Voters to decide 2 county races Tuesday

Texas Demos to pick U.S. Senate candidate

Voters will finish what they started in March when they go to the polls Tuesday to decide winners of political party nominations for county and state offices.

Polls will be open Tuesday from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. for both Democratic and Republican voters. (See Where to Vote on this page.)

An early voting period of only five days drew more than 600 Democrats to mark ballots prior to election day. In the March primary, 1,274 persons cast early votes in a total turnout of 2,972.

Republican interest is low because most races were decided in the primary. Only 10 early votes were cast. In the March primary, 110 persons voted early in a total of 246.

Deaf Smith County Clerk David Ruland, chief elections officer for the county, foresees only a "moderate" turnout for Tuesday.

"I think we may do better than the state average, though," said Ruland. Observers believe the March primary turnout was impacted by a late winter snowstorm that spread across the area. Weather for Tuesday is expected to have no effect on voting.

A countywide contest between Nan Rogers and Lois Jones will determine the next treasurer of Deaf Smith County. There is no Republican candidate for the office being vacated at the end of the current term by Vesta Mae Nunley.

Deaf Smith County Democrats in Precinct 2 will decide their nominee for commissioner. The winner of the race between the incumbent, Lupe Chavez, and Bernie Griego will face a Republican opponent, Conny Whitehorn, in the November general election.

Democrats all over Texas will make a decision on a candidate for U.S. Senator.

Jim Mattox, a former Texas attorney general, and a Dallas businessman, Richard Fisher, with former ties to Ross Perot, have conducted a war of words in their quest to face the incumbent, Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison, in November.

Another race on the Democratic ticket that has gathered increasing attention is between Raul Gonzalez and Rene Haas for Place 1 on the Texas Supreme Court.

Rounding out the Democratic runoff is a race for the nomination for Place 2 on the Court of Criminal Appeals, between Gene Kelly and Betty Marshall.

On the Republican side, a contest between Sam Bayless and Sharon Keller will end with a nominee for the Criminal Appeals court Place 2.

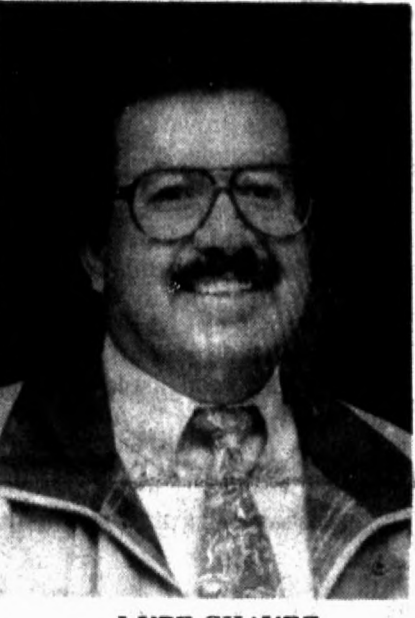

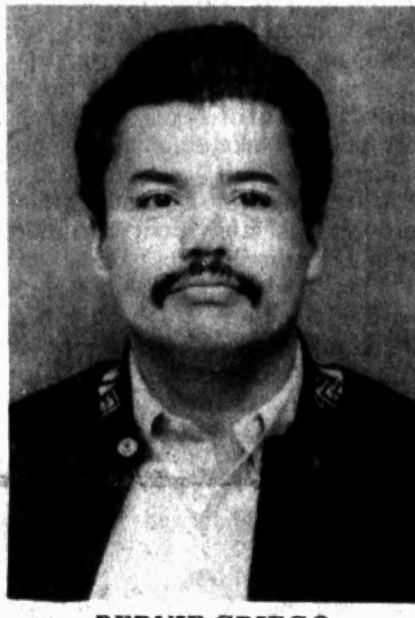

Endeavor blasts into orbit early Saturday

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) - Space shuttle Endeavour blasted into orbit with six astronauts Saturday on a mission to test the most advanced radar ever built for environmental monitoring.

The 4.5 million-pound rocketship thundered from its seaside pad at 6:05 a.m. CDT. A tall, billowing cloud of vapor was left in its wake, tinted peach by the rising sun.

Endeavour hugged the East Coast on its way to orbit. The shuttle resembled a bright star before it disappeared from view more than 100 miles from the launch site.

Saturday morning's weather was far better than it was Friday, when clouds and high wind forced NASA to forgo the launch. The flight also had been delayed earlier in the week because of a last-minute engine inspection.

The \$366 million worth of radar equipment on Endeavour will scan Earth's mountains, deserts, oceans, volcanoes and forests during the nine-day flight. NASA expects to map 18 million square miles.

Commander Sidney Gutierrez and his crew will photograph the sites 138 miles below for comparison. At the same time, about 2,000 researchers, teachers and students around the world will help verify the radar's accuracy by taking their own surveys: measuring soil moisture, for instance, and clipping leaves.

The two radar instruments will fly aboard Endeavour again in August so researchers can observe the sites in a different season. NASA supplied one of the instruments; the other was provided by Germany and Italy's space agencies.

Also aboard Endeavour is an \$8 million device for measuring carbon monoxide that will give information on the so-called greenhouse effect.

The flight is part of NASA's Mission to Planet Earth, an ongoing program to study Earth from space. It's the sixth flight for NASA's newest shuttle and the 62nd for the shuttle program.

Five space veterans are assigned to the mission: commander Gutierrez, pilot Kevin Chilton, Linda Godwin, Jay Apt and Michael Clifford. The lone rookie is Thomas Jones.

Shortly after the initial countdown began Monday, NASA bumped the launch from Thursday to Friday to check Endeavour's engine oxidizer pumps for a defect discovered elsewhere in the fleet. The pumps checked out fine.

Endeavour is due back at Kennedy Space Center on April 18.

Aides say plan still short of votes in House, Senate

Clinton defends health care plan, blasts foes for 'hot-air rhetoric'

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Clinton completed three televised town-hall meetings on his health care plan with a blast at opponents for performing "hit jobs" and spouting "a bunch of hokey."

Now, back in Washington after a week of promoting the plan on the road, Clinton will try to translate his effort into votes in Congress.

He called approval of a universal health care plan his No. 1 priority for the rest of the year.

The president returned early today after a final town-hall telecast in St. Paul, Minn., that also involved studio audiences in Milwaukee, Detroit and Sioux Falls, S.D.

Although audio difficulties made it difficult for the audiences in the other cities to follow the questions and answers, Clinton made a 90-minute, at times passionate, defense of his plan to provide health

insurance for all Americans.

"Are we going to be the only advanced economy in the world that can't figure out how to provide health insurance for its people? Or are we going to solve the problem after talking about it for 60 years?" he asked.

As happened the night before in Kansas City, Kan., every question Friday night was on health care - thanks largely to a TV station request to audience members who submitted questions in advance.

That contrasted with Tuesday's kickoff appearance in Charlotte, N.C., where Clinton was hit with caustic questions on a variety of unrelated subjects, including the Whitewater affair.

"This health debate, in my judgment, has really been retarded - in more ways than one - by all this motive-throwing around we've had,"

the president declared in St. Paul. "Let's argue about what should or shouldn't be done and not talk about other people's motives."

He took aim at television ads against the plan financed by the health insurance industry.

"This is a bunch of hokey," he insisted. "If people don't agree with me, let them come forward and contest with their ideas. But I am sick ... of all this hot-air rhetoric and all these paid television ads and all these hit jobs from people who are making a killing from the insurance business we have today. It is wrong and we should change it."

To a 17-year-old student from Milwaukee who said he had studied the plan and concluded it wouldn't work, Clinton said simply: "I think it will do far more good than harm." Aides suggested the president's

plan was still short of votes in both the House and the Senate.

But spokesman Jeff Eller said "It's been a good week of refocusing the attention of the American people on health care."

The White House disclosed that it suggested TV stations choose audience members from a list of people who had written to the president or to Hillary Rodham Clinton about health care.

Criticism over that process prompted the administration to ask sponsors of Friday's town-hall meeting not to call on anyone who had been recommended by the White House - a request the stations apparently heeded.

"We have the smartest president in the history of the Republic. We don't need to stack audiences," said White House spokeswoman Dee Dee Myers.

Coneway describes Navy tour with stop in Somalia

Before Josh Coneway enlisted in the U.S. Navy less than two years ago, he probably couldn't have told anyone where the Seychelle Islands are located.

But, now, he not only can identify them geographically, he can spell the name. And, he's been there.

Coneway possibly may be only young man from Hereford, Texas, who's ever set foot in Somalia, too.

Somalia and Seychelles are in the same general area of the globe and in Coneway's life, the two countries are linked.

Assigned to the USS Comstock, a docking landing ship of the U.S. Navy, Coneway was cruising from Hong Kong to Singapore last fall when his ship was diverted to Somalia.

The orders cut for the complement of 500 U.S. Marines aboard the Comstock sent them ashore as part of the American presence in Somalia,

identified by the Navy as Operation Restore Hope.

"All but about 50 of the Marines went ashore," said Coneway. The Comstock with a crew of 200 cruised off shore while the Marines did their duty in Somalia.

Some of the Navy personnel got a chance to tell their friends they had been to Somalia, too, but the visit was not very long.

"They just drew names and I got to go onto the beach," said Coneway. But, there was little to see, except the damaged buildings of the city of Mogadishu, he said.

After two months in the Somalia area, the Comstock sailed eastward to the Seychelles, an island group in the Indian Ocean. Marine and Navy personnel alike enjoyed a few days of "R&R" before returning to Somalia for two more months.

Coneway won't soon forget the Thanksgiving and Christmas seasons of 1993. He was far from home and the weather was anything but

Christmas-like.

"The temperature was in the mid-80s," he remembers.

American ingenuity provided some holiday cheer, though.

"One of the ships in our group had a big radiq antenna," Coneway explained. "They strung lights on it and it looked like a Christmas tree."

On shore, U.S. Army and Marine units fired colored flares to lend a festive spirit to an otherwise dreary holiday.

En route to Somalia, Coneway's ship called at Okinawa and Hong Kong before being ordered to Somalia. Because of the change in orders, Coneway said he missed seeing Australia.

"We were supposed to go to Singapore and Australia but that was changed when we went to Somalia," Coneway said.

while anchored in Hongkong.

Thailand and Japan also were ports of call for the Comstock on the trip back to the home port of San Diego. A brief stop in Hawaii allowed guests to board for a "Tiger cruise," a Navy public relations project that invites civilians to sail on ships of the fleet.

Josh Coneway is the third generation of a family of sea-minded men. His grandfather, Paul Coneway, was a World War II Naval officer, and his uncle, Capt. Clint Coneway, currently is on active duty with the Navy.

There is some indecision on Josh Coneway's part about his future in the Navy.

He said he enlisted after graduation from Hereford High School in 1992 because he felt he wasn't quite ready to go to college.

Now, he's deciding whether to end his Navy career when his enlistment expires next September or re-enlist. Coneway seems to be leaning

toward enrolling in a training program for veterinary technicians in Denver.

He has no idea what orders may be in store for the Comstock when he reports to his ship on April 14, after his leave.

"It depends, I suppose, on how Korea keeps up," he observed.

Coneway was glad to get back home to some of "Mom's cooking," but his months aboard the Comstock and ports he visited were a real adventure for a young man who won't be 21 until next month.

He did some shopping in ports where the Comstock docked. A highlight was purchase of an Oriental rug -- he indicated the size by spreading his hands about three feet apart -- for his parents.

"It's for birthdays, anniversaries, Christmas, everything for a while," laughed Coneway.

School adopts policy for police citations

SAN ANGELO, Texas (AP) - Beginning Monday, students in San Angelo schools could get police citations if they're caught fighting or engaging in other incidents involving assaults or abusive language.

Students will be required to appear before Municipal Court Judge Allen Gilbert and must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

The policy will apply to high school and junior high school students caught in acts of disorderly conduct, school officials said when announcing the policy Friday.

Officials said the policy is intended to "improve campus safety, reduce class disruptions and reduce acts of violence against students and school personnel."

Student reaction was mixed. "If school officials call the cops on every cuss word or scuffle, it won't work. But if they use it for fights and gang activities, it should

be very effective," San Angelo Central senior Ted Pluff said. "It's a scare tactic, but it will probably work."

Brody Maedgen, a sophomore at Central, said he was surprised by the policy's severity. "It's supposed to cover even things like profanity in the halls," he said. "I can see that that may not be acceptable, but you shouldn't be taken to court for it."

Senior Jennifer Giddens said: "I think it's a good idea. I know a lot of people don't think OCS (on-campus suspension) is a bad thing. But having a citation and paying a fine - I think they'll take that more seriously."

Assistant superintendent Herschel Duckworth said he would hold a news conference Monday to explain the policy.

He said the new program grew out of discussions among school officials, police and the municipal judge.

White House seeks legal support on nominating Mitchell to court

WASHINGTON (AP) - White House officials should know next week whether President Clinton would be able to nominate Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell to the Supreme Court despite a constitutional complication.

White House Counsel Lloyd Cutler asked the Justice Department on Friday to determine whether a clause in the Constitution would prevent a member of Congress from replacing retiring Justice Harry A. Blackmun.

The clause prohibits a member of Congress from being appointed to a federal job during a term in which lawmakers approved a higher salary for the position.

Cutler's request to Assistant Attorney General Walter Dellinger did not identify Mitchell, but the Maine Democrat is believed to be the only member of Congress under

consideration for the court. Because the current Congress voted to raise Supreme Court salaries, there have been suggestions that Mitchell could not be nominated.

Justice Department spokesman Carl Stern said the opinion probably would be ready next week.

The constitutional clause has been circumvented before, most recently when Lloyd Bentsen left the Senate to become Clinton's treasury secretary. Bentsen accepted the salary that had been in effect when he started his most recent Senate term.

Cutler said he was "personally confident a solution could be found" that would allow Mitchell or another member of Congress to join the court if nominated by Clinton.

A Justice Department source, speaking on condition of anonymity, said an opinion prepared for the

Reagan administration in 1987 raised questions about the legality of appointing a senator to the court.

But Stern said, "Obviously, someone else can look at the question and come up with a different opinion."

The source said the earlier opinion was requested when Reagan considered nominating Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, to the high court. The point was never tested because some Democrats said they would not approve legislation to lower the court salary for Hatch temporarily and he was not nominated.

A Mitchell nomination might be contested in court by one or more of the conservative groups that contend it would be unconstitutional.

A similar challenge was made in 1937, after President Roosevelt nominated Sen. Hugo Black to the

Supreme Court. The challenge was thrown out on procedural grounds and Black became a justice.

Blackmun, 85, announced he will retire at the end of the court's term. Clinton is expected to move quickly so the newest justice can be on the bench when the court begins its new term in October.

Mitchell, a former federal trial judge, announced earlier this year that he would not seek re-election this fall.

Besides him, the list of potential candidates for the high court is believed to include U.S. District Judges Stephen G. Breyer of Boston and Jose A. Cabranes of Connecticut, U.S. Appeals Court Judge Richard Arnold of Little Rock, Ark., Attorney General Janet Reno and Solicitor General Drew Days.

Texas drivers may soon take class on defensive driving from home

AUSTIN - Texas drivers who opt to take a defensive driving class to get a traffic ticket dismissed soon will be able to do so without leaving the comfort of home.

Two Houston entrepreneurs have teamed up with an Austin business to provide a method for taking the state-approved, six-hour course at home with the aid of videos and a minicomputer, both supplied by the company.

Inconvenience is a chief reason only 8 percent of Texas drivers who are ticketed take defensive driving courses, said Phil Ward, president of SA Training Co. of Austin, which provides its safety course to more than 250 schools across Texas.

Drivers who choose the take-home course have three days to complete it and may log on to the interactive computer system - via a toll-free phone line - at any hour. Another toll-free line has a live instructor on stand-by at all times to field questions from students.

Since mid-January, the take-home

kits have been available only through two Houston outlets. More than 600 people have used them, said Scott Owens, one of the developers of the system. Ward said he believes all of the schools affiliated with USA Training - including several in Austin - will have the equipment by the end of the summer.

Owens said reaction from students has been positive, even though the \$40 course cost is more expensive than classroom instruction, which ranges from \$15 to \$30. The system includes a simple-to-use computer and videos that feature music by ZZ Top and James Brown and appearances by Jerry Seinfeld, Hulk Hogan and other celebrities. The videos feature comedian Jeff Altman.

OK. Let's stop right here. Ward knows what you are thinking.

"You mention to people a 'take-home defensive driving course,' and the light bulb goes off," he said. "They think: 'I can fast forward the video. I can have someone take the test for me.' But, hard as you might try, you can't beat the system."

Owens said safeguards were built

into the system to verify that the ticketed driver actually is the one taking the course, and that the state requirement of six hours of instruction is fulfilled.

"We have a pool of over 500 validation questions," said Owens, who formed U.S. Interactive with business partner Richard Johnson. "When the students check out the equipment, they give us some information about themselves. Then we access outside additional information from what they initially provided us, and we quiz the student on that for validation."

One validation question, for example, is "What is your mother's maiden name?" Owens refuses to divulge other questions, citing their proprietary nature.

The Texas Education Agency, which certified the system last summer, put the take-home course through the ringer to make sure it could not be duped, said Dee Bednar, senior director of the Division of Proprietary Schools, Veterans Education and Driver Training.

"We tested the validation mechanisms by using our staff as well

as our computer gurus," she said. "We told them that their job was to cheat."

Cheat they did, but "we busted every one of them," Owens said.

Still, the system has its detractors. The Driving School Association of Texas, a trade organization that represents about two-thirds of the state's 210 licensed operators, filed a lawsuit against TEA last year challenging the certification process.

Scott Wilson, past president of the association, said he believes the system can be hoodwinked.

"There's still nothing that prevents someone from having another person take it for them," he said. "You could be in the house, drinking a beer or whatever, while I'm taking the course for you. And whenever a verification questions is asked, all I would have to do is holler back to you to get the answer."

But Owens said the student who was supposed to be taking the test would need to be constantly nearby to answer all the verification questions, which are fired randomly.

Wilson said his association's main opposition to the take-home course is that it gives courts another avenue to rail against defensive driving courses. Many judges already resent that revenues from traffic tickets are being lost because people take defensive driving classes instead of paying their fines.

"The association is concerned that unless TEA goes slow on this and examines it very carefully, the courts will use this as an example of the decline of quality and credibility of defensive driving and will ask the Legislature to do away with driving safety courses for ticket dismissal all together," he said.

Bednar said the TEA had doubts initially and proceeded cautiously.

"Whatever issues of concern we raised, they went back and redid, reworked and rewrote to satisfy them," she said. "So when we did finally issue the approval, we were comfortable with it."

Bednar said the State Board of Education also viewed the certification in a broader context.

"Board members were making a decision not only on driving safety programs, but on whether they want this type of take-home, interactive technology to be used in education," she said.

But Wilson said he begrudges that the defensive driving school industry is being used as the guinea pig.

Las Cruces officials favor SPS to power city electric company

LAS CRUCES, N.M. (AP) - City officials say they favor signing up Southwestern Public Service Co. to power Las Cruces' proposed municipal electric company, but it could be months before a final decision is made.

They say the Amarillo, Texas, utility gained a big edge over other electric companies when councilors this week reviewed nine bids to supply electricity and three bids to run the proposed municipal system.

"Right now I think Las Cruces would do well to put all its eggs in SPS' basket," City Councilor Herculano Ferralez said Friday.

The city requested the bids to confirm studies showing it is possible to break away from El Paso Electric and still reduce local electric bills by

creating a city power company.

On Thursday, councilors chose the best four of nine bids to supply wholesale power to Las Cruces. Southwestern's proposal topped the finalist list, Assistant City Manager Jerry Trojan said, but added that it could be months before the city decides who gets the contracts.

Councilors also concurred that Southwestern had submitted one of the best offers to operate the Las Cruces utility, Trojan said.

"The electric power proposals, particularly by SPS, are as much as we could have dreamed for," Councilor John Haltom said.

Southwestern's bid said it would operate the city utility only if it also could supply the electricity.

The city says El Paso Electric, which filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection in January 1992, charges unreasonably high electric rates, hurting residents' pocketbooks and hampering local economic development.

Last year, Southwestern lost its bid to buy El Paso Electric for \$2.1 billion to Dallas-based Central and South West Corp., which offered to pay \$2.2 billion.

The city wants to reduce local

electric bills by as much as 20 percent, or an average savings of \$9.40 a month.

Southwestern's bid says it would sell power to the city for about 4 cents a kilowatt-hour starting in 1996 with the cost rising to about 6.3 cents a kilowatt-hour by 2010.

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Rebels launch new attacks in Rwanda

MULINDI, Rwanda (AP) - Rebels launched new attacks today against government troops in Rwanda, where hundreds have been killed in two days of ethnic slaughter. France sent troops to the capital of Kigali to prepare for evacuations, and more than 300 U.S. Marines arrived in neighboring Burundi.

The new fighting came less than 24 hours after the United Nations announced security forces in Rwanda had named an interim government and agreed to a cease-fire with the rebels in a bid to restore order to Kigali.

But a rebel leader said they were never consulted about any cease-fire. "We are not aware of any such deal, so this is a continuation of the war," said Vice Chairman Patrick Mazimhaka of the Rwandan Patriotic Front in rebel-held Mulindi.

Distant shelling could be heard from the rebel camp at Mulindi, 45 miles north of the capital. A U.N. observer, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the rebels were attacking on three fronts.

Gen. Paul Kagame, chairman of the rebel high command, said they were fighting the hard-line presidential guard, blamed for much of the bloodshed since the deaths of the presidents of Rwanda and Burundi in a plane crash Wednesday.

"We appeal to all Rwandans to help fight this clique, including government soldiers who may want to join us," Kagame said today on rebel radio Mwabura.

Another rebel commander, Theogene Rudasingwa, said the Rwandan Patriotic Front was trying to advance on Kigali to reinforce 600 rebels, mainly Tutsis, battling the Hutu guard and government troops.

The ruling Hutus and the minority Tutsis have fought for decades.

The guard and the rebels were not involved in the selection of the new

government, according to a U.N. statement issued in New York.

The violence that has left hundreds dead - including the acting prime minister, about 20 priests and nuns and dozens of aid workers - began after the presidents of Rwanda and Burundi were killed Wednesday in a plane crash.

Wounded and dead from just two days of fighting "can be counted by the thousands," said Dr. Pierre Harze, a spokesman in Paris for the humanitarian organization Doctors Without Borders. "There are a huge number of bodies in the street." The report came from staff members in Kigali, he said.

Some 280 French paratroopers landed at Kigali airport at dawn today to prepare for "an eventual evacuation" of the 600 French citizens in Rwanda. Another 120 soldiers were to arrive this afternoon, French military chief Adm. Jacques Lanxade said.

But officials had yet to give the evacuation order, a French Foreign Ministry spokeswoman, Catherine Colonna, said today.

About 330 U.S. Marines were sent to Burundi in case an evacuation of U.S. citizens from Rwanda becomes necessary, U.S. Navy Capt. Gordon Peterson, said today from U.S.-European command headquarters in Stuttgart, Germany. The Marines come from a force of 1,200 based on four Navy ships off the coast of Somalia.

He said there were no reports of threats against the 255 Americans, mostly aid workers and missionaries.

The United Nations also was considering sending 1,500 reinforcements to the peacekeeping force in Rwanda to evacuate foreigners. A Security Council session was planned for today.

About 200 people had taken refuge

in the U.S. embassy compound, Prudence Bushnell, acting secretary of state for African affairs, said Friday.

President Juvenal Habyarimana of Rwanda and President Cyprien Ntaryamira of Burundi, died in a plane crash Wednesday on return from a peace conference in Tanzania

aimed at ending ethnic strife in their countries.

Both men were Hutus, by far the largest ethnic group in both countries.

The Rwandan government said the plane was shot down by unidentified attackers. U.N. officials were prevented from going to the crash site to check on the cause.

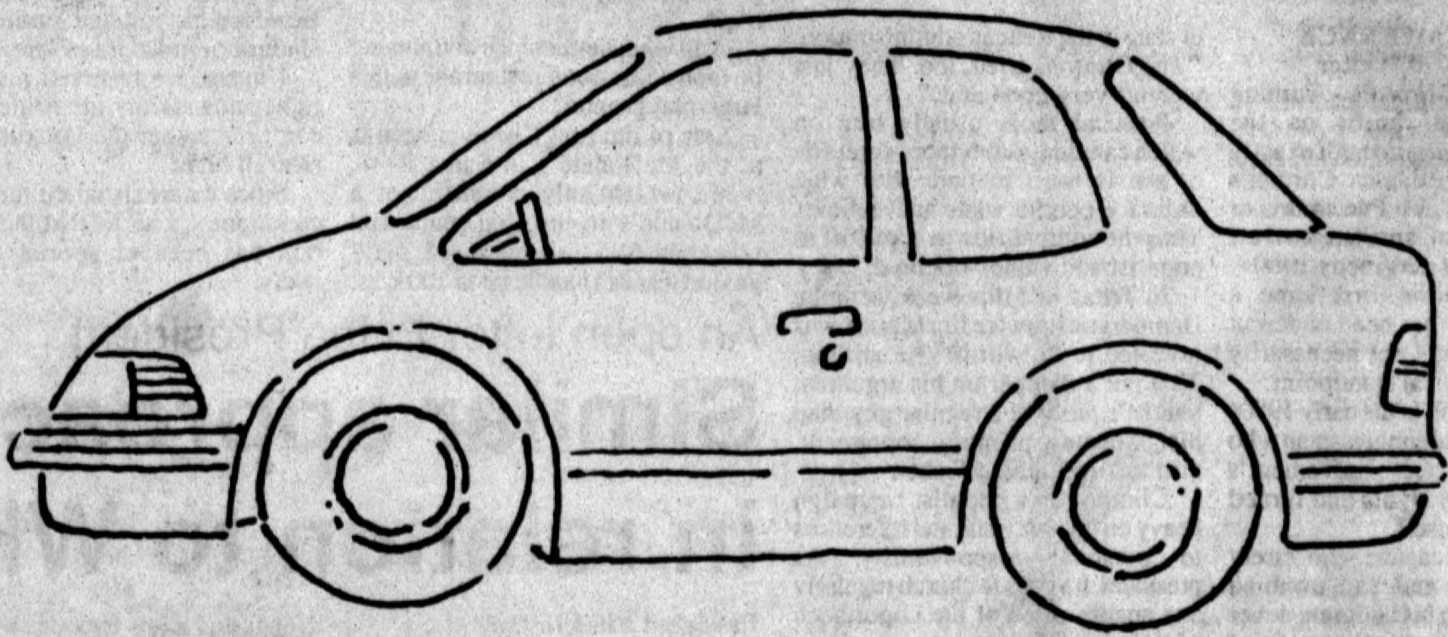

That feller on Tierra Blanca Creek says you know you're getting old when you want to see how long your car will last instead of how fast it will go.

Psychologists say that no person should keep too much to himself. The IRS is of the same opinion.

I've got one of those exercise bicycles at my house. It's a popular brand and several folks have offered to buy it from me. Kenny Gearn is one. "If you're not going to use it, you might as well sell the thing to me," says Kenny.

Another friend advised me that I needed to buy another one. "Put one on each side of the bed, then you and your wife will both have something to hang your clothes on," he jokingly told me, after learning that I wasn't making regular use of the stationary bike.

I admit that I should do some calisthenics, watch my food intake better and—most of all—quit smoking. You'd think a guy who was a "jock" in high school and started college on a football scholarship would take better care of his body.

Several friends have asked me how I keep my waist so trim. Modestly, I admit that I'm not a big eater and it must be in the genes.

What most folks don't realize is that I get lots of exercise. It's my freedom of choice not to walk or jog, and lifting weights is out of the question. And, I'm not turned on to be physically attractive by using those rowing machines, treadmills, or whatever that you see on TV commercials.

I type a lot. My fingers are in good shape. I read a lot, but like some weightlifters I've seen, I may have overworked my optic muscles because my eyesight is now getting weak. Daily, I must make about 20 trips to the break room in the office for coffee. I figure it's about 60 steps for a roundtrip. Let's see...60 times 20 comes out to 1,200 yards of brisk walking.

Wow! That's almost a mile! If I added a regular schedule of jogging a mile every day to that schedule, I'd probably be prone to stress injuries in my knees or hips. My theory on

jogging is that anyone who can run two miles a day must be in pretty good condition, so they don't need to be wearing out good body parts.

I really prefer getting my exercise playing golf, which I try to do at least once or twice a week. I've still got a weak ankle from playing football, so I use a golf cart. But you still get exercise getting in and out of the cart, hitting the ball and walking around the greens...or out into the rough to search for a wayward swat.

I use to get some good exercise from mowing the grass and working in the yard. But my wife and son need exercise, too, and I've sacrificed so they can benefit from these fine opportunities.

You might get the idea that I'm pretty well satisfied with my body. Not really, it's just that for a man my age, I'm hanging in there!

Even writing about taking regular exercise makes me tired. Reminds me of an anonymous article about being tired that has made the rounds. I think I've printed it before in this column, but it bears repeating: "Yes, I'm tired. For several years I've been blaming it on middle-age, iron-poor blood, lack of vitamins, air pollution, water pollution, saccharin, obesity, dieting, under-arm odor, and a dozen other maladies that make you wonder if your life is really worth living."

"But now I find out, it ain't that. The population of this country is 200 million. Seventy million are retired and 14 million are on welfare. That leaves 116 million to do the work. There are 75 million in school, which leaves 41 million to do the work. Of this total, there are 22 million employed by the government. That leaves 19 million to do the work."

"Four million are in the Armed Forces, which leaves 15 million to do the work. Take from that total the 14.8 million people who work for state and city government and that leaves 200,000 to do the work. There are 188,000 in hospitals, so that leaves 12,000 to do the work."

"Now, there are 11,998 people in prisons, so that leaves just two people to do the work. That leaves YOU and Me, and you're sitting there reading this. No wonder I'm tired!"

Undercutting the image with reality

WASHINGTON (AP) - Turning a quick \$99,000 profit on the commodities market doesn't exactly thrill Hillary Rodham Clinton's studied devotion to noble causes or her husband's campaign-trail complaints about the greedy 1980s.

But it's not the first time a leadership image has been undercut by reality. And it's not necessarily fatal from a political standpoint.

Voters did revolt in the early 1980s against a Maryland congressman who led the evangelical movement's opposition to gay rights and turned out to be gay himself.

Yet Ronald Reagan, who rarely attended church and had troubled relationships with his children, never lost his reputation as a champion of family values and causes dear to the religious right. And trading arms for hostages in Iran barely dented his tough foreign-policy image.

The Clinton problem was crystallized this week by Rebecca Fairchild, a questioner at a town meeting in Charlotte, N.C. "Mr. President, are you one of us middle-class people?" she asked. "Or are you in with the villainous, money-grubbing Republicans?"

During his campaign Clinton often said there was nothing wrong with making money as long as it was done the old-fashioned way - by starting businesses and creating jobs.

A killing on the commodities market would not seem to qualify, but Clinton defended it this week as "perfectly legitimate." He said he still believes that in the 1980s "there was too much making money by pushing paper around in ways that cost people jobs."

Even before Mrs. Clinton released records showing she made \$100,000 in 1979 on a \$1,000 outlay with help from a prominent Arkansas attorney, Republicans had leapt on the Clintons' failed Whitewater investment and said it was time to cut the lectures on greed.

Everyone was trying to make millions during the 1980s, said Elliott Abrams, a former assistant secretary

of state in the Reagan administration. "The Clintons tried, too. They just weren't very good at it."

Political races usually turn on which candidate convinces voters he or she is most in tune with what ordinary people want and believe. Thus the competition to come off as populist and values-oriented.

In Texas just this week, scrappy Democratic brawler Jim Mattox was revealed to be worth \$3.1 million. That put a damper on his argument that he's more of a regular guy than his Senate primary opponent, millionaire Richard Fisher.

Clinton ran a populist campaign heavy on church visits and references to personal responsibility. As president, he goes to church regularly and speaks often of the importance of strong families and strong values. Mrs. Clinton, known for her work on education and child welfare in Arkansas, is now her husband's chief adviser on health.

Both of them like to frame the current health debate in moral terms.

On Passover and Palm Sunday weekend, for example, Clinton said health care reform "is about doing what's right." He characterized health care for all as "a practical expression of our deepest faith and ideals."

Republicans, who dwelled extensively on values during their 12-year hold on the White House, are now the ones bogging sarcastically to be spared.

"There is a kind of moral vanity that is central to the Clintons," says GOP strategist William Kristol. He had called on his party Wednesday to proudly reject the Clinton goal of universal health insurance coverage.

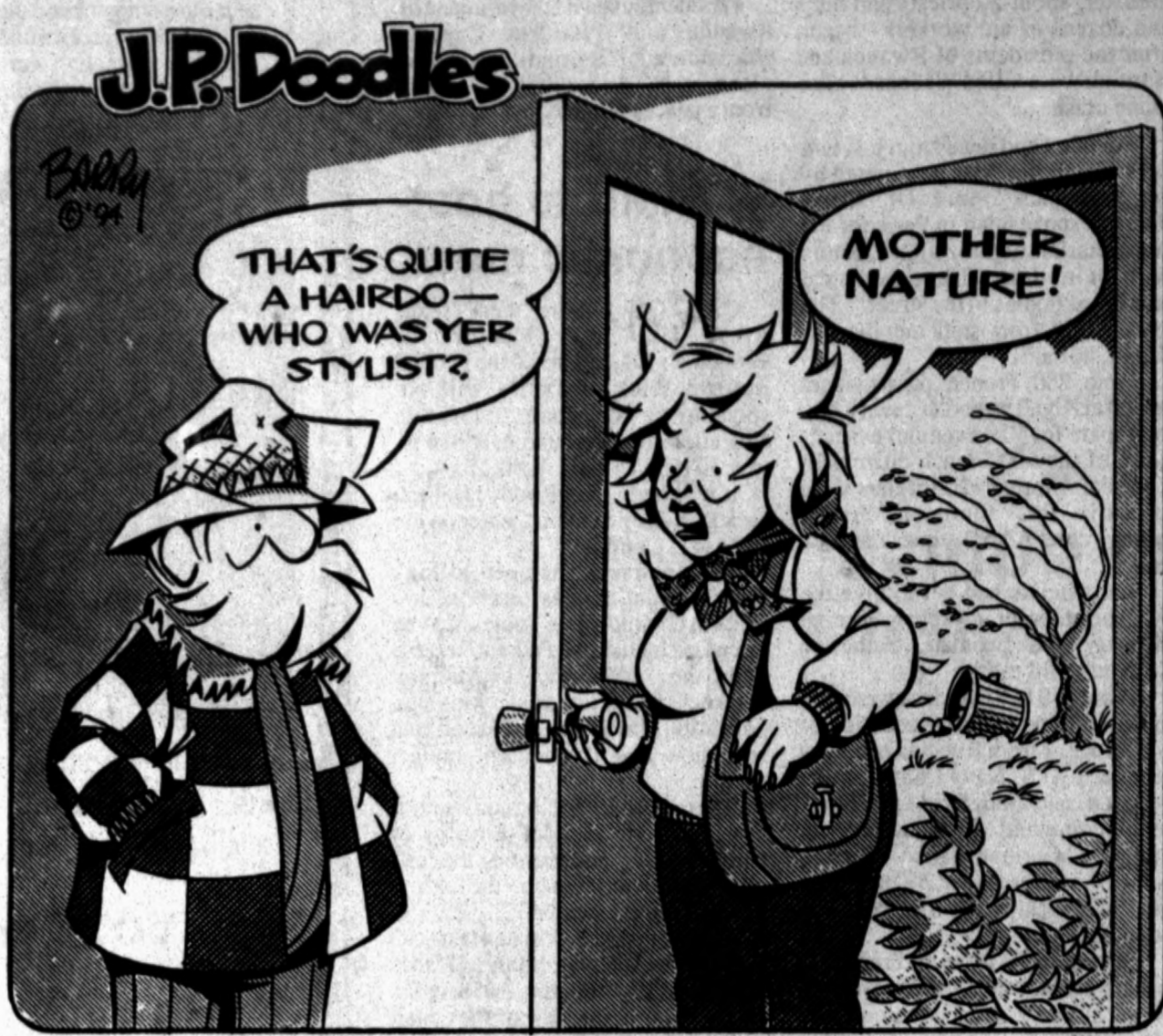
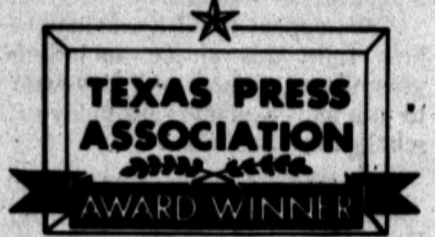

Low turnout anticipated for Tuesday runoff voting

AUSTIN (AP) - Texas voters have some unfinished business Tuesday. The March 8 political party primaries produced several runoffs for both Democrats and Republicans. Voters who cast a ballot in either of the primaries can vote only in the runoff election of that same party. Voters who did not vote March 8 can vote in the runoff election of their choice, but not in both. Early voting for the runoff ended Friday. Only about 17.5 percent, or 1.58 million of the 9 million registered voters in Texas participated in the primaries, according to the secretary of state's office. That number is expected to decrease in the runoffs to about 11 percent, or 1 million voters,

Harold Cook, a special assistant to Secretary of State Ronald Kirk said. "The bottom line on this is there are no models that would indicate anything but low voter participation, and that's a shame," Cook said. "It's kind of astounding to me that someone would willfully give up their right to vote and wait for others to make important decisions for them," he said. The top two vote-getters in primary races advance to runoffs when no candidate gets more than half the vote. Runoff winners advance to the November general election. The top runoff in the Democratic Party features Jim Mattox, a longtime politician, against Richard Fisher, a Dallas businessman seeking his first election win. They are vying for the

party's U.S. Senate nomination. The winner will face incumbent Kay Bailey Hutchison, a Republican. The Fisher-Mattox race has been dominated by negative attacks from both candidates. Mattox says Fisher is a Republican in disguise. Fisher says Mattox is a political dinosaur. Another bitter runoff has developed between Texas Supreme Court Justice Raul Gonzalez and Rene Haas, who are both Democrats. Gonzalez is generally backed by insurance and business interests, while Ms. Haas is backed by consumer advocates and trial lawyers who represent people who sue businesses and insurance companies.

Republicans have not been immune to inter-party squabbles. Pat Lykos and Don Wittig, both judges from Houston, are sniping at each in the GOP attorney general runoff. The winner faces Attorney General Dan Morales, a Democrat. Ms. Lykos has accused Wittig of exaggerating his military record in Vietnam. Wittig has stood by his statements that he was decorated for risking his life during combat, and has called on Ms. Lykos to apologize. Wittig emphasizes that Ms. Lykos

received the lowest rating among all criminal district judges in the 1993 Houston Bar Association poll, while Ms. Lykos criticizes Wittig for receiving campaign contributions from plaintiffs' lawyers. In the Court of Criminal Appeals runoff, Sam Bayless, a San Antonio lawyer and former Dallas County prosecutor, faces Sharon Keller, also a former Dallas County assistant district attorney. In legislative races, the only incumbent in a runoff is Doyle Willis

of Fort Worth. The 85-year-old Democrat has been in the Legislature for 37 years since 1947. He is opposed by Lon Burnam. Party nominations in three congressional races are still up in the air, including the Democratic nomination in Houston where Ken Bentsen, former Harris County Democratic Party chairman and nephew of Treasury Secretary Lloyd Bentsen, is running against Beverley Clark, a former city councilwoman.

Centenarian outlived doctor's prediction

DALLAS (AP) - Centenarian Emma Winn outlived a doctor who told her to slow down almost 70 years ago.

The daughter of former slaves, born a decade after word of the Emancipation Proclamation filtered to Texas blacks, also buried two husbands and outlasted four younger brothers and sisters, none of whom reached 100.

Mrs. Winn died in her sleep Wednesday at a Dallas nursing home. She was 118.

Born in the Central Texas town of La Grange, made famous by the house of ill-repute called the Chicken Ranch, Mrs. Winn ran away to Dallas as a teenager in 1888. She spent most of her life as a housekeeper and worked well into her 90s, said Mattie Samuels, activities director of the South Dallas Nursing Home.

Although she has no birth certificate, the federal government accepted June 19, 1875 as her date of birth. That was one year before Alexander Graham Bell invented the telephone and Lt. Col. George Armstrong Custer and all 264 of his men were killed at the Battle of Little Bighorn.

"She knew when she was born," Ms. Samuels said, recalling how Mrs. Winn would spin tales, including a story about how her parents sometimes hid in the cornfields from their slave master.

Ms. Samuels, who described her as a "lovable Christian lady who loved everybody," said Mrs. Winn was in relatively good health until she fell and broke her hip when she was 111. She broke her hip again about three years ago and lost her eyesight about 18 months ago.

In 1980, Mrs. Winn recalled the advice she got from a doctor several decades before.

"He told me I'd kill myself if I kept up that pace," she said at the time.

Despite his instruction, Mrs. Winn worked about another half-century, crediting her longevity to greens, cornbread "and good, hard work."

Although she has no living relatives, she liked Dallas blues artist Johnny Taylor, who adopted her nine years ago, Ms. Samuels said.

"Every year he would send her

cards and flowers and give her a tape," she said. "She was so in love with him. She always told him she wished she were a young woman so she could marry him."

Mrs. Winn, who was known as "Granny," had no living relatives.

In the Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2 runoff, Democrats Betty Marshall and Gene Kelly square off. Ms. Marshall is co-chief of the appellate section of the Tarrant County district attorney's office. Her late husband, C. Chris Marshall, was killed in the 1992 shooting rampage at the Tarrant County courthouse.

Political observers say that Kelly, a San Antonio attorney, has run well in several races because his name reminds people of the famous dancer.

The seat is currently held by Chuck Miller, a Republican, who did not seek re-election.

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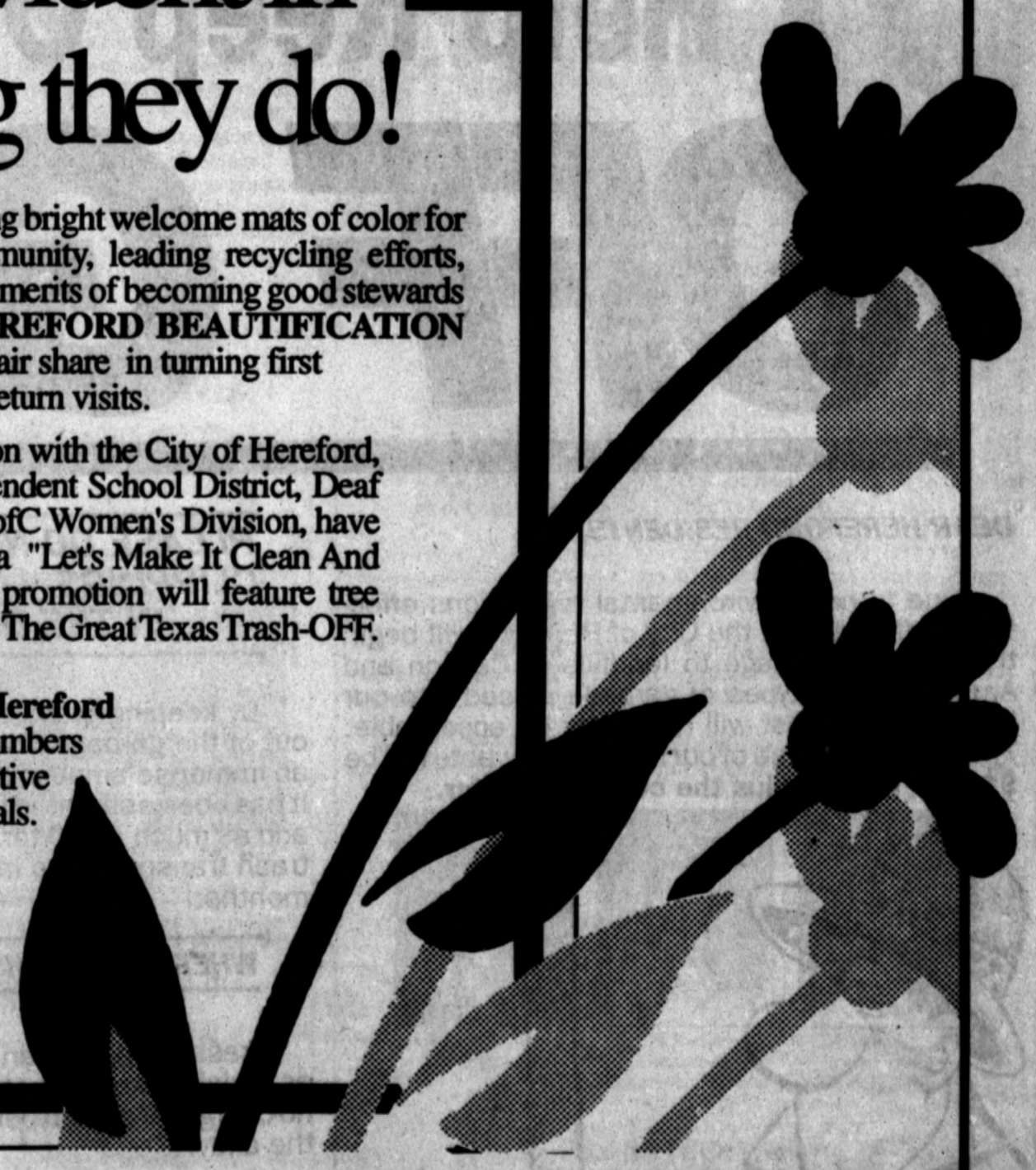

TCU to name Tubbs to coach basketball

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - Oklahoma coach Billy Tubbs will be introduced Saturday as Texas Christian University's new basketball coach, according to published reports.

The Fort Worth Star-Telegram and The Daily Oklahoman both quoted in Saturday's editions an unnamed official at TCU as saying Tubbs will replace Moe Iba, who was fired last month.

"Yes, it's Billy Tubbs," an official told the Star-Telegram. A news conference is expected Saturday afternoon, the official said. Horned Frogs freshman guard Matt Akridge told the Star-Telegram that players have been told to attend a meeting at 2:15 p.m.

Oklahoma City television station KOCO reported Friday that Tubbs, who led Oklahoma to the 1988 NCAA title game and is the Sooners' winningest basketball coach, had interviewed for the job.

Tubbs was interviewed by TCU officials Friday at an off-campus site in Fort Worth, The Oklahoman reported.

Tubbs reportedly was in Great Bend, Kan., on Friday to attend a junior college all-star game. He did not immediately respond to a message left on his answering machine by The Associated Press.

TCU athletic director Frank Windegger also could not immediately be reached for comment Friday by the AP.

Oklahoma athletic director Donnie Duncan said he had expected Tubbs to have been interviewed by TCU on Friday.

"Frank asked if it was acceptable for him to officially contact coach Tubbs, and I said it was," Duncan told the Oklahoma City newspaper. "Then when coach Tubbs returned from the Final Four he told me he anticipated an interview (Friday)."

Tubbs would be paid between \$200,000 and \$400,000, over an unspecified period, a source told The Oklahoman.

Tubbs' base salary at OU has been \$107,000, but he may have doubled that with money from other sources such as television and radio contracts.

Oklahoma went 15-13 this past season, breaking a string of 12 straight 20-game seasons. Tubbs has been there 14 seasons.

The Star-Telegram reported that TCU also interviewed University of Arizona assistant Jessie Evans and Murray State coach Scott Edgar.

Evans, 43, joined Arizona coach Lute Olson's staff in April 1988 after spending the previous two years as an assistant at the University of Texas.

Edgar has spent the past three seasons at Murray State after serving 11 years as an assistant to Arkansas coach Nolan Richardson.

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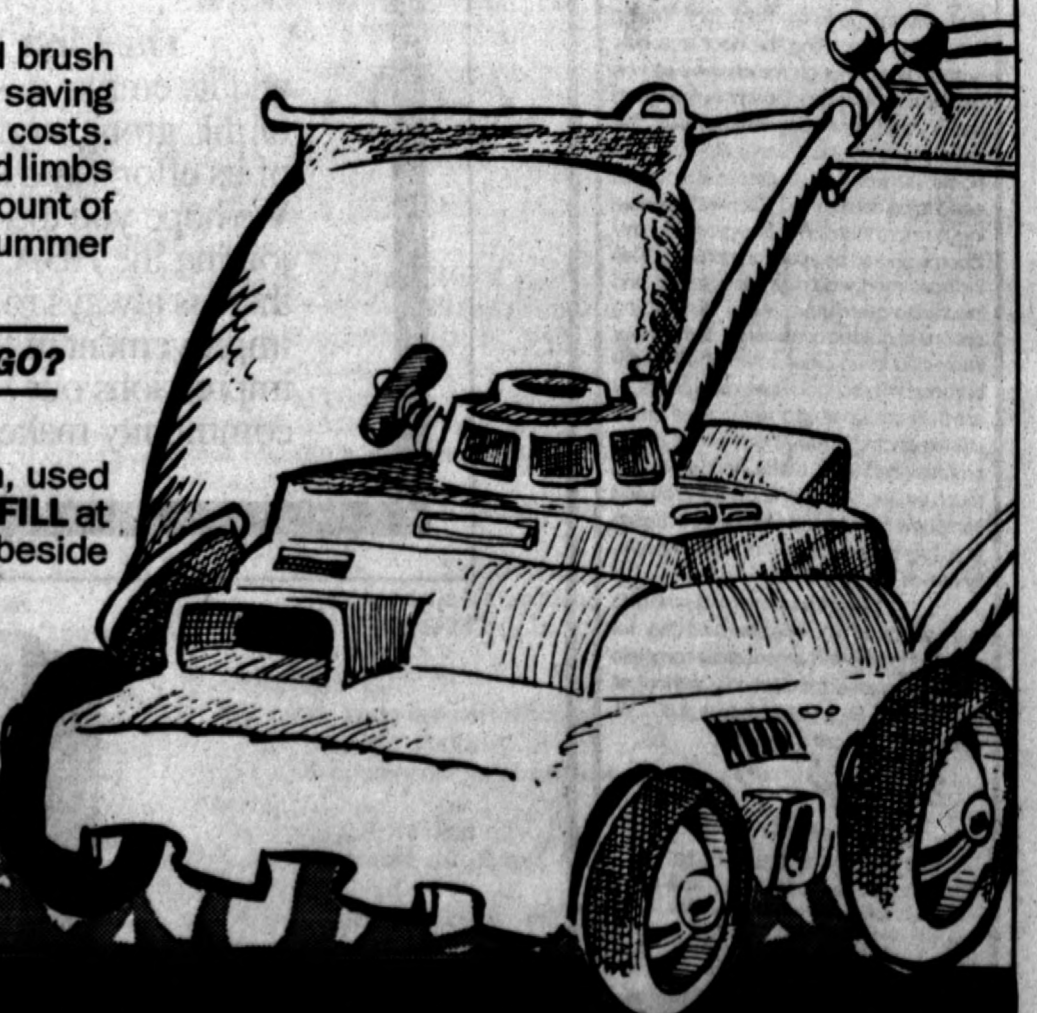

War forced baseball to take whoever it could get

DALLAS - The 1945 edition of Official Baseball called St. Louis Browns pitcher Sigmund "Jack" Jakucki "perhaps the most amazing 'rookie' of the 1944 season." This was going some. A 15-year-old, two 16-year-olds and a 40-year-old outfielder made their major league debuts in 1944, mostly because more than half the game's best players were temporarily indisposed.

Ted Williams missed the 1944 season because of World War II. So did Joe DiMaggio and Johnny Mize and Warren Spahn. In all, 15 Hall of Famers have holes in their records where 1944 should be.

And baseball was more than just star-denied 50 years ago. Better than 60 percent of the players in 1941's opening day lineups were lost to the military by 1944, the worst of the war years in baseball.

The soldiers left baseball's honor

to be defended by one of the game's most curious collections, the young and the old and the 4Fs, conducting what one magazine predicted would be "a harrowing experience."

Most owners were not bothered by the thought. All they wanted was an OK to play. In his 1942 "green light" letter to baseball commissioner Kenesaw Mountain Landis, President Roosevelt alleviated much of the owners' concerns that he might want the game suspended during the war.

Roosevelt, who encouraged an increase in the number of night games for the entertainment of day workers, wrote that the players would be a "definite recreational asset to at least 20 million of their fellow citizens."

Baseball remained uncertain, though. Alva Bradley, owner of the Cleveland Indians, doubted early in 1944 that the game would survive the season. "It's too grand a game to be turned into a farce," he said.

Faced with the option of farce or

famine, the owners leaned toward the former.

"The personnel changes during the war went on all the time, almost from week to week," said former Washington Senators and Indians outfielder George Case, in Donald Honig's "Baseball: Between the Lines." "And I'll say one thing - everybody that played during those war years were legitimate rejects from the service. Most of them were either color blind or had bad cartilages, bad shoulders, bad stomachs."

"Our center fielder, George Binks, was hard of hearing in one ear; as a matter of fact, I ran into him a half-dozen times one year because he couldn't hear me calling for the ball."

George "Bingo" Binks got his start in 1944.

Baseball took all types that season. It was desperate for filler, though not

desperate enough to violate its hallowed color line. Bill Veeck tried to become the game's great emancipator, and failed. His 1943 bid to buy the financially strapped Philadelphia Phillies was vetoed when owners learned he planned to stock the team with black players.

With the minor leagues all but shut down during the war and the Negro Leagues not yet an option, scouts went elsewhere. They went to Latin America for the first time and brought back more than 50 players.

A few places, the scouts weren't as welcome.

"Complaints come from Crozier Technological High, winner of the city and state championships, that scouts are tampering with their players, including one lad only 15 years old," reported the June 9, 1944 edition of The Dallas Morning News.

"I saw a lot of guys," said former Browns pitcher Bob Muncrief, now 78 and living in Duncanville, "who

shouldn't have been in the big leagues."

In some ways, one of Muncrief's teammates, Jack Jakucki, was typical of the 1944 class.

Jakucki had pitched in seven games for the Browns in 1936, which seemed to exhaust his abilities. He played parts of the next two seasons in minor league cities Galveston, New Orleans, Los Angeles and Shreveport. By 1939, he was out of baseball, working in a Galveston shipyard.

The Browns found him by way of a letter of recommendation. He would thereafter be said to have cost the Browns "a three-cent stamp."

He provided more than cheap thrills for the 1944 Browns, who won their only American League pennant that season and lost to the St. Louis Cardinals in the World Series. Jakucki boldly predicted in spring training that, at 31, with seven games' experience in the major leagues and no experience at all in the previous five seasons, he would win "between 12 and 15 games."

He won 13. More important, he clinched the pennant with a 5-2 victory over the New York Yankees in the last game of the season.

At 6-2 and 195 pounds, Jakucki could pitch. He also could fight and

drink, a dangerous combination. He was responsible for giving the Browns one of the wildest reputations in baseball.

"He came into the clubhouse once," Muncrief said, "and our manager, Luke Sewell, asked him, 'How much have you had to drink?'"

"A couple of beers."

"You ain't gonna tell me about the fifth of whiskey, are you?"

One of Jakucki's more celebrated escapades came in 1945, when he got into a fight with teammate Pete Gray, baseball's only one-armed man. Jakucki, figuring to square the odds, fought with one hand behind his back.

At least Jakucki had talent, which gave him an advantage over most of his rookie rivals. The men who started their big league careers in 1944 generally were not up to previous standards. The Baseball Encyclopedia is rife with players who played the 1944 season and little else.

Chuck Hostetler made his debut with Detroit in 1944. He was 40. He played 65 games in the outfield and hit .298. He played in 42 the next season and was gone by 1946.

Phillies rookie Ford "Moon" Mullen hit .267 in 118 games in 1944.

Gustafson continues to win at UT

AUSTIN (AP) - Twenty-six consecutive winning seasons haven't changed Texas Longhorns baseball coach Cliff Gustafson.

Well, maybe his guitar strumming is a little better and his collection of country music a little bigger.

But the man known as Coach Gus still lugs peanut butter and honey sandwiches to the ballpark and on road trips for lunch each day.

He still drives a pickup that he uses for chores amidst the horses and cattle on his modest ranch southwest of Austin.

And he still barks about fundamentals to players through a baseball-sized wad of chewing tobacco.

Gustafson, 63, whose team is sitting atop the Southwest Conference and recently swept defending national champion Louisiana State, will likely become the all-time victory leader in college baseball by mid-April.

He is on track to surpass the record of 1,332 victories set by 45-year Southern Cal coach Rod Dedeaux, a man Gustafson greatly admires.

"When and if we are fortunate enough to see that record come, it still doesn't dilute the great accomplishments of Rod Dedeaux," Gustafson said of the man who led the Trojans to 11 national championships and 28 Pacific 10 Conference titles before retiring in 1986.

"There will never be anyone to replace him or what he accomplished in the college game."

Dedeaux, who just turned 80 and now works outside of baseball in Los

Angeles, praised Gustafson, a friend and coaching rival for nearly 20 years.

"I'm pulling for him," Dedeaux said. "We have been good friends for many, many years. I can recall his victories that were at our expense and he deserved every one of them."

For Gustafson, the record will be one of the crowning achievements in a career that includes two national championships, 17 trips to the College World Series, 21 SWC titles and a legion of star former players such as Roger Clemens, Greg Swindell and Burt Hooton.

While his achievements are high-profile, Gustafson isn't.

He shares fellow Texan Nolan Ryan's country charm and humility off the field and his intensity on it.

Gustafson's subdued demeanor and slow, penguin-like stride to the pitcher's mound give way to a fiery temper that flares when his players don't measure up to their ability.

The most notable tirade occurred in Gustafson's first season at Texas in 1968 after the team opened the SWC schedule with three straight losses.

A seething Gustafson gathered his team in the center of Clark Field after a practice so he could shout where no one else could hear.

Now that the Longhorns have a locker room at Disch-Falk Field, he has a more private venue to get his points across.

"He was very direct," said Clemens, a member of the Longhorns' 1983 national championship team. "It was simple, but he was a very direct person when

he gave us our lectures after games that we lost and in getting us ready for life after baseball."

"If we play well and get beat by a team that is better than us on that day, that's one thing," said Gustafson, now in his 27th year at Texas. "But I have a hard time tolerating losing to what I consider an inferior team because we didn't play well."

Players jokingly say Gustafson has so many wins because his teams are afraid of the wrath that comes with defeat.

But the coach helps create star pitchers more than he pitches fits. He worries about bunts not bureaucracy. And he celebrates effort not ego.

Clemens said Gustafson taught him to never quit.

The Boston Red Sox pitcher, nicknamed "Rocket," recalled a game against Oral Roberts his last year at Texas (1983) in which he was struggling and felt like leaving the game.

"There was a lot of weight on my shoulders at that time to perform well and I was thinking of just shutting it down, and he (Gustafson) came in in the middle of the game... and got on me pretty good," Clemens said. "He let me know where we stood. And I ended up going out there and finishing the game."

Former Texas athletic director Darrell Royal, who hired Gustafson as baseball coach, said, "Coach Gus is an athletic director's dream."

"He always stayed within budget, obeyed all the rules and he won, and he won big," Royal said. "He has never been involved in any kind of controversy and he is a good family man."

"He is kind of a country boy in attitude, and I like that. He likes his space, likes it where he has a little acreage around him, likes to play guitar."

Gustafson gives credit for his success to his players.

And he talks as glowingly of the men who graduated and became doctors, lawyers and businessmen as he does of stars like Clemens, a two-time Cy Young Award winner and the only Longhorn to have his number retired.

"I take pride in what these guys do whether it's in baseball or in teaching," Gustafson said.

Current players praise Gustafson's attention to detail - hitting the cutoff, laying down bunts and perfecting rundowns and pickoffs.

The Longhorns are typically characterized as one of the smartest teams in college baseball.

"We have never had the reputation of being a strictly power, bowl-you-over type of team," Gustafson said. "Nor do I particularly care to have that reputation. We have done it with pitching, defense and good base running."

He also instills confidence, said junior outfielder Stephen Larkin, brother of Cincinnati Reds shortstop Barry Larkin.

"I think the thing he has done for me here is he has brought out the most in me. He has brought out stuff in me I didn't know I could do," Larkin said.

Gustafson points to his national championships in 1975 and 1983 as career highlights and to runner-up finishes in 1984, 1985 and 1989 as disappointments.

"Any time you have a good team with a legitimate shot at a national championship and fail to win it, it's a bitter pill to swallow," Gustafson said.

"I look back at the national championship games in 1984 (against Cal State Fullerton), 1985 (against Miami) and 1989 (against Wichita State) and truly felt we could win those championships."

"We got beat by other fine teams and that is always a difficult thing to accept when you get to that level and your team is that good."

As for the future, Gustafson said he doesn't like to think about slowing down.

"I have never had any thoughts that now is the time I need to get out," he said. "Rather I have some regrets that my career probably is going to have to end in not too many more years because of my age."

"I would like to win a couple more conference championships and a couple more national championships. And I would like to see the players here get degrees and go onto successful careers."

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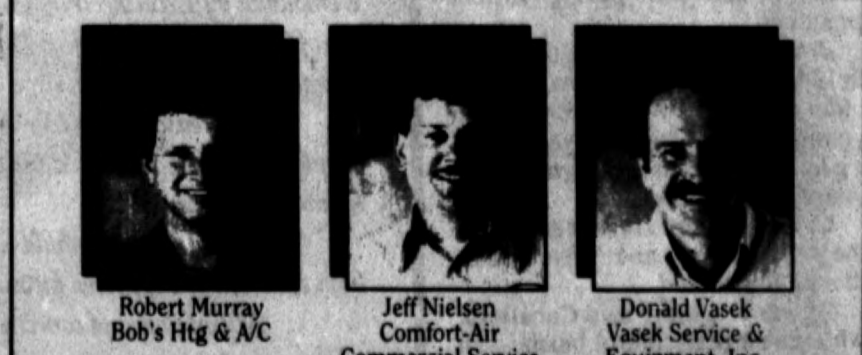
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Astrodome's manual scoreboard provides jobs for Houston teens

HOUSTON - The Astrodome's manually operated scoreboards, which tell the tale of every major-league baseball game, stand as a pillar of baseball tradition. Yet, they are monuments of the new age in Houston Astros baseball.

After one day of service, the brainchild of owner Drayton McLane Jr. already began drawing rave reviews from its operators and, more importantly, Astros fans.

"It's a great idea. The Astrodome always has needed a touch of tradition," Steve Gatlin of Houston said. "I'm in a rotisserie league, so I'm always looking at the scores. I think that's part of the excitement of coming to a game if you're a real baseball fan."

Actually, no one has been more enthusiastic about the Dome's most talked about addition than the four teen-age boys hired by Astrodome USA to operate the wooden structures, which stand 16 feet high and span 75 feet across right and left fields.

"I was so excited I got the job that it was all I could talk about for three or four days," said Blake McDonnell, an 18-year-old freshman at the

University of Houston.

"It kind of gets you back to the basics of baseball," he added. "It's baseball like I heard of growing up, the stories about old Buff stadium. It lets young people relive what their parents always talked about."

McConnell is joined by Houston Baptist students Matt Alexander and Robby Fisher, and Ricky Rosa, a junior at Elkins High School. All four were a perfect fit for the job, said Doug Swan, assistant director of scoreboard operations for Astrodome USA.

Swan, who was inundated by applicants for the positions, interviewed candidates with one purpose in mind. That was to find people with extensive baseball knowledge, who didn't mind being at the ballpark every day.

"I knew it would be a perfect job for a high school or college-age kid who liked baseball and wanted to make some extra cash," Swan said. "I was worried about finding good kids who could be left unattended. But everything has worked out perfect."

The operation has run smoothly because the foursome is taking their part-time employment seriously.

Their thinking is that paying close attention to the sports ticker (where inning-by-inning scores from each game are transmitted) and then standing atop a moving ladder to hang numbers plays an integral part in the baseball experience at the Astrodome.

"I'm really looking forward to the end of the season in the playoff race when I hang a score and the crowd responds," Rosa said.

The problems have been minimal. The biggest thing the operators must resolve is the exact way they will work their two-man system on each board, especially on a Sunday afternoon when just about every team is playing.

The Astros outfielders, on the other hand, have been coming out early and tossing balls off the scoreboards to learn the caroms.

Both concerns will only be solved with time.

For now, McConnell is just happy he can potentially live out a dream.

"I remember watching Cubs games on TV when I was 7 and seeing the (manually operated) scoreboard operator waving to the crowd," he said. "I always thought that would be a great job and pretty neat if the Astrodome had one."

most of them at second base.

He never played another major league season.

"I'm sure a lot of us had that opportunity because of the war," said Mullen, 77, retired and living in his native Olympia, Wash. "The four years before that season, I never got above Class B ball. But you know how it is in athletics: Timing is everything."

Mullen's time was over by 1945, when the big league players began returning to their rosters. The Phillies sent Mullen to the minors, then traded him in 1946 to the Yankees, who sold him to a minor league club in Portland.

A favorite memory of his only major league season was a game against the New York Giants. Ernie Lombardi, the Giants' catcher, was near the end of a Hall of Fame career, an end that was increasingly obvious.

A foul came off a bat in a game against Mullen's Phillies. Lombardi threw off his mask to give chase ... and took off after a pigeon.

Baseball couldn't keep a straight face, judging by its promotions and attempts at patriotism. Among the game's contributions to the war effort was a "Waste Fat Night," in which grease was collected by the government to make soap. Fans were instructed to return foul balls, which were distributed to military posts. And the Reds conducted a "Smokes for Servicemen" campaign, requiring cigarettes for admission to the game.

But the most unique war gimmick came in 1944, in the form of a three-way game to raise money for war bonds. The three New York teams - Giants, Yankees and Brooklyn Dodgers - played a nine-inning exhibition in which each of the teams batted six times.

The New York Times concluded that the game "won the lunacy championship hands down."

Former Dodger Bobby Bragan, who works with the Rangers, couldn't recall much about the triple-decker, which Brooklyn won, 5-1-0. Most of his 1944 memories revolve around the Dodgers' woeful record and the stars - Frank Sinatra, Red Skelton, etc. - that manger Leo Durocher brought into the clubhouse.

They couldn't match the characters Durocher put on the field. His shortstop for 46 games was a 16-year-old named Tommy "Buckshot" Brown. Brown won his nickname from the pattern his throws left in the seats behind first base. Fans would congregate in the area before games, hoping Buckshot would throw them a souvenir during infield practice.

Another 16-year-old major leaguer in 1944 was Putsy Caballero, a month older than Brown. He was the youngest major leaguer ever to start a game at third base. Brown was the youngest shortstop.

Caballero played in four games for the '44 Phillies and was hitless, though undaunted.

"I was relaxed," said Caballero, who runs a pest-control business in New Orleans. "Nobody could believe it."

"I knew we weren't going anywhere."

The Phillies went to the World Series in 1950, though. And

Caballero was there. He played until 1952, hitting .228 for his eight-year major league career.

He was 24 when it ended.

The game's true war baby, though was Joe Nuxhall. He was 15 years old when Cincinnati manager Bill McKechnie sent him in against the Cardinals on June 10, 1944. He started the ninth inning of a game the Reds were losing, 23-0.

"I'm nervous, quite nervous, and I walked a guy," Nuxhall said in Williams Mead's book "Even the Browns." "But I got a couple of guys out. That's when I started realizing exactly what the hell was going on. Here I am, two weeks prior to this, I'm pitching against a junior high school. Now I'm pitching against the potential world champions."

"I'm just scared to death."

Nuxhall's line for the 1944 season: one game, two-thirds of an inning, five walks, no strikeouts, 67.50 ERA.

Nuxhall, now a Reds broadcaster, went to the minors after his one appearance. But he returned in 1952 to pitch 15 seasons in the majors, most of them with Cincinnati.

The servicemen seemed to hold no grudges against their replacements, though a few received nasty letters. Cleveland pitcher Bob Feller, who lost part of his career to the war, said his peers in the military understood. Baseball had sent 470 players into the military by the end of 1944. Most of them didn't lose their baseball jobs for long, considering the caliber of the subs.

Bad baseball or not, Frank Mancuso, a Browns catcher, called FDR's call to play ball "probably one of the greatest decisions ever made. It knocked the morale out of the Germans and Japanese. Here we were, losing the war early on, but we still had baseball going on."

"And it gave Americans something to do for entertainment."

War baseball gave Mancuso a job, which he held until 1947. He won his chance in 1944, while still recovering from a broken back and leg that he suffered in a 1943 parachute training jump.

He got to the Browns in time to be part of one of the most memorable races in baseball history. The race led to an all-St. Louis series, won by the Cardinals in six games.

The Series proved to be an anti-climax. The Browns, who would move to Baltimore following the 1953 season and become the Orioles, went into the last week of the '44 season in a virtual tie with Detroit.

The Browns swept the Yankees, with Jakucki pitching the clincher.

The victory carried no sentimental value with Sewell, the Browns' manager.

He tired of Jakucki's wild, if winning, ways. On Aug. 31, 1945, he ordered Jakucki to turn in his uniform.

He never pitched in the majors again. "He was a terrible drinker," said Mancuso, who retired last year after 30 years on the Houston city council.

"He hung out in Galveston, and he'd come by my office every so often. He'd never ask, but I'd give him \$20 or so."

Jakucki died in Galveston in the spring of 1979, at 69.

"I had to help bury him," Mancuso said.

Not long after the funeral, a friend came to Mancuso with a cheap watch. He said he got it from a Galveston bartender, who had obtained it in a swap with Jakucki. The friend thought Mancuso should have his old teammate's timepiece.

He still does. "Every time I look at it," Mancuso said. "I think, 'I might not have played in that World Series if not for Jack Jakucki.'"

Each contestant will participate in and interview by judges, talent competition and evening gown competition. Application forms are available at the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce office.

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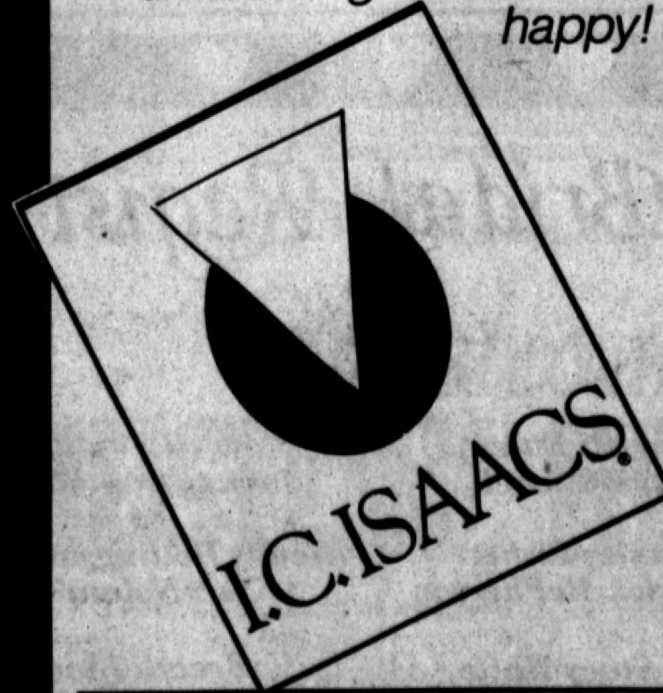

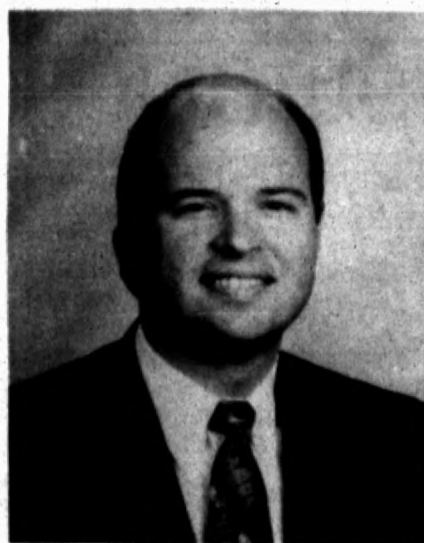

Most parents know, it is not always easy getting toddlers and preschoolers to eat nutritious foods, especially when many of today's foods come in full-filled packages—all made to delight a child's taste buds.

Ensuring that young children have a healthy start is one of the most important responsibilities you have as a parent. Today's parents and other care providers face major challenges in feeding young children.

The erratic eating behaviors of toddlers and preschoolers, social changes that place increased demands on parent's time, and recent emphasis on the relationship between diet and health, all contribute to parents' anxiety about feeding young children.

What Constitutes a Good Diet? After the first year, children do not need a special diet that is different from the rest of the family. Toddlers and preschoolers can eat the same foods as other family members if they are soft, moist, and easy to chew.

It is the variety of food, not the amount that counts. Dietary variety is the key to preventing nutrient deficiencies. Nutrients of special concern include fat, iron, calcium and zinc.

Several federal and health professional organizations recommend that all children over two years of age reduce their dietary fat intake to no more than 30 percent of total daily calories.

A diet containing 30 percent of calories as fat can support normal growth and development during childhood, provided that careful food selections are made and nutrients-rich foods such as meat and dairy products are included in the diet.

Child nutrition experts like Dr. Ronald Kleinman, chief of pediatric gastroenterology and nutrition, Massachusetts General hospital, agree that a sufficient diet for a child would include a variety of foods from the major food groups—bread and cereal, vegetable, fruit, meat and dairy.

It is hard to know exactly how much food children need for normal growth. Preschool children and toddlers need the same variety of foods as older family members do, but they need smaller servings.

A good rule of thumb is one tablespoon of food for each year of a child's age. The following recommendations can be used as a guide for your meal plan:

-Milk group -- 2-4 servings daily. One serving equals 1/2 to 1 cup.

-Meat Group -- 2-3 servings daily. One serving equals 1 tablespoon for each year of a child's age.

-Vegetable Group -- 3-5 servings daily. One serving equals 1 tablespoon for each year of a child's age.

-Fruit Group -- 2-4 servings daily. One serving equals 1 tablespoon for each year of a child's age.

-Bread and cereal group -- 6 or more servings daily. One serving equals 1/4 slice of bread for each year of age until age four. One serving of cereal equals 1 tablespoon for each year of life.

These amounts are only guidelines to go by. Some very active children may need slightly larger servings.

Sweets and fats should be limited. These foods provide calories and little else nutritionally.

The easiest way to establish good eating habits in children is to set a good example yourself, and to provide a variety of healthful food choices.

"IN HARNESS"



The classic example, in books and paintings, of working in harmony is often two oxen yoked together to the same harness. There's really a better example closer to hand: your eyes.

Working together, your eyes are able to focus on the same object at the same

time. For most people, this is easy and automatic. Sometimes, though, the eyes don't work well together. Then the result may be double vision, a concept the brain rejects. Either the individual overworks his eye muscles trying to get the two eyes to aim at the same object at the same time or, in time, the brain will block out the image seen by one of the eyes. In that case, depth perception is lost.

This problem can be corrected. After careful examination, your optometrist may recommend corrective lenses and/or vision training. Sometimes a prism is added to corrective lenses to alter the image that the eye sees. If vision training is advised, the exercises are usually started in the optometrist's office and continued at home.

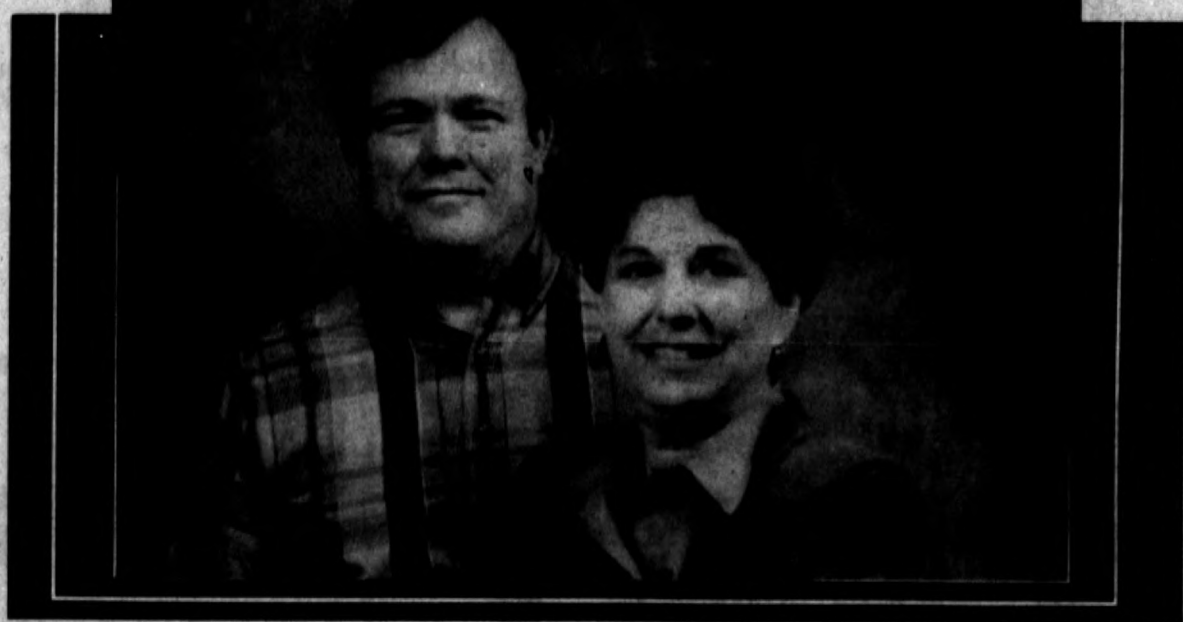

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MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

OLD-FASHIONED BUSINESS ETHICS

Small business enjoys a good reputation. People usually think of entrepreneurs as honest, hard-working and ethical. My experience in working with hundreds of small businesses reinforces this reputation. In addition, I believe that business ethics play a vital role in small business success.

Our free enterprise system was founded on principles of conduct that have become blurred today. Recent Washington scandals, the savings and loan industry boondoggle, and business and political graft have become the norm. The message is clear: Cheat, if you have to, but win at any cost.

Maybe I'm old-fashioned, but I don't believe that cheaters are ever winners. One of the greatest joys I derive from owning my own business is knowing that I built them honestly. However,

following the principles of honesty and integrity is not always easy. **Ethical Dilemmas**

The following incidents are true-life examples that area business people have shared with us. The names and genders have been changed for reasons of confidentiality.

Joe had an opportunity to hire his competitor's area manager. The manager promised to bring Joe the competitor's customer lists, pricing policy and sales records. This information would help Joe's struggling business. Should he hire the manager?

Frequently, Mary is paid in cash for her work. Her business is not very profitable, and she wonders if it would be OK to spend the cash and not report the revenue as income. Mary's friends have told her that the Internal Revenue Service is corrupt and already collects too much tax money. Should Mary report the cash?

Bill just closed a big loan at the bank. A few days after the papers were signed, he noticed a large error. The bank inadvertently omitted the largest piece of equipment used to collateralize the loan. Should Bill point out the error?

A Three-Point Check

The answer to many ethical questions can be found in a book written by Kenneth Blanchard and Norman Vincent Peale. In "The Power of Ethical Management," they suggest using a three-question test to establish ethical behavior. The questions are: 1) Is it legal? 2) Is it fair to all? 3) Would I be happy if the whole story was made public?

These three questions make it easier to tackle any issue that involves questionable ethics. "Is it legal" establishes a minimum criteria. If it is against the law, don't get involved. The fairness

question asks if it would be OK if I were on the receiving end of the deal. The third question asks if it would be all right if the whole story was printed on the front page of the local newspaper.

The ethical dilemmas faced by Joe, Mary and Bill become fairly simple decisions using this test method. While it is legal for Joe to hire the manager, the manager's proposal is not fair to all parties. The information that the manager will bring to Joe's company will give Joe an unfair advantage. Joe wouldn't want the situation reversed or made public knowledge.

Mary's dilemma is answered by the first question. Not reporting cash income is tax evasion, a punishable crime. Even though we may not like the IRS, the law says that we must pay taxes on all income.

Bill's situation may not involve legality. However, the question of fairness certainly is relevant. It will not be fair to the bank if the error is not reported. Bill can further his good working relationship with the bank by pointing out the irregularity.

Many of life's toughest problems can be solved by asking the ethics test questions. Is it legal? Is it fair? Would I want everyone to know about it? Remember, there's no right way to do a wrong thing.

Lowered incidence of brucellosis lifts Texas to 'A' ranking

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - Texas has joined 17 other states and moved up a notch in the ranking of how few cattle in the state are infected with brucellosis.

The U.S. Agriculture Department reclassified Texas from a "B" to an "A" ranking because the cattle industry curbed brucellosis in breeding cattle to no more than 2.5 infected herds for every 1,000 herds in the state during the previous 12-month period.

Texas joined the Class A states because inspectors also found no more than one brucellosis-infected animal in 1,000 cattle marketed statewide for the previous 12-month period, said Billy Johnson, a veterinarian and deputy administrator of veterinary services at USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service. Thirty-two states are ranked "brucellosis-free."

The new ranking was announced Monday at the 117th annual meeting of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, the Fort Worth-based support group for cattle producers and traders.

The convention, continuing through today, is expected to draw more than 2,000 of the group's approximately 17,000 ranchers and other members in Texas, Oklahoma and surrounding states.

Texas is the nation's leading cattle-producing state, with about \$6 billion in annual sales of all cattle and calves.

Texas cattle raisers have participated for 35 years in a national effort to eradicate the cow disease.

Dead calves and other industry losses were blamed on brucellosis in the 1970s and early 1980s, when other states were threatening to embargo Texas cattle shipments because of the disease threat.

The state's upgrade to Class A, one step removed from "brucellosis-free," will be an economic boost to Texans selling and moving cattle across state lines, Johnson told the Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

"Our cattle will move more freely," said rancher John Cargile, operator and principal owner of Producers Livestock Auction in San Angelo.

The Class A ranking continues to require brucellosis testing of Texas' breeding cattle before shipment to other states, but it eliminates the previously mandatory retesting and 45- to 120-day quarantine at the buyers' end of the interstate cattle shipment.

Brucellosis also can be contracted by people through contact with infected animals. Known in humans as undulant fever, it can be treated with antibiotics but often becomes a recurring, though controllable, infection causing intermittent fever, weakness, pain and swelling of the joints.

Summer storms may cause hazardous pasture feeding

WASHINGTON (AP) - Summer storms may cause some cattle to eat themselves to death, scientists say.

The problem is that cattle seem to gorge on a poisonous weed known as larkspur when a storm strikes their rangeland.

"Cattle will normally eat larkspur flowers, pods, and leaves casually," says James A. Pfister, a range scientist with the Agricultural Research Service.

"But when storms come, some cattle eat larkspur leaves almost exclusively for short periods of time," he said. That "gluttonous consumption" can be deadly.

Pfister and a fellow range scientist,

Michael H. Ralphs, have measured significant relationships between larkspur consumption and several weather conditions associated with storms.

These included dropping barometric pressure and temperature, high humidity, rain and leaf wetness.

"This observation, coupled with many published and ongoing research projects, will be the basis for an integrated approach to reducing livestock deaths and increasing rancher profit," said Lynn F. James, who is in charge of the research service's Poisonous Plant Research Laboratory in Logan, Utah.

Voters will mark ballots for directors only within their regions.

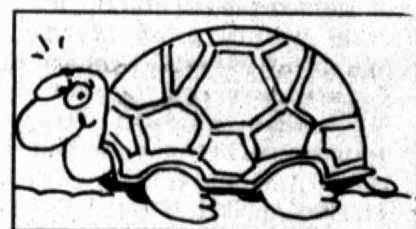
Ballots must be returned to TCPB, postmarked no later than May 5.

rangeland, where the poisonous weed kills more than 3,000 head a year.

The range scientists suggested that in the future, ranchers might use a combination of improved management practices to reduce the risk of larkspur poisoning.

They might include using herbicides to control particularly bad larkspur patches and keeping cattle off rangelands where larkspur is growing, until the weed matures and its toxicity is reduced.

The scientists also suggest some ranchers might use sheep, which aren't affected by larkspur, to pre-graze and clean up infested ranges before they release their cattle onto the land.

Number of employees drops on farms, ranches

WASHINGTON (AP) - U.S. farms and ranches employed 2.4 million people during January, down from 2.5 million a year earlier, the Agriculture Department says.

Farm operators paid their hired workers an average wage of \$6.54 an hour, up 14 cents from January 1993.

Workers paid on an hourly basis received an average \$6.14 per hour, up 12 cents, and livestock workers earned \$5.75 per hour, up 11 cents.

Benefits such as housing and meals were provided to 43 percent of hired workers, compared with 45 percent a year earlier.

Pecan tree planting marks anniversary

AUSTIN - During a ceremony in Austin commemorating the 75th anniversary of the official state tree, Texas Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry commended efforts to keep the pecan tree at the forefront.

"Today is a day of celebration -- of remembering childhood walks through the shade of a quiet pecan grove. It is a day when we all look to the future -- a future represented by the tree we planted, a tree that will stand in testimony to the significance and greatness of our Texas Pecan Industry."

Perry paid tribute to the Texas Pecan Growers Association for keeping the industry strong, saying, "They have also kept the tradition of Governor James S. Hogg alive."

He said the pecan tree was designated the official state tree in part because Governor Hogg requested that on his death, no monument of stone would be erected.

"Let my children plant at the head of my grave a pecan tree and at my feet an old-fashioned walnut tree."

And when these trees shall bear, let the pecans and walnuts be given out among the plain people of Texas so they may plant them and make Texas a land of trees," Perry quoted Hogg.

The president of the TPGA, Mike Adams, joined Perry in planting the pecan tree on the northeast side of the Texas Capitol.

The executive vice president of TPGA, Cindy Wise, conducted a pecan pie bake-off between San Saba and Seguin to determine the "Pecan Capital" of Texas. The pies were judged by Perry, Adams, Extension Horticulturist Emeritus Blueford Hancock and Texas A&M University Professor of Horticulture Dr. Benton Storey.

The pie contest was declared a tie. Announcing the results, Perry said, "Fortunately pecan pie baking is serious business and not a sport where only one team wins. In the world of thrashing, picking and cracking, all our pecans are winners, and our winning Texas pecan industry is big enough for two capitals."

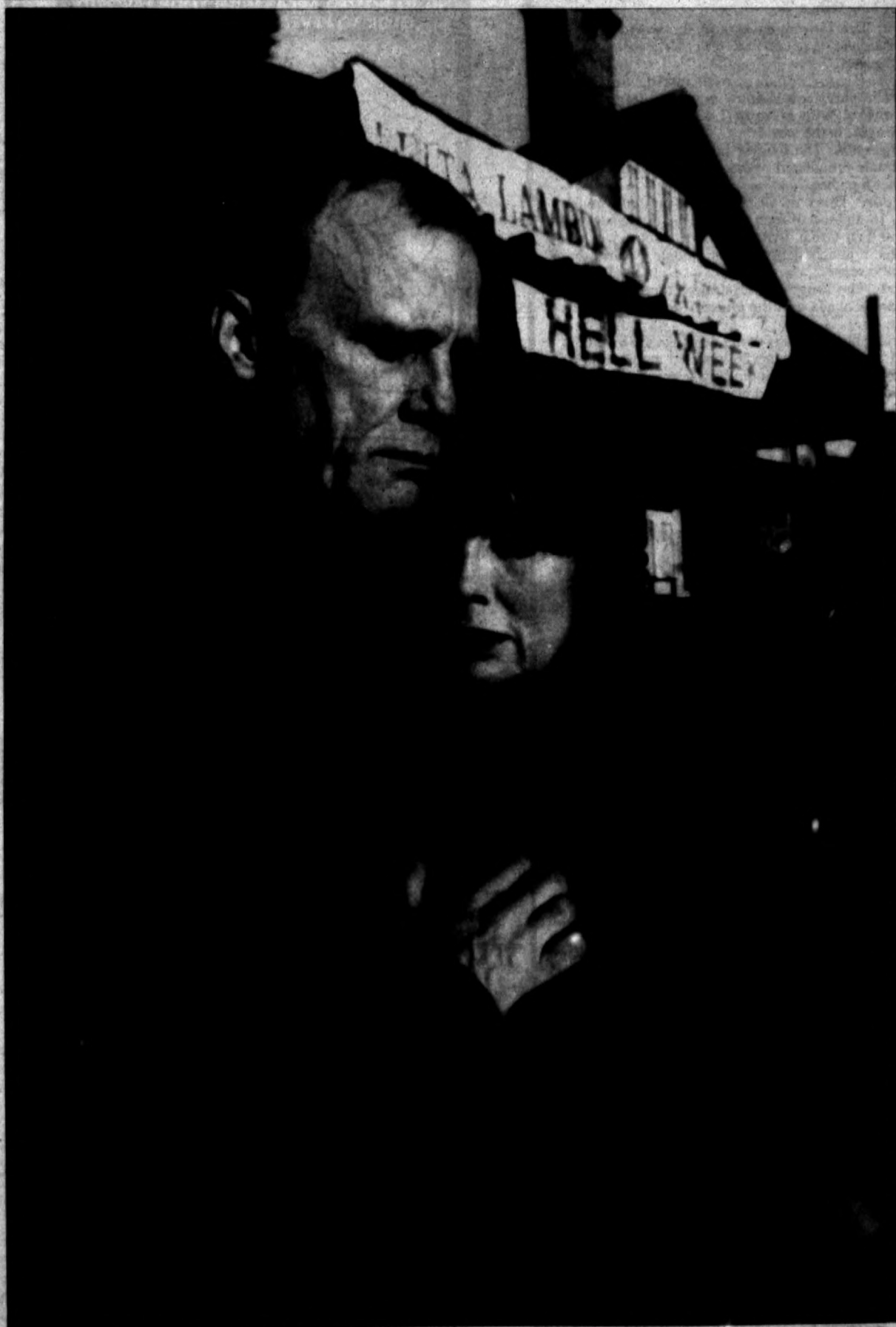

Gray portrays grief-stricken mother in 'Broken Pledges'

The year was 1978. Moviegoers everywhere were lining up to see John Belushi starring as a developmentally arrested, beer-swilling barbarian of a college student in "National Lampoon's Animal House." The movie lightheartedly depicts the various shenanigans of a rowdy bunch of fraternity brothers at fictional Faber College.

That same year at Alfred University, in upstate New York, sophomore Chuck Stenzel made up his mind that he was going to pledge an on-campus fraternity.

"He decided to pledge the fraternity at 4 in the afternoon," says Stenzel's mother, Eileen Stevens. "He was dead by 11."

On Monday, April 11, the shocking, painful story of Stevens' family comes to NBC in "Moment of Truth: Broken Pledges."

In the film, Linda Gray portrays Eileen Stevens, who must deal with the grief over the loss of her son in an incident at fictional Crawford College.

Devastated, but determined to uncover the mystery surrounding her son's death, Eileen eventually finds out that his last night alive was spent in a dangerous hazing ritual with the fraternity.

"What had happened was they had kidnapped the pledges from their dorm rooms," the real-life Stevens explains, "took them to a parking lot and locked them in car trunks, three at a time. It was February, freezing cold and they wore no coats, because they were taken by surprise."

"They were each given a pint of bourbon and a mixture of wine and beer," she continues, "and they were told they had to consume that alcohol before they would be released from the trunk."

When the pledges were finally

released at the fraternity house, many of them were unconscious or vomiting. They were then taken to a bedroom and left on mattresses on the floor to "sleep it off."

"Chuck never woke up," Stevens says. "When the ambulance came, he was pronounced dead."

Since that time, Stevens has sought to outlaw fraternity hazing throughout the country. She has spoken at more than 500 college campuses on the dangers of hazing, and has seen anti-hazing legislation passed in 38 states.

Stevens served as a consultant for the film and has seen the finished work, which stars Major League Baseball player Barry Bonds as a state senator she seeks out in her plight.

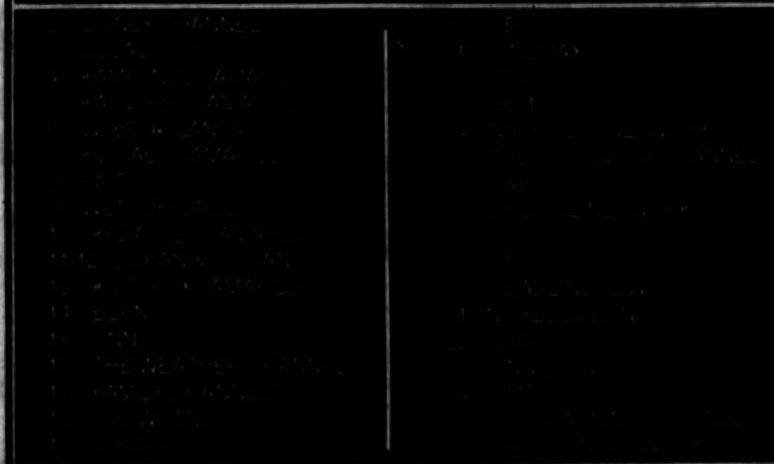
"I was very comfortable with it," Stevens states. "I felt very good about the way it was done. Of course, much was omitted. You know, you can't cram it all in in 90 minutes, but I think they certainly highlighted what the issue was about. I thought the portrayal of my son was strong."

Some of the acting seems forced. Gray particularly wavers between showing too much and not enough emotion. Some of the performances aren't even that good and may serve to distract viewers from what the movie is about.

But the message of the film winds up coming through loud and clear: Fraternity hazing, in all its forms, is not only inhumane and cruel, but also life-threatening.

"I think it's important to note," Stevens claims, "which they did in the movie, that I'm not anti-fraternity. I am opposed to hazing and I have chosen to work within the system and speak to those young people as a parent."

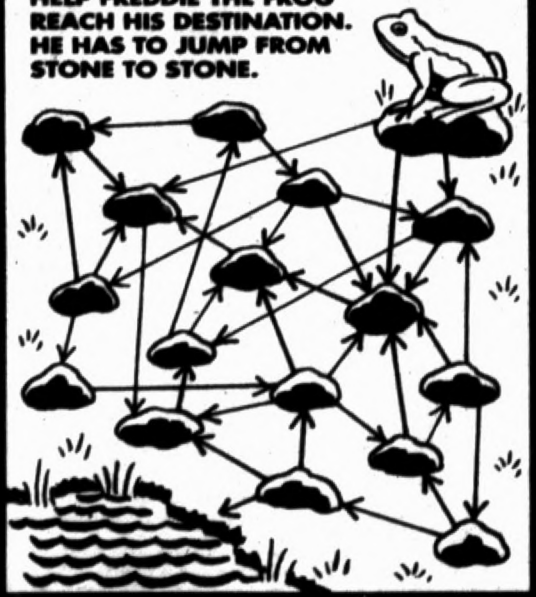

While working in Las Vegas showrooms in 1962, Van Dyke was offered his first acting role on his brother's show, "The Dick Van Dyke Show." He received overnight acclaim and was signed to a contract by CBS.

Soon Van Dyke was in high demand. He appeared on "The Judy Garland Show" as comic relief, and later did a game show called "Picture This."

In 1964, Grant Tinker convinced Van Dyke that "My Mother the Car" was the perfect vehicle for his comedic skills. The show lasted only one season, but in the annals of comedy television, it has never been forgotten.

Other shows in which he starred include "Accidental Family," "Headmaster," "13 Queens Boulevard," and the miniseries "Fresno," alongside Carol Burnett and Dabney Coleman.

Van Dyke's feature film credits include "The Courtship of Eddie's Father," "Palm Springs Weekend," and "Run If You Can."

Currently, Van Dyke is a headliner in major showrooms in Atlantic City, N.J., and Lake Tahoe, Reno and Las Vegas, Nev.

He has received three Emmy nominations in the category of outstanding supporting actor for his role as Luther Van Dam on "Coach."

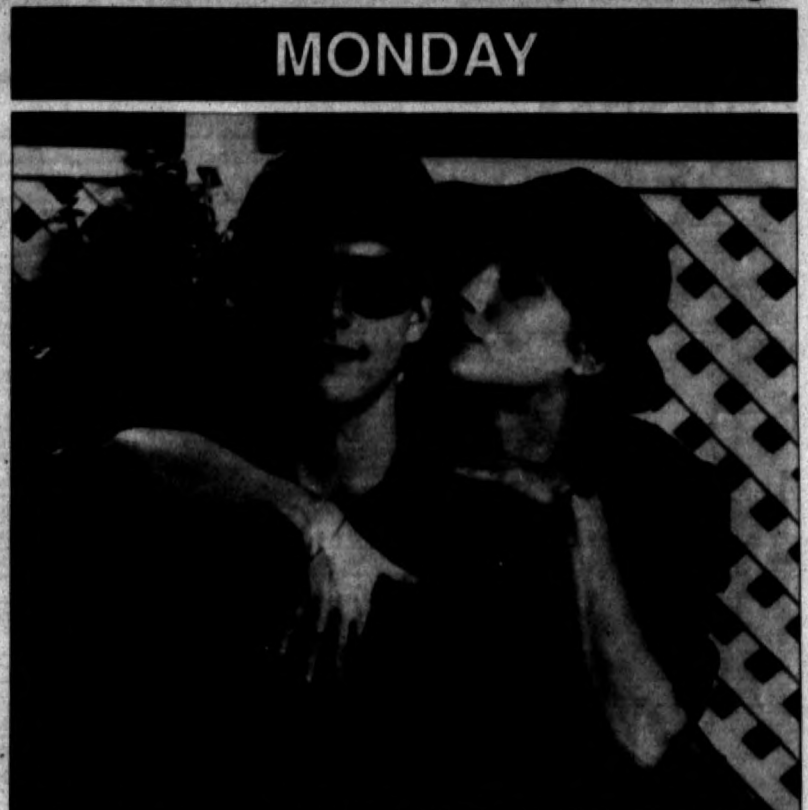

Ironside gets railroaded in USA's 'Revenge'; Alley portrays 'David's Mother' on CBS

Viewers seeking little more than a light, two-hour escape from reality are hereby advised to check out "Deadman's Revenge," premiering Friday, April 15, on the USA Network.

The movie stars Michael Ironside as Luck Hatcher, a homesteader in the Old West who is imprisoned on charges trumped up by wealthy railway magnate Payton McCay (Bruce Dern).

Twelve years later, Luck escapes from prison with a young bounty hunter named Bodeen (Keith Couluris) hot on his trail. Unbeknownst to everyone, Bodeen is actually Luck's son Tom, a U.S. marshal looking to corral the unscrupulous McCay. Bodeen happens across another bounty hunter, Jessup Bush (Vondie Curtis-Hall), who claims to have killed Luck.

But as the title implies, "Deadman's Revenge" is chock-full of surprises.

Luck resurfaces and orchestrates a highly charged sting operation along with the two bounty hunters with McCay as the intended target.

The acting is acceptable, if unspectacular, and Dern gives a particularly viable performance as the civilized antagonist, McCay. The dialogue is fun and contains such gems as Bodeen referring to a local lawman as "a self-serving, dollar-a-day, slab of pork belly acting like a sheriff."

No, there isn't much chance of anyone confusing this movie with "Hamlet," but so what? Friday-night-stay-at-homers should kick back and enjoy.

Other films on TV this week include Clint Eastwood in "Pale Rider," Sunday, April 10, on ABC. Also on Sunday, Kirstie Alley plays a woman who makes sacrifices for her autistic son in "David's Mother" on CBS. A college professor becomes the target of a stalker in NBC's "Shadow of Obsession."

Monday on Fox, Tom Cruise gets into some "Risky Business" with Rebecca De Mornay. Linda Gray stars as a grieving mother whose son has been killed in a fraternity hazing accident in NBC's "Moment of Truth: Broken Pledges."

'Middlemarch' brings Eliot's saga to life on PBS

George Eliot's 800-page novel, "Middlemarch," "frightened the wits" out of actor Robert Hardy when he read it at age 16. Now that Hardy plays a principal role in the BBC dramatization, he says the film "bears all the best of the original, but reduces a fat volume ... down to six hours." Six-and-a-half hours, actually - still a daunting prospect in the world of USA Today and Headline News.

But both the novel and the miniseries cover a lot of territory, and the trip is a rewarding one. It begins Sunday, April 10, on PBS' "Masterpiece Theatre" (check local listings).

Like many novels by Eliot's elder contemporary, Charles Dickens, this one was published in serialized form and has a strong political thread and moral. It is also heroic and romantic, with no fewer than five important courtships and marriages within its scope. It is interesting that Eliot (the pen name for Mary Ann Evans) writes so fully about preserving faulty and broken marriages, since she lived for many years with a man who left his

wife and family to love her.

Eliot's heroine is Dorothea Brooke, more popular with many of the British than Jane Eyre or Elizabeth Bennett. Lovely and high-minded, she is played by newcomer Juliet Aubrey.

Other performers include Caroline Harker as Celia, Dorothea's affectionate sister, and Hardy as their benevolent uncle, Patrick Malahide ("The Inspector Allyn Mysteries") plays the cold-fish cleric Edward Casaubon, and Rufus Sewell is his intense young cousin, Will Ladislaw. Douglas Hodge is the talented physician Tertius Lydgate, and Trevyn McDowell plays the spoiled and beautiful Rosamond Vincy. Michael Hordern is her sputtering, spiteful old relative.

Produced at a cost of 1 million British pounds an hour, "Middlemarch" is well-acted and luscious to watch, but some things were left out. It would be helpful to know some of the characters' thoughts, for example. Also, the final episode gives Eliot's conclusion really short shrift, and still-hungry viewers will find great satisfaction in the last 100 pages of the novel.
