### Windows to the door of chapel broken out, parts of U.S., Italian flags broken at compound entrance

Tuesday night at the POW Camp Chapel, which is located southwest of Hereford just across the Castro County line.

The vandals broke out windows in the doors to the tiny chapel, which sits in the middle of a field. They also broke parts of the United States and Italian flags at the entrance to the small compound.

The chapel, which was dedicated on May 8, 1993, and is registered as a Texas Historic Landmark, sits on the site of Hereford Prisoner of War Camp No. 31, which held Italian POWs between



The chapel compound, which is listed as a state historic site, was dedicated in 1993. It sits on the site of the former World War II prisoner of war camp.

1946. During World War II, more than 7,000 Italian prisoners passed through the barbed wire fence.

During their internment, the Italian POWs worked as farm laborers and as construction workers, building a part of a grain elevator in Hereford, while a major with artistic talent designed the murals for St. Mary's Catholic Church in Umbarger, later recounted in the book "Interlude at Umbarger."

The chapel was built by former POWs as a tribute to their five comrades who died while in the Hereford

### HISD gets good news from education agency

#### By Dianna F. Dandridge Hereford Brand Staff Writer

Preliminary reports are in and the news is

Hereford Independent School District has released the preliminary results of the 1999-2000 Texas Assessment of Academic Skills tests which students completed earlier this year.

Students in grades three, eight and 10 were tested in reading and mathematics. Students in grades four, eight and 10 also completed writing

Aikman Elementary School set a precedent last year by earning an exemplary campus designation from the Texas Education Agency. This year, school district officials expect Tierra Blanca, Shirley and Bluebonnet to follow suit.

TEA ranks campuses and districts as exemplary, recognized, acceptable or unacceptable. Rankings include TAAS tests scores, attendance and other factors that measure the schools and students accomplishments.

HISD deputy superintendent Nena Veazey said the results are very pleasing.

"We expect to see some significant changes in the TAAS test in 2003, but our district is taking a pro-active stance and preparing our teachers and students in advance. District Improvement Teams are still meeting to determine what actions will be necessary to maintain this level when the changes come," Veazey said.

Campus principals are also pleased with the work the students and teachers accomplished.

"I know it's still not official, but the scores indicate we're going to be exemplary," Bluebonnet Principal Richard Sauceda said. "We attribute this to the high expectations of our students and they met every challenge. The teachers, parents and students all worked as a team. That work is what made us so successful."

"Everybody on this campus is sharing a sense of pride and accomplishment by students staff and parents alike at Tierra Blanca," Principal Sharon Hodges said.

There are a few small problem scores. Only 79 percent of tested seventh graders passed the reading portion and 78 percent of eighth graders passed the writing portion.

"We are not certain why this happened," Veazey said. "We are looking into the causal factors which may have contributed."

Veazev said she hopes the district will have better answers by the fall when the official TEA rankings are released. The district officials won't know how HISD

compared with other districts in Region XVI or

### **Appraisal** notices in the mail

The Deaf Smith County Appraisal District mailed 4,100 letters Wednesday to county property owners showing their proposed appraised value for 2000.

Chief appraiser Danny Jones said the letter of appraised value is not a tax bill.

"Please do not pay — this is not a tax bill," Jones said

Jones said the notice and the key information it contains are very important to property owners.

"A property owner has the right to appeal to the Deaf Smith County Appraisal Review Board on any disagreement with the property's value, exemptions, ownership and other areas," Jones said.

The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent panel of residents responsible for hearing and settling protests for prop-

erty owners who disagree with some action by the appraisal district. The notice includes instructions on how and when to file a protest and a protest form. The deadline for filing a


protest is June 9.

In reviewing the letter, Jones said property owners should "look at the proposed value for 2000. The letter states the land's value and any improvement value for the property for the current year."

An improvement is a building, structure, fence or any other type of fixture to the land.

The appraisal letter also includes current year information on exemptions granted on the property. It also provides the 1999 value.

Homeowners who qualify



for property tax homestead exemptions have a limitation on their homes' appraised value, beginning with the second year that they qualify their home for homestead exemptions. The appraisal district may not increase their home value by more than 10 percent for each year since the last reappraisal year.

Letters to property owners whose values went up by more than \$1,000 also will include "estimated" taxes. These "estimated" taxes are based on the new taxable value and estimated tax rates if the taxing units set tax rates for the same amount of operating dollars as last year. Taxing entities will set final 2000 tax rates in August and September. Final tax amounts may vary.

Jones said property owners should check the legal description and mailing address to be sure there are no mistakes.

"If the letter has an old address, please let the appraisal district know. The post office forwards mail to a new address for a short time, and tax bills do not go out until October," Jones said.

A property owner is responsible for informing the appraisal district of the correct mailing address. A property owner is liable for additional penalties and interest on a tax bill that is not paid

#### Defense calls in psychologist

HOUSTON (AP) — Attorneys for admitted serial killer Angel Maturino Resendiz were preparing today to present the centerpiece of their insanity defense — testimony of a psychologist who studied the Mexican drifter's history and crimes.

Defense attorneys said the second day of their case would mirror the first on Wednesday, in which Maturino Resendiz's family took the stand to describe behavior another psychologist earlier termed paranoid, schizophrenic and delusional.

Maturino Resendiz, 40, has admitted to nine killings from 1997-99 - six in Texas, two in Illinois and one in Kentucky but is only standing trial for the death of Houston-area physician Dr. Claudia Benton. Benton was stabbed, bludgeoned and raped during a Dec. 18, 1998, break-in at her home in West University Place, a Houston suburb.

Faced with a catalogue of physical evidence tying their client to Benton's murder and rape, the defense has pleaded innocent by reason of insanity.

To make their case, defense attorneys sent two psychologists to examine Maturino Resendiz. Dr. Robert Cohen was to take the stand today to bolster the defense argument that their client was insane when he killed Benton.

#### Rimes suing father

DALLAS (AP) - A lawsuit by teen country singer LeAnn Rimes against her father and her former co-manager contends that they took more than \$7 million from her over a five-year

The Garland, Texas-raised singer is blue because, according to a lawsuit filed this month in Dallas County district court, Wilbur C. Rimes worked with Lyle Walker to funnel money away from LeAnn and the company set up in 1995 to manage

Papers filed in the lawsuit ask for an unspecified amount of damages because attorneys don't know how much money the men allegedly took, attorney Tom Rhodus told The Dallas Morning News in today's editions.

"It would appear that her father didn't always act in a fatherly way to her," Rhodus said Wednesday. He is representing LeAnn, 17, and her mother, Belinda Rimes.

Brad Rhorer, a Baton Rouge, La.-based attorney represent-ing the singer's father, called the accusations "completely false" and added that his client's "compensation was fair.

"I can imagine no heartbreak greater than that of a father watching helplessly as others, for their own personal gain, alienate the affections of his daughter," Rhorer said in a prepared statement. "Wilbur Rimes fathered and raised LeAnn. He taught her how to sing and how to perform."

### **UT seeks top 10 exemption**

### **Business school** forced to turn applicants away

AUSTIN (AP) - With The University of Texas already turning away first-time and transfer students planning to enroll next spring, business school administrators are urging exemption from a state law that guarantees admission

for top prospects.

The UT business school received 5,000 applications this year — 1,000 more than 1999. The high demand forced the school to exceed its enrollment cap of 1,250 to accommodate out-of-state students and others who fell outside of l'exas' "top 10 percent" law.

It guarantees admission to a public university for students in the top 10 percent of their graduating high school class

"We knew this might be the year that it happened," said Urton Anderson, the business school's associate dean for undergraduates. "But next year, we will be operating under a new admissions policy."

Anderson is meeting with administrators at UT's other crowded colleges to come up with a solution to limit enroll-

Options under consideration include accepting students in the top 6 or 7 percent of their high school class and admitting the rest of the students based on academic and other

criteria used before the law went into effect.

The admissions law helped swell UT enrollment to more than 49,000 last year. Last month, UT officials announced they would not admit new students next spring because of a record 7,500 students entering the freshman class in 2000.

The admissions moratorium won't affect those who have already received commitments from Texas. But it could affect as many as 1,000 others who were counting on entering next

The moratorium on admissions, officials said, was a last effort to shrink an enormous student body.
Other UT schools, such as

architecture and fine arts, are already exempted from the state's top 10 percent law because they require audition or portfolios for acceptance.

For students already enrolled, the demand for admission isn't surprising.

When you have a public business school ranked fifth in the country, obviously people are going to go there because it's cheap," said Brian Howell. a UT business honors junior.

Howell said he's concerned the school won't be able to hire more professors fast enough to keep the studentfaculty ratio low.

He added that he's glad administrators are taking steps to exempt the business school from the 10 percent law.

"It inhibits the school's ability to recruit students from out-of-state," Howell said. In 1994, before the top 10

### DRT questions panels

display panels donated to the Alamo by the Daughters of the Republic of Texas have wording that concerns the city, according to today's editions of the San Antonio Express-News.

The panels feature illustrations and text to help visitors understand the famous Texas shrine's history. The DRT panels are titled "The Alamo in 1836" and have sturdy aluminum frames and graffiti-resistant panels made to National Park Service standards.

According to the Express-News, some people are wondering if an excerpt on the panels from a letter by Santa Anna's secretary is necessary. It describes how 300 Mexican soldiers were left dead on the battlefield and 100 more later died for lack of medical atten-

There is also an omission in the description of the southwest corner, one of the places where a sloped ramp was built to roll artillery up to the top of the wall.

That is where the Alamo's largest weapon — an 18-pound

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - Two artillery piece - was placed in the corner closest to Mexican General Santa Anna's encampment across the river next to what was known as San Fernando Church.

Many historians say it was the 18-pounder that was fired in response to a message sent by courier on the first day of the siege demanding the Alamo garrison's surrender.

The famous volley is not mentioned in the proposed narrative.

"We need to make sure we are not misrepresenting history by omission," history teacher Yolanda Chavez Leyva told the Express-News.

A San Antonio committee is already working on five large panels to tell the history of Alamo Plaza from before Mission San Antonio, through the mission period and up to the battle and then the modern development of the plaza, plus some of the myths and legends of the Alamo.

Alamo Director Brad Breuer told the newspaper."We aren't trying to force anything on

percent law, 51 percent of freshmen at the UT business school were ranked in the top 10 percent of their graduating class. This year, 96 percent of the 1,386 students offered admission were in the top 10 percent.

Anderson predicted the large enrollment won't affect the quality of education, since only an estimated 900 of the 1,386 will decide to attend UT.

He added that huge incoming class hasn't decreased the overall quality of the student body at the business school.

"In this group, 1,330 is the average SAT score. Last year it was 1,250," Anderson said. That's pretty good. Changes to admission stan-

fore they can take effect.

### **Final Davidian** report released

WACO, Texas (AP) - The final report on a simulation of the Branch Davidian siege indicates that flashes seen on a videotape were sunlight re-flecting off debris, not govern-ment gunfire as claimed in a wrongful death lawsuit.

Vector Data Systems, the British firm that conducted the March 19 simulation at Fort Hood, submitted its conclusions this week to U.S. District Judge Walter Smith Jr., who is presiding over the Branch Davidian lawsuit. A preliminary report sent to Smith last month gave similar conclusions.

By comparing the simula-tion to videotapes from the last day of the siege, Vector found that the 1993 flashes were caused by reflections off metal and glass, including a helicopter canopy and falling and wind-blown debris.

"We were unable to identify any gunfire, either from gov-ernment forces or from Davidians, from either the (infrared tapes) or other collat-eral imagery available to us," the report stated.

The report also states that no one was seen prior to the breakout of two fires that consumed the compound on April 19, 1993. At least 80 people died during the inferno.

"This analysis vindicates those FBI people long accused of shooting into the com-pound," said Deputy FBI Di-rector Thomas Pickard. "The FBI's long-standing and steadfast position that no shots were fired has now been strongly and independently corroborated."

An attorney for Branch Davidian survivors and relatives, Jim Brannon, said he believes Vector's analysis is "fatally flawed."

I say they are living in our house, and ought to assume some of the domestic responsibilities.

I work overtime to pay the household bills, and should not have to do extra work at home when there are able-bodied adults around. I absolutely refuse to fold laundry while my grown sons are lounging on the sofa watching television. My wife also works full time, and is wearing herself out taking care of these lazy bums, eliminating any chance for us to enjoy time together as a couple.

I have tried to set some guidelines, but no one pays any attention to them. What can be done about this galling situation? — Overworked Dad in New York

Dear Overworked Dad:
The cards are stacked against you, and your wife is holding the deck. Relief might come

when one or both of the "lazy bums" meets some unsuspecting young woman and decides to move out — and probably move in with a woman who will also do the cooking and cleaning. Your wife would be doing her sons a huge favor if she gave them three weeks' notice to find other lodging and learn to fend for them-

We work closely with physical and speech therapists (another discipline that rarely receives recognition) to rehabilitate people to their fullest functional lev-

Please give credit to each of these disciplines, so your readers will stop thinking of them all as "physical therapy." We do a variety of things, and work together to achieve the best results. If you print this letter, it will make every occupational and speech thera-

pist in the country proud. —

# Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- the value placed on your property
- any exemptions that may apply to you
   the cancellation of an agricultural appraisal
- the taxable status of your property
   the local governments which should be taxing.
- your property

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 140 E. 3<sup>rd</sup>, Hereford, Texas.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

### Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB\*

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later). JUNE 9th.

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year.

Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

 The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

# Flood's final cha

#### ■ Hereford senior hopes to break record at final competition

For Kurtis Flood the time is now.

The Hereford High School senior will wear his maroon and white track uniform for the last time when he steps in the discus ring to compete for the state title tomorrow in Austin at noon.

"Winning the meet would mean everything to me," Flood said. "I just want to make some memories and have something I can tell my grand

kids someday."
Winning the state meet in discus has been a goal of Flood's for some time now. Flood said he made up his mind two years ago to compete in the throwing event, and he takes that decision seriously.

activities he will try to relax and focus on why he is there. He said he hopes he can not get uptight or nervous about the state meet. Flood said when he begins to get ner-vous he thinks back to his HHS track career.



As a sophomore, Flood said he felt he wanted to compete in the discus competition. Flood made up his mind to succeed in the event but recalls how horrible his form and his throws were. Flood said he would average throws of 70 feet and scratch often.

"I was told I was hopeless," Flood said. "I see the person who told me that often, and I always joke with him about it."

In his junior year, Flood continued to improve earning an alternate position at the regional meet, and as a se-nior he feels his work has paid off making to the state

"I feel like I have just kept going up like a rocket," Flood said.

One thing Flood said he likes about track is the ability to control his own destiny. In football, Flood said the unity and team work was awesome but in track one has to learn to be successful on their own.


"A team sport is awesome but in track you are on your own," Flood said. "I can get away on my own and just throw.

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) -The Texas Rangers acquired David Segui to provide Rafael Palmeiro some protection in the batting order and an occasional

break from playing in the field.

What they now have is the American League's top hitter, and a pretty good duo at fivst base.

Segui hit a game-winning, two-run homer in the ninth inning and drove in five runs Wednesday, extending his hitting streak to 13 games and taking over the AL batting lead as the Rangers beat the Seattle Mariners 7-6. Yet Segui doesn't even feel like

he's even in a grove. "There's a time in the year when you feel locked in ... I don't

e e locked in," Segui said. "There's too many strikeouts, and too many bad at-bats I throw away between the

g o o d ones."



He has struck out 19 times this

season, but Segui has gone 23-for-52 (.442) during his 13-game hitting streak, raising his average 40 points to .387. That's enough to overtake Anaheim's Darin Erstad, who went 3-for-5 Wednesday night, but has seen his average drop from .449 to .385 since May 1. "We brought David here to give

Raffy some protection. Little did we know that he would have the lead in the league in hitting," Texas manager Johnny Oates

Segui has been the primary first baseman in the past week, with Palmeiro, a Gold Glove winner, limited to designatedhitter duty because of a strained

hamstring.
With the Rangers trailing 6-5,
Palmeiro set up Segui's walk-off
homer when he reached on a bloop single with one out in the ninth. Seattle second baseman Mark McLemore got a glove on the ball, but couldn't hold on.

Wetteland was warming up for the chance to get the save when Seattle tied the game at 5 on David Bell's two-run double off Tim Crabtree with two outs in the eighth. Wetteland, who had not pitched since Saturday, came out to pitch the ninth with the game

Segui's homer came off Kazuhiro Sasaki (1-1), who got out of a bases-loaded jam in the eighth when he struck out Luis

Segui's RBI single in the first drove in the Rangers' first run. He snapped a 2-2 tie with a two-run single in the fifth after the Mariners opted to intentionally walk Palmeiro to load the bases

Lakers beat Phoenix in final seconds while Indiana leads series 3-0 against Sixers

LOS ANGELES (AP) -Kobe Bryant looked like a young Michael Jordan as he contorted his body, doublepumped, and fired a 15-foot jumper from the left corner of the key with Jason Kidd in his face.

The result was most Jordan-like as the ball swished through the basket with 2.6 seconds remaining. And it gave the Los Angeles Lakers a 97-96 victory over the Phoenix Suns on Wednesday night and a 2-0 lead in their Western Conference semifinal series.

"Kobe is known to make shots like that," teammate Glen Rice said. "Thank God it went in.'

Bryant, who has a long way to go before rivaling Jordan although the resemblance is obvious - acknowledged it was the biggest shot of his fouryear NBA career.

And, he quickly added, "So

"It's a situation you dream of as a kid," said Bryant, who at age 21 isn't far removed from that designation. "It was just like in the backyard, man, everything was going in slow motion. I just tried to go right, cut left, and went up for a jump shot. I think that I had

a hand up, so I had to pull the shot back a little bit."

In the other game Wednesday night, Indiana took a 3-0 lead over Philadelphia with a 97-89 victory. Tonight, it's Portland Utah, with the Trail Blazers ahead 2-0.

"Kobe double-pumped and made a tough shot," Kidd said. "We didn't want him to get to the basket. I thought I played pretty good defense. You've got

to give him credit."
Robinson led the Suns with a career playoff high 30 points, and Hardaway, who missed a desperation shot O'Neal got a piece of as time expired, had 27 points and eight assists.

### Uninsured health bills \$4.7 billion

DALLAS (AP) - Uninsured Texans get \$4.7 billion worth of health care a year — nearly \$1,000 per person — according to a state comptroller estimate.

That's how much doctors, hospitals, charities and governmental entities pay or absorb in unpaid bills for health care sought by the 5 million Texans who do not have health insurance.

Democratic critics of Gov. George W. Bush - the presumptive Republican nominee for the presidency — have noted that millions of Texans lack health coverage. But Bush's de-fenders say the figures show the problem is not as bad as Vice President Al Gore wants voters to believe.

"Texas is being unfairly por-trayed right now because of national politics. When people cited the number of uninsured, the implication is they're not getting health care. The truth is, they are," said Bush health care adviser John Goodman, president of the Dallas-based National Center for Policy Analysis.

### 100 homes in Los Alamos go up in flames as water runs out

LOS ALAMOS, N.M. (AP) — A firestorm swept through the abandoned streets of Los Alamos today, burning at least 100 homes while frustrated firefighters ran short of water and were forced to retreat.

At least 18,000 people were evacuated from Los Alamos, including 7,000 in suburban White Rock this morning. No injuries were reported, but President Clinton declared New Mexico a major disaster area. LOS ALAMOS, N.M. (AP) -

major disaster area.

At the storied Los Alamos National Laboratory, for the first time shut down by fire, flames singed a research building but it did not ignite. Explosives and radioactive material were protected in fireproof facilities, lab officials said.

"We can assure the country and New Mexico that our nuclear materials are safe," waid Energy Secretary Bill Richardson, a former New Mexico congressman.

The fire was set by the National Park Service a week ago to clear brush, but it quickly flared out of control, racing through stands of ponderosa pine as it grew to more than 4,500 acres. Winds gusted to 50 mph Wednesday and forecasters said they could increase today to 60 mph.

Los Alamos, 70 miles north of Albuquerque, is essentially a company town for the federal lab. It sprang up in the 1940s as the base of operations for the Manhattan Project, which built the atomic bomb. There are still military barracks and are still military barracks and military-style housing in Los Alamos, along with relatively upscale, newer developments.

ing visas for highly skilled for-eign workers and granting digi-tal signatures the force of law. "The high-tech industry is the future," said House Speaker Dennis Hastert, R-Ilh. "The last thing we want to do is impede our future with high taxes and excessive government regula-

### Million Mom March' takes aim at guns

WASHINGTON (AP) -While plenty of celebrities will be there Sunday, thousands of ordinary Americans also will spend Mother's Day rallying on the National Mall for the licensing of gun owners and registration of their firearms.

Entertainers, politicians and mothers of children who were fatally shot plan to participate in the "Million Mom March" in Washington and nearly 70 other communities. While traditional gun control groups are involved, organizers have stressed that most participants will be Americans who decided to get out of the house and do something about gun violence.

The day will be emotional and a call to action," said

Donna Dees-Thomases of Short Hills, N.J., a wealthy suburban mother who conceived of the march after a white supremacist opened fire in a Jewish Community Center in Granada Hills, Calif. last August.

Debbye Kelley-Watson of Washington, whose 19-year-old son was shot to death by a teen-ager three years ago, told a news conference on the march Wednesday, "I am turning tears into action."

Hillary Rodham Clinton, running for the Senate from New York, is expected to march as a mom but does not plan to address the rally. President Clinton is expected to participate, but the White House has not decided what

form this would take.

Entertainers and celebrities expected to appear include Rosie O'Donnell, Rosanne Cash, John McEnroe, Emmylou Harris, Susan Sarandon and Melissa Etheridge.

The primary pro-gun group, the National Rifle Association, is not ready to concede the spotlight to images of gun control supporters pushing their children in strollers down the Mall.

The NRA has begun an ad campaign that portrays its members as mainstream Americans who want to bring gun safety lessons to the nation's classrooms.

In television and newspaper ads running across the

country this week, the NRA dismisses policy disagreements as "gun politics" and says it will spend \$1 million to educate children about gun safety.

March supporters contend that a requirement for a gun license and registration of the weapon would not be any more burdensome than a driver's license and vehicle registra-

The licensing system would require purchasers to receive basic safety training and is designed to prevent sales to criminals, children or disturbed individuals.

Guns would be registered after sellers checked the buyer's license and then registered the gun's serial num-
