More questions are raised about justice system in the state

LIVINGSTON (AP) - A Northwestern University journalism professor whose students have helped exonerate death row inmates in Illinois is now hoping to do the same

for a Texas inmate. Henry Watkins Skinner, 38, was convicted in 1995 of bludgeoning his girlfriend, Twila Jean Busby, 40, with an ax handle and then fatally stabbing her two mentally impaired sons at their Texas Panhandle home in

Mark Protess, the professor investigating the case, says Skinner's trial defense was inadequate and forensic testing was incomplete.

"It's a textbook case of a miscarriage of justice where you have the lethal recipe of police and prosecutorial misconduct, defense ineptitude and judicial indifference,"

Texas, which leads all other states in executions, has become the national focus of the death penalty debate, in part because of Gov. George W. Bush's presidential campaign. About a dozen executions are scheduled between now and the Nov. 7 election.

Skinner maintains his innocence. His case is under federal appeal and an execution date has not been

The Taxmen waiteth

Five taxing entities are waiting for the revised figures from the Deaf Smith County Appraisal District as they begin putting together their budgets for the next fiscal

Although the district presented its annual appraisals to the county, City of Hereford, Hereford Independent School District, Deaf Smith County Hospital District and Walcott School District last month, property owners who contested the tax value placed on their properties had an opportunity on Tuesday to present their arguments to the county's Appraisal Review Board.

Chief Appraiser Danny Jones said the reviews generally result in some lowered appraisals of properties, which would reduce the tax base

available for the taxing entities. The appraisal review board (ARB)

is an independent panel of residents responsible for hearing and settling protests for property owners who disagree with some action by the appraisal district. The notice includes instructions on how and when to file a protest and a protest form.

The Deaf Smith County Appraisal District mailed 4,100 letters last month to county property owners showing their proposed appraised value for 2000. When the appraisals were sent out, Jones said two years of drought during the latter part of

the 1990s had an adverse effect on the Deaf Smith County tax base as the value of agricultural land fall by about \$6 million last year. Within the Hereford Independent School District, the value of agricultural land fell by about \$7 million.

In determining the value of agricultural land, the appraisal district includes a five-year average of crop

Crop yields (and value) were down in 1997 and 1998 because of drought, but when the appraisers begin work

on the 2001 valuations, the 1999 crop year will be the base - and the yields higher than 1997 and 1998.

Tax abatements also cost the county and school district about \$3 million each.

Archer-Daniels-Midland, built a grain-handling complex near the junction of U.S Highway 60 and County Road 1, and Bimbo Cereal Foods Inc.'s masa mill near Dawn, received 50 percent, five-year tax abatements.

Because of the abatement, both companies will be taxed on half of the value of their properties. The taxable value of ADM is \$1,889,500; Bimbo's taxable value is \$4,301,960.

When the district completed its reappraisal of residential property, it had determined an increased value of about \$9 million within the county.

The residential increase within HISD was pegged at \$8 million, with



U.S. economy surges 5.5% in first quarter

WASHINGTON (AP) - The U.S. economy, buoyed by hardy consumer spending, grew at a robust 5.5 percent annual rate in the first three months of 2000, but a key inflation gauge posted the biggest gain in more than five years.

The January-through-March increase in the gross domestic product, the nation's total output of goods and services, showed the economy growing slightly faster than the 5.4 percent rate of the government's two previous estimates, the Commerce Department said Thursday.

Many analysts had expected the final reading on first-quarter GDP growth --- which is based on more data --- to remain at the 5.4 percent rate. In the fourth quarter, the economy grew at a sizzling 7.3 percent

An inflation gauge tied to the GDP and closely watched by Fed Chairman Alan Greenspan rose at an annual rate of 3.5 percent in the first quarter. That was the biggest increase since 3.5 percent in the third quarter of 1994. The 3.5 percent first-quarter increase has not been exceeded since a 3.6 percent gain in the first quarter of 1992.

The inflation figure was slightly higher than the government estimated one month ago and significantly above the 2.5 percent of the fourth quarter. Surging energy prices accounted for most of the gain.
"It's not good news, but I don't think it's alarming," said William

Cheney, an economist with John Hancock. That's because excluding energy and food, the inflation measure rose just 2.2 percent, suggesting most other prices were in check, he said. The Federal Reserve has raised interest rates six times over the past

12 months in an effort to slow the economy and keep inflation from escalating. The Fed, amid signs of a slowing, decided Wednesday not to boost rates for a seventh time.

The report urged more attention by governments to the impact of World Trade Organization negotiations on human rights.

But it questioned the inclusion of labor standards in future global trade agreements, saying that it "is far from likely to be a panacea for

Archbishop released unhurt

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — The 40-year-old unemployed immigrant was extremely frustrated at not being able to access documents related to his possible deportation. So, police say, he let the world know by taking hostage an outspoken advocate for immigrants' rights.

Law enforcement officials and Catholic leaders were at a loss to explain why the man chose Archbishop Patrick Flores, who is known as a friend to immigrants and the poor.

"I don't think he really knew what he wanted," Police Chief Al Philippus said of the man accused in Wednesday's nine-hour standoff at the archbishop's chancery.

Nelson Antonio Escolero, an immigrant from El Salvador who has been living in the United States legally for many years but is not a citizen, was in police custody early Thursday. Flores, the state's top-ranking Catholic clergyman, was released unharmed around 7 p.m. Wednesday.

DEATH ROW APPEAL: Lawyers for a Texas death row inmate set to be executed Thursday are saying the penalty phase of their client's trial was tainted with racial stereotypes promoted by both prosecutors and a court appointed defense attorney. The attorneys are asking that Jessy Carlos San Miguel be resentenced. But the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals and the state parole board have turned down his lawyers' attempts to stop the execution. ... CONFEDERATE FLAG: Confederate heritage groups upset over the removal of two plaques from the state Supreme Court building take their protest to the state General Services Commission. The groups have already filed a lawsuit and were expected to attend the agency's monthly board meeting on Wednesday. ...LATINO LOTTO SCAM: The Texas Lottery Commission warned Wednesday about a scam aimed at elderly Hispanics and perpetrated by thieves claiming they want to exchange a winning lottery

ticket for money to travel back to their home country. The scheme has taken place in at least eight Texas cities and has resulted in \$139,000 in losses, officials said.

Professor develops kudzu killer

RUSTON, La. (AP) - A nally Louisiana Tech professor has patented a fungus that kills kudzu as well as other weeds.

"A lot of chemical pesticides are being taken off the market," said Lynn Walker, whose research has been coordinated with the U.S. Department of Agriculture. "Others are being restricted, and we're looking for alternative ways to control pests, particularly weeds."

The patent covers a mi-crobe that will kill kudzu and other weeds like sicklepod, which assails soybeans and peanuts. If used on sicklepods, Walker said, the fungus can safely be applied beneath the crop's canopy. Walker and two of his

graduate students obtained the initial patent in 1998. Now, with USDA help, Walker is pursuing another patent that centers solely on kudzu.

The result will be a joint patent between Tech and the USDA, but will still fall under the umbrella of Walker's origi-

Kudzu, native to eastern Asia, was introduced into the United States in the 1876 Centennial Exposition in Philadelphia. The government origi-

Georgia and Mississippi.
According to USDA statistics, kudzu spreads about 120,000 acres a year and potential losses are estimated at \$336 million annually; forested areas especially suffer.

The problem has grown so big that the government declared kudzu a noxious weed in 1998, which means its movement over state boundaries is restricted.

Walker is seeking to treat the problem through nature itself. His method of controlling kudzu centers on the fungus Myrothecium verrucaria.

"Normally, this fungus is not a pathogen," Walker said. "It grows naturally on dead organic matter in soil and on decaying wood products."

When applied to unwanted weeds, the fungus was found to effectively control up to 100

Texas schedules another execution

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) - The carnage inside the walk-in freezer at a Dallasarea Taco Bell was so overwhelming, the police officer who discovered the four bodies fainted.

And there was so much blood on the floor, authorities had to use a squeegee to locate the spent cartridges from the murder weapon.

"It was just a cold-blooded methodical execution of four people," Toby Shook, an assistant district attorney in Dallas County who prosecuted the case, said of the January 1991 shooting deaths during a robbery of the Irving restaurant.

Jessy Carlos San Miguel,

28, a 10th-grade dropout with a history of mayhem, was set for execution Thursday evening for the shooting spree that left the assistant manager of the fast-food place dead along with two employees and a friend of one of the work-

San Miguel's punishment was attracting none of the fanfare that a week ago accompanied the lethal injection of convicted killer Gary Graham, whose claims of innocence drew hundreds of protesters and media to Huntsville and put Gov. George W. Bush's support of the death penalty under intense national scrutiny.





OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — David Segui delivered the key hit and Mike Venafro delivered the key pitch. Combined they ended the Texas Rangers' road woes.

Segui's two-run double highlighted a five-run fifth inning and Rick Helling snapped a six-game losing streak as the Rangers beat the Oakland Athletics 5-3 Wednesday night.

Venafro pitched out of a bases-loaded jam to preserve the lead.

Ivan Rodriguez, Rafael Palmeiro and Dave Martinez each had two hits and an RBI for the Rangers, who won for just the second time in 11 road games. Texas still has the second-worst road record in the AL at 13-22.





Prescription drug issue moves to Senate

WASHINGTON — Republicans are hailing their House-passed prescription drug bill as a historic new Medicare benefit, but its prospects

are iffy in the Senate and President Clinton has threatened a veto to force major changes in a measure Democrats claim is an electionyear scam.

This plan is sound, it is in Medicare, it is an entitlement program and it is a guaranteed benefit," Rep. Bill Thomas, R-Calif., a chief ar-chitect of the GOP plan, said Wednesday night as the measure cleared the House in a close, mostly party-line vote, 217-214.

House Speaker Dennis Hastert, R-Ill., said he had received assurances from Senate Majority Leader Trent

"We've always said we're willing to sit down with the president," Hastert said.

Meanwhile, Senate Finance Committee Chairman William Roth, R-Del., said his panel was working behind closed doors on bipartisan Medicare legislation he would like to begin action on in July, after Congress returns from its Independence Day break.

Committee Democrat Sen. Jay Rockefeller of West Virginia said he wasn't confident that the result would be a viable bill, however.

"Are we going to have a better chance of compromise after the July Fourth recess? I very much doubt it," Rockefeller said.

GOP 'partial-birth' abortion ban may be ready to move forward

WASHINGTON - Republicans in Congress soon may push forward with legislation that would ban so-called partial-birth abortions now that the Supreme Court has given guidance on how to make such a bill constitutionally valid.

On Wednesday, the nation's highest court threw out Nebraska's ban, saying it violates women's constitutional rights by imposing an

"undue burden" on their decisions to end their pregnancies.

GOP lawmakers, who have been waiting on this decision, now will take the ruling and rework their already-approved "partial-birth" ban in hopes of avoiding any constitutional questions.

"This opinion will be studied intensely," House Judiciary Committee Chairman Henry Hyde, R-Ill., said.

One of the things that the court said made the Nebraska law unconstitutional — the lack of an exemption to protect the health of the

mother — also is not in the GOP bills as they now stand in the House and Senate.

But President Clinton likely will get a rewritten bill before this year's presidential election. He vetoed legislation on the matter in 1996 and 1997, stating that it did not provide adequate exceptions to protect the health of the mother.

The House both times voted to override the veto but the Senate failed to come up with the necessary two-thirds majority for an override.

British, U.S. jets hit Iraq

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — U.S. and British warplanes bombed sites in southern Iraq on Thursday, killing one person and injuring another, the official Iraqi

News Agency said.
The U.S. and British armed forces confirmed they attacked Iraqi military positions, but said they had no word on casualties.

The Iraqi report said the attack took place in North Rumeila, the site of Iraq's most productive oil field. Its wells account for about half of Irag's production of nearly 3 million barrels a day.

The agency did not give the target of the strike and it was not immediately known whether any oil installations were hit. Oil Ministry officials were not

available for comment.

U.S. F-16 and British Tornado fighter-bombers attacked a missile battery at Qal'at Sukkar, 130 miles southeast of Baghdad, and two anti-aircraft gun sites at Rumeila, 225 miles southeast of Baghdad, at about 7:20 a.m. Iraqi time, said Maj. Joe LaMarca, a spokesman for the U.S. Central Command.

"These strikes were in response to violations of the nofly zone, specifically against anti-aircraft artillery fire against coa-lition aircraft on Wednesday," LaMarca said.

"We don't target civilian populations or infrastructure and we seek to avoid injuries to civilians," he said of the Iraqi reports of casualties.

A British Defense Ministry spokesman said the targets were chosen because they had fired

at allied planes.
The United States and Britain have been enforcing no-fly zones in northern and southern Iraq since the end of the Gulf War in 1991.

"Once we had enough to convince a grand jury and a trial jury of his guilt, that was enough to go with and I went with it," Mann said.

Skinner disputed that theory in a recent interview.

"If I had hit her in the head 14 times with an ax handle, been covered in blood instead of just a few spots?" he said.

He said Caler's blood got on his clothes when the mortally wounded man tried to roust him from the living room couch. A review of court documents and trial testimony shows:

· The prosecution's star witness, Andrea Reed, recanted her testimony that Skinner threatened to kill her at her home after the killings. In an affidavit, Reed said police pressured her and prosecutors gave her prepared testimony. No court has yet considered the recantation.

• Skinner's court-appointed defense attorney, Harold Comer, had successfully pros-ecuted him for assault and car theft as a district attorney. That prevented Comer from objecting during the punishment phase when those convictions were presented as proof Skin-

ner would pose a danger to society.

• The prosecution failed to murder test three possible murder weapons - two knives and an ax handle covered in blood. It did not order DNA tests for flesh found under Busby's fingernails, several hairs found
