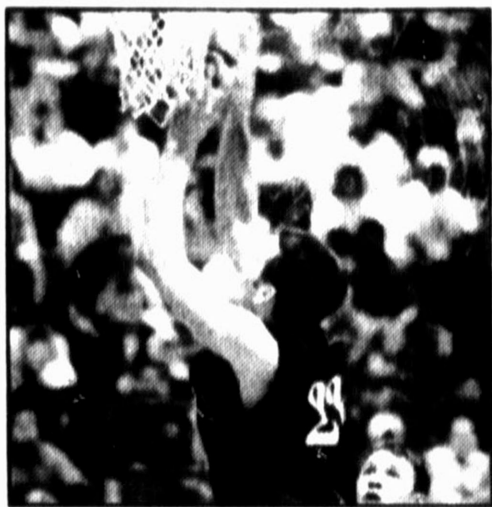

Cassidys to take audience on a musical trip to Ireland

A traditional Irish band will open the Hereford Community Concert season in the new century.

The Cassidys, a family of brothers who have performed together since their childhood on the rocky western coast of County Donegal, will perform at 7:30 p.m. Feb. 1 in the Hereford High School Auditorium.

The Cassidy performance

will be the second in the 1999-2000 concert season. The season was launched in October by the Brothers Four, whose career started four decades ago at the University of Washington.

The members of the Cassidys are from a family of 12 siblings who were raised speaking Gaelic, the ancient language of Ireland. The learned English as a second language after starting school.

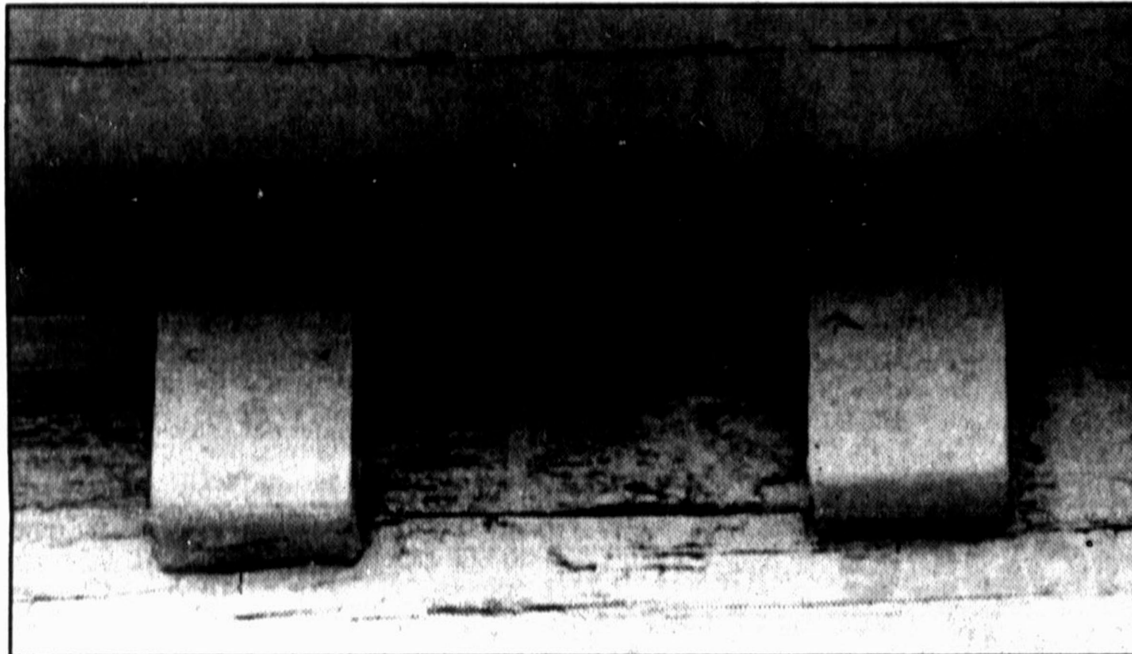
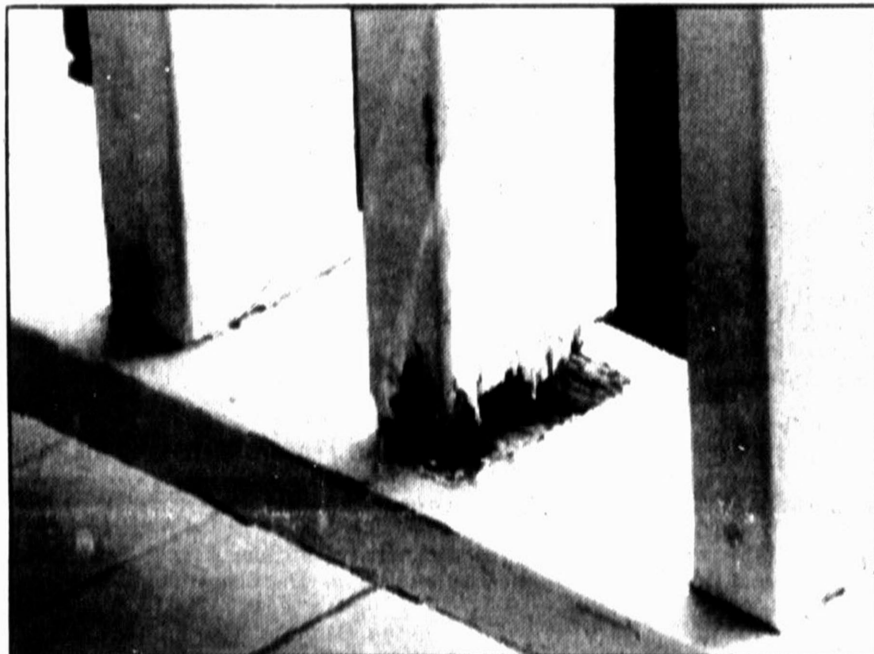
The Cassidy boys were sur-

Time takes toll on Black House

The historic house sitting at the corner of West 3rd Street is full of memories to some; to others, it represents the history of early 1900's in Hereford.

The E.B. Black House, which seems to be deteriorating faster than a repairman is able to fix to it, stands tall and represents every aspect of the typical friendly "Hospitable Hereford" lifestyle of the early 20th Century.

Though the magnificent elm trees have all died out and the white picket fence does not adorn the house anymore, the outside structure and inside designs have been restored to resemble the early days of the house.

Many people may wonder what significance the house holds. Paula Edwards, Deaf Smith County Museum and E.B. Black House director, said simply, "It is for the community. To me, it's preserving our history of Hereford. It shows how their business grew, much like several others."

Mr. and Mrs. E.B. Black were

among the first settlers to Hereford, bringing with them tradition and hospitality.

E.B. Black was born in 1867 in Opelika, Ala. He and his wife, Carrie, and their first three children moved to Hereford in 1901 from Cleburne, Texas. After arriving in Hereford, their fourth child, William was born.

In 1909, Emmett Vanderburgh built the Black family a new, modern Victorian-style house located on West 3rd. The Blacks were socialites throughout town and hosted church parties, teas, luncheons and other gatherings on a regular basis. Their home was always open to the passer-by.

Black owned a furniture store known as the E.B. Black Furniture Co. Several of the original pieces of furniture from his store are on display at the Black House. Soon

after opening the furniture store, E.B. Black became involved in the undertaking business, in which he owned the first motor-driven hearse in the Panhandle.

Black was a well-known civic leader in Hereford and donated time and money to the town and its organizations. A flyer which sits on a table in the house's foyer explains a short history of the Black House. In the flyer it states the house's significance:

"Mr. and Mrs. Black became religious, cultural, educational and social leaders in the community, and this house was site and symbol of these interests."

Edwards said Black "was a very instrumental civic leader. He began the Hereford central school system, now known as Hereford Independent School District, and was the First United Methodist Church's first

Sunday School superintendent."

"At one time, he was mayor (1932). He represents how Hereford grew," Edwards said. Along with all his accomplishments, he was also a charter member of Order of the Eastern Star.

The house was occupied until the mid-1970's when the last residents, James and Prudis Black, moved out. In 1977, the family donated the house to the Deaf Smith County Historical Society and Deaf Smith County under the condition the house be kept open for community use.

Since 1977, the historical society members and repairmen have spent thousands of hours decorating, painting and restoring the house to its turn-of-the-century style. An upstairs bathroom and a massive flower garden and gazebo have been added to the house. In the 1960's, carpet covered the floors, but during the restoration process it was torn up revealing the original elegant wood floor.

The upkeep has not been an easy

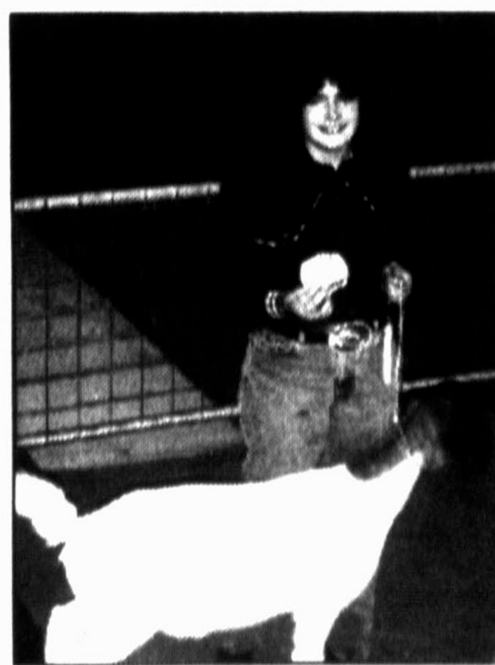

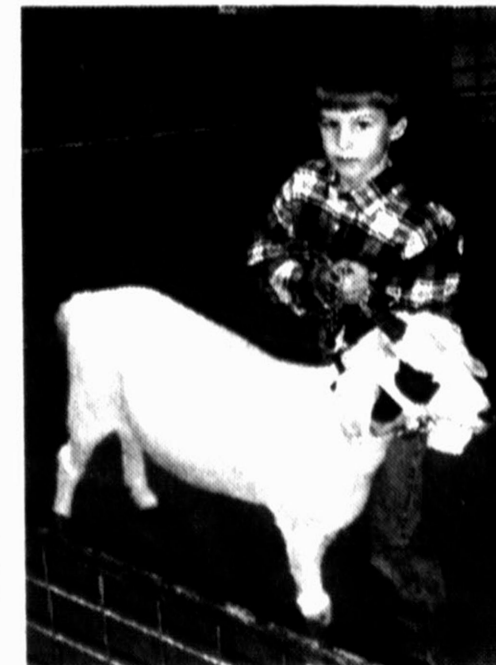

task. The county museum and Black house have fixed budgets for each fiscal year. Unfortunately, this amount doesn't always cover the serious repairs. However, Edwards said the county commissioners help out with extra money when there is money in the budget.

Currently, the entire exterior of the house is in the process of being painted.

"We had hoped it would be last fall but did not receive enough funding," Edwards said.

Recently, the historical society opened bids for re-painting. A self-employed painter, Michael Gavina, offered an accepted bid of \$8,000 to paint the exterior and replace rotted wood areas. He will begin the project this spring.

Stanley Black, grandson of E.B. Black, made a matching grant to the re-painting fund for \$2,500. Edwards said the other \$2,500 came through funds selling historical society cookbooks, donations, memorials, and party fees.

The house usage fees have been raised to \$50 for small events and \$75 for large events, a \$50 deposit is required for either size event. Still \$3,000 short, the historical society is reaching out to the community and asking for their support. After all, the house is for the community's benefit.

The spring and summer is when the house is used most; for bridal showers and weddings. Gavina has agreed to paint sections of the house according to the party schedule line-up so that when a party or wedding is in process, equipment will not be scattered.

After the re-painting project is complete, Edwards says the historical society will look into funding for repairing areas of the inside of the house which also need attention.

A tour of the historical sight is available upon request by calling Edwards at the museum, 363-7070.

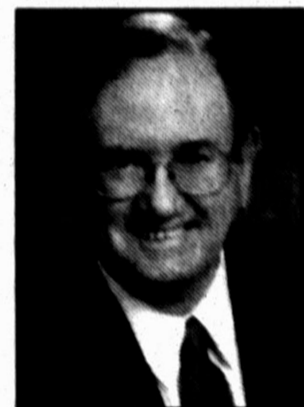

A former Hereford resident will be the keynote speaker next week at the annual Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce banquet.

The keynote speaker, Georgetown humorist-author Ellis Posey, was born in Hereford and spent his first nine years here. After his family moved from Hereford, Posey has lived and worked in all of the major cities and many of the smaller communities of Texas. He also still has many relatives who live in Hereford, Canyon and Amarillo.

He served during the Korean War as a deckhand in the Navy and as a meteorologist in the Air Force.

The service as an Air Force meteorologist led to a career in television and radio. He also worked in advertising in Lubbock, Dallas, Austin and Houston.

In the mid-1970s, he started a community newspaper in Liberty Hill. His weekly humor column gained popularity and he was invited to speak to various organizations, which became a 20-year career as a professional humorous speaker. Since launching that career, he has spoke from coast to coast.

His book, "The Funny Side of Texas," was published in 1995 by The Republic of Texas Press and can be found in major bookstores. He also writes a monthly column, "Say Something Funny," for the *Austin Business Journal*. The column teaches how to use humor in business presentations.

Ellis and his wife, Doris, live in Georgetown. Their daughter, Nell Frostman, is a nurse in Boulder, Colo., and their son, Bob, owns a construction company operating out of Ridgeway, Colo.

The chamber banquet also will feature the presentation of the Hereford Lions Club's annual Citizen of the Year Award. Kim Leonard, the chamber Women's Division's Woman of the Year also will be recognized, as will the chamber directors.

At the 1999 banquet, retired educator Carolyn Waters was named Citizen of the Year, while Shannon Redwine was presented as Woman of the Year.

Gore takes lead in latest surveys

CONCORD, N.H. (AP) — Vice President Al Gore has pulled ahead of Bill Bradley in New Hampshire polls with a surge of support from men, independents and registered Democrats. Bradley was working to reverse the trend with aggressive campaigning.

With four days left until the first-in-the-nation primary, Gore appears to have gotten a boost from his strong campaign in Iowa, which resulted in a decisive win Monday.

A Dartmouth College-Associated Press poll, released Friday, gives Gore a 54 percent to 40 percent lead over Bradley.

The poll was conducted Sunday through Wednesday, in the days just before and after Gore's victory in the Iowa caucuses. Gore was moving up in many polls before his caucus win.

A tracking poll released Friday night by the University of New Hampshire for WMUR

and Fox News gave Gore a 13-point lead, 54-41. The CNN-USA Today-Gallup poll out Friday night gave Gore a 16-point lead, 56-40. Both polls had an error margin of plus or minus 5 percentage points for the Democrats.

The last Dartmouth-AP poll two weeks ago had Bradley at 49 percent and Gore at 43, a slight edge for Bradley.

In the Republican race, the latest Dartmouth-AP poll had John McCain in a virtual tie with George W. Bush, 37 percent to 34 percent. Steve Forbes had 15 percent. In the Dartmouth-AP poll two weeks ago, McCain had 42 points, Bush 33 and Forbes 11.

McCain has a narrow lead in some polls, based on his strength among independents. Bush's chance to catch him may depend on his ability to win over undecided Republicans despite competition for their votes from Forbes and Alan Keyes, veteran pollsters say.

The CNN-USA Today-Gallup poll taken Tuesday through Thursday out had the two about even, Bush at 37 percent and McCain at 36 percent with an error margin of 4 percentage points. The University of New Hampshire-WMUR-Fox tracking poll taken Monday through Thursday gave McCain a 40-33 edge.

Clinton plans sitdown with lawmakers

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Clinton says congressional leaders from both parties will come to the White House to discuss his State of the Union proposals, including a plan to pay off the \$3.6 trillion national debt.

"First and foremost, I hope we can agree on my plan to pay down the debt entirely over the next 13 years and make America debt-free for the first time since Andrew Jackson was president in 1835," Clinton said in his weekly radio address.

The president said he wants to reserve a third of the projected federal surplus for debt reduction, and a lower debt would free up interest payments that should be used to preserve Social Security.

"That will keep it strong and sound for 50 years and take in the life span of the baby boom generation," he said.

Two days after delivering his 89-minute speech to Congress, Clinton offered an abridged version of his final year's agenda, a long wish list of projects ranging from passing a patients bill of rights to raising the minimum wage.

Clinton would create a new Medicare prescription drug benefit and spend more on education, scientific research and military pay.

"We must ensure that every child begins school ready to learn and graduates ready to succeed. We must help every family succeed at home and at work," Clinton said. "We must do all of this while maintaining the fiscal discipline that brought us to this rare and promising moment we enjoy."

Clinton also wants Congress to pass campaign finance reform and legislation dealing with gun-safety and hate crimes.

"Dinosaur Day" is an annual one-day event in which the community is invited to participate in dinosaur-related activities. The Panhandle-Plains Historical Society will provide free admission for families attending the event. Participation in the games area requires an activity ticket priced at \$2 per child. Dinosaur-related prizes will be awarded to all participants in each game.

The focus of the program is to increase and enhance knowledge about dinosaurs and paleontology through hands-on activities and game competitions. The program is designed for participants ages 3-13. There will be games

and activities appropriate for participants in this age range. Scheduled activities include dinosaur films, puzzles and fossil rubbings; a scavenger hunt; Dino Data Quest; Dino Cliques; Volcano walk; Dino Wheel; Dino Dig; Dino Dominoes; Create and Paint a Paper-maché Dinosaur; Draw and Color a Dinosaur; and 10 engravings will be used in the fossil rubbing activity.

Castro: Child's mother 'practically kidnapped' by boyfriend

HAVANA — Cuban President Fidel Castro says Elian Gonzalez' mother was "practically kidnapped" by her boyfriend and intimidated into leaving for the United States, countering claims that she was on a flight to freedom with her 6-year-old son.

Many who want Elian to remain in the United States say his mother, Elisabeth Brotons, was trying to bring him to freedom in a voyage

across the Straits of Florida that ended with shipwreck. She and 10 others drowned and Elian was left floating alone in an inner-tube.

But Castro, speaking to a conference of economists Friday, denounced that idea. He blamed the tragedy on Brotons' boyfriend Lazaro Rafael

Munero, who apparently organized the ill-fated journey in late November in which he also died.

"The mother was practically kidnapped along with the boy" to make the trip, Castro said. "The mother was taken in conditions of intimidation."

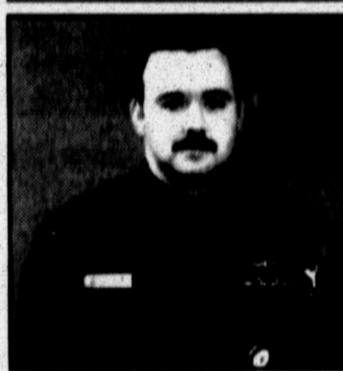
"I loved the travel opportunities and it was an easy way to my college paid for. I am currently attending Wayland Baptist in Plainview," he said.


He says most recruits are juniors in high school and must be 17 years old in order to join the Navy under the delayed entry program.



Last round of debates offers nothing new

Republican presidential candidates accused each other of sounding like Democrats. Then the real Democrats came on to argue about which of them was being nastier. In back-to-back debates, the men who would be president put their cases — and clashes — to New Hampshire voters.

By this time — the debates last Monday night were the 10th for the GOP field, the 9th between Vice President Al Gore and Bill Bradley — there was nothing new to be said about their rival programs and proposals.

So they replayed their arguments about those issues, stridently at times, in the push toward the first of the presidential primary elections next Tuesday. The double debate was televised from WMUR-TV and by CNN.

There were no landmark debate moments, nothing likely to give any candidate a clear boost in the final days of campaigning for Tuesday's primary.

Both contests are rated close ones, with the Republican edge to Sen. John McCain over national front-runner George W. Bush. Steve Forbes, Alan Keyes and Gary Bauer trail them.

Gore has edged ahead of Bradley after trailing him in the New Hampshire surveys, but only narrowly so. Bradley came on strongest of the debaters. He accused Gore of knowingly lying about his proposals. "Attack, attack, attack, every day," Bradley said. "I think the people are fed up with it."

Campaigning to come back from a landslide loss to Gore in the Iowa caucuses on Monday, Bradley said later that the hardened tone was part of his game plan, an effort to contrast old politics with new, claiming the latter as his.

Actually, they sounded alike, each Democrat accusing the other of negative campaigning, personal attacks, misrepresentations.

Bradley questioned why people should believe Gore would tell the truth as president when he doesn't as a candidate. He called him "the elephant of negative advertising."

Gore said Bradley was being negative. "If you're going to talk about a higher standard, you need to live by it," he said.

The 90-minute Republican debate was tame by comparison, but the five GOP candidates, their roster down by one with the withdrawal of Sen. Orrin Hatch, feuded, too.

McCain pressed his campaign reform issue, and said that as nominee, he could confront Gore on it in debates next fall, but Bush could not because he wouldn't have anything to say, being a defender of the current system.

"I'm for reform," Bush countered. "I sure am." But not the reforms McCain wants on unrestricted contributions that can flow through political parties.

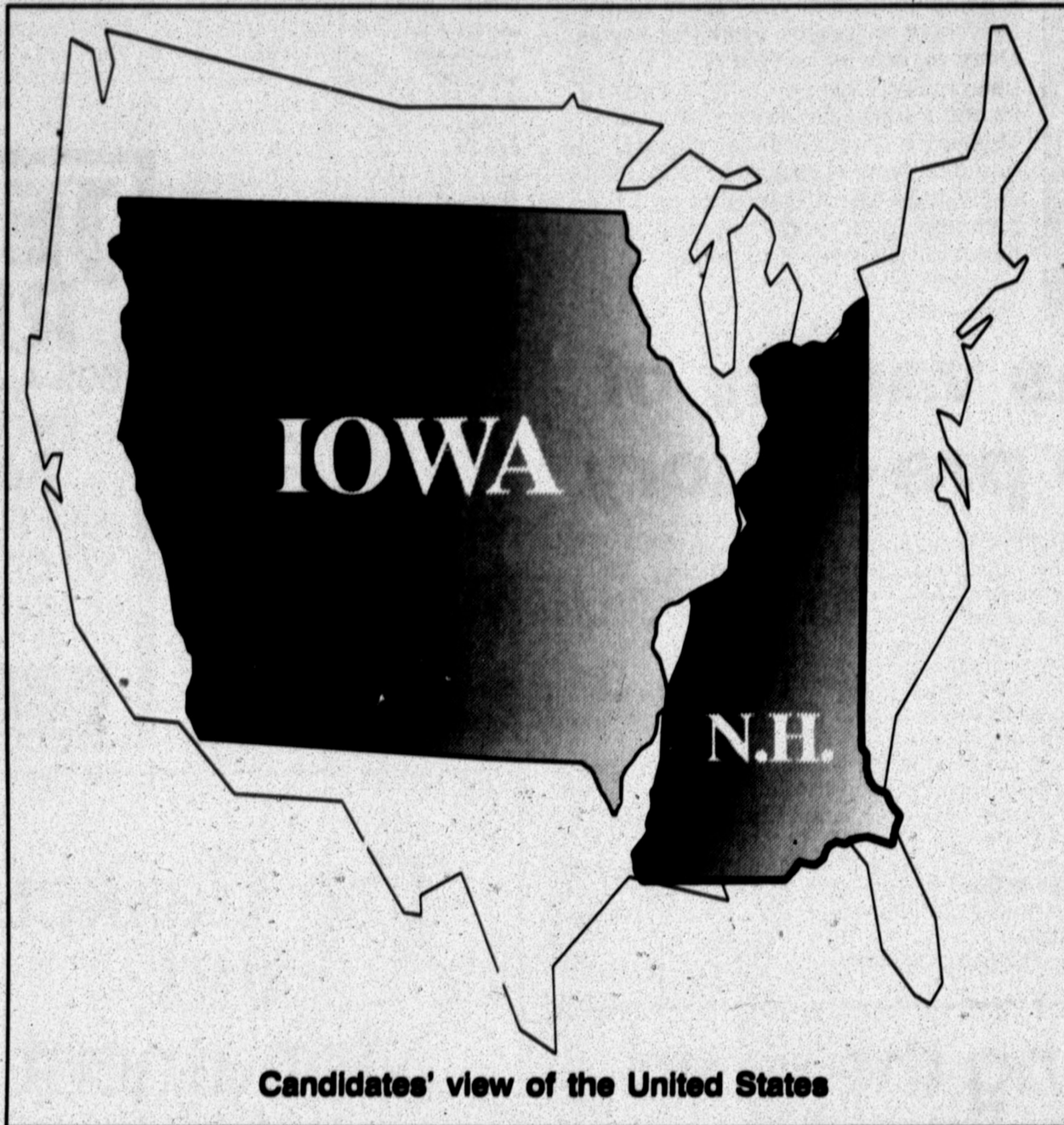
Bush, the GOP winner in Iowa, said McCain's tax plan, for a more modest break than he advocates, could have come from a Democrat. "Al Gore could have written your plan, Mr. Senator," he said.

"George, if you're saying that I'm like Al Gore, then you're spinning like Bill Clinton," McCain replied.

Bush said after the debate that there didn't seem to be much difference between McCain's plans on education and taxes and those of the Clinton administration.

Steve Forbes said his rivals both sounded as though they belonged in the other debate. "You look at their complicated tax plans and believe they would have been in the 9 o'clock debate tonight instead of the one at 7:30," said Forbes, who ran second in Iowa.

Something's very wrong

Al Gore and George W. Bush are the presidential nominees, and in just 357 days one of the two men will take the oath of office as the 43rd president of the United States.

How do we know the Democratic and Republican presidential nominees have been selected? That's easy. Iowa and New Hampshire.

Earlier this week, voters in Iowa conducted their party caucuses, and 63 percent of the Democrats backed Gore, while 41 percent of the Republicans supported Bush.

On Tuesday, New Hampshire's Democrats and Republicans will go to the polls to cast their ballots for president. If Gore and Bush win, the whole presidential nominating process will be over — if the television commentators are to be believed.

Gore and Bush will be proclaimed the nominees more than six months before the delegates to the party conventions gather and after voters in just two of the 50 states actually cast ballots.

There's something dreadfully wrong with the political system when voters in just two states make the decision about who will be the next presidential nominees.

The name of the game in today's presidential politics is raise more money than the Gross Domestic Product of most Third World nations and then sink most of it into Iowa and New Hampshire.

If a candidate has enough money to saturate the airwaves with advertising, the chances are good that the presidential race, or at least the race for the party nominations, will be over before the voters in most of the United States are aware there is a presidential campaign.

Once upon a time, the presidential nominees were chosen by the delegates at the party conventions. The conventions were more than just the party pep rallies of today when the

delegates gather to rubberstamp the results of the primaries, or as it is now, rubberstamp the results of Iowa and New Hampshire.

In those days, the delegates would engage in often-heated debate on the convention floor as they selected their party's nominee. This process, while noisy and contentious, did involve the delegates from all of the states, not just two.

There is something wrong with the nominating process when it is over before voters in two of the largest states, California and Texas, have a chance to make their preferences known.

There is little reason to question why the voters are becoming less interested in participating because there is less likelihood they will be able to make their voices heard.

About 30 years ago, former Montana Sen. Mike Mansfield suggested holding a series of regional primaries, over a period of about two months.

Mansfield believed the regional primaries would lead to greater turnout and would reduce the undesired importance of the early primary (or caucus) states like Iowa and New Hampshire.

Perhaps we should consider adoption of a plan such as proposed by Mansfield before we reach the point where the nominees are selected before any voters can cast a ballot.

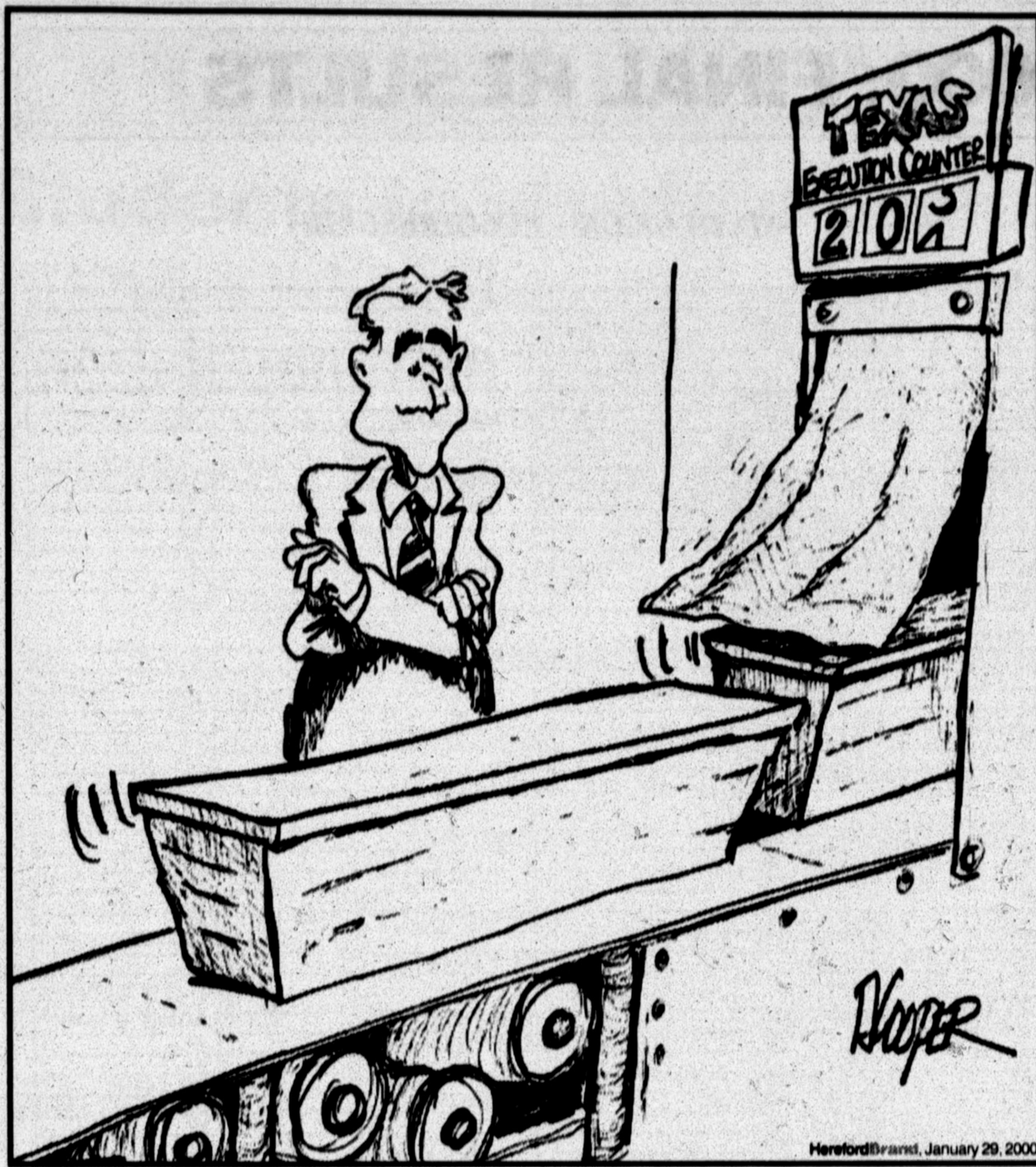

offending tasks. I left the office with wads of cotton soaking up the blood and instructions to change the packing in two hours. Oh, yeah, he gave me the teeth he pulled as souvenirs.

My next venture into the world of dentistry came when we started seeing a local dentist, whom my mother thought was wonderful.

In all fairness, he was a very good dentist. Except he always called me "Princess," then told me I had umpteen cavities. I always thought he was picking on me and told him so. After all, my brother had green stuff growing on his braces from not brushing his teeth and never got any cavities, how was it possible that I got every cavity in the family?

More than 20 years later, I'm still the one being told I have cavities. And this time it's worse than ever. I've finally heard those fateful words — every dentist-avoider dreads —

root canal.

It started with a filling that worked its way loose and ended with a huge gaping hole in my tooth. The jagged edges draw my tongue like a magnet attracts metals. But the time has come, I can no longer deal with the problems this abscessed crater causes. If I just didn't have to listen to the whirring of the drill, I might have been able to have the tooth fixed before it reached this state.

My first thought was to just have the tooth pulled, but I was told because it has three big roots I would have to go to an oral surgeon. And that would cost within \$75 of the root canal.

I've made the appointment twice in the past six months. Both times something happened and I had to break the appointment.

Now, after a weekend spent with an infected tooth, I've decided I can no longer put it

off. The dentist ordered a second round of antibiotics and his nurse scheduled the dreaded date.

Ten days for the antibiotic to work and five more days of waiting. The dentist has promised me there will be nothing of the horror tales I've heard about others' root canals. He explained every detail, everything he's going to do.

I have complete and absolute faith in this dentist's abilities. I've heard nothing but good things about him. And, besides, going to the dentist these days never hurts, right?

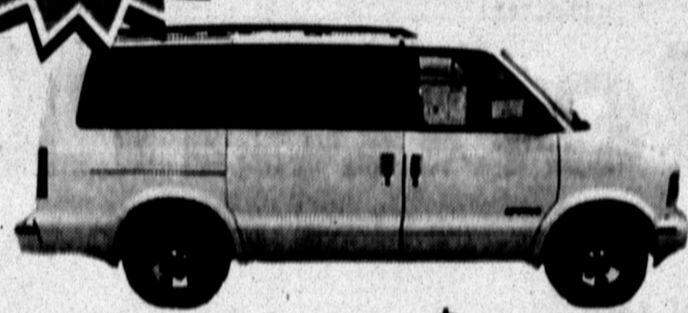

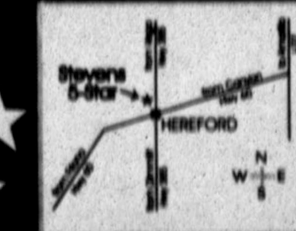

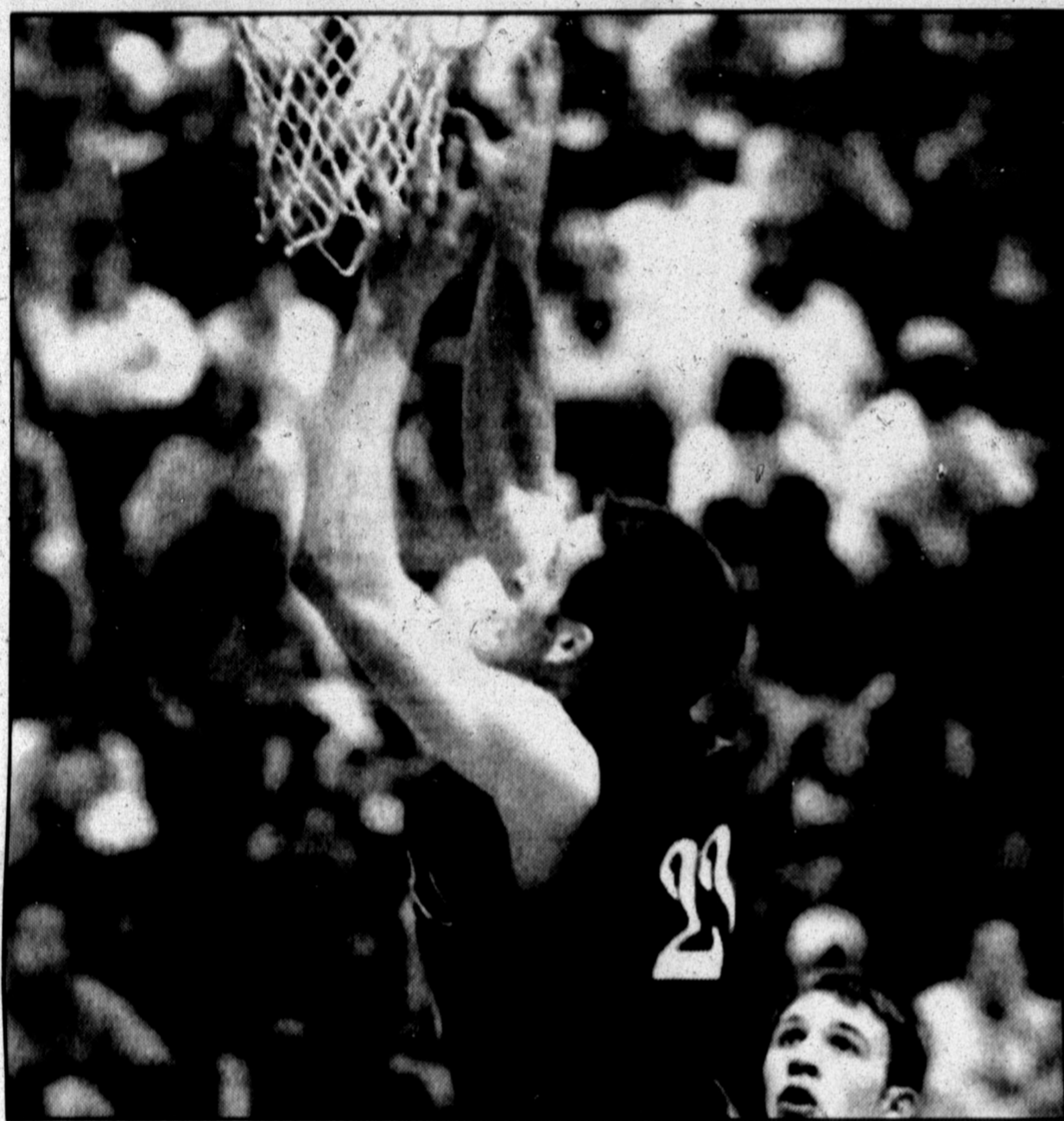

Beaten Down

Unoffensive Herd bows down to Lady Dons, 51-37

AMARILLO — The Lady Dons of Amarillo Palo Duro were on the ropes all night in their contest against the Hereford Lady Whitefaces.

But Hereford didn't provide enough punch to produce a knockout of the fourth-ranked team in the state.

The Lady Whitefaces shot 40 percent from the field, including a paltry 31 percent in the second half as they bowed down again to the Lady Dons, 51-37 on Friday night at Palo Duro High School.

The loss gives the Lady Whitefaces a 22-6 record, 5-2 in District 3-4A.

"They played really physically, but we just couldn't get any of the shots to go," Hereford coach Key Harrison said. "We didn't execute well on the offensive end."

Early on in the game, Hereford shot very decently. Led by Tori Walker, the Lady Whitefaces shot five-of-13 shots in the first period, three of those shots were made by Walker.

But Palo Duro went inside with Casey Jackson and Julianna Morrison, who combined for eight points in the period to give the Lady Dons a 13-10 lead after the first stanza.

"We know Hereford is a good team and we didn't take them lightly and didn't think the game was going to be a blowout, or anything like that," Palo Duro coach A.J. Johnson said. "We had some ups and downs where we

played in spurts, but luckily, our defense was there for the majority of the game."

Defense was the key in the first half for both teams.

Hereford focused on the bluechip post Jackson, triple-teaming, sometimes quadruple-teaming the six-footer.

Palo Duro focused their efforts on Walker.

"It's hard to get any shots off against their defense,"

Eicke could do in the evening.

"We played tough, but I don't think we played very smart," Eicke said. "I don't think we came out prepared to play tonight and obviously the result showed it."

The lack of preparedness Eicke describes took effect in the third period as the Lady Whitefaces only shot 2-of-12 attempts.

Sarah Griffin missed two shots that resulted in air balls.

Valerie Guzman missed a three-pointer.

Eicke missed two three-pointers.

Tiffany Mercer missed two short jumpers.

Walker was forced to shoot two bad shots before scoring the only four points in the period for the Lady Whitefaces.

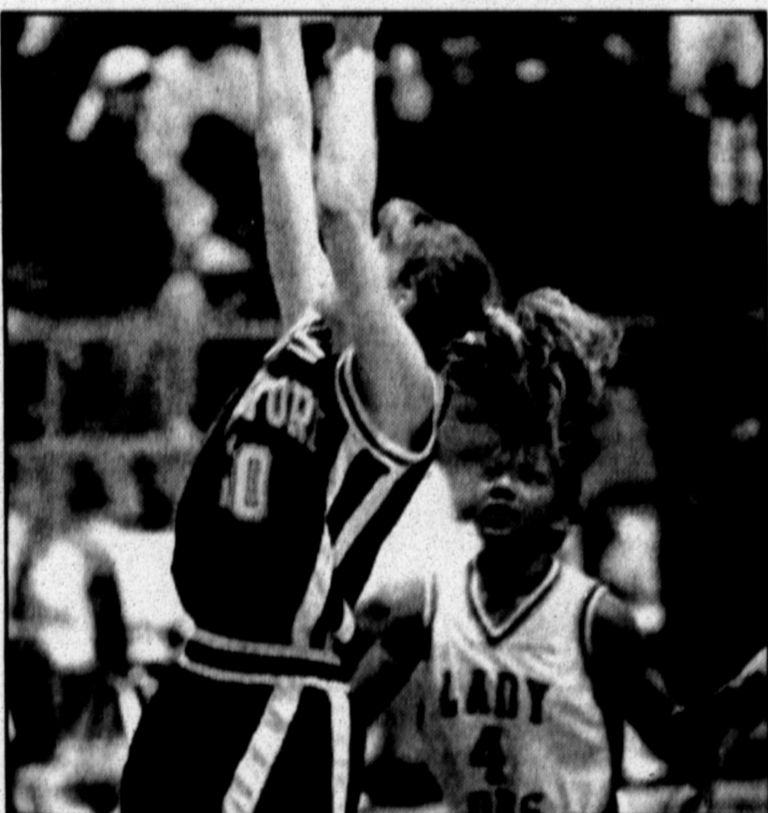
"We scouted them a lot and played them a couple of times last year, so we knew what they wanted to do," Johnson said.

"We knew on defense we had to be aggressive and try to take the ball out of Walker and Griffin's hands."

"We got some deflections and the girls ran up through some passes rather than stopping," Johnson added. "We were fortunate to get some turnovers and then convert them."

A tough night indeed.

"You have to play physical against them," Walker said. "They play physical against you, they try to bump you around, so you have to get

Some season date adjustments, and decoying sandhill cranes

Final days of the 1999/2000 goose and sandhill crane season in this region are being juggled to accommodate an early start on the special late conservation white goose season in the Western Zone.

Hunting for dark geese and sandhill cranes had originally been scheduled to extend through February 13, but things have changed.

The best I can find out from visiting with Steve Lightfoot of the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department in Austin, regular goose season as well as sandhill crane season in our region will now end on Friday, February 4, about nine days earlier than had originally been planned by TP&WD.

The upside of this early ending to the dark goose and sandhill crane season is that effective February 5, in the Western Zone, white goose hunters will be permitted to utilize electronic calls and to hunt with no plug in their shotgun, and with no bag or possession limits, so long as they harvest only snow, blue and Ross's geese. Dark geese and sandhill cranes will be off-limits.

The white goose conservation season is scheduled to continue into April in this region.

All of this is aimed at greatly increasing the harvest of snow geese within the Central Flyway. Because the overall snow goose population has exploded to an estimated six million, to the detriment of Arctic habitat, waterfowl managers are hoping to boost the harvest of snow geese to about one million annually. Because snow geese are so frustratingly wary, the utilization of electronic calls is allowed.

Last year during the first conservation season, harvest reached only 400,000 snow geese. More snow geese must be harvested for the good of the resource. The alternative is long-term damage to the Arctic tundra, and a massive die-off of snow geese when the habitat can no longer support them.

Seasons always seem to get away, in spite of your plans to participate as much as possible.

Regrettably, the heart of the sandhill crane season slid past without my pursuing these gray ghosts. There were plenty around, just no time to hunt them. Last weekend we finally made time and Kurt and Paden Landis helped me to do a little making-up for lost opportunity.

We set up a blind and a spread of homemade decoys in a plowed corn field. Despite the bird-flaring presence of a tractor pulling a ripper in our chosen field, we were able to bring down half-a-limit of cranes, not bad under the circumstances.

Hunting over decoys just doesn't get much more showy than when you are able to lure flocks of broad wing-spanned sandhill cranes to your look-alikes.

The massive, mesmerizing profile of a sandhill crane on approach to the decoys is unlike anything else in wingshooting. Those cupped glider-like wings and the long legs trailing out behind the bodies give these birds a huge appearance, even when they are beyond range.

Sandhills can close ground so quickly, and maneuver effortlessly as they glide toward you. Usually they are vocal upon approach, trilling constantly, but often on the final run-in they fall silent, intensifying the suspense as you watch them loom

larger.

There is a curvature to the wings of cranes and geese as they lock into that glide into the spread. It becomes an emblem of excitement and anticipation. If they hold that wings-locked posture for enough seconds, then you know you have them, but getting them to glide the last 50 yards or so is no given.

When the magic works the sandhills sometimes come sliding toward you, then rock their feet forward as they adjust to a hover-and-land angle. They seem to glide forever, and in that time of approach their keen eyes can pick up any movement on your part and they simply slide past out of range if they don't like what they make out. I have often heard it said that the eyesight of sandhill cranes is far superior to that of geese. I have no reason to doubt it. You simply must be still and hidden well in order to fool them. That instant when their feet are down and their wings flared-back in hover mode puts them at their most vulnerable to the waiting hunters. Come up with your shotgun then, and a limit can be gathered swiftly by a disciplined shooter.

Unfortunately, the hard-working tractor kept the cranes antsy last weekend. We were never able to lure them feet-down close, although several flights did make some heart-racingly spectacular approaches.

We did get a few birds sliding by the front of the blind within range. As they crossed over our blind we came up and concentrated on the closest birds. Focusing our shooting put four sandhills on the ground that we likely wouldn't have gotten otherwise.

It wasn't a bad morning, all things considered, and the show when you are watching and hearing the rolling call of these great prehistoric-looking gliders is always spectacular.

Minority hiring once again issue at Super Bowl

ATLANTA (AP) — There's never been a minority head coach in the Super Bowl. Of course, the odds are stacked against it.

Only two blacks, Minnesota's Dennis Green and Tampa Bay's Tony Dungy, are among the 31 NFL head coaches, so commissioner Paul Tagliabue found himself addressing a familiar issue Friday as another title game approached.

In particular, Tagliabue was grilled on the recent trend of coaches-turned-kingmakers designating a successor before even leaving their post.

Bill Parcells did that in New York, though Bill Belichick quit the Jets after only one day. Dave Wannstedt was elevated to the top job in Miami as Jimmy Johnson retired.

Even the St. Louis Rams, who meet the Tennessee Titans in Sunday's Super Bowl, know who their coach will be after Dick Vermeil retires. Offensive coordinator Mike Martz is next in line, though he probably won't get the job until 2002.

Belichick, who now coaches the New England Patriots, is white. So are Wannstedt and Martz. Ditto for Dave Campo (Dallas), Al Groh (Jets) and Mike Sherman (Green Bay), hired since the end of the regular season.

But Tagliabue, speaking at his annual Super Bowl news conference, defended the league's minority hiring record.

"The reality is that one-

third of our coaches are African-Americans," the commissioner said, including assistants in his figures.

"The growing number of coordinators are African-Americans. And to the extent that coaches are trying to designate an heir apparent, I think you are going to see African-Americans in that pipeline."

Tagliabue

pointed out that the Jets have just elevated Maurice Carthon to assistant head coach and Ted Cottrell, Buffalo's defensive coordinator, is well respected around the league.

The commissioner doesn't believe minority candidates are denied a fair opportunity when a successor is named in advance.

"It might be a positive thing if people are doing that kind of long-range planning," he said. "They might start looking at younger coaches. ... I don't see that as a negative in terms of minority hiring, frankly."

On another issue, Tagliabue acknowledged the NFL is concerned about off-field crimes committed by its players, but he also suggested those crimes are part of a deeper problem.

"I think our track record is better than society at large," Tagliabue said.

The league's well-polished image has been sullied this

season by a number of off-field arrests. The most serious involved former Carolina receiver Ra

Carruth, released by the Panthers after he was charged with first-degree murder in the shooting death of his pregnant girlfriend.

"Can we separate ourselves from society? Of course not," Tagliabue said. "We can't predict what NFL players will do any more than we can predict students shooting other students of workers shooting fellow workers."

At this Super Bowl, the hottest topic has been the

cold weather. Both teams practiced in wintry conditions until Friday, when they moved to the Georgia Dome because of an approaching storm that brought snow and ice to much of the Deep South.

You certainly won't hear the Titans or Rams complaining about the lack of headline material. They're here to play for a championship, not stir controversy.

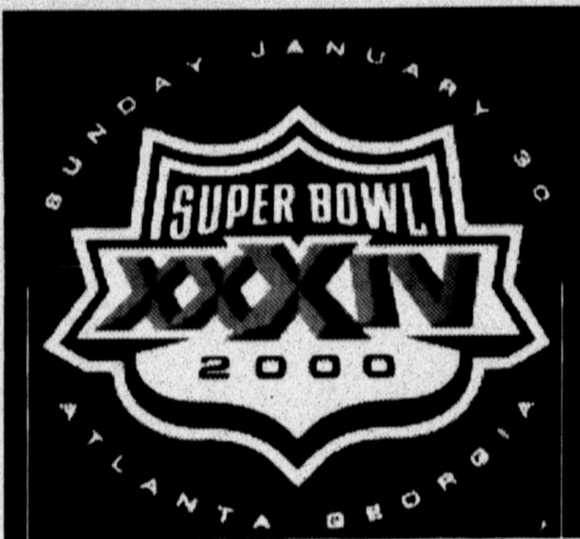
Tennessee coach Jeff Fisher said his wild-card Titans (16-3) had an excellent workout Friday, though receiver Derrick Mason and safety Blaine Bishop came to blows in the final session.

Bishop was covering Mason on a pass in a two-minute drill when the ball fell incomplete. Mason accused the safety of hitting him in the helmet.

Afterwards, Fisher spoke privately with Bishop and Mason for several minutes. The players hugged before leaving the field.

"It's over with," the coach said. "They compete. They are highly competitive. That happens over the course of the season. Did you see them walk off the field together? Those two are about as competitive guys as I've got."

The Rams (15-3) didn't let Jeff Wilkins test his sore left knee at practice, but he will be their kicker on Sunday. Nick Lowery, who

Davenport ends Hingis' reign at Australian Open

■ Davenport to compete for final today

MELBOURNE, Australia (AP) — It was almost an amazing blowout. Then, it was almost a sensational reversal.

Lindsay Davenport never doubted as she blitzed through the last two games and ended Martina Hingis' three-title run in the Australian Open.

Davenport needed just 65 minutes today to win her third Grand Slam championship with a 6-1, 7-5 victory that stopped Hingis' winning streak in Australia at 27 matches.

But it was only easy for the first 45 minutes. Not only was Davenport whipping winners into the corners but, in a role reversal with Hingis, she was the one retrieving her opponent's best shots and turning from defense to offense.

Then, serving for the title at 6-1, 5-1, 30-15, Davenport felt the tension and Hingis stopped missing. After 13 errors by Davenport, the set was tied 5-5 and Hingis was looking confident on the court that she always refers to as her own.

Davenport said she wasn't worried.

"I was fine," she said. "I knew I could break her. She wasn't serving that well throughout the day. Even though I was missing shots and getting tight and to a certain point letting her back into the match, I knew I could win that second set."

Davenport held serve at 15, winning three straight points on backhands down the line and one by charging in for a forehand volley.

This time Hingis didn't recover. She started her last service game with a double-fault, set up match point with two more misses, and then hit a backhand long on a deep serve return by Davenport.

Davenport skipped toward the net with her hands in the air. Hingis' mother and coach, Melanie Molitor, sat slumped forward as most of the audience rose for a standing ovation.

"I just hate to play you," Hingis told Davenport as the two waited for the trophy presentation.

"That's pretty rare to hear her say that," said Davenport, who has beaten Hingis

four straight times and in six of their last seven meetings. "She's so confident and so good, that's the best compliment you could ever get."

Despite the result, Hingis still is No. 1 and Davenport No. 2 in the WTA rankings.

Davenport said Hingis has been more consistent in reaching tournament finals.

"I couldn't care less that I'm not No. 1 right now. I'm just going to go on as the Australian Open champion and that's, to me, far more important," said the 23-year-old American, who also has won the 1996 Olympic gold medal, the 1998 U.S. Open and 1999 Wimbledon.

Hingis said that at 5-5 she still felt she had a chance.

"Anything can happen in a Grand Slam final," she said. "So many times, disappointing things or just surprises happen, so I just tried not to give up."

Davenport started her next service game by netting a forehand, but that was the last point she lost.

"I came in with a backhand up-the-line winner and that to me changed those last two games," she said. "That gave me a ton of confidence, and I started being more aggressive with all my shots. It kind of reminded me what I needed to do."

Davenport suffered a left hamstring injury in her semifinal victory over Jennifer Capriati, and later dropped out of a doubles semifinal. She took a day off, and "I never felt it today," she said.

Hingis said Davenport pressured her often.

"I just felt I had to play very close to the lines, take a high risk, and I just missed," Hingis said. "She was just running and she made it hard for me to just make a winner."

At 5-1 in the second set, Hingis said she kept looking at the clock.

"I thought, 'Oh, my God, people had to pay for seeing this match.' It was like the No. 1 and 2 players in the world, it should be a closer match."

Hingis lost another streak Friday when she and new partner Mary Pierce fell to Lisa Raymond and Rennae

Stubbs in the women's doubles final. Before that, she had shared in three Australian doubles titles — with three different partners — and been in the winning pair 23 straight matches.

Hingis said she needs to find a way to beat Davenport.

"I keep working on it," she said. "One day, it's going to be my day. I have to beat her again."

Hingis, 19, has won five Grand Slam titles but, like Davenport, has never won the French Open.

Asked about winning the French, Davenport laughed and said, "Let me enjoy this one first."

"I never thought I'd be in the position to try to win all four majors. That's a great position to be in, and it's going to be a challenge."

No. 1 Andre Agassi plays defending champion Yevgeny Kafelnikov, seeded second, for the men's championship Sunday. Agassi is playing in his fourth consecutive Grand Slam final.

UConn beats Providence, 64-50

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — Albert Mouring scored eight of his 20 points in a 23-9 first-half run to lead No. 6 Connecticut to a 64-50 victory over Providence on Thursday night, the Huskies' first Big East home win of the season.

UConn played most of the second half without Khalid El-Amin and Kevin Freeman.

El-Amin bruised his right thigh in a collision with Providence center Karim Shabazz with 18:16 left in the game and did not return. A few minutes later, Freeman took an elbow to the back and sat out with spasms.

The Friars have lost five straight and brought a young starting squad — four juniors and a freshman — into the Hartford Civic Center.

UConn trailed early as Shabazz fueled a 7-2 run with four points.

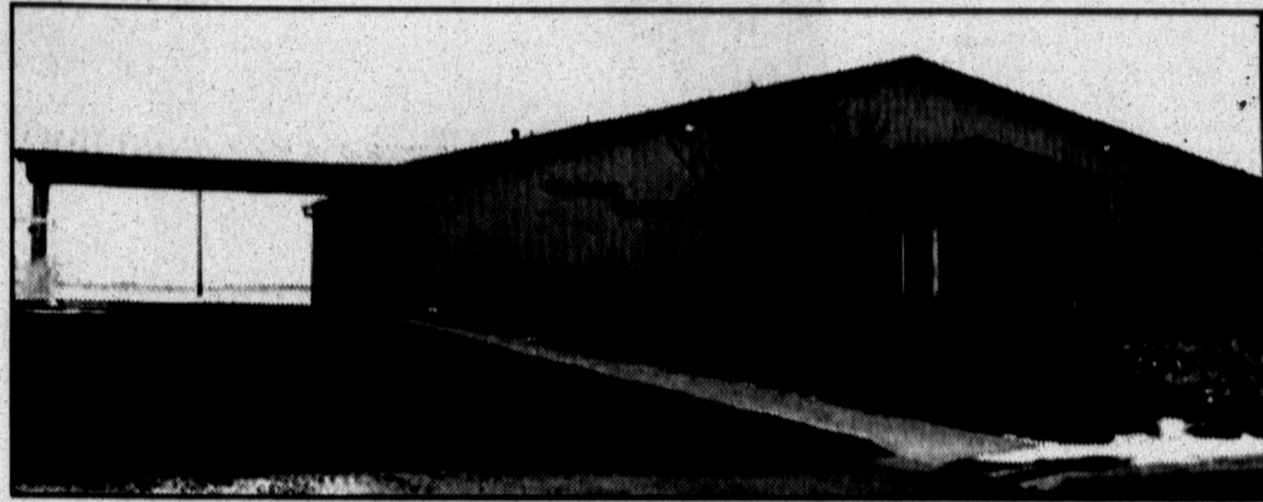

FOB: A work in progress

A history

Fellowship of Believers is a work in progress.

This is the belief of Nathan Stone, Ph.D., current pastor of Fellowship of Believers and the second of only two pastors the church has had. The first was Dr. Doug Manning, who served for seven years.

The church was begun by a group of 15 individuals who were looking for a church home and held its first meeting in September 1989 in a bank meeting room.

According to histories of the church, this group began moving toward the establishment of a new kind of church with a structure that would avoid the normal church hierarchy.

Fellowship of Believers as it continues to evolve today is a result of this movement.

It is structured as a simple fellowship where the worship leader is one member of that fellowship and decisions are made by the consensus of the congregation.

The church has an administrator with total control and a secretary to help. These leaders are chosen on a yearly basis.

Receiving its charter on Feb. 8, 1990, the church began meeting in the Senior Citizens Center.

Land was acquired on Kingwood St. and groundbreaking ceremonies were held on May 5, 1991. On Nov. 14, 1991, the first service of worship was held in a church building that was in part constructed by members donating their time, labor and

expertise.

"It was my privilege to serve as worship leader for seven years. I cannot begin to relate what those years meant to me. Nor can I relate how much the

experience still impacts my life. To say that I miss the Fellowship of Believers would be a gross understatement," Manning said.

When Manning and his wife, Barbara, moved his business to Oklahoma City in 1996, a worship leader search was organized. As a result of this search, and through contacts with Dr. Charles Johnson with Second Baptist Church of Lubbock, Dr. Nathan Stone was invited to become the worship leader. He began this responsibility on June 1, 1997.

"My sense is that FOB was founded on the notion that too much duplicity, pretentiousness, and a kind of artificial religiosity mark much of the modern church. FOB was born with a longing to avoid those characteristics. And that is what I was looking for when I came to FOB," Stone said.

Another part of what FOB is about is to meet, or try to meet, the needs in the community. Overseeing this is the prime duty of the administrator.

"We administer to the community's needs through our members but there is another part of that which is very important and that is to meet a need with 'no strings attached,'" Carolyn Baxter, former administrator, said.

Perhaps the best representation of Fellowship of Believers is a wall hanging of The Velveteen Rabbit in the worship center with the words, "If you're REAL, you can't be ugly."

"Just like that rabbit, FOB longs to be REAL," Stone said. "Real means that FOB will never arrive, but will always be a work in progress."

A celebration

Conceived 10 years ago by a group of individuals looking for a church home, Fellowship of Believers will celebrate its anniversary on Feb. 5-6.

An anniversary banquet will be held at 6:30 p.m. on Feb. 5 in the Hereford Community Center Banquet Room. Entertainment will be provided by guitarist/soloist D.E. Adams of Louisville with the keynote address by Dr. Charles Johnson, pastor of Second Baptist Church of Lubbock.

The celebration of 10 years of love and surprises will continue with worship at 10:30 a.m. Sunday when Dr. Doug Manning will be guest proclaimer.

Adams' image harkens back to the 1960s, but his message is

eternal. His songs are gentle and folksy, accompanied by an acoustic guitar. Even though he has made a career of music, he has no formal music training.

Dr. Johnson has been the senior pastor at Second Baptist since 1989, having previously served congregations in Mississippi and Kentucky. He received his undergraduate degree in

Dear Ann Landers: I am sick and tired of the way you always take the woman's side and make the man out to be the villain. You recently printed a letter from "Finally Happy Dad," whose wife had been beating the daylights out of him. Your response was especially interesting. You commended him for writing, and referred him to the Domestic Violence Hotline, but said nothing about the fact that he spent years in the courts, plus \$55,000, to get custody of his child. That sort of thing is a disgrace, and it happens all the time.

When a woman is abused, she can pack up her things, take her child with her, go to a shelter and have very little trouble getting custody. If a man wants to leave a woman, he better not take anything from the house, or he could be accused of stealing. Furthermore, there are no shelters for abused men, only fleabag hotel rooms in the worst part of town.

The good news is that the police are starting to do a better job in domestic-violence cases. Now, we are hearing more about husbands and boyfriends who get beat up, but rarely does the woman have to pay a fine or go to jail. It would help if you addressed this problem in some future columns.

The court system in this country has always been prejudiced against males in cases involving divorce and child support. Also, most men do not have \$55,000 for legal fees. And one more thing, Miss Landers. The children are NOT always better off with the mother, and I wish you had said so. — A Reader in Bay Port, Mich.

Dear Mich: I plead not guilty to "always taking the woman's side." Where were you when I printed those letters from men whose ex-wives spent the child-support payments on themselves and used the children as leverage to get luxury items? Did you miss the letters from women saying the children were better off with their ex-husbands? I have printed several.

If you are a regular reader of my column, you will know that I print both sides of the story. I do believe, however, that divorced women are more likely than men to get a raw deal because, usually, the ex-husbands have the greater earning power and can hire

the best attorneys. In the majority of instances, it is the man who chooses to leave the relationship, and he often takes his money with him.

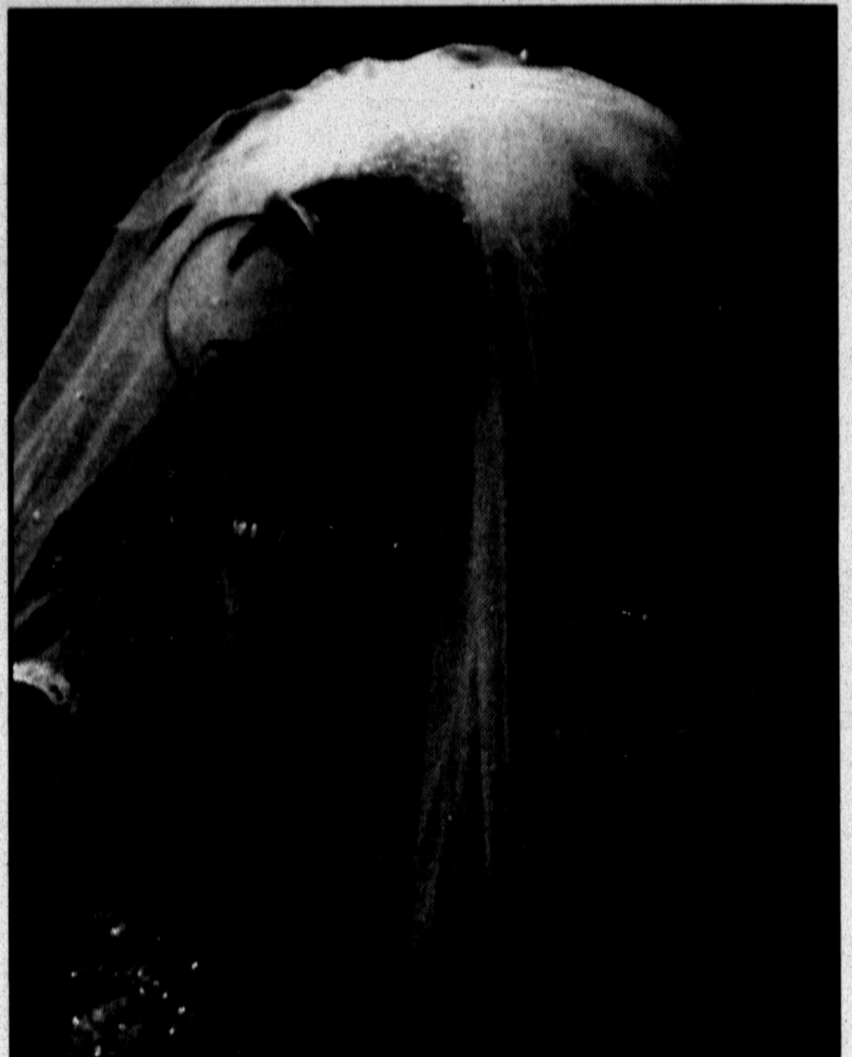
A reception was held in the Alumni Lounge immediately following the ceremony.

Future of marriage in 21st century

NEW YORK (AP) — The future of marriage looks like this: later wedding vows, later parenthood, and efforts to ensure the longevity of the union, according to Bridal Guide magazine.

The bi-monthly publication reports on marriage trends in a coming issue, with these key findings:

— In 1998, the median age for a first marriage was 25 for women and 27 for men. Ages will continue to rise as more people postpone marrying to establish their careers, the magazine says. This bodes well for marital success because couples will be more mature

and better established financially.

— "Marriage education" classes before the ceremony — an effort to ensure solid, lasting unions — will become commonplace.

— Interracial and interfaith marriages will continue to increase. Census figures between 1960 and 1990 show a tenfold rise.

— The birthrate for women between 30 and 34 grew more than any other age group between 1980 and 1990. Experts predict more one-child families, the magazine says.

— Alternatives to traditional divorce that doesn't work out continue to

be explored. Many states have enacted or are considering initiatives such as covenant marriage or a partial rollback of no-fault divorce statutes to give partners stronger legal protection.

YOUR EYES

How Contact Lenses Work



Contact lenses are thin, delicate optical disks, smaller than a dime, made from hard or soft plastic. As the name implies, contact lenses are worn in contact with the eye. They are designed to rest on the cornea, the clear out surface of the eye.

Contacts are held in place primarily by adhering to the tear film that covers the front of the eye, as well as by pressure from the eyelids.

As you blink your eyes, the eyelid glides over the surface of the contact lens and makes it move slightly. This movement allows tears to lubricate the cornea and to clean away particles between the cornea and the contact lens. If you need corrective lenses, check with your vision care specialist to see if you are a good candidate for contacts.

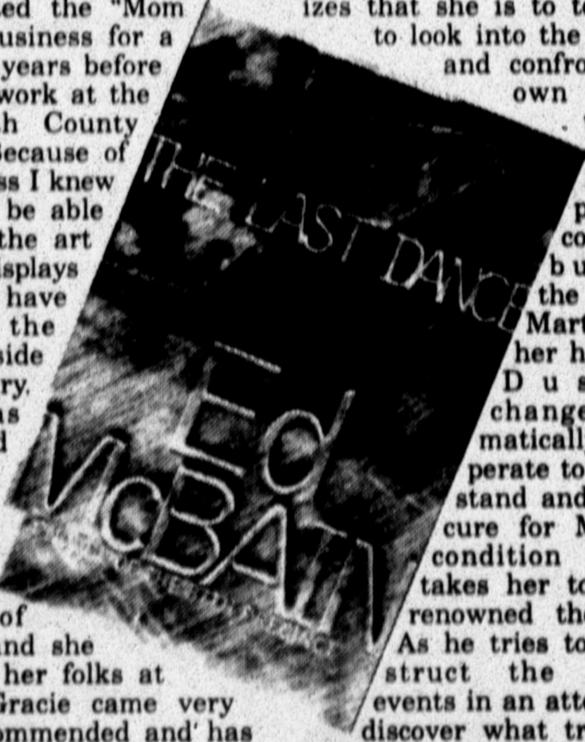
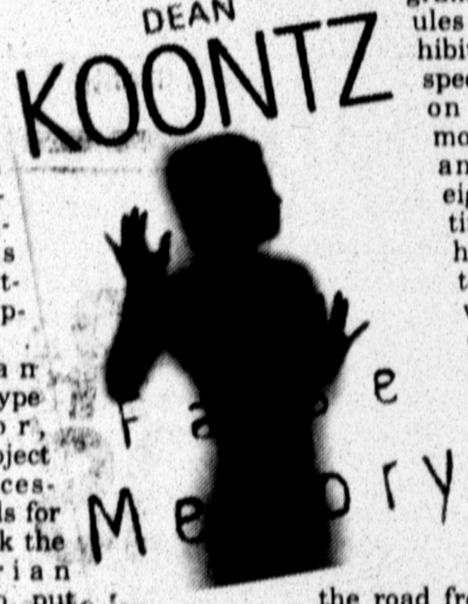
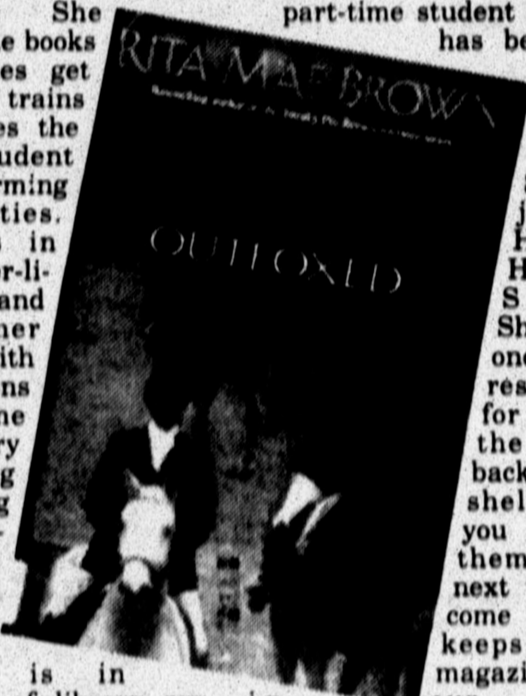
Outfoxed by Rita Mae Brown takes place at the prestigious Virginian Jefferson Hunt Club owned by 70 year-

Oilmen purchase ground water rights

Pair intend on selling to parched cities

HOUSTON (AP) — Two veteran oil men are laying the groundwork to produce new riches from another kind of liquid — water.

T. Boone Pickens and Scott Carlson are separately accumulating groundwater rights around Texas with the notion of selling the water to parched cities.

Pickens has quietly acquired the water rights to tens of thousands of acres in the Panhandle, including his own 24,000-acre ranch, the *Texas Journal of The Wall Street Journal* reported.

An attorney representing Pickens has attended meetings of the South Central Texas Regional Water Planning Group, which is in charge of water planning for the San Antonio area, and planning group member Steve Raabe said the lawyer has told the group that Pickens wants to market his water rights.

Pickens did not return calls seeking comment.

Carlson leads Houston-based Metropolitan Water Co., which hopes to develop a 75,000-acre well field in Burleson County and pump the water to fast-growing cities and water districts in Williamson County.

The moves by Pickens and

Carlson have some officials in the state worried.

Officials from seven counties near the proposed Burleson well field met this week to discuss dust off old discussions about forming a groundwater-conservation district, which could limit how much water is pumped from the area. "I think Mr. Carlson has heightened the need for us to come forward with this," said Tom Wilkinson Jr., executive director of the Brazos Valley Council of Governments.

Carlson declined to comment.

Others also question the role of private enterprise in managing the state's water supply.

"We can't go in like an oil company, pump the heck out of the field and then leave town," said Susan Butler, director of water resources for the San Antonio Water System. "We have to develop a sustainable resource."

But as Texas enters its third drought in the past four years, the demand for water is unmistakable. Austin paid the Lower Colorado River Authority \$100 million earlier this year for enough water to last the next 50 years. San Antonio hopes to double its supply by using water that is the byproduct of lignite-mining operations, and the city is looking for more.

As the Texas Supreme Court affirmed last year, landowners can do as they choose with groundwater under their land.

Other speculators have tried to corner the market on water. In 1997, brothers Ed and Lee Bass of Fort Worth caused an uproar when they bought 45,000 acres in Southern California with the intent of selling the water to thirsty cities. They later sold their interests to U.S. Filter Corp. for \$250 million, believed to be more than twice what they paid for the land.

Earlier this week, the San Antonio Water System said it is trying to buy 11 farms totaling 5,200 acres in Uvalde, Medina and Bexar counties so it can acquire additional rights to pump from the Edwards Aquifer.

The farms, with projected pumping rights of 8,935 acre-feet, were bought in 1996 by Lee Bass and a group of Austin lawyers, the San Antonio Express-News reported. Bass traded those properties to U.S. Filter in 1997, the paper said.

U.S. Filter spokesman Mike Albach said the company wants to sell the properties because they don't offer a quick and

hefty return on the investment. The price in tentative documents released by the San Antonio Water System is set at \$500 per acre of land and \$700 per acre-foot of water rights, a total of \$8.7 million.

One of the first major leasing-rights deals in Texas closed earlier this year when Amarillo paid more than \$20 million to a group of local ranchers headed by Salem Abraham, grandson of a wealthy oil man.

Abraham banded together with other landowners because he didn't think he could find a buyer just for the water from his family's 12,000-acre Roberts County ranch. The group sold rights to 72,000 acres.

Amarillo, which will pay \$80 million to \$100 million building a pipeline, won't need the extra water for at least 25 years, but City Manager John Ward said the city jumped at the chance to buy Abraham's water.

"Quite frankly, we were afraid that if we didn't buy it, somebody else might," Ward said.

Drought planning workshops scheduled

While drought contingency plans from Texas' large water suppliers slowly trickle in, the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission and the Texas Water Development Board are offering a series of four-hour workshops to assist medium and smaller water suppliers in the preparation of their plans.

Senate Bill 1 required drought contingency plans for large water suppliers to be submitted to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission by Sept. 1, 1999. However, slow response has prompted the agencies to organize workshops for the smaller systems, serving fewer than 3,300 connections, are required to prepare a drought contingency plan by

Sept. 1, 2000. Although they are not required to submit their plan to the TNRCC, these suppliers must make the plan available for public inspection upon request.

The dates and locations for the workshops are Conros, Feb. 3; Denton, Feb. 10; Alice, Feb. 17; San Marcos, Feb. 24; Longview, March 7; Victoria, March 9; Dallas, March 16; Waco, March 21; Lufkin, March 28; San Antonio, March 30; Amarillo, April 4; Dallas (Texas Water Conference), April 7; Odessa, April 18; and Austin, May 3.

Engineered plants show little cross pollination

Study eases fears of tainting conventional crops

ORONO, Maine (AP) — Researchers hope a study showing very little cross-pollination between genetically engineered and natural corn plants will ease fears that altered crops could taint conventionally grown crops.

A study done at the University of Maine's Cooperative Extension farm showed a small amount of cross-pollination with nearby conventional plants and no cross-pollination with conventional plants that are farther away from the altered ones, said James Jemison, an agronomist.

"This will give farmers information they can definitely use," Jemison said.

The study was launched after a group calling itself "Seeds of Resistance" destroyed about

1,000 stalks of genetically engineered corn being used for a herbicide study last August.

Genetically engineered crops are a source of controversy because many individuals, organizations and countries question the long-term environmental and health effects.

"Those who oppose growing GE crops made it look like there was going to be a cloud of genetically engineered pollen flying all over the state," Jemison said.

Seeds from conventional corn grown near the altered corn were grown in a greenhouse to determine if any cross-pollination occurred before harvest, Jemison said.

"The conventional corn was grown only 100 feet away from the GE corn, plus it was downwind," he said. "We figured this was a perfect example of the worst-case scenario."

Jemison said most corn breeders use a set distance of about 1,000 feet from other corn plants to ensure genetic

integrity.

"Organic farmers are concerned about having their product not meet organic standards and potentially losing their organic certification if pollen from GE corn cross-pollinates their non-GE corn," he said.

The study showed there was a cross-pollination rate of about 1 percent in the first six rows

when hybrid corn was grown about 100 feet downwind from genetically engineered corn, Jemison said. In the middle six rows, the rate of cross-pollination dropped to 0.1 percent. It dropped to 0.03 percent in the last six rows.

No cross-pollination was found in corn planted 1,000 feet away, Jemison said.

FEDERAL LEGISLATION WOULD SEVERELY LIMIT STATES' RIGHTS TO PROTECT HOMESTEADS

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Texas homeowners could lose a hard-fought right to protect their homesteads from foreclosure if some members of Congress get their way.

On Nov. 10, the U.S. Senate voted 76-22 on a measure that would supercede state laws and cap the amount of equity homeowners can protect from debtors to \$100,000.

The Senate vote came barely a week after Texas voters overwhelmingly approved an amendment to the Texas Constitution expanding the definition of an urban homestead from a limit of one acre to a maximum of 10 acres.

Texas Sens. Kay Bailey Hutchison and Phil Gramm are among those in Congress who oppose the homestead cap, a central part of major bankruptcy overhaul legislation. Hutchison supports an alternative proposal in the House that includes an "opt-out" provision, allowing states to set their own homestead exemptions.

"I just think it's a matter that should be left up to the states," Hutchison said.

The 50,000-member Texas Association of Realtors also opposes the homestead cap.

"For Texans, protection of the family home is a sacred thing," said

Louise Hull, chairman of the board, Texas Association of Realtors. She added that the founders of Texas and its citizens have always placed a high value on homeownership.

"We're against this attempt in Congress to impose an arbitrary, nationwide limit on homestead exemptions because it would put too many Texans in danger of losing their homes in the event of an economic downturn," Hull said.

Other critics say the federal legislation does not take into account varying land values among states, and would put farms and ranches at serious risk.

Proponents of the legislation, spearheaded by Northeastern credit card companies and nationwide lenders, contend that the unlimited homestead exemption in Texas and Florida provides an unfair loophole for the wealthy to shield their assets and evade creditors.

Movement on the bankruptcy legislation came to a standstill when Congress adjourned for the holidays, but the homestead cap issue is likely to heat up again after the 106th Congress reconvenes in January.

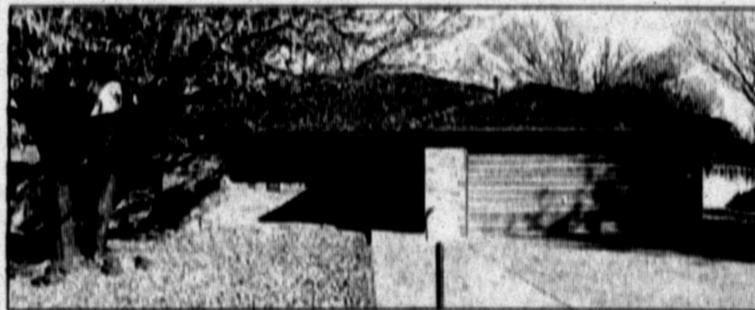

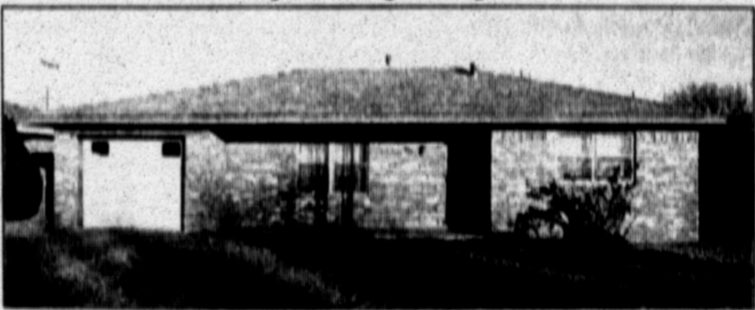

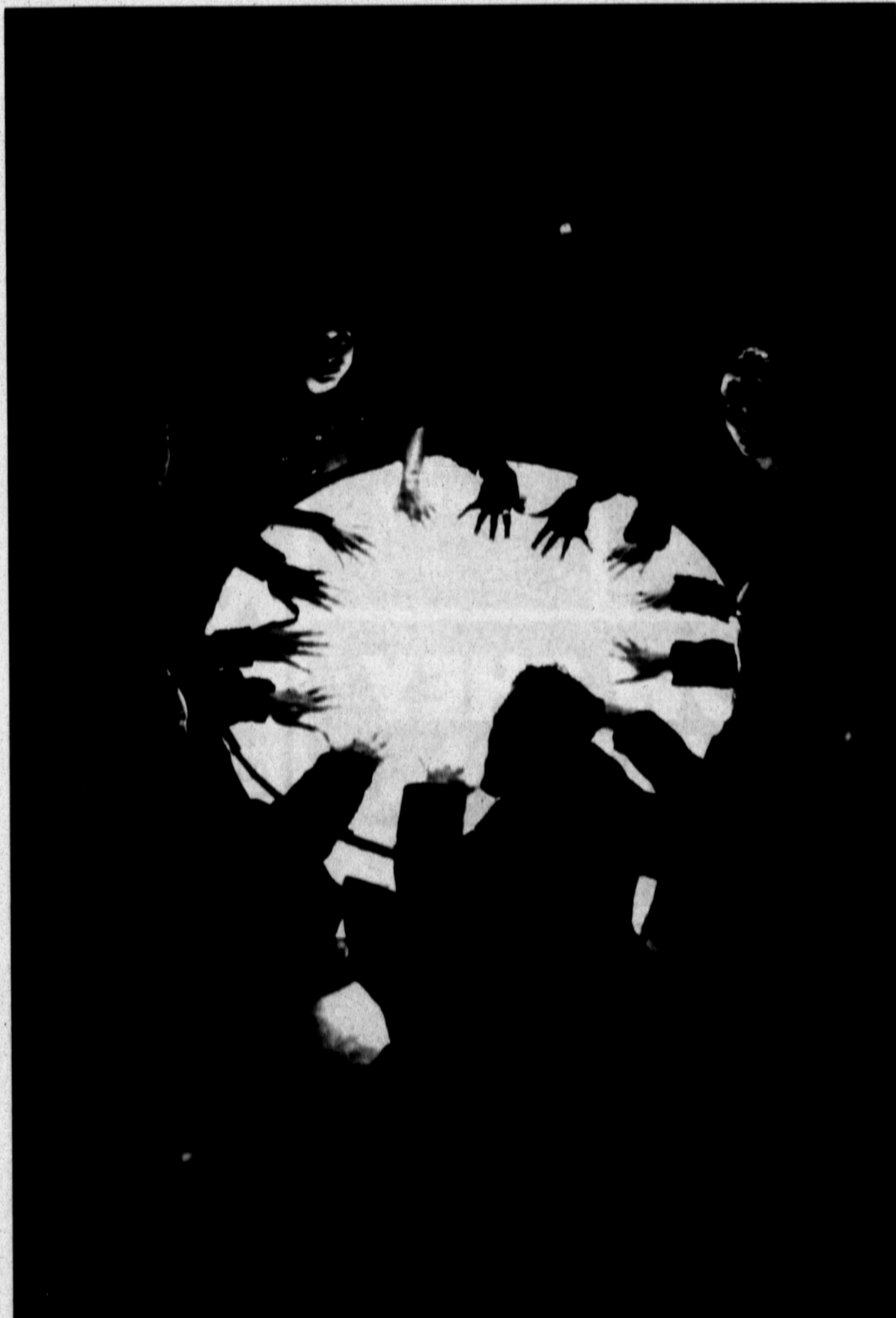

NBC enters the paranormal realm with *The Others*

What frightens you? Things that go bump in the night? That eerie feeling that you're being watched? Quick glimpses of things out of the corner of your eye that aren't really there?

For centuries, debates have raged over what happens to the human spirit once the physical body dies. For those who don't believe in ghosts and the "other side," NBC's new series *The Others*, premiering Saturday, Feb. 5, might seem a bit out there. But don't worry. That's the whole point.

The Others are a group of individuals struggling to understand and hone their collective paranormal abilities. They experience the feelings, thoughts and emotions of people they've never met and, in selfless efforts, guide them into the world of paranormal phenomena.

An empathic medical intern (Gabriel Macht), a mentally unstable man (Kevin J. O'Connor), a visually impaired malcontent (John Aylward), a New Age "sensitive" (Melissa Crider) and a spiritual leader-mentor (Bill Cobbs) join a professor of parapsychology (John Billingsley) to recruit a frightened college student (Julianne Nicholson) who needs to come to grips with her disturbing abilities.

"We've all been to a psychic bookstore or two," Crider says of her own interest in the show's subject matter.

"I play a 'sensitive,' a professional psychic named Satori whose name means an enlightened state sought in Buddhism. Her closest friends are the Others. They're her family."

Cobbs plays Elmer, the elder leader of the group. He believes the show's credibility lies in the numerous accounts of similar situations and the mind-sets of societies past and present.

"While we're dealing with fictional stories," Cobbs says, "we are dealing with various beliefs of people throughout the ages."

Some might see *The Others* as a bit too dark for a network long known for its hit sitcoms and dramas, but it

does fit the mold of those other shows in two key areas: solid cast development and subtle script touches that carry story lines and further enhance the actors' performances.

"The characters are so rich," Crider says. "They're like people I've known my whole life. And some of them are people I've wanted to know my whole life."

The Others successfully combines the elements of the supernatural and sentiment without breaking the rules of believability or promising a fairytale ending at the close of each episode.

"We go from one extreme to another in terms of things that might frighten you or things that might interest or fascinate you," Cobbs says.

"Even though we're dealing in a surrealistic area, we have that realistic basis, something that's believable."

Sometimes those creaking floors or odd sounds and feelings are just products of our own paranoia and one too many late-night horror movies. But maybe there is something more there.

Maybe the things that frighten us the most are mysteries we don't fully understand or are too intimidated to learn about.

"It never hurts the mystery to know something about it," Crider concludes. "That's how I feel about this show. If I have respect for the unknown, that's all I need."

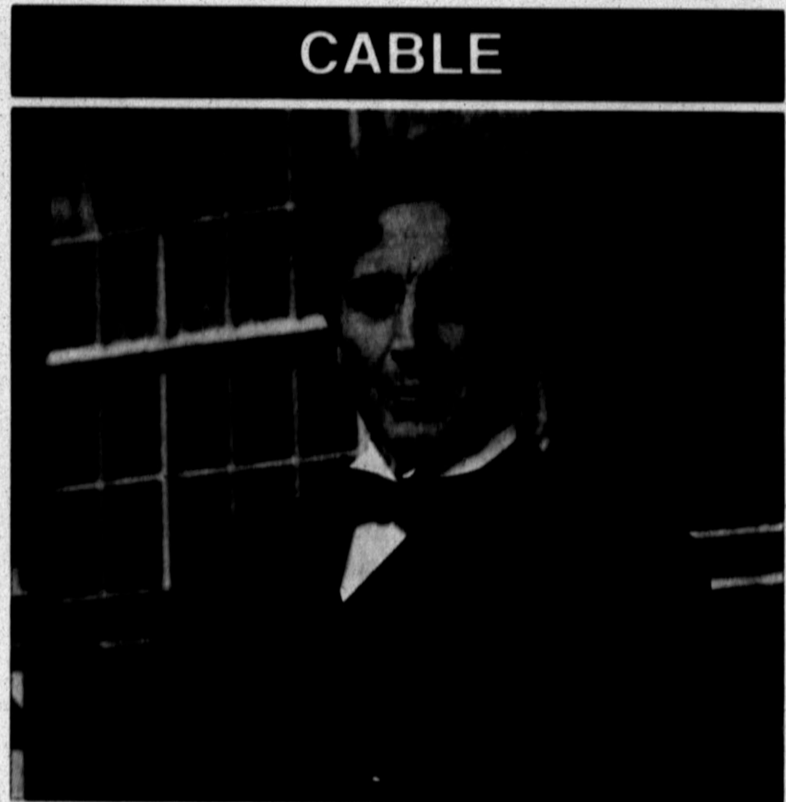

War seen through the eyes of children in HBO special

When *Children in War* ends, expect to be dumbstruck with grief. The gut-wrenching film by Academy Award winners Alan and Susan Raymond takes a hard look at children in Bosnia, Rwanda, Israel and Northern Ireland whose lives have been shattered by war.

Airing Monday, Jan. 31, on HBO, the documentary presents brutal facts objectively. And the most brutal is the basis for the film. In today's wars, 90 percent of the casualties are civilians, compared to 50 percent in World War II. During the past decade, 2 million children were killed in wars around the world.

Despite the topic, the film isn't gory, although it does open with footage of a 7-year-old boy killed by a sniper's gun in the former Yugoslavia. Children there were often murdered as they fetched water.

One little boy says cheerfully, "If you consider what could have happened, I'm lucky to be alive." He then shows what remains of his left arm, blown off above the elbow.

Regardless of the locations the Raymonds visited during the four years they

spent making the film, some grim aspects were identical. Children were unprotected. Many witnessed their parents' murders. They talk about war as if they were in parliament.

Of the Palestinian-Israeli conflict, one Palestinian boy says, "My generation's role was merely to throw stones."

The genocide in Rwanda was so horrific that just being reminded of it is painful. One 5-year-old girl with deep machete scars on her skull and face says, "They saw us and they killed us." Off camera, Susan Raymond asks why. "They did it for nothing," the child responds.

In Northern Ireland, a preteen says, "In my whole life, I've never known peace."

The filmmakers don't pretend to proffer solutions to age-old religious and tribal feuds. "The principal reason for making a film like this was to confront audiences with a kind of reality they don't often think about on a day-to-day basis," Alan Raymond says. "We feel it is important for audiences to see today that wars and terrorists' conflicts are deliberately targeting children and creating no zones of safety for children."
