Rogers, Chavez claim election victories



Gone ... but not for long

Election distance markers such as this one at the Deaf Smith County Courthouse -- which show the closest to a polling place where a candidate may campaign during early voting or on voting day -- may be gone today following Tuesday's primary runoff elections, but don't think they won't be seen again. Early voting for the May 7 municipal, school board and hospital board elections begins Monday.

A new Deaf Smith County treasurer was elected by Democratic voters Tuesday and residents of County Commissioner Precinct 2 gave the nod to the incumbent in a hotly-contested runoff race.

Nan Rogers will succeed Vesta Mae Nunley in the county treasurer's position. She defeated Lois Jones in the primary runoff, by a vote of 824 to 689. There is no Republican candidate in the November general election.

The Precinct 2 commissioner, Lupe Chavez, won the Democratic nomination over Bernardo Griego Jr., 329 to 245. Chavez will face a Republican opponent, Conny Whitehorn, in November.

The Democratic primary attracted 1,606 voters and 40 voted on the Republican ticket. Early voters accounted for 736 of the Democratic ballots and 13 Republicans voted prior to Tuesday.

County Clerk David Ruland, chief election official, said Wednesday that the Voting Precinct 2 polling place ran out of ballots shortly before the 7 p.m. closing time.

A deputy accidentally photocopied the wrong ballot, Ruland explained, and the last three voters in the precinct received ballots that did not list the commissioner's race.

"Two of the voters apparently didn't notice but the third called it to our attention and we rectified the error," Ruland said.

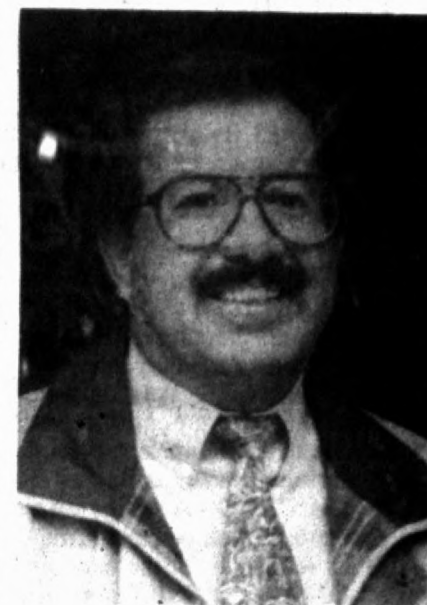
The mistake grew out of an earlier request from Voting Precinct 7 at Dawn for additional ballots.

"The deputy already had made copies for Dawn and overlooked the fact that the Precinct 2 ballot was not the same," Ruland added.

Voters propel Gonzalez, Fisher to general election campaigns

AUSTIN (AP) - Texas Democrats said they expect to have a unified ticket in November after U.S. Senate nominee Richard Fisher and Supreme Court Justice Raul Gonzalez won bitter primary runoffs.

Fisher defeated veteran political brawler Jim Mattox by a 54 percent to 46 percent margin. He will face Republican Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, a rising national GOP star, in November.

For Mattox, it was a second straight statewide loss. He was defeated in a 1990 gubernatorial runoff by Gov. Ann Richards.

Gonzalez beat back a tough challenge from Corpus Christi lawyer Rene Haas, who had accused him of being too close to the insurance industry.

The Republican nominee, Oliver Kitzman, has said he wouldn't campaign against Gonzalez, who became the court's first Hispanic justice when first appointed by former Gov. Mark White in 1984.

"Spirited primaries are nothing

new to the Democratic Party," Chairman Bob Slagle said Tuesday night. "Our primary candidates have shown the kind of strong personalities it takes to provide real leadership and solve the problems facing Texas

today." Richards, who is seeking re-election, said she was pleased to be running with Fisher.

"He brings a new spirit and a new

Requests for ballots prompt investigation

ALICE, Texas (AP) - Election officials say something looks fishy about 134 mail-in ballot applications from two addresses in Falfurrias.

"It's not illegal per se, but it doesn't look good," said Elizabeth Hanshaw, a staff attorney for the Texas Secretary of State's office. "Obviously 60 to 70 people do not live in one place. It looks highly suspicious. It looks like something fraudulent is going on."

A register of mail-in ballots at

the Jim Wells County Clerk's office showed that 66 applications were returned from one address and 68 were returned from another.

Both addresses are from a low-income apartment complex in Falfurrias. Neither of the registered occupants of the addresses are among those who requested the mail-in applications, according to a report in the Alice Echo-News on Tuesday.

"This deserves an investigation," Hanshaw said.

Papers show Mrs. Clinton sold Whitewater property

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) - Hillary Rodham Clinton sold Whitewater property and received payment checks from lot owners, according to newly released documents that portray the first lady as having a more active role in the land venture's final years.

The papers also include notations

showing that companies owned by President and Mrs. Clinton's Whitewater partners loaned tens of thousands of dollars to the real estate venture.

The documents, released Tuesday, included Whitewater Development Corp.'s balance sheets, bank statements and tax returns. James McDougal, the Clintons' former partner, sold copies of the documents

to reporters about a week after he received them from the White House.

They show that in the early years, McDougal ran the land venture designed to be a vacation and retirement community along the White River in Arkansas' Ozark Mountains.

But Mrs. Clinton "by default took necessary steps to wrap up and wind down the company's affairs" when

McDougal was debilitated by a stroke and depression in the late 1980s, David Kendall, the Clintons' personal attorney, said Tuesday in Washington.

One document listed Mrs. Clinton as having sold \$16,500 worth of property in the 230-acre development in March 1990. Others showed Whitewater lot owners made some monthly payments in 1989 and 1990

with checks made in care of Mrs. Clinton.

Also, three years worth of Whitewater tax returns - belatedly prepared in 1990 by the Clintons' personal accountant - listed the company's mailing address as the Rose Law Firm, where Mrs. Clinton was a partner. Those returns were prepared June 1, 1990, by Yoly Redden.

Among money put into Whitewater by companies owned by McDougal or by McDougal and his former wife, Susan, were 14 loans from the McDougals' Great Southern Land Co. between 1980 and 1984. In 1984, a balance sheet shows Whitewater still owed that company \$35,365. Another McDougal company, Flowerwood Farms, made six loans to Whitewater between 1980 and 1985, and was still owed \$40,385 in 1985, according to one worksheet.

Clinton also made a \$2,900 loan to Whitewater in 1979, and still was owed \$2,400 in 1980, according to the same document.

The papers released Tuesday, however, do not include bank

statements showing loans Whitewater obtained from Union National Bank of Little Rock, nor details of accounts at the Bank of Cherry Valley, Madison Guaranty Savings and Loan or Madison Bank and Trust.

Madison Guaranty was a thrift owned by McDougal. It eventually failed in 1989 at a cost of taxpayers of at least \$47 million. He also was a part owner of Madison Bank and Trust.

Also missing are some monthly statements, including those from the entire year of 1985, from Citizens Bank of Flippin, where the partners borrowed \$182,000, the bulk of the \$203,000 initially invested in Whitewater.

Whitewater special prosecutor Robert Fiske is investigating whether money from Madison was improperly diverted in the mid-1980s to aid Whitewater or to pay the political and personal debts of prominent Arkansans, including then-Gov. Clinton.

The Clintons and McDougals have maintained that Whitewater lost money and that they did nothing wrong.

Consumer prices increase in March

WASHINGTON (AP) - Consumer prices rose moderately in March, with increases in the cost of housing and clothing accounting for nearly half the upturn, the government said today.

The Labor Department said the Consumer Price Index increased 0.3 percent for the second straight month, in line with economists' predictions. Prior to February's 0.3 percent rise the index was unchanged in January, the first time it did not rise in more than four years.

For the first three months of the year, the annual inflation rate was up 2.5 percent, compared to 2.7 percent for the same period in 1993.

Energy prices, which had shot up a revised 1.6 percent in February, advanced 0.4 percent with the arrival of spring and milder March weather. Food prices rose a mere 0.1 percent in March, following two straight months of declines.

Excluding the volatile food and energy costs, the index still rose 0.3 percent last month.

The Labor Department said the cost of medical care rose 0.2 percent

in March, matching the smallest increase in a decade.

Economists said in advance of the report that a 0.3 percent rise in the consumer index should be considered a second straight day of reassuring inflation news.

The Labor Department said Tuesday that wholesale prices were in check in March, increasing 0.2 percent, and for the first quarter of 1994 they were up 3.9 percent at an annual rate.

Analysts said the inflation figures could help hold down short-term interest rates for a while. But some said they still expect the Federal Reserve Board, looking further down the road, to move again this spring to tighten the money reins.

The latest reports "probably should not upset (Fed) Chairman (Alan) Greenspan and his colleagues," said Sung Won Sohn of Norwest Corp. in Minneapolis. "But they're focusing on 1995 and later this year. Those concerns probably have not abated."

Another quarter percentage point boost in short-term rates could come May 17, when the policy-making

Federal Reserve Open Market Committee next meets.

Hoping to restrain inflation before it gathers a head of steam, the Federal Reserve in the last two months nudged short-term interest rates from 3 percent to 3.5 percent.

Inflation has been mild for more than three years, the best stretch in three decades. The cost of living was up 2.7 percent last year, following a 2.9 percent rise in 1992 and 3.1 percent in 1991.

The Labor Department said prices of fruits and vegetables rose 0.6 percent in March. Fruit prices were up 1.7 percent and vegetables fell 0.1 percent.

Meats, poultry, fish and eggs rose 0.1 percent, with declines in prices for pork, poultry and eggs more than offset by increases for beef, fish and seafood.

Beef prices, which declined for the preceding three months, rose 0.8 percent in March.

Housing costs rose 0.3 percent in March, following a 0.4 percent increase in February. The index for apparel and upkeep were up 0.4 percent in March after declining the three preceding months.

The government reported Tuesday that wholesale prices for crude material surged 2.8 percent in March, the biggest advance since an 8.6 percent jump in October 1990. But analysts said consumers are not likely to feel any impact for months.

Some economists said that with labor costs declining so far this year, the increase in commodity prices has not been passed on to consumers. Labor costs account for about two thirds of the wholesale index, which for all of last year rose only 0.2 percent.

The Clinton administration expressed confidence inflation will remain under control.

"We just don't see a scenario under which inflation rises meaningfully from present levels," said Deputy Treasury Secretary Roger Altman.

Bruce Steinberg of Merrill Lynch & Co. said inflation will continue to be tame as long as labor costs stay low.

Financial markets, which had been shaken by expectations of rising inflation and interest rates, have steadied after the recent nosedive.

Retail sales rise in March

WASHINGTON (AP) - Retail sales rose 0.4 percent in March, the government said today in a report showing many of the nation's businesses rebounding from the harsh winter and the California earthquake.

The Commerce Department reported sales totaled a seasonally adjusted \$182.3 billion, up from a revised \$181.5 billion a month earlier. The February gain, 1.6 percent

rather than 1.5 percent as first reported, came despite the effects of inclement weather. Winter storms and the earthquake had caused sales to fall 1.3 percent in January, the first decline in 10 months.

But in advance of today's report, many economists had expected an even stronger 1 percent gain in March, citing improved weather and earlier reports of strong automobile and department store sales.

Circus to perform in Hereford April 27

Carson and Barnes Five-Ring Circus, which will appear in Hereford on April 27, is the oldest Big Top Circus traveling the highways of America and will celebrate its 58th year of operation this season.

This year also marks the start of the third century of the circus in America.

The Carson and Barnes Circus will present performances at 4:30 p.m. and 8 p.m. in Hereford.

Part of the fun of the circus is to watch the show's caravan pull into town and erect the big top on the grounds of the Deaf Smith County Bull Barn.

The tent erection will begin about an hour after dawn on circus morning and will last several hours.

Part of the morning activities will be the unloading of the circus animals -- the elephants, horses, camels, giraffe, lions, tigers, ligers, llamas, zebras, zebus and many other species of exotic animals.

At the same time, the tent crew will be pounding stakes, laying poles and spreading the tent on the ground.

Finally, three of the 20 elephants that travel with the show

will be led to the tent and -- just like the first circuses that spread their tents in America -- the elephants will raise the big top high into the air.

Then, at 4:30 p.m. and 8 p.m., the circus will present two full performances, featuring five rings of performing artists from such places as the United States, Canada, Mexico, Italy, France, Argentina and Peru.

A vote inspector, James Nino, from the Texas Secretary of State's office spent most of the day observing election procedure, Ruland said.

A deputy treasurer for almost 13 years, Nan Rogers has lived in Hereford since 1945 and is a Hereford High School graduate. She has worked in bookkeeping and accounting since 1960. Rogers said she anticipates no changes in the treasurer's office operations.

The treasurer's race started as a three-way contest in the March primary. Rogers led the ballot in the primary over Jones and Joyce Skelton, but did not receive a majority of votes, forcing the runoff.

Chavez is a first-term county commissioner. He took office in January 1991. In the March primary election, he was challenged by Griego and Armando Alaniz. Since no candidate received a majority, Chavez and Griego went to the runoff.

The county lined up with statewide Democratic voting in runoff elections, giving Richard Fisher the majority over Jim Mattox for U.S. Senator; Raul Gonzalez over Rene Haas for Supreme Court justice, Place

1, and Betty Marshall over Gene Kelly for Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2 judge.

Republicans had only two races to decide in Texas. Dan Wittig carried Deaf Smith County for the nomination for attorney general and Sharon Keller was the winner for the nomination for Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2. Wittig defeated Pat Lykos and Keller won over Sam Bayless.

Fees for Hutchison's defense climbing toward \$1 million mark

WASHINGTON (AP) - Texas Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison's successful defense against criminal ethics charges has cost her more than \$900,000 and is expected to top \$1 million by the time she's paid all the bills.

The Republican's legal defense fund was established last November after she was indicted on charges she used state resources for personal and political gain while state treasurer. The fund has spent \$699,181 as of the end of March.

Mrs. Hutchison, who faces re-election in November, was acquitted in February after prosecutors refused to present their case following a dispute over documents seized in a raid on the treasurer's office in June.

A report filed Tuesday with the Secretary of the Senate shows that during the 4-1/2-month period surveyed, the legal defense fund collected \$720,235 from contributors nationwide.

In addition to the almost \$700,000 in defense fund expenditures, Mrs. Hutchison previously reported spending about \$200,000 from her state political campaign fund on her legal case.

Hutchison spokesman David Beckwith said the defense fund will remain open for several more months, because at least \$100,000 in expenses remain to be billed and paid.

Some \$565,000 of the defense fund total was spent directly on lawyer fees, with the remainder going for expenses such as jury consulting, fund-raising expenses, hotel stays and

Richards says public has stake in her battle for job against Bush

AUSTIN (AP) - Democratic Gov. Ann Richards says she's ready for battle against Republican challenger George W. Bush and believes many voters feel they have a stake in her re-election.

"There are people that feel so intensely about the direction that we've moved the state that they want to see it continue. And I think they have a personal stake in it," Richards said.

The governor attributes that to the thousands of new private sector jobs created during her term and the state jobs she's given to women and minorities.

"It has a whole lot to do with jobs, it has a whole lot to do with their companies, it has a lot to do with the fact that there are segments of the Texas population that have been recognized and moved into positions of power for the first time in the history of this state," Richards said.

In an interview with a small group of Capitol reporters on Tuesday, the governor said her administration has much to brag about.

She cited job growth, rising student achievement scores, a decreasing high school dropout rate, a crime rate that dropped for the first time in 10 years and "an unqualified success economically."

"I don't think there's any question in anybody's mind that this administration has been a success," Richards said.

Bush has sought to portray Richards as having accomplished little during her term.

That continued in an attack from his campaign on Tuesday accusing Richards of lacking a welfare reform plan. "The inaction of the last three

years reveals the governor to be a firm believer in the status quo," said Bush campaign manager Joe Allbaugh.

Richards scoffs at such criticism. During the interview, she reiterated her belief that Bush, an oilman and managing partner of the Texas Rangers baseball team, knows little about government and governing.

"How can you suddenly be printing pages of opinions on criminal justice and education and education finance and welfare reform, having never publicly testified before a single committee or agency or board?" she asked.

Nonetheless, Richards said she expects the campaign to be rough and expensive. Prepared to gather \$14 million, she said her fund raising is ahead of schedule.

"I think that this is going to be a high-dollar campaign. I've watched carefully what the Bush operation is doing," she said. "It is predicated on lots and lots of money and lots and lots of television (advertising)."

Several GOP leaders have pointed gleefully to the outcome of the March gubernatorial primaries. Richards received 78 percent of the vote against an unknown, while Bush got 93 percent against a similar opponent. Republicans insist that shows dissatisfaction with Richards.

But the governor said Republicans in areas with few GOP candidates crossed party lines to cast votes they hoped might embarrass her.

And she sounded ready for the upcoming battle.

"Do I think this is going to be a tough race? Yes, and that's totally unrelated to my primary," she said. "I think George Bush is going to have a tough one, too. And that is totally unrelated to his primary."

voice to the Democratic Party, and his presence strengthens the ticket," she said. Richards easily won renomination in last month's primary and faces Republican George W. Bush, eldest son of the former president.

Fisher, a founder of the moderate Democratic Leadership Council, said his victory shows that Texas Democrats are ready to move forward rather than cling to the old-style politics he said Mattox typified.

"We've got to look to the future, folks, not cling to the past," Fisher told supporters at a Dallas rally. "We need to be on the cutting edge of change."

Republicans also finalize their November slate Tuesday. Houston Judge Don Wittig defeated fellow judge Pat Lykos for the GOP attorney general nomination. He faces one-term Democratic

incumbent Dan Morales, who was unopposed in the primary.

Three U.S. House candidates were nominated.

Democrat Ken Bentsen, nephew of U.S. Treasury Secretary Lloyd Bentsen, won the nomination to face Republican Gene Fontenot for the seat being vacated by Rep. Mike Andrews, D-Houston. Andrews lost a bid for the Senate.

Republicans in Austin nominated Jo Baylor to challenge Democrat Lloyd Doggett, currently a Texas Supreme Court justice. The winner will succeed Democratic Rep. J.J. "Jake" Pickle, who's retiring after three decades in Congress.

El Paso Republicans, meanwhile, picked businessman Carlos R. "Bobby" Ortiz to challenge incumbent Democratic Rep. Ron Coleman.

Both parties held runoffs for the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2. Democrats nominated Betty Marshall, co-chief of the appellate section of the Tarrant County district attorney's office. She will face Republican Sharon Keller, a former Dallas County assistant district attorney.

Only one incumbent state legislator had been forced into a runoff. But Rep. Doyle Willis, 85, a Fort Worth Democrat and 37-year lawmaker, easily defeated challenger Lon Burnam. Willis has no Republican opponent in November.

In Houston, meanwhile, Leslie Elaine Perez, a transsexual ex-convict who once came within hours of the electric chair lost her third try to head the Harris County Democratic Party. Real estate developer David Minberg won by a 3-to-1 margin.

Mavs avoid infamy with 10th win

While most teams worry about the playoffs this late in the season, the Dallas Mavericks find themselves thinking about the 1972-73 Philadelphia 76ers.

Now they don't have to anymore. At least not this season.

The Mavericks made sure they won't tie the 76ers for the worst record in NBA history (9-73). They did it with their 10th victory of the season, a 108-107 upset of the Trail Blazers at Portland.

Among teams playing for the playoffs, the Los Angeles Lakers lost a chance to pull within three games of Denver, falling to Golden State 128-117 just two hours after the Nuggets lost to Phoenix 107-102.

"Tonight, I thought we played to win," Dallas coach Quinn Buckner said. "It's taken some guys, and it will continue to take some guys, a long time to get to that point of playing to win."

Last season, the Mavericks didn't win No. 10 until the next-to-last night of the season. They came out the following night and beat Houston to finish the year 11-71.

In order to beat that victory total, Dallas needs two victories in its six remaining games (Denver, Sacramento, Phoenix, Houston twice, Minnesota).

For Portland, the loss put it into a tie with Golden State for the sixth playoff seed in the Western Conference. Both teams have six games left, and the Warriors have the easier schedule.

Jamal Mashburn's 20-footer, a steal and layup by Fat Lever and a baseline layup by Jimmy Jackson in the final minute gave Dallas the victory.

Jackson led the Mavericks with 24 points, while Mashburn added 20 and Lever 14. Portland's Clyde Drexler led all scorers with 29 points.

Rockets 98, Timberwolves 89

At Houston, Hakeem Olajuwon scored 42 points, three short of his season high, and Robert Horry added 17 points and a career-high 13 rebounds.

Warriors 128, Lakers 117

At Inglewood, Calif., Chris Mullin, Chris Webber and Billy Owens scored 25 points apiece and Golden State kept Los Angeles behind by at least eight throughout the fourth quarter.

Webber added 10 rebounds and nine assists to barely miss a triple-double.

Suns 107, Nuggets 102

At Denver, the Nuggets chose to focus their defense on Phoenix's high-profile players. That left usual benchwarmers like Frank Johnson and Mark West wide open.

Johnson was 5-for-6 from the field and West was 6-for-8.

Kevin Johnson paced the Suns with 25 points and 10 assists. Mahmoud Abdul-Rauf led Denver with 25.

Bulls 111, Nets 105

At Chicago, Scottie Pippen had 25 points, nine rebounds, nine assists and six steals as the Bulls moved within a half-game of New York and Atlanta in the battle for the best record in the Eastern Conference.

SuperSonics 116, Clippers 101

At Los Angeles, the Sonics set a franchise record with their 24th road

victory despite the fact Dominique Wilkins and Mark Jackson returned to the Clippers' lineup.

Wilkins had 26 points; Jackson was held to four.

Jazz 126, Kings 91

At Salt Lake City, the Jazz stayed within two games of Phoenix in the race for the fourth-best record in the West by posting its third straight lopsided decision. Karl Malone had 21 points and Jeff Hornacek 20.

Cavaliers 119, Bucks 91

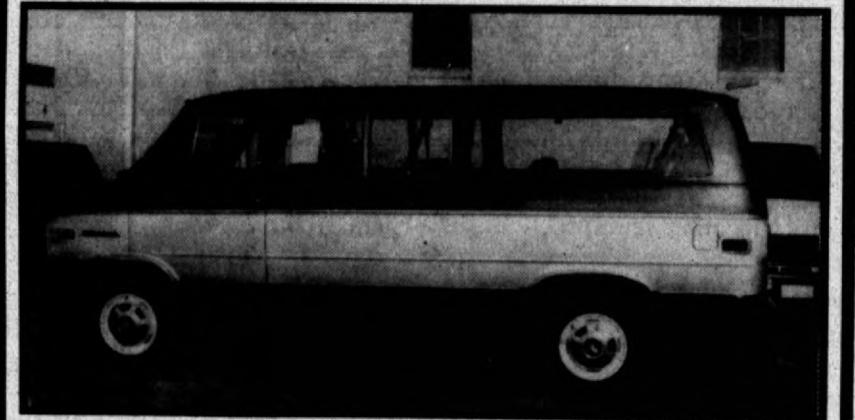

Mavs dump VP Sund

DALLAS (AP)—Dallas Mavericks owner Donald Carter, the stereotypical Texan with the big grin, big hat and big wallet, has finally had enough with his team's big losses.

Carter decided Tuesday to step in and try reversing the downward spiral the Mavericks have been on since getting within a game of the 1988 NBA Finals.

His first move was firing vice president Rick Sund, a key builder of the model franchise of the 1980s and equally responsible for its collapse in the 1990s.

"It wasn't something that just happened one day," Carter said. "Let's just say it has to do with a new course that we've got to be on."

Sund, 42, joined the team as player personnel director when it began in 1980. His moves helped them reach the playoffs by 1984, although a series of bad ones recently have kept them out of the postseason since 1990.

His legacy, however, remains in Jim Jackson, Jamal Mashburn and seven first-round picks over the next five seasons, all of which makes Carter believe success isn't as far away as it seems for a team that's 10-66.

"I don't think you can say we need to make a lot of changes," Carter said. "In sports, one thing can make a difference in the chemistry and that can make a lot of difference."

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Cooper hits for cycle as Red Sox rock Royals

Scott Cooper and the Boston Red Sox were terrific, and that made it another terrible day for the Kansas City Royals.

Cooper hit for the cycle and drove in five runs, and the Red Sox romped 22-11 Tuesday night in the highest-scoring game ever against Kansas City.

Cooper went 5-for-6 with two doubles. He became the first Boston player to hit for the cycle since Mike Greenwell in 1988, completing it in the ninth inning with a single after backup shortstop David Howard came in to pitch.

"I've never done it before. Ever, ever," Cooper said. "So it's

something that's pretty special to me."

Mo Vaughn homered, tripled and drove in four runs for the visiting Red Sox. Billy Hatcher, Dave Valle and John Valentin also homered for Boston in its biggest outburst since a 24-5 romp over Cleveland on Aug. 21, 1986.

The Royals had never allowed so many runs in 3,986 games since joining the AL in 1969.

The loss dropped Kansas City to 1-5. The team started out 2-9 last year and began 1-16 in 1992.

"We were just lucky to get it over with," Royals manager Hal McRae said.

The Red Sox combined 15 hits, 11 of them for extra bases, 13 walks and

three errors. They scored six times in the first inning off Kevin Appier (0-2) and added eight runs in the sixth off Stan Belinda with only two hits.

Danny Darwin (2-0) pitched six innings. Dave Henderson and Bob Hamelin homered for the Royals.

White Sox 10, Yankees 5

Wilson Alvarez won his 10th straight decision, helped by home runs from Frank Thomas and Joe Hall in Chicago.

Alvarez (2-0), whose winning streak includes a victory in last year's playoffs, pitched 6 1-3 innings. Terry Mulholland (1-1) was tagged for eight hits and six runs in 3 2-3 innings.

Thomas hit a two-run single during a five-run fourth inning, and later hit

a solo homer off Jeff Reardon. Hall had his first big league home run and two singles. Mike Stanley and Bernie Williams homered for the Yankees.

Mariners 12, Twins 0

Ken Griffey hit a 462-foot drive into the center-field seats at the Kingdome, leading Seattle over Minnesota.

Griffey's fourth homer of the season was a three-run shot that made it 7-0 in the second inning. Minnesota later made five errors, three on throws by shortstop Pat Meares.

Dave Fleming (1-1) gave up four hits in seven innings. Scott Erickson (1-1) allowed 10 runs on 11 hits in four innings.

Ozzie Canseco trying to make Brewers

NEW ORLEANS - He looks just like Jose but nothing else in Ozzie Canseco's life has mirrored his famous brother's. While Jose was collecting contracts, cars and celebrity, Ozzie was lost in the minor leagues.

"It's been a long time," Canseco said Tuesday as he waited to take right field for the Zephyrs, the Milwaukee Brewers' AAA club. "A lot of springs thinking this was the one."

Canseco is surprised to find himself back in uniform for another team and another spring. Last year he declared the final one, retiring in July after the St. Louis Cardinals acquired Mark Whiten in a trade on the last day of spring training and sent

Canseco to Louisville.

"I was very unhappy," Canseco said. "I felt like no matter how well I played, no matter how well I hit the ball, no matter what I did, I'd never make it to the majors with the Cardinals."

In 1992, Canseco was voted the best player in the American Association. He led Louisville in RBIs and homeruns with 22, making him second overall in the league. He also had three games in which he hit two home runs and he hit two grand slams during the year.

Last spring he led the Cardinals in home runs and RBIs and was assured he'd make the team.

"The Cardinals didn't keep me and when they put me on the protected list they kept me from

going to another team that could have used me," Canseco said. "I love the game, but I spent 11 years in the minor leagues and I felt it was time to see what else there is in life."

On top of that, there was always Jose's shadow.

"There are lots of times when I'm out in a mall or in a restaurant or something and people will ask for my autograph thinking I'm Jose," he said. "Then I have to explain who I am. Sometimes they don't believe me. They think I'm Jose and just don't want to give them an autograph."

Sometimes people hear about controversies Jose's involved in and think Ozzie's in them too, he said.

"They stereotype me as being the same way he is and I'm not. I'm a real easy going guy, it's unfair to think I'm just another Jose."

Canseco decided to give baseball another chance, as long as it wasn't with the Cardinals' organization.

"I thought if I could get with an organization where I really had a shot at the big league I'd do it," Canseco said.

Canseco has a very legitimate shot, Zephyrs manager Chris Bando said. "He has major league power, a lot of sock in his bat and you can't teach that. You either have it or you don't,"

Bando said. "If the Brewers didn't think he could move up he wouldn't be here."

The Canseco boys started playing baseball when they were 12. But at 15, while Jose was learning to hit and field, Ozzie was made a pitcher.

"I had a pretty good arm and the coach just told me one day I was a pitcher," he said. "I always loved batting, but he wouldn't let me touch one."

Canseco was drafted as a pitcher by the Yankees in 1983 and spent five years with them in that position. An arm injury in 1986 ended his pitching and gave him new incentive.

"I always wanted to be an everyday player," he said. "I like this a lot better."

Canseco's natural power and ability make him a valuable commodity, Bando said. With a little honing, he feels there could be another Canseco in the majors someday.

"He can still make it," Bando said. "He's only 29, and some guys don't mature until they're 29."

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Oilers, QB Moon disagree over salary restructuring

HOUSTON (AP) - The salary cap has become an arguing point in contract talks with Houston Oilers quarterback Warren Moon.

Moon said following a meeting with Oilers general manager Floyd Reese last week that he would not agree to a restructured contract. Moon and his agent Leigh Steinberg have been meeting with Vikings vice president Jeff Diamond at Steinberg's office in Newport Beach, Calif.

Moon is scheduled to make \$3.25 million this season. Backup quarterback Cody Carlson, with a \$3 million contract this season, is in the final stages of restructuring his contract.

If the Oilers lose other players, they would have more money under the salary cap to negotiate with Moon.

"Warren still wants to be in Houston," Steinberg said following the latest round of negotiations with the Vikings. "But if there's going to be a trade, Minnesota would be a reasonable place."

"Warren hasn't totally ruled out restructuring his contract with the Oilers."

The Vikings also want to restructure Moon's contract, giving him less money this season and helping their own salary cap.

"We're still talking to Minnesota," Steinberg said. "We talk on a daily basis. There's no timetable but a third-party event could force the issue."

The Oilers also must worry about cornerback Cris Dishman and safety Marcus Robertson, who are shopping for new contracts. Dishman met with Kansas City on Monday and was in Atlanta on Tuesday. Robertson planned a visit with Arizona Cardinals coach Buddy Ryan, the Oilers' former defensive coordinator.

Moon said he still wants to know how the Oilers feel about him.

"Basically, I would just like them to have the guts to tell me just what it is they feel about me as a football player and whether I fit into their plans this year, or whether I don't," Moon said Monday night during an interview on KHOU-TV.

Reese said Moon's options were outlined during their meeting last week.

Steelers make offer to Pokes' Harper

DALLAS (AP) - The Pittsburgh Steelers have made an offer to Dallas Cowboys wide receiver Alvin Harper, but Harper's agent says more discussions are expected.

Agent Jimmy Sexton of Dallas declined to comment on reports out of Pittsburgh that Harper has been offered in the range of \$1.4 million per year over three years.

Harper is a restricted free agent, and the Steelers would have to give the Cowboys their first-round (17th overall) and third-round picks if the Cowboys opted not to match the offer.

There have been indications that Harper is seeking a deal that would average more than \$1.5 million for three years.

Dallas has given Harper a qualifying offer of \$866,000 for the 1994 season. That's what entitles the Cowboys to compensatory picks in both the first and third rounds if another club signs him to an offer seat.

Harper could sign for one year with Dallas and be an unrestricted free agent following the season.

The Cowboys have given no indication of interest in matching another team's offer to Harper. Owner Jerry Jones has said additional high draft choices would be welcome.

The Steelers are reported to be pursuing another restricted free agent, Atlanta's Mike Pritchard. He would cost the Steelers only their first-round pick because the Falcons tendered him a lower qualifying offer than the one the Cowboys made to Harper.

Restricted free agents have until April 18 to sign offer sheets with other clubs. After that, their current clubs retain their rights for the 1994 season.

Cowboys offer deal to Wilson

IRVING, Texas (AP) - In the wake of an expected deal between Bernie Kosar and the Miami Dolphins, the Dallas Cowboys have offered Wade Wilson a one-year contract to be the club's backup quarterback, according to a published report.

Wilson is considering signing a one-year, \$700,000 contract today, agent Leigh Steinberg told the Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

"Wade has more money being offered elsewhere," Steinberg said. "But (Cowboys owner) Mr. (Jerry) Jones is a compelling salesman."

Jones spoke to both Kosar and Wilson on Tuesday, suggesting one-year deals to both of them. But Kosar appears ready to sign with the Dolphins, possibly as soon as today.

Cowboys officials said Wilson is Dallas' top choice for a backup should Kosar leave.

Wilson, 35, started for New Orleans last year. He completed 221 of 388 passes for 2,457 yards, with 12 touchdowns and 15 interceptions. He threw for seven touchdowns and just one interception early as the Saints started 5-0, but had a 5-14 TDs-to-interceptions ratio in his final nine games before being injured.

Wilson, who was paid \$2.8 million last year, was released by the Saints in March. New Orleans has offered him a deal for about \$900,000 for next season. Detroit is reportedly willing to pay \$1 million for the 13-year veteran.

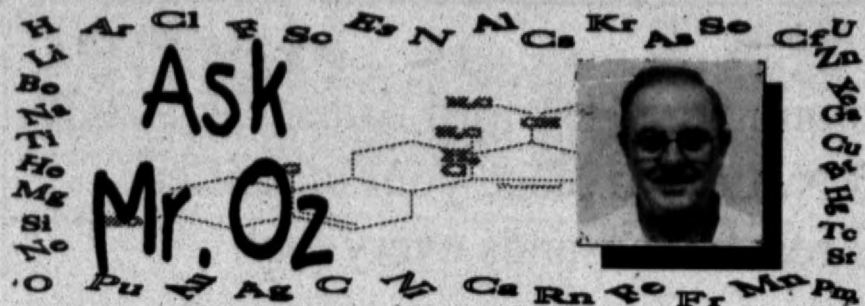

What to expect from investment returns

As many of you might be aware, the stock and bond markets have performed extremely well over the past ten years. When market performance is so strong, it is especially important to take an objective look at what you can earn from your investments. Specifically, what level of returns can you expect to earn from your investing in the year to come? The questions and answers below may provide some perspective.

Q. I received high returns from my stock and bond investments over the past ten years. Can I expect the same in the future?

The markets' exceptional returns over the past ten years are not likely to continue. Why? Because the U.S. stock and bond markets have been fueled primarily by a drop in interest rates since the early 1980s. As a result, few areas of the markets today are as undervalued (priced below what they were worth) as they were in the early 1980s. Since investors today do not have the same opportunities to buy securities with attractive starting prices, future returns are not likely to be of the same magnitude.

Q. I am investing for the first time. Do I still have the opportunity to benefit by investing?

Certainly. The economic times may be different today, but it can still be a good period for investors. Of course, you may not see the same returns as those of the past ten years. I believe returns will most likely be more in line with "normal" historical standards. Overall, I expect stocks should outperform bonds, and bonds should outperform cash.

Q. The 1980s started off with very high inflation and high interest rates. Today inflation and interest rates are low. Which is better?

It's not a question of better, it's a question of different. In the early and middle part of the 1980s, many of you probably put your money in insured, fixed rate Certificates of Deposit (CDs) and insured money market accounts paying 12 percent or 13 percent. At the same time, inflation began to decline. It was an unusual time when your money could earn returns well above the rate of inflation - and with little risk to your principal. Investments with low risk to your principal - such as CDs - typically pay a rate of return roughly equal to the rate of inflation, not significantly above it. People became accustomed to these high returns without realizing how unusual they really were.

What you, as an investor, need to realize is that going forward it will be virtually impossible to earn returns that significantly outpace inflation without taking a certain amount of risk - risk you may not have had to take in the recent past.

Ask Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB: Have you ever heard of a person having a cyst of the liver from birth and not knowing about it? I'm 72 years old and am told I have had a cyst on my liver since birth. I had a CAT scan and besides showing I have an abdominal aneurysm that is 4.8 cm, it showed the cyst. The doctor said a lot of people have one and don't know it, and that I shouldn't worry about it. But I do.

DEAR READER: Such isolated cysts are on a congenital basis, but they may not be apparent until after puberty. They are not harmful, nor will they damage the liver, and if you hadn't had the test you would never have known about it.

You are worrying about the wrong thing. The main concern is your abdominal aneurysm. Even small aneurysms such as yours may rupture. You may need a consultation with a cardiologist to determine if you need

surgery, which can be done. At the very least, it needs to be followed carefully for any evidence of increased size, which should prompt immediate surgery.

QUESTION: When is the next annular eclipse?

ANSWER: Be prepared for a spectacular annular eclipse on May 10. The total durations will be about three hours and will be directly overhead at about 11:20 a.m.

Annular means that a ring will surround the moon as it slides between the earth and the sun. The moon, as seen from the earth, will not completely cover the solar disc; thus, a ring is formed. About 89 percent of the sun will be covered.

The duration of the annular eclipse will be just over four minutes. The remainder of the time will be a partial eclipse as the movement is from southeast to northwest.

Eye safety should be a prime factor to those who plan to observe the eclipse. DO NOT attempt to observe the partial or annular eclipse with the naked eye. Failure to use proper filtration could result in permanent eye damage or blindness.

Safe methods include: projection, in which a pinhole or small opening is used to cast an image of the sun on a screen placed a half-meter or more behind the opening; a number 14 welder's glass; Mylar or glass filters specifically designed for this purpose should be used with telescopes or binoculars.

Unsafe filters include color film, smoked glass, photographic neutral density filters and polarizing filters.

Get prepared folks. Don't wait until the last minute for this special event, weather permitting.
