Russell loves her position

Maybe she'll go on to something else, but while Martha Russell's serving as assistant director of the Deaf Smith County Public Library she intends to be the best librarian she can be.

Russell, who has been assistant director of the library for 3½ years, said, "I have found that no matter what field I'm in, it serves me well."

"While I'm here, I want to be the best librarian I can be. I want to know the most I can about the newest technology. I want to learn the most I can learn. There's always something new out there," Russell said.

Russell didn't start out to be a librarian, although she now says she wishes she had majored in library science in college instead of sociology. But now that she's in the field, she has found what she considers to be her calling.

"I wonder now why I didn't major in library science while I was in college because I love it," Russell said with a laugh.

"I've always been a reader. I always loved to go to the library; librarians were always my buddy," she said.

One of the pleasures of being a librarian is "dealing with the people. You never know what information you'll be asked to help find. Like someone wanted to know about the biggest refinery in South Africa, and someone else wanted to learn something about the world's biggest rodent," Russell said.

Russell has lived in Hereford for 11 years. Russell and her husband, Lee, who works at B&R Thriftway and runs some cattle, have two sons, Sam, 19, a computer info systems major at South Plains College in Levelland, and Joe, 14, an eighth-grade student at Community Christian School.

Before moving to Hereford, the family lived in Oklahoma, Hedley and Friona, moving four times in 18 months.

A native of Okemah, Okla., she graduated from Oklahoma Baptist College in Shawnee with a degree in

sociology, a degree she described sardonically as "really marketable," adding, "That's why I'm a librarian."

Before assuming her duties at the library, Russell worked for 7½ years at Nazarene Christian Academy, first as a teacher's aide and substitute teacher, then as teacher in the fourth and eighth grades.

"When we moved to Hereford, we wanted (older son) Sam to be in a Christian school. I applied for a position to help with tuition. I was hired as a teacher's aide. Ethel Bailey (then NCA principal) encouraged me

to pursue teaching as a substitute. "When there was an opening for a fourth-grade teacher, I applied for the job and got it," Russell said. "By that time I was completely familiar with the curriculum."

During the time she was teaching at NCA, Russell said she became acquainted with Joe Weaver, then assistant director of the library, through programs at the school.

When Weaver was named director of the library in Dumas, Russell

Combs sees agricultural crisis

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas' agricultural industry is entering a crisis situation with its third drought in four years, Agricultural Commissioner Susan Combs said Friday.

Farmers and ranchers have not recovered from the droughts of 1996 and 1998, she said.

"If we don't get rain, we have a potentially devastating situation shaping up in Texas agriculture," Combs said. "Many areas of the state have not received significant rainfall since last summer."

1999 was one of the driest years on record, and weather forecasts call for dry conditions to continue. Rainfall totals last year were below half of the annual average in several parts of the state, the Texas

Department of Agriculture said.

Hardest hit have been livestock producers. Stock tanks are drying up in many counties and 71 percent of the state's ranges and pastures are in poor condition.

Combs said some ranchers are hauling water or moving livestock to other pastures.

Although cattle prices are up from last year, ranchers could lose out if they are forced to liquidate herds due to water shortages, poor forage conditions and high prices for hay.

Winter wheat has suffered significant losses, Combs said. Ninety-one

percent of the state's winter wheat crop is in fair to very poor condition. Winter wheat is a major winter forage crop for cattle.

"The dry winter is taking many of our farmers into a spring planting season with no surface soil moisture and no subsurface soil moisture," Combs said. "If it doesn't start raining, many areas of the state may not see any spring planting."

Combs said she has notified state and federal lawmakers about the drought crisis.

Currently, 75 counties have been declared disasters due to drought and are eligible for assistance.

Combs has requested a federal waiver for grazing on 3.9 million acres of grasses and forages in the

Conservation Reserve Program.

"Unfortunately, drought is a way of life in Texas. Our state has experienced serious drought in various regions for each decade of the last century," Combs said.

The TDA says South Central Texas, which includes the Austin and San Antonio areas, received 15 inches of total rainfall, compared with a 34.48 inch annual average.

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GOP foes battle over tax plans

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — George W. Bush is accusing Sen. John McCain, his chief rival for the Republican presidential nomination, of "Washington double-accounting" with his tax plan.

At the same time, the Texas governor aired a new ad in response to intensifying criticism of his own big tax-reduction plan.

Facing accusations from McCain and fellow contender Steve Forbes, Bush said simply, "They're both wrong."

The charges and countercharges came as the six GOP presidential hopefuls prepared for an afternoon debate today sponsored by *The Des Moines Register*.

McCain had a new tax ad, too. Speaking directly into the camera for a spot airing in New Hampshire, he said: "There's one big difference between me and the others — I won't take every last dime of the surplus and spend it on tax cuts that mostly benefit the wealthy."

At the same time, Forbes claimed that Bush, as governor, broke a 1994 anti-tax pledge by supporting failed legislation that included business and sales tax increases.

Not guilty, Bush said in his Iowa ad. "In Texas, you're only as good as your word."

The Forbes camp dismissed that. "Once again, Governor Bush has ducked the issue," said Bill Dal Col, Forbes' campaign manager. "It's simple — he just has to come clean."

On the attack himself, Bush said in Glenwood, Iowa, that McCain was targeting the same special-interest tax benefits to pay for both his tax cuts and an education proposal.

"It sounds like he's going to fund his education reform with ethanol and he's going to fund his tax cut plan with ethanol," Bush said of the Arizona senator's plan. "It sounds like Washington double-accounting to me."

Livestock producers predicting big selloff

FORT WORTH (AP) — Without relief from drought conditions soon, some Texas livestock producers believe a huge selloff could occur this year.

While most livestock producers made some adjustments last fall when there was not enough rain, continued dry conditions could lead to some hard decisions for some growers in late spring.

"The next critical time is if we don't get mid-spring rain," said Pierce Miller, a fourth-generation livestock producer in Crockett County in southwest Texas. "Most of the ranchers, they will have to make a very critical decision if this remains up to June 1. We could see a dramatic sellout in livestock numbers."

Cattle rancher Jim Link, who is also head of the range management program at Texas Christian University, said the liquidation of cattle started last year. He said some ranchers will be forced to continue decreasing their herds without some rain soon.

"My concern is we don't see any relief in sight," Link said. "Last year, we took a little bending. If it continues, it will break some people bad."

Texas is in the midst of its third drought in four years. Of the state's 254 counties, 75 already have received drought disaster declarations from the U.S. agriculture secretary and 13 more await such declarations.

Rainfall last year was below normal averages statewide. As a result, agriculture officials said 71 percent of the state's ranges and pastures are in poor to very poor condition, while 91 percent of the state's winter wheat crop is fair to very poor.

Miller, chairman of the National Sheep Industry, and Link both agree that lower feed prices as the result of a bumper corn crop have helped livestock producers whose grazing areas have been devastated by the lack of

rain. "If it were not for the relatively inexpensive protein price, there would be an even greater reduction in goat and sheep," said Miller, without giving exact numbers. Without supplemental feed, Miller said, livestock would literally die in the pasture.

"The only saving grace is cheap grain price. When we run out of grass, we can still send our cattle to a feed yard," Link said. "We have cut back on numbers by sending cattle to the feed yard earlier than usual."

Link said he has not reduced the number of cattle he owns, but has only half the number he normally would in the Fort Worth area. He sent many of his cattle to east Texas.

"I just changed my operation. In this business, you have got to be flexible," he said. "The trouble is that it takes a while to get into a drought, and then it takes us a while to get out of a drought."

Helen's interest in the library not only started with the study club but also with Campfire.

"Growing up in Abernathy (Texas), we never had any type of organization like Girl Scouts or anything. So when I came to Hereford, I became involved with Campfire. That's when I really got interested in the library, while doing my studies on Indian culture for Campfire, because they had books that I could use."

Helen is also a member of a local bridge club, Women's Division of the Chamber of Commerce and works part time as a caregiver for a woman diagnosed with dementia.

"When I was offered the job (as caregiver), I really didn't want to do that, but I have learned that I can appreciate this because we're not far apart in age."

Helen's eldest daughter and the daughter of the lady she cares for graduated from Hereford High School together. She feels deep compassion for this woman and says she has learned a lot from her as well as this experience.

"It's so important to keep somebody home if you can because they can just keep on living life and it's OK, but she has to have somebody stay with her all the time. It's important to me to do this. Before I did this, I felt like I needed to do something worthwhile and now I feel as though I do."

Helen recently resigned as president of the Hereford Community Concert Association. She says she truly enjoys this organization and is sorrowful to let it go.

"I love Hereford Community Concert, I really do. I don't want to get my fingers out of that pie until I just have to. I enjoy having that kind of culture in our community; it's just the kind of music that gives a little more opportunity for culture to our children."

Helen's most recent project was the Friends of the Library's annual book sale which ends today. Helen, having recently been elected president of the organization is proud of her position, but has some pretty big shoes to fill. Past president Jessie Ann Davis retired from her long-standing position as the organization's president.

"I'm going to have to really work at it to make it worthwhile because I have some big shoes to fill."

Helen became involved with the organization, for the same reason she becomes active in numerous other activities — she wanted something to do worthwhile.

"I really do love history. I read lots of books and wanted to be involved in the library with membership — I don't know that it really needs to be better. And, since I no longer am teaching Sunday School, I needed a place to work."

Friends of the Library recently raised enough money to donate to the library for new shelves in the talking book section. All proceeds from this weekend's book sale stay within the library to enhance their programs.

There currently are only eight board of directors for the Friends of the Library organization, which allows for 25 board members. Helen's response to the shortage of directors, "Sometimes it's better to have a few hard-working board members than 25 non-working members. We are all hard-working."

decided to take a look at the position.

"I checked to see the requirements and I thought, 'You know, I can do this,'" she said.

Russell applied for the position and said jokingly, "When (library director) Rebecca (Wall) found out I could spell, I was hired."

Although she had been hired as assistant director, Russell still had to fulfill her contract at NCA, so from March until the end of the school year, she worked at night and on Saturdays at the library and taught school during the day.

Even in the 3½ years she has been at the library, Russell said she has seen major changes in the technology available to library patrons.

"When Rebecca interviewed me, she asked what I knew about computers and the Internet. I knew nothing about the Internet, but I told her that I wanted someone to teach me. Now I'm surfing the 'Net every day," she said.

"When I came here, we just had a 'dumb terminal' without graphics. Now we have work stations and can go anywhere in the world for information."

"We were supposed to be the first entity in Hereford to get the Internet," Wall said. "But because of grant mixups, we were the last."

Last or first, Russell doesn't mind. She just wants to continue to learn as much as she can about a job she loves.

First suit filed over bus accident

HOUSTON (AP) — The first lawsuit stemming from a December bus crash in Colorado that killed three Houston residents and injured dozens of others traveling on a church-sponsored trip has been filed against the bus owner.

Floyd and Paula Kight filed the state District Court suit on behalf of their daughter, Jennifer Kight, 17, who fractured her lower back during the Dec. 23 wreck near Canon City, Colo., about 90 miles south of

Denver.

The Kights are seeking unspecified actual and exemplary damages against Sierra Stage Coaches Inc. of South Houston.

Kight is no longer hospitalized, but it's unclear whether she will suffer any permanent damage, said attorney Richard Mithoff.

"What we do know right now about this tragic day is that the kids were screaming at the bus driver to slow down," Mithoff told the *Houston Chronicle* Friday.

Local students to be 'groundhogs'

■ Annual program gives young people an opportunity to shadow professionals, see how life really is in the world of business

Dozens of students from Hereford schools will have a chance next month to see how life is in the real business world when they participate in the annual Groundhog Job Shadow Day.

The students will spend a half-day Feb. 2 working with and observing business professionals in their chosen fields.

Students from Hereford High and Hereford Junior High already have been selected for the program and will be able to have first-hand experience in the field of their choice, thanks to the generosity of many businesses in the area.

This is the second year that Hereford Independent School District has sponsored the program, which is considered an extension of the students' classroom experience. Last year's program saw participation by more than 50 students.

Many of the students who participated in last year's Groundhog Job Shadow Day decided to continue their career investigation by being a part of the event this year.

"This gives the students a chance to see if they really want to be involved in the profession of their choice," HHS counselor Marsha Winget said. "Business lead-

ers have been very helpful by participating in this program, which gives them an opportunity to help these young people decide their futures."

Several of last year's participating businesses also found new employees through the program, hiring several students who worked side-by-side with employees during that half-day educational experience.

Termed a "win-win" situation by organizers of the nationwide event, Groundhog Job Shadow Day is designed to benefit educators and businesses as well as the students.

The program helps answer the question "Why do I have to learn this?" It also demonstrates the importance of academics in reaching college and career goals and serves as a motivational tool.

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Exhibit features blueprints series

CANYON — "Renovating Yesterday; Building Tomorrow" opened Friday in the Alexander Gallery at Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum.

The exhibit will continue through Nov. 16.

It will feature historical blueprints of the museum from the past and proposed renovations for the future, which are scheduled to begin this spring and be complete by May 30, 2001.

The exhibition will show actual historical blueprints of each addition to the museum and will document chronologically each renovation/annexation in the life of the largest history museum in Texas.

A narration will be included in the exhibit of the progression of the museum from the original "brick drive" in the early 1940s to the opening of the Harrington Petroleum Wing in the 1980s, with all of the other changes in between. The presentation will chronicle the growth of the museum from the less than \$500,000 initial investment to the more than \$6.3 million in proposed renovations.

A historic view of the 20th century will be the highlight of the coming exhibit and will bring a new perspective to the vital growth and enormous change representative of the Texas Panhandle as illustrated in the development of the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum.

CANYON — The Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum will host "Dinosaur Day" between noon and 4 p.m. Feb. 12.

"Dinosaur Day" is an annual one-day event in which the community is invited to participate in dinosaur-related activities. The Panhandle-Plains Historical Society will provide free admission for families attending the event. Participation in the games area requires an activity ticket priced at \$2 per child. Dinosaur-related prizes will be awarded to all participants in each game.

The focus of the program is to increase and enhance knowledge about dinosaurs and paleontology through hands-on activities and game competitions. The program is designed for participants ages

3-13. There will be games and activities appropriate for participants in this age range. Domestic rig count falls

HOUSTON (AP) — The number of rigs actively exploring for oil and natural gas in the United States fell this week by five to 781.

Of the rigs running nationwide, 142 were exploring for oil, 638 were looking for gas and one was listed as miscellaneous, Houston-based Baker

Hughes Inc. reported Thursday. During the same week last year, 597 rigs were operating in the United States.

Baker Hughes has kept track of the count since 1944. The tally peaked at 4,530 on Dec. 28, 1981, during the height of the oil boom but set several record lows last year.

Nothing new being offered

If you've been following presidential politics lately, you know what others, even those who are paid to pay attention to them, know — there's nothing much new on the horizon that we haven't heard before.

No new taxes? We've heard it. Social Security? We're not counting on it. Education? Please don't mess it up any more than you already have. Finance reform? Tell us another one. Freedom to Farm Act? Backsliding on a market system you helped create.

Sure, there are new faces, but not many fresh solutions to the complex problems of old.

The rhetorical promises banded about today are still largely based on what an increasingly fragmented and disinterested Third Millennium society wants to hear: Namely, that it will have more money, more security, more happiness — more of everything except government and personal problems.

The most serious concern facing both Democratic and Republican parties should be how to reinvent something other than a casual, passing interest in a presidency and a government that, despite the promises, is governed more and more by the day's polls, special-interest groups and their campaign contributions.

That process starts with a leadership that wins back the trust of the American people, a leadership that won't sell its convictions for political expediency and a leadership that can rally even a complacent America around its ideals.

We have to admit we're skeptical. Statesmanship may be a reinvented notion, if it ever existed at all, but it may be a novelty whose time has come.

Otherwise, America is just watching another rerun of an old game show.

Sadly enough, the rerun may win the November Sweeps.

Voters have choice in the county races

The field is complete for the March 14 primary election. And, unlike 1998, there are some real races for Deaf Smith County's voters.

In 1998, none of the county's incumbents drew opponents, but that is not the case in this election because Precinct 1 Commissioner Wayne Betzen and Precinct 3 Commissioner Troy Don Moore, both Republicans, have opponents in the primary. Betzen's challenger is Precinct 1 formerman Alfred Ortiz, while farmer-rancher Mike Brumley is trying to wrest the nomination from Moore.

Although the Democratic Party didn't field candidates in six of nine statewide races, the county party will have a hot race for Precinct 1 commissioner. Margaret Del Toro, who has vacated the county tax assessor-collector post to make the run for commissioner, has drawn opposition from Armando Gonzalez and Joe Henry.


Incumbent Joe Brown may not have an opponent in the Democratic primary; however, he will have to fend off the challenge in November from a Republican, either Brent Harrison or Fidel Reyna.

In recent years, there has been a shift of power away from Washington, D.C., as the Congress has shifted more responsibility for a variety of government functions, from schools to environmental protection to welfare, back to the states. Recent cases involving state's rights have seen the U.S. Supreme Court rule in favor of the states, further accelerating the trend toward more local authority.

As Washington becomes less relevant, local government will gain more importance in our daily lives. As residents of Deaf Smith County, we have a responsibility to get to know the candidates, what they see as the major issues affecting the county, and where they stand on those issues.

Then, we must go to the polls. After the Constitution was ratified in 1789, Benjamin Franklin said, "We have a republic, if we can keep it."

One of the ways we can keep this republic is for an informed electorate to exercise the franchise — by voting.



Looking at Gore, Bush

In his superb account of the 1972 presidential campaign, gonzo journalist Hunter S. Thompson described Democratic candidate Edmund S. Muskie as "looking like a farmer with terminal cancer trying to borrow on next year's crop."

Thompson's description of Muskie, the Maine senator whose front-runner status melted in the snows of New Hampshire, could easily be that of Al Gore.

Although he's still heavily favored to win the Democratic nomination, there seems to be a sense of desperation as the vice president fends off the challenge of former New Jersey Sen. Bill Bradley. Gore may yet win the nomination and go on to capture a term in the White House, but his desire to be president is so visceral that he is willing to say whatever he thinks the voters want to hear in order to squeeze out one more vote.

Just within the past week, the vice president has made a public statement on gays in the military, then changed that when it generated a little controversy.

The vice president apparently wants to ensure he gets the gay vote, but he's afraid that staking out a firm position will alienate conservatives — who aren't likely to support him anyway.

He followed that up with a position on the situation involving Elian Gonzales, the 6-year-old boy who is at the center of a dispute between the United States and Cuba, that could only be described as trying to have it both ways. He looked first at Florida's big block of electoral votes and apparently allowed that to determine his position.

In his efforts to appeal to as many voters as possible, to avoid offending any groups, the vice president is running the risk of offending just about everyone by playing politics and appearing to sacrifice principle on the altar of expediency.

One of the reasons Gore is finding himself trapped in a close race — at least in New Hampshire, is because the voters are looking favorably at Bradley, who is saying what he thinks rather than what he thinks every voter wants to hear.

On the Republican side, Texas Gov. George W. Bush, despite raising more money than the gross national product for most Third World nations, is in a statistical dead heat in the New Hampshire, according to most surveys.

Part of Dubya's problem is the dogging perception that he's an intellectual lightweight. That perception is reinforced by his appearances on the campaign trail, events that are carefully choreographed by his staff. Everything Dubya does and says is following a script prepared by his handlers.

The governor also demonstrates a tendency to be flippant at inappropriate times. According to one interviewer, Dubya mocked Karla Faye Tucker not long before the woman was executed in Texas. During the debate in Columbia, S.C., when asked about his biggest mistake as an adult and what lessons he learned from it, Dubya listed his greatest mistake as trading Sammy Sosa for Harold Baines while serving as managing general partner of the Texas Rangers baseball team.

A sense of humor is desirable in a president, but a president also has to know when to be serious. Both John F. Kennedy and Ronald Reagan had a marvelous sense of humor, but they never were flippant when dignity and seriousness were required.

The governor has to keep in mind he's running for president of the United States, not host of the "Tonight Show."

Solitaire's more than just card game

Solitaire is an interesting game. It's so simple that any child who knows red from black and who can count pretty well can play the game.

At first glance it appears so simple.

A player uses a standard deck of 52 playing cards consisting of four suits — hearts, diamonds, spades and clubs — and two colors — red and black. Beginning play, the dealer/player lays out the first card face up. Six more cards are laid out in a horizontal row, completing a row of seven cards.

Row two begins with card eight being placed face up and five more cards being laid face down. This setup continues until row seven has seven cards with the last one face up.

The object of the game is to lay the cards out in such a manner as to be able to stack them from high number to low number and ultimately arrange them from the ace of each suit to the king of the same suit.

It's actually harder to explain than it is to play the game.

The hand when first viewed may have all the appearances of either an easy win or an inevitable loss.

A hand which shows nothing but single-color, mid-range cards may not prove to be anywhere nearly as challenging as the hand which shows a wide range of cards in both colors.

With 24 cards left to play, the game is still pretty well

up for grabs. Not only are the unplayed cards a major factor in the game's outcome, but also the ability of the player to choose the correct play can make the game a winner or loser.

A simple misplay can cost the game, delay the game, or even change the course of the game. Even after all the aces are displayed, there's no guarantee of a sure win.

Strange, this simple little card game, which has no pertinence to anything in particular, in many ways mirrors the

game we call "life."

Some people are said to be born with a silver spoon in their mouths and yet sometimes they wind up being as much of a "ne'er do well" as anyone can ever imagine.

The other picture presents the individual with the apparent losing hand who has enough heart to bring the diamonds, spades, and clubs to their fingertips.

After all, "Every hand's a winner, and every hand's a loser." We all have to know when to fold 'em and when to keep 'em. This is the hand we were dealt, this is the hand we have to play.

corporate welfare, while spending only \$14.4 billion on Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC.) 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Bush family lines up behind George W.

Father and son, the George Bushes are campaigning to end their political generation gap at eight years.

Gov. George W. Bush's quest to win in 2000 the White House that George Bush lost in 1992 is becoming a family matter.

"Our son will serve with honor," former President Bush said, seeking support for George W. in the Iowa Republican caucuses a week from Monday.

With the year's first voting at hand, the former president, Barbara Bush and W.'s brother-governor Jeb are taking campaign roles more visible than before.

They'd been helping, but usually offstage.

Mrs. Bush filed her son's candidacy papers for the Arizona presidential primary this

week and will be campaigning for him next week in New Hampshire for the first primary, on Feb. 1.

Jeb, Florida's governor, is flying in with 120 Bush supporters on a campaign charter to campaign door to door in New Hampshire later this month.

And the elder George went on his first outright

campaign mission of the year Thursday in Iowa. He said George W. was seasoned at his side in four national campaigns and in the White House. He keeps his word, does what he promises to do, proved it in Texas, Bush said.

Bush drew an overflow crowd of more than 500 people at the Atlantic High School

auditorium on Thursday. Another 200 or so couldn't get in and watched on television monitors. Later, he delivered an after-dinner speech to 1,400 people at a Des Moines Chamber of Commerce banquet, nonpartisan, so he jokingly avoided a direct appeal to "anyone who is considering supporting my boy."

"Not gonna do it. Wouldn't be prudent," he said, mimicking the TV comic who mimicked him as president.

Bush had appeared at private fund-raising receptions for his son earlier in the campaign and spoke out for him when the opportunity arose in television interviews. Now his role will be a more active one.

"He'll be on the road more for his son," said Karl Rove, political director of the Bush campaign. The senior Bush is not booked in New Hampshire, where he's had his own political troubles in campaigns past. His next target: South Carolina.

Recalling his own Iowa campaigns the former president said organization is what sound as though a Bush victory would be a sort of restoration of the lost administration of 1992.

"Well, I got half my mother in me," Gov. Bush smiled when a worker in Laconia, N.H., asked him how his potential presidency would differ from his father's.

He said comparisons would be up to history.

"I think he was a great president because, first and foremost, he was a great Dad," Bush said. "We'll let historians judge if I become the president. ... It's a fair question, but I would give you such an unfair answer because I am so subjective."

When he worked in his father's campaigns, Bush got a reputation for being feisty and combative, and he acknowledges he deserved it. He learned to be campaign-tough, too, the former president said of the son, and not to make mistakes in anger.

"There is a big difference between being the loyal son and being the candidate," Gov. Bush wrote in his campaign autobiography. "One is a follower, the other a leader."

Now it is his show, to win or lose. With a little help from Mother and Dad.

The New York Times, on the biggest media merger yet:

Everything about the \$165 billion takeover of Time Warner by America Online is big. AOL is the largest Internet company. Time Warner is the largest media and entertainment company. Their proposed marriage will be the largest corporate merger in history. The implications of this merger are big too, for the way stocks are valued, for the way information services reach consumers, and perhaps for the way entertainment, politics and journalism ...

The challenges that these big, multifaceted companies represent for journalism are just now coming into focus. For decades journalists, readers and viewers have been coming to grips with the concentration of ownership in newspaper chains and networks. In that environment, maintaining a wall between advertising and news departments has worked well. But building walls among the multiple compartments of these new information, entertainment and marketing giants may not be so simple. Yesterday (Steve) Case (AOL's chairman) said he was teaching (Gerald) Levin (Time Warner's chairman) about "Internet time" and Mr. Levin was teaching him about journalistic tradition. That is an interchange that will have to take place

not just in their company, but all across a media world that is being reshaped more rapidly than anyone could have predicted.

The Beaumont (Texas) Enterprise, on Elian Gonzalez:

It might have been the most difficult custody decision since King Solomon's. The mother of Elian Gonzalez, 6 years old, drowned in the Florida Straits in November trying to escape from Cuba to the United States. ... Elian survived by clinging to an inner tube.

After that terrifying and tragic ordeal, all Elian probably wanted was a place where he would feel loved and secure. But where? His father, who had been divorced from his mother before she attempted to flee, remained in Cuba — and he wanted the boy back. In the United States, Elian's closest relative is a great-uncle.

Of course it's galling to see Castro and his lackeys cry crocodile tears over the fate of one boy when they have presided over the biggest human rights disaster in this hemisphere. But civilized nations like the United States must do the right thing in cases like this — even with adversaries like Castro — precisely because we respect the concept of due process.

Elian the boy should return to Cuba. The best possible ending to this saga would be for Elian the man to live in a non-communist Cuba, a place where mothers with small children don't have to

attempt desperate escapes just because they want to be free.

Hobbs (N.M.) News-Sun, on the re-nomination of Alan Greenspan:

Thankfully, President Bill Clinton has nominated Alan Greenspan to his fourth term as chairman of the Federal Reserve Board.

In this post, Greenspan has held inflation in check while still stimulating one of the longest periods of growth in the history of the United States. ...

Greenspan has never held an elected office, yet he is one of the most powerful men in the nation. In his post, he determines the interest rate we pay for consumer loans, mortgages and business loans, among other things.



The number of vehicles stolen is down statewide since its record level in 1991 of 163,837. In recent years, the vehicles stolen most often are pick-up trucks.

Total vehicles stolen (in thousands)





HISD administrators see TAAS surviving challenge

The constitutionality of the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills test is coming under the scrutiny of the U.S. Supreme Court, but local administrators doubt the challenge will stand.

Recently former Texas high school students, represented by attorneys with the American Civil Liberties Union, filed complaints, contending the TAAS exam discriminates against minorities.

"There's two sides to every issue," said Hereford Independent School District Superintendent Beth Abernethy. "More than anything, the TAAS is about us (teachers and administrators) doing our job, which means our students succeed in school and as members of society."

"The TAAS or any other assessment test levels the playing ground and helps us know where the help is needed and what skills should be focused on by the teachers," said HISD Deputy Superintendent Nena Veazey.

In separate interviews, both Veazey and Abernethy said a panel of teachers, from across

the state review the test each year in an effort to eliminate any discriminating wording or factors.

While reviewing each question, the committee watches for questions which may have cultural or racial implications, said Abernethy. The judging panel makes sure names, places and events pertaining to each question fairly represents the Texas student population.

Veazey said the percentage of students of any nationality or race should be reflected proportionately by the number of students from that group who pass the test. For that reason, test results are broken down into African American, Hispanic, White, Native American, Asian/Pacific Island, as well as male, fe-

male, economically disadvantaged, and special education students.

This allows the students to compete against themselves, others in the same group, the rest of the students in their school and other students in other parts of the state.

"We expect the students to compete, both academically and athletically," Abernethy said. "Panhandle schools do very well in preparing students for that competition. We expect to succeed with all our students."

Veazey said HISD has for many years offered early childhood intervention classes to help non-English speaking students develop language skills which will make them successful when they go to take the TAAS for the first time.

"The TAAS has changed many times in the years it has been taken," Veazey said. "It is now offered in a Spanish format, which helps to eliminate the number of exemptions."

Veazey continued to say that students who have been in the district since an early age should have no excuses for failing the TAAS.

"The district offers tutoring, special TAAS classes, and extra instruction periods," Veazey said. "It remains up to the student to take advantage of the help when it is offered."

"The TAAS is simply a means of applying and maintaining a system of quality control," Veazey offered.

HISD uses released TAAS tests from previous years to prepare students for the type of questions which will be on the actual test. These released tests are available at the administration building or the campuses.

Ugly, but good enough

Lady Whitefaces survive sloppy play to defeat rival Pampa, 53-43

After two big games against Dumas and Amarillo Palo Duro, a letdown could have been expected for the Hereford Lady Whitefaces.

But it didn't happen. Despite shooting 48 percent from the floor, the Lady Whitefaces got the necessary scoring throughout the game as they captured a 53-43 victory over the Lady Harvesters of Pampa.

"A win is a win," Hereford coach Key Harrison said. "We're 2-1 and we got seven games left and try to win every one we can in the district."

Early on, the Lady Whitefaces looked sharp. Baskets by Toni Eicke, Tori Walker, Valerie Guzman and Shyla Martin put Hereford in a tie with the Lady Harvesters at 8-8 with five minutes to go in the first period.

In the second period, both teams had trouble scoring.

After free-throws by Walker, a three-pointer by Sarah Griffin and a layup by Amanda Hill, the

Lady Whitefaces missed their next three shots and committed four turnovers.

"It's really hard to come off two hard games," said Toni Eicke, who finished the evening with 12 points. "We had Dumas and Palo Duro and we had to be up for that. This week has been long, there's been a lot going on and we knew it was going to be hard for us to get up for this game."

Tori Walker scored seven of the 12 points the Lady Whitefaces produced in the period. Emily Hartman scored six for Pampa as the Hereford defense converged to the Lady Harvester post to seal off the passing lanes.

"When you have tall girls, you got to get in front of them and not let her get the passes and the ball," Walker said.

Walker was Hereford's leading scorer with 13 points.

The third period was the low point for both teams.

After Eicke opened the period with a jumpshot and a three-pointer, Hereford went 1 for 7 the rest of the way.

"It was Pampa and they knew they were supposed to win, but it was really hard to get them focused about it," Harrison said. "It's hard to get out after three-straight big games and I thought we were a little flat."

Sonics give champs the boom

■ Seattle defeats San Antonio Spurs for the second time in ten days, 91-85 at Key Arena

SEATTLE (AP) — If the Seattle SuperSonics are going to have a chance against the NBA's elite teams, Vin Baker is going to have to perform like a player with an \$87 million contract.

Baker did just that on Friday night as the Sonics won their fourth straight game by beating the defending NBA champion San Antonio Spurs 91-85.

Criticized for being soft and disappearing in big games, the 6-foot-11 Baker had 23 points and nine rebounds in Seattle's second victory over the Spurs in less than two weeks.

"When you play hard and you work hard, good things can happen," said Baker, who received his big contract from the Sonics this summer. "It

boosts your confidence when you beat the world champions twice in 10 days."

Gary Payton led the Sonics with 25 points on 9-of-26 shooting, while the Spurs' twin towers, Tim Duncan and David Robinson, combined for 52 points and 23 rebounds. Duncan had 32 points and 16 rebounds, while Robinson scored 20 points.

"We're winning because we're playing the way we're supposed to play, like a team," Payton said.

The Spurs lost for the second time in two nights. They were beaten 107-103 on Thursday night in Sacramento.

San Antonio saw its road record slip below .500 (10-

11). The Sonics never trailed after grabbing an 18-2 lead in the first 5:20, but the Spurs got to within one point at 60-59 in the third quarter.

"They bombarded us in the first quarter and it took so much to claw back that we didn't have anything left," Duncan said.

Robinson added, "If we play the whole ballgame, we win. Instead, we play 30 good minutes and think that's enough to beat a good team."

The Sonics finished the game without their best big man, Baker, who fouled out with 2:34 to go with his team ahead 87-81.

Ruben Patterson had 15 points and Brent Barry 12

for Seattle. Horace Grant of the Sonics had nine rebounds.

Robinson cut Seattle's lead to 83-79 with a 17-footer, but Baker answered with two free throws after being fouled by Samaki Walker.

After the Spurs' Antonio Daniels threw the ball out of bounds, Barry scored on a fastbreak dunk after a steal by Terry Porter.

Avery Johnson made another critical San Antonio turnover when he dribbled the ball out of bounds with 2:34 left and the Sonics ahead 87-81.

The Spurs committed 19 turnovers, four by Duncan against Seattle's swarming inside defense. In 45 minutes, Payton did not have a turnover.

Duncan scored 14 points in the third quarter when the Spurs crept to 60-59 with 6:04 gone in the period. The Sonics came back to take a 73-63 lead on a free throw by Baker before San Antonio got the last six points of the quarter, four on a pair of baskets by Duncan.

The Sonics led 49-42 at halftime after going ahead by 21 in the opening quarter when they scored 18 unanswered points after Robinson opened the game with a 15-footer. In that 18-0 run, Barry and Payton, each hit 3-pointers.

Jaren Jackson of San Antonio sank a 3-pointer, but Payton hit consecutive 3-pointers to give Seattle a 24-5 advantage with 7:06 gone in the game.

But the Spurs came back in the second period and cut Seattle's lead to five at 41-36 on two free throws by Duncan with 3:12 left in the first half.

In the second period, Dean cleared the bench as the Whitefaces outscored the Harvesters 39-24 after halftime.

Eleven different players scored for the Whitefaces on the night while holding the Harvesters' top scorer, Derek Williams, to 10 points. Nobody else on Pampa's squad scored on double figures.

Hereford now begins a tough road trip Tuesday at Borger and Friday at Amarillo Caprock. This marks the beginning of another adventurous basketball season.

Emotionally, Hereford feels good about the big win Friday.

"It was nice to get a big win here at home, but this thing is only beginning," Dean said. "We have one down and nine to go. We got to make sure we maintain our focus and maintain our goals that we have set."

Emily Hartman was held to 1 of 4 shots in the period.

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There's no bag limit on the spectacle of goose hunting

The weatherman's prognostication that this was to turn into a warm day hadn't made much of an impression on the elements thus far. Wind was plentiful already, and though it was from the southwest—a portent of the mild weather that had been forecast, the steadily-stiffening breeze was on the raw and shiver-evoking side.

Brian Van Zee and I had set the goose spread so efficiently that we were actually sitting in place, clad in heavy coats and white parkas and waiting amidst the decoys as shooting time arrived.

As is the rule of nature, had we been late, the geese would have been early. We were early—and this day the geese would be casual risers. So, we waited as the coating of hoarfrost that frequently accompanies sunrise formed on the decoys, and the velocity of the wind gusts continued to increase.

Once the sun brightened from the glowing orange-and-red of dawn to full daylight, skeins of geese strung themselves across the northern sky. Some undulated our way against the wind, a mixture of dark and light forms characterized by their short-stroke wingbeats. When the snows among the flocks wheeled and turned in the light they flashed like sparks against the blue sky.

We played for the oncoming flocks the plastic song of goose seduction; once we thought they were close enough to hear and appreciate the plaintive hails and clucks that our cold-numbered lips evoked from the cylinders we blew into.

Our job was to convince feathered skeptics that they should come to their imitators in this place of tender wheat shoots and abundant scattered morsels of corn. The geese gave their instantaneous critique of our music.

Many of the approaching flocks slid past us to the southwest

without so much as a sidelong glance, but a few veered toward the "tube" of our spread, painting the timeless picture of geese-on-approach against the morning sky--the riveting image of rhythmic wingbeats, the smooth arc of cupped wings as birds lock-up, the hypnotic final glide and sideslip before feet drop.

In 35 years of goose hunting, there have been abundant frustrating outings--no birds, geese that wouldn't work and flared at the sight of a decoy, pass shooters shadowing the spread and busting the birds, rude people setting up right downwind of you, road hunters blasting away with rifles at your decoys, snow geese that would never--ever work. Even amidst all of these frustrations, however, after a hunt when the magic has worked yet again as it did last weekend, I can long-after the hunt close my eyes and see the flocks of geese, wings cupped and gliding feet-down into the decoys. That is what keeps us coming back.

Thankfully, if we do this goose hunting thing long enough, we seem to reach a plateau and this game no longer has to be

about how many geese you shoot on such a morning, but how convincingly you can talk to them with your call, and how close you can lure these honking heralds of the wild and the wary to you.

Brian and I got five geese apiece, our morning's bag including five Canadas, four Ross' geese, and a snow. We missed our chances to get some others--mostly when our shotgun actions choked on the wind-blown grit and the cold and wouldn't feed the follow-up shot. That is just part of the game on a windy, gritty day of the type that keeps the geese flying low. Autoloaders are most susceptible, but even pumps choke.

In this game where you sit or lie among the decoys, grit and gunk is going to get into your gun. You can do your best to protect your gun, but if there is any wind and the least bit of dust, granular gremlins are going to wreak havoc. I have seen all kinds of guns rendered either into one-shot wonders, or totally inoperable due to the grit.

The best that you can do is to try to keep the gun out of the dirt as much as possible while hunting, and to strip and completely clean the action after each hunt--and skip the oil. I have been known to take a can of gun scrubber to the field with me for an emergency spraydown in order to remain in action.

Our last outing was another on which we bagged every bit of the spectacle without a worry over exceeding the limit. Isn't that what we ultimately go for?

Vikings', Rams' success reflect coaches

ST. LOUIS (AP) — When you think of the Minnesota Vikings in the 1990s, you think of the playoffs, which they've made in all but one of Dennis Green's eight seasons as coach.

When you think of the St. Louis Rams of the '90s, you think of losing. They carried the NFL's worst record of the decade into this season.

So while Green just had to keep on keepin' on, Rams coach Dick Vermeil had to make some serious changes.

That he did reflects well on Vermeil, whose Rams take a 13-3 record, the best in the NFC, into Sunday's playoff game with the Vikings (11-6).

"There is no question how good a job Dick has done with the Rams," Green said.

"It's a 180 percent turnaround from last year to this year," added Rams linebacker London Fletcher.

Vermeil's Rams were 5-11, then 4-12 in his first two seasons after a 14-year hiatus from coaching. Questions of whether Vermeil, 63, could still handle the rigors of coaching — he left the NFL in 1982 with burnout — dominated summer talk.

Vermeil adapted, making changes in staff, players and style. And the Rams now have the inside track to the Super Bowl.

"I talked to Bill Parcells on Wednesday," Vermeil said. "He said, 'I'm excited to see our generation of coaches experience success.' (Colts coach) Jim Mora and myself, and the way he experienced success a year ago and finished so strong this year. He says it proves the old way isn't a bad

way, and I agree with him. We aren't done yet."

While Vermeil's job security was minimal before the season, Green didn't have such worries heading into 1999 — for the first time in a long while. Each year, his Vikings would get to the postseason, then underachieve.

But last year's 15-1 mark and record-setting offense eliminated talk of Green's job being in jeopardy. Then the Vikings started the season 2-4.

"I think our guys played hard," Green said. "I never had any question about our guys' attitude. I just don't think we were playing as clean a game as we should have been playing. When you're playing Tampa Bay and Detroit and Green Bay, those are teams that you play twice every year. They have a great understanding of how they want to play you. If you make a few mistakes, they can beat you."

"We've been around long enough to know not to panic. You either know your team or you don't."

Green knew enough to bench Randall Cunningham for Jeff George at quarterback. He also knew that if he relied on his stars, they would begin coming through.

Minnesota won five in row.

"We went 8-2 down the stretch and we won our last three games," he said. "In the history of the Vikings, I don't know how many times we won three consecutive games at the end of the regular season."

It's five times, but now they have won four straight after the 27-10 playoff victory against Dallas.

"I don't know him personally, but I do as a coach," Vermeil said of Green, whose games Vermeil occasionally broadcast

while Vermeil worked for ABC and Green was coaching Stanford. "He has done a great job at Minnesota. He is a leader within the coaches' organization and with his role on the competition committee. Everybody in the profession has a lot of respect for Dennis Green."

If Vermeil lost some of his players' respect, he quickly recaptured it this year. Success — and a slightly less intense approach — will do that.

"You always know where you're coming from with coach Vermeil," defensive end Grant Wistrom said. "He's never going to beat around the bush with you and everybody appreciates that he's so straightforward with you. It is kind of nice. You see so many coaches who are so stoic, and you know when he's excited and when he's upset. He's not too difficult to read."

Indy, Tennessee not your normal playoff powerhouses

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Indianapolis tight end Ken Dilger, at 27 years old, will be the oldest starter on offense when the Colts play host to the Tennessee Titans on Sunday at the RCA Dome.

No, there's not a lot of experience in this matchup of two teams with six losses between them.

The Colts have 13 wins and the Titans 14, the extra win being the "Music City Miracle," that 22-16 wild-card victory over Buffalo decided by Kevin Dyson's kickoff return after taking a lateral from Frank Wycheck.

"This is a time when our veterans have to step up," said Colts quarterback Peyton Manning, one of many stars on both sides in their first playoff season.

"It will be a learning experience for us and the only way to learn is to go out there and play and experience it."

The problem for the Colts is that those veterans are primarily on defense. Not only that, but Cornelius Bennett, who's played in five Super Bowls with the Bills and Falcons, will miss this game with a knee injury.

The Titans are a little more experienced.

They have eight players back from the Houston Oilers team of 1993, the last time the itinerant franchise made the playoffs. And they have nine more who had postseason experience with other teams.

And, of course, they all played last week.

The most experienced Titans player is one of the most experienced in NFL history — 38-year-old guard Bruce Matthews, who this

season set an NFL career record for games by an offensive lineman with 264. He has 11 playoff starts, including last week, more than any player on either team but Bennett, who has played in 20 postseason games.

But a lot of players on both teams don't think that matters much given their big-game college experience.

The Titans start two rookies on the defensive line — Jevon Kearse, the former Florida star who was defensive rookie of the year and an All-Pro and John Thornton, their second-round draft choice.

"Jevon played for a national championship every year," said Thornton, who played at West Virginia. "We have a whole lot of guys that come from winning programs in college."

The Colts, meanwhile, have a small group of veterans left from the 1995 and '96 playoff teams, including Dilger, defensive linemen Bernard Whittington and Ellis Johnson, and safety Jason

Belser. The other starters in the secondary also have playoff experience — Jeff Burris with Buffalo and Tyrone Poole and Chad Cota with Carolina.

That seems to make Sunday's game a wash in terms of experience, or lack of it. That doesn't make it very different from the rest of this weekend's four games in the Super Bowl countdown.

"I read in the paper where there's not much fan interest because the Denvers and the Dallases and the 49ers and teams like that are not playing now, but I'm not sure that's right," Indianapolis coach Jim Mora said. "We have fans. Tennessee has fans. The Rams have fans. People want these teams to win, too. So I think it's good. I think it's great."

Mora himself has some playoff experience, all of it bad — he was 0-4 in 10 seasons in New Orleans.

"That makes no difference," Mora says. "This is one you want to win for the team."



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We're better off than we know

You might think there aren't enough hours in the day, but what would you have thought a century ago, when the workweek was 30 percent longer than today?

In effect, Julian Simon might have reminded a time-pressed American, you don't know how well off you are. And he would have had the facts to document his opinion.

Those who knew him, remember Julian L. Simon as an unflinching optimist, perhaps because he was disposed to be that way, but more likely because of his penchant for what he viewed as the facts.

Simon, a University of Maryland professor, spent much of his adult life, refuting the dismal conclusions, so common during the past half century, that planet earth was speeding toward disaster.

He did it through prodigious research and voluminous writings, which now have been brought up to date by Stephen Moore, an associate at the Cato Institute, a libertarian think tank.

Moore's continuum has been published by Cato under the title "The Greatest Century That Ever Was," subtitled "25 miraculous trends of the past 100 years."

Among the more miraculous of the trends assembled by Moore is the 30-year increase in American lifespans within the century, aided by huge decreases in both infant mortality and infectious diseases.

Deaths from heart disease, according to the tome, have been cut in half, and in defiance of notions that accidental deaths have risen, Moore and Simon show they have decreased by 61 percent.

The evidence of a better material life is stunning. Using the same (1998) dollar as a measuring stick, real gross domestic product is nearly seven times higher, manufacturing wages four times. And household assets are seven times greater.

Notwithstanding increases in numbers, the poverty rate as a percentage of households has decreased three times, homeownership has risen 43 percent, and black incomes have increased 10-fold.

There are some comparisons that can't be expressed in percentage terms. TV ownership, for example, is almost universal today, and ownership of computers is soon likely to be.

The percentage of households with electricity has risen 10-fold, telephone calls have rocketed by 5,600 percent, and ownership of cars has leaped 90-fold.

Education has become far more widespread. The percentage of adults completing high school is four times higher today, and the percentage of bachelor degrees held by women has risen by half.

Industrialization, often criticized as having brought as many problems as advantages, is viewed by Simon and Moore as a creator of the better life.

They contend that the air we breathe is 97 percent cleaner when measured by micrograms per 100 cubic meters of lead in the air. And largely as a consequence of inventions, the price of wheat has decreased 95 percent.

Moreover, they say, "the American people are net resource creators, not resources depleters — protectors of the environment, not destroyers."

PERRY'S CAMPAIGN

Lieutenant governor launches a 'campaign' for Bush's office

AUSTIN (AP) — Lt. Gov. Rick Perry, who's served as acting governor while George W. Bush is off campaigning for president and would move up should Bush win, Friday reported raising \$4 million in campaign contributions last year.

"I'm humbled by this enormous outpouring of support from thousands of Texans in every corner of our state. More than 98 percent of the funds we raised were from Texans who care about the future of our state," Perry said.

In a campaign finance report to the Texas Ethics Commission, Perry said he raised \$3.75 million during the July 1-Dec. 31, 1999 reporting period and just over \$4 million

for the year. He reported spending about \$600,000 during the July-December period.

Perry and other elected state officials are prohibited from raising money during the legislative session. The Legislature adjourned June 1.

Perry's report was filed early. Campaign finance filings are due at the Texas Ethics Commission next Tuesday.

Perry, a Republican, is serving his first term in the state's No. 2 job. A former Democratic state legislator, he switched parties in the late 1980s. He won two terms as Texas agriculture commissioner before being elected to his current post in 1998.

Since launching his campaign for the White House in

March, Bush has become the front-runner in a number of national opinion polls. Were he to win the GOP nomination and the presidency, Perry would ascend to the governor's office for the final two years of the term Bush claimed in 1998.

U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, R-Texas, who is seeking re-election this year, previously has said a gubernatorial bid might be an option for her. And while touring the state to kick off her re-election effort last week, she didn't rule out such a possibility.

"I don't know. Right now, I'm concentrating on being elected to the Senate," she said last week. "I'm not opening any doors, and I'm not closing any doors."

No more numbers, please

Call me by my name. Call me by my nickname (which is what most people do). Call me "Hey, you." Just don't assign me another number.

When I was growing up I thought it was "silly and old-fogy-ish" that my parents couldn't remember the phone numbers and addresses for our family members and friends.

Now I am forced to acknowledge that age might have been a contributing factor, but since I'm fast getting to that stage, I don't think that is the single largest contributing factor.

The problem is that by the time we are "older" adults, we've been bombarded with so many numbers from so many sources, we can't possibly be expected to remember them all. We would certainly be using a much larger percentage of our brain capacity if we did.

Consider the list.
• Social security number. Required at birth now, not just when you become a member of the work force. (Even a birth date is relegated to merely a number. When was the last time you tried telling a clerk your birthday was Sept. 11 and have them look at you uncomprehendingly until you said, "Nine-eleven?")

• Phone number, i.e. home phone, work phone, mobile phone, cell phone, digital phone. If you are placing a local call,

this will be only a seven-digit number. But look out if you are calling where your local service does not reach. This number can rapidly escalate to 17 digits or even more depending on whether you are dialing direct, using a credit card or making a collect call.

• Address. All the address you need for a single piece of mail to reach you can be compiled into a nine-digit number - your Zip+4 code. That is your five number Zip code which identifies your state and city plus the additional four numbers which identify your mail box or house. And let me "clarify," these are **not** necessarily the same numbers as your actual box number or house number.

• Account numbers. Separate

account numbers for **everything**. Bank account, savings account (if you're lucky enough to have one), loans (usually more than one and each with a different number), utility accounts - gas, water, electric, cable, phone (account number is similar to, but different than, phone number), credit cards and bank cards.

• Bank cards. Another subject entirely. Not only does this require an account number, it requires a PIN, personal identification number. Now I know, most of the time, who I am, so why do I have to have a number to personally identify me?

Tell me that this hasn't turned into a nightmare of numbers!! No one - NO ONE - could possibly remember them all.

Now, let me see. Where was I? Oh, yes. Call me by my name - Becky. Well, actually that's not my name. It's my nickname...





Changes challenge old assumptions of wedding etiquette

NEW YORK (AP) — Today's wedding may look much like those celebrated in previous generations. But behind the big event are changes which challenge old assumptions about wedding etiquette, reports *Bride's* magazine in its December/January issue: — **Wedding Expenses.** Traditionally, the bride's family pays for most of the wedding, the groom's family hosts the rehearsal dinner, pays for the bride's flowers and the officiant's fee. But now, both families may share the expenses of a wedding. The bride's family may pay for the reception space, the groom's might cover flowers and catering, and the couple pays for the rest. Three out of 10 couples pick up the entire cost themselves. — **Don't ask guests to contribute to the cost of the wedding,** the magazine says. That includes setting up a cash bar or valet tipping. — **Invitations.** The traditional formal wedding invitation is engraved in black script on white or off-white stock, placed in an inner unsealed

envelope. Reception information appears on a separate enclosure in the same type-script and paper. A similar response card can be included, but a handwritten reply is still expected. Information about hotel accommodations and directions to the events should be mailed separately. For semi-formal weddings, custom-designed invitations, created either by a stationer or on the couple's home computer, are appropriate. Colored ink and paper and response postcards also are appropriate. Maps and hotel information, printed on the same paper stock and type-face as the invitation, may be mailed with the invitation. For a wedding with fewer than 50 guests or one that's less than a month away, the couple can send handwritten notes or e-mail. Guests can phone or e-mail their responses to these. Whichever form you use, don't use a computer or a typewriter to address the envelopes. The address should be calligraphed or in the couple's own handwriting.

While relaxing in front of the TV the other night, I flipped the channel to C-SPAN-2. At that time, an author was discussing his latest book and his career. I soon learned it was David Baldacci, and the book being signed that day was *Saving Faith*.




When Pride Still Mattered:



Gusty Elise goes the distance as runner Loretta Claiborne



Kimberly Elise, who began her career on the stage and wowed critics in the feature film *Beloved*, makes an indelible impression in the title role of *The Loretta Claiborne Story*, a Wonderful World of Disney production premiering Sunday on ABC.

Kimberly Elise (*Beloved*) scores a personal best in the title role of *The Loretta Claiborne Story*, an uplifting movie premiering Sunday, Jan. 16, on ABC's *The Wonderful World of Disney*.

The film, directed by Lee Grant, also stars Emmy winner Camryn Manheim (*The Practice*) and Tina Lifford (*The Temptations*). Timothy Shriver, the son of Special Olympics booster Eunice Kennedy Shriver, is among the executive producers.

Part of a large, poor family headed by a single mother (Lifford), Loretta Claiborne was born partially blind. Unable to walk or talk until age 4, she endures the predictable taunts and humiliation for her mild mental retardation while growing up, finding her bliss at last in running.

Her discovery of that talent happily coincides with the establishment of the Special Olympics program, which genuinely changes her life. She receives the 1996 Arthur Ashe Award for Courage at the ESPY Awards.

It's a story that easily could tip over into mawkishness or sentimentality, yet it never does, thanks to striking performances by its stars and bracing direction by Grant.

Manheim is terrific as feisty social worker Janet McFarland, but the role is almost a copy of her award-winning work on *The Practice*. More surprising is Lifford, who turns Loretta's mother, Rita, into a figure of iron will and righteous anger.

"If God only gives us what we can handle, he must think the world of me!" Rita snorts at one point, and you sense that she is right.

If Lifford and Manheim are excellent, however, Elise is nothing short of extraordinary. The 28-year-old actress came out of the theater less than four years ago and has been giving one

breakout performance after another ever since. This one is no exception, making Loretta a prickly, stubborn individual, not a martyr to her disability.

"Our goal was to capture Loretta's spirit more than to just do an imitation," Elise says, recalling the creative decision she reached with director Grant. "The things that I saw and felt coming from her when I met her were what I wanted to put into the character."

"I saw a very sensitive person, but someone who, at the same time, was very strong and confident. She was very funny, very smart and full of intelligent information. But what struck me most was her sensitivity. That kind of character is just so rare."

Elise acknowledges that playing mentally and physically challenged characters is full of traps, but she found freedom in the diversity of the disabled community.

"The biggest thing I had going for me is that there is just not one 'type' of developmentally disabled person," she explains. "They're each such a diverse and particular individual, and that made me feel safer, once I knew there wasn't just one 'right' way to play the character. Each child that I met was as different and unique as pebbles on a beach."

The role proved physically challenging as well. While Elise has kept in shape by running for most of her life, she had given birth to a daughter just a few months before filming.

"The running was really rough, because my body had just been through this (other) trial, and having to do those scenes without having a chance to train properly and get back into shape was tough," she says ruefully.

And that same toughness keeps this TV movie running smoothly.





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Want to stay young and live forever? Be careful what you wish for.

Such opportunities would undoubtedly be wrought with conditions, restrictions and unavoidable problems.

Dennis Conway (Kyle MacLachlan) and his son find the legendary fountain of youth in a hidden town situated in the Pacific Northwest. "When you turn 100, the whole town throws you a party," Eastwood says.

Port Charles is Gail's first daytime drama, but he's been working in TV and films for years.




