Lottery jackpot REALLY, really big

ATLANTA (AP) - The odds of hitting tonight's Big Game jackpot of \$325 million with a I ticket are about the same as putting a finger down on a list of everyone in America and landing on an ex-president.

And no one seems to care. For days, gas stations and groery stores have been swamped with people hoping their numbers - some carefully chosen, others computer-picked - would

bring them the big prize.

If it goes to just one person after tonight's drawing, the jackpot will be the richest lottery prize in world history. After taxes, that lucky person would get either \$8.5 million a year for 26 years or a one-time payment of \$110 million.

"They're dreaming of what they'll do with it for that minute they're buying it," said Kevin Finneran, owner of a Li'l Peach convenience store in South Bos-

Just how big is the jackpot? Nineteen times bigger than all of the prize money given away on "Who Wants to Be a Millionaire." Enough cash to pay the entire Minnesota Twins baseball team until 2020.

The Big Game is played in Georgia, Illinois, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, New Jersey and Virginia.

In Cana, Va., just across the North Carolina state line, 200 lottery players lined up at an Exxon station before sunrise Monday.

N.M. blazes force evacuations

RUIDOSO, N.M. (AP) — Hundreds of people were forced to flee as one of two large wildfires burning in New Mexico swept within a few feet of their homes and spread across more than 5,000 acres.

"It burned right up to their back yard and backdoor steps," firefighter Tyner Cervantes said Monday in this south-central New Mexico resort town. "It burned down some wooden fences and a flatbed trailer, but we didn't lose a single house.'

A second blaze 200 miles to the northwest has forced the evacuation of at least 500 homes and virtually

shut down the Los Alamos National Laboratory. Lab officials have said explosives and nuclear material were in fire-safe structures.

The lab, as well as Los Alamos County schools and offices, were closed for a second straight day today. No major injuries have been reported.

The Los Alamos fire had been set to clear underbrush at a national monument but got out of control, charring more than 3,000 acres. It was about a mile away from the nearest homes Monday as it burned across several canyons at the foot of the Jemez Mountains.

"We're going to stay as long as we can," said Bill Redmond, a former congressman who lives in Los Alamos. "We have ash all over our vehicle and everything in our yard."

Officials say this fire season could rival the one in 1996, almost 17,000 acres burned near Los Alamos.

"The state is a tinderbox," Gov. Gary Johnson said in declaring a state of emergency Monday. "This is a huge wakeup call."

Cooler weather Monday helped firefighters battling the blaze at Los Alamos, Forest Service spokesman Jim Paxon said.

"We are very confident things are going in the right direction," Paxon

The fire was set Thursday by the National Park Service to get rid of excess underbrush and deadwood at the Bandelier National Monument, home of ancient Indian ruins and 70

miles of hiking trails. Park Superintendent Roy Weaver took responsibility for the blaze, saying he believed conditions had been just right for the park's annual regimen of prescribed burning to lower the overall fire danger.

County delays action on pact

There wasn't much on the Deaf Smith County commissioners' agenda. Even so, they managed to delay any action on one of the few items to be considered.

The commissioners failed to take action on a proposal to join the city of Hereford in an aerial spraying

The city commissioners voted unanimously May 1 to approve a contract with Southwest Aerial Service of Plainview to spray the city and unincorporated county areas adjacent to the city.

Under the terms of the contract, the company will receive \$5,926 per application. In the past, the county has paid one-quarter of the cost because the spraying also targets unincorporated areas adjacent to the city. These areas include the San Jose Community, along Holly Sugar Road, and north of 15th Street.

The cost of the chemical for the spraying is 63 cents per acre, with the application cost put at 53 cents per acre. The spraying will affect 5,000 acres. According to officials, the chemical used in the aerial application is a malathion-based material that is not harmful to humans or pets in the spray quantities.

Precinct 1 Commissioner Wayne Betzen questioned participating in the spraying program, describing it as "a waste of time."

Betzen said he didn't think the mosquito problem is serious enough to justify the \$1,500 per application that the county would pay. No action was taken by the com-

missioners, who will discuss it again as part of the annual budget pro-

'LOVE BUG'

Computer virus invades clerk's office, deletes some photo files

The "love bug" bit in Hereford.

Deaf Smith County Clerk David Ruland said Monday he had opened an e-mail that contained the computer virus. "Nothing significant was lost," Ruland said. "But it did delete

the jpeg (photo/graphic) files on one computer — mine Ruland said his computer was the only one in the councilerk's

office that was affected by the computer virus. The virus has caused a flood of e-mails with the subject line "ILOVEYOU" to course through computer systems in more than 20 countries since it appeared last week. When opened, the virus can destroy graphics and other saved files.

Several variations appeared soon after — one masquerading as an e-mail joke, another as a receipt for a Mother's Day gift.

Meanwhile, a student at a Philippine computer college wrote a password-stealing program very similar to the "ILOVEYOU" computer virus that has struck computer systems worldwide, a school official said today.

Officials at AMA Computer College examined programs written for thesis projects after investigators linked the school to the virus, said Manuel Abad, the college's executive vice president. However, he refused to identify the author of the program, which he said was "very close" to the virus.



McCain endorses Bush, says he looks forward to campaign

PITTSBURGH (AP) - Two months after their bitter primary battle, John McCain endorsed George W. Bush today and said he looked forward to "enthusiastically campaigning" for the likely Republican presidential nominee. McCain, however, asked not to be considered as a running mate.

The Arizona senator gave his formal endorsement to Bush after a 90-minute private meeting that ended with a public handshake. "I endorse Governor Bush," McCain said over and

Ex-presidents OK China trade

WASHINGTON (AP) - With just a few weeks before a vote, President Clinton has invited two former presidents and top officials from past administrations to the White House to help him twist the arms of congressmen who remain undecided about granting permanent normal trade relations to China.

Presidents Ford and Carter were to join Clinton and Vice President Al Gore in the East Room today to rally support for the landmark trade legislation, which would ease the Asian nation's entrance into the World Trade Organization.

Former secretaries of state, including Henry Kissinger, and past national security advisers also were to stand with the president. And the Democratic Leadership Council planned to hand Clinton a national petition signed by more than 140 state and local elected leaders who support normal trade with China.

At a fund-raiser Monday night for Rep. Baron Hall D-Ind., in Bethesda, Md., Clinton said failing to pass the measure would have a negative effect on national security and could heighten tension between China and Taiwan.

On Monday, Clinton got key support from three former presidents and a highly respected Republican economist, Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan.

Osprey crash due to loss of lift

Investigators rule out human errors or mechanical failures

WASHINGTON (AP) --- Marine Corps investigators believe last month's MV-22 Osprey crash that killed 19 Marines probably was caused by a loss of aerodynamic lift that forced the aircraft into a fatal nose dive.

to ruling out mechanical failure as a cause and do not believe the investigation will find a need to redesign the aircraft, a unique hybrid of airplane and helicopter, officials said Monday.

Investigators also have found no indication of recklessness by the pilot, Maj. John A. Brow, 39, of California, Md.

Among victims of the crash and explosion were Pfc. Alfred Corona and five other Texans stationed at Camp Pendleton,

The Marines planned to disclose their latest findings publicly today and possibly to announce plans to use two of the remaining MV-22 Osprey aircraft to simulate some circumstances of the April 8 incident.

The tilt-rotor Osprey takes off and lands like a helicopter but flies like an airplane.

Marine Corps officials who discussed the matter Monday The investigators are close on condition of anonymity stressed that the investigation is incomplete. Families of the victims have been informed of the investigation's progress.

One Pentagon official said investigators are about 90 percent certain that the crash at a small airport north of Tucson, Ariz., was caused by an aerodynamic phenomenon known as "settling with power."

as "vortex ring state," occurs when a helicopter settles into the wash produced by its own rotor system. This can happen in circumstances combining a rapid rate of descent, low forward airspeed and a nearly vertical descent. The aircraft's descent is so rapid that the flow of air at the inner portion of the rotor blades is upward rather than downward. The upward flow of air caused by the aircraft's descent can reach a level that is greater than the downward flow produced by blade rotation. At this point the aircraft

This condition, also known

can sink uncontrollably. In the case of the Osprey, the rotors may have been using such a large proportion of available engine power that the aircraft had insufficient power left to slow the rate at which it was sinking in its rotor wash.

It is not clear what caused the Osprey to get into the

"settling with power" problem. The Washington Post reported Monday that the Osprey

probably pitched over as it began sinking, then flew al-most straight down into the ground. Citing unidentified sources, the Post also reported that investigators are examining the extent to which the Osprey's fuel tanks were ruptured in the crash.

Investigators have accumulated evidence from a combination of sources, including interviews with members of the crew of an MV-22 Osprey that landed at the same airport just moments before the crash. A member of that crew reported seeing the Osprey nose-dive into the ground as he looked behind him.

Investigators also have leaned details from the Osprey's flight data recorder.

The crash was the deadliest air disaster for the Marines since 22 died in a helicopter. crash in South Korea in 1989.

chemical in my home. How did this happen? I worked for 10 years in a chemical plant, and had con-stant daily exposure to per-fumes and other chemicals. The company I worked for is extremely safety conscious, and follows all the rules. Even so, the chemical odor was quite noticeable, and my reaction was severe, including joint stiffness, swelling and pain. More recently, I have been getting stroke-like reactions, such as numbness on one side of my body, slurred speech, dizziness and nausea.

The first few doctors I saw insisted I had psychological problems. I am thankful that I now have a competent, welleducated environmental doctor who is helping me. There is a treatment to desensitize the sufferer to those enzymes that cause the problem, but it is obscure and expensive, many doctors do not know about it, and insurance agencies do not always cover the



HOUSTON (AP) - When he was flying high last year toward a 21-victory season, flam-boyant Houston Astros starter Jose Lima called his turn in the rotation "Lima Time."

Lima Time usually ended with another victory, loud meringue music in the Astros locker room and opposing hitters anguished at Lima's fist-stabbing, body language after a big JOSE strikeout.

Now, Lima is getting the flip-side and Astros manager Larry Dierker has decided a Lima timeout might help him break out of a slump that has extended to five straight losses, a 9.52 ERA and 11 homers allowed in his last three starts.

"We're going to skip Lima's next start," Dierker said Mon-day night. "I think we'll pitch him Tuesday in Milwaukee. We have an off-day and this will give him a chance to have two or three bullpen sessions so he can try to get his problems

ROADS ■ Clinton wants

to halt building of forest roads

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Clinton administration today is proposing to ban road building in 43 million acres of roadless federal forests while letting local foresters decide whether to bar activities such as logging, mining and off-road-vehicle use.

Environmentalists who heralded President Clinton's launch of the rulemaking last October said the proposal was a disappointment.

"It doesn't match up to the vision President Clinton laid out," said Ken Rait, director of the Heritage Forests Campaign. Merely banning roads isn't enough — timber companies could use helicopters and cable systems to log forests, the

group said. The plan defers a decision on whether to prohibit roads in 8.7 million acres of the nation's largest forest, the Tongass in Alaska, until 2004 when agency officials review a separate plan governing that forest.

Leaving out the Tongass "just leaves a gaping hole in this policy," said Matt Zencey, campaign manager of the Alaska Rainforest Campaign.

Industry groups also com-plained, saying the proposal as they had expected — limits their access to forests. "It's another step toward zero harvest," said Jim Geisinger, president of the Northwest Forestry Association in Portland, Ore.

Forest Service Chief Mike Dombeck was scheduled to announce the plan at a news conference today in Phoenix.

About 60 million acres of the 192 million acres of federal forests are considered wild, or undeveloped. The rest of the acreage, governed by the For-est Service, is host to a wide range of activities, including logging, camping, skiing, mining and off-road-vehicle use.

Environmentalists complain that roads cause runoff, disrupt plant and wildlife and make it easier for people to conduct harmful activities such as logging, mining and off-road-ve-hicle riding.

is probably a good description." Behind the scenes, McCain's political team was chafing at Bush's refusal in the news conference to repudiate conservative broadcaster Pat Robertson's statement last weekend that a McCain vice presidency would be "very dangerous."

British troops evacuate Europeans

FREETOWN, Sierra Leone (AP) - British soldiers evacuated European citizens from this tension-filled city today, lifting them away in helicopters from a Freetown hotel crowded with people fleeing violence that has threatened to tear Sierra Leone

The flight continued even as government and U.N. officials said this West African nation's peace process was not com-pletely wrecked, a day after rebel soldiers opened fire on protesters, killing four and throwing Freetown into chaos.

There were fears of more violence after the country's no-torious rebel leader, Foday Sankoh, vanished following Monday's shooting outside his Freetown home, where he had been under U.N. guard. About 320 British, European

Union and Commonwealth citizens have been evacuated so far, a British Defense Ministry spokeswoman said in London. They were flown through the night by helicopter to Sierra Leone's main airport, across a bay from Freetown, and from

there most had already been taken by airplane to Dakar, the capital of nearby Senegal, a U.N. official said on condition of anonymity.
The United Nations also be-

gan evacuating some of its 266 nonessential civilian employees Monday night. Another 55 were staying in Freetown, U.N. officials said.

The streets of this seaside capital were calm today, with many stores open and people moving about freely. U.N. spokesman David Wimhurst said there were no reports of fighting anywhere in the coun-

try today.

Monday's bloodshed followed clashes last week between U.N. peacekeepers and rebel forces outside Freetown and the kidnapping of hundreds of U.N.

troops.

When some 5,000 protesters marched on Sankoh's house demanding an end to hostilities, they overwhelmed his U.N. guards and began throwing rocks. Rebel fighters, standing behind the U.N. troops, sprayed the crowd with automatic weapons and rocket-propelled grenades.

People fled in panic, and dozens were wounded in the shooting and subsequent stam-pede. Within hours, soldiers from all the country's factions were cruising the streets of Freetown, pointing machine guns from their vehicle win-

Today, officials sought to reassure the public they were in control. A government statement read on national radio expressed "full confidence" in the abilities of U.N. peacekeep-

A Clinton administration official told the United Nations that the U.S. Air Force was prepared to fly a battalion of U.N. peacekeepers from Bangladesh in coming days. The United Nations wants to speed up deployment of that battalion and two others scheduled to arrive by mid-July, bringing the U.N. force up to its full strength of 11,100.

Bernard Miyet, the head of U.N. peacekeeping operations, arrived in Freetown on Monday night and was meeting U.N. soldiers and officials to assess the situation and "to demonstrate to ... the world that we're determined to put the peace process back on track, Wimhurst said.

Sierra Leone, among the world's poorest countries de-spite vast diamond resources, was brutalized during eight years of civil war, which ended with a peace accord last July that created a power-sharing government. In principle, that deal included Sankoh's rebel Revolutionary United Front, whose forces killed and maimed

thousands during the war.

After the Freetown shooting,
hundreds of British citizens and other foreign nationals Monday night poured into the Mammy Yoko hotel, which serves as the peacekeepers' headquarters, clutching passports and suit-

A Sierra Leonean woman who said rebels had killed her husband and four of their children last year waited in a hotel courtyard to send her 9-yearold daughter to safety.
