11 HHS students advance

■ Hereford captures nine of 15 slots at district UIL academic competition

Eleven Hereford High School students captured nine of the 15 regional-qualifying slots at the district UIL Academic meet on the campus of West Texas A&M University and will be advancing to Regional UIL Academic competition April 14-16 in San Angelo.

Hereford students scored a one-two-three sweep of informative speaking competition. Darren Sliney placed first in the event; Josh Briones, second; and Tan Nguyen, third. All three qualified for regional.

Sliney and Nguyen will also advance to regional in Lincoln-Douglas debate after walking off with the top two placings at district with Sliney winning first and Nguyen second.

The computer science team qualified for regional by finishing first at district. Members of the team advancing to regional include Brigham Brown, who won first place in individual standings at district; Cassie Daniel, who was fifth-place individual; Jay Crawford and Morgan McNeely.

Jay Crawford led a strong performance by Hereford students in persuasive speaking, winning first place at district. LyNita Dotson was second, and Clay McNeely was fourth. Crawford and Dotson will advance to regionals in the event.

Seth TeBeest garnered third-place in district ready writing competition and advances to regional. Jessica Stubbs finished fifth in the district event.

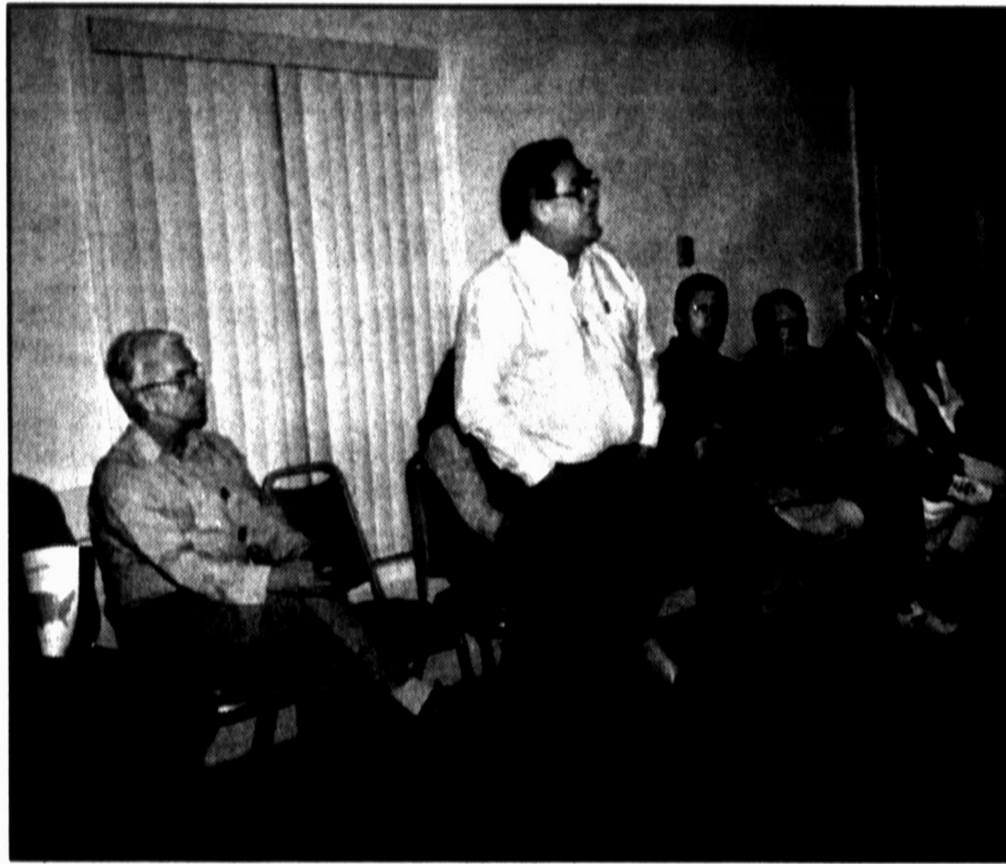
Chris Diller placed third in district in the biology test portion of science competition.

Amariah Rodriguez qualified for regionals in poetry with a third-place finish at district and Angela Morris placed fourth in the event.

Seniors like center for youth offenders, oppose its location

Not in our backyard!

That was the prevailing sentiment of more than 120 area residents attending Thursday's public forum regarding the location and organization of a proposed juvenile youth detention center at the now-closed Golden Plains Care Center.

The former nursing home is in the 400 block of Ranger, close to the Hereford Senior Citizens Center.

Several city and county officials, judges, the chief of police and members of different economic entities were on hand to hear the residents' comments, ranging from safety concerns for the senior citizens living in the immediate area to the devaluation of property.

Lou Serrano, Deaf Smith County chief juvenile probation officer, explained why the facility is needed

and why the now empty Golden Plains facility has been considered.

"We're not sold on anything, yet. We just need to get comments and find out where we need to go from here," Serrano said. "We must keep our community safe, but the cost is high, whether we use this existing facility or find other alternatives."

"In a meeting, two or three months ago, between the juvenile board, school district officials, law enforcement and others, we discussed the cost of contracting with Randall and Lubbock counties for the youth we have to send out of county," Serrano said. "We've budgeted \$50,000 and in the first quarter of the year, we have already spent some \$47,000 to have our youth placed in a facility where we have no control."

Serrano said sending juvenile of-

Martin selected for board

A veteran educator was chosen Thursday night to fill a vacancy on the Deaf Smith County Hospital District.

After interviewing two prospects for the seat opened by the resignation of Steve Lawlis, the directors chose Conny Martin, an assistant principal at Hereford High School, to complete Lawlis' term, which expires in May 2001.

Lawlis, who was elected to the board in May 1999, will relocate his medical practice to Georgetown later this spring.

Martin and Gayle Cotten, a partner in the Hereford accounting firm of Warrick & Cotten, met with Directors Dean Crofford, Ernest Flood,

Bobby Owen, Jesse Rincones and Karen Solomon in the hospital board room. Director Mark Collier was absent.

Both Martin and Cotten expressed interest in serving on the board because each has "a vested interest in this community."

Both men also said they believed the hospital district should be operated as if it were a business.

Following the board's decision to appoint Martin, Crofford said he believed both men "were very good candidates. I would have felt com-

fortable with either one."

He also said Martin's experience in dealing with school boards during his long career as a school administrator was the difference, giving the educator a background in the operations of public bodies.

Martin is the second person appointed to the board in less than six months.

Last fall, Jesse Rincones was named to complete the unexpired term of Jeremy Grant, who had resigned before relocating to Nebraska.

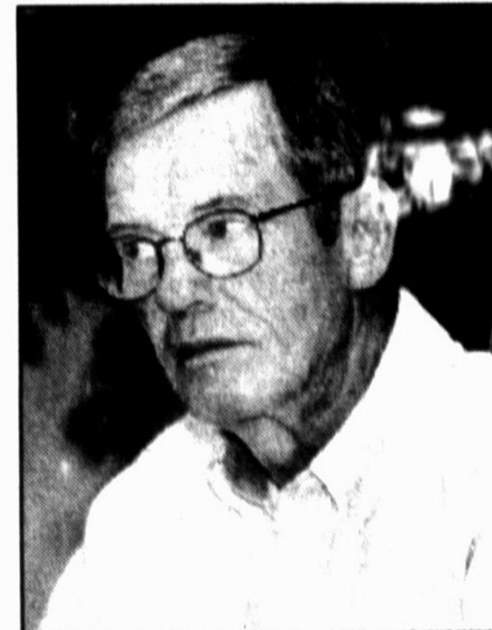

Hospitals serving poor struggling

WASHINGTON (AP) — Public hospitals and clinics serving the poor are cutting back services and struggling to survive as they lose patients to HMOs and take on more uninsured, said a panel of health experts that recommended spending \$2.5 billion over five years to keep them afloat.

Without the federal funds, many providers of last resort for people who can't afford to see a doctor will be forced to close, predicted an Institute of Medicine report on the

nation's health "safety net."

"You can't just assume that these providers will always be there," said Raymond Baxter, IOM panel member and executive vice president at The Lewin Group, a private health policy research group. "People who have come to rely on these clinics will have their care delayed at best, or won't be able to get care at all."

Many local public health services are losing patients subsidized by federal and state programs such as Medicaid — an important source of

revenue — to managed care organizations, leaving fewer dollars to offset the free care they provide to people who can't pay.

The Contra Costa County health department in northern California is facing an \$8.2 million budget shortfall next year because revenues are exceeding costs, 31 percent of which goes to providing care for people with no insurance.

"We'll have to start looking at cutbacks in programs," said Sara Hoffman, assistant county adminis-

trator.

Most safety net providers have been able to survive by cobbling together grants, the report said. Federal officials said more needs to be done to stabilize the safety net.

"This report has confirmed our worst fears," said Dr. Claude Earle Fox, head of the Health Resources and Services Administration at the Department of Health and Human Services. "We need to get all of the potential sources of funding working closely together to ensure that we

strengthen the safety net and don't weaken it."

Fox, whose department commissioned the IOM study, said a \$25 million pilot program for consortiums of safety net providers aims to improve coordination of care for the uninsured. The Clinton administration has asked Congress for \$1 billion to expand the program over the next five years.

The Institute of Medicine is part of the National Academy of Sciences.

Recovery to be long and costly

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — From the curb, there's little evidence that the mountain of crushed concrete, twisted metal and sprawling wires is The Sweet Shop's chocolate factory. But closer to the rubble, the smell of smashed bonbons is overpowering. A powerful tornado broke thousands of pounds of confection to pieces Tuesday night. The F-2 twister swept through downtown Fort Worth, destroying the Sweet Shop and dozens of other businesses. Several candy shop workers were trapped in the debris but miraculously, none was seriously injured. It's their spirit that hurts the most, said Darla James, a 16-year employee. "I'm just devastated, sheer devastation," she said. "I've been here so long. It's my life." James said her employer has vowed to rebuild. The candy company is one of the largest wholesalers of gourmet chocolates in the United States. Many other Fort Worth businesses won't be so lucky, said Fort Worth Mayor Kenneth Barr. "Undoubtedly, there will be some businesses that can't reopen," he said. "And a lot will have to relocate." The tornado damage ranged from the leveling of small convenience stores and automotive repair shops to structural damage to large skyscrapers. Damage to all areas in Tarrant County, including homes, is expected to top \$450 million, according to the Southwestern Insurance Information Service.

County suffers due to cleanup

BANDERA, Texas (AP) — About 2,000 cubic yards of gravel were dredged from the river below Bandera Lake before the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department ordered work stopped in January because no permit had been obtained, according to the San Antonio Express-News. And it appears that city leaders who pushed for the Medina River cleanup to satisfy one state agency are in hot water with another after getting carried away on the project. City Manager Don Reddout told the Express-News in today's editions that the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission had sanctioned the river cleanup last summer in lieu of the city paying a \$9,375 fine levied over past sewage treatment plant problems. "By removing the gravel and debris, we are enhancing the area and helping nature," Reddout said in a Jan. 27 letter to the parks agency. "At no time did anyone mention having to get a permit." Hundreds of bottles, cans and assorted other refuse also were removed. The gravel was piled beside the dam near a roadway.

Prices coming down

Widespread defects on nation's tracks

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal railroad inspectors say the CSX Transportation system used by passenger and commuter trains up and down the East Coast has deteriorating track conditions and other potentially dangerous defects in many areas, according to *The Washington Post*. The Post reported today that a 60 percent increase in track-caused accidents over five years on the 22,700-mile system prompted the Federal Railroad Administration to begin a two-week systemwide track audit on Feb. 22. The review found many instances where the distance between the rails had spread wide enough to risk derailments. Two such wide areas were found in the District of Columbia on the line used by Amtrak, Virginia Railway Express and all north-south CSX freight trains. The defects were repaired immediately after they were found. Defects were also found in Florida, Pennsylvania and Maryland. Two of three recent track-caused derailments were caused by wide track, including a minor derailment of Amtrak's Chicago-Washington Capitol Limited at Connellsville, Pa., on Jan. 30, the report said. George Gavalla, the agency's associate administrator for safety, said he worried about the type of defects inspectors found. "When you look at the nature of the defects, these are conditions that should not exist on any Class One (major) railroad," Gavalla said.

Senate passes rural TV legislation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Americans in rural markets may soon be able to watch local news, sports and weather for the first time, thanks to legislation that gives businesses an incentive to offer local television signals. The Senate passed a bill Thursday offering \$1.25 billion in federal loan guarantees to entice satellite, cable and wireless companies to deliver local TV signals to rural areas where millions can't get them now. That's because the viewers may live outside the broadcast signal range of local TV stations signals, are in not served by cable companies or have broadcast satellite subscriptions that are not yet offering the local channels. "Just because they are

small, doesn't mean they should be left out," said Sen. Conrad Burns, R-Mont., one of the authors of the bill. The loan guarantees would be capped at 80 percent. That means the federal government would promise to cover 80 percent of the loans if the borrower defaults. The bill is technologically neutral — meaning that companies getting the loan guarantees could use cable, satellite or any other type of service to deliver the local signals. But satellites may offer the most cost-effective option, with the ability to cover the greatest rural area. The House Commerce Committee has approved a similar bill and the Agriculture Committee in the House has cleared one that would guarantee 100 percent of the loans. The House must either merge those two or pick one before the legislation can advance. The White House has taken no position on the legislation. The loans would have to be approved by a board composed of the secretaries of Treasury and Agriculture and the chairman of the Federal Reserve Board. They could choose designees who would have to be confirmed by the Senate. Lawmakers forged agreements Thursday to allow rural cooperatives to participate — in addition to lenders insured by the Federal Deposit Insur-

ance Corporation — as long as they meet certain conditions. Senate Banking Committee Chairman Phil Gramm, R-Texas, said the bill was structured so that taxpayers would not be placed at financial risk by the loan guarantees. "The bill maximizes the chances that the loans will be paid back," said Gramm, who last year blocked action on the measure. Projects seeking to receive the local TV loan guarantees would get special consideration if they also provide high-speed Internet access and National Weather Service information.

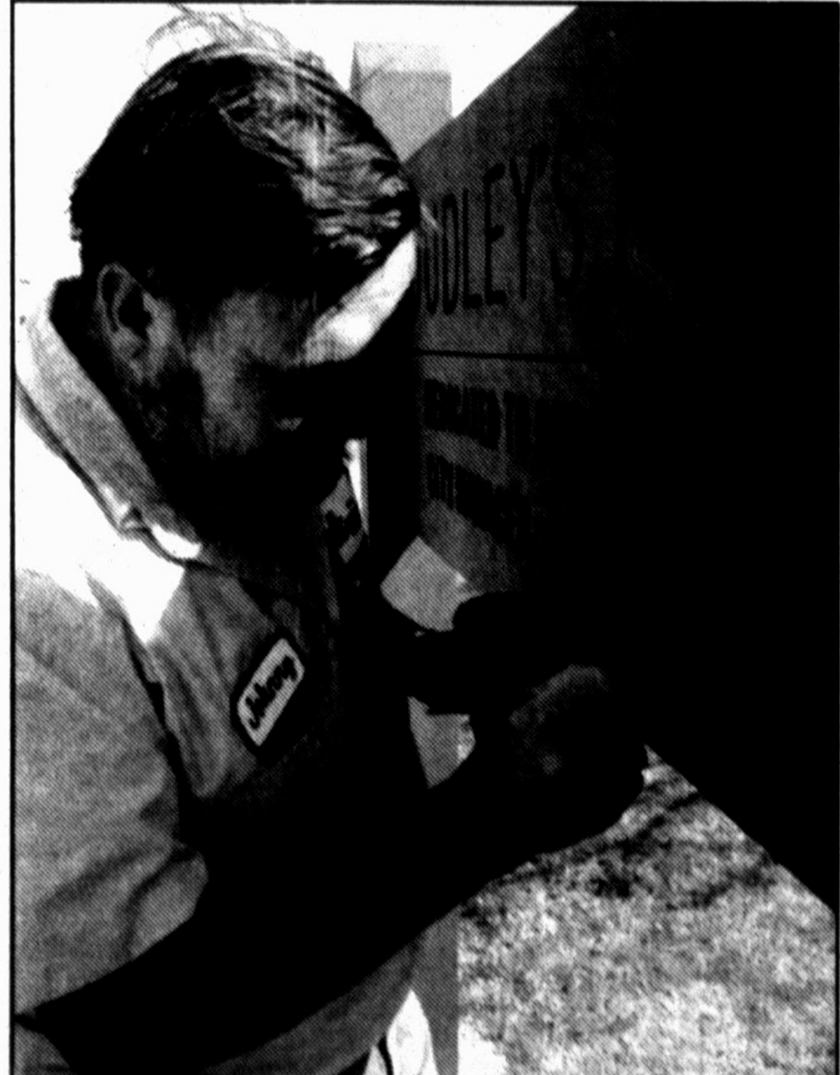

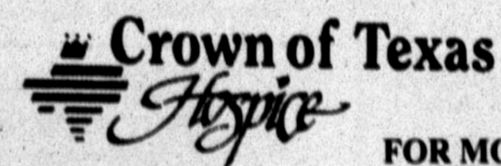

NOTICE OF PROPOSED INCREASE IN ENVIRONS GAS RATES AND SERVICE CHARGES

On March 8, 2000 Energas Company filed a statement of intent with the Railroad Commission of Texas to increase its gas rates in the unincorporated areas ("Environ's") surrounding the sixty-seven West Texas Cities listed below. The proposed increase would affect all classes of environ's tariff customers including Residential, Commercial, Public Authority, Small Industrial and Air Conditioning customers and would be identical in relative magnitude to those proposed by the Company for the sixty-seven West Texas cities in the Company's pending Appeal at the Railroad Commission. The proposed effective date for the increase is April 27, 2000. The Railroad Commission may delay the proposed effective date for up to 150 days. However, the environ's rates will not be changed until the rates inside the sixty-seven West Texas Cities are changed. There are approximately 22,275 Environ's customers in the unincorporated areas surrounding the sixty-seven West Texas Cities from which the Company has appealed to the Railroad Commission. The proposed changes in environ's rates are expected to increase the Company's annual revenues by approximately \$1.0 million or 8.5%, adjusted for normal weather. The change is a "major change" under state law only in the environs of Lubbock and Odessa.

Energas proposes to restructure its gas rates to moderate bill variability during the heating season, to increase its revenues from gas service by increasing the customer charges and lower pricing blocks, and to increase its charges for miscellaneous services such as reconnecting gas services following nonpayment. The Company also proposes changes to its Gas Cost Adjustment ("GCA") Clause to collect all of the gas cost and related taxes instead of just the difference between actual gas cost and a base cost of gas in the base rates. TNRCC to collect hazardous waste

Deaf Smith County residents will have a chance to dispose hazardous wastes and recyclables next week, thanks to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC).

The agency will collect these items 8 a.m.-1 p.m. April 7 at the Deaf Smith County Bull Barn as part of its cleanup campaign.

The purpose of the cleanup campaign is to offer rural areas disposal and recycling opportunities for farm and ranch wastes as recyclables. Since

1991, 187,080 participants have disposed of 3.1 million pounds of pesticides and 6.9 million pounds of recyclables through Agricultural Waste Pesticide and Texas Country Cleanup Collections.

Disposal costs for one 55-gallon drum of pesticide could cost a farmer as much as \$2,000 at a commercial facility. All agricultural chemicals will be accepted except pesticides or herbicides containing 2,4,5-T-Silvex; explosives; compressed gas cylinders; fertilizers or nutrients that are neither hazardous nor contain pes-

ticide admixtures; or pesticide or wood preservatives containing pentachlorophenol.

Empty plastic containers must be clean, triple-rinsed or high-pressure rinsed to be accepted. There is a two-drum limit per a participant on oil filter recycling and filters will not be accepted from businesses that change oil for a fee. Empty household containers will not be accepted they can be disposed of in the trash.

Tire collection is not available at the cleanup. Chemicals will not be accepted from chemical manufacturers.

Unsure how to write a Classified Ad that will get results? Follow these pointers and you'll soon have an empty space in your storage room and cash in your pocket.

For starters, look at ads which offer the same item/products. Get a sense of going rates and ideas for how to make your ad stand out. Once you're ready to write, begin with exactly what you're selling: "Dining room set, maple, six chairs."

 • Give the price. A newspaper consultant says 70 percent of classified readers won't respond to an ad with no price.
 • Use key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type of construction, number of bedrooms and baths, and condition.

• Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed by the words, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.
 • Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual when you write. Be sure to include a phone number and the best times to reach you.

Income, spending both up

WASHINGTON (AP) — Americans' income went up in February but their spending rose more than twice as fast, pulling the nation's savings rate down to an all-time monthly low.

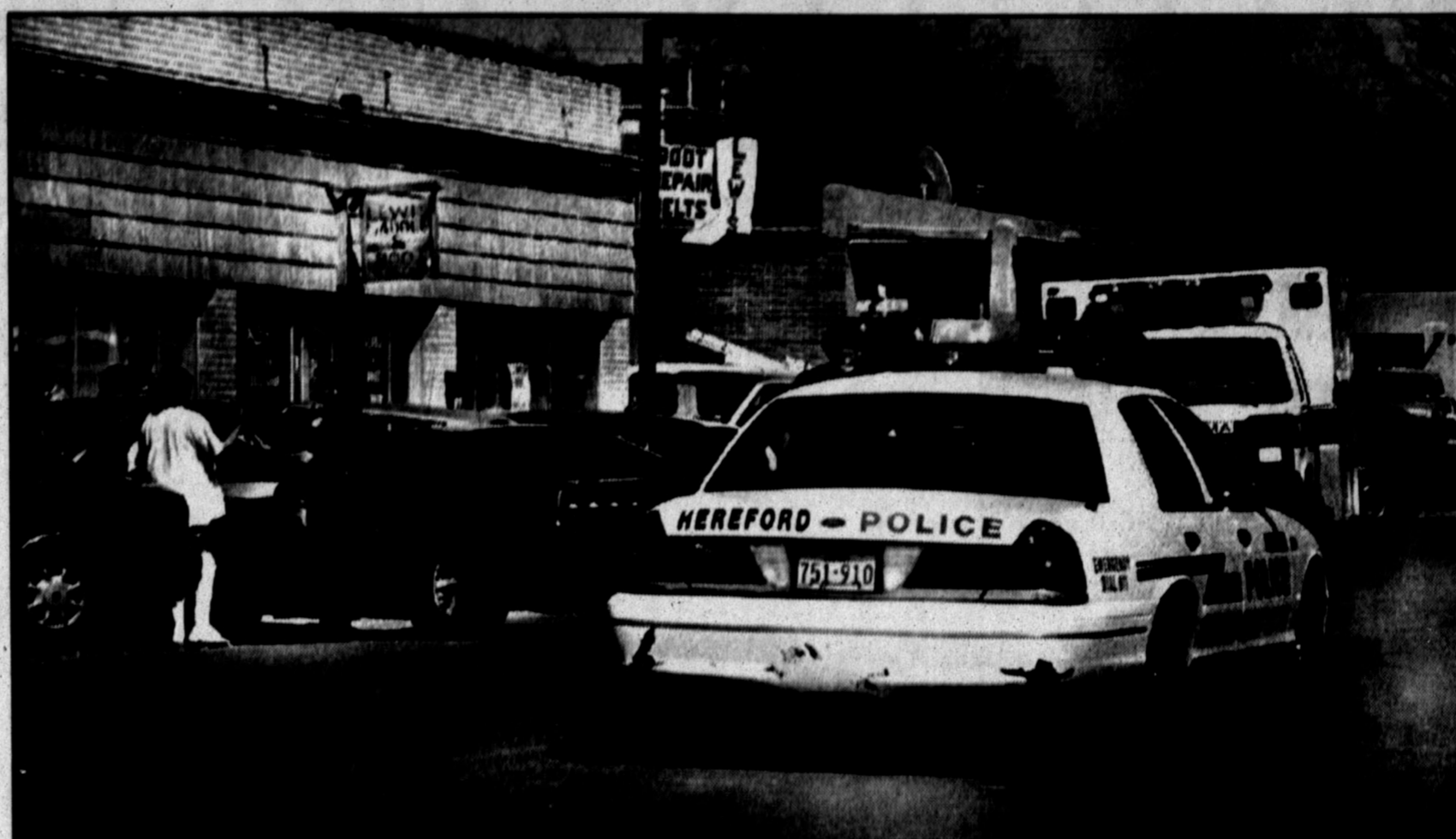
The Commerce Department reported today that personal income, which includes wages, interest and government benefits, increased by 0.4 percent last month, the slowest pace since December. But it was a slightly better showing than the 0.3 percent increase many analysts were predicting.

Spending zoomed ahead, rising 1 percent. Many analysts had anticipated a 0.9 percent gain.

In early trading today, stocks were attempting to regain some of Thursday's losses. The Dow Jones blue-chip average was up 12 points and Nasdaq — following four days of big losses — had gained 65 points. Yields on 30-year Treasury bonds dropped to 5.86 percent from 5.87 percent late Thursday.

With plentiful jobs, rising incomes, stock market gains and low inflation, Americans have been feeling in the mood to spend.

All that spending reduced the personal savings rate to 0.8 percent in February, a record monthly low.

fenders to other counties costs \$87.50 per day, per-individual. For that, the juveniles are allowed to watch movies, drink Kool-Aid, and they no longer have to attend school, he said.

"This may not save us any money," Serrano said. "But, it will keep \$300,000 to \$350,000 of our tax money here instead of giving it to Randall or other counties."

Before the comments from the audience began, Serrano addressed security questions.

"Yes, this would be considered a secure facility. I cannot promise there would never be escapes. It happens. What we can guarantee 100 percent is that the facility would be as secure as we can make it," he said.

When questioned about the low number of employees who would be responsible for the confinement of the offenders, Serrano made it clear that all state guidelines would be strictly adhered to with one adult for every eight children.

Regardless of the positive aspects of bringing the facility to Hereford, most people at the meeting appeared to believe the negatives far outweighed the problems caused by placing the detention center next door to the apartments which house so many senior citizens.

One man, who did not give his name, received a loud round of applause when he said, "I am 100 percent for the facility and 100 percent against the location."

Another man seemed to gain approval when he commented that the fear did not come from only prospective inmates, but also fear from the outside element, which would draw gangs and maybe even drive-by shootings.

"Our seniors are at risk," said an audience member. "If we had to risk even one of our seniors being raped, or hurt the cost would be too great. It would be a cost we could not get past. We can't put a dollar figure on our seniors having to live in fear."

Other concerns included the threat to children attending West Central Elementary School and Hereford Junior High, as well as the impact of mourners at funeral services knowing they were in the immediate vicinity of a youth correctional facility.

"I don't know what we'll do ultimately," Serrano said. "We wanted your opinions and comments and we will now take this back to Civigenics and see what we need to do."

After the meeting, Serrano said the turnout had been better than he had anticipated and the response from the community would give officials a good idea of where to move to meet the needs of our juvenile offenders.

DATE, Japan — After threatening mountainside villages for four days, Mount Usu erupted today, spewing a rolling mixture of rock, gas and ash over the snowy countryside.

Many townspeople near the volcano rushed into the streets and onto rooftops to watch the eruption, which was clearly visible for several miles.

There were no reports of injuries or damage, and Mount Usu's eruption appeared to be subsiding — at least temporarily — hours after it sent a huge column of ash and debris shooting into the sky early this afternoon.

Officials, however, warned that the danger was far from over.

"It is possible that widespread damage could result from this eruption," chief Cabinet spokesman Mikio Aoki said from the government's emergency headquarters in Tokyo. Prime Minister Keizo Obuchi was also there monitoring the situation.

Residents were calm, and most followed directions to stay at evacuation centers or at their homes. Coast guard ships and military helicopters also

were mobilized to rescue hundreds of residents near the volcano.

About 51,000 people live in the coastal city of Date and several smaller towns near Usu, located 475 miles north of Tokyo on Japan's northernmost main island of Hokkaido.

Maryland may be first to require gun locks

ANNAPOLIS, Md. — Maryland is a few legislative steps away from becoming the first state in the nation to require built-in locks on all new handguns. Opponents aren't sitting still.

A National Rifle Association advertisement featuring Gov. Parris Glendening fumbling to open one of the locks was to begin airing today statewide, coinciding with a crucial vote before a divided House committee.

In the commercial, the narrator asks: "If your family's safety is threatened, how much time will you have to unlock the firearm you depend on for protection?"

The ad uses footage from a press conference earlier this month when Glendening spent nearly two minutes struggling to open a push-button combination lock on a handgun. His "childproof gun" bill would require similar locks on all new handguns sold in the state, beginning in 2003.

Glendening conceded that he should have had some training with the device before attempting a demonstration, but in-

sisted the locks themselves are effective.

"The lock worked perfectly. What didn't work is my knowledge that I had to release the safety on the gun," he said.

The bill has been by far the most controversial piece of legislation in the 2000 session, which draws to a close in less than two weeks. The fight is holding up other major items, including the state budget.

Research suggests aging caused by genetic errors

WASHINGTON — A failure of quality control in genes may be the underlying reason for the physical decline that inevitably accompanies aging, according to new research.

In a study published today in the journal Science, researchers at the Scripps Research Institute in La Jolla, Calif., said that a survey of 6,000 genes uncovered at least 61 that go through dramatic changes from the age of 9 to 90.

Dr. Richard A. Lerner, a co-author of the study, said he believes it is these genetic changes that imprint the body with the typical signals of aging — gray hair, wrinkled skin, weaker muscles and brittle bones.

"There are checkpoint genes that have to do with quality control in a cell," said Lerner. "These genes decide after a cell divides if it is good enough to live or not."

If the checkpoint genes work, then genetic errors are stopped immediately.

But when the checkpoint genes fail, mistakes in DNA are perpetuated because the flawed cells then make new cells with the same genetic mistakes, or worse. This cascade of genetic goofs can eventually cause a loss of function that may include the typical symptoms of aging.

There's a lot of clowning at this convention

TORONTO — Peering down her bright red nose, Linda Berman — aka Heart Throb — stamped a gargantuan shoe to make an important point about bubble blowing during her seminar at the World Clown Association annual convention.

"There's absolutely no end to the amount of fun," she said, "and you can make a LOT (pause) OF (pause) MONEY."

Berman was talking about how a clown can use soap bubbles at a party — but she could have been talking about the convention itself: a gathering of practitioners of one of the oldest forms of entertainment to share secrets on how to keep 'em laughing and make a profit.

More than 250 clowns, mostly from North America and the United Kingdom, converged on Toronto's downtown Holiday Inn for the four-day convention that opened Wednesday.

Finding the meeting was easy — just follow the clowns. While some of the delegates attended sessions in street clothes, others chose to wear the most recognized tools of their trade.
