Along with the general discussion relative to the saving of money comes the growing activity toward the organization of local groups looking in the direction of reducing governmental costs. Investigators are digging up facts and presenting figures galore to show that there are duplications, waste and perhaps extravagance in the operation of even local affairs, to grow to alarming proportions when it reaches district, state and national interests.

An instance of this expenditure of public money is fund in incorporated community. Three distinct agencies are used to assess, collect and spend .tax money for the same people's local affairs-that is, the school system, the city system and the state and county system. When times were good little was thought of having three departments to look after different parts of the people's affairs, but tax associations are being organized with the view of securing legislation to combine various offices under one head to effect untold savings. It is a long way from accomplishment, and simple endorsement will do nothing to bring it to pass. The American people are so used to "letting George do it" that it is doubtful if we will do more than talk about what somebody else ought to do.

The lack of getting behind the proposition and pushing it to a then possible successful conclusion. has as good as killed the paved road movement in Deaf Smith county at the present time, thus losing half a million dollars that would have been spent here for local labor during this year. There was plenty of talk about the proposition, but the work was dillydallied with and delayed until the governor of the state and his appointees, the state highway commission, do not agree as to a proper course of procedure. It would be the height of foolishness to try to put over a road program under those conditions.







### Tax Payers to **Meet Saturday** In Organization

A number of letters that are self explanatory of a called meeting of tax payers to convene in the district court room next Saturday afternoon at 5:00 o'clock, have been mailed to interested citizens during this week. The matter is of vital concern and the Brand is glad to publish the letter in detail. The movement has been agitated for a considerable time and is sponsored by a number of reputable and influential business men. The letter follows:

To the Tax Payers of Deaf Smith County, Texas:

Our tax problems, Federal. State our State, have become serious matters with those who are required to pay them.

Congress searched for and found every conceivable thing of value it could legally tax, and it now finds it self unable to make the "budget' balance with the taxes it can make the people pay, by some two billion dollars; that is, after exhausting all the taxes that Congress thinks can and should be collected, legally, it will still lack two billion dollars having enough money to run and pay the expenses of the National Government. Our State Government and its various taxing subdivisions are all encountering the same difficulties in their efforts to balance their budgets. Additional means of increasing our ever-increasing burden of taxation, in order to try to continue the same policies, are making taxation to the tax payers more oppressive.

To us, as must be to all tax payers, these conditions are serious, and nothing short of bankruptcy and ruin of our governments, as well as our people, will be the result, unless remedied. The remedy cannot be, by increasing rates or values-that will only increase the burden. The remedy must be the reduction of cost of government by the reduction of expenditures, and we consider the matter of such importance to all tax payers, that we ask all the tax payers of this county to meet with us in a mass meeting in the District Court room in Hereford at five o'clock p. m. on the second day of April, 1932, for the purpose of trying to devise some means that will, in some measure, relieve us from the result that will necessarily follow ur present taxing policy.
