County facing smaller than expected shortfall

Projected revenue and expenditures for Deaf Smith County for the current fiscal year may come closer to a balanced budget than was expected when the year began on Oct. 1, 1993.

Alex Schroeter, county auditor, told Commissioners' Court Monday that the shortfall may be \$21,000 instead of \$36,790 projected when the budget was adopted.

Commissioners began preliminary work on the next budget, receiving requests from elected officials for operating their departments in the year beginning next Oct. 1.

In other business, commissioners: -- Approved advertising for a deputy for the county clerk's office, as well as advertising for bids for chemicals and for new maintainers.

-- Agreed to increase the hourly pay of election judges.

-- Heard a report from the county extension office on a grant program and approved employment of a

summer assistant for the office.

-- Approved the audit of the juvenile board.

-- Adopted an interlocal agreement between the City of Hereford and Deaf Smith County for the aquatic center.

-- Heard an explanation of a records retention management program from a contractor.

During the budget workshop, Schroeter presented only the requests from county officials for expenditures next year. He said the figures were preliminary.

The deficit budget adopted last fall was based on using approximately \$36,700 from the reserve fund, Schroeter said Tuesday.

"It looks like we won't spend quite as much," he explained, "and the revenue may be a little higher."

Schroeter expects a reserve of \$861,000 when this year ends.

Bids will be taken for purchase of chemicals for spraying right of way along county roads.

Commissioners also will seek bids

for new road maintainers for Precincts 1, 3 and 4.

On a recommendation of County Clerk David Ruland, commissioners agreed to raise the compensation for election judges from \$4.25 to \$5 per hour.

Beverly Harder, Deaf Smith County extension agent for home economics, introduced Chiselda Hernandez who has been employed to work in a nutritional education program funded by grant.

Harder said the grant, administered by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, provides funding for classes and certain food items needed by children.

Hernandez works 30 hours per week, including teaching classes on nutrition 20 hours each week.

The agent also asked commissioners for funding for a summer assistant in the extension office. The assistant, approved by the commission, will be assigned primarily to 4-H activities.

County Judge Tom Simons reviewed an interlocal agreement between the county and City of Hereford for assistance the county will provide in construction of a new aquatic center.

The county's contribution will be labor, equipment and materials, primarily for preparation of the pool site.

City Manager Chester Nolen told the commission that work will begin in a few weeks. Some dirt work has been started at the site, adjacent to the YMCA.

Representatives of Hart Graphics explained to the commission the process when the firm uses to help with preparing a records management plan and with designating records that may be destroyed.

Inspector requested for today's voting

Report reveals few problems in March

A vote inspector sent to Deaf Smith County during the March 8 Democratic primary found very little fault with the way the election was conducted.

However, critics of the conduct of elections here again requested a vote inspector for Tuesday's Democratic runoff. County Clerk David Ruland, who also serves as chief elections officer was notified Monday morning that an inspector was assigned.

Ruland said Monday afternoon that the inspector probably will spend most of the day in the Voting Precinct 2 polling place in the courthouse.

A letter from the Texas Secretary of State's office with a report on the March 8 primary by vote inspector, Jeff Richardson, was received by Ruland Monday.

The representative of the secretary of state complimented the county clerk for "maintaining distinction between his duties as election administrator and his role of candidate in the election."

"Overall, election officials were well informed regarding the election process and presented a well-run election."

Richardson called attention to a procedural misunderstanding that was

quickly put right by designating ballot boxes for uncounted and counted ballots in one precinct.

He also observed incidents in a polling place that resulted in a poll watcher being asked to leave the premises. Another poll watcher did not present proper documentation and was not permitted in the polls, Richardson reported. A third poll watcher carried out the assignment without incident.

Richardson reported proper procedure was followed when a voter presented a receipt for registration but the name was not found on the poll list of eligible voters. The person was allowed to vote under the challenged voter provision.

On a checklist of 29 items the inspector observed at the three voting boxes he visited, Richardson was critical of procedure on only two items.

State law requires that two officials help voters needing assistance, but only one performed the function, the inspector observed.

In the same category, Richardson observed that an oath of assistance was not administered by the election official.

Ruland said he was pleased with the inspector's report. The two items about voter assistance, he said, were

the result of election workers' overlooking the requirements because they were very busy or were short-handed.

The vote inspector spent election day at Voting Precincts One, at Aikman School; Two, at the county courthouse, and Three, at the Community Center.

The Secretary of State was requested by a group of Deaf Smith County citizens to send an inspector for the election.

One reason given by the group was related to the possibility that voters would be turned away if they had no registration certificates. No such incident was observed by the inspector.

The request for an inspector also cited the possibility of computer error with no listing of the voter on the poll list.

The only such incident reported on March 8 was addressed by the inspector who noted the challenged voter ballot.

Ruland expressed satisfaction that the conduct of the election was given a high mark by the vote inspector.

"I think the people of Deaf Smith County should be proud of the way our people conducted the election. They aren't paid much for what they do," he said.

Hereford, Deaf Smith County receive April tax rebate funds

State Comptroller John Sharp has mailed out April sales tax rebate checks to 979 Texas cities and 111 counties -- including Hereford and Deaf Smith County, which both received checks in excess of the amount received last year.

The city of Hereford's April check was \$45,253.27, which reflects the city's 1 percent share of sales taxes. The amount reflects an increase of 3.4 percent over the \$43,764.08 received in April 1993.

For the year to date, the city has received \$227,702.74, which is 5.61 percent over the \$215,600.62 paid for the same period last year.

Deaf Smith County, which collects a one-half percent sales tax on county sales, received a check for \$24,180.88 for April, which is up 5.87 percent over the \$22,839.00 last year.

For the year to date, the county has received checks totaling \$117,002.19, up 4.33 percent from last year's \$112,137.37.

Overall, the state rebate checks reflected a total of \$101.9 million, which sharp said is "an impressive 14 percent increase above last year's \$89.3 million," while the \$11.4 million in rebates to Texas counties is "an equally encouraging 18.1 percent increase over the \$9.6 million payments in April 1993."

This month's sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected in

February and reported by businesses filing monthly tax returns in March.

Other area towns and counties received their rebate checks as well. Those include the following towns and counties, with figures reflecting the April check, percent difference from April 1993 and the amount of

the April 1993 check.

-- Castro County: Dimmitt, \$21,828.31, 21.92 percent above last year's \$17,902.37; Hart, \$848.37, up 17.46 percent from \$722.24 last year; Nazareth, \$797.08, up 54.04 percent from \$517.45 last year; and Castro (See TAX, Page 10)

Probation revocation nets man term in state prison

A defendant who failed to comply with terms of probation Monday received two seven-year sentences in the state prison system.

Judge David Wesley Gulley of 222nd District Court revoked the probated sentences of Jose Lara Flores, 21, who previously was convicted of aggravated sexual assault of a child and taking a controlled substance in jail.

On a no contest plea, another defendant was assessed a 40-year term in prison. Jose DeLaLuz Esparza, 27, also was given a two-year sentence on a guilty plea of bail jumping and failure to appear.

A third defendant, Alford Ray Guess, 41, was sentenced to 10 years in prison after pleading guilty to a drug charge.

Flores was sentenced to eight years' probation and fined \$1,500 in

September 1990 on the sexual assault conviction. He was given an eight-year sentence on the drug charge in May 1991. On completion of a term in the alternative incarceration program, he was placed on shock probation. Both probated sentences were revoked by Judge Gulley.

The defendant will serve the two sentences concurrently in the Texas Department of Criminal Justice institutional division.

Esparza previously was convicted on a charge of aggravated sexual assault of a child and sentenced to 40 years in prison. The sentences imposed Monday will be served concurrently with the earlier conviction.

Guess, charged with possession of a controlled substance, cocaine, was denied probation by Judge Gulley.

Tan Nguyen places second in regional spelling contest



Tan Nguyen was runnerup in the Regional Spelling Bee Saturday in Canyon, going 52 rounds before being edged by three-time champion David Urban of Amarillo. Nguyen slipped an erroneous "o" into the spelling of "fremitus," which is defined as the sensation felt by the hand when placed on a part of the body that vibrates during speech. Urban, who placed second in the national bee last year, correctly spelled the word, then spelled "ovularian," meaning resembling an egg, to take the title.

Tan, a 12-year-old sixth grader at West Central School, and Urban both said they realized Nguyen's mistake after he spelled the word. A field of 34 competitors quickly dwindled to eight students by round 10 during the bee at Mary Moody Northern Recital Hall at West Texas A&M University.

Both spellers breathed a sigh of relief as the two-hour contest came to an end. Tan bowed his head slightly when he missed, while Urban congratulated him on "doing a real good job."

Tan, son of Day and Sang Nguyen, operators of Hunan Chinese Restaurant, won a 32-volume set of the New Encyclopaedia Britannica, awarded by the publishing company, and a watch donated by the Amarillo Globe-News.

Urban, the regional champ, earned two airline tickets to Washington, D.C., where he will compete again in the national spelling bee in June. He also received a plaque, a dictionary, a \$50 savings bond and a watch.

Tanner Whatley of Canyon finished third in the contest. Other finalists included: 4. Sarah Boone of Elida, N.M.; 5. Michelle Ehrlich of Perryton; 6. Jacque Fowler of Hooker, OK.; 7. Gwen McEntire of San Jon, N.M.; and 8. Bertha Juarez of Plainview.

NASA astronaut Dr. Jan Davis gave all spellers a few words of encouragement during the luncheon preceding the bee. Davis told contestants they were already champions and advised them to try again next year if they didn't win.

Davis said she knew firsthand now persistence pays off. She began working for NASA in 1979 and tried unsuccessfully to become an astronaut in 1984. She continued her education and training and became a mission specialist in 1987, and has participated in two shuttle missions since then.

Tan's older brother, Bao, also claimed runnerup honors in the 1992 regional bee. He also was edged by Urban, who now has won for three straight years.

The spelling bee is sponsored by the Amarillo Globe-News and West Texas A&M University. Speedy Nieman is director of the Deaf Smith County Bee, sponsored locally by The Hereford Brand.

World/Nation

WASHINGTON - Bosnia's Serbs face the threat of U.S.-led air attacks in five other Muslim enclaves as the Clinton administration prepares to extend its NATO role in the military defense of Gorazde's embattled civilians to other "safe areas" in Bosnia.

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina - Bosnian Serbs intensified their pounding of the Muslim enclave of Gorazde after NATO's second air strike in as many days, but the shelling stopped shortly after the U.N. commander in Bosnia threatened to send NATO jets in again.

KIGALI, Rwanda - U.N. efforts to broker a cease-fire between the rebels and the army in failed again in Rwanda, as grisly reports of vicious massacres and rampant lawlessness continue to pour out of the Central African country.

SAN FRANCISCO - Scientists have developed a vaccine that they say dramatically reduces the recurrence of the deadliest form of skin cancer. The approach may one day be used against other forms of cancer.

WASHINGTON - The Clintons' underpayment of their 1980 taxes, which is costing them \$14,615 in back taxes and interest, is the latest installment in the confused account of Hillary Rodham Clinton's adventures in commodities trading.

WASHINGTON - Benjamin Chavis and his bosses at the NAACP are embroiled in a tug of war over whether the nation's foremost civil rights group will go right or left on the road to rejuvenation.

State

AUSTIN - Democratic Senate hopefuls Jim Mattox and Richard Fisher were racing the clock to talk to voters before today's runoff election. A poll by The Dallas Morning News and Houston Chronicle published over the weekend showed Mattox with 48 percent and Fisher at 46 percent. The survey had a margin of error of 4 percentage points.

WASHINGTON - The State Department's refusal to allow the exhibition of an F-16 fighter at a major Latin American air show is "shortsighted," says Texas Gov. Ann Richards.

AMARILLO - A \$10 million meat processing plant proposed in Amarillo for prison inmates is "guaranteed to waste taxpayers' money," according to a comptroller's report.

EL PASO - In the most severe outbreak of botulism reported in at least 10 years, 14 people have been hospitalized, including one in critical condition and four in serious condition.

HOUSTON - Police killed one suspect and used tear gas to force two others out of a southwest Houston home where they were holding two families hostage.

HOUSTON - Nation of Islam leader Louis Farrakhan called upon 13,000 black men in Houston to love each other and stop the violence among themselves.

SAN ANTONIO - Dallas billionaire Ross Perot blasted President Clinton's health care reform package Monday and urged doctors to develop an alternative proposal.

WASHINGTON - Southwest Airlines is least likely to arrive late or lose baggage, but passengers are more likely to get bumped from flights, according to an annual ranking of the nation's major air carriers.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. - The fund to compensate thousands of women who received silicone breast implants grew to \$4.7 billion when five more companies joined the deal.

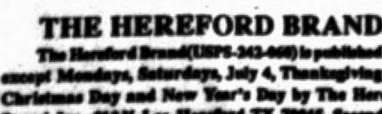

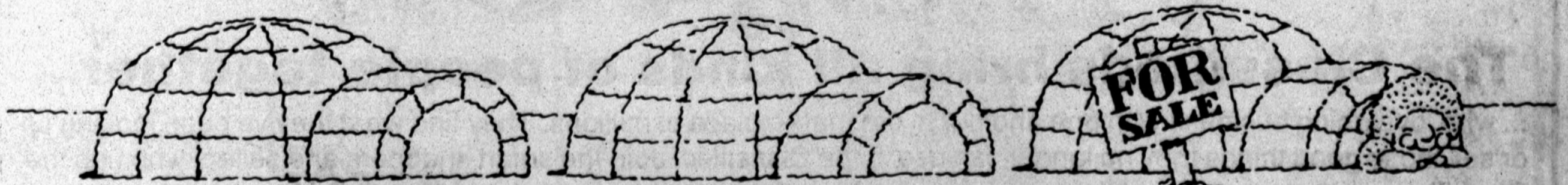

Herd holds off Caprock for 3rd district win

Russ Watts collected four hits and starting pitcher Ray Hastings

survived a Caprock rally in the seventh inning as Hereford hung on for a 7-5 win Saturday at Whiteface Field.

The win puts the Herd at 3-0 in District 1-4A--tied for the lead with Borger--and gives the Herd a winning record at 9-8.

Caprock falls to 1-2 and 7-10. Hereford was to host pre-district favorite Randall (1-2, 15-5) today, but Sunday's rain forced postponement of the game until Thursday. It will be played at 4:30 p.m. at Whiteface Field.

Watts had a two-run triple in the first and an RBI double in the second to help the Herd out to a 7-0 lead through three innings.

Hastings took a shutout into the fifth, but a pair of walks and Adrian Padilla's two-run double spoiled that. Hastings got out of a jam in the sixth inning, then struck out the first batter in the seventh before running into serious trouble with the top of the Caprock order.

Three of the next four batters blasted triples, utilizing the stiff wind that was blowing out, and the other batter walked. The Longhorns had

suddenly cut the lead to 7-5.

Herd coach J.J. Villarreal left Hastings in to instill confidence, he said.

"I wanted Ray to have the complete game," Villarreal said. "I wanted him to know I and the team had faith in him to finish."

He finished, but it wasn't pretty. Another strikeout, Hastings' sixth of the game, provided the second out, but a walk put men on first and third. The next batter hit a ball that bounced all of 15 feet away from the plate, and Hastings fielded it but bobbled it and couldn't get the runner. The man on third wisely didn't move, but the man on first ran nearly all the way to third. He was tagged out on a rundown, and the Whiteface celebrated with a sigh of relief.

The Herd is on a four-game winning streak, and they've pulled their record up from 3-6 to 9-8.

"You've got to appreciate the way these guys work hard," Villarreal said, adding that he's being helped by good senior leadership.

Watts had a triple, a double and a single in the first three at-bats. When he came up for the fourth time in the sixth inning, he knew he needed a homer to hit for the cycle. On the first pitch, he took a mighty swing, which resulted in a mighty whiff. After that, he toned down the swing and

collected another single.

"That first pitch, I took a big stroke at," he said, grinning. "I got my head together and took a base hit. We needed baserunners more than anything."

Watts' first inning triple drove home Tanner Murphey and Jacob Lopez, both of whom had walked. Watts scored when Scott Ahola reached on an error, and Ahola came around to score on another error.

Watts' second inning double plated Chris Vallejo, who had walked and stolen second base. Hereford led 5-0.

In the third, Andrew Tijerina and Ronald Torres both walked. Vallejo drove in Tijerina with a single, and Torres scored on Murphey's RBI groundout.

All the damage came against Caprock starter Michael Wise, who was pulled after Vallejo's single. He gave up only four hits--two to Watts--but he walked six. Padilla relieved Wise and retired nine of the last 13 Hereford batters.

In the second game of the varsity/junior varsity doubleheader, the Herd JV completed the sweep with a 16-5 rout. Gregg Kalka pitched all six innings for Hereford, and Sonny Perez scored three runs.

The JV's game with the Borger JV scheduled for Monday in Hereford was rained out.

Europeans, like Olazabal, are prepared for Masters

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) - In the American version of golfing hell, there will be no sandwiches, no second-place money and every approach into every green will demand a bump-and-run shot.

Whoever first described Augusta National as heaven on earth was no doubt a European. The golf course may not fit the above bill of particulars to a tee, but it certainly comes close enough. Which explains in part why, for the sixth time in the last seven years and ninth since 1980, a European won the Masters. Especially the bump-and-run part.

"I don't know. I don't know why we are doing so good here," Jose Maria Olazabal of Spain, the latest import to make off with the green jacket, replied when asked about foreign domination of America's most storied golf championship.

But a moment later, it came to him.

"I think," he said, "it has mostly

to do with the kind of imagination that you need to hit certain shots."

American Tom Lehman was more specific. He left the National clubhouse Sunday morning at 7 under, leading the Masters and playing partner Olazabal by a single stroke. Over the next four hours, he watched the Spaniard rescue par from almost-certain disaster on five holes with brilliant bump-and-run shots and deadly putting.

When someone pointed out that Olazabal made only two bogeys in the last 54 holes and ran the ball into the hole twice from off the green, Lehman could hardly have expressed surprise. After all, he was treated to the clinic firsthand.

Despite misfiring often and coming back toward the pins from angles that only a geometry teacher could love, Olazabal bumped short pitch after short pitch on the putting surface and heard the crowd roar time after time as the ball ran unerringly toward pin after pin.

"He's got that reputation," Ehman said glumly, "so I kind of expected it. ... My personal feeling is that the Europeans are a lot more creative around the greens than we are."

"We're better at the flop shot from U.S. Open-type rough, because that's what's around most of the greens we play. But miss the green here and you need the bump-and-run shots to get back on."

"Most American players are afraid of that shot," he concluded, "because we never have to play it." Except here. And especially this year.

Worried by the plunging numbers put up by the pros at the TPC two weeks ago - winner Greg Norman finished 24 under par - the Masters committee apparently decided to toughen up Augusta National. New, even more treacherous pin placements were found and the greens - either because they were dried out by the winds or watered less - repeatedly bounced iron shots into nearby swales and hollows like so many bad checks.

"As far as I am concerned, I played here eight years and this is the toughest the course has ever played," Olazabal said.

Augusta native Larry Mize, who won this tournament in 1987 and finished third this year, was asked his opinion about Europeans. He started reading the names off the leaderboard. Every one between Olazabal's 279 and the 286 recorded by South African Ernie Els - six in all - belonged to an American.

"Everybody," Mize concluded, "makes such a big deal about winning."

He may not, but the Europeans still do. Not nearly as coddled as their American counterparts with free food and free courtesy cars, and not yet spoiled by purses so huge that a Top 10 finisher in a couple of events can live like a king, Olazabal & Co. come to these shores with a hunger to win that must seem foreign to the pros over here.

"Are we hungrier?" Olazabal repeated a question put to him. "To be honest, I didn't have a good breakfast. And I never had lunch."

Yet somehow he made do.

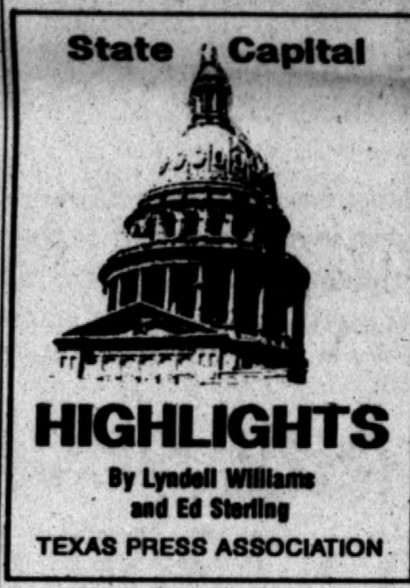

AUSTIN — Comptroller John Sharp's fresh audit of the state's prison system shows room for 5,500 more convicts in the Texas Department of Corrections, he said last week, but other state officials winced at Sharp's recommendations.

According to the audit, the beds could be added by moving minimum security prisoners to older prison units, moving maximum security prisoners to newer, more secure units, and by double-bunking some cells and all trusty camps. Sharp recommended some 200 operational policy changes that he said would save about \$175 million in the next five years. Those changes would cut waste and correct management flaws found in the present system, he said.

Judge Rips Report
But state District Judge Scott McCown, who acted as a liaison in the audit for Gov. Ann Richards, said the report was "full of inaccuracies, mischaracterizations and oversimplification of complex processes."

In a letter to Richards, McCown said that increasing the prison capacity as Sharp recommends would violate court agreements. Sharp responded: "He (McCown) is not the state's attorney general. If he wants to be the state's lawyer, he should run for the office."

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock and House Speaker Pete Laney said Sharp's recommendations might lead to the reopening of the Ruiz case, a lengthy federal case in which a prisoner claimed his constitutional rights were being violated by the overcrowded conditions in the Texas prison system.

Richards said the audit was helpful, but stressed the importance of the state maintaining control of its prisons.

George W. Bush, Richards' GOP opponent in the November general election, said the audit highlights the governor's ineffectiveness.

Governor's Tax Return
Gov. Richards' 1993 federal income tax return shows she owes \$27,639 in taxes on income of \$110,645. Her income was composed of \$94,086 in salary, \$4,520 in interest on savings and \$12,039 from mutual funds, her campaign said last week.

Because she overpaid, Richards gets a refund of \$1,232, which she applied to her 1994 estimated tax.

Richards has made her returns public every year since entering public office as a county commissioner in 1976.

Her spokesman, Chuck McDonald, called on Bush to release his tax returns.

Bush campaign spokeswoman Deborah Burnston-Wade said Bush would release his returns by the federal filing deadline of April 15.

And Reggie Bashur, a spokesman for the campaign, said returns would be released for 1991-93.

Tax Overhaul Needed: Laney
The state's tax system is overdue for an overhaul, House Speaker Pete Laney told members of the Texas Association of Business last week.

But change won't happen until lawmakers are certain Texans want

it," Laney said.
"We need a tax system that produces enough revenue to pay for services that promote economic expansion, and a tax system that does not discourage business investment."

Laney, D-Hale Center, urged TAB members to convince other Texans "that our future depends on the investments we make today in education, public safety, and criminal justice."

Court to Hear School Case
The Texas Supreme Court will hear arguments May 25 on the state's public school funding law, which is being challenged by property-rich and property-poor school districts.

The law, which requires the school districts with the most property wealth to share some of it with property-poor districts, was upheld last year by Judge McCown of Austin.

But McCown gave the Legislature until Sept. 1, 1995 to come up with an equitable way to pay for school construction.

The Supreme Court has found three previous school funding laws unconstitutional since 1989.

Bullock Names School Panel
Meanwhile, Lt. Gov. Bullock has appointed an interim committee to explore state government's role in paying for public school facilities.

Bullock said the committee is needed because of Judge McCown's order requiring the Legislature to address inequities in funding.

Bullock picked Sen. Teel Bivins, R-Amarillo, to chair the committee. Other members are Sens. John Montford, D-Lubbock, and Bill Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant.

The committee will issue a final report by December. The Legislature convenes in January.

Other Highlights
The Texas Racing Commission cleared the way last week for Lubbock Downs to proceed with financing plans for a new mid-size pari-mutuel horse racetrack. The \$9.9 million project would be financed largely through bonds guaranteed by the cities of Lubbock and Slaton.

The first black man to serve as Texas secretary of state, Ronald Kirk, was sworn in by Gov. Richards on April 4, the 26th anniversary of the assassination of civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr. Kirk, 39, a Dallas lawyer, grew up in east Austin.

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) - Pink Floyd fans have something to celebrate besides the group's first concert tour since 1987: "Dark Side of the Moon" has become the fourth biggest-selling album in U.S. music history.

According to the Washington-based Recording Industry Association of America, "Dark Side of the Moon," which has sold 13 million copies in the United States, is the best-selling album ever in this country by a British act.

On the all-time sales list, it trails Michael Jackson's "Thriller," 22 million; and Fleetwood Mac's "Rumours" and the Eagles' "Their Greatest Hits 1971-1975," both at 14 million, the association said last week.

Released in 1973 by Capitol Records, "Dark Side of the Moon" includes cuts such as "Money" and "Time." The album features then-novel sound effects such as a cash register ringing and alarm clock buzzing.

Worldwide, the LP has sold 25 million copies.

The band's 40-city North American tour opened earlier this month in Miami.

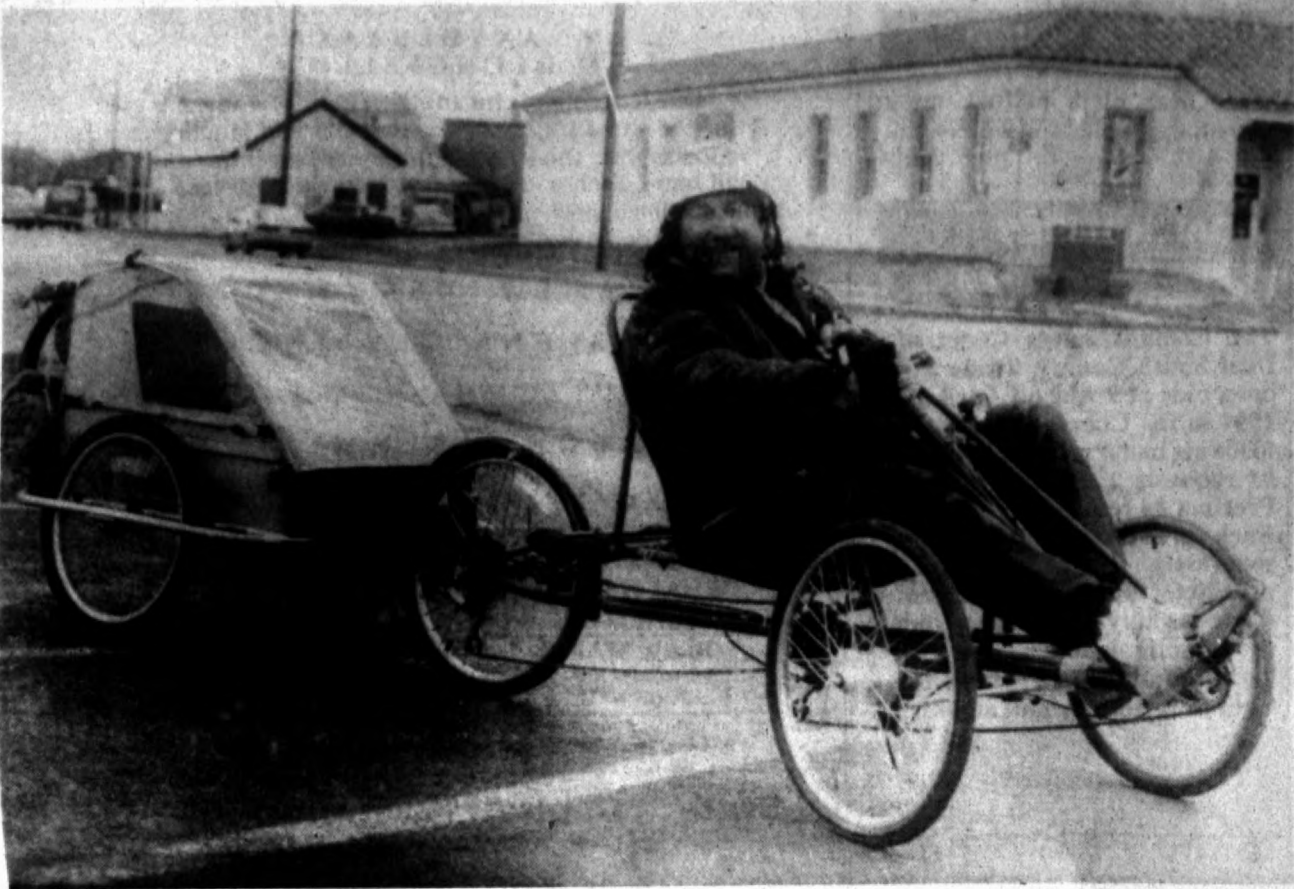

Clintons pay back taxes, interest on 1980 returns

WASHINGTON (AP) - President and Mrs. Clinton's underpayment of their 1980 taxes, which is costing them \$14,615 in back taxes and interest, is the latest installment in the confused account of Hillary Rodham Clinton's adventures in commodities trading.

"They view it as their duty to come forward, disclose the mistake and pay what is owed," the Clintons' personal attorney, David Kendall, said Monday as the White House released new documents on the couple's finances.

The new material, which has been sent to the Internal Revenue Service, showed that the Clintons did not include on their 1980 tax return an additional \$6,498 profit Mrs. Clinton made in the commodities market.

"The Clintons do not know how the error occurred but accept responsibility for it," Kendall said, reading a statement at a news briefing.

The earnings are in addition to a nearly \$100,000 profit the White

House earlier acknowledged Mrs. Clinton made in commodities trading in 1978-79, largely in the risky cattle futures market.

Even though the underpayment occurred 14 years ago - well beyond the three-year statute of limitations for tax liability - the Clintons "have repeatedly said that they will correct any mistakes in their tax returns ... and they are doing so today," Kendall said.

Traders have said Mrs. Clinton's well-publicized \$100,000 killing in the cattle futures market was highly unusual for a beginner.

Those gains - and now the additional profits of \$6,498 - are expected to be part of a congressional hearing into the Clintons' investment in the Whitewater real estate venture in Arkansas and its relationship to a failed savings and loan.

The new documents showed activity in a second account, different from the one in which Mrs. Clinton was said to have put up \$1,000 and turned it into a \$100,000 profit.

They showed Mrs. Clinton put up \$5,000 of her own money in a second trading account in October 1979.

The Clintons wrote checks to the U.S. Treasury and to the state of Arkansas on Monday totaling \$14,615, Kendall said.

A source close to the Clintons' tax situation, speaking to White House reporters on condition of anonymity, said the details of Mrs. Clintons' trading "are confusing."

The additional income "was just overlooked," he said, suggesting the Clintons had not gotten a year-end statement from the brokerage - Stephens Inc. of Little Rock - that detailed the commodity gains.

The existence of a second trading account for Mrs. Clinton with the Stephens brokerage firm had been previously reported, but not the extent of her profits.

Earlier, the White House had claimed Mrs. Clinton had lost about \$1,000 on the account. That statement now "is inoperative," a senior administration official demanded anonymity said Monday.

The new documents revealed that Mrs. Clinton actually opened the account in 1978, put \$5,000 into it in October 1979 and closed it in May 1980, withdrawing \$10,489.

The new documents show Mrs. Clinton traded heavily in commodities other than cattle futures.

For instance, she posted a \$11,435 profit in early 1980 from trading in sugar futures. But she also recorded losses about the same time of \$11,250 on copper futures contracts.

Rwanda ethnic warfare toll estimated at 20,000

KIGALI, Rwanda (AP) - The capital echoed with mortar and heavy machine-gun exchanges today between government troops and rebels advancing from the north. The streets were filled with men armed with machetes, clubs, hatchets and spears.

Six days of ethnic warfare have killed an estimated 20,000 people, and the air in Kigali was heavy with the stench of corpses.

Fears mounted that the entire country could become engulfed in fighting between the majority Hutu ethnic group and the minority Tutsis. Their ancient feuds have etched Rwanda's history in blood.

"We've had trouble before, but I've never seen it this bad," said Tony Wood, a British citizen who has owned a tea factory in Kigali since 1968.

"It seems this has been an excuse

for settling old scores," he said.

In the countryside, smoke from burned-out villages wafted over the lush green hills that had once earned Rwanda the nickname "The Switzerland of Africa."

New reports of butchery surfaced in this small Central African nation.

A nun told Spanish National Radio that about 100 people were massacred Monday in the town hall in Kibuye, 85 miles west of Kigali.

Hundreds of Tutsis were reported hacked to death by Hutus at a church-run university in Gisenyi, a town at Lake Kivu near the border with Zaire about 60 miles northwest of Kigali.

In Butare, Rwanda's second-largest city 50 miles south of Kigali, refugees from the countryside told of gangs of men setting fire to villages and killing residents with machetes.
