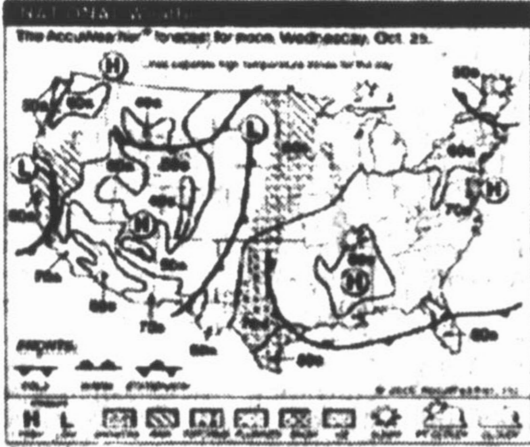

• Severe weather hits •

Thunderstorms erupted in parts of Texas on Monday, causing some flooded roads and hail the size of pingpong balls. The Panhandle was hit with at least two tornadoes.

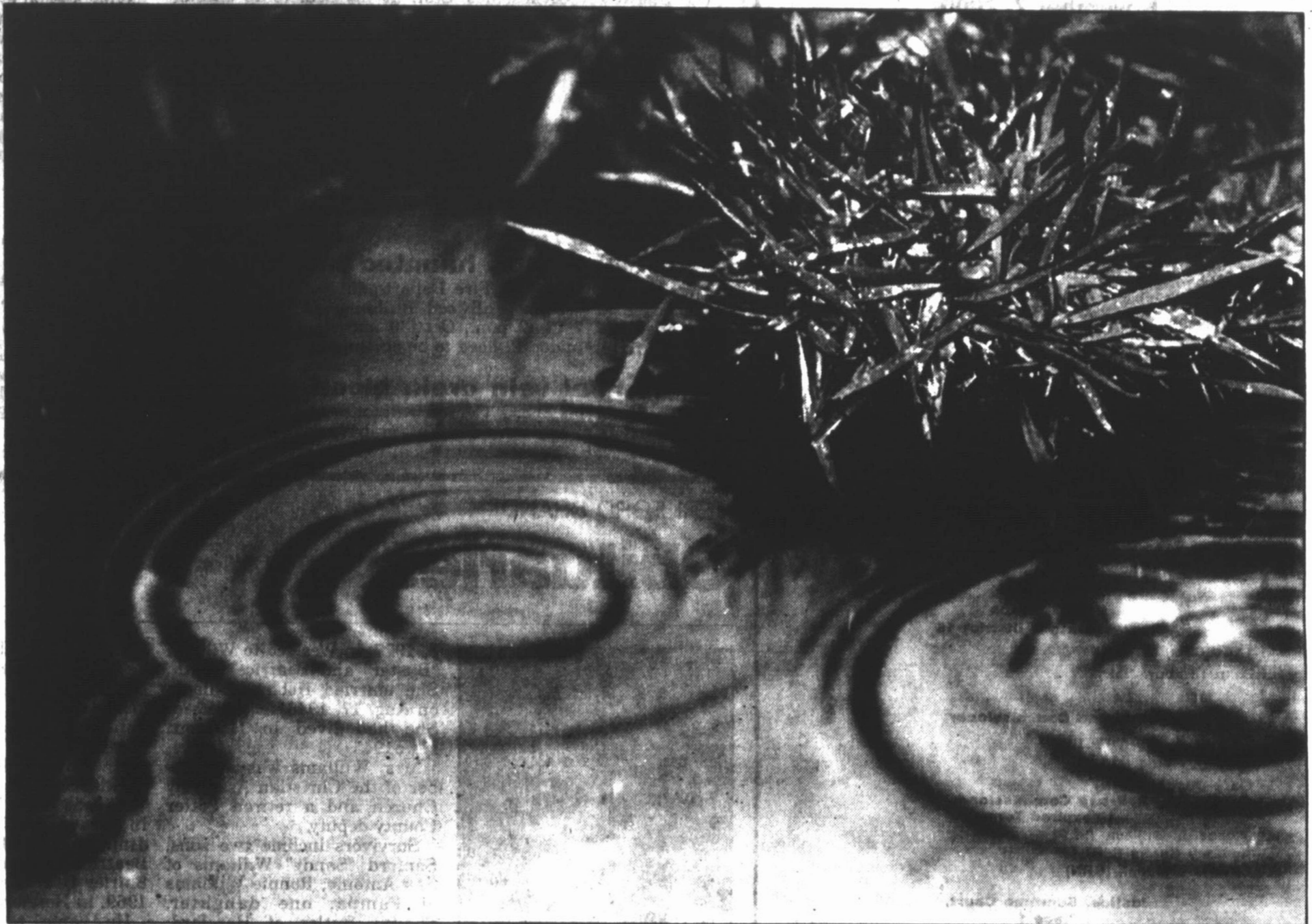
Forecasters said the severe weather probably isn't over yet.

Scattered thunderstorms are expected in parts of North Texas on Tuesday. High temperatures should reach into the upper 70s and lower 80s.

A flash flood warning remains in effect for the Hill Country and south Central Texas through the end of Tuesday. Scattered showers and thunderstorms also are expected along the coastal bend and possibly in deep South Texas.

Most of West Texas also is expected to see heavy rain today. Highs in the Panhandle should only reach into the 60s, but elsewhere high temperatures should be mostly in the 70s.

Heavy rains triggered a flash flood warning on Monday in the Panhandle. Temperatures were mostly in the 60s or 70s.

2,4-D ■ Committee of cotton, grain producers to work out recommendation on herbicide's restriction

The ingredients were in place Monday morning for an explosion that didn't happen.

Because of interest in a possible ban on use of the herbicide 2,4-D during the cotton season, the Deaf Smith County commissioners moved part of their meeting to the third-floor district courtroom, which can hold more people than the commissioners courtroom on the second floor.

Cotton producers are seeking the 2,4-D ban because the herbicide, which is used by grain producers to control weeds, damages cotton plants. Proponents and opponents of the ban attended the commissioners' meeting to express their opinions. Also attending were representatives of the Texas Department of Agriculture and the Texas Extension Service.

Dale Kleuskens of Dawn said his cotton crop was severely damaged by 2,4-D.

"If the system were working, there wouldn't be 2,4-D damage," Kleuskens said. "It's widespread, all across the county. It's a deterrent

to cotton farming in Deaf Smith County the way the system is working."

The cotton producers are asking the county to ban all products containing 2,4-D (dichlorophenoxyacetic acid) between the end of April and the first of October.

County Judge Tom Simons said the commissioners would like to find a common ground. He suggested the producers meet with representatives of TDA and the extension service to see what could be worked out on the matter.

"Is that possible? You guys are all in the same business, no matter what you're growing," Simons said.

Following further discussion, in which both sides of the issue spoke, Simons asked for volunteers to serve on an ex-officio committee to hammer out a recommendation for the commissioners.

Simons also said the committee doesn't have much time to develop a proposal because it has to be adopted by the county commission by Dec. 31 to become effective in the next growing season.

Producers who agreed to serve on the eight-member committee are Ronny Owen, Joe Perrin, Dennis Brown, Mike Brumley, Dick Fellers, Craig Solomon, Clyde Broman and Harold Sides. Shawn Davis of the agriculture department and Brent Beene of the extension service research station at Bushland agreed to serve as advisers.

According to the state agriculture department, Deaf Smith County already has a prohibition on the use of all butyl ester formulations of 2,4-D and/or all high volatile formulations of 2,4-D between April 15 and Oct. 1 each year. The cotton producers were seeking to expand that ban to all 2,4-D formulations.

In other business, the commissioners:

- Approved bond for Lucy Lopez, a new employee in the district clerk's office;
- Approved a request to install a water line across a county road in Precinct 1; and
- Took no action on the Deaf Smith County Public Library's request to sell old card catalogs. The county had sought bids, but received none.

Band's performance in eye of beholder

■ Split-decision gives Mighty Maroon Band a disappointing rating

At least one-third of the judging panel scored the Hereford High School Mighty Maroon Band's playing and marching as superior and worthy of a Division I rating at the Region I UIL Marching Band Contest at Dick Bivins Stadium in Amarillo.

Unfortunately, scoring is by majority rule in the highly subjective event. Two other judges saw and heard things differently. Their scoring gave the Mighty Maroon Band a Division II "Excellent" rating and handed a young HHS band its second consecutive dose of disappointment.

Judges for Saturday night's marching competition included Rodney Klett of Georgetown, Greg Miller of Iowa Park, and Bill Woods of Abilene.

The same loud, proud, brassy sound of the Mighty Maroon's "Olympic Montage" that brought audiences to their feet at halftime performances at football games and at a Plainview band competition apparently fell on some unappreciative ears when the



Mighty Maroon's performance was evaluated by the panel of judges Saturday night.

Hereford's Mighty Maroon wasn't the only band that had a hard time winning over the majority of the judges.

The Canyon High School band saw its string of consecutive Division I ratings snapped at 32 Saturday night as it received a Division II rating. The Caprock High School Band was

also given a Division II in the AAAA class, and even AAAAA Tascosa High was awarded only a Division II.

The ratings announcements left HHS band members, their directors, parents and band boosters stunned with disappointment at the marks. Band members had worked extra hours for months in preparation for the contest.

HHS Band Director Gary Owens

and his staff met with the 175-member band Monday afternoon to help their young charges get past the disappointment and set their course for the next few weeks.

"We viewed the video of Saturday night's performance and talked about integrity, quality of performance, and handling our individual responsibilities. The kids know they did well Saturday night, and that's the most important thing," Owens said.

"We thought we had the caliber of performance to receive a Division I. I'm disappointed for the kids, but certainly not in them. They worked their hearts out on the program. We made some small mistakes in our program and ran into some tough judges," he said.

HHS band members voted by a large majority to continue doing their popular "Olympic Montage" program in coming weeks.

"We're thinking maybe we want to

play it even louder," Owens quipped.

The first-year HHS band director was clearly puzzled by some of the judges' remarks concerning the Mighty Maroon's performance Saturday night, particularly concerning their level of sound.

Woods credited the HHS performance as a "big open show with audience appeal," but said the Mighty Maroon needed to "work on the finesse connected with the event."

He went on to rate the HHS band as "a bit boisterous" (too loud) and said "lack of dynamic contrasts hurt the show."

Owens' take on those remarks was that Woods would have preferred the band to play a greater range of sounds, including more soft music.

On his written score sheet, Woods commented that "too many band members were out of step during the performance, and marching in-step is a must!"

"Our future is looking good. We have lots of good musicians coming up, and they've learned an important lesson about what it takes to be rated at the top."

Dear Ann Landers: One year ago, my mother was diagnosed with ovarian cancer. She died four months later. To honor her, I would like

to make more women aware of this terrible disease. This year alone, over 25,000 women will be diagnosed with ovarian cancer. They have a 50 percent chance of surviving five years. The survival rate could approach 95 percent, but unfortunately, only 25 percent of women are diagnosed early enough.

Women and medical professionals across America need to be educated about this disease. The most common symptoms include:

- Abdominal pressure, bloating or discomfort
 - Nausea, indigestion or gas
 - Unexplained weight gain or loss, particularly in the pelvic or abdominal area.
 - Pelvic or abdominal swelling, bloating and/or feeling of fullness.
 - Urinary frequency, constipation or diarrhea
 - Abnormal bleeding
 - Shortness of breath
 - Pain during intercourse
 - Unusual fatigue
- My mother had most of these symptoms a year before she was diagnosed. When she complained to her doctor, she

was told it was irritable bowel syndrome. She went into the hospital to have a polyp removed from her colon, and the surgeon discovered the advanced cancer.

You've printed information on ovarian cancer in the past. Please get the word out again. If this letter can save just one life, I will be forever grateful. — Sheila in Dayton, Ohio

Dear Sheila: Thank you for a letter that could make an enormous difference for many women. And now, dear readers, if you see yourself in Sheila's letter, PLEASE get a checkup at once. Early detection could save your life.

Cardinals show Tobin the door

48-7 loss to Cowboys last straw for Arizona coach

TEMPE, Ariz. (AP) — Vince Tobin, who coached Arizona to its first playoff victory in 51 years two seasons ago, was fired Monday, a day after the Cardinals lost to the Dallas Cowboys 48-7.

Defensive coordinator Dave McGinnis was named interim coach for the remainder of the season.

"We decided that it would be in the interest of the team to make a coaching change," owner Bill Bidwill said at a news conference. "I felt it was time."

"Tobin is a very fine man," Bidwill said. "He's worked

very, very hard here. I wish him well in the future."

Bidwill said McGinnis will be considered for a permanent job after the season.

"Dave McGinnis brings a great deal of experience and enthusiasm to the job," Bidwill said. "We anticipate that hopefully there will be a different Cardinal team on the field this Sunday."

McGinnis said he was honored by the faith Bidwill placed in him.

"If they come to you with the job, take it and run with it, take it and run with it, and that is what I intend to do," he said. "I took this football job because I believe in the players we have here."

Quarterback Jake Plummer said he was sad to see Tobin

go, but excited to work with McGinnis.

"I think you're going to see a fired-up ball club that's going to be ready to play," Plummer said.

Tobin's firing came with the Cardinals in last place in the NFC East and two weeks before a vote in Maricopa County on a proposed \$331 million stadium for the team.

Tobin had a 29-44 record in 41/2 seasons as head coach. In 1998, he directed the team to a 9-7 regular season, its only winning campaign since the franchise moved to Arizona from St. Louis in 1988.

The Cardinals made the playoffs for the first time since 1982, then beat the Cowboys in Dallas for their first playoff victory since the

NFL championship game 51 years earlier.

However, the team stumbled to 6-10 last season and was 2-5 this year.

Plummer said he would always be grateful to Tobin for making him a starter as a rookie and sticking with him through some tough times.

"Obviously you can't fire 54 players," Plummer said. "The sick thing is we are good, talented football players. You look at the guys we have, a lot of them could start on other teams. Why is

it not happening? We have to find that answer."

"Whether Coach was a scapegoat or not, we still have nine games left, we have to find an answer and get it done and win this weekend."

The loss in Dallas was the Cardinals' largest margin of defeat since 1981, and team president William Bidwill would not endorse Tobin afterward.

"We're all disappointed, but now is not the time to go beyond that," William Bidwill said.

Defensive end Andre Wadsworth, still not playing while recovering from knee surgery, said he noticed that the morale had been at its lowest the past couple of weeks.

"As the head coach, he takes the brunt of everything," Wadsworth said. "You can't blame him for everything. He's part of it, but we're all to blame."

Tobin, quiet and mild-mannered, was often referred to in the local media as "Coach Beige."

McClendon to skipper Pirates

McClendon the fifth African-American head coach in majors

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Lloyd McClendon, the hitting coach on former Pittsburgh manager Gene Lamont's staff for four years, will be hired Monday as the Pirates' manager. The Associated Press has learned.

A source inside the Pirates organization, speaking on condition of anonymity, confirmed that McClendon would be the next manager.

McClendon took an overnight flight to Pittsburgh from Phoenix, where he is managing in the Arizona Fall League, to be introduced at a 4 p.m.

news conference.

McClendon, 41, a former Pirates player who hit 244 in an eight-year major league career, will become the fifth black manager in the major leagues, joining the Giants' Dusty Baker, the Cubs' Don Baylor, the White Sox's Jerry Manuel and the Brewers' Davey Lopes.

The Pirates are coming off a 93-loss season — their eighth consecutive losing season, the organization's longest such streak since the mid-1950s.

McClendon, known for his abilities to motivate and work with younger players, has no major- or minor-league managing experience, although he managed the Lancaster Stealth to the California League fall championship last year.

The Pirates have declined to comment publicly on their

managerial search for nearly a week since they wrapped up 10 interviews, including those with former Arizona manager Buck Showalter and three major league bench coaches, Ron Wotus of San Francisco, Grady Little of Cleveland and Ken Macha of Oakland.

However, after the Pirates told some candidates, including Showalter, they would not get back to them until after the World Series, they began calling other candidates early Monday to tell them they had picked a new manager.

McClendon also had what he called an excellent interview with the Philadelphia Phillies, and the Pirates may have moved to prevent the Phillies from hiring him.

McClendon played in the majors for the Reds (1987-88), the Cubs (1989-90) and the Pirates (1990-94).

the same way. But that game ended far earlier than this one, which stretched until 1:20 a.m. EDT.

The Jets rallied with a precision they totally lacked for the first three quarters — and against a defense that had yielded just 51 points and three TDs the entire season.

"I thought New England was a great comeback, but this was incredible," Chrebet said. "We took it upon ourselves and made the plays when we had to. It was gutcheck at halftime and we decided to go out swinging."

They scored a knockout of Miami's brilliant defense, which crumbled in the fourth quarter. That unit allowed 30 points in the fourth quarter, when the Jets had 20 first downs; Miami one.

It was the first time since 1981, when Atlanta did it, that a team scored 30 points or more in a fourth period.

Testaverde hit Laveranues Coles for a 30-yard score, the rookie's first NFL touchdown; found rookie Jermaine Wiggins for a 1-yard TD, his first pro score; hit Chrebet for 24 yards to tie it at 30 with 3:55 to go; then con-

nected with the 300-pound Elliott to tie it at 37.

Testaverde finished 36-of-59 for 378 yards, five TDs and three interceptions.

Jay Fiedler, looking early in the game much like the legend he replaced, connected with Leslie Shepherd for a 46-yard TD one play after Chrebet's touchdown. That score was set up by Brock Marion's 47-yard kickoff return.

Dan Marino often beat the Jets with his arm, and Fiedler appeared to have done it, too. He also had a 42-yard TD throw to Shepherd in the first half and ran an efficient offense for three quarters.

But the Jets displayed the fortitude and resilience that has marked their season by staging yet another comeback.

Lamar Smith paced a surprisingly crisp Miami attack that gained 299 yards in the first half alone.

Smith scored on runs of 68 and 3 yards and finished

with 155 yards. Oronde Gadsden caught seven passes for 119 yards.

The Dolphins thoroughly befuddled New York on both sides of the ball for most of the game. And as hot as the Jets were later, the Dolphins were at the outset. They led 17-0 and gained 207 yards in the opening 15 minutes — the most by any NFL team in the opening period this season.

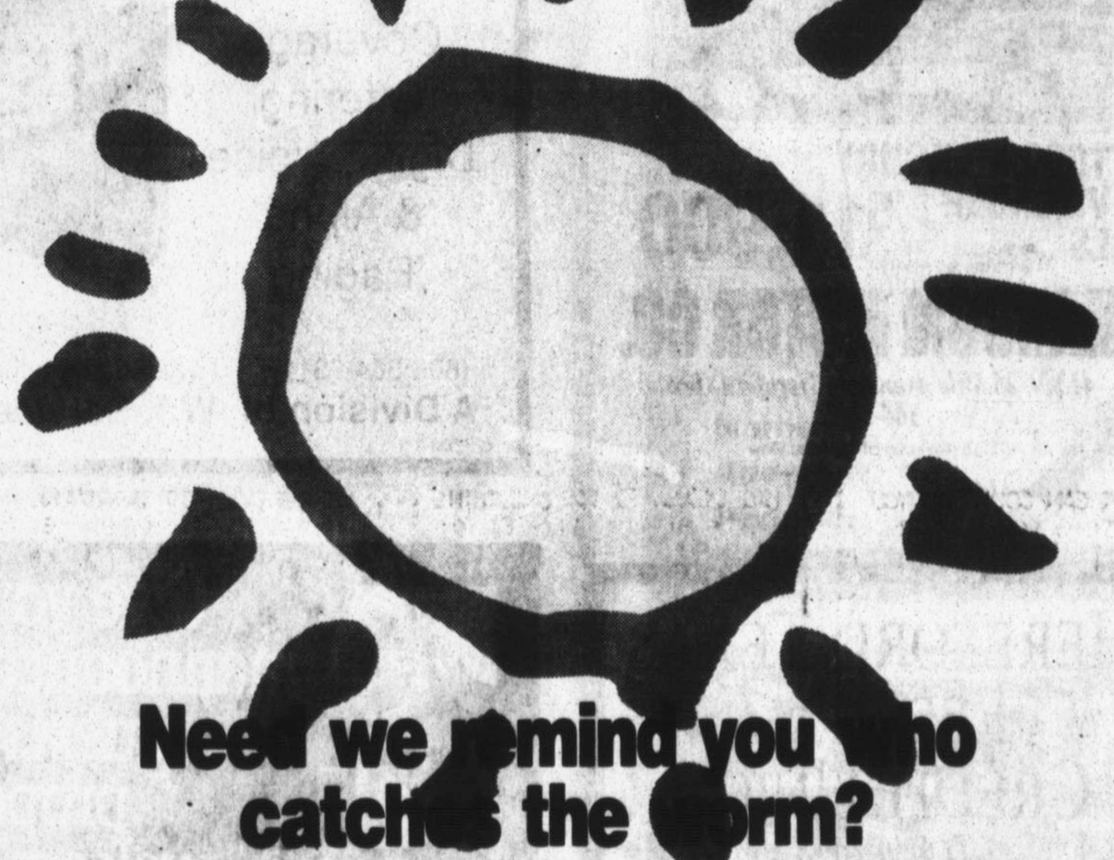
It took the Jets until 8:04 elapsed in the second quarter to register a first down. By the end of the long night, however, they had become unstoppable.

Writing Want Ads that really sell!

Unsure how to write a Classified Ad that will get results? Follow these pointers and you'll soon have an empty space in your storage room and cash in your pocket. For starters, look at ads which offer the same item/products. Get a sense of going rates and ideas for how to make your ad stand out. Once you're ready to write, begin with exactly what you're selling: "Dining room set, maple, six chairs." Then remember these hints:

- Give the price. A newspaper consultant says 70 percent of classified readers won't respond to an ad with no price.
- Use key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type of construction, number of bedrooms and baths, and condition.
- Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed by the words, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.
- Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual when you write. Be sure to include a phone number and the best times to reach you.

PYONGYANG, North Korea — Secretary of State Madeleine Albright and North Korean leader Kim Jong Il opened a second round of talks Tuesday aimed at easing a half-century of enmity and mistrust dating back to the Korean War. During the first day of talks Monday, the two discussed issues including North Korea's missile development program and its export of missiles to Iran and Syria. Prior to Tuesday's meeting with Kim, Albright ventured out into the countryside for a lunch hosted by Jo Myong Rok, Kim's top aide, at a rural guest house.

Barak looks at coalition with Israeli hard-liner
JERUSALEM — With peace receding as clashes intensified, Prime Minister Ehud Barak appealed Monday to hawkish opposition leader Ariel Sharon to join a coalition government, a move that further dashed hopes of reconciliation. Fighting continued into Tuesday in the divided West Bank city of Hebron. A 55-year-old Palestinian man was killed at his house when he was hit in the head by gunfire. The fighting sparked by Sharon's visit on Sept. 28 to a disputed holy site in Jerusalem. Since then, 124 people have been killed, the vast majority of them Palestinians.

Nader ads tell voters don't waste votes on Bush, Gore
WASHINGTON — Ralph Nader supporters are being told in a new ad campaign that a "vote for Nader is not a vote for Bush." The Green Party candidate currently draws about 4 percent in national polls, and some Democrats fear he could siphon enough votes from Democrat Al Gore to give Texas Gov. George W. Bush the edge in several states with close races. Full-page ads scheduled to run Thursday are trying to convince such voters otherwise. "The message is, if you live in a state where one or the other major-party candidates has a lock, and you're

not happy with the way things are going, your only effective vote is for Nader because that adds up in the national total and can bring him millions of dollars for 2004," said Greg MacArthur, whose group, Citizens for Strategic Voting, paid \$320,000 for the ads.

Chinese police torture protest leader to death
BEIJING — Police have tortured to death an organizer of one of the largest uprisings against Chinese rule in China's restive Muslim northwest, according to a separatist group. Abduhelil Abdulmejit, imprisoned 44 months ago and repeatedly interrogated and tortured, died Oct. 17 in the Chapchal Su Detention Center in the Xinjiang region's Yili county, said the East Turkistan Information Center, based in Germany. A detention center official confirmed Abduhelil Abdulmejit's death but said he died from pneumonia at the central prison in Yining, Yili's county seat, not at the detention center.

Congress seeks to establish memorial to Indians slaughtered at Sand Creek

DENVER (AP) — The scores of American Indians killed in a U.S. Army massacre 136 years ago will be memorialized under legislation sponsored by a descendant of the victims and awaiting President Clinton's signature. The bill was passed by voice vote Monday in the House and by the Senate earlier. Clinton has indicated he would sign it. "Fewer than 5 percent of all the bills that are introduced each year become law. The fact that this one did in a matter of weeks is a testament to the overwhelming acknowledgment by Americans that we are better than our past," Sen. Ben Nighthorse Campbell, R-Colo., said.

Campbell's ancestors were among the more than 150 Cheyenne and Arapaho Indians who died Nov. 29, 1864, when nearly 1,000 men under the command of Col. John M. Chivington surrounded hundreds of Indians camped on the banks of the creek. Historians say when the first shots were fired, Cheyenne Chief Black Kettle raised an American flag and a white cloth of truce. It drew more fire. One soldier, Capt. Silas Soule, later described to Congress the gruesome scene where troops slaughtered Cheyenne and Arapaho women, children and elderly men. "It was hard to see little children on their knees have their brains beat out by men professing to be civilized," wrote Soule, whose words were retold by Campbell this summer in hearings on creating the memorial. The 1865 congressional probe sparked by Soule and other witnesses condemned the massacre, but those involved were never punished and promised reparations were never paid. Soule was assassinated in Denver shortly after testifying. David Halaas, Colorado state historian, said the massacre ignited 12 years of wars with Indians, who had become convinced the government wanted to kill them all. Sand Creek's impact culminated 12 years later at Little Big Horn, where Lt. Col. George Custer and his 7th Cavalry unit were massacred, he said. The Sand Creek Massacre Historical Site, to be located on 12,480 acres of rolling prairie 160 miles southeast of Denver, will be the first to memorialize one of the half-dozen major massacres of peaceful Indians in the West. Indians have long said the number of sites honoring settlers and soldiers in the West fail to recognize their side of the story. A Colorado town near the massacre site is named for Chivington.

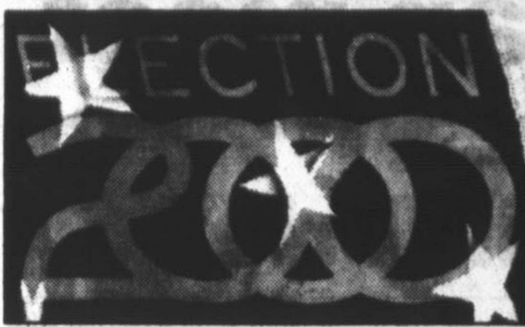
Owens points out the HHS band is young, with 60-plus freshmen, and an equal number of sophomores within its 175-member company.

"Our future is looking good. We have lots of good musicians coming up, and they've learned an important lesson about what it takes to be rated at the top," he said.

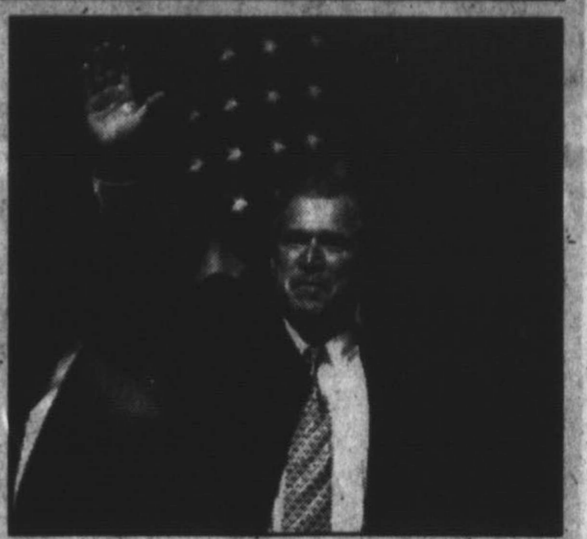

Bush, Gore sharpen attacks on records



MILWAUKEE (AP) — With neither candidate yet able to seize a decisive lead, George W. Bush and Al Gore are sharpening their attacks in the final two weeks of the presidential campaign.

With polls suggesting a cliffhanger outcome on Election Day, Republican Bush and Democrat Gore were going after undecided voters and crossing each other's campaign paths.

Bush was campaigning today in Illinois and in Gore's home state of Tennessee — states that went Democratic in 1996 but where Republicans think they have a good chance this year.

Gore also was to be in Tennessee, which he should have wrapped up by now but where polls show an unexpectedly tight race. He also planned events in Louisiana and Arkansas.

In Little Rock, Ark., the

vice president planned to explain his views on how the federal government can help continue the nation's prosperity going by becoming smaller, smarter and more efficient. He will also suggest that Texas' bureaucracy with Bush as governor has become more bloated even as the federal government has

tightened its belt, aides said.

Surrogates also were stepping up their assault on Bush's record in Texas, arguing it offers a model for what he'd do as president. Bush was expected to defend his record and emphasize his proposal for a \$1.3 trillion across-the-board tax cut.

On Monday, Bush said Gore as president would be the "obstacle in chief," fighting against school, tax and Social Security reform. Gore stuck mostly to his prosperity theme but argued that Bush hopes to "run out the clock" on the Nov. 7 election to avoid issues people care about.

Bush was campaigning in the Chicago suburbs Tuesday with a group of Republican governors, part of a team 28 GOP governors who are barn-

storming for Bush this week.

Gore has led Bush in polls in Illinois, which has 22 electoral votes, but recent surveys show Bush closing in.

Illinois Gov. George F. Ryan, one of those on the cross-country tour, said Bush's "persuasive powers" may help him capture the state.

Even though Gore enjoys a slight edge, Ryan said in an interview, "There's a good chance we can carry the state. We have strong support in southern Illinois, usually a strong Democratic area, and the Chicago suburbs will come along."

With two weeks to go, "I can't do it without you," Bush told thousands of boisterous supporters Monday night at packed rally in Milwaukee, urging them to find independents and "open-minded Democrats" and bring them to the polls.

He said their message to

the undecideds should be: "You tell them that this nation can do better, you tell them that our agenda is crystal-clear."

Recent polls show Bush gaining in Wisconsin, usually a Democratic bastion with 11 electoral votes.

"We love you, Mr. President!" a woman shouted to Bush from the crowd. "Behave yourself," he fired back with a grin.

Bush also issued a solid vote of confidence to his top national security adviser, Condoleezza Rice, and gave the clearest signal yet that she would have a top spot in a Bush administration.

"I'm a better candidate with her at my side," Bush said, sharing the stage with Rice. "If all goes well, she'll make a big difference for the secu-

rity of this country." Rice is widely expected to head the National Security Council if Bush is elected.

Her remarks over the weekend about a pullout of troops from Bosnia and Kosovo produced sharp criticism from Gore, who accused the Bush team of "playing politics with national security."
