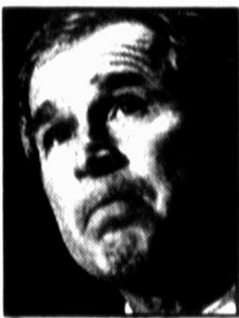

■ Noisy car stereos called noise pollution, can land owners the city's court

Sitting at a red light, windows down, enjoying a mild spring day, a driver seems to have not a care in the world.

BOOM-DAH-BOOM, DAH-BOOM-BOOM!

From either side or behind comes the thundering noise emitted from an ultra car stereo system.

The mid-day quiet instantly disintegrates. Worse than the noise though is the vile words, which are often the only distinguishable phrases among the heavy bass and loud instrumental background.

The noise is so loud not even raising the windows blocks the impact of the sound waves.

Most drivers are glad their family is not present and just hope the offending noise moves quickly away. Little do they know there is a legal option.

Hereford Police Cpt. Pat Michael said this is a matter of disturbing the peace and residents, including drivers, can file a complaint.

The loud music and profane language falls under Chapter 4201 of the Texas penal code and is a class C misdemeanor.

The law states anyone who intentionally or knowingly uses indecent or profane language breaches the peace.

Profanity includes any of the words commonly considered as "cuss words" or which can be degrading when taken in the context used.

"The same is true for the volume," Michael said. "We do file on individuals if we can get a name to go on the complaint."

Michael said if a driver can get a good description of the car, including

the license plate, and some description of the driver, a complaint can be filed and the driver can be cited for disturbing the peace.

Fines, according to the Municipal Court Judge Tawanna Hollowell can range up to \$500.

"Most of the people who are cited for disturbing the peace are under 25. We very seldom have repeat offenders on this," Hollowell said.

The judge said parents, to a great extent help curb repeat offenders.

Music coming from rolling boom boxes can be considered to loud if it can be heard in the car next to or if it impedes general conversation in another vehicle.

Growth surges by 6.9%

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. economy, propelled by hardy consumer spending, surged ahead at a breakneck 6.9 percent annual rate during the final three months of 1999 — the strongest pace in more than three years.

The Commerce Department reported today that the big advance in the gross domestic product was even stronger than the sizzling 5.8 percent fourth-quarter rate the government previously estimated one month ago.

Today's revised estimate matched a 6.9 percent growth spurt posted in the second quarter of 1996 and has not been exceeded since a 7.2 percent rate of increase in the fourth quarter of 1987.

The revised fourth-quarter estimate shows the economy growing at a more robust pace than many analysts were predicting. They estimated that the economy could grow at rates anywhere from 6.3 percent to 6.8 percent.

With investors expecting supercharged growth, the bond market showed little reaction after the report's release. Bond prices were largely unchanged as the yields on 30-year Treasuries nudged up to 6.14 percent in early trading from 6.13 percent late Thursday.

The economy's fourth quarter growth sprinted past the 5.7 percent rate of increase recorded in the third quarter of 1999.

A number of factors contributed to the fourth-quarter performance: robust consumer and government spending and a strong buildup in inventories held by businesses added to growth, while the swelling U.S. trade deficit continued to subtract from it.

The Federal Reserve has bumped up interest rates four times since June to slow the red-hot economy and keep inflation under control.

Many economists widely expect the Fed will boost rates again on March 21 because the economy continues to grow faster than the Fed's preferred 3 percent range.

Dallas firm to build new WTAMU center

CANYON — A Dallas construction company was awarded the contract to design and build a 6,500-seat, \$9 million special events center at West Texas A&M University.

Howard D. Graves, chancellor of the Texas A&M University System, recently signed the contract with Centex/HKS.

The multi-purpose facility will be located on a 14-acre tract near Spur 48 and Fourth Avenue, east of the Canyon Holiday Inn Express.

The university system regents approved the center in 1999, with the state appropriating \$6 million for its construction through tuition revenue bonds. WTAMU committee the other \$3 million to the project, which may be completed by the summer of 2001.

"We will be the first campus in the A&M System to use the design/build approach in which one contractor handles both the design and the construction ... of the project," WTAMU vice president for business/finance Gary Barnes said.

The design/build approach, while not new to the private sector, was not authorized for state projects until 1997 when it received the approval of the Texas Legislature, Barnes said.

Under the terms of the contract, the center must contain 4,500 permanent seats with room for 2,000 more on the floor; it must be able to accommodate National Collegiate Athletic Association basketball and volleyball; it must be flexible enough for other events, such as concerts,

University Interscholastic League competitions, conferences, seminars and commencement exercises. Many of these events have been conducted at the Amarillo Civic Center.

Although Centex/HKS is expected to complete the project within the \$9 million budget, additional donations, if received, would mean more amenities for the facility.

"We will not be getting a Cadillac, nor will we be getting a Pinto; we'll fall somewhere in between," Barnes said.

Livestock industry confronting challenge with water shortage

COLLEGE STATION (AP) — Limited forage and water supplies are forcing livestock producers across the state to reduce their stocking rates, according to the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

District extension director Scott Durham of San Angelo said the reductions come at time when Texas producers were hoping to rebuild herds that were already reduced during the 1996 drought.

"Producers had to reduce their stocking rates considerably, and they haven't been able to rebuild those herds," he said. "Now with the drastic reductions of this year, we are not going to see any rebuilding."

The Texas Agricultural Statistics Service said this week that the state's beef cattle numbers dropped by 100,000, and Texas sheep and lamb numbers dropped by 150,000 in 1999.

Durham said producers are reducing their herds to cope with the continuing costs associated with the drought.

"The forage supply is limited, and stock tanks are dry," he said. "Livestock are requiring other means, and hauling water and supplemental feeding become costly."

Durham said even supplemental feeding supplies are limited, as hay is in short supply.

"We didn't produce very much hay to begin with," he said. "So, naturally we're experiencing low inventories accompanied by high prices."

Durham said producers are also reducing their herds to protect their forage resources.

"Leaving more soil and forage undisturbed will certainly allow for a quicker recovery following the drought," he said. "It's going to have a big impact on simply surviving it."

District extension director Galen Chandler of Vernon said cattle producers struggling to maintain forage and water supplies are also opting to sell older cows to capitalize on relatively high cattle prices.

"There are higher than normal cattle runs at area livestock auction barns due to high prices and drought conditions," he said. "Light weight stocker cattle are being pulled off wheat pastures and shipped to feed lots."

District extension director Bob Robinson of Amarillo told the Texas A&M University Department of Agricultural Communications that warm and dry weather continues in the Panhandle.

"As a result, range conditions are very poor to fair," he said. "Until substantial moisture is received, growth will be slow."

Driver faces no charges

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — A grand jury has decided not to indict an 18-year-old Texas A&M student who dozed at the wheel of his truck and ran down a group of students walking along the roadside.

The accident killed six and injured two others. Brandon Michael Kallmeyer of Katy was driving home Oct. 10 when he fell asleep and veered off the road. His truck plowed into people getting out of their cars or making their way to a fraternity party near the A&M campus hours after the school's football team played Baylor.

Brazos County District Attorney Bill Turner said the grand jury found insufficient evidence to indict Kallmeyer on a charge of criminally negligent homicide.

"With drowsy-driving cases, the law requires you to look at the particular circumstances surrounding an incident," Turner told the Bryan-College Station Eagle. "There was no evidence that when he got behind the wheel of the car for the 30-minute drive home, his sleepiness was so evident that his failure to recognize it was extremely careless."

Investors reach tentative agreement

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Marriott and investors suing the company over limited partnerships formed in the 1980s have reached a tentative settlement under which the hotel giant would buy back 120 Courtyard by Marriott inns for \$372 million.

The agreement also calls for Marriott International Inc. and Host Marriott Corp. each to pay \$31 million to end lawsuits involving certain limited partnerships aside from the Courtyard by Marriott deals.

Marriott's lawyers unveiled key coval by investors and the court.

Attorneys for both sides called the agreement a "win-win" situation by providing liquidity for investors and value in the form of hotels for Marriott.

"The sense I get is the clients are thrilled to have liquidity," said David Berg of Houston, lead plaintiffs' attorney. "I'm thrilled with the settlement, and I think Marriott is and I hope it gets done."

JAIL INVESTIGATION: Indictments and firings that followed reports of sex and alcohol in the Rockwall County Jail have prompted state and federal investigators to look into operations at a jail east of Dallas. The Texas Rangers and FBI are looking into accusations that jailers gave drugs and alcohol to female inmates in exchange for sex. Texas Ranger Al Alexis said Thursday. ... **EARNSPENNEY:** Plano-based J.C. Penney Co. Inc. plans to close about 45 department stores and 289 Eckerd drug stores in an effort to turn the troubled retailer around. Company officials said Thursday most of the closures will occur by midyear, but they declined to say which of its 1,150 department stores and 2,900 Eckers will close or how many jobs will be lost. ... **LAJITAS AUCTION:** A phone-company executive from Austin outbid six others Thursday to buy virtually the entire town of Lajitas and an additional 21,000 acres for \$4.2 million. Stephen R. Smith, 55, who helped build Excel Communications Inc. into a multibillion-dollar long-distance company, said he has no specific plans for the resort, which includes a saloon, more than 90 hotel and motel rooms, a golf course and a landing strip, all located on the edge of Big Bend National Park.

Proper safety seats save young lives

Adult safety restraints provide little security for small children

ATLANTA (AP) — Too big for child safety seats and too small for adult seat belts, children ages 4 to 8 face a unique risk of dying in accidents because drivers often leave them unrestrained and in the front seat, according to government researchers.

About 500 children in that age group die in car wrecks each year, according to a study of federal traffic fatality data released Thursday by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

The study found that from 1994 to 1998, 14,411 children

ages 4 to 8 were involved in fatal car wrecks; 2,549 of them died. The report also found that more than two-thirds of the children killed in car accidents during that period were not wearing a safety restraint, and fewer than half — 49 percent — were in the back seat.

The National Transportation Safety Board recommends that children 12 and under ride only in the back seat. Studies show that keeping children in the back seat could cut deaths by a third, yet about a quarter of all kids routinely ride up front, the CDC said.

Children in the front seat also face injury risk from air bags and are more likely to suffer injury there than in the back.

The report's lead author, Steven Trockman of the CDC's National Center for Injury Prevention and Control, likened

the issue to a disease in which a vaccine goes unused. He said placing children in booster seats in the back seat wouldn't save every life, but would reduce the number of deaths.

"We have a known problem. We have a known vaccine for it," Trockman said. "The vaccine is not getting to the children."

The figures are discouraging because of substantial safety gains among toddlers in recent years, experts said.

"In general, parents just don't understand" the problem, said Karen DiCapua, director of child passenger safety at the National SAFE KIDS Campaign.

"Once the child is 2 1/2 or 3, parents just jump at the chance to put them in the adult seat," she said.

The CDC recommends that children ages 4 to 8 use booster seats so that shoulder belts fit them securely between the

neck and arm and the lap belt fits across the upper thighs. But only about 5 percent of the children killed in accidents were using a child booster seat.

Children must be 58 inches tall and weigh 80 pounds before they fit into adult seat belts, according to CDC-adopted guidelines from the American Academy of Pediatrics.

Also, while all states have child-restraint laws, the CDC found wide gaps among the safety measures mandated for children ages 4 to 8.

No state requires the use of booster seats, and 19 states allow children to ride in the back seat without a restraint, according to the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety, an Arlington, Va.-based research group funded by auto insurance companies.

Only 12 states prohibit the use of adult seat belts for children.

Democrats attack Medicare plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — Democrats are launching fresh attacks on a Senate Medicare overhaul plan favored by Republicans.

"Without question, seniors would be forced to pay considerably more under this reform plan," said Sen. John D. Rockefeller, D-W.Va.

The proposal could drive Medicare premiums up by 47 percent or more, according to a letter from Health and Human Services Department actuary Richard Foster that is being circulated by Democratic lawmakers.

Sen. Bill Frist, R-Tenn., co-sponsor of the bill with Sen. John Breaux, D-La., called the letter "just a continuation of the (Clinton) administration's disinformation campaign on Breaux-Frist, which is the only proposal that provides both outpatient prescription drugs and true Medicare reform."

HHS spokeswoman Melissa Skolfield defended Foster's analysis. While it may serve the administration's position, she said that he serves in a congressionally established office created to assess the fi-

nancial condition of Medicare and his conclusions are reached independently.

Congressional action on Medicare this year is uncertain, but the topic is an election-year favorite for rhetoric and partisan attacks.

Frist and Breaux served of a 1999 bipartisan Medicare reform commission, where the plan they are now peddling did not win enough support from Democrats to be formally recommended to Congress.

President Clinton has since come out with his own Medicare plan, featuring a new prescription drug benefit at a cost to retirees of \$26 per month.

Republicans have criticized Clinton's plan as an attempt to score political points for Democrats without seriously tackling the problem of curbing Medicare costs, which are expected to balloon once baby boomers begin to retire in about a decade.

Meanwhile, GOP leaders have praised the Breaux-Frist plan, which would seek to save the government money by making Medicare more like the

health benefits many younger Americans get from employers.

Senior citizens would choose among pre-approved private health plans and Medicare would pay a standard portion of the premium. Those choosing higher-cost plans would pay more out-of-pocket, but supporters say competition among plans would bring costs down for many.

A government-run Medicare option would continue to be available. But it would have to compete under the same financial constraints as private plans.

For that reason, Foster said in his Feb. 23 letter that staying in the government-run plan — which would be most similar to what retirees are used to now — could cost 25 percent more out-of-pocket.

In addition, Foster's letter noted that the Breaux-Frist legislation calls for money from premiums collected from Medicare beneficiaries to cover 12 percent of Medicare's total costs. Under current law, premiums are scheduled to cover about 10 percent of costs in 2003, 11 percent by 2010, and in 2015, the program would run short of cash.

A boost to premiums covering 12 percent of costs in 2003 would translate into a 22 percent rise in premiums, Foster estimated. Monthly Medicare premiums are currently \$45.50 per month.

Those choosing new prescription drug coverage offered under the Breaux-Frist proposal would pay an additional charge, which Foster estimated at about \$57.50 per month.

roundball. Tonight at the Odessa Permian gym, the Herd faces off against the San Elizario Eagles after drawing a bye in the first round of the playoffs.

The game, scheduled for 7 p.m., will stack two teams with similar makeups against each other. Hereford comes into the game with a 20-10 record, while the Eagles had a 20-11 season and a playoff win against El Paso Burges last Tuesday night, 53-40. Hereford's last game was an overtime win in a "get ready" game at Randall against Hale Center.

"We scouted the San Elizario

team when they played Burges," said Coach Randy Dean in an interview Thursday. "They match-up with us in size with their tallest starter at 6'3". They play real hard, and the extra effort shows up, especially in rebounds."

What remains to be seen is whether the level of competition experienced by both teams is on an even keel. Hereford plays in a region where five of the top 20 teams reside, according to the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches rankings.

The San Elizario team was the runner-up in District 2 while the Herd went undefeated in 3-4A district play for the first time since 1977. "The El Paso area has a competitive basketball program," said Coach Dean. "We had good practices this week, and we're in a building process for Friday. We're probably in as good a shape as we can be in at this time of year."

Since many of the football players had to play themselves into court shape, they may just now be reaching the top of their game.

Dean added that the players are excited about the playoffs. "I think they feel challenged to advance."

What Dean was really saying is that this group of kids knows all about playoff games — and winning. After the football team finished

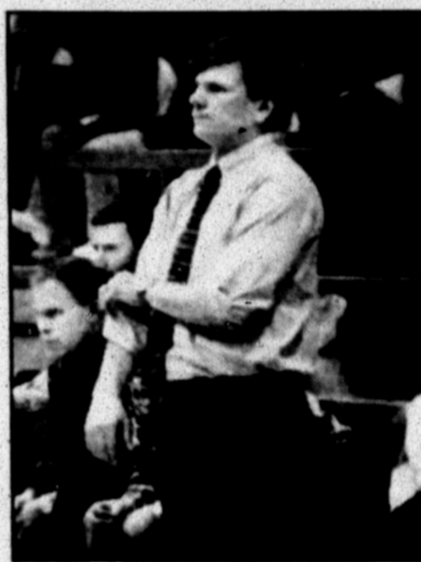

The Herd is back, and is still flex-

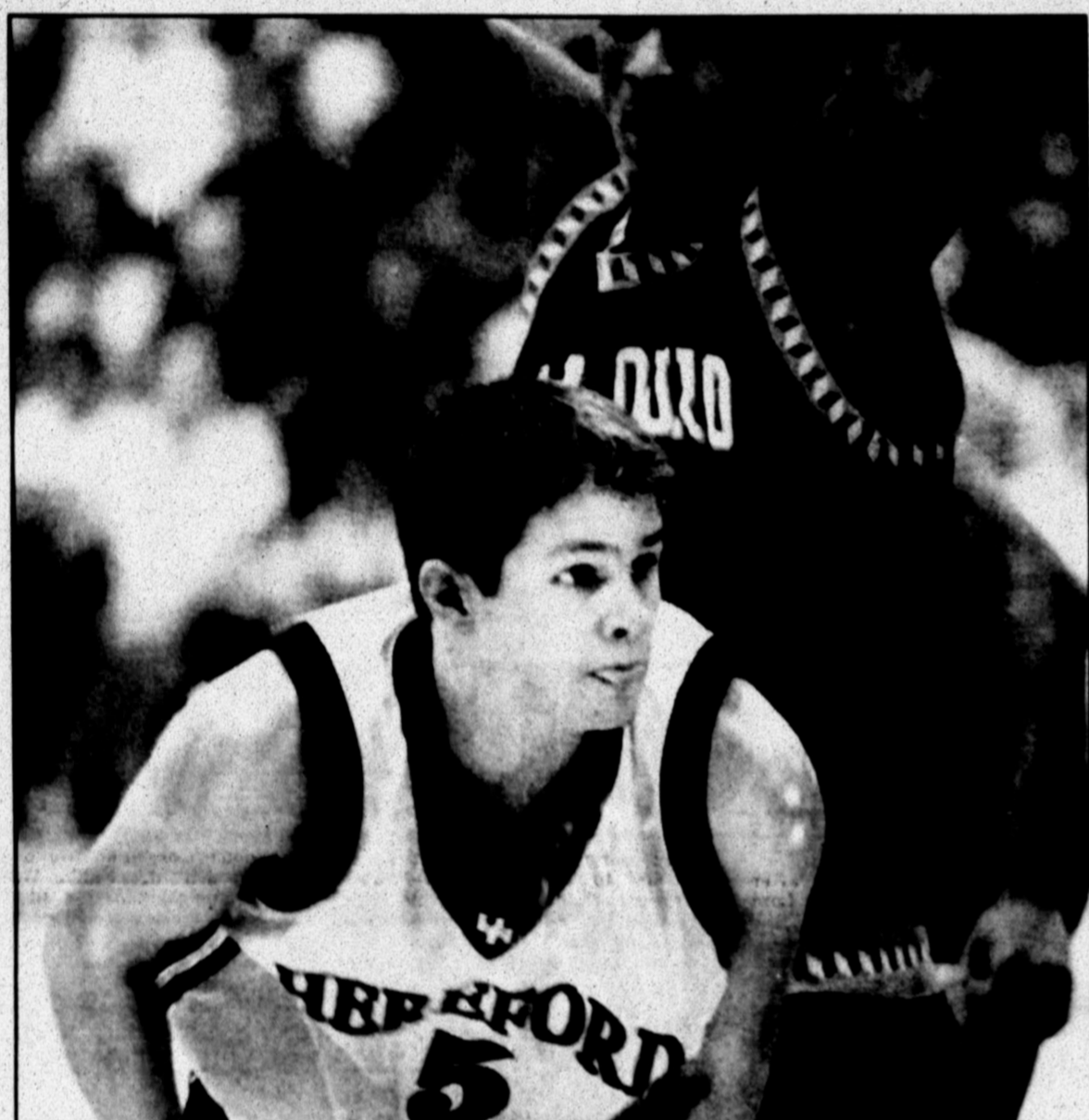

DALLAS (AP) — Dennis Rodman is turning out to be everything the Dallas Mavericks expected and everything they feared.

Although Rodman has brought bigger crowds, a higher profile and more toughness, he's also been a magnet for fouls, ejections and controversy.

Rodman was tossed in the

fourth quarter of 92-85 loss to the Utah Jazz on Thursday night, marking his second ejection in five games. He was suspended one game for lingering after his previous ejection, and he could be punished again, considering he hung around longer this time.

"The referees have got to understand, people are not

here to see them," Rodman said. "I do my thing. I don't take any cheap blows. I try to help the team win. I can't do that if I'm getting kicked out. It's unfair to me."

Juan Ayala drove in Torres with a shot up the middle and Artho followed on a Tascosa error.

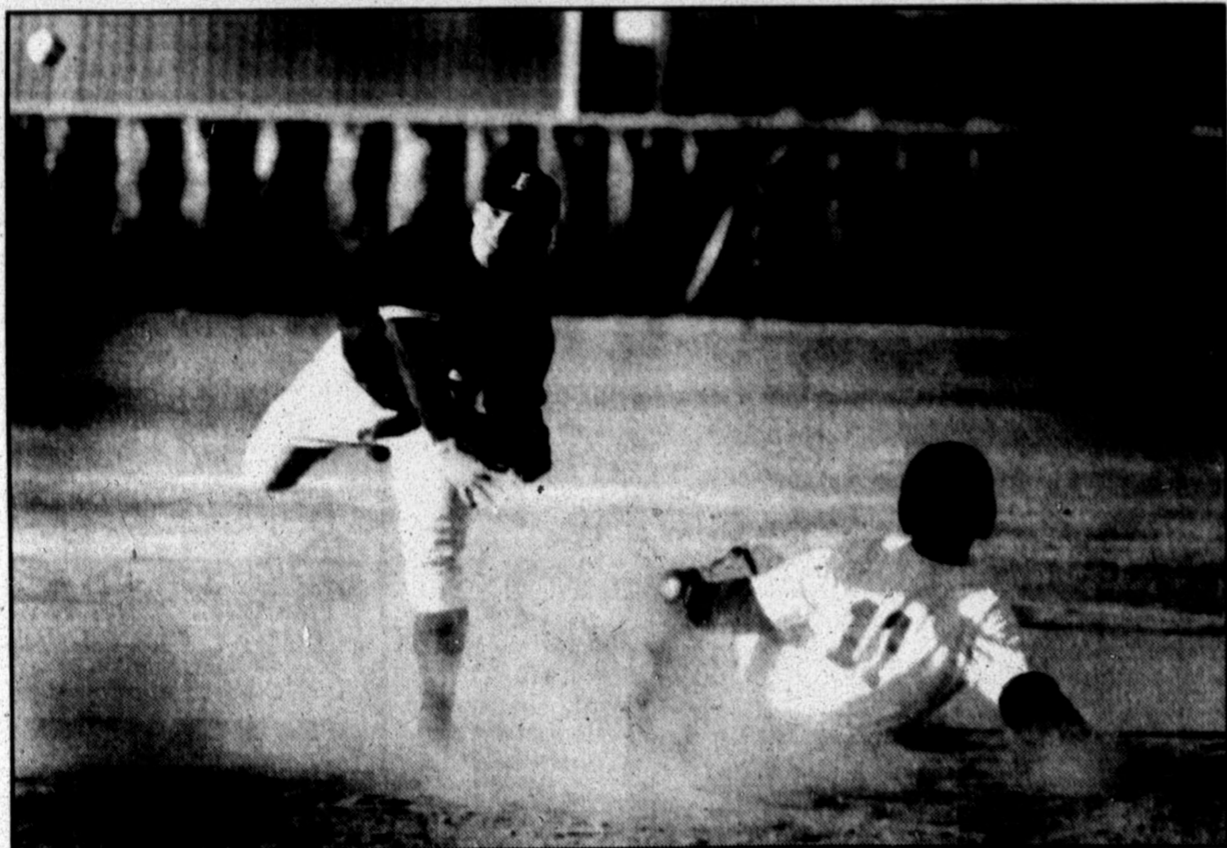
With the score split 4-4, Brady Daniel singled, L.J. Vallejo walked before Lacey came to bat again and singled to score Ayala.

—Averaged 15 rebounds, but scored just 10 points,

—Drawn sellout crowds to two of three home games, but Dallas is 1-4 with him in the lineup. The Mavs had won seven of eight before he joined, and they won the game he missed while suspended.

"David Stern and Rod Thorn, they need to get their ass kicked. It's ridiculous. Just let Dennis Rodman play," said Rodman, whose only point against Utah was on a free throw with his eyes closed. "I'm not throwing cheap blows. I'm not out there trying to kill anybody."

This game was expected to be physical because of Rodman's history with Utah's Karl Malone and because of a run-in Malone had with Dallas center Shawn Bradley and coach Don Nelson last month. It was so obvious that even the Mavericks' mascot wore boxing gloves during pregame introductions.

The game was uneventful until early in the third quarter when Rodman picked up his first technical for arguing an official's call. He and Malone were later assessed a double foul when they got tangled up and both went sprawling to the court away from the action.

The ball was nowhere near them again in the fourth quarter when Rodman was whistled for tripping Malone. His gripping over that call led to his ejection, and he remained on the court to continue complaining.

Once teammates and coaches finally convinced Rodman to leave the court, the action continued as his traditional jersey-toss into the stands triggered a court-side fight between the team doctor and a fan.

"Dennis always has a knack of keeping the attention focused on him, even when he's walking down the street," Utah coach Jerry Sloan said.

The concert will benefit the Human Rights Campaign Foundation, the educational arm of the Human Rights Campaign, which lobbies Congress.

Texas executes second woman

HUNTSVILLE, Texas — As Gov. George W. Bush forges ahead with his presidential campaign, he leaves behind what some are calling a missed opportunity to demonstrate his "compassionate conservatism."

Capital punishment opponents and organizations that deal with domestic violence victims had urged Bush to delay the execution of Betty Lou Beets. Executed after Bush denies reprieve.

But the governor, following what has become standard practice, denied a last-minute reprieve. Beets, 62, was executed by injection Thursday night for murdering her fifth husband nearly 17 years ago.

"It is an act of which we should be deeply ashamed," said Joseph Margulies, Beets' lawyer, who watched his cli-

ent die. "It is not an act of compassion."

Beets is the nation's fourth condemned woman to be executed since the U.S. Supreme Court allowed the death penalty to resume in 1976. She is the second to die in Texas.

"I am confident that the courts, both state and federal, have thoroughly reviewed all the issues raised by the defendant," Bush said in a statement shortly after the U.S. Supreme Court rejected Beets' final appeal.

Less than an hour later, she was strapped to the death chamber gurney. She declined to make a final statement and made no eye contact with the victim's family. She smiled at her attorney and a spiritual adviser watching through a window, and continued smiling as she slipped into unconsciousness.

Pope celebrates Mass in Cairo

CAIRO, Egypt — Pope John Paul II celebrated the first papal Mass in Egypt today, touching on the sensitive issue of discrimination against Christians in the mostly Muslim nation.

The pope was greeted with cheers, emotional waving and song as he slowly made his way to the altar, dressed in white and gold robes. He responded by solemnly raising

his right hand in greeting.

He appeared tired at first, bowing his head and raising a hand to an eye during a lengthy introduction in a stadium usually used for squash and other indoor sports. His words as he began prayers in French were slurred, and aides held the text he read.

His hands trembled when he later held the pages of his homily. The 79-year-old pope's slurred speech and trembling hands were symptoms of Parkinson's disease, a progressive neurological disorder.

John Paul, sitting on a gilt, throne-like chair during his homily, noted Christians have endured in Egypt for centuries, keeping the faith even when it meant "shedding their blood." Christians are about 10 percent of the population in overwhelmingly Muslim Egypt.

Egypt's Copts, the largest Christian community in the Middle East, have a history of persecution dating to St. Mark, believed to have brought Christianity to Egypt around A.D. 43 and been martyred here by the Romans 20 years later. More recently, Muslim fundamentalist insurgents targeted Christians before crackdowns began weakening the movement.

The pope called for dialogue among the faiths. And he touched on the sensitive issue of discrimination against Christians. Egypt's Christians and Muslims generally live in peace, but Christians occasionally complain of being denied government posts, particularly high-ranking ones.

Bill Bradley says his rival, Al Gore, has repeatedly broken pledges to protect the environment.



Bradley pitches to 'Greeners'

OLYMPIA, Wash. (AP) — Bill Bradley, appearing at a northwestern liberal arts college where students are known as "Greeners," says Al Gore has repeatedly broken promises to protect the environment.

Gore, campaigning in New York, disagreed and called environmental protection "a profoundly moral obligation."

The two Democratic candidates for president fought a transcontinental battle Thursday over who's the better environmentalist.

Speaking inside the synagogue at the Orthodox Jewish community of New Square, Gore told Hasidic men and boys, "We honor and glorify the Creator by being good stewards of what He has created."

At an earlier event along the banks of the Hudson River, the vice president and front-runner for the Democratic nomination even offered a rare compliment to his opponent.

"Bill Bradley does have a good environmental record and I acknowledge that," Gore said. "But I deeply appreciate your willingness to look at not only the two very similar records on votes but also to go beyond that and look at leadership, because I've worked hard."

SPS crosses the tracks, has new service center

Southwestern Public Service Co. employees celebrated the opening of the company's new Hereford Service Center by holding an open house Thursday at the new location, 3550 Holly Sugar Road.

The service center formerly was located on New York Street, which was south of the Burlington Northern Santa Fe rail lines through Hereford.

The new center allows the company to consolidate equipment in one convenient location, and away from the regular trains that often blocked access to electrical emergencies.

At the former site, trains could be a regular hassle for SPS crews needing to move

freely throughout town, said Wallace Hill manager for construction, operations and maintenance in the Hereford District.

"Our response times are faster now that we've moved to Holly Road," Hill said. "The New York site was blocked by trains every 12 minutes and we would have to wait for the tracks to clear before we could get to the trouble spots."

Another advantage to the new site is SPS is able to store all equipment on one site and all company vehicles are stored inside the building, Hill said.

The new service center has almost double the square feet of office and storage space

available at the New York Street site, which had only 6,492 square feet of space.

"When the customer service office closed in 1997, all our Hereford employees were moved to a very small space at our warehouse on New York Street," Hill said. "At the new site, we have double the office space, which allows for better organization and productivity for all employees involved. This results in more-efficient service to our customers."

The Hereford Service Center serves a wide section of the southwestern Texas Panhandle, including the towns of Hereford, Dimmitt, Bovina, Friona and Canyon.

Bush hoping to smoke McCain in Virginia vote

SPRINGFIELD, Va. (AP) — Gov. George W. Bush headed to Virginia today to target tobacco country, the military-dominated Norfolk area and northern Virginia in his bid to defeat Sen. John McCain in the state's Republican presidential primary on Tuesday.

Bush said he would stick to his campaign schedule after receiving assurance that his father, former President Bush, "was fine" following hospitalization Thursday for an irregular heartbeat. "Had there been a real problem, I can assure you we would have been all up in arms," Bush said this morning as he boarded a plane in Austin, Texas.

In tobacco-growing southern Virginia, Bush supporters are chastising Arizona Sen. McCain for supporting tax increases on cigarettes. Voters in the Newport News-Norfolk area, home of the world's largest Navy installation, are being told of McCain's opposition to the Seawolf submarine.

In the Washington suburbs, McCain is being attacked for trying to increase flights into Reagan National Airport, which some northern Virginians say is noisy enough already.

Bush's campaign hopes the regional attacks, combined with support from Gov. Jim Gilmore and much of Virginia's GOP establishment, will bring a resounding victory following losses in Republican presidential primaries this week Michigan and Arizona.

Polls have shown Bush with a comfortable lead in the state. A survey today by Mason

Wednesday. Late Thursday, the former president was hospitalized in Naples, Fla., with an irregular heart beat, after becoming ill at a reception. He was expected to be released from Naples Community Hospital today.

"His spirits are high and he's ready to travel," the governor said of his father.

McCain's campaign complains that Gilmore and the state's GOP establishment are seeking to ram Bush down the throats of Virginians.

"The Bush folks strike me as a little smug. They assume they have won here," said Dennis Peterson, executive director of McCain's Virginia campaign.

Steve Katsurinas, Bush's co-chairman in Alexandria, said "George W. Bush is the candidate most in line with traditional Republican values."

Far from hurting him, McCain's votes to trim excess military spending and curb tobacco use by minors should show voters that he is courageous, supporters say. His service as a Navy pilot and the more than 5½ years he spent in a Vietnamese prison camp also show his toughness, they say.

Most agree McCain faces an uphill battle here.

"Ultimately, his problem in Virginia is he has no organization, and what organization there is is very amateurish," said Stephen Medvic, an Old Dominion University political science professor.

NAPLES, Fla. (AP) — Former President Bush was recovering at a hospital today after he became lightheaded during a business conference and was diagnosed with an irregular heartbeat.

Bush, 75, was expected to be released from Naples Community Hospital later today, said Jim McGrath, Bush's spokesman.

He became lightheaded Thursday night after being on his feet for about 90 minutes

during an investors conference sponsored by the Clark-Bardes Corp. at the Registry Resort, McGrath said.

Aides sat him down until he said he felt better, McGrath said. He was driven to the airport for a return flight to his Houston home, but still felt ill. His doctor, contacted by telephone, suggested Bush be driven to a hospital as a precaution.

McGrath said Bush, a vigorous septuagenarian who has

skydived, walked into the hospital on his own.

Bush was treated with blood thinners and "put to bed," McGrath told CNN. He said the heart irregularity "flares up from time to time" and that Bush takes medication for heart problems.

Dr. Robert Mulert, who treated the former president, told the Naples Daily News the condition is not considered serious.
