## Today's weather OUTLOOK

• **Mostly cloudy skies** •  
Tonight: Mostly cloudy with a 40 percent chance of thunderstorms, lows near 63, northeast winds 10 to 15 mph.

• **Across the state** •  
Remnants of Tropical Storm Beryl continued Thursday to benefit parts of West Texas with rainfall, while other parts of the state remained dry.  
Most activity overnight was restricted to the Guadalupe Mountains. Remnants of the tropical storm, which made landfall earlier this week in northeastern Mexico, were located east of El Paso and moving north.  
Early-morning temperatures were in the 70s and 80s, except for near 60 in the Guadalupe and Davis mountains. It was 61 at Marfa and 74 at Childress.  
Also, it was 79 at Galveston, Palacios and Laredo, and 73 at Junction, Burnet, Georgetown and San Marcos.  
Winds were mostly southerly and southwesterly around 5 mph, except for speeds of 10 to 15 mph in the eastern Panhandle.  
Forecasters held some hope for rainfall in northern parts of Texas from a weak cool front now located across the Oklahoma Panhandle.  
But the National Weather Service offered only a slight chance of afternoon and evening thunderstorms through Friday evening along the Red River in North and West Texas. Isolated rainfall may occur in Southeast Texas.  
Daytime highs through Sunday should range from the high 90s to 103 in the Big Bend and along the Rio Grande, except for 80s in the mountains and lower 90s along the coast.  
Lows overnight were expected from the 60s and 70s with 50s in the mountains.

## PRISON SITE?

### Community leaders initiate first steps to determine if Deaf Smith County should try to get its name on the list for a new TDCJ facility

Preliminary steps are under way to determine if Deaf Smith County should put its name in the pot when the state decides where it wants to build new prisons.

The Texas Board of Criminal Justice recently approved a recommendation for its Fiscal 2003 budget, requesting a bond program to build three maximum-security prisons for \$544 million. The board also wants an additional \$86 million to pay for improvements at existing facilities.

The officials estimate the state will need nearly 15,000 more prison beds. The three new units would

provide 8,550 beds. Another 1,500 beds could be provided if lawmakers approve spending \$17.4 million for 1,000 new beds in other facilities, such as halfway houses and expands its electronic monitoring program.

Representatives of the county, City of Hereford, Hereford Independent School District and Hereford Economic Development Corp. met Wednesday afternoon to begin laying the groundwork to see if there is interest in the community for pursuing a prison, City Manager Chester Nolen said this morning.

Joining Nolen at the session were County Judge Tom Simons, HISD Superintendent Beth Abernethy, Hereford Regional Medical Center

administrator James Taylor and HEDC Executive Director Don Cumpton.

"It was a preliminary meeting. We wanted to see if people are interested," Nolen said. "In 1991 we put together a proposal and a couple of us were involved. We've had some calls from people who want to see if we're going to make another proposal."

"The county judge (Simons) will take a little more definitive role in organizing a committee to explore the possibility," Nolen said.

At Monday's meeting of the Deaf Smith County Commissioners Court, Simons said he believed the county should try to persuade the state to

put a prison near Hereford.

Simons said the prison could be a boon for the area economy because it would generate jobs, both in the construction phase and after it is opened.

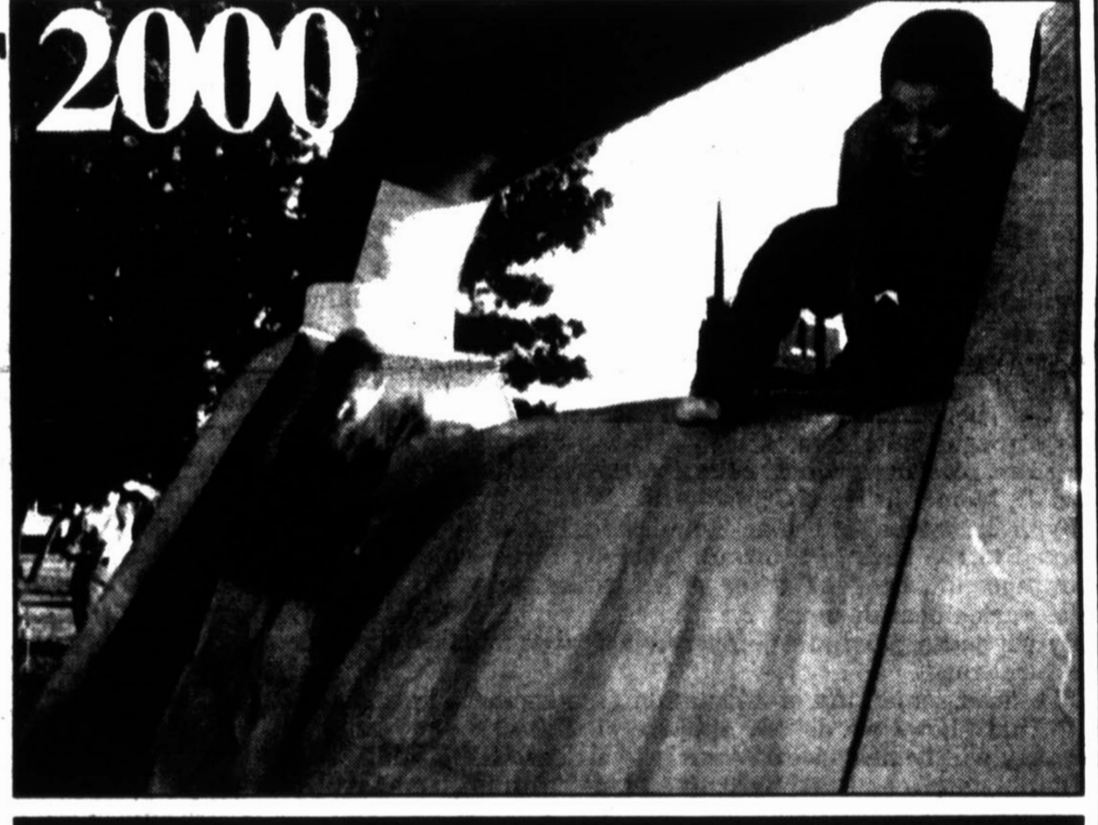
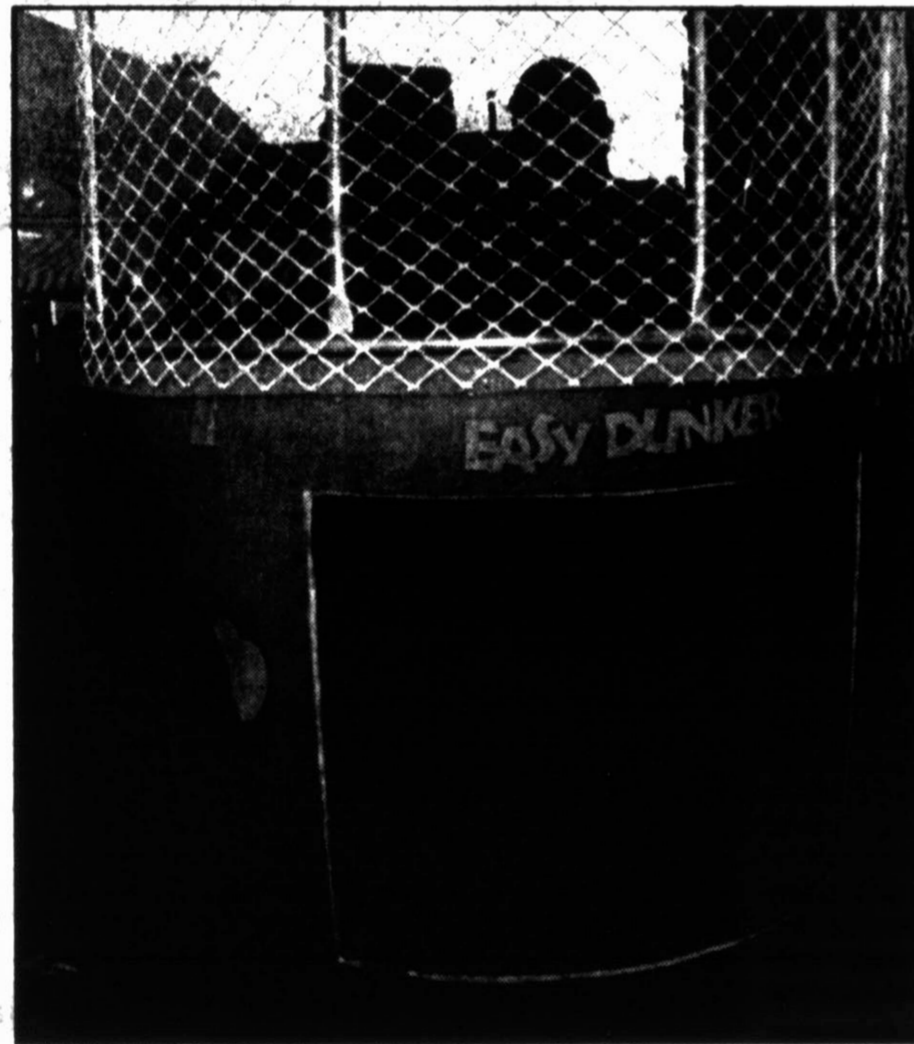
Cumpton said last week any decision to make an effort by the HEDC to promote the Hereford area as a potential site for a prison would be up to the directors.

The state spent nearly \$2 billion over the last decade to ease prison overcrowding, and according to news reports, state Rep. Pat Haggerty, R-El Paso, chairman of the House Corrections Committee, said in May he expects the issue to be a major item during the next session.

## Gore: 'the new guard'

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LOS ANGELES (AP) — Democratic presidential nominee Al Gore, a political underdog no more, is urging Americans to reject Republicans who would take them "back to the past," and promising to deliver prosperity, progress and positive change if he wins the White House.

"We're the new guard," the vice president said in a preview of the nationally televised address he delivers Thursday night at the Democratic National Convention. That acceptance speech is a vital step in his quest to catch and beat Republican George W. Bush, Gore's hour at the center of the national stage, his send-off into the intense, 82 days of campaigning that will settle the issue.

Gore said he has been working on it for two months, "rewriting and editing and tweaking" the words with which he hopes to reintroduce himself after eight years as vice president, and persuade the voters to shorten the title by a word.

His campaign chairman, William Daley, said in advance that the speech would be an opportunity for Gore to

address people who think "that he's just a boring, stiff, you know, unable-to-speak guy," and to come through as a real person.

Gore's nominators Wednesday — his college roommate, a black Tennessee legislator and friend, and his daughter — stressed the personal over the political as they presented his name for the formality of his unopposed nomination.

Gore was nominated in a ritual roll call of the states, staged after East Coast television time. Gore won a shutout since there was no other candidate.

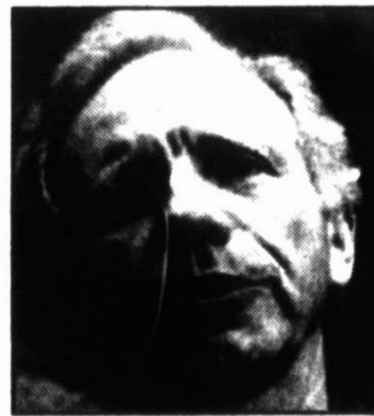
Gore's name was put in nomination by his college roommate at Harvard, actor Tommy Lee Jones, Tennessee legislator Lois DeBerry, a friend of 25 years, and his elder daughter, Karenna Gore Schiff.

"I hope, for the sake of our country and our future, that my father is elected president," she said. "But I want you to know, to me, he's already won. For he has been the most wonderful father in the world."

As she stepped back to the cheers of the convention, Gore walked on to hug her and walk across the stage with her. She said she was surprised, although news photographers and reporters had been alerted to Gore's cameo appearance earlier in the day.

At a welcoming rally in Burbank earlier in the day, Gore said people deserve to know exactly what the candidates are proposing "so you can make an informed judgment."

He said teachers should get better pay, with smaller classes, higher standards and more accountability, that the minimum wage should be increased, that patients' rights should be guaranteed in dealing with HMOs, that there should be a hate crimes law, new gun controls, new steps to "clean up our air and water."

Some of the positions long held by Joseph Lieberman in the Senate are proving changeable, even expendable, now that he's Al Gore's running mate.

The man who championed experimental school vouchers now says he won't press the idea.

Intrigued by making Social Security partly private, he took another look once he was on Gore's running-mate radar screen and came to Gore's precise conclusion that such a course would be a "risky."

One of his first acts upon arriving in Los Angeles this week for the Democratic National Convention was to pledge fealty to the party line on affirmative action after crossing that line in the past.

"What I think he has to do is put aside this business of apologizing for his career," political scientist Robert Dallek said from Boston University.

### Some long-held views proving to be changeable

No apology has been delivered, as such. Instead, it's a process of explaining away or burying conflicts. That, in Dallek's view, amounts to saying sorry.

Although it can be unsettling to watch, it's a common enough scenario when matching presidential and vice presidential candidates. Dick Cheney had to do some of it too in becoming Republican George W. Bush's man.

Few such pairings can agree on everything and running mates are chosen on qualities other than point-to-point compatibility on policy.

But Lieberman's journey is more complicated than usual. Not only have some of his views been out of step with Gore, but they have been in step with several signature positions of Bush.

In June, Lieberman wrote a newspaper piece that was not published.

•Democrats toughen hate crimes bill

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Julian Vasquez-Hellig joined fellow Texans in making a promise as the family of the late James Byrd Jr. spoke about hate crimes at the Democratic National Convention. "Never again in Texas!" the delegates chanted after the family's speech on a night Democrats pushed their desire to pass stronger hate crimes legislation. That goal is echoed in the state platform, which calls for the passage of the James Byrd Jr. Memorial Hate Crimes Act. Byrd, a 49-year-old black man and father of three, was chained to the back of a pickup truck by three white men two years ago and dragged three miles to his death in the East Texas woods near Jasper. Byrd's decapitated, dismembered body was left in the middle of a rural road. "We need some kind of legislation as a community and as a state that shows we do not approve of those types of actions, and they will be dealt with severely," Vasquez-Hellig said. Byrd's children, Ross Byrd and Rene Mullins, appeared at the convention Wednesday. "Hate crimes must die, but my father's legacy must live on," Mullins told the crowd. "America has a choice in November." Texas Democrats want to strengthen the state's current hate crimes law, which punishes crimes committed with bias or prejudice as a motive.

•Theater reopens

ARCHER CITY, Texas (AP) — In this one-stoplight town immortalized in a 1971 Academy Award-winning film, a national icon is rising from the ashes. Thirty-five years after the Royal Theater burned down, the front of the stone building — complete with a blue and white marquee, orange awnings and illuminated "Royal" sign — has been rebuilt to appear as it did in "The Last Picture Show," based on a novel by Archer City native Larry McMurtry. The site of the original 100-seat theater won't show movies but will be an open-air amphitheater with a larger room next door for bands, plays, dinner theater and art classes. "This," said project coordinator Abby Abernathy, "would have been simple to rebuild as a movie theater, but for what? To get 100 people in here?" The renovated theater will be unveiled Thursday night, the 35th anniversary of the fire. Abernathy has envisioned the restoration since he bought the property nearly 15 years ago. He has received little support from locals, many of whom objected to the movie's sexual themes and felt it denigrated their town. After working on the restoration for several years, though, Abernathy has convinced many that this link to the past is key to the town's future.

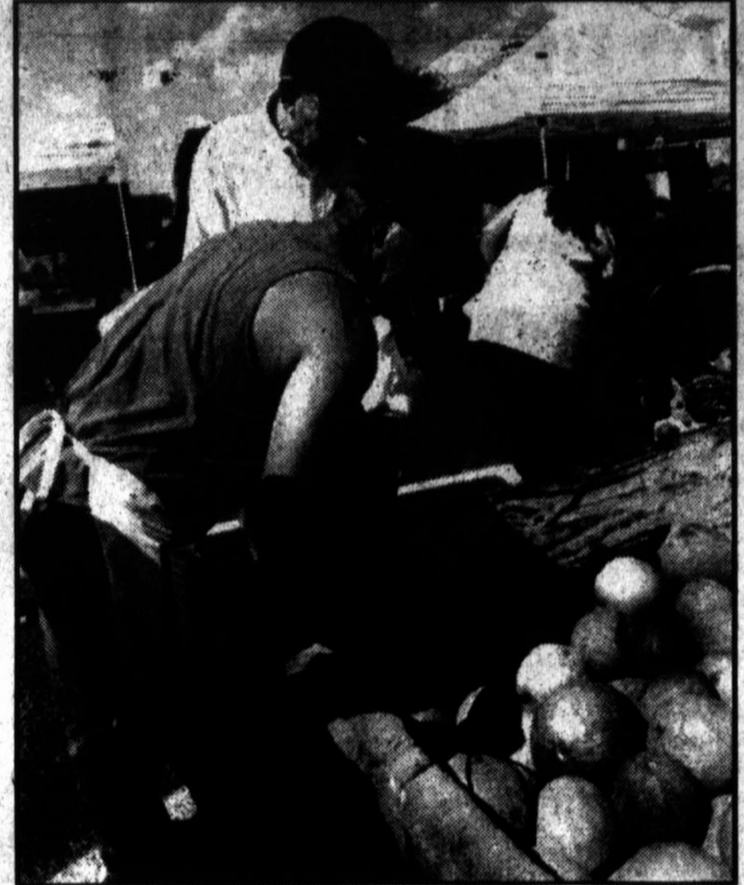

College board sells e-mail addresses

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — High school students whose mailboxes overflow with college publications each summer and fall may soon find the same onslaught in their virtual mailboxes. The College Board is selling students' e-mail addresses to colleges and universities this summer for the first time. The nonprofit administrator of the SAT has since the 1970s sold lists of test-takers' names and addresses to accredited colleges. "We're talking about provid-

ing colleges sometimes hundreds and thousands of names where they're really cultivating first contact," said Brad Quin, executive director of admission with the Reston, Va.-based College Board. Only e-mail addresses of students who register online — about 38 percent of the 750,000 students who took the test between January and June — are available right now, Quin said. "That number is growing by leaps and bounds," he said. Many colleges already use e-mail to communicate with their students, but most have yet to take full advantage of virtual marketing, he said. Meanwhile, consulting companies have sprung up to help colleges market themselves online. "Students don't want mail, they want e-mail," said Brian Niles, whose Philadelphia-area company, TargetX.com, helps colleges communicate with students through e-mail. The company has already been contacted by schools for assistance in setting up and administering e-mail systems. Contacting prospective students through e-mail serves a dual purpose: It's cheaper and it shows students that the college uses the same technology that they do, Niles said. He has created a student search service which will use the College Board's e-mail list and will cost colleges 6 cents for each message plus a \$150 setup fee. At Temple University, admissions officers are already using e-mail to stay in contact with students, said Donna Mlaker, the university's associate director of admissions. The school does not use e-mail addresses, though, to contact prospective students ini-

ACT scores remain steady; more taking college tests

AUSTIN (AP) — The number of Texas students taking the ACT college entrance exam is up, but the state's average composite score remains steady and slightly below the national average, according to ACT figures released Thursday. Texas' composite score remained at 20.3 out of a possible 36 for the third year in a row. The national average is 21 for the fourth year in a row. There was an increase in the number of Texas students taking the test — 68,010 out of 212,531 seniors from private and public schools. "Testing experts tell us that test scores tend to drop as the number of test takers increases," Education Commissioner Jim Nelson said. "While we certainly would have preferred an increase in our scores, we are thankful that we maintained our composite score even though quite a few more Texas students took the exam last year."

## Killer earthquake struck Turkey on today's date, one year ago

Today is Thursday, Aug. 17, the 230th day of 2000. There are 136 days left in the year.

**Today's Highlight in History:**

One year ago, on Aug. 17, 1999, more than 17,000 people were killed when a magnitude 7.4 earthquake struck Turkey.

**On this date:**  
In 1807, Robert Fulton's North River Steam Boat began heading up New York's Hudson River on its successful round-trip to Albany.

In 1863, Federal batteries and ships bombarded Fort Sumter in Charleston harbor during the Civil War.

In 1896, a prospecting party discovered gold in Alaska, a finding that touched off the Klondike gold rush.

In 1940, President Roosevelt and Canadian Prime Minister William Mackenzie King met in Ogdensburg, N.Y., where they agreed to set up a joint defense commission.

In 1943, the Allied conquest

## Local eyes history in Scotland

■ Hereford's Kevin King travels to Europe and witnesses Tiger Woods' triumph at the British Open Championship

Have you ever seen a Tiger play golf?

Kevin King has. Last month, King and his parents took a family trip to visit his cousin when he suddenly found himself in a once in a lifetime situation.

A chance to see Tiger Woods in action.

"I wanted to see one of those popular players you always hear about," King said. "Plus it was the British Open at St. Andrews, the birthplace of golf."

So King paid his 13 pounds (about \$20) and headed off with his cousin to see perhaps the greatest golfer today.

King and his cousin went to the course on Saturday, one day before Woods would become the youngest golfer ever to win every major tournament once by claiming the British Open's Claret Jug.

King said he knew Woods was an awesome golfer but had no idea how well he was already doing in the tournament.

"We (the crowd) knew we were watching something special," King said. "The crowd

was talking about how remarkable he was."

On Saturday, Woods took an eight stroke lead crushing the hopes of anyone who dared chase him. King said all of the observers knew that no one would be able to catch him.

"When we saw him he was eight strokes ahead," King said. "We knew no one was going to come back."

King said another interesting thing was that the rest of the field had already begun to show their frustration at Woods' perfection.

"It was over," King said. King said when he and his cousin realized Woods was dominating the action, they quickly became a part of the crowd following Woods to every hole. King said they even would travel ahead on the course just to get a good spot to catch a glimpse of the 24-year-old golf legend.

"Probably about 75 percent of the crowd was following him," King said. "It was like a race to the next hole just to get a good spot to see him tee off or on the green."

"Some would even go four holes ahead."

King said the crowds' size made security and Woods a little nervous.

"Before the golfers teed off security would get up there and push the crowd back," King said.

One of the tournament's rules was that no cameras were allowed to be used during play, but King and his cousin took their video camera with them and got some great memories on film that

they will never get tired of watching.

Before their tee times, King said the golfers would go to a practice green and warm up.

He and his cousin went back to the putting green and got some footage of other notables getting ready.

"We got some video of David Duval, Sergio Garcia, Tom Kite and Mark O'Meara," King said.

King and his cousin were able to get close to the players because all that separated them from the golfers was a yellow rope.

When following Woods, King said he could have reached out and taped him on the shoulder. King said standing so close to the superstar was

an amazing feeling.

"I am a big basketball fan, and I love Michael Jordan," said King. "It was like standing next to the Michael Jordan of golf."

"It was neat standing next to somebody who has set all kinds of records and will probably be the greatest for a long time, and I can say I stood next to him."

King said he thought it was neat to be standing so close to Woods while the entire world was watching him on television.

"It's unbelievable," said King. King also said that he

quickly learned to appreciate Woods' determination and focus on the golf course.

He said it seemed almost like Woods did not even realize the amount of people or pressure surrounding him.

"On every hole he would stare at that ball from every angle," King said. "He would measure out every detail and take about five minutes until he putted."

King was also able to see Woods kneel down and bend the bill of his cap to examine a putt. This action has become a trademark of the young champion.

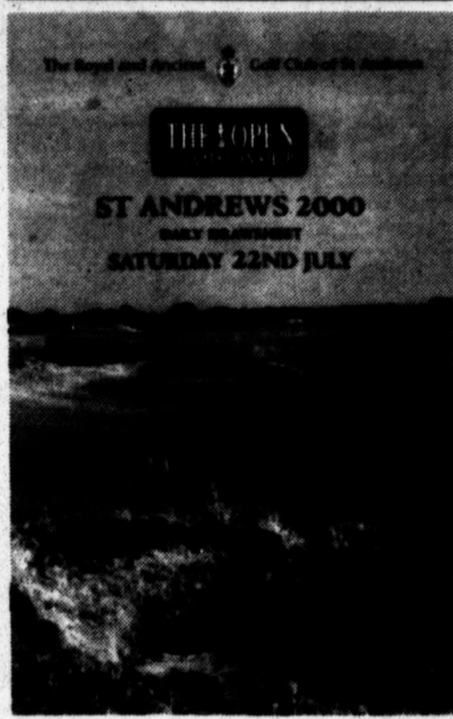
"He would crouch down and grab his hat," King said. "Other golfers would not take near as long to putt."

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## Sims, Applewhite to lead 'Horns

■ Head coach Mack Brown skeptical of team's 1999 finish and pre-season number seven ranking

AUSTIN (AP) — Asked before the preseason polls came out if Texas deserved a top 10 ranking, coach Mack Brown said no.

"I don't think you can rate a team in the top 10 that lost its last three games and be fair," Brown said. "Those games were a wake-up call and may help our program in the long run, but there's too many question marks at this point."

Obviously, the pollsters weren't listening.

Texas heads into the 2000 season at No. 7 in The Associated Press preseason poll, a strong showing that indicates the voters believe Texas is good enough to stand among the nation's elite teams — and quickly get up off the mat.

The Longhorns were rolling along at 9-2 and ranked No. 5 last season when the bottom fell out with consecutive losses to Texas A&M, Nebraska in the Big 12 title game and Arkansas in the Cotton Bowl.

Quarterback Major Applewhite, the 1999 Big 12 offensive player of the year, said the late crash left bitter feelings about the lost oppor-

tunity for a great season. Adding injury to insult, Applewhite suffered a torn knee ligament in the 27-6 Cotton Bowl loss to the Razorbacks.

"That was just the culmination of a lot of bad stuff. I can still hear the pop resonate in my head," Applewhite said. "The losing streak really hurt our pride. This team is ready to come back from that."

Brown believes the Longhorns should be able to avoid a similar collapse this year, his third in Austin.

"The attitude. I really like this team," Brown said. "I've been in enough transition periods to know that it takes two years to figure out your problems and the third year to straighten things out."

The Longhorns return 16 starters, including nine on a defense anchored by All-American defensive lineman Casey Hampton.

On offense, Texas returns its entire offensive line and 1,343-yard rusher Hodges Mitchell.

The Longhorns' success will depend largely on the play — and attitude — of their quarterbacks.

Applewhite's knee injury forced him to sit out spring practice and Brown has left the position up for grabs with sophomore sensation Chris Simms ready to challenge for the job.

Simms played well in mop-

up duty and one start last season and drew praise from the coaching staff for his development in spring practice while Applewhite recovered from surgery.

Brown has said the quarterbacks could share time. He used a two-QB system during his years at North Carolina and went to five straight postseason bowl games.

What the team can't afford are hurt feelings.

"We won't let a pouting quarterback ruin our chemistry," Brown said.

"The quarterback situation is a good problem to have," said offensive coordinator Greg Davis. "I think we have two guys we are confident we can win with."

The quarterbacks will depend heavily on a receiving corps that must mature quickly. Gone are wideouts Kwame Cavil and Ryan Nunez, who combined for 156 receptions and 1,788 yards last season.

In their place is an inexperienced group led by speedy Montrell Flowers, who finished 1999 with 34 catches for 552 yards and six TDs. The Longhorns will rely heavily on a highly-touted crop of freshman receivers, including high school

All-American B.J. Johnson.

On the schedule, Texas won't play top-ranked Nebraska, No. 8 Kansas State and Iowa State, picking up Missouri, Kansas and Colorado instead. Texas also got a travel breather when the Longhorns dropped a scheduled Sept. 2 season-opener at Hawaii.

The move drew sharp criticism from the Rainbows, who said the Longhorns were scared to play them. Texas paid Hawaii a \$100,000 fee for canceling the game.

Strong recruiting classes the last two years have created depth and should help Texas avoid the fatigue factor that plagued the Longhorns in 1999.

Texas plays 10 straight weeks before its only open date prior to the Nov. 24 matchup with Texas A&M.

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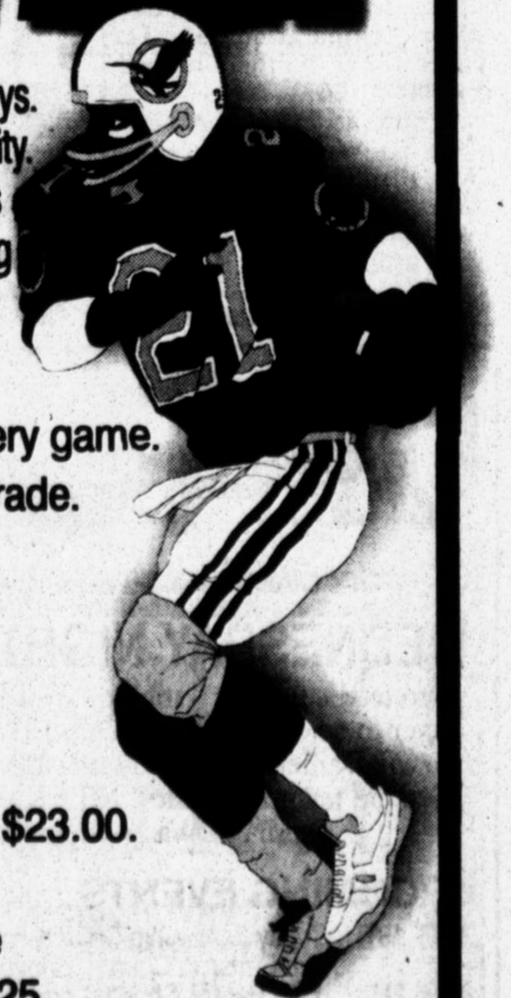

but released after Gore picked him, explaining how he ultimately had decided it would be a bad idea to let people put some of their payroll taxes into personal retirement accounts instead of Social Security, as Bush wants.

Previously he had said, "A remarkable wave of innovative thinking is advancing the concept of privatization."

The idea of letting parents in some failing schools use federal money — vouchers — for private schooling is part of Bush's education agenda and something Lieberman repeatedly pushed in the Senate.

Gore says vouchers would wreck public education.

Now Lieberman has explained his praise for a 1996 California ballot initiative limiting affirmative action by saying it sounded good when a reporter told him about it.

He often has complained that group preferences are unfair. On the other hand, he has voted several times in favor of affirmative action.

For all that, Tipper Gore said her husband's running mate is a man of strong opinions and "I wouldn't expect ... Senator Lieberman to trim his sails."

If so, that may be because he has already thrown some things overboard.

# MasterCard sues Nader over parody

NEW YORK (AP) — They say imitation is the sincerest form of flattery, but MasterCard International Ltd. is having nothing of it.

The credit card company filed a \$5 million lawsuit Wednesday against Ralph Nader, accusing him of ripping off MasterCard's well-known

"Priceless" advertising campaign in a new TV ad for the Green Party presidential candidate.

"We feel we have one of the most successful advertising campaigns, period, and we will always do whatever it takes to protect this campaign," said Chris O'Neill, vice president of global marketing communications for Purchase, N.Y.-based MasterCard.

MasterCard filed its lawsuit

in federal court in Manhattan on Wednesday, seeking an order barring Nader from running the ad. O'Neill said the company brought the suit after a week of fruitless conversations with the campaign.

MasterCard's ads features sentimental episodes of families together at places including a beach or baseball game, assigning monetary values to various activities before coming up with an activity that is

"Priceless." The ads conclude: "There are some things in life money can't buy. For everything else, there's MasterCard."

The Nader ad adopts a nearly identical format to focus attention on the role of political contributions in this year's presidential campaign. The ad opens with video clips of Texas Gov. George W. Bush and Vice President Al Gore, as an announcer intones

"Grilled tenderloin for fundraiser: \$1,000 a plate. Campaign ads filled with half-truths: \$10 million. Promises to special interest groups: over \$10 billion."

"Finding out the truth: Priceless."

But Laura Jones, deputy press secretary for the Nader campaign, the 30-second ad was still airing in Los Angeles and that it has proven a valuable tool in awakening voters.

## Cheney gets \$13.6 million retirement deal

DALLAS (AP) — Republican vice presidential nominee Dick Cheney officially left his oil-services firm Wednesday with a generous retirement package that drew criticism from Democrats and raised eyebrows of some compensation experts.

Cheney received shares and stock options from Halliburton Co. worth more than \$13.6 million, according to officials of the Dallas-based company and filings with the Securities and Exchange Commission.

He had received a salary of \$1.3 million and earned \$3 million by selling Halliburton stock in May.

Before the company released details of his retirement package, Cheney made his final rounds at Halliburton offices in Houston, avoiding reporters along the way.

Doug Hattaway, a spokesman for Vice President Al Gore, said Cheney's retirement package represents "a big investment" by the oil industry in the Republican ticket of Cheney and Texas Gov. George W. Bush.

"It adds to the perception that Republicans are tied to special interests," Hattaway said.

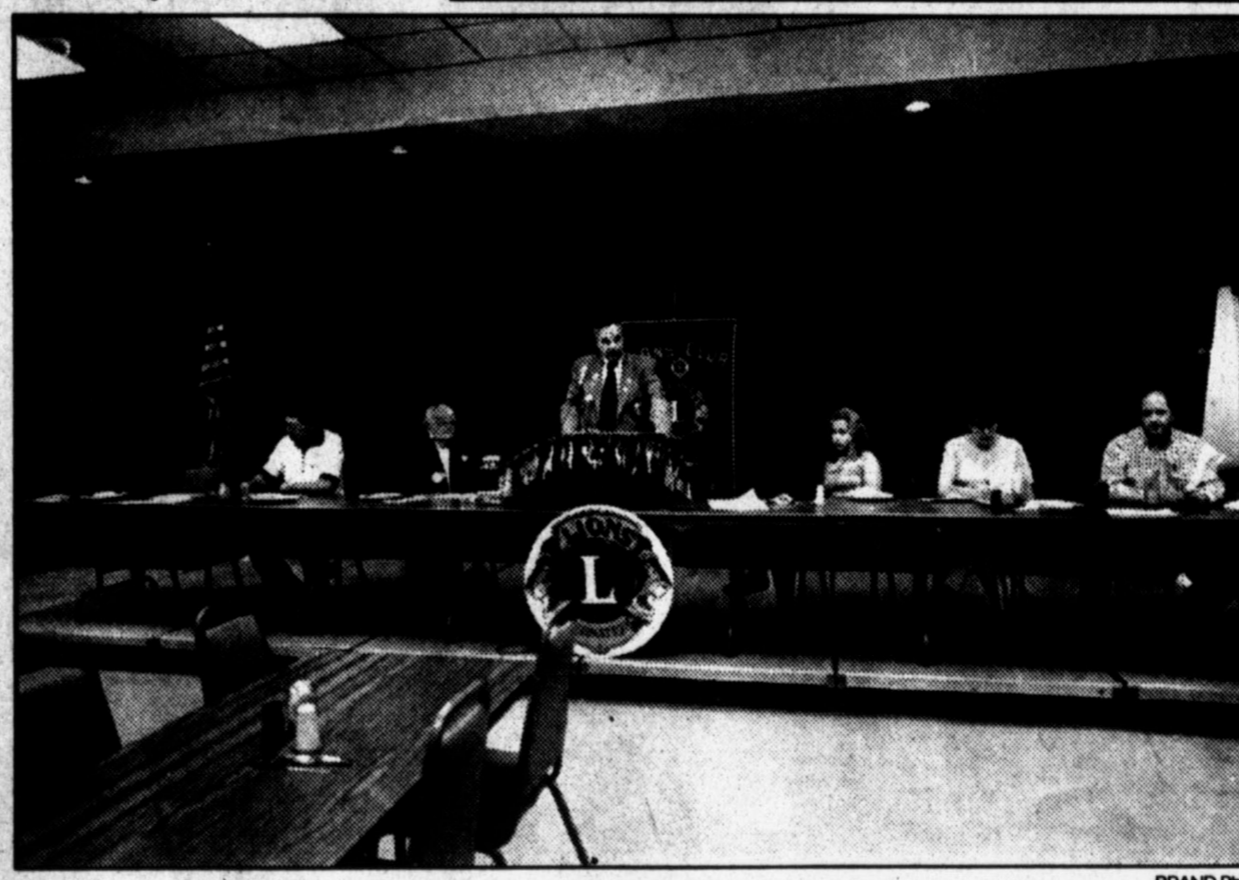

Clinton taps Bush library director to direct effort

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — The director of the Bush Presidential Library was named Wednesday to oversee the massive effort of storing and organizing President Clinton's documents and memorabilia until his library can be built. David E. Alsbrook said he expects to leave his Texas post and take over the Clinton effort in Little Rock on Oct. 16, when the National Archives and Records Administration is to take custody of a temporary holding building. Clinton's historical materials include more than 75 million pages of official and personal papers, about 1.85 million photographs and 75,000 presidential gifts. "The volume for any president when he leaves office can be very intimidating, because it's a lot of stuff," Alsbrook said in telephone interview from the Bush Library in Col-

lege Station, Texas. "Our job is to make sure this material is readily available and accessible to the American people centuries from now, long after we're dead and gone." The city of Little Rock is paying \$8.5 million to buy 27 acres of land for Clinton's library along the Arkansas River near downtown. The library complex, estimated at \$80 million to \$125 million, is to be built with private donations. No date has been set for the library to open. Alsbrook said he expects to direct the pre-library Clinton Presidential Materials Project for three to five years. Alsbrook directed the sorting and storage for George Bush's historical materials and then was named to direct the Bush Presidential Library in 1997. He also served as the supervisory archivist at the Carter Library in Atlanta from

1981 until 1991. Directors of presidential libraries are appointed by the U.S. archivist with the consultation of the former president and his family. Alsbrook said he has never met Clinton and described himself as nonpartisan. Archive officials said a director for the Clinton Library will not be chosen until later. "To my knowledge, there have been no discussions with Clinton about who would direct the library," said Gerald George, spokesman for the National Archives and Records Administration. As director of the Clinton materials project, Alsbrook said he expects to provide suggestions on the design of the library's storage space and research areas. As director of the Bush Library, he said, he already has consulted with the people planning Clinton's

Analysts: Russian sub wrecked by explosion MOSCOW— Underwater rescue capsules fighting to reach 118 seamen trapped on a Russian nuclear submarine failed again Thursday as new evidence suggested a massive explosion shattered large areas of the vessel and many sailors had no time to escape. Navy officials said there were no signs of life, but that some of the crew could still be alive. Rescue capsules trying to link up with the submarine for the past three days were again driven back Thursday by racing currents and swirling sand in the inky darkness far down on the sea bottom. Prime Minister Mikhail Kasyanov described the situation as "close to catastrophic."

Cloned pigs seen as replacement organs WASHINGTON— The cloned barnyard has a new resident: the pig, a creature researchers say holds promise for growing organs to replace ailing hearts, livers and kidneys in humans. A team led by Japanese and American researchers announced in the journal Science that a single piglet had been cloned. Separately, a Scottish company said it had cloned a litter of five pigs. "Pigs have an enormous potential for" transplanting organs to humans, said Tony Perry, a Rockefeller University researcher and co-author of the Science study. "This is a breakthrough toward that goal."

Karen is ejected from 'Big Brother' NEW YORK — Karen, the often-emotional mother of four, was plucked from the "Big Brother" house on Wednesday's live broadcast of the CBS reality series, which airs the residents' behavior six nights a week. Laughing and crying on hearing the news, she hugged her housemates and wished them well, then made her exit. The object of "Big Brother" is to stay in the house, not leave. But on a past episode, Karen had pleaded with viewers to spring her with their phoned-in votes, so she could rejoin her children back home in Columbus, Ind. "I'm ecstatic," said Karen, weeping as she joined host Julie Chen in the Los Angeles studio beside the house. "I get to see my kids. That's all I wanted to do."

'Love Letter' virus hits Swiss banks WASHINGTON — A new strain of the "Love Letter" computer virus is targeting customers of a Swiss bank, stealing their account information and sending it off to the virus writer, U.S. computer security companies said Wednesday. The virus, known as "VBS/ Loveletter.bd," is a variant of the original Love Letter virus that circulated in May, and many versions have been created using the original as a template. This new strain replicates itself using Microsoft's Outlook e-mail program, and includes a resume. A previous Love Letter version had a resume as well, of a Filipino student. The new resume is in German and represents a job applicant in Zurich, Switzerland.

■ Civil liberties group objects to how to release its e-mail files

WASHINGTON (AP) — A civil liberties group objects to how the FBI plans to release to the public some of the 3,000 pages of documents describing its "Carnivore" e-mail surveillance system.

The group says the schedule laid out by the government is too open-ended.

The Justice Department told a federal judge Wednesday that the FBI had located 3,000 pages in response to a Freedom of Information request and lawsuit by the group, the Electronic Privacy Information Center, which asked for every document the FBI has describing the computerized system that has raised an uproar among civil libertarians and in Congress.

The government said the FBI could release the first batch of documents in about 45 days. Additional releases should follow every 45 days until all the pages have been evaluated for release. But the Justice Department and the FBI gave no commitment to either process or to release any specific number of pages in each interval.

"The proposed schedule is far too open-ended," complained David Sobel, general counsel of the group. "With no clear commitment to evaluate a specific number of pages in each interval, this process could stretch on for many months or even years."

The department told U.S. District Judge James Robertson in a written status report that the government has begun reviewing the pages to see if any should be withheld as classified information.

## 86 wildfires raging across the West

HELENA, Mont. (AP) — Some 86 raging wildfires ripping through forest, brush and grass across the West have burned more than 1 million acres — and show no signs of slowing.

On Wednesday, officials closed Yellowstone National Park's south entrance, people were evacuated from South Dakota's Black Hills and the danger extended to Alaska.

So far this year, 4.9 million acres have burned nationwide, according to the National Interagency Fire Center in

Boise, Idaho, more than double the 10-year average.

Montana's 25 largest active fires accounted for nearly half

of the total acreage burning. This year, more than 2,000 fires have burned 457,000 acres statewide.

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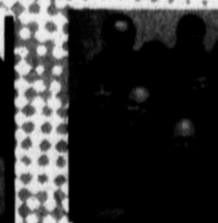
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
