo homer in the fifth inning that tied the score at 3-3 and hit an RBI double in the sixth that tied the score at 4-4.

Bagwell had put the Astros ahead 4-3 with a run-scoring single in the fifth inning.

The Astros got a 3-0 lead in the third inning off starter David Cone on a grounder by Craig Biggio and singles by Bagwell and Ken Caminiti.

Cone, making his final start before the regular season, went 4.1 innings, allowed nine hits, four earned runs and walked two.

"I felt good tonight," Cone said. "All my stuff was there. I'd like a better result, but

they have a good lineup and they put it to me. You have to give them credit because they're a good team."

"I thought my stuff was the best of the spring. I'd like to be a little sharper with my location but I had all my pitches. I think I'm ready to go."

When I looked up the boy was still there, and he asked me again, were there any fishing experts around here?

"Well, I don't know if there are any experts," I told him, "what did you need?"

I had handed the kid a loaner rod and reel that were rigged and

ready to go, some bait, and directions to go ahead and start fishing. Now, he stood there, rod in hand, looking puzzled. "I've never been fishing before, I don't know what to do with this stuff," he said.

Suddenly, rigging rods and loosening tangles wasn't so important. I had the boy follow me, and stepped away from the cluster of people, to an area where we had a little room. I showed him how the thumb button on the Zebco spinning reel worked, put my hand over his on the rod, and we false-cast together a few times, so that he got the feel of it and the idea of when to release the button.

Then I stood back and let him try it, reminding him to let go with his thumb when the rod came forward on the cast.

Line streamed satisfactorily from the reel at the cast. Line hung in a tree alongside us. No big deal, he wouldn't have to fight trees at the pond. He had the idea. Once I got his line free of the tree, I showed him about baiting the hook, wished him luck, and a littler surer of himself now, headed off to find a place along the pond's bank.

I saw the youngster again at the end of the event, in the rush when folks were bringing back the loaner tackle. Of course, I asked him if he caught any fish.

"Didn't catch any fish," he said. Then, he replied with a grin, "but I sure did have fun."

Might have hooked a young fisherman there--the best catch of the day.

(AP)—The NBA's playoff seeding races got a little tighter, with Charlotte passing Toronto in the East and Seattle moving within a half-game of Sacramento in the West.

Charlotte got a career-high 31 points from Anthony Mason to beat Toronto 110-101 in overtime Friday night, and Gary Payton had 35 points and 16 assists in Seattle's 123-108 victory over Sacramento.

In other games, the Los Angeles Lakers beat Philadelphia 100-88, Indiana beat Minnesota 109-85, Orlando beat New Jersey 103-97, Phoenix beat Detroit 98-97, Utah beat Golden State 114-97, New York beat Vancouver 89-83 and

Washington beat Boston 104-102.

Mason also had 14 rebounds and a season-high 11 assists as the Hornets scored eight straight points in overtime to clinch their fifth straight win and overtake slumping Toronto for fifth place in the East.

Mason also was 15-for-15 from the free-throw line and has hit 26 in a row.

"We knew it was going to be a dogfight," Mason said. "We were able to impose our will on them in overtime."

Besides his offensive feats, Mason also found the energy to guard Toronto's Vince Carter, who scored a team-high 31 points but was only 12-of-30 shots from the field.

"We just have to shake it off," Carter said. "It's rough time for us right now. Things didn't go our way."

The Raptors have lost six of their last seven games. **SuperSonics 123, Kings 108**

At Seattle, the Sonics (41-31) moved within half-game of the Kings (41-30) in the race for seventh spot in the Western Conference standings.

The Sonics scored a season-high 69 points in the first half in rolling to a 20-point lead. The Kings got no closer than 15 during the second half.

The Sonics beat the Kings for the first time in three meetings this season. The teams play for the final time in the regular season on April 18 in Sacramento — a game that could decide the seventh and eighth spots.

O'Neal moved ahead of Philadelphia's Allen Iverson in the NBA scoring race as Iverson was held to 15 points on 6-of-20 shooting. O'Neal is averaging 29.097 points to Iverson's 28.918.

Matt Geiger had 20 points and Toni Kukoc 19 for the 76ers.

The victory ran the Lakers' record against Eastern Conference teams to 26-3, with Sunday's game against the New York Knicks, their last against an Eastern Conference opponent.

Pacers 109, Timberwolves 85

At Indianapolis, Reggie

Miller scored 19 first-half points, becoming the 25th-leading scorer in NBA history, and finished with 26.

His showing represented a turnaround from Indiana's last three games, all losses. The Pacers' career scoring leader connected on just 15-of-41 shots from the field, scoring 41 points, over that span.

"We have a month left to get ready for the playoffs. We were playing a team that has been playing very well since the All-Star break," Miller said. "We moved the basketball. We got some good shots and our defense was in sync tonight. We were rotating."

Travis Best matched his career high of 27 points, shooting 12-of-16 from the field, and Jalen Rose added 21 for Indiana.

Magic 103, Nets 97

At Orlando, Ron Mercer scored a game-high 22 points and Bo Outlaw finished with

16 points, nine rebounds and seven assists. John Amaechi scored 17, Ben Wallace had 11 points and 14 rebounds and Darrell Armstrong had 11 points and nine assists.

The victory, combined with Detroit's loss to Phoenix, moved the Magic within percentage points of the Pistons for the seventh-place playoff berth in the Eastern Conference.

City expected to cancel election

If things go as expected, voters won't go to the polls May 6 to cast their votes for city commissioners or school trustees.

The terms of four city commissioners are expiring. And, there are four candidates.

In the Hereford Independent School District, there are three terms expiring and three candidates.

Because there are no contested races, the Hereford City Commission will consider an ordinance Monday night to cancel the election.

Following adoption of the ordinance, the commission will conduct a casting of lots to determine which candidate is elected to Place 5 (at large) and Place 6 (at large).

A similar situation occurred last year in the municipal election when Mayor Bob Joaserand and Place 3 Commissioner Tom Conaway drew

no opposition. The commission declared the two incumbents as the winners and their names were left off the ballot.

HISD public information officer Jack Stein said last week the school board probably will take the same action at its April board meeting.

With the fling in the city and school district election concluded, the candidates are:

- Place 2: Angie Alonzo (i);
 - Place 4: Wayne Winget (i);
 - At-large: Roger Eades (i); and
 - At-large: Michael Kitten.

- SCHOOL DISTRICT**
- District 1: Alan J. Foster;
 - District 3: Mark Landrum (i); and
 - District 6: Lloyd Ames (i).

Filing in the Deaf Smith County Hospital District race will not end until Thursday. Although petitions have been picked up, none have been returned — so there are no official candidates.

HOSPITAL DISTRICT

The four seats on the hospital district board are all at-large and are now held by Mark Collier, Dean Crofford, Jesse Rincones and Karen Solomon.

While Collier, Crofford and Solomon are completing full terms, Rincones is filling out the unexpired term of Jeremy Grant. Grant resigned last fall.

Collier has been a director since 1996; Crofford, since 1994; and Solomon since 1997. Solomon was appointed to complete an unexpired term, then won a full term in 1998.

Candidates for seats on the hospital district board must submit a petition with 25 signatures of registered county voters by 5 p.m. April 6.

Petitions are available in the Hereford Regional Medical Center administration office during regular office hours. Completed petitions must be authenticated as

signed by registered voters by the candidate in the County Clerk's Office before being submitted to HRMC administrative assistant Carolan Garza.

The deadline to register to vote in these elections is Thursday.

Voters who want to vote by mail-in ballot must apply by April 28.

Early voting in-person will be April 19-May 2.

James raced cars many years ago on the asphalt tracks in Lubbock, Amarillo and Altus and still keeps in

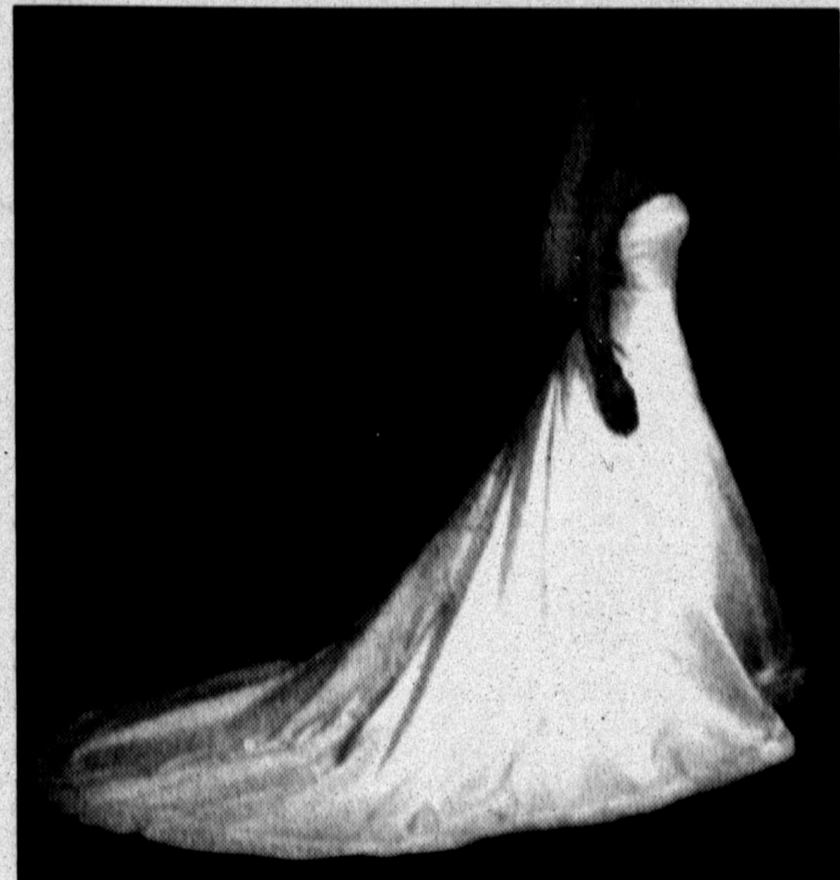
touch with racing buddies. "He is hoping a lot of his old racing buddies will be at the concert," Kathy said.

It could also be the day on which we would all agree to accept the olive branch extended by a former friend. Life is too short to hold grudges. To be able to forgive can be enormously healing and life-enhancing. It's the best example of casting your bread upon the waters, and getting back caviar sandwiches. Do it today. Make it a real day of reconciliation.

Dear Ann Landers: Last night, I was caught totally off guard by a young man's expression of gratitude. I had just arrived at the gym for my daily workout. Nearby, was a young man. I guessed he was Asian, and asked him, "What is your homeland?" When he said he was from Vietnam, I told him I had been there in the Navy during the Vietnam crisis. He bowed his head and said in a soft, sincere, almost reverent voice, "Thank you."

I learned he has been in the United States for 16 years, and earned a degree from a local state university, where one of his teachers gave him an American name, Kenneth. He is a freelance writer in the performing arts, and feels so fortunate to be here. "Everyone wants to come to America," he said.

After he left the gym, it occurred to me that no one had ever thanked me for my efforts, my sacrifices and my losses during the Vietnam crisis. In fact, after the war, some veterans were subjected to vicious name-calling and harassment. Because of the

threat of job rejection, when I wrote my early resumes, I made no mention of my military service.

Recently, people have become more understanding of the Vietnam era, but the news media has been largely one-sided in recalling those years. What a disservice, and so unfair to those who served so nobly. No name, just sign this letter — I Was There

Dear Friend Who Was There: So was I — in 1967, and it was one of the most rewarding and memorable experiences of my life. The month was August. The temperature was 113 degrees. I wore G.I. fatigues and Army boots, courtesy of the U.S. Army. I was in Da Nang to visit our men in the military hospitals.

My parent paper, which was then the Chicago Sun-Times, arranged for my transportation to San Francisco, and sent a photographer with me. The U.S. government took over from there. Once I arrived, I went from 9 a.m. until 9 p.m., from bed to bed, visiting informally with our soldiers. My initial response was astonishment at how young the men were, some 18 and 19 years of age, just out of high school. The "astonishment" went both ways. A great many soldiers recognized me immediately, and said they couldn't believe I had come all that way to visit them.

Gen. Westmoreland learned I was on the premises, and asked that I pay him a visit so he could thank me personally. He could not have been more cordial. What a handsome man he was! When I saw him years later at the wedding of Sen. Stuart Symington and Nancy Watson in Connecticut, he was still handsome, had aged very little, and said he remembered my visit vividly.

Please forgive me for rambling, Dear Readers, but when anyone says "Vietnam," a flood

of memories rush to my mind, and there is no stopping me. That war was not a popular one, but the men who served and the 58,000 who died have earned our eternal gratitude. They certainly have mine.

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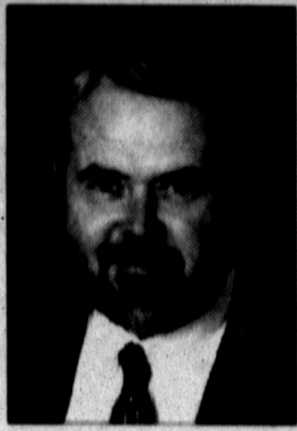

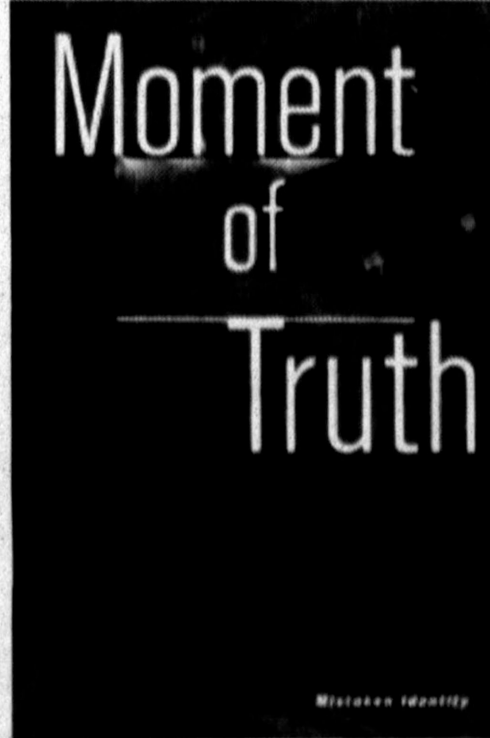
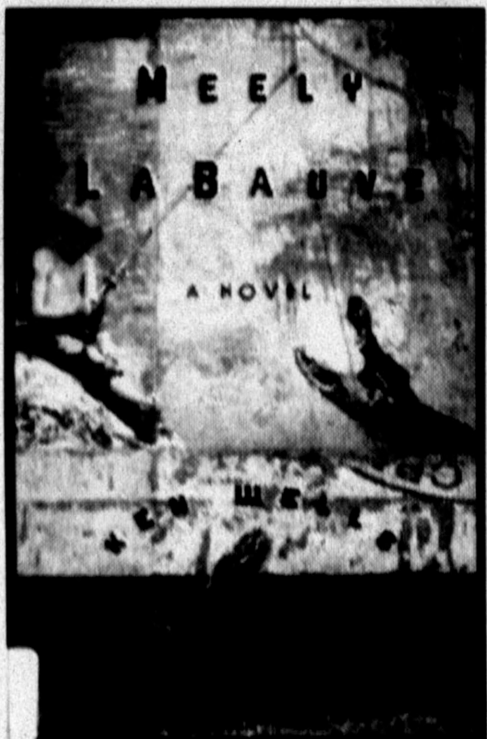
the law's sights, it takes baseball bats, fire ants, flying alligators, an unidentified body and a lot of fast thinking to set things right.

Legislation offers insurance improvements

More coverage at lower cost is the ultimate goal of crop insurance legislation approved this week by the U.S. Senate.

"If all goes well, the farmers may have the bill within 30 days that would provide a better coverage and a better price for the producers," said Jason Andrews, a local farmer and crop insurance salesman. "It still has to go to the joint house (conference committee) and we have to wait and see what happens there."

Andrews said he doesn't know how many local producers have crop insurance, but is fairly certain most do not have adequate coverage.

"What it boils down to is for what it covers, the price is just too high," Andrews said.

The bill, if passed, could cost taxpayers \$1.5 billion annually for the next four years.

"Crop insurance is subject to the budget," Andrews said. "It is part of the ag expenditure."

Currently crop insurance costs are determined through the use of a formula which includes an individual farmer's yield. Andrews said that for many producers in this area that can put them in a higher risk category and so make their coverage more expensive.

"We get into multiple loss years, which lowers our yield and puts the farmer at higher risk of loss," he said. "Hopefully — and this is just speculation — the new formulas would eliminate a

number of the worst loss years and so bring up the yield, putting the farmer in better position."

Andrews described crop insurance as an excellent risk management tool, but one which has to be wisely used with all the pros and cons being weighed.

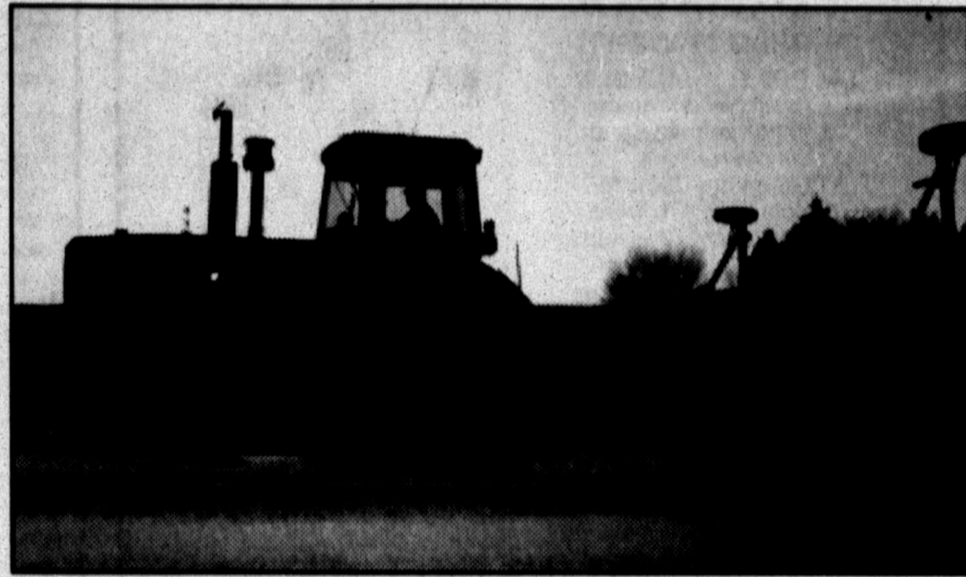
"You have to weigh the cost of the risk management with the cost price received for the final product. If the price doesn't cover the cost and still make the farmer a profit, then all the risk management in the world can't do any good," he said.

Many lending agencies look at the amount of insurance coverage a producer has and considers it part of the borrower's assets.

"We don't require a producer to carry crop insurance," First National Bank President Wade Easley said. "Sometimes if a producer's income statement is right on the edge, it might sway our decision."

Easley, like Andrews, doesn't know how many local farmers have adequate coverage, but he feels that it is a fairly low number.

With the passage of the new legislation, the government subsidies would increase up to 67 percent of the farmers cost.

"Many people don't like the thought of government 'subsidizing' the farmer, but if they want to maintain a relatively inexpensive food and fiber supply then the farmers are going to have to get some subsidies."

Andrews explained that many people erroneously feel food crops could be imported more cheaply than by providing producers with some form of subsidy.

"When you can't grow the food domestically, then the prices would go up and the American consumer would be at an even greater mercy of food producing nations. Just look at the way gas prices have gone up," he said.

Andrews pointed out that agricultural producers are in a unique position, because this is the only industry where the profits do not keep up with the cost of inputs.

"Every aspect of agriculture has grown exponentially except the price for the final product," he said.

As an example, Andrews demonstrated that the price of a bushel of corn nuts — hard roasted and flavored snacks — would cost a consumer about \$400. A bushel of corn earns the producers about \$2.50.

"The profits are going somewhere and this legislation would provide producers a safety net

so they could ride out the periods of low prices," Andrews said.

The new bill would add livestock policies as well as expand coverage for specialty growers, such as fruits and vegetables.

Crop insurance programs are not changing, according to Andrews, just the way the cost is figured. Insurance could still only be offered to growers of approved crops and the private companies would continue to service policies set in place by the federal agencies.

Andrews admits many farmers have opted to keep the least amount of coverage as possible, but if the legislation passes, many would increase their coverage, if they could see a real advantage.

"Many producers won't allocate more money for the same risk management, but they will spend some. They want to make sure they are getting as much as possible for what they spend."

Andrews said the bill could possibly be made retroactive so it would benefit this year's crop, but he doesn't see that happening.

Researchers view water/waste relationship

BUSHLAND — At the Bushland USDAS Agricultural Research Service and the Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station experimental feedlot a remarkable team of scientists is quietly going about their work. Their findings, however, may well affect the way cattle feeding operations are designed and operated all over the state.

To the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, the facility and its research are of particular interest. The results of this research could eventually find its way into the water quality management plans the TSSWCB certifies for smaller feedlot operators as part of its mission to reduce agricultural sources of nonpoint source pollution, noted Charley Rodgers, manager of the TSSWCB's Hale Center regional office.

Water Quality management plans are voluntary, site-specific, plans which include land treatment practices, production

practices, technologies and implementation schedules. These plans ensure farming or ranching operations are carried out in a manner consistent with state water quality goals.

"There are many states that haven't gotten to the point of trying to develop guidelines. The State of Texas is really ahead in this area," noted Dr. Nolan Clark, laboratory director and agricultural engineer, ARS.

Other partners working with ARS and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station include West Texas A&M University, Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory. Texas Tech University and New Mexico State University are also active in the research programs.

Researchers are examining all facets of cattle feedlot operations. Part of their work involves scrutinizing the design and management recom-

mendations currently being made to feedlot operators. Scientists are also looking at new ideas which could mean improved animal nutrition and health, a lessening of feedlot impacts on water quality, and the ability of feedlot operators to continue to maintain food safety and quality.

"We have a unique capability of being able to go in and monitor and double check all of the design parameters that we use. We can evaluate the process and make sure we have the best guidelines. We can see if everything that we are saying in calculations matches up with what is actually happening in a managed feed yard," Clark said.

The heart of the on-going research centers around 18 cattle pens, each designed to hold 10-15 head of beef cattle. The row of rectangular pens slopes downhill at a precise 4 percent slope, with each pen terminating in what looks like a giant funnel. Near the end of the funnel, or flume, is a monitoring station.

"We are instrumenting each pen individually so we can measure the runoff from each pen. We are not only measuring the amount of runoff, we are also sampling the runoff and determining all of its components. The procedure varies from one project to the other as to what we look at in detail," Clark explained.

One aspect of research at the facility is looking at what cattle are fed. Researches are

studying how different mixtures and amounts of nutrients are digested by cattle, and in particular, how feed affects the animal's waste.

"Right now we are looking at the role of a particular yeast product has on increasing nutrient digestibility and reducing waste output," said Dr. Wayne Greene, professor and animal science ruminant nutritionist, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and West Texas A&M University.

"If we can find a treatment that increases feed digestibility by 5 percent, we would reduce the amount of waste excreted by that animal by 25 percent," Greene said.

Other research is looking at how manure from feedlots can be integrated into other systems of agricultural production. Scientists will be using manure from the feedlot to fertilize wheat, sorghum, and native vegetation in adjacent test Pastures.

"This is going to be a showcase for land area requirements for balancing certain nutrients," added Dr. Brent Auvermann, assistant professor, agricultural engineering/environmental systems, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"We will be able to show producers, in terms of soil samples, why we say you need 'X' number of acres for land application of waste, per head of beef cattle," Auvermann said.

as vice president of research; Bill Kubeca of Palacios was elected as vice president for legislation; James Vorderstrasse of Hebron, Neb., will serve as secretary; and Ken Tevis of Hughesville, Mo., will serve as past president.

The NGSP board of directors is made up of sorghum producers from six states. These representatives are elected by their state associations, with board representation based on the number of members from each state. States with sorghum checkoff programs that provide financial support to NGSP also have representation on the board, although checkoff representatives do not vote on legislative issues.

A wraparound porch and attractive windows introduce the comfortable sunny styling of plan G-79, by HomeStyles Designers Network. It has 2,245 square feet of living space.

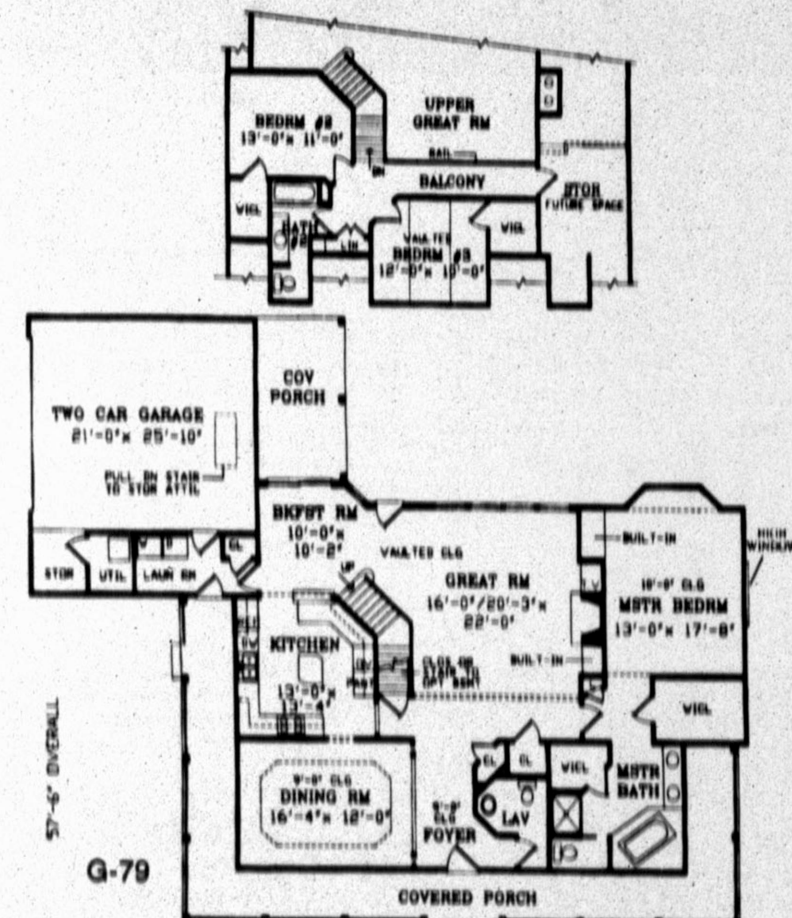

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CBS prepares special rollout for its promising *Falcone*

CBS programming executives obviously realize they have a promising and decidedly unorthodox new drama series in *Falcone*.

They're rolling out the occasionally violent new show unconventionally, in nine hours airing over eight nights, starting with a special two-hour premiere on Tuesday, April 4. Additional one-hour episodes air each of the following nights except Sunday, April 9, climaxing Wednesday, April 12.

Based on the true-life exploits of FBI agent Joseph D. Pistone — whose story also inspired the film *Donnie Brasco* — the new CBS series follows Pistone, aka Joe Falcone (Jason Gedrick, *Murder One*), as he infiltrates the mob to expose such ringleaders as Santino "Sonny Boy" Napoli (Titus Welliver, *Brooklyn South*) while struggling to maintain a family life.

Although the show's organized-crime setting might evoke comparisons to HBO's red-hot *The Sopranos*, Falcone has more superficially in common with another fondly remembered CBS cult hit, *Wiseguy*. That's a comparison Welliver strongly resists.

"I enjoyed that show, but I thought it was a little slick," he says candidly. "I think our show is a lot grittier. We have the same process of bringing characters in that Jason's character bounces off of.

"*Wiseguy* sort of reminded me a lot of *Miami Vice*. I don't mean to imply that it necessarily glamorized (violence), but I think our show really shows the immediacy of the violence, and the life, and the constant threat of ... him being unveiled as an FBI agent. But that's sort of mixed up beautifully with our relationship, and how he wins my confidence and we become closer and closer, and how the allegiances are constantly tested."

Of course, there's one built-in creative hurdle to Welliver's long-term participation in the show: If Joe's primary objective is to put Sonny in jail, how long can the series logically continue to keep the two men together on-screen?

Executive producer Bob Singer is keeping mum for now.

"That's a question we've asked ourselves a lot," he says with a chuckle. "And we try to give each individual episode an emotional conclusion so the audience doesn't feel like they're just hanging out waiting (for Joe to bust Sonny).

"By the end of the last episode, something will happen — and it will be totally satisfying for people who have stuck around for all the shows."

While the show is a candidate for the fall schedule, Welliver and Gedrick are philosophical about whether *Falcone* has the potential to become a mainstream hit.

"I have no expectations. Just do the work and sort of leave caution to the wind, and hopefully, we'll get an opportunity to come back. But it's a great joy to go to work every day," Welliver says.

"Any time I've been on a show that I've been extremely proud of, I hope for the best," Gedrick says in agreement. "But if it doesn't work out, what do you do? Do you think about doing a show with less quality that might be more viable or commercial?"

"We're on another great show, where the writing is superior to most TV shows. (The writers) outdid themselves, and we're going to deliver. Hopefully, we can get everyone to see it."

And for viewers who remember Gedrick's and Welliver's electrifying work in their past vehicles, that's all they need to know.

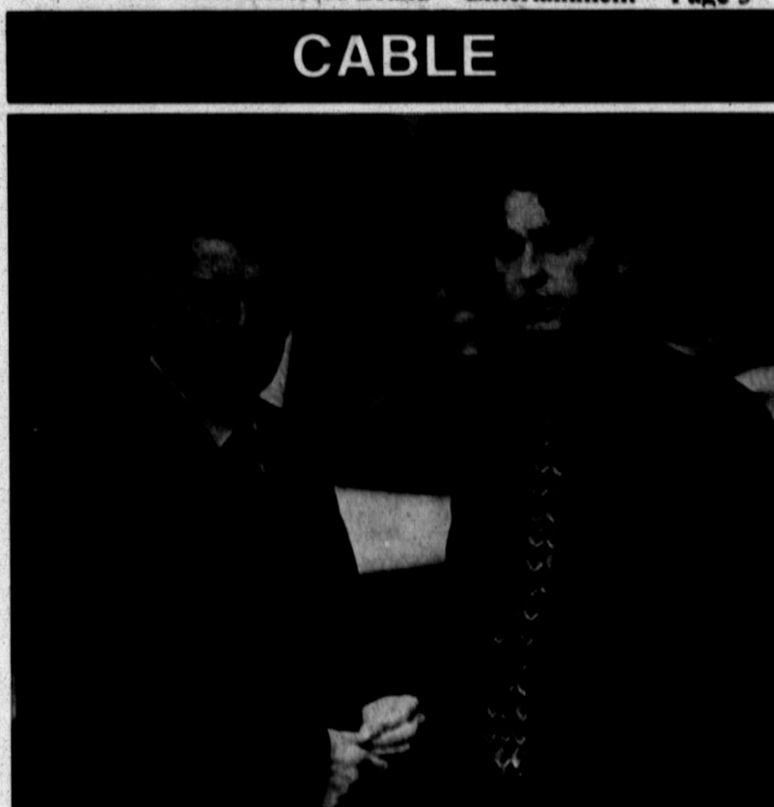

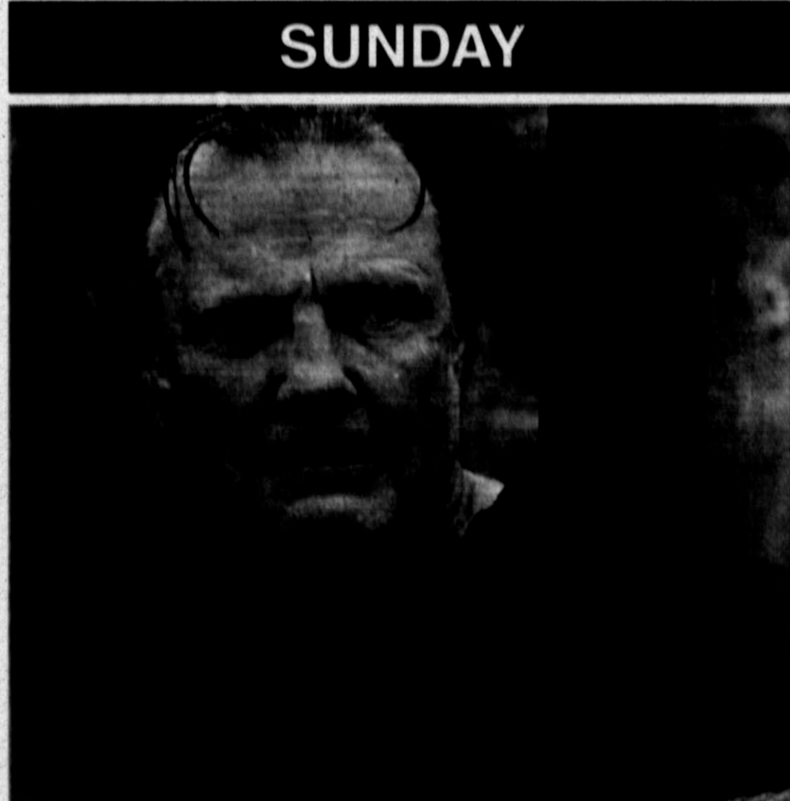

FDR's financial man puts Alan Greenspan to shame

In the middle of the 21st century, will people talk about Alan Greenspan manipulating the great boom of the 1990s? Or, like Jesse Jones, will he be forgotten? Caught up in today, sometimes we forget yesterday.

A biographical documentary, *Brother, Can You Spare a Billion? The Story of Jesse H. Jones*, airs Monday, April 3, on PBS (check local listings) and does a great job of explaining the Great Depression and how one man helped the nation climb out of it.

Jones, whose formal education ended at eighth grade, was born in 1874 to a tobacco-farming family in Tennessee's Robertson County. At age 14, he discovered his business acumen as he negotiated with other farmers and realized he enjoyed bargaining more than farming.

Soon he was running an uncle's lumber business in Houston, and with a keen understanding of credit, he managed to parlay a small company into a chain of 65 yards and began building houses. He was borrowing millions when that was a most unusual quantity.

Jones built Houston's skyscrapers and owned its ritziest hotel, its major newspaper and a bank. A visionary, he recognized Houston couldn't be a world-class hub without access to the ocean. He persuaded the federal government to dredge the channel to the gulf. During economic crises, when others panicked, he remained calm.

Houston native Walter Cronkite, the documentary's narrator, recalls Jones as a dominant force in his hometown. As a young reporter, he interviewed Jones.

"He was an imposing man in person, very much so," Cronkite says. "Besides having made a lot of money -- in a period of time where there weren't millions of millionaires -- he was looked at with considerable awe by most of those who knew him because he had done so well in business."

As President Franklin Roosevelt's chief financial architect, Jones effectively reinvigorated the economy with his clever use of credit.

Shortly before he died at the age of 82, Jones said, "I suppose I'll be lucky to get into heaven. And if I do, I'll be happier there if it's just a mite like Houston."

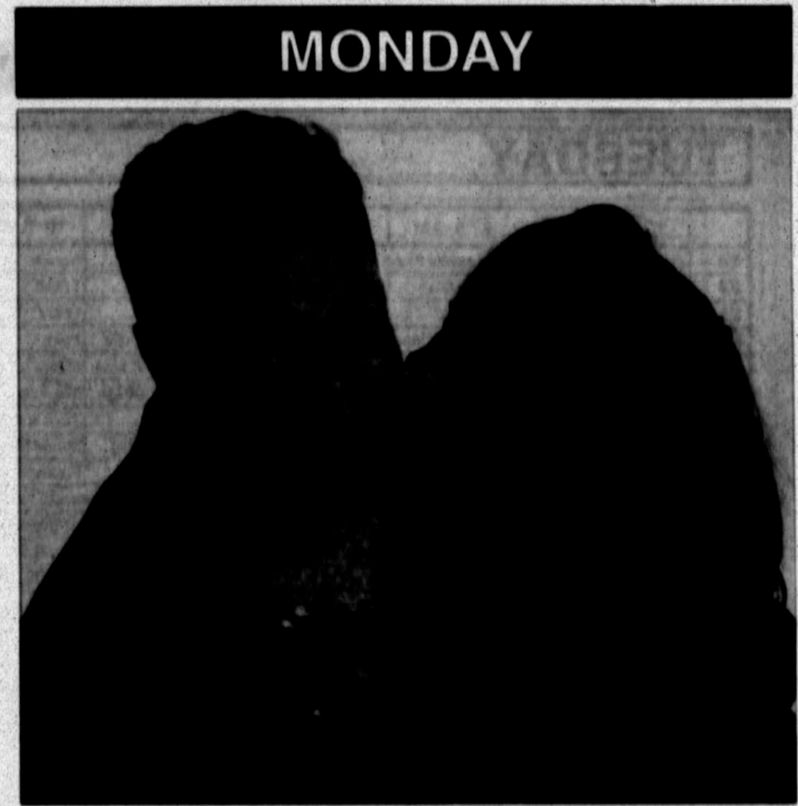

Danny isn't related to Mary Stuart, but he is the older brother of Christopher Kennedy Masterson, who plays the eldest sibling on *Malcolm in the Middle*.

Q: Who played Artemus Gordon opposite Robert Conrad's Jim West in the TV series *The Wild, Wild West*? -Helen Kofod, Chicago.

A: Ross Martin played Artemus in that tongue-in-cheek adventure series. The Polish-born actor suffered from a heart attack during the run of the show. He died in 1981 of complications from his heart condition. He was 61.

Q: Does Laura Innes, who plays Dr. Kerry Weaver on *ER*, really need that device to help her walk? -C. Vitale, Fairview, N.J.

A: That's a character point invented by the show's writers.

Q: Do the story lines of *The West Wing* follow the real procedures of our government or is that fictional? -M.M. Kellman, Valparaiso, Ind.

A: The show's principal writer and creator, Aaron Sorkin, draws upon the information he amassed while writing *The American President*, as well as input from insiders such as President Bill Clinton's former press secretary, Dee Dee Myers. He also takes liberties for the sake of making compelling drama.

A: She's his daughter.

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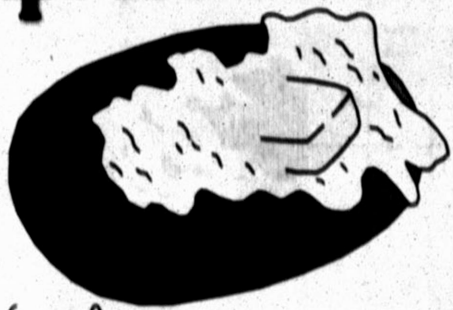
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Potato Facts

•One serving of potato is one medium potato. Nutrition facts: Calories 100, Calories from fat 0g, Total Fat 0g, Cholesterol 0mg, Sodium 0g, Potassium 720gm, Total Carbohydrate 26g, Protein 4g. These facts are for a plain potato with no toppings.

•The average person eats 142.7 pounds of potatoes each year.

•Don't buy potatoes that are soft or that have excessive cuts, cracks, bruises, discoloration or decay. Also, avoid green potatoes: they have been exposed to light which means they are coming out of dormancy. If you buy green potatoes, simply pare away the green portion, which sometimes can be bitter.

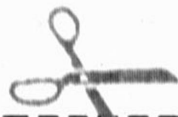
•Store potatoes in a cool, dark place. They store very well about 50°F but they should not be refrigerated because temperatures cooler than 42°F converts potato starch to sugar, which changes the taste and causes the potatoes to darken when fried.

•Cook with the skin as much as possible to preserve the potatoes abundant nutrition.

•Never bake in aluminum foil. Foil seals in the moisture and steams the potato, making the texture pasty instead of dry and fluffy. Aluminum foil can be applied after baking to hold the serving temperature.

•You can spot a potato connoisseur because he or she will never open a baked potato with a knife. Instead, the connoisseur will poke a zigzag pattern into the top of the potato with a fork, then will press the ends of the potato together to open or "blossom" the potato. The connoisseur recognizes that the blade of the knife flattens the surface and alters the premium fluffy texture of the properly prepared potato.

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
