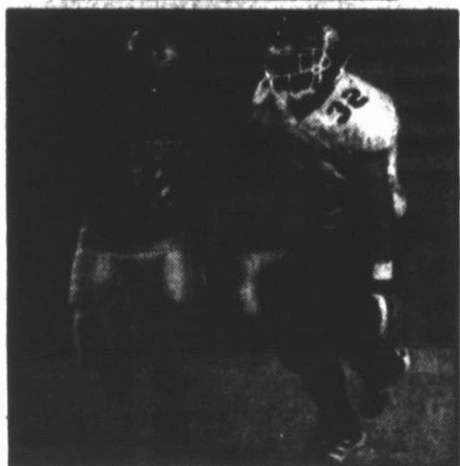

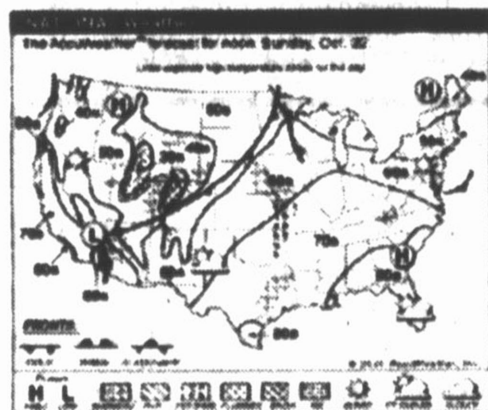

WHAT A HERD

■ Former hairdresser moves from perms, cutting, dying to producing wooden critters

From hairdresser to livestock producer, sort of.

This is pretty much the way Wanda Gibson sees herself, even though her "livestock" are wooden replicas which she designs and creates just because she has to be doing something creative.

Gibson, whose late husband, Richard Sol, raised cattle for a few years, has always enjoyed cows, and now she uses this love to make enchanting critters which can be used as planters, magazine racks or just yard decorations.

Handcrafted farm animals haven't always been her thing, but after 30-odd years of cutting, curling and dying hair, Gibson began to feel the after effects of a bout with childhood polio.

On most afternoons, Gibson can be found painting, sanding or assembling her various farm animals. Cows, especially longhorns, are her favorite.

"I just work at my own pace. I work on

them when I feel like it, but most of them sell as fast as I can get them made," she said. "I like doing the longhorns, but the Holsteins sell faster."

The pieces she creates take about a week to complete, if she works pretty steady.

"They have to be drawn off, cut and routed. I hand sand every piece then I apply a good oil base-coat — to keep the wood from warping. Then I do the free-hand painting, putting on the faces and details. Some may have longer lashes or different expression, but none are ever exactly alike. Then we seal it and put it together."

For Gibson, creating the individual caricatures of the animal is the fun part. She says she likes to experiment with facial expressions or different colors, but she never runs out of something new to add to the pieces.

And, of course, what piece of livestock is complete without the marking which declares its owner. Gibson marks her cattle with the brand used by her late husband — the Star of David. Mr. Sol was of German Jewish descent.

"We probably are the only ones who ever used

the Star of David as a brand," Gibson said.

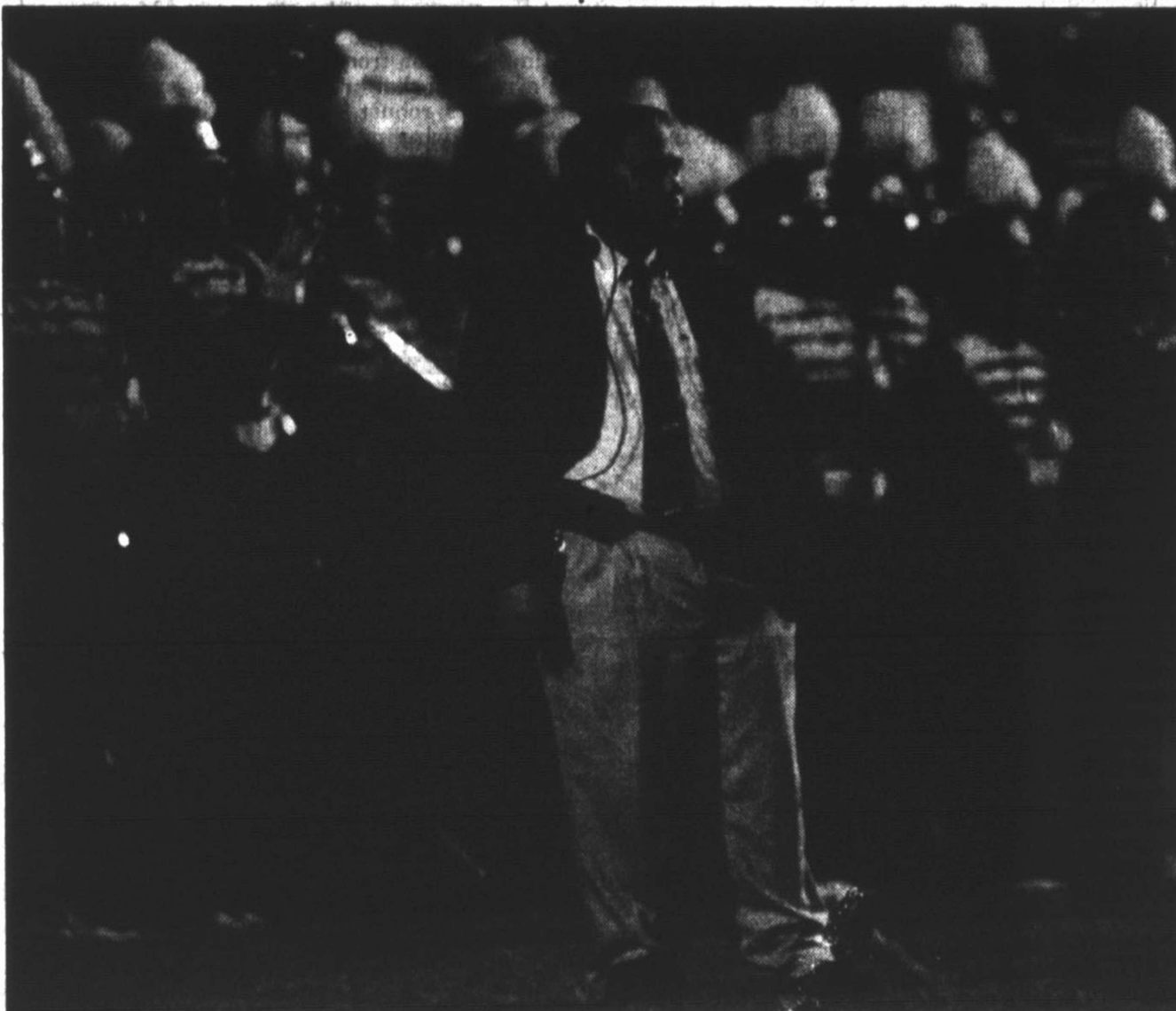
Gibson got started making the animated critters about four years ago, when her daughter gave her a big Holstein. Later she found some patterns for different animals and just started doing them for her own pleasure.

At first she did most of the work by herself, but now her husband does the biggest portion of the cutting.

"The big pieces of plywood got too much for me to handle. Now he does most the cutting, when he's got the time," she said.

She gets some help from her tool of choice, a Shop Smith Mark V component, which provides her the usefulness of five tools in one, so the space allotted to equipment is kept to a minimum. She hopes to get a shop completed later this year so she won't be at the mercy of weather, but she's not real concerned about it.

"I work at my own pace and do what I can. If people don't buy them, that's okay, because I will always love my cows."

BUSH FACTOR

Governor's bid for the White House may have impact on local elections

AUSTIN — First comes the presidential election. Then, perhaps, the real political frenzy takes over Texas.

Ripple effects of Gov. George W. Bush's presidential candidacy may be felt in local races as voters go to the polls and afterward amid fallout from the Nov. 7 election.

Lt. Gov. Rick Perry would ascend to governor and the Texas Senate would elect Perry's successor if Bush defeats Vice President Al Gore in his race for the White House.

Austin political consultant Bill Miller describes

the likely aftermath of a Bush victory as a two-part "scramble": the tussle for control and consolidation of the Senate, and the shakeup caused when Texas politicians — including some elected office holders — join a new Bush administration in Washington.

Perry, a Republican who presides over the 31-member Senate, would become governor shortly after the election. Then state Sen. Rodney Ellis, a Democrat from Houston and the Senate pro tem, would convene the body to elect a new lieutenant governor from within the Senate ranks.

Early voting set Monday

Early voting in the Nov. 7 general election will begin Monday at the Deaf Smith County Clerk's Office in the courthouse, 235 E. 3rd.

Voters will find some changes this year. Precincts 3 and 8 have been consolidated. In July, County Clerk David Ruland filed a preclearance report with the U.S. Justice Department seeking approval to combine Precincts 3 and 8. He received word last week that the federal government has approved the request.

Precinct 8 is in the sparsely populated western portion of the county and the number of registered voters has dropped to 59, with fewer than 25 casting ballots in elections.

In the preclearance report, Ruland contended the expense of opening the Precinct 8 polling place in Walcott School cannot be justified by the normal turnout. With the Justice Department's OK, the voters in former Precinct 8 will cast ballots at Hereford Junior High School, the Precinct 3 polling station.

Early voting will continue through Nov. 3. There will be three contested races for Deaf Smith County offices.

Incumbent Wayne Betzen, who narrowly survived a challenge in the Republican primary, will face Democrat Armando Gonzales in the race for Precinct 1 commissioner.

In the March primary, Betzen eked out a one-vote victory over former Precinct 1 foreman Alfred Ortiz. On the Democratic side, Gonzales defeated Joe Henry in a runoff to earn a spot on the Nov. 7 ballot.

Incumbent Sheriff Joe Brown, a Democrat, will try to fend off the challenge of Republican Brent Harrison, a sergeant on the Hereford Police Department.

Democrat Teresa Garth will meet Republican Jeannine Zimmerman in the race for county tax assessor/collector.

Although no Democrat in the 19th Congressional District stepped forward to challenge incumbent Larry Combest, the Lubbock Republican won't have a completely free ride to re-election.

Libertarian John Turnbow, a Lubbock physician, has pledged to wage a "vigorous" challenge to Combest and will "attempt to motivate the thousands of people who no longer vote because they think their vote makes no difference."

With no Democrat in the race, Turnbow has said he believes he has a "legitimate chance" of unseating the heavily favored Combest.

Other than Democratic presidential nominee Al Gore, only one other Democrat is listed on the statewide ballot — perennial candidate Gene Kelly of San Antonio is challenging incumbent Republican Kay Bailey Hutchison for the U.S. Senate.

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Israelis call timeout on peace process

JERUSALEM — After calling a timeout in a peace process rocked by violence, Israel warily watched for Arab leaders' response from a Cairo summit today as Palestinians buried their dead from a day of heavy gunbattles that left a U.S.-brokered truce in tatters. Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Barak called President Clinton to inform him of Israel's decision to put the peace process on hold after vicious clashes in the West Bank left nine Palestinians dead Friday and 67 wounded. "Timeout is not a slogan. This is what is needed," Barak said. "We cannot go on with the peace process as if nothing has happened." Clinton also spoke with Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat.

Navy revises timeline of events preceding the USS Cole attack

WASHINGTON — The Navy has altered its account of events leading to the bombing of the USS Cole in

Yemen last week. The changes raise new questions about how the attackers foiled Navy security. The Navy said Friday the explosion occurred nearly two hours after the Cole was moored to a fuel dock in Aden harbor, not during the mooring op-

eration, as it said before. That means the boat believed to have detonated the explosives did not use a flotilla of harbor craft as cover. It is now less clear than before how the attacking boat could have approached the Cole without raising suspicion.

Gore sees black vote as crucial to victory

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Al Gore met with African-American ministers to tout the "deeper values" he brings to the campaign and to add a jolt of energy to black voter turnout efforts important to his hopes.

"This race depends on you, it really does," Gore told about 75 church leaders, "I need your help."

With the race a dead heat, Gore is banking on a solid voter turnout among African-Americans in states like Louisiana, where polls show George W. Bush with an edge. To that end, he's enlisting the aid of ministers, pointing to his own religious faith.

"I am a person of faith," Gore said. "Faith is at the center of my life."

Gore prayed with the religious leaders, and broadened his economic pitch.

"This election is not only about the economy, but it's about values," said Gore. "It starts with the economy but then it goes to our deeper values," Gore said. He argued that keeping promises on issues like Social Security demonstrate the character of a campaign.

Democrat Gore planned to spend the weekend focusing on the candidates' competing Social Security proposals, sharpening his argument that Texas Gov. Bush's proposal to partially privatize the retirement system would drain \$1 trillion from it.

Gore says that is a certain route to bankruptcy for the system, as well as a body blow to the nation's robust economy. With campaign strategists convinced they've got a winning issue, the vice president has spent all week making his case to business groups.

"The days are ticking down and Governor Bush has a choice to make," Gore argues. "It's time for him to tell us whether he will break his promise and cut benefits or raise the retirement age. Which will it be and when will he tell us?"

"It's like an election with 31 voters, 31 yard signs," Miller said.

And the stakes are high. The Texas lieutenant governor generally is viewed as stronger than the governor because of his power to guide legislation in the Senate.

Republicans currently hold a 16-15 edge in the Senate, though that could change with the November election. A tight battle in Senate District 3 in East Texas has Perry and other big-name politicians from both parties contributing and campaigning for the Republican and Democratic candidates, Todd Staples and David Fisher, respectively.

More immediately, the impact of Bush's run for president may be seen on Election Day. Texas Republicans predict Bush's ability to invigorate voters will help GOP candidates down the ballot.

"What we are seeing is a lot more

interest and energy at the local level. People are aware of the presidential race and of local races. We think that that awareness will translate into more people getting out to vote on Election Day," said Robert Black, spokesman for the Republican Party of Texas.

Regardless of turnout, Bush isn't likely to have any longer coattails than he had in running for re-election in 1998, when Democrats gained a seat in the state Senate, said Molly Beth Malcolm, chairwoman of the Texas Democratic Party.

"I think Texans are going to vote for the candidate they considered to be the most qualified in the race, regardless of who they vote for in the presidential race," she said.

Miller, who has been a consultant for both Democrats and Republicans, noted that in Bush's 1998 re-election bid, the governor spent \$18 million

to \$20 million campaigning throughout Texas, which helped fellow Republicans.

This year, it is assumed Bush will win the presidential race in Texas. Therefore, Bush isn't spending much money campaigning here.

But Texans still may be motivated to vote, if only to voice anger about Democratic attacks on the state, some say.

"I think they're going to go to the polls to send a message: We're proud of our state. We're real tired of hearing you folks beat us up and tell stories about Texas that aren't true," Perry said.

Gore's campaign particularly has criticized the Bush's record on the environment and health care in Texas.

Perry, 50, was a Texas House member and state agriculture commissioner before he won his current

LONDON — Sir Paul McCartney didn't shy away from saying those three special words to girlfriend Heather Mills — even though he was speaking before a British television audience. The famous Beatle's admission of love came during the filming of a TV show featuring Mills, a former model whose left leg was amputated below the knee after she was struck by a police motorcyclist in 1993. Mills, 32, had planned not to talk about their year-long relationship, but McCartney made a surprise appearance on stage in front of the studio audience. Mills admitted, "I love him." Then, smiling broadly, McCartney, 58, confessed, "Yeah, I love her."

Hereford economy slides

Hereford's economy slid last month, at least by one measurement.

The city's sales tax payment from the Texas Comptroller's Office for October was \$81,849, down 4.5 percent from the \$85,725 it received last year. However, October's payment was up from the \$79,247 received in September. For the year, Hereford has received a total of \$869,792, down 1.2 percent from the \$880,201 for the same period last year.

Deaf Smith County received a rebate of \$27,603, down 7.1 percent from the \$29,717 it received in October 1999. The county's payment, however, was up from the \$26,995 it received in September. For the year, the county has received \$304,842, up 0.8 percent from \$302,565 for the same period last year.

The Texas Comptroller's Of-

fice distributed \$212.5 million in sales tax revenue among 1,106 Texas cities and 119 counties. The month's sales tax rebates are up 20.8 percent compared to October 1999. For the year, payments to cities and counties are up 9.2 percent from last year.

The sales tax rebates delivered include \$195.7 million to Texas cities, up 21 percent compared to October 1999. Texas counties received rebates of \$16.7 million, up 19 percent compared to a year ago.

In addition to city and county sales tax rebates, \$75.7 million went to Texas' six metropolitan transit authorities and two city transit systems, and \$7.2 million was paid to 54 special purpose districts.

October sales tax rebates represent sales taxes collected in August and reported to the comptroller in September. Retailers who file quarterly sales tax reports haven't reported their August sales, so the re-

sults of Texas' second annual Sales Tax Holiday aren't known. The comptroller's office will calculate the Sales Tax Holiday results in early November.

By law, the state collects sales taxes for Texas' cities and counties that have local sales taxes. The comptroller's office then returns the portion of the taxes on a monthly basis.

The state charges a 6.25 percent sales tax and local sales taxes can be up to 2 percent above that. The city of Hereford levies a 1.5 percent tax, while Deaf Smith County's sales tax is 0.5 percent.

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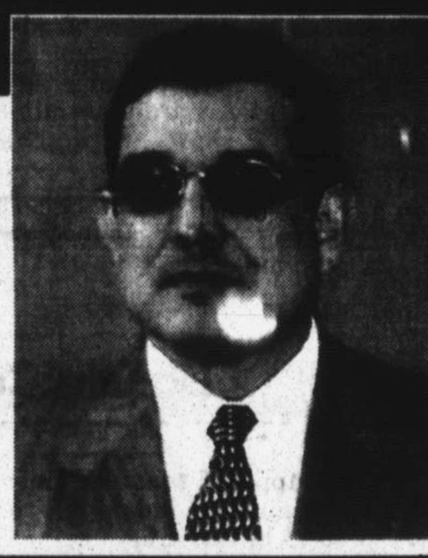

Community has asset in its library

There is a place out there in our midst that is a meeting place for all the ideas and words of persons who have influenced the world.

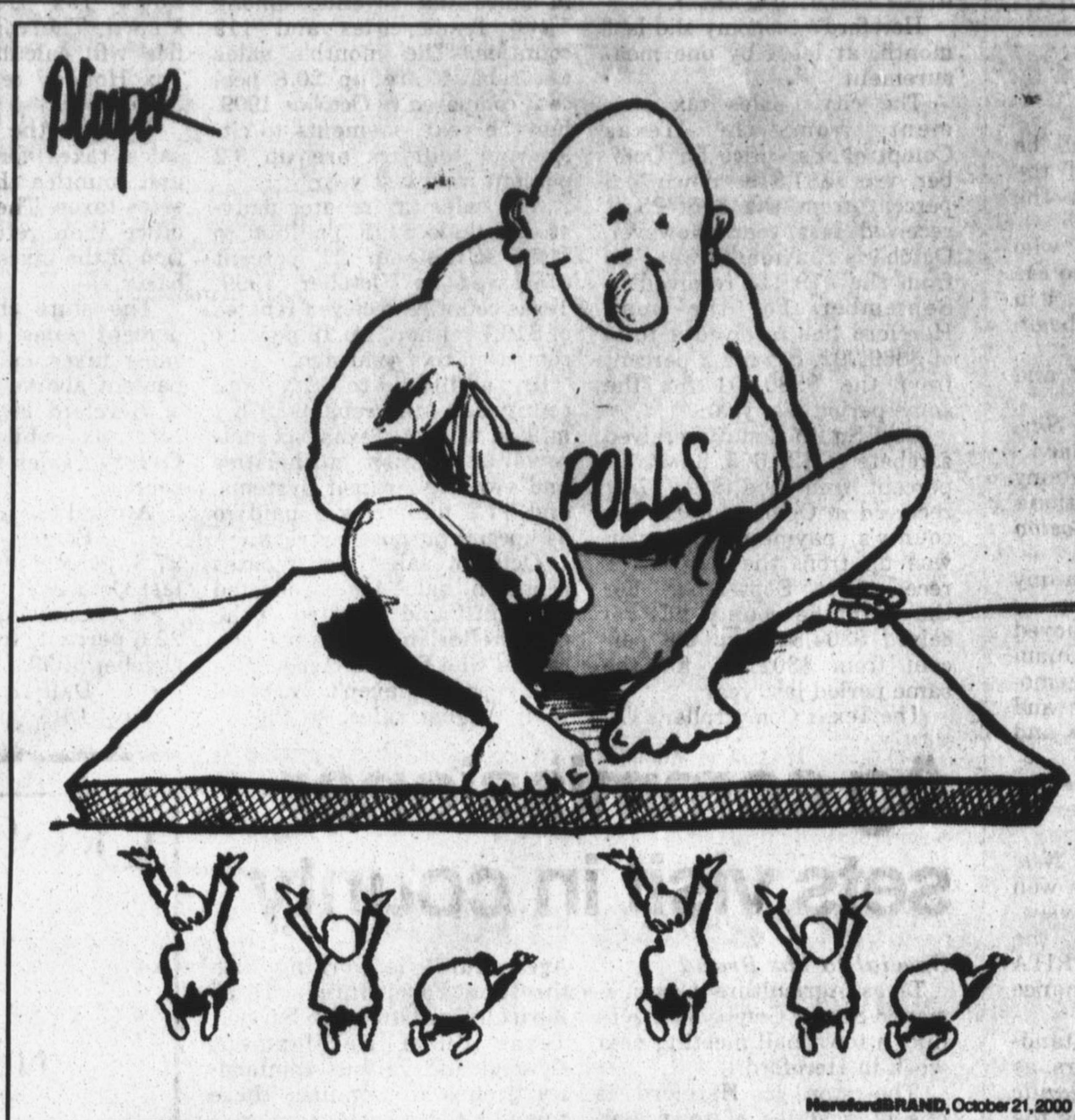

Foil the polls — lie

When it came to the polls, the late Chicago columnist Mike Royko had a great piece of advice: lie.

Ours is a nation that’s becoming driven by polls. Polls are determining legislation, what TV shows we watch, what music we can buy — and who’s going to be the next president.

Politicians of both major parties are using polls to decide how they will vote on legislation that affects all of us. Our elected representatives are supposed to make their decisions based on their own judgment, to go through the process of thinking.

But when you turn on the television news, what do you hear? It seems that the first thing out of any politician’s mouth is: “Well, the polls say ...”

I don’t want to hear what the polls have to say about an issue, I want to hear what the polls have to say. Maybe I’ll disagree with what the politician says, but I’ll respect a person’s judgment who uses the thought process, not demographics, to make decisions.

A few years ago, the television networks would allow a show to find its audience. Some of the shows that have become classics, such as “Gunsmoke,” “All in the Family,” “M*A*S*H” and “Northern Exposure” started off slowly, but the network honchos didn’t panic, they let the audience find the show.

In this world of polls and demographics, a show which doesn’t find its audience — or the level of viewing the network wheels want — immediately is gone. Following the last TV season, NBC canceled “Stark Raving Mad,” a show that consistently placed in the top 20. However, the demographics showed the viewing audience wasn’t what the network expected, so “Stark” got the ax.

We’ve gone beyond the weekly polls, which were annoying enough, to the daily tracking polls and the so-called “instant” polls.

The tracking polls supposedly let us know where a candidate stands with the

electorate each day. The “instant” polls let us know immediately how a very small group of people reacted to the presidential debates.

Our elected representatives are using focus groups, which are another form of polling, to determine which issues they will pursue, which ones they will avoid.

When Newt Gingrich was putting together the Contract with America a few years ago, he used focus groups to decide what would be in the contract. If there wasn’t 50 percent support for an issue, it didn’t make it into the contract.

That’s not being a leader, that’s being a follower. Thanks to the polls, our politicians are jumping on bandwagons and hoping people think they’re doing the driving.

There’s still three weeks until the election. If you are approached by a pollster, take Mike Royko’s advice — and lie.

Bush or Gore? Neither
This year, I just cannot find any real compelling reason to support either Bush or Gore. I can’t even say I’ll hold my nose and vote for the lesser of two evils — there isn’t one.

For the first time in my memory, the major parties, thanks to the corruption of corporate money, have managed to come up with the same candidate.

I realize there are some minor differences between Bush and Gore, but it’s still next to impossible to distinguish between the two. With these two presidential wannabes, that old cliché about the weather in West Texas comes to mind: If you don’t like where they stand on an issue, just wait five minutes and it’ll change.

Because neither of the major parties is offering a candidate I can vote for on Nov. 7, I’ll take a look at one of the minor parties. I know the Democrats and Republicans adherents will say that I’m just throwing away my vote.

So what? It is my vote; I can cast it anyway I choose. And, I certainly don’t choose to vote for either Bush or Gore.

Canada vs. United States:

A stark contrast between political Do-Rights and Do-Wrongs

Hello, Hereford.

If only American politicians could be enrolled in a Canadian Dudley Do-Right course.

No matter which venue Do-Right found himself in, the Royal Canadian Mounted Policeman was always freeing people from their bondage and pending doom on the railroad tracks.

The Mountie’s trusty work is still being done up there.

Our good friend Ruth Knox returned last month from a trip to the diminutive Canadian province of Nova Scotia, which sticks its nose into the North Atlantic, north of Main.

She thoughtfully brought us a copy of the *Toronto Globe And Mail*, a daily newspaper billed as Canada’s national newspaper and published in Ottawa — another of the 10 provinces that also join two vast wilderness territories to compose the Canadian federation.

The paper’s leading front-page story reported the Canadian government posted a \$12-billion budget surplus in 1999-2000 — the third consecutive surplus to be automatically applied to the Canadian national debt.

Canadian lawmakers obviously have a different perspective about surpluses than do their North American counterparts, and they’ve weathered their share of hard times.

Canada’s economy, just like ours, hasn’t always flowed with black ink. In the late ‘60s, severe inflation was followed by a deep recession that, if not for not for deep-pocketed American draft dodgers, might have completely crippled the country. Since then, however, the country has quietly quadrupled in population and lawmakers have shored up its financial reserve with booming increases in gross domestic product.

The ruling Liberal Canadian Party, led in part by Prime Minister Jean Chrétien and Finance Minister Paul Martin, has been treading on today’s conventional wisdom for players in the global economy — paying as it goes.

How crude?

The newspaper reported the Canadian government’s recklessness has already shaved roughly \$720 million a year in interest payments off the country’s debt load.

Our more sophisticated American politicians, especially those espousing their interest in electoral votes, have used the potential leftovers as venture capital for campaign promises.

The stark comparison between Canadian and American philosophies is more evident when you consider how many times the Republicans and Democrats, giddy with the prospect of the first true balanced budget since 1969, have both graciously accepted responsibility for our projected budget surplus and, not surprisingly, the greatest wisdom for how best to spend it.

In truth, neither the donkeys nor the elephants have had much to do with the supposed surplus or the prosperity we are so frequently reminded we now enjoy.

Nor have the two parties had much to do with erasing this nation’s red ink.

The majority of those who are tied to the Beltway still find it terribly inconvenient to adhere to reality: that our economy’s current good fortune is a direct result of someone slapping hands away from the cookie jar — namely Federal Reserve Board Chairman Alan Greenspan.

It has been his conservative manipulation of the Fed’s interest rates, first to head off inflation, and then to avert contraction, that has kept our economy from derailing despite a national debt that by this past Tuesday had soared to \$5,664,975,939,816.81.

Most economists agree our nation’s last recession ended in 1991, when the Oval Office was manned by George Bush. By the time President Clinton stepped in, our economic recovery was already as well-established as the Democrats’ amnesia for achieving it.

The recession was noted as one of the mildest on record, lasted less than year and was far from the brink of hell exaggerated so enthusiastically by Al Gore while on the Campaign 2000 stump.

It seems to me that the only valid and recent contribution either party has made to our economy, beyond curbing their instinct to spend more than a budget allows, has been in having the good sense to hire Greenspan, and then to leave him alone.

He’s not the dashing, square-jawed Royal Canadian Mountie we typically envision, but like yesterday’s Dudley Do-Right he has been a lonely crusader in the fight to keep us off the railroad tracks.

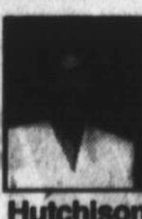

Auditor: Pay workers more

AUSTIN — Salaries for state employees are years behind the paychecks for similar private-sector jobs and the lag soon could begin to affect overall state services, the State Auditor concluded in a biennial report released last week.

State employees' actual salaries have increased only 28 percent in the past 10 years while per capita income in Texas has risen an estimated 58 percent. Texas' average state employee salary is \$7,656 less than the average state employee salary for the other nine most populous states.

Turnover among the state's 25,000 employees cost Texas between \$127 million and \$254 million in 1999.

The report recommends between \$30 million and \$56 million in changes for the biennium to help reduce costs associated with turnover.

The report proposes that the salary range for the state's schedule A and B employees be adjusted to more accurately reflect similar positions in the private sector even though state employees still would fall 7 percent behind.

The report also calls for a \$200 per month flat increase for schedule A employees and a 10 percent increase for

schedule B employees effective Sept. 1, 2001, and additional increases of \$50 per month for schedule A and 3 percent for schedule B on Sept. 1, 2002. The adjustment would cost the state about \$945 million in the biennium.

Schedule C employees would receive a \$50 increase per month Sept. 1, 2001 and another \$50 per month Sept. 1, 2002 at a cost of about \$7 million in the biennium.

"The issue of pay needs more attention given both the strong Texas economy and the forecast of a significant labor shortage," the report said.

ATM fees debated

Texans could learn more about the fees they incur when using Automatic Teller Machines and they could gain more control over their non-public personal financial information under recommendations made last week by a senate subcommittee.

The Subcommittee on Consumer Credit released several

recommendations after studying how the banking, securities and insurance industries seem to be merging and crossing services.

Another subcommittee, charged with identifying ways to fund new jobs and promote economic development in Texas, also released a report that found new businesses often have difficulty getting early-stage financing.

The Subcommittee on Private Sector Business Financing also found that state-sponsored funding works in some areas but not across the board.

To help promote growth in the private sector, the subcommittee recommended dedicating state revenue from oil and gas reserves or lottery reserves and using proceeds from the state's tobacco settlement.

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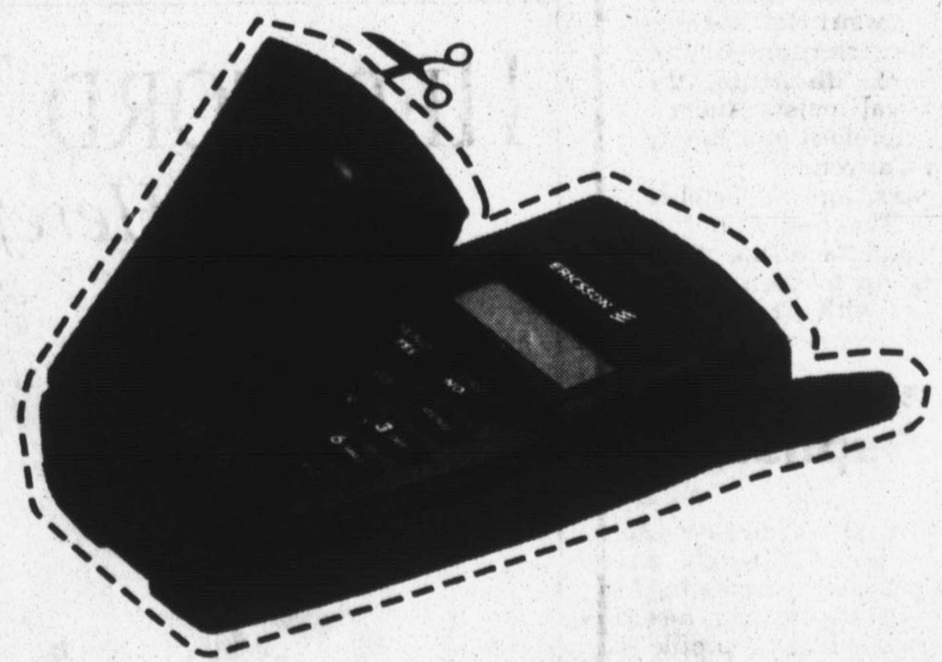

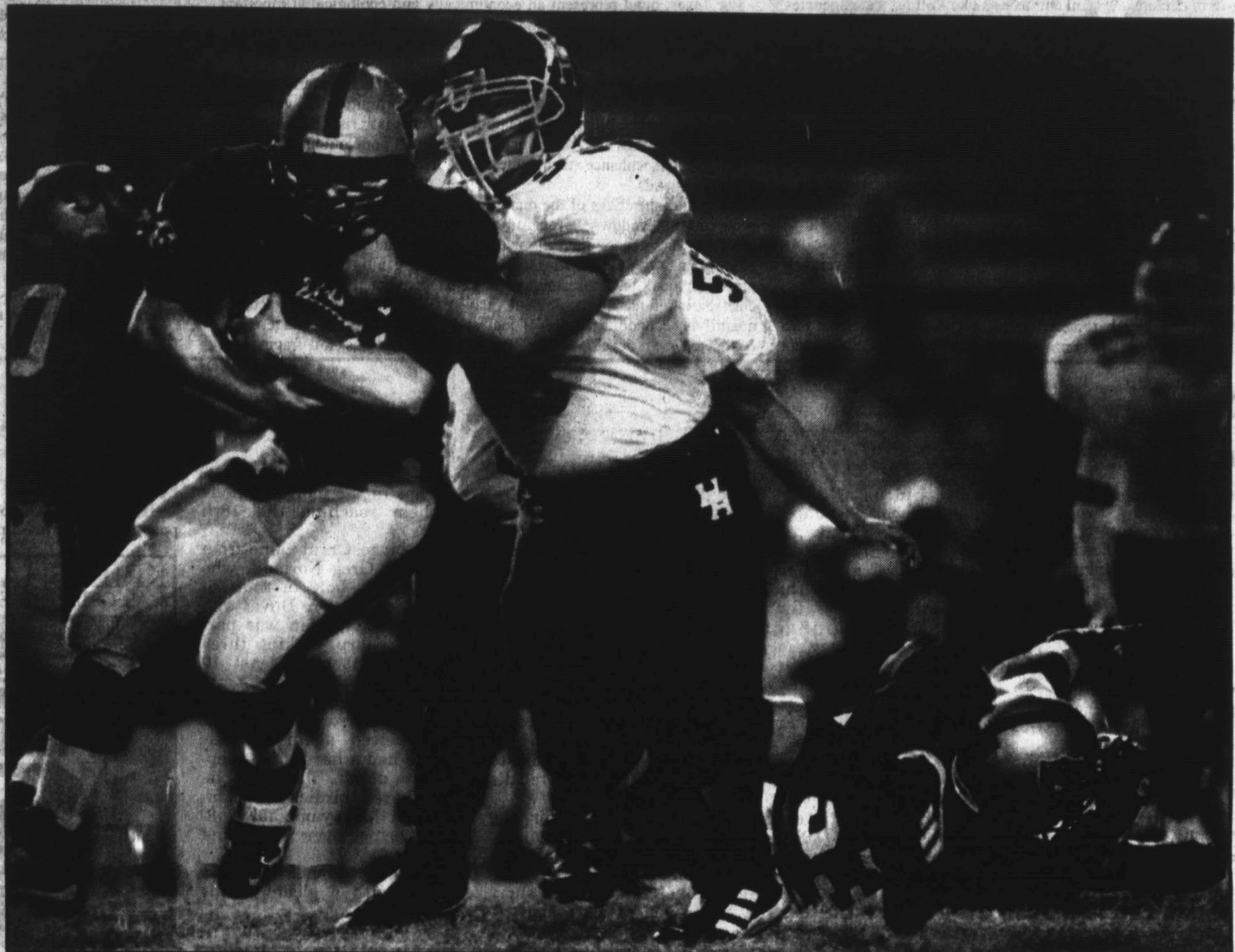

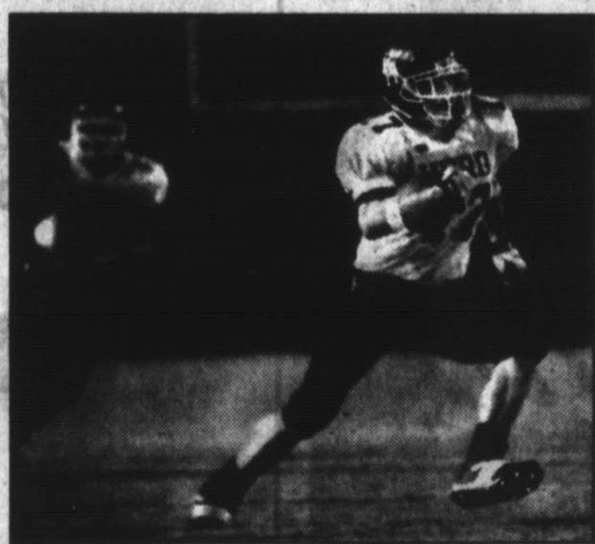

Every piston of the Herd's offense fired and Randall could only watch one of the Panhandle's most explosive teams totally destroy any hopes of a win.

The Hereford Whitefaces made it six wins in a row Friday night at Kimbrough Memorial Stadium routing Randall 52-14 to stay tied for the top spot in District 3-4A.

The Herd's defense and offense came to play shutting down the Raider's running

attack and by dominating the scoreboard with touchdowns by the special teams unit, defense and offense to keep the Herd's winning streak at six. Boys athletic director and head football coach Craig Yenser said he felt his team came out focused and prepared.

"I've got a lot of confidence in what we're doing," Yenser said. "I really feel like we are doing better than we were at this time last year."

Yenser said he felt the Herd's passing game was in full stride Friday night thanks to the outstanding play of his offensive unit. The offense racked up 451 total yards while scoring seven times.

"We are running the ball down the field, and we are passing the ball well," Yenser said. "We just keep getting better."

The game was over at half time with the Herd scoring five times taking a 33-0 lead into the locker room off a touchdown pass from junior receiver Cody Marsh to senior quarterback Cody Hodges. Hereford senior receiver Slade Hodges scored two of the touchdowns for the Whitefaces including a

60-yard punt return for a touchdown with 10:54 left in the second quarter to put Hereford up 14-0. S. Hodges said he felt like the team was able to put everything together Friday night.

"Once we get in the end zone we know we can go back anytime we want to," S. Hodges said. "We've just got to get our minds set to do the right things to get in there."

Hereford High (6-1, 4-0) limited the Raiders to only 10 total offense yards in the first half and 225 overall stopping them cold when they tried to run any kind of offense. Senior nose tackle Kris Hammerbeck said he feels when the Herd's defense gets on a roll it cannot be stopped.

"I feel that even with our backups in we can win, and we are building up confidence everyday," Hammerbeck said.

Yenser said he also feels like Hereford's defense also continues to grow each week and are learning to absolutely shut down another team.

Americans steal back momentum to take lead in Virginia

GAINESVILLE, Va. (AP) — On a day of two spirited comebacks, Tiger Woods, Kirk Triplett and the rest of the Americans saved their best golf for the toughest format Friday afternoon, and the Presidents Cup was right back where it

started. Hours after getting blindsided by the International team in the best-ball format, the Americans restored their five-point lead with a birdie blitz to win four of the five alternate-shot matches and move closer to reclaiming the cup.

"Each team, when they have the onus on them, they seem to come back and play well," Woods said.

Quail aficionados want funding to study decline of bobwhites, blues

Quail hunters across a good portion of the state are likely to see another disappointing season in 2000-2001, according to Dr. Dale Rollins, a Texas A&M wildlife specialist stationed at San Angelo.

Rollins says quail numbers are the lowest on record in the Edwards Plateau, the Gulf Prairies, and the Cross-Timbers eco-regions.

The bright spot is an area north of a line from roughly Big Spring to Childress, where a good year is expected for both bobwhites and blue quail.

There's encouraging news for the area north of the Big Spring-Childress line. A rebound in blue quail has evidently occurred here. Rollins says the bounce started last year, and continued this spring on the strength of favorable moisture in March and April.

While quail population trends are more steady in the Rolling Plains and South Texas, bobwhite numbers have been declining statewide by 4.7 percent annually since 1981.

This long-term decline has quail enthusiasts like Rollins, state agencies, and conservation organizations so concerned that they plan to present a \$3.7 million appropriations request before the 76th State Legislature in 2001, asking for a study of the quail decline in Texas.

Proposed is an appropriation of \$1.85 million in each of fiscal years 2002 and 2003 to fund research, extension, and landowner incentives to reverse the quail decline in Texas.

Rollins says bobwhites have especially declined across their U.S. range during the past 15 years. Their plight is so critical that some scientists are predicting that bobwhites will be extinct in parts of the Southeast by 2005.

According to Rollins, Texas remains a final frontier for wild bobwhite populations, but even in Texas, their numbers have been declining at an alarming rate.

Blue quail numbers have skidded right along with bobwhites over their Texas range during the past decade, and even a variety of grassland songbird populations are similarly declining, according to Rollins.

"Bobwhites serve as a barometer of changes in other grassland bird populations. Management that improves quail populations will also benefit

declining songbirds," Rollins says.

"Texas needs to address quail decline now, before the situation becomes as critical as in the southeastern U.S.," he adds.

For Texas, quail represent an economically and ecologically important natural resource. Their economic impact includes all-important revenue to rural landowners, revenue to rural communities through eco-tourism, and prime quail areas can provide a boost to rural real estate values.

"The decline in the quail population across the southeastern U.S. has increased the value of Texas' quail hunting opportunities. However, the quality and marketability of quail hunting in Texas is at risk. Economically depressed ranchers need to maintain/restore quail populations in order to maintain and enhance their enterprise diversification opportunities," Rollins contends.

Goals and objectives of the quail proposal include focused educational programs for landowners regarding the decline of quail and associated songbirds and general education for youth and adults; research aimed at identifying causes contributing to quail decline and mitigating management practices; quail habitat restoration in 12 targeted counties through use of cost-sharing funds to implement quail-friendly management practices; quantifying economic impacts of quail and related enterprises; and research conducted and developed for management strategies for fragmented

landscapes.

Challenges that would confront any quail study include finding how to maintain bobwhites in an increasingly fragmented rural landscape; learning to better manage watersheds for quail production, and working with Farm Bill programs to enhance quail habitat.

"Landowners are the key to restoring quail populations. An extensive outreach effort will seek to increase awareness and adoption of best management practices for restoring quail habitat. The proposed 12 pilot counties would receive \$100,000 of cost-sharing each. Results would be evaluated," Rollins says.

Partners for the proposed quail decline study include the Texas A&M University System, TAMU Kingsville, the Ag Extension Service, Texas Ag Experiment Station, and Texas Tech University.

The Texas Parks & Wildlife Department would serve as an agency and the Texas Department of Agriculture would be a supporter.

Conservation groups endorsing the study include Quail Unlimited, the Texas Wildlife Association, Texas Audubon Society, the Texas Chapter of The Wildlife Society, and the Texas Section of the Society for Range Management.

Commodity groups supporting the quail effort include Texas & Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, Texas Farm Bureau, and the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association.

"We can look at bobwhite trends from 1981-1996 and realize that an important economic resource for Texas is slip-sliding away. Georgia used to have higher quail numbers than Texas. Texas currently enjoys greater demand for its quail hunting because of low quail numbers throughout the Southeast. Many Texas landowners generate as much, and often more profit from wildlife than they do from producing livestock," Rollins points out.

"Georgia and several other states have recently funded initiatives to try to reverse the decline in their quail populations. Texas needs to act to halt the decline of its important quail resources, too."

He was wild — although he opened a cut over Golota's left eye. Then, with 12 sec-

onds remaining in the round, Tyson crashed a right hand to the head that toppled Golota.

Golota got up immediately and took the mandatory eight count, then the bell saved him from further punishment.

The second round was marked by a lot of clinching, although Tyson got in a couple of hard head shots and one solid left jab to the face.

There were no dirty tactics by either fighter, who have earned reputations for breaking the rules.

"I plan to fight clean as much as possible," Golota said before the fight.

It turned out he didn't have much fight in him — clean or dirty — at all.

The fight wasn't the kind Tyson was looking for, but it was a victory and he fought hard.

The loss has to end Golota's

status as a contender or an attraction in the heavyweight division.

The 32-year-old native of Poland living in Chicago also

quit against Michael Grant after being knocked down in the 10th round of a fight. Golota was winning last Nov. 20.

San Jose welcomes new priests

Those who attend the third annual San Jose Enchilada Dinner on Oct. 29 at the Hereford Community Center may notice some difference in the way the priests of San Jose Parish are dressed.

They are Padres Nicolas Perez, Adalberto Ramirez and Leobardo Heredia, Order of Franciscan Monks.

Father Nicolas and Father Adalberto came to San Jose in February of this year. Father Leobardo only arrived two weeks ago.

They are here, according to Father Adalberto, because Bishop John W. Yanta of the Diocese of Amarillo went to Guadalajara where their Franciscan seminary is, and requested them due to the shortage of Catholic priests in this area.

"We are here to minister to this parish which is mostly Spanish-speaking people," Father Adalberto said.

While Father Nicholas is the pastor or head priest and Fathers Adalberto and Leobardo are parochial vicars, all three share in performing the necessary duties during services which are conducted in both English and Spanish.

The parish in Hereford is not the only one suffering from a lack of priests. According to published figures, 25 percent of world parishes do not have resident priests.

"Later on Bishop Yanta will give me an agenda to visit parishes in the surrounding towns," Father Adalberto said. "We know that in this area, just like all over the United States, there is a shortage of priests, especially for the Spanish-speaking people."

The shortage of priests seems to be due, at least in part, to the fact that young men are not going into the priesthood. However, Father Adalberto said that in Guadalajara at least 40 men are going into the priesthood every year.

Another factor contributing to

the shortage is the loss of priests due to age. By 2005, half of the priests in the United States will be 55. Father Adalberto confirmed that this problem also exists in this area.

"If you attend some meeting for priests in Amarillo, you can see mostly priests from age 60 and up. There are few young priests," he said.

The Franciscan order was founded by St. Frances of Assisi in Italy in the 13th century.

"We are all over the world, almost in every nation, divided into provinces. But we all are Catholic. Being a Franciscan means that we are Catholic, first of all," Father Adalberto said.

The dinner which San Jose Parish will serve on Oct. 29 is a parish fund-raiser. Proceeds from

the event will be used to meet the daily necessary operating expenses of the parish.

While many members of the parish are among the lowest wage earners in Hereford, the people have been very generous, according to Father Adalberto.

Support from the community is encouraged because part of the operating expense of the parish is the San Jose Community Building, which is available for use by the entire community.

The spacious modern facility was completed in October 1995 and offers a day care Monday through Friday, a large meeting area and several smaller meeting rooms.

"We praise the people for their help and encourage them to call us about using the San Jose

Community Center. It is for all, just as God is for all," Father Adalberto said.

The Third Annual San Jose Enchilada Dinner will be from 11 a.m.-3 p.m. on Sunday, Oct. 29 in the Hereford Community Center. Tickets are \$5 for adults and \$3 for children. Carry out will be available. Advance tickets are available from members of San Jose Parish or from the parish office.

The next meeting will be Nov. 7 with Harris as hostess and Jana Morgan as co-hostess.

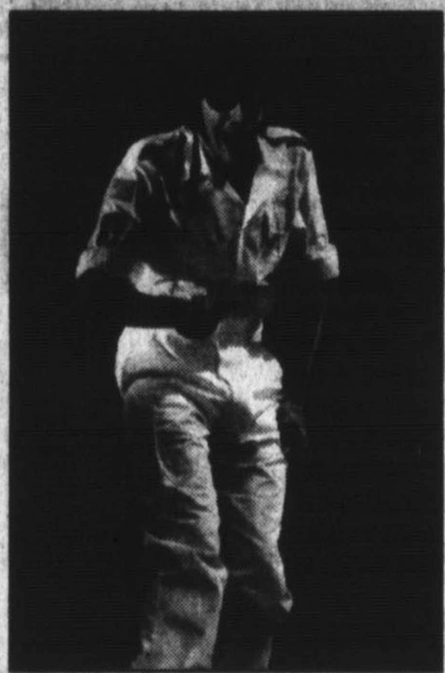

I have news for her. Pregnant women and the elderly aren't the only ones who don't get offered seats. I spent several months on crutches with my leg in a plaster cast. No one offered me a seat on a bus or a train. Once, when I felt faint, I asked a middle-aged male if he would please give me his seat. He said, "I'm tired, too," and ducked behind his newspaper. — Ashamed of My Fellow Citizens

Dear Ashamed: That letter produced a firestorm of complaints against "those wild-eyed women's libbers who brought it on themselves." Keep reading for more:
From Houston: I have

traveled the world, and nowhere else do the men sit while pregnant women, the handicapped and the elderly stand. In Paris, every time I got on the subway, a young adult or teenager jumped up and offered me a seat. That doesn't happen often in the States. In New York last month, a young man got up and gave me his seat. I said, "You're not an American, are you?" He replied, "No, I'm a tourist from Mexico City going to my first major league baseball game."

New York City: When my aunt was pregnant with my cousin, she found herself on a military shuttle bus with her mother. The two women were standing, and all the seats were taken by healthy G.I.s. My grandmother rose to her full height and said in a loud voice, "Well, chivalry may be dying, but at least it's not dying on its feet!" They promptly got seats.

Des Moines, Iowa: During the past 40 years, I have offered my seat to pregnant women and others, only to be embarrassed when they indignantly announce that they are

not invalids. I'm through being nice.

Atlanta: Pregnant, handicapped or elderly people should be allowed to pay an extra fee for a ticket that entitles them to bump someone from a seat. And people who are willing to stand should be given discounts.

Tallahassee, Fla.: Years ago, my mother and I grabbed the last two seats on a downtown bus. Two nuns in flowing habits soon boarded. I still have the bruise where my mother poked me with her elbow because I didn't jump up fast enough to give up my seat. It was a lesson in manners that this Jewish boy will never forget.

Silver Spring, Md.: I was standing on a train when a blind man boarded with his Seeing Eye dog. Not one person offered him a seat, and he and his dog were left to stumble through the car. How did we become so rude and callous?

Peoria, Ill.: People are getting fatter all the time, and lots of women dress in such a way that it is impossible to know if they are pregnant or

not. I guarantee if I gave up my seat for a fat woman because of her "condition," she would clobber me.

Versailles, Ky.: My husband was in Chicago, traveling on the train from the airport. A pregnant woman boarded, and my husband, always the Southern gentleman, tapped her on the shoulder and offered her his seat. She jumped so high, he was afraid she would go into labor. The woman turned to my husband and said, "You're not from around here, are you?"

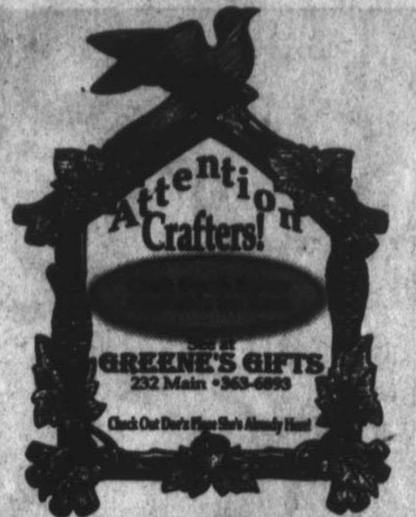

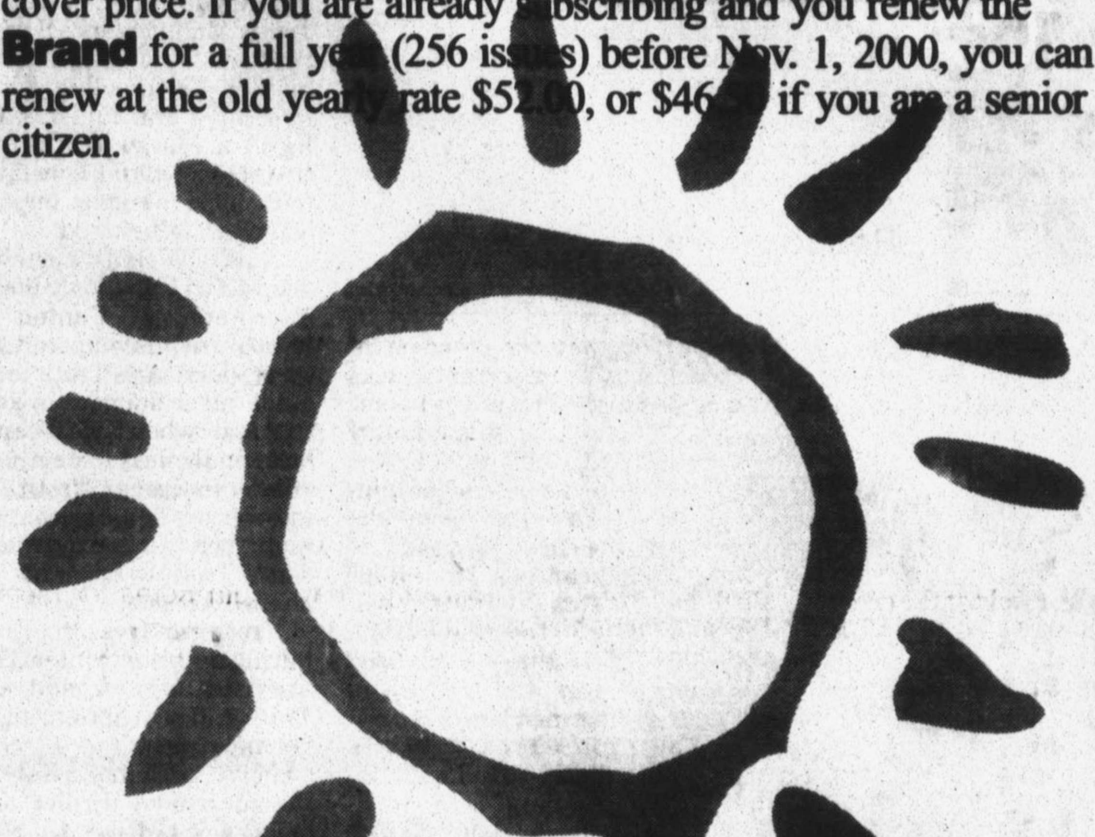

Quality: Some Things are Still the Same

I believe that some things never change. For instance, if you give your customers something worth paying for, they will pay. Quality is a good example. By definition, quality is the degree of excellence a thing possesses. It is also defined as something of excellence or superiority. While some folks appear shocked at the high price of some

goods and services, others who know the cost of quality are not at all surprised. You really do get what you pay for.

Quality is timeless
Several years ago, while traveling through Kansas I saw a vintage John Deere tractor crossing a field near sunset. I stopped the car on the wide shoulder and stepped out to enjoy the scene.

I listened to the distinctive sound the tractor made. There is no sound like it. Anyone who has ever spent even a few hours on a two-cylinder John Deere will never confuse its exhaust rhythm with any other tractor.

The driver was a seasoned farmer with a sun-lined face and a friendly smile. He waved as he neared my end of the field. I waved back. The smell of the freshly turned earth took me back about 30 years.

While enjoying the memories, I took note of the farm. The fence row was clean, the posts were straight and the barbed wire was tight.

I also noticed that the line the plow was drawing across the field was straight and true. The tractor, though nearly 50 years old, was obviously well maintained and still working flawlessly. Everything I saw indicated quality.

If you can judge a man by the quality of his work, I'd guess that Kansas farmer is a loving husband, father and grandfather. I'll bet he lives in a comfortable, but unpretentious house. I'm sure it brings him satisfaction to know that the wheat he raises helps feed dozens of other families.

This experience always comes to mind when I think about quality. I still see it all: the tractor, the straight lines, the clean fence rows. It makes me remember that some quality things never change.

Take these to the bank

Here are some quality precepts you can profit from. They aren't new, but they still work.

- **Quality isn't what you put in, it's what the user gets out.** Consider the John Deere tractor I mentioned earlier. It's more than 50 years old, but still in the field. I believe that farmer is getting his money's worth.
- **Don't confuse "fast" with "good."** Long after they forget how fast you got the job done, they'll remember how well you did it.
- **Any fool can cut his price, but it takes brilliance to build it better.** If you know second grade math, you can cut prices. You often sell more, but make less. The better focus is building the best, and there's more money in it.
- **Quality is its own salesman.** I once asked a very successful professional speaker how he marketed his speaking business. He said, "Every speech sells the next one."
- **All buyers aren't quality buyers.** Some people buy junk. Research tells us that 20 percent of all buyers are more concerned about price than any other factor. They aren't quality buyers; they are price buyers.
- **If you don't do it well, it will probably never be profitable or fun.** Shoddy workmanship never paid very well. One of the greatest joys in life is doing something well. If you can't make money, and aren't having fun, why bother?
- **If it ain't perfect, make it better.** Some folks believe the old saying, "If it ain't broke don't fix it." I like this one better. Most things still have room for improvement. Constant improvement should be our goal...in all things.

and biological weapon installations. Having privileged information, it was the information that Frank obtained that enabled them to cripple Iran's killing capacity.

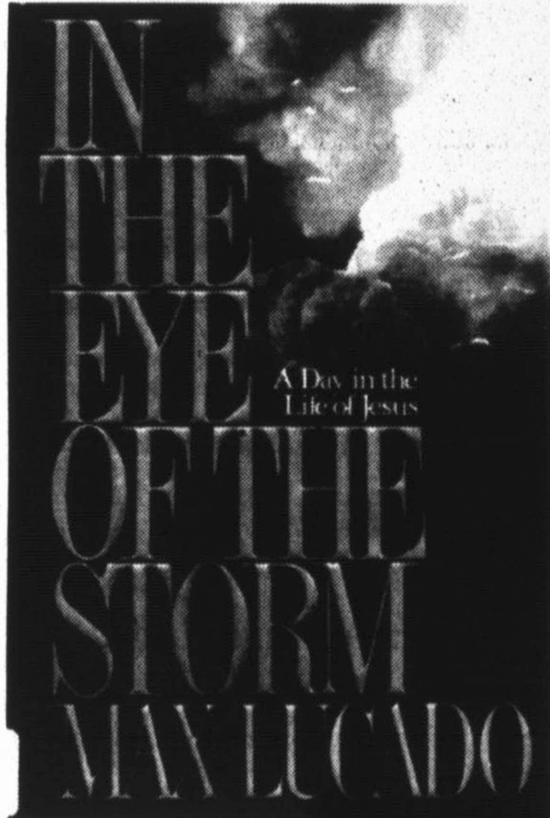

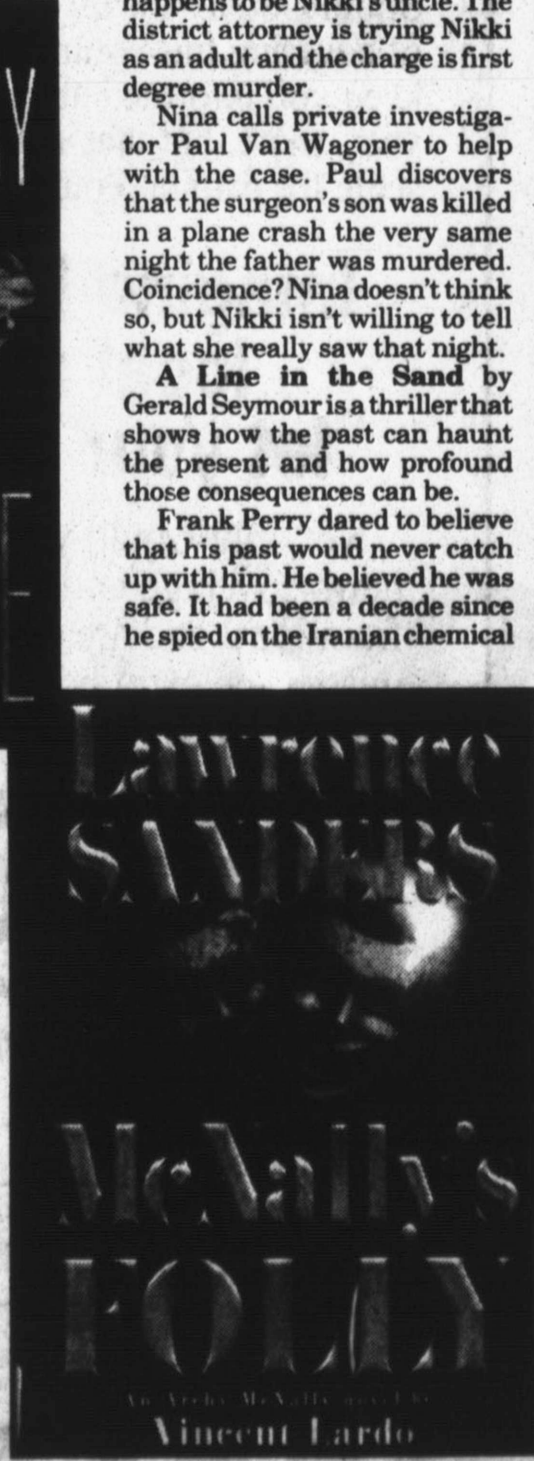

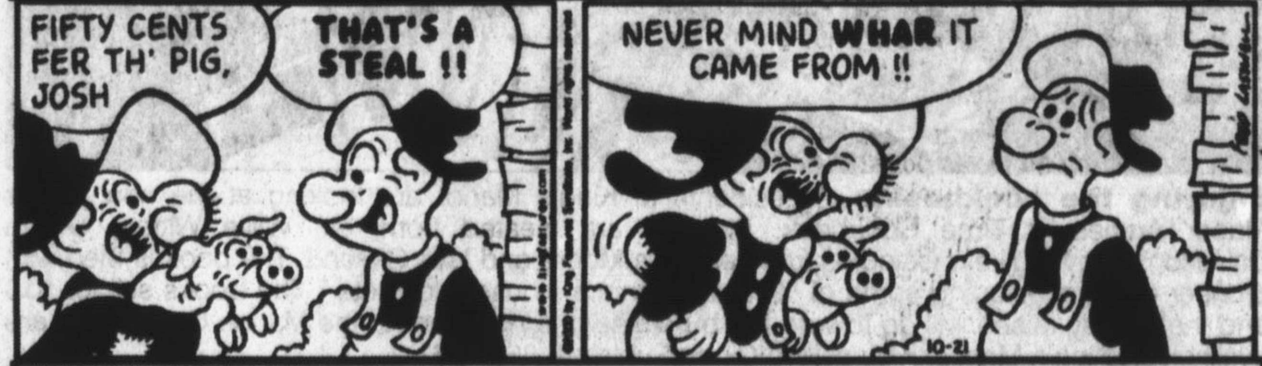

Area cotton harvest in full swing

Module trucks travel the roads that lead to Hereford Farmers' Cotton Gin, scattering tufts of fluffy white cargo as they go.

Residents in the area are used to such sights. Every year about the middle of October, bits of white dander dance in the wind, but this year's conditions had many producers wondering how much cotton there would actually be to take to the gin.

Gin manager David Varner said the harvest so far has been mixed. "The irrigated stuff is coming out about average. Some has made about 2-1/2 bales per acre, with the dry-land cotton only making a 1/4 of a bale in some cases."

"If we're real lucky we might be able to squeeze out a bale per acre on the average, which is slightly below average," he said.

The cotton, which has been ginned so far is showing both high and low micronaire (thickness of fibers) and relatively short length, according to Varner.

Even though the yield is far from a record crop, Varner feels this may still be a decent year for cotton. He said planted acreage is up 20 to

25 percent, mainly due to the lack of water and the low prices, and he expects more acreage to be planted next year.

"With the energy costs continuing to rise, I hear a lot of producers talking about rais-

ing more cotton," Varner said.

Typically cotton is not grown much farther north, but Varner said new fast maturing varieties may encourage producers to plant as many as 20,000 acres north of the Canadian River.

So far, with the harvest season just getting under way, Varner estimates 45,000 bales have already been ginned locally.

"We're running at near capacity now," he said. "At least as close as we can with it still

being a little green."

Some farmers are still waiting for the first freeze, hoping to skip the added costs of defoliation, but there are risks involved with waiting too late.

"We're about 10 percent complete right now," he said. "The worst thing that could happen now would be a hail

storm. Producers would lose everything at this point, especially those who don't have a crop history."

Varner said the best thing that could happen now would be several cold nights with temperatures below freezing and cool dry days to continue, until the harvest is complete.

Southern fields finally get rain

Moisture hampers already poor cotton harvests

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — Rain has returned to the Mississippi Delta farmland, but as is the case with hundreds of farmers from Texas to Georgia, the moisture is too little, too late.

"In our area we basically went 2-1/2 months with no moisture from rainfall other than scattered dust-settler showers," said Bernie Jordan, a third-generation delta farmer. "We saw prospects go from expectations of a tremendous crop to a salvage operation."

Across the South, weeks without measurable rainfall and intense heat sapped young cotton plants, cutting production and threatening quality. Those two factors, along with prices, make up the roulette wheel of factors determining whether farmers make a profit or lose money.

Nationally, the cotton yield is expected to be up slightly from a year ago, thanks in

large part to California, the nation's No. 2 producer, and other cotton-producing states in the West. Texas, the top producer, is forecast to have yields 5 percent below last year.

Elsewhere in the South, production is also down.

Mississippi, third nationally in production with 1.8 million bales, will likely average 686 pounds of cotton per acre this year. The state's five-year average is 744 pounds and the 1999 crop produced 708 pounds per acre. A bale of cotton is 480 pounds.

Cotton is the highest-valued row crop in Mississippi, with the 1999 crop estimated at \$440 million. The reduced production comes in a year when acreage was increased in anticipation of good prices after disappointing prices a year ago.

Alabama's projected cotton yield is down 9 percent from a year ago, while Louisiana is down by 5 percent, said Larry Salathe of the National Agricultural Statistics Service in Washington.

Travis Walker, who along with his son farms 800 acres of cotton on Louisiana flatlands between Monroe and the Mississippi River, said pro-

duction losses in his area are likely higher than forecast.

"Personally, we're picking anywhere from 350 pounds to 500 pounds on dry land, when normally on both dry land and irrigated land we average from 700 pounds to 900 pounds," he said.

Farm economist Fred Cook conducted tests on two Mississippi Delta farms that normally produce 800 to 900 pounds of cotton per acre and found both would barely make 500 pounds.

Jordan, who pumps water to about 60 percent of his 2,200 acres of cotton, said he has yet to get a handle on production from irrigated land. But he said it appeared weeks of intense heat had reduced yields.

"The bad thing about this crop, both dry and irrigated, is that we are getting into the big push of harvest," he said. "A lot of this cotton matured prematurely and is exposed to the elements."

"Now we're getting rains that we would have welcomed a few weeks ago, but these rains are damaging," he said. "What we need now is what we had then — plenty of sunshine."

Jordan said adding to the problem are the prices farmers receive for their cotton.

Spot cotton prices have averaged in the 60 cents per pound range and Jordan said he considered the break-even price for his farm to be 62 cents per pound.

"If it wasn't for crop insurance and government marketing assistance, many people would be going out of business," he said.

Grain storage in short supply

DOVER, Del. (AP) — A record corn crop on the Delmarva Peninsula has posed a problem for farmers looking for storage space to keep their corn until it can be milled.

Ray Burton, an inspector with the Delaware Department of Agriculture, said the situation is nearing a crisis.

"There will be a critical storage problem before the corn harvest has been completed," Burton said.

Delaware corn farmers are expected to harvest 24.6 million bushels of corn this year — an 80 percent increase over last year and a new high over the previous record set in 1996 of 22 million bushels of corn. Farmers on Maryland's Eastern Shore are expected to see similar record yields.

The "bin buster" crop has pushed grain elevators and grain mills to their limits.

Despite the booming corn crop, the state of Delaware and the Eastern Shore of Maryland may still have to import approximately 20 million bushels of corn to feed the region's poultry.

Last year, poultry growers on the Delmarva Peninsula raised 606 million broilers and fed them about 71 million bushels of corn. Delmarva corn

farmers provided about 50 million bushels to poultry growers, said Bill Satterfield, executive director of Delmarva Poultry Industry, Inc.

Meanwhile, mills in Maryland and Delaware are running nearly around the clock processing the corn into poultry feed. The more corn that is milled, the more space is available for storage, Burton said.

Between Maryland and Delaware, the peninsula can store about 90 million bushels of grain, but according to some estimates as much as 4 million bushels of corn will be stored on the ground by the end of the harvest.

Ground storage is more common in the Midwest, which has longer and colder winters than the temperate Mid-Atlantic. Moisture can destroy as much as 5 percent of corn stored on the ground.

Perdue Farms Inc. has begun storing corn on the ground at both its Salisbury, Md., headquarters and its mill in Hurlock, Md., said John Cassidy, grain operations manager for the poultry processing company.

The company, which has the capacity to hold from 21 to 22 million bushels of grain, ex-

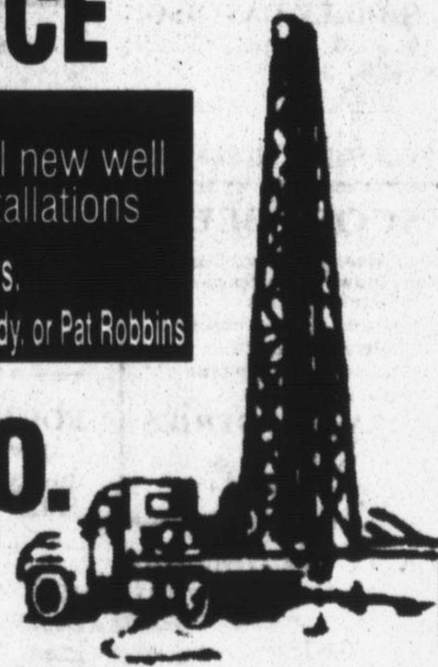

Writing Want Ads that really sell!

Unsure how to write a Classified Ad that will get results? Follow these pointers and you'll soon have an empty space in your storage room and cash in your pocket.

For starters, look at ads which offer the same item/products. Get a sense of going rates and ideas for how to make your ad stand out. Once you're ready to write, begin with exactly what you're selling: "Dining room set, maple, six chairs."

Then remember these hints:

- Give the price. A newspaper consultant says 70 percent of classified readers won't respond to an ad with no price.
- Use key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type of construction, number of bedrooms and baths, and condition.
- Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed by the words, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.
- Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual when you write. Be sure to include a phone number and the best times to reach you.



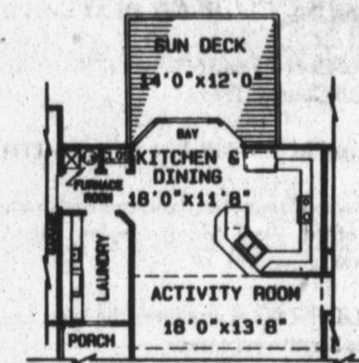
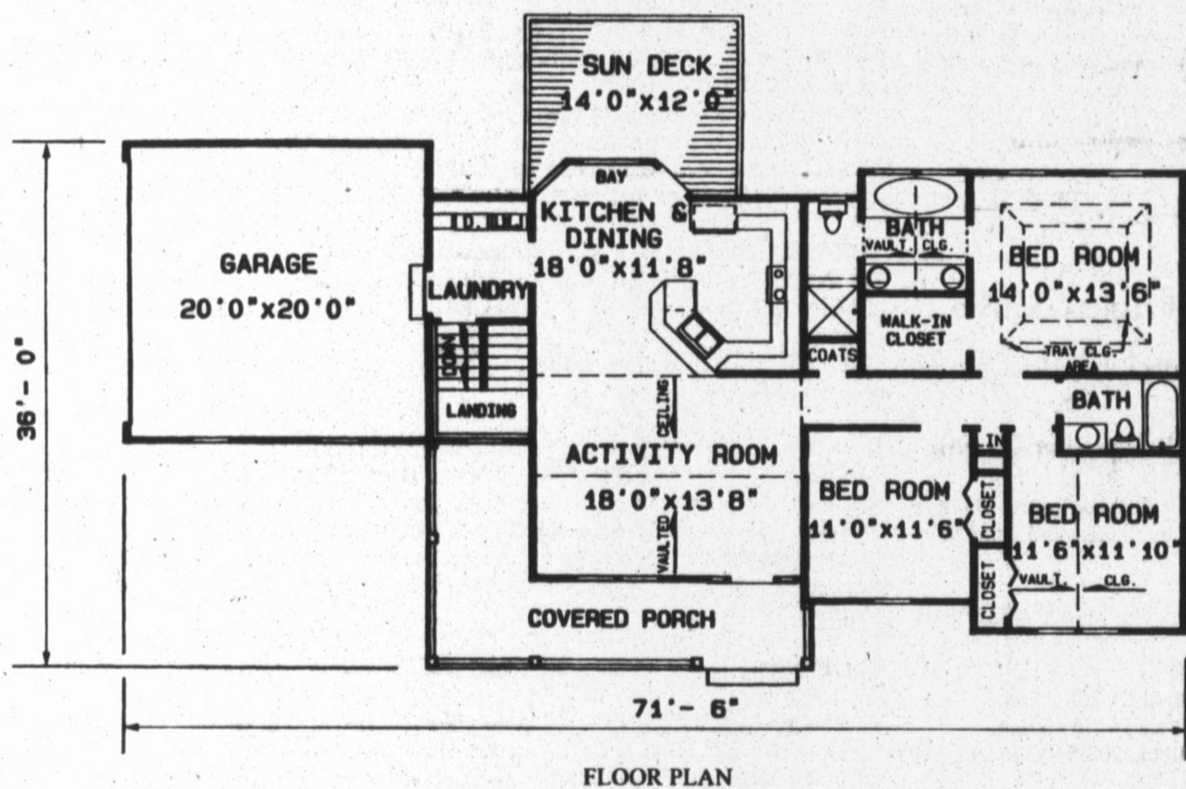

Richard's new character: like Kramer, only tamer

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Michael Richards has said all along that he won't be playing Kramer in his new series.

That it will be difficult to keep that in mind while watching *The Michael Richards Show*, which premieres Tuesday, Oct. 24, on NBC, is in no small way a compliment to the actor's physical gifts. The three-time Emmy winner can get as much mileage out of a prat-fall, bumble or double-take as anyone on television. But while Kramer was over the top, Richards' new character, private detective Vic Nardozza, is a bit more subdued. It's like watching Kramer Lite.

"It would be nice if we could make him an American Inspector Clouseau," Richards says, referring to the work of the late Peter Sellers, one of his comedy influences.

Watching Nardozza crack a case is a bit like watching Dudley Do-Right do the same. Both are lawmen without a clue who somehow always manage to get their man.

Not that Nardozza, much like Richards, doesn't get help. "I realized more than ever the necessity of having a strong supporting cast. That's the trademark of any show that works."

The confused PI is partnered with a brand-new agent, played by relative newcomer Amy Farrington, best known for a small guest role on another NBC show, *ER*. She joins a cast filled with veterans, including Tim Meadows (*Saturday Night Live*, *Ladies Man*), Bill Cobbs (*The Others*, *I Still Know What You Did Last Summer*) and William Devane (*Knots Landing*).

Richards has a certain disdain for most of today's dialogue-driven comedies despite his ties to *Seinfeld*, which was a real groundbreaker in that area. "Most of the comedies that I watch to-

day, they're talking-head comedies. Good, funny patter between them all, but I like to do funny, and I intend to do that with this show," he says.

What makes it all the more interesting is that he, along with three former *Seinfeld* writers, has created a show that thrives on irony, an intelligent quality missing from many comedies. Examples: Nardozza spends 20 minutes of each episode clueless before making some magical leap of logic that solves the case; the firm's muscleman is 65 years old; and Meadows plays a recovering Peeping Tom who, not surprisingly, is very good with surveillance and video equipment.

And then there's Devane's character, the owner of the agency. He's the one who should be the most worried about his befuddled employee, but he seems to be the only one who knows he has a good detective on his hands.

If *The Michael Richards Show* has one glaring weakness, it's the characters who surround Nardozza. What made Kramer work was his self-serving and self-important friends. His entrance brought a change of pace and a fresh perspective to a scene. Here, Nardozza is the self-indulgent one, leaving the others to wonder how he can be so egotistical.

That this angle doesn't work as well in a farce is a small consideration given all the reported problems this series has had, including rewrites, reshoots and cast changes. The writing is funny, Richards still gets laughs with his contortions alone, and Devane and Cobbs are both particularly effective in their supporting roles.

NBC certainly has faith in the program. *The Michael Richards Show* will lead off the network's strong Tuesday block of comedy.

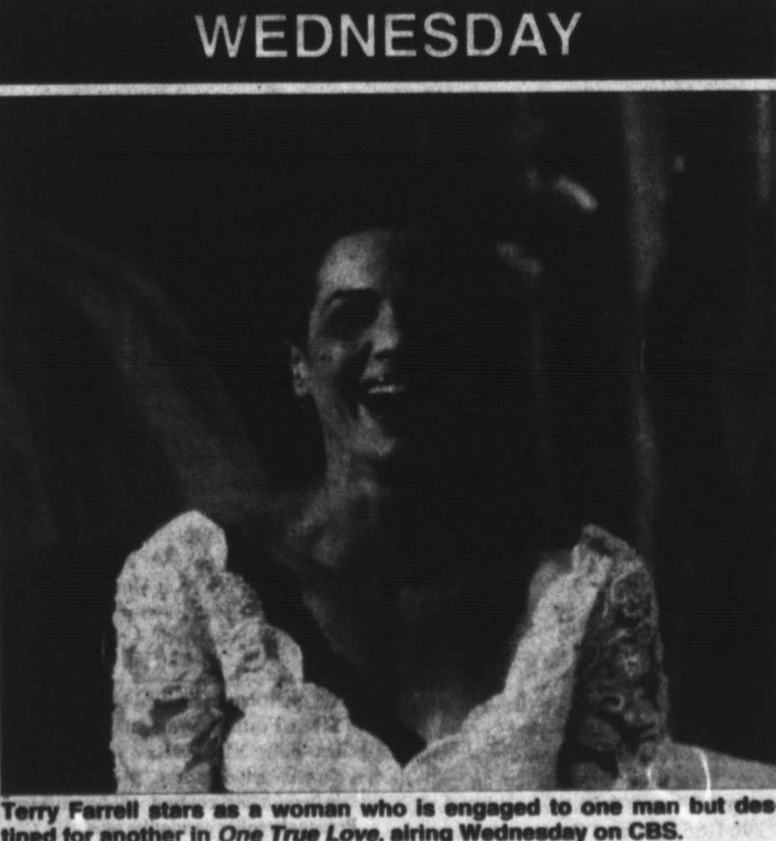

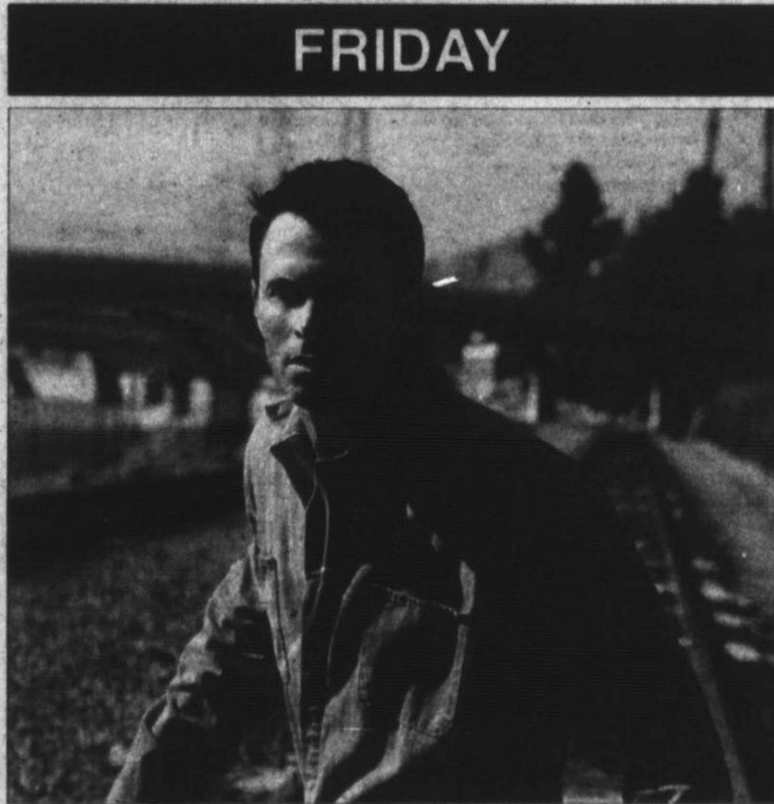
