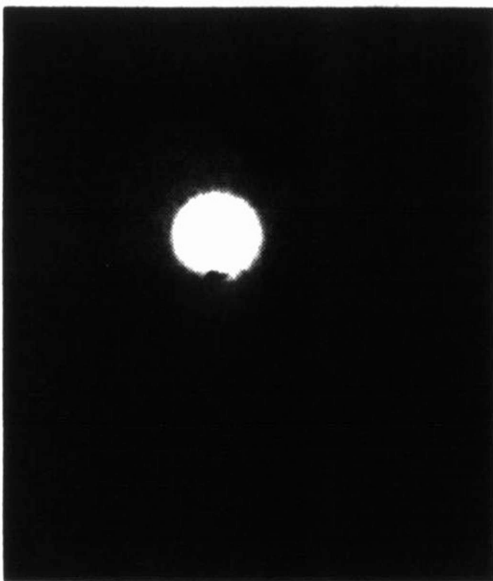

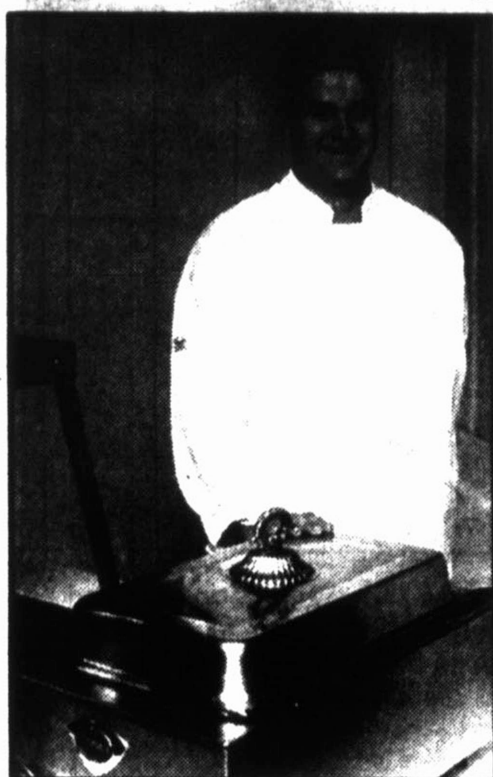

'SPICING THINGS UP'

Burns returns to hometown as chef

Beautiful sunsets, sweeping vistas and family brought Chad Burns back to the Panhandle and, if he has anything to do about it, will keep him here.

Burns, a Hereford native, and his wife, Amber, moved from Austin to Hereford, where he took over as chef at the Hereford Country Club.

In another week or so, Burns said the kitchen at the country club will become a family operation. That's because Amber will join her husband as a chef.

"She's finishing her last week at the Amarillo Club. She'll be doing dinner service here also," Burns said.

Burns is a 1992 graduate of Hereford High School, where he also played football. His father, David

Burns, is a pharmacist and owner of West Park Drugs. His mother, Cindy, is an interior decorator.

"I spent a year and a half at college, but I decided that cooking was what I really enjoyed," Burns said. "I enjoyed meeting people and working in the hospitality industry."

That's when he enrolled in the Le Chef of Hospitality Careers College in Austin.

During the two years he studied the culinary arts, Burns worked part time in several restaurants in Austin, including Lucy's Retired Circus Bar on 6th Street.

"After I graduated, I moved to Santa Fe, tried a little resort cooking — New Mexico cuisine. I worked at La Casa Seña on the plaza there.

"From there, I went to Pranzo Italian Grill, also in Santa Fe," he

said.

While in New Mexico, Burns got married. He had met his bride at the culinary school in Austin. They would move back to Austin, but after about a year, the couple decided to come back to the Panhandle. Burns said he wanted to be closer to family, especially his grandparents, and just settle down in the area, which was a definite change for Amber.

"She's not used to all the cattle, that's for sure. But she's been really impressed by the sunsets, that's there's not much blocking it, hills or trees. She's also impressed with the people who're generally kinder, more caring," Burns said.

Burns said one cuisine that he

Cups? Cawthon's at 2,500 and counting

"Here, have another cup," is a common enough refrain from a waitress to favorite coffee shop customer, but one local man may very well take her offer literally and take the cup, minus the coffee.

E.W. Cawthon, or "Bud" as he is more commonly known, enjoys his coffee cups — all 2,500 of them. He doesn't use them as crafty little flower vases. He doesn't use them to decorate the house. He doesn't even use them to drink all that much coffee from. Cawthon simply enjoys collecting coffee cups and remembering special stories about them.

His cups hang all over the walls, across the ceiling and even up and down the racks in his garage, each one special in its own way.

His cups come from as far away as Sweden and as local as the Amarillo Globe News. He's got a few duplicates, but not many. Some have similar charac-

teristics; some are way beyond odd.

The one thing they all have in common is they all make him smile.

"Sometimes, I just come out here and remember the people who gave me a cup or the story behind it. I just enjoy the oddity of having this many different coffee cups," he said.

Some are truly different. Cawthon is willing to show off his most unique vessels. One, advertising a nasal decongestant, has a nose on it, another favorite has a bicentennial coin embedded inside wall.

With a chuckle Cawthon points out a recent acquisition — a cup with a cow's udder — he says his sister saw it and thought of him. Others have come from long time friends Betty Henson and Jack Nunley.

"Everywhere they go, they're always on the lookout for a cup I might not have, something unusual of

First steps taken

■ Lawmakers plan hearings on redistricting

Texas lawmakers are taking the first steps on a torturous trip — redrawing the boundaries of the Texas congressional and legislative districts.

Redistricting takes place every 10 years following conclusion of the U.S. census. The census is taken at the turn of the decade and the legislative boundaries are redrawn during the following year.

In Texas, the legislative redistricting committees develop the plans for presentation to the full Legislature. After passage by the Legislature, the redistricting plans are submitted to the governor for approval or veto.

Because the Democratic and Republican parties try to draw the boundaries in ways that will increase their chances of legislative control, the redistricting ended up in court in 1971, 1981 and 1991, with a federal court redrawing the districts in 1991.

Representatives from the Texas House Redistricting and Texas Senate Redistricting committees will conduct a regional hearing later this month in Lubbock.

The public hearing, which will be noon-4 p.m. Aug. 25 at the International Cultural Center of Texas Tech University, 601 Indiana Ave., is one in a series of meetings planned across Texas. The hearing is to give the area residents an opportunity to give their perspective on the possible configuration of districts in West Texas.

Census Bureau Regional Director Al Mirabal and Deputy Regional Di-

Public hearing planned for budget

It's balanced, but it's not popular.

The Deaf Smith County budget for Fiscal 2001 is in balance, but it contains no pay raises for county employees nor does it provide for any capital expenditures. It also contains a tax increase, which is the subject of a public hearing Sept. 5 in the county courthouse.

The FY 2001 budget calls for a tax rate of 56.76 cents per \$100 assessed valuation — up 3.15 per-

cent from this year's 54.97 rate and about 5.7 percent over the effective tax rate of 53.33 cents — and is expected to generate \$3,299,463 in revenue.

The budget approved last week by the county commissioners projects revenues of \$4,166,078.

The estimated revenues for the General Fund are (FY 2000 budget in parentheses):

- Ad valorem taxes, \$2,826,378 (\$2,679,890);
- Interest, \$83,150 (\$82,500);

- Sales tax, \$360,000 (\$360,000);
- State revenue, \$40,000 (\$25,589);
- Fees, \$261,950 (\$361,700);
- State & jury fees, \$158,100 (\$35,000);
- Fines, \$241,000 (\$247,000);
- Miscellaneous, \$94,500 (\$88,000);
- TOTAL: \$4,166,078 (\$3,879,689).

In looking at the projected spending, law enforcement accounts for most of the spending, with \$699,392 for jail operations and \$668,840 for the sheriff's department.

In the FY 2000 budget, the county

projected \$696,890 for the jail and \$670,775 for the sheriff's department. With two months left in the budget year, the actual spending for jail operations is \$562,956, while the sheriff's department has spent \$573,418.

By department, the projected expenditures for FY 2001 are (FY 2000 budget in parentheses):

- County judge, \$83,932 (\$83,141);
- County clerk, \$168,664

Government reports surplus

WASHINGTON (AP) — The federal treasury posted a surplus of \$4.76 billion in July, smaller than June's \$56.3 billion surplus but a rare feat since July usually is marked by a budget deficit.

The government's surplus last month, announced by the Treasury Department on Friday, compared with a \$25.2 billion deficit in July 1999.

It was the first time the government posted a surplus in July since

the 1950s.

The budget is on track to produce a record bounty for the entire fiscal year.

Revenue for July totaled \$134.1 billion, while expenditures came to \$129.3 billion.

For the first 10 months of fiscal 2000, which began Oct. 1, the government is running a surplus of \$181 billion — far surpassing the record \$124.4 billion surplus for all of fiscal year 1999.

Revenue for the first nine months came to \$1.67 trillion, while spending totaled \$1.49 trillion.

With the expected surplus for fiscal year 2000, it would be the first time the government has reported three consecutive surplus years since 1947, 1948 and 1949.

The Clinton administration is predicting a \$224 billion surplus for fiscal 2000, while the Congressional Budget Office is projecting a slightly larger \$232 billion.

rector Henry Tow will report on the status of the census in Texas. Marshal Turner, chief of the 2000 Redistricting Data Office of the U.S. Census Bureau in Washington, D.C., has been invited to speak, but his attendance has not been confirmed.

Rep. Delwin Jones of Lubbock, chairman of the House Redistricting Committee, will be the host for the hearing. Other members of the House panel expected to attend are Vice Chairman Bob Glaze and Reps. Fred Bosse, David Counts, Jim Dunnam, Kent Grusendorf, Bob Hunter, Kenny Marchant, Paul Moreno, Jim Pitts and Ron Wilson.

State Sens. Troy Fraser and Mario Gallegos serve as co-chairmen of the Senate Redistricting Committee. Other senators on the committee are Gonzalo Barrientos, Robert L. Duncan, Mike Jackson, Eddie Lucio, Frank Madia, Jane Nelson, Steve Ogden, Florence Shapiro and Royce West.

The legislative committees will draw district lines for congressional districts, state House and Senate districts, and the Texas Board of Education districts during the 77th session of the Legislature, which convenes in January 2001.

If the Legislature is unable to approve a redistricting plan, the task would be taken over by the Redistricting Board, which is comprised of the lieutenant governor, speaker of the House, attorney general, land commissioner and comptroller. If the board is unable to reach a decision, the matter would go to the courts. That seems unlikely because a majority of the board members are Republicans.

In determining the population guidelines, the redistricting panels will take the total population of the state and, for Texas House seats, divided by 150; for the Texas Senate, divided by 321. Congressional seats are allocated to the states based on population of each state. It is anticipated that Texas will gain two seats, giving it 32.

Hereford economy retreats

Hereford's economy retreated in August, at least by one measurement.

The city's sales tax payment from the Texas Comptroller's Office this month was \$96,496, down 14.2 percent from the \$112,492 received in August 1999. The August rebate, however, was up from the \$82,398,398 payment it received in July.

For the year, Hereford has received \$708,696 in rebate payments, down 0.9 percent from \$715,186 for the same period in 1999.

Deaf Smith County received a rebate of \$32,413, down 15.9 percent from the \$38,553 payment the previous year. However, August's rebate was up

from the \$28,960 payment for July.

A total of \$275.5 million in monthly sales tax payments were delivered by the Texas Comptroller's Office to 1,107 Texas cities and 119 counties. August sales tax rebates are up 1.2 percent compared to August 1999. Year-to-date payments to cities and counties are running 7.7 percent ahead of 1999.

The sales tax rebates delivered include \$254.9 million to Texas cities, up 1.2 percent compared to August 1999. Texas counties received rebates of \$20.6 million, up 1.2 percent compared to a year ago.

In addition to city and county sales tax rebates, \$96.2 million went to Texas' six met-

ropolitan transit authorities and two city transit systems, and \$8.7 million was paid to 51 special purpose districts.

August sales tax rebates represent sales taxes collected in June and reported to the comptroller in July.

By law, the state collects sales taxes for Texas cities and counties that have local sales taxes. The comptroller's office then returns the portion of the taxes on a monthly basis.

The state charges a 6.25 percent sales tax and local sales taxes can be up to 2 percent above that. The city of Hereford levies a 1.5 percent tax, while Deaf Smith County's sales tax is 0.5 percent.

Texas Demos bid to rebuild the party

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Texas Democrats are convinced if they rebuild it, they will come.

Returning Friday from the party's national convention, Democrats say they are re-energized and focused on winning key legislative races this November.

The party that dominated state politics for more than 100 years has no statewide office holder and no prominent statewide candidates in this election.

"The real challenge for those of us from Texas, I think, is for us to go back to the business of building the Democratic Party," said state Senator Rodney Ellis of Houston.

For the Democrats, rebuilding begins with winning control of the Legislature.

Right now, Republicans hold a 16-15 edge in the state Senate. Democrats hold a 78-72 edge in the House. Those races are not only critical for control of the statehouse but because lawmakers will redraw district lines next year.

Republicans also are gearing up for the election and have said repeatedly that they will fight to take over the Texas House so they can choose the first Republican speaker.

Both parties have declared Senate Districts 2 and 3, and House District 11 battle grounds in November.

In District 2, Republicans

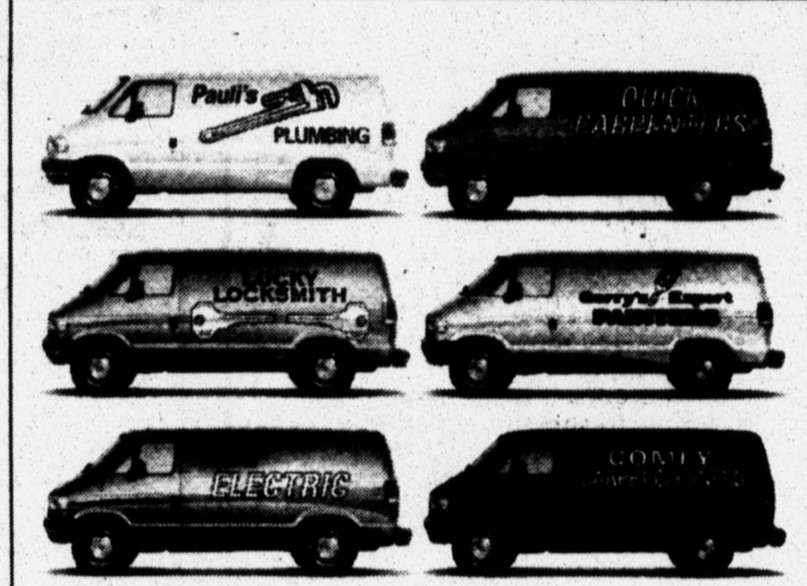
say they can defeat incumbent Democrat David Cain of Dallas with their candidate, Bob Deuell, a Dallas doctor.

In District 3, Democrats hope to recapture the East Texas seat they lost by fewer than 400 votes in 1996 with David Fisher, a lawyer from Silsbee. Fisher is running against Republican Todd Staples of Beaumont.

Staples gave up his District 11 House seat to run for the Senate seat vacated by Sen. Drew Nixon, R-Carthage.

The District 3 seat not only will determine control of the Senate, but it also could impact the lieutenant governor's post, arguably the most powerful elected position in Texas.

If Republican Gov. George W. Bush wins the White House, Republican Lt. Gov. Rick Perry becomes governor. The Senate would then hold a special election among its members to replace him and the majority party would hold the edge.

Getting reading right

Traveling through time and across continents with the written word should be the inheritance of every school child, whether it's fighting the waves and the whale with Captain Ahab in "Moby Dick," taming the frontier with Laura Ingalls in the "Little House" series, or even peering behind the magic wardrobe to visit Aslan in the "Chronicles of Narnia."

Adventures like these capture the fertile imagination of every child. But in order to enjoy those classic pieces of literature by Melville, Wilder and Lewis, our children must have a strong foundation in reading.

I believe that reading is the building block of our children's education. That's why I proposed the master Reading Teacher Program in 1998 and pushed for its passage in the Texas Legislature last year.

A Master Reading Teacher is a teacher who has been specially trained in the latest research on effective reading instruction, in identifying children with reading disorders, and in instructing children whose native language is one other than English. Master Reading Teachers are trained to incorporate their knowledge in the classroom and mentor fellow teachers who will benefit from their specialization.

I believe our teachers need to be armed with a continual flow of new information. Just as scientist are making daily discoveries into how humans learn to acquire and process knowledge, teachers must apply these new insights into the science of learning and utilize the latest techniques that will help our children learn.

But where in a teacher's day, between teaching multiplication tables to a classroom full of bright, boisterous young children, wiping countless runny noses, monitoring the lunch room, writing the next day's lesson plan and grading homework far into the evening, is there time to sit down and learn about the latest science in reading? Enter the Master Reading Teacher to bring that knowledge to them.

The State Board for Educator Certification (SBEC) recently approved a number of new Master Reading Teacher certification programs. Those programs have been operating at various university campuses, school district facilities and regional education service centers during the summer months, and will continue training in the fall.

Researchers have found that between 10 to 20 percent of the children in our schools today have a reading disability such as dyslexia. Yet in many instances, that kind of reading disability goes undetected simply because we haven't been able to train our teachers to properly identify it. School becomes a struggle for those students and, eventually, they may lose interest and drop out.

Additionally, one out of every three students attending school in one of our state's major cities arrives at the schoolhouse door learning English as a second language. In some places, the figure is even higher. What a tremendous challenge that poses, and what a tremendous opportunity.

The kids are OK, so leave them alone

It was a hot night, so Annette and I went to the Sonic for milk shakes. When we were leaving, we noticed a group of teenagers sitting on their cars in an area between the drive-in restaurant and a convenience store.

The kids weren't doing much, just hanging out, talking and looking to see who was driving by. It just shows some things haven't changed much over the years.

Back in the late '50s and early '60s in Texarkana, the best place to hang out was at Lee's Drive-In. It was the premiere teen-age eating place in town, with char-grilled burgers, fries and rich, thick milk shakes or cherry Cokes.

Lee's was a place where the local teenagers, especially those from the Arkansas side of town, congregated after football or basketball games, after going to the movies, a dance or whatever else might have been on tap that night.

Lines of cars would circle the drive-in as the drivers checked things out to see who was there and who was with whom.

A year or so after I graduated from high school, the owner of Lee's got the idea that all those cars apparently circling aimlessly were a nuisance and annoyed his adult customers, so he put up barriers so the cars couldn't circle.

A few months after the barriers went up, Lee's Drive-In went out of business. What the owner hadn't noticed was the teenagers who he thought were just circling and circling, were parking on side streets and jumping in cars with their friends or pulling into an available slot and ordering food.

When the barriers went up, business went down as the teen-agers found another place to congregate. It turns out the adults were not the major source of his income.

One night about four years ago when I was covering a meeting of the Hughes Springs City Council, several adults showed up and demanded the council do something about the teen-agers who were gathering on Friday and Saturday nights on an empty lot near the downtown.

The consensus of the adults was the kids needed to be run off because "they might do something."

When a council member responded that the kids really didn't have any other place to hang out with their friends, one of the complaining adults said, "They have church and football games, what more do they need?"

At that point, the police chief stood up and said emphatically: "I check on these kids every weekend. All they do is sit on their cars and talk. That's the only place in town where they can. They're good kids, just leave them alone."

That's good advice. Most of the kids are good kids, and we adults should just leave them alone.

For 98 days, shorts, T-shirts and swimsuits sufficed as clothing for all but Sunday morning wear. Toes wiggled in the freedom of casual sandals, and fair hewed skin darkened to bronze from hours spent swimming or jumping on a trampoline in the Texas sun.

How long ago did I wonder if I would ever get through this interminable out-of-school season? Is it possible only 2,352 hours have passed since school dismissed in May? Surely my calculations must be wrong!

What difference does it make? School bells

are ringing and parents can now sigh in relief. The curtain climbers, cookie crunchers, and chandelier chimps are once more restricted to the confines of a classroom.

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DPS begins new way of notifying about offenders

AUSTIN — Texas residents have begun to receive notification by post card when high-risk sex offenders move into their neighborhoods.

The new program, implemented by the Texas Department of Public Safety, gives residents more information about recently convicted sex offenders deemed most likely to re-offend.

The program affects only offenders convicted on or after Jan. 1, 2000, who have been designated Risk Level 1 under guidelines set by the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

Post-card notifications supplement those already required by law, such as notices that must be published in newspapers in both English and Spanish.

The first mailing of post cards, which went

out last week, involved about 30 offenders and nearly 16,000 pieces of mail.

Post cards containing information about the sex offender, including a photograph, name, age, address and offense, were mailed to neighbors within a three-block radius in subdivisions and a one-mile radius in rural areas.

"The Legislature has given the people of Texas another tool to protect themselves from potentially dangerous people," said DPS Director Col. Thomas A. Davis Jr.

Shoppers took 'holiday' seriously

Texas' second annual "sales tax holiday" appears to have been even more successful than last year, state Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander said.

"Judging by media accounts and an informal survey of shopping mall managers, families across Texas headed for malls and department stores in droves to stock up on back-to-school clothes for the kids, and clothes for Mom and Dad, too," she said last week.

At stores offering layaway plans, shoppers responded positively to an administra-

tive change Rylander made this year: eligible items placed in layaway during the sales tax holiday can be taken out later without having to pay sales tax.

"This change enables hard-working families with limited budgets to pay for their purchases a little bit at a time and still receive the tax break," she said.

Rylander predicted shoppers would save at least \$34 million in state and local sales taxes during the three-day shopping spree, Aug. 4-6.

The actual amount of tax saved will not be known until late October, Rylander said.

DNA testing confirms McGinn's conviction

Gov. George W. Bush last week said the results of new DNA tests confirm a jury's verdict that Texas death row inmate Ricky Nolen McGinn is guilty of raping and murdering his step-daughter in 1993.

Bush said he recommended a reprieve of execution for McGinn because it was important that biological evidence be tested to help determine the defendant's guilt or innocence of the rape charge.

Director responds

Dear Editor:

I read with concern the Aug. 13th letter in the *Hereford Brand*: "Does Hereford need an assisted living center?" What concerned me was the fact the writer stated that our nursing home, August Healthcare, is in bankruptcy.

The fact is that we were owned by a Canadian company that lost the leases on four of their Texas nursing homes. As of March 1, we were taken over by a Texas-based company, August HealthCare, and thus our new name, August HealthCare of Hereford. We are not bankrupt; however, the former management company has declared bankruptcy after losing the lease on the former Hereford Care Center.

Currently, 45 percent of Texas nursing homes are in bankruptcy. Texas is ranked 47th lowest in the nation for reimbursement. What priorities do legislators place on the care of our elderly and disabled? The dollars spent in Texas for nursing home care is near the lowest in the nation, although Texas continues to rank near the top in spending for the prison system. If you recall, Gov. Ann Richards coined the phrase: "If you do the crime in Texas, we have a place for you to do the time." She also made midnight raids on nursing homes and, as I recall, was highly critical of long-term care, but didn't do much to help support facilities financially. Voters would be appalled to know how much Texas spends to care for convicts, compared with the care for elderly in nursing homes. We encourage the residents of Deaf Smith County to contact their legislators and question the disproportionate budget allocation for the geriatric population. One thing we all have in common, if the Lord is willing,

someday we will all be gerians.

If I may comment on the letter regarding the assisted living center coming to Hereford: Assisted living is a wonderful concept and it definitely has its place in the market. However, consumers need to be informed of what services are rendered for their dollar. For instance, the daily rate of Seville Estates (an assisted living complex in Amarillo) charges approximately \$73 per day and have numerous add-ons, such as dressing, bathing, medication assistance, laundry and medical transpor-

tation charges. August HealthCare is the only Medicare-certified long-term care facility in Deaf Smith County. Our rates are \$71 per day, with all of the above list of add-on charges included in the daily rate. The licensed professional nurses on staff 24 hours per day work closely with residents' physicians to provide quality skilled care. We invite the residents of Hereford to tour our facility and see what August HealthCare is all about.

In order to become a Master Reading Teacher, a teacher with at least three years of teaching experience must enroll in and complete a Master Reading Teacher training program and then pass the Master Reading Teacher certificate exam. Teachers who already have a "reading specialist" certificate must only complete the MRT course to be certified as a Master Reading Teacher.

Teachers who successfully complete Master Reading Teacher training and become certified will be eligible for a \$5,000 annual bonus if they agree to teach at one of 1,880 high-need campuses that have been identified around the state. These are campuses that the Commissioner of Education has deemed have the highest need for expert reading instruction based on TAAS reading scores. The Legisla-

ture has set aside \$12 million for the next school year to pay these bonuses.

In the future, I hope we can expand the program to more campuses, and build on this concept by expanding it to core subject areas like math and science.

Our children will be able to soar to new heights with the foundation of a quality education. That means we must continue to invest in our teachers, giving them the tools they need to shape the next generation of Texas leaders.

Faith no longer barrier, but not invisible

When John F. Kennedy was confronting his "so-called religious issue" 40 years ago, he warned that the suspicions raised about his Catholicism might one day be aimed at candidates of other faiths.

His admonition to Protestant clergymen echoes now as Joseph Lieberman begins his campaign for vice president, the first Jew nominated to a major party national ticket.

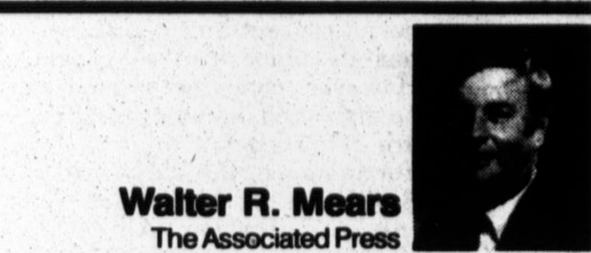
"We are not asking people to vote for me to make history," he said, although Al Gore boasted of a historic breakthrough when he chose Lieberman. "We want people to forget the history and vote for me and Al Gore because we are the best ticket for America's future."

Both Kennedy and Lieberman offered pledges not asked of other candidates, to put their oaths to the Constitution first. Those pledges were volunteered to dispel questions about the demands of their faiths.

"When you take an oath, as I have in my Senate terms, to uphold the Constitution of the United States, that's your priority," Lieberman said.

He said that when U.S. and Israeli interests diverge, he, "obviously," would stand with America's interests.

In Kennedy's time, the question was of the Roman Catholic hierarchy, of Vatican

power, with some Protestants questioning whether he would be independent of church commandments. Those questions did not come only from the fringes. The Rev. Norman Vincent Peale put his household name behind them.

Earlier, Kennedy had told voters that a president swears to support the constitutional separation of church and state and that to break that oath would be an impeachable crime and a sin against God.

When the questions persisted, Kennedy went before the Greater Houston Ministerial Association on Sept. 12, 1960, with a landmark address on the issue of religion in politics.

Kennedy said he believed in an America where no Catholic prelate would tell the president how to act and no Protestant minister would tell his parishioners how to vote. He said he was not "the Catholic candidate for president," but the Democratic candidate, "who happens also to be a Catholic."

He said that should his office ever force him to choose between violating his conscience and the national interest, he would resign.

"While this year, it may be a Catholic against whom the finger of suspicion is pointed, in other years it has been,

and may someday be again, a Jew — or a Quaker — or a Unitarian — or a Baptist."

Kennedy was not the first of his faith nominated by the Democrats. That was Gov. Alfred E. Smith, who ran and lost in 1928, leading party leaders, even Catholic politicians, to conclude that the religion was a bar to winning the office.

That was still a barrier when Kennedy emerged, first as a losing candidate for vice president at the 1956 convention, then in winning the nomination and the White House four years later.

Presenting Lieberman as his running mate, Gore said with his nomination, Democrats "tear down an old wall of division again."

Lieberman said Gore showed confidence in the American voter by believing "as I do that they will not vote for me or against me based on my religion."

Former President Carter, a Baptist, as is Gore, recalled his own experience when he was campaigning in 1976. "When I said I was a born-again Christian a lot of people thought it was some kind of a strange cult," he said, "but it had been part of my life, like breathing."

Lieberman, an Orthodox Jew, describes his faith in much the same way, living by tenets that will take him out of the campaign on Saturdays, the Sabbath, and on three other religious holidays before the election.

Gore, he said, "doesn't want me to vary from my traditional practices, and I won't." He said that for both men, religion "grounds our lives."

For the Democrats, reminders of Lieberman's devout faith could be an asset as they try to dispel the lingering cloud of President Clinton's White House sex scandal and the fund-raising excesses which embroiled Gore, too.

As he first took the vice presidential stage at Gore's side, on Aug. 8, Lieberman quoted a Biblical verse from Chronicles and offered a prayer of thanks to God.

It has since been suggested, even by his Republican friend, Bill Bennett, that he overdid it. Lieberman said that the moment was miraculous to him and moved him naturally to prayer.

Addressing the Democratic National Convention on Wednesday night, Lieberman spoke of his Jewish heritage and the barrier broken by his "miraculous journey" to the vice presidential nomination, "Only in America," he said.

Carter said that except for "a few nuts," he does not think anti-Semitism will be a significant factor against the Democrats.

"That time is gone," he said. His benediction:

"I think for people to know that Joe Lieberman is a deeply convicted Jew, and that Al Gore is a deeply convicted Christian, and so is George W. Bush, is not looked upon as a strange thing any more. It's looked upon as a reassuring thing."

"No matter what happens, these guys have something in them on which I can depend."

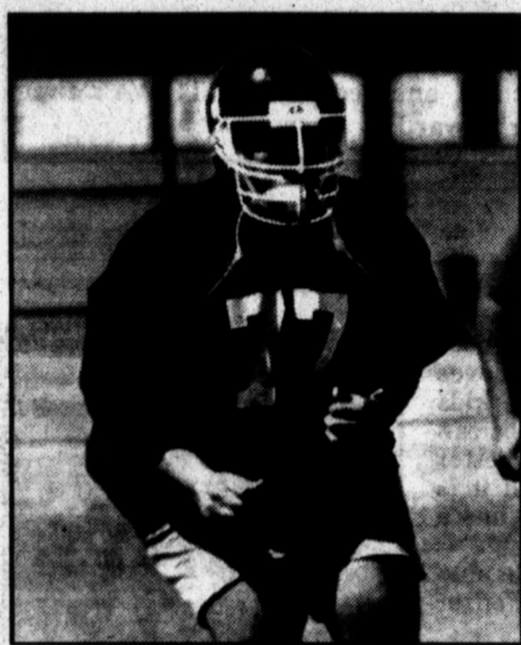
The Hereford High School 2000 football team began its quest to repeat as district champions and make it to the playoffs Monday on the practice field.

Sydney ready to host 2000 Olympics

Tickets still remain for Olympic games

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — The Opera House shimmers on placid waters. A ferry slips silently under the majestic Harbor Bridge, escaping the gaze of tourists gossiping at a dockside café.

Deep beneath tranquil Sydney Harbor, sharks lurk — far from sight.

The scene is idyllic yet potentially threatening — just like the Olympics that begin in less than a month.

On the surface, Sydney is ready to welcome the world. All the Olympic venues are complete, and the city is eager to show itself as one of the world's financial and cultural centers.

Possible problems await, too. Aborigines say they'll pro-

test during the Sept. 15-Oct. 1 games. Train derailments and airport blackouts have outraged Sydneysiders the past few months. The Summer Games are set for Australia's early spring, so rain might make things messy.

And although most people are excited about the arrival of 10,200 athletes and the world's attention, many think Sydney would be just fine without a two-week extravaganza that will clog roads and restaurants.

"I find myself regarding the Olympics as a gigantic annoyance, something that will disrupt my life and force me to leave town," columnist Anne Summers wrote recently in The Sydney Morning Herald.

Unlike four years ago, when Atlantans smothered their games in enthusiasm and commercialism, Sydney resi-

dents are typically laid back about Australia's first Olympics since the 1956 Melbourne Games.

A few minor scandals turned some Aussies against the games. The International Olympic Committee projects 78 percent of Australians will watch the games on TV, a lower figure than in Ireland or Lithuania.

Interest has grown as the Olympic torch tours Australia. Thousands of spectators have lined the route at nearly every stop, from the remote outback to an underwater stint at the Great Barrier Reef.

"The torch relay is touching people in a real, unfiltered way," said John O'Neill, ticketing communications manager for the Sydney Games. "There had been a lot of concentration on politics and controversy."

Sydney, a city of 4 million nestled between the Blue Mountains and Pacific Ocean, boasts some of the world's most striking architecture. Though 27 years old, the Sydney Opera House remains a design wonder.

The new 110,000-seat Olympic Stadium, host for the opening and closing ceremonies and track and field events, is the largest in Olympic history and another marvel of modern design.

Darling Harbor offers trendy restaurants with an Australasian touch. A monorail speeds tourists and businessmen between downtown skyscrapers.

Sydney also has its quaint side alleys and beachside suburbs. A short train ride leads to nearly untouched hillsides and caves.

Australians are far from the

bawdy characters featured in "Crocodile Dundee" movies. There are no kangaroos or koalas roaming downtown Sydney, and there are more Frisbees than boomerangs on Bondi Beach.

Sure, Aussies enjoy "shrimp on the barbie" and their brand of Australian Rules Football makes the U.S. version seem tame.

Sophisticated Sydney is a tolerant, multiracial community with a gay community rivaling San Francisco's. The annual Mardi Gras would make many New Orleanians blush.

They do speak a slightly different language Down Under, mate. Coffee with milk is a "flat white." And slot machines, found on nearly every corner, are "pokies."

Following a \$1.92 billion construction program, most of

the Olympic venues were completed months or years before the games. Most are based in Homebush, a former industrial wasteland about 30 minutes west of downtown Sydney.

At Bondi, where a handful of protesters buried themselves in the sand and vowed to block construction of a temporary 10,000-seat beach volleyball stadium, the facility was completed by late July.

Ticket sales were slowed by budget blunders and a failed ticketing plan in which top seats secretly were siphoned off for corporate bigwigs, leaving more than 2.1 million tickets still unsold.

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Cowboys set to face Denver on Saturday

Dallas attempts to salvage final pre-season match up

DENVER (AP) — Preseason games are for evaluating personnel, but somewhere along the line first-year Dallas coach Dave Campo would like to win one.

The Cowboys are 0-3 in this exhibition campaign, and in fact they have lost 12 of their last 13 preseason games, a woeful stretch that nonetheless has a positive side.

Dallas' lone win was a 22-12 decision over the Denver Broncos last year, and the Cowboys get another crack at the Broncos on Saturday night at Mile High Stadium.

"I don't like to lose," Campo said. "That's why you don't see me at the horse track. I'm not a gambler. All I can say is winning does not make me feel as good as losing makes me feel bad. That's going to be the case whether it's preseason or not. If we have a chance to win the game, I want to win. That's what my message to the team was after the last ballgame."

"We cannot get happy with losing. There are so many more things that are more important than that in these preseason games — I can't stress that enough — but I personally do not like to lose."

Campo's No. 1 offense built a 17-3 lead over the Oakland Raiders just before intermission on Sunday night, but backups allowed the Raiders to rally for a 21-20 victory.

Campo noted that it was "the third straight game that our No. 1s left with the lead. I think our offense is excited because they felt they had

two or three shots to put the game away early and we didn't get it done. That's an area we're kind of pushing, that we're going to be a team that can make the big play."

Taking advantage of a fumble, a pass-interference penalty in the end zone and an interception, the Cowboys needed to generate only 80 yards in the first half to take their big lead. Troy Aikman was a modest 6-for-14 for 61 yards.

Dallas will be without running back Emmitt Smith (calf), tight end David LaFleur (groin) and wide receiver Raghbi Ismail (thumb) for the game with Denver. Offensive guard Larry Allen (broken hand) is expected to play for the first time this preseason.

Starters will play the entire first half. Randall Cunningham will replace Aikman for part of that time so he can work with the first-team offense. Paul Justin and Clint Stoerner will share time in the second half.

The Broncos (2-0) will have a similar rotation. Quarterback Brian Griese and most of the other starters will play into the third quarter.

Running back Terrell Davis, making steady progress following reconstructive knee surgery last season, will start but will share time with Olandis Gary.

"If Terrell gets a little tired, we'll spell him," coach Mike Shanahan said. "We don't want to overwork him."

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Bugbee works to be shown

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CANYON — A retrospective of Southwestern artist H.D. Bugbee's work will open Sept. 8 at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum. To celebrate the 100th anniversary of Bugbee's birth, the museum will bring together 100 of Bugbee's finest works in oil, watercolor, pen-and-ink, and sculpture.

Bugbee portrayed historic and then-contemporary Southern Plains life, including cowboys, American Indians, and flora and fauna of the region.

At the suggestion of his cousin, cattleman T.S. Bugbee, Harold Dow Bugbee came to the Texas Panhandle from Lexington, Mass., in 1914 with his parents. He studied at Texas A & M College in 1917 and the Cumming School of Art in Des Moines, Iowa, in

1920.

Advised by cattlemen Frank Collinson and Charlese Goodnight, Bugbee rendered the landscape and wildlife of the Texas Panhandle, as well as nostalgic paintings of Indians and cowboys. Until the late 1930s, the artist traveled each fall to Taos to paint with his fellow artists "Buck" Dunton, Frank Hoffman, Leon Gaspard, and Ralph Meyers, often packing into the mountains to paint with either Meyers or Dunton.

By the mid-1920s, galleries in Denver, Chicago, Kansas City and New York handled Bugbee's work. With the Depression and decreasing picture sales, Bugbee turned to magazine illustration, a practice he maintained for 18 years. He did pen-and-ink illustrations for a variety of

magazines, including "Ranch Romances," "Western Stories," "Country Gentleman," and "Field and Stream." Additionally, Bugbee also illustrated a number of significant books on Western history including J. Evetts Haley's "Charles Goodnight: Cowman and Plainsman", Willie N. Lewis's "Between Sun and Sod," and S. Omar Barker's "Songs of the Saddleman." He also continued to make easel paintings.

Under Roosevelt's New Deal, Bugbee painted the first of five murals for the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum's Pioneer Hall in 1934. He later painted additional murals for the Amarillo Army Air Field and set of murals on Native American life for the Museum.

Bugbee exhibited at the Tri-

State Fair at Amarillo, Fort Worth Frontier Centennial Exposition in 1936, the Greater Texas and Pan-American Exposition at Dallas in 1937, and in the annual West Texas art exhibitions at Fort Worth. He also had numerous solo exhibitions in Texas and exhibited at Taos.

In 1951, Bugbee became the first curator of a Panhandle-Plains, a position he held until his death. Over 230 Bugbee works are part of the museum's art. Exhibits of Bugbee's illustrated letters, his work in Taos, and his illustrations for J. Evetts Haley's books will be ancillary to the larger retrospective.

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Clinton to sign bill creating AIDS trust

WASHINGTON (AP) — A week before he makes what will likely be his last presidential trip to Africa, President Clinton plans to sign a bill establishing a trust fund to care for African AIDS victims, Clinton administration officials said Friday.

Clinton will use his weekly radio address Saturday to announce the signing, said an aide who spoke on condition of anonymity. The signing will likely take place in Lake Placid, N.Y., in the Adirondack Mountains, where Clinton and his family were planning a quiet weekend.

In his speech, Clinton will also direct Treasury Secretary Lawrence Summers to begin negotiations with the World Bank to set up the trust fund.

Unassuming pets assume vital roles in nursing home

When Dorothy Blumer came to King's Manor Methodist Home as interim administrator, she did what so many of us do when we start a new job, she took something to make her feel at home. But what she selected is probably not what most of us would take to a new job. She took her poodle, Westcliff.

And Blumer was very pleased to find that Westcliff was not the lone pet at King's Manor.

Already in residence were two maple colored cocker spaniels, Hanna and Mandy, and two aviaries with an assortment of miniature birds.

All of these animals play vital roles in the lives of the nursing home residents and what they provide is commonly referred to as pet therapy.

"Hanna and Mandy have been at King's Manor for about a year," Blumer said. "They roam the halls of the nursing home and go in and out of patients' rooms at will. What they provide is companionship. It means the residents are never alone."

Just as Westcliff has been a part of Blumer's life (or maybe it's the other way around) for 14 years, Hanna and Mandy have become a part of the daily lives of the residents.

"Many of these people had to leave their pets behind when they entered the care center," Blumer said. "These animals fill that void. And most importantly, it shows that this home loves and cares about the welfare of its residents."

Not only do the animals provide companionship, care givers at King's Manor believe they

also provide affection as well as to create relief from the monotony that often goes along with life in an institutional setting.

"This program has proven in facilities which have carried it through, to reduce the number of resident complaints," Blumer said.

She said that even residents who are not "animal people" have something to focus their complaints on other than their pain or unhappiness.

Shelly Moss, with King's Manor Social Services, said it didn't take the dogs long to learn

if there was a room where they were not welcome.

"The dogs know when they are not wanted in a room. They learn very quickly who doesn't like them and who does like them. They poke their head in a room and if they are told to 'shoo', they're out of there," Moss said.

Treats for the dogs are furnished to the residents who wish to feed them.

"When the dogs first came here, they were getting fed a lot of things that were not good for them and they got fat," Moss said. So now dog treats are always kept

on hand and the dogs are much healthier.

For those residents who are not dog lovers and don't long for the companionship and hands-on love that dogs require, there are two aviaries.

The aviaries are glass enclosures about six feet tall, three feet wide and two feet deep. The birds that are kept in the aviaries are smaller varieties that do well in a limited environment.

"There are some certain residents who can be found sitting and watching the birds at the same time every day," Blumer said. "They get peace of mind by watching those birds."

According to Blumer, a new program called the Eden Way is being used in some nursing home facilities. What this program professes is "change this nursing home into your own home, however you do it."

Ware Memorial in Amarillo, where Blumer has been volunteering for the last year, is using the program.

"They have aviaries, fish tanks, three dogs and nine cats. They have a parakeet for every resident that wants one to have in their room," she said. "I have seen the difference in the residents since this program has been initiated."

Mandy and Hanna have made a difference at King's Manor. According to Moss, even those residents who do not pet or feed the dogs will watch out for them and help take care of them.

"One man who is a loner and not good with people visits the dogs every day," Moss said.

Occasionally the dogs provide some comic relief as well.



"They create a diversion you wouldn't expect in an institution," Moss said, "like when a clown came and the dogs tried to run him out of the building. The residents got a kick out of it."

Blumer said that while no particular breed of dog is best, small dogs are easier to care for and cause less disruption than larger breeds.

While some of the facilities

have cats, there are no cats at King's Manor right now.

"We tried that once but it didn't work out," Moss said. But maybe they will try again in the future.

The benefits of pet therapy appear evident to the care givers at King's Manor. And as Moss said, "There is evidence to support the theory that people with pets live longer."

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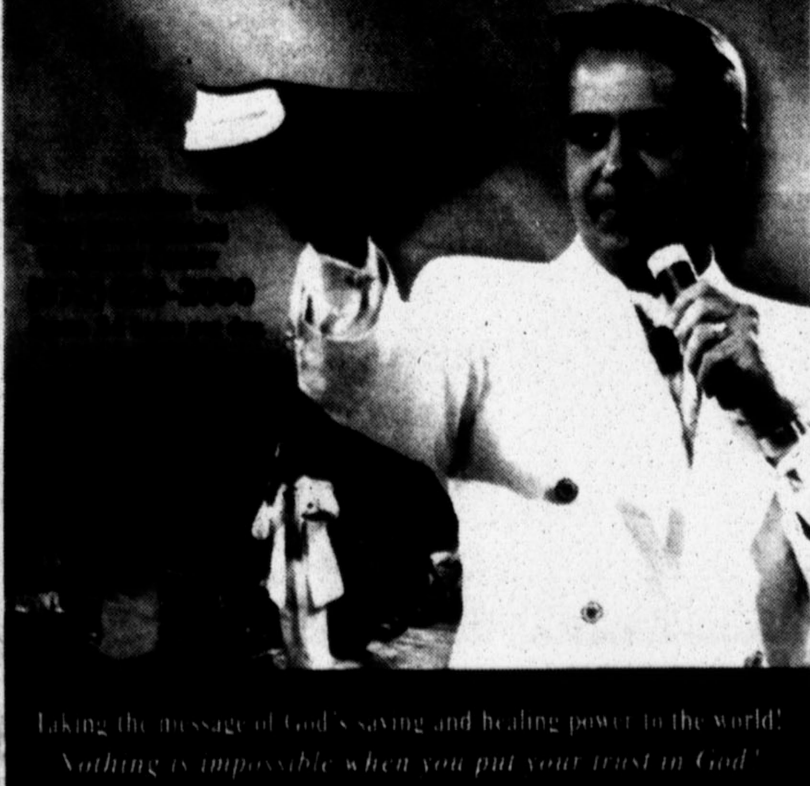

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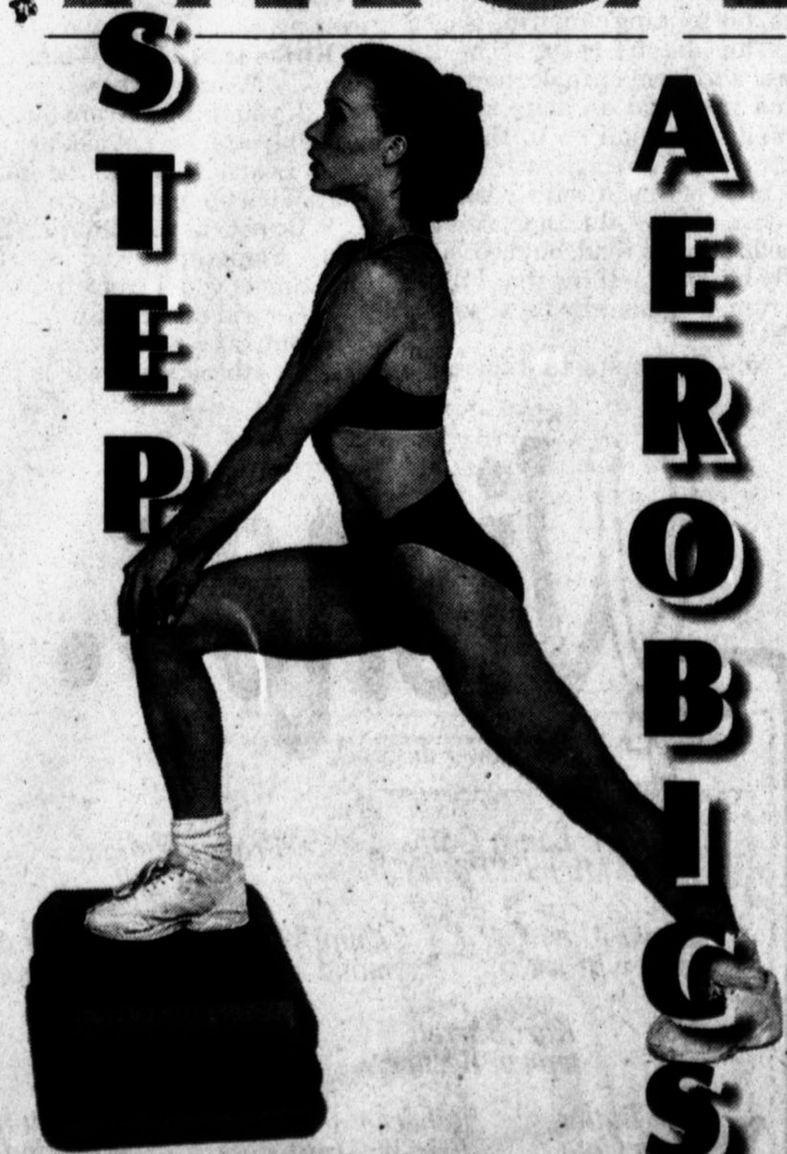

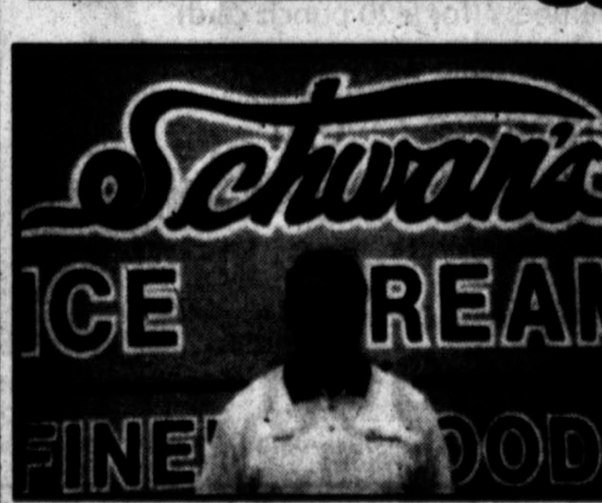

THE DANGERS OF GLAUCOMA

Sometimes aqueous humor—the fluid continuously produced within the eye—does not drain properly. This causes increased pressure within the eye. This condition is called glaucoma. The pressure pushes on the retina at the back of the eye. This reduces the blood

supply to the nerves of the retina causing them to die. As the optic nerve deteriorates, so does vision. Without treatment, glaucoma can eventually cause blindness. Almost 80,000 Americans are blind from glaucoma, and another million are at risk for vision loss because they don't know they have it. In fact, glaucoma is one of the leading causes of preventable blindness in the U.S. and the most common cause of blindness among African-Americans. Because most people with glaucoma experience no noticeable symptoms, an eye examination is the single most important tool in preventing vision loss from the disease.

PCS gets approval to assist homebuyers

The Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs has approved Panhandle Community Services for \$400,000 to be used for down payment and closing cost assistance for first time homebuyers, according to PCS executive director Johnny Raymond.

The agency serves the 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle with this program except in the Amarillo metropolitan area, which is served by the City of Amarillo.

The Hereford office of Panhandle Community Services is located at 1011 E. Park and Celia Serrano is the center coordinator.

Under the program, up to \$5,000 can be utilized (up to \$7,500 in some cases) for down payment and closing costs on a loan.

This is not a grant, but a zero interest, zero payment, second lien that does not come due until the first lien is paid off or on the premature sale or disposition of the property.

In essence, according to Raymond, it is moving the down payment and closing costs from the front of the loan where the money may not be available, to the back of the loan where it can be more readily addressed.

Homes purchased under the

program cannot exceed \$59,877 for an existing home, or \$94,716 for a new home.

"We expect the money to be available to begin administering the program late in August," Raymond said.

Applications may be made at the Hereford center for PCS, where an applicant's income will be checked against program guidelines to see if they qualify. The income guidelines differ by county.

If the applicant qualifies under the guidelines, they still must be able to meet the credit requirements of the lender they choose to work with. After initial application, PCS works strictly with the lender.

Interested parties should contact Serrano at 364-5631 to make initial application for the assistance as soon as it becomes available.

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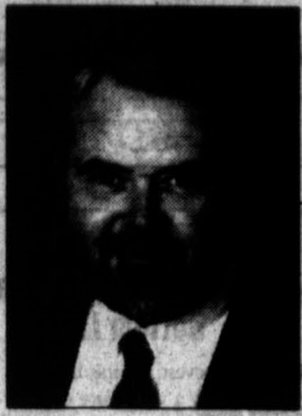

MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

Creating A Customer-Centered Culture

Hypercompetition, exploding technological advances, fickle customers and increasing governmental regulations make up a big part of the business environment today. However, even under these challenging circumstances, some new businesses are thriving. What factors contribute to their success and profits? In this column, I want to talk about one of the many ways to enhance your success: creating a customer-centered culture. Let's begin by defining the word "culture." It means, "the

improvement, refinement or development of a process through training study and design." It focuses on improvement. Therefore, creating a customer-centered culture has an end result of better serving your customers by improving your service to them.

Think of it in this way. Without customers you have a hobby, not a business. Only through satisfying customers can you stay in business profitably. Therefore, if you want to be successful, you must redefine and improve your customer service culture. You must strive for the perfect customer experience.

You must become the better choice for all your present customers and those you want to serve in the future. Your good competitors are taking steps to get better. If you plan to stay ahead, you must improve as well.

If you struggle with the concept that "satisfying the customers" is the best way to grow your business, be prepared for the consequences. Your business will become very vulnerable to competition. Anyone who offers a slightly lower price, a higher level of service or a little extra convenience can steal your customers away.

On the other hand, if you stay one step ahead, you will reap the benefits from the best customer culture. Not all customers fully understand the value they receive, but those who do will keep you healthy.

Changing your customer culture

To change your culture, you must accept these customer truths: First, customers must trust you before they will buy from you. Customers are asking, "Is this really what I wanted?" "If something goes wrong will this company make it right?" "Is this really the best value?" etc. Answer their questions honestly, keep your promises and know your

stuff. This will build confidence and create trust.

Second, quality is a serious matter. For me, quality is more important than age. My dependable lawn mower is a 1978 Snapper. My reliable motorcycle is a 1980 Yamaha. My favorite car is a 1967 Corvette. Why? One common reason: They were quality when they were built, and they are still quality today. Though we live in a "throw away" society, most all customers want quality products, services and results.

Third, customers are not dependent on you. However, you are dependent on them. They honor you when they allow you to serve them. If they aren't getting exactly what they want when they want it, they will find some place else to do business. You aren't doing them a big favor when you serve them well, you're simply meeting their expectations.

Fourth, relationships are important. Customers are people, and people have inherent human desires. These include: to feel important, to be respected, to be liked and to have friends. They like to build personal relationships with those they do business with. So learn their names, treat them in a special way, and they will come back to you.

Fifth, remember that satisfied customers are your future. They represent repeat business. Not only that, they will refer others. But the reference process works both ways. Recently, I heard a young man denigrating a business. I thought to myself, "Boy, this guy must have been treated badly." It turned out that he had no personal experience with the business, only the complaints of a friend. He would never be a customer because of the opinions of others.

When was the last time you were in the library? Has it been a while? Do you know that we have a genealogy collection? Do you know we have phone books from all over Texas and the surrounding area? Would you like to see all the new juvenile nonfiction books we were able to purchase with our Sewell Elam Foundation grant money? Have you seen the magazines we have available for check out? Why not come in and let us give you the tour of your county library?

Recently we had the privilege of meeting Kirsten Lietz of the Michigan State Library in Lansing. She was in town for a few days visiting friends who brought her by to meet us and tour our facility. As is so often the case, she exclaimed over the excellence of our library, especially complimenting our Reference Section. Were we glad that we had just weeded it and ordered replacements!

Ms. Lietz graciously presented us with what has recently been declared the Michigan State Book, *The Legend of Sleeping Bear* by Kathy-Jo Wargin, illustrated by Gijbert van

Frankenhuyzen. This beautiful illustrated children's book recounts the legend which was originated to explain the sandy area that is known as the Sleeping Bear Dune, on the shore of Lake Michigan. In this story, Mother Bear and her two cubs must escape a forest fire in Wisconsin. As they struggle to make this journey across the lake, the loyalty and dedication they show for one another is powerful and heartwarming.

She also brought us another book by the same author and illustrator, *Legend of the Loon*, which uses symbolism from the Scandinavian culture and its fairy tales to reconstruct some of the very first beliefs about this magnificent bird. Both books are a welcome and attractive addition to our children's collection.

New additions to the adult collection this week include *Catch Rope: The Long Arm of the Cowboy* by John Erickson, author of the popular Hank the Cowdog series. For more than a hundred years, American cowboys made their living through the skilled use of horse and rope. Whole libraries have been devoted to the horse, but no one, until now, has written a thorough study of the origins and evolution of ranch roping - which differs from arena roping as practiced by rodeo cowboys. Erickson studies ranch roping; and the endless debate between those cowboys who rope "hard and fast" and those who "dally."

Mixing scholarship with this working-cowboy's knowledge of the subject, he tells stories of cowboys who could not resist fitting their loops on "things that ort not to be roped," such elk, deer, badger, bears, and bobcats. He tells of jackrabbit roping

contests, and of cowboys who roped mice, geese, hogs, wives, or a runaway milk wagon.

The *Guinness Bok of the 20th Century* tells the fast-moving story of the last 100 years, tracking the major news events - from the optimistic early years of the century, through the central decades of war and political tension and into the closing period of relative stability - in a way that will inform the curious and engross the browser. It also covers the popular events that defined the times - the scandal, the stars, the television shows - and the people who gave each year its flavor, from Charlie Chaplin to the Spice Girls.

In Ridley Pearson's *Middle of Nowhere*, "blue flu" has struck the Seattle Police Force and a majority of the officers are on an unofficial strike. Overworked and understaffed, Detective Lou Boldt is committed to remaining on the job no matter what. But when a string of robberies and the brutal near-murder of a female cop descend on the city, the pressure of being a nearly one-man operation threatens Boldt's mind and his marriage. With the help of police psychologist Daphne Matthews and Sergeant John LaMoia, Boldt is able to make slow progress cracking the case, and their work leads them to a Denver convict and his brother, a hardened criminal with a record. As things spin out of control, Boldt's worst fears are confirmed when he refuses to drop the investigation, and it's clear his life is in danger because of it. Boldt and Daphne come to realize that the robberies, assaults, and strike are somehow all connected.

Gilliam Roberts' *Adam and Evil* finds Philly Prep English teacher Amanda Pepper unsure what category her bright senior student Adam Evans falls into, but she fears for him. Increasingly erratic, unkempt, and isolated, Adam is an accident waiting to happen. When a young woman is murdered at the landmark Free Library while Amanda and her class are touring the premises, Adam, now mysteriously missing, becomes the prime suspect.

Unlike the police, including her detective boyfriend, Amanda is dead certain that Adam is both innocent and in terrible danger. And he's not alone. The more Amanda sifts through the layers of the victim's life, the closer she comes to losing her own.

Eileen Goudge's latest is *The Second Silence*. When Noelle Van Doren's only child is stolen from her by her wealthy estranged husband, it is she who must battle, against an onslaught of false evidence, to prove she's a fit parent. Into the fray step Noelle's long-divorced parents, whose quest to discredit their socially prominent son-in-law raises questions about his dubious past...and disquieting realizations about their own. After all these years the passion that once consumed them as teenagers proves as inescapable as the mounting evidence against Noelle's husband, Robert.

Only Charlie, Mary and Noelle know Robert, supposedly a paragon of civic virtue, is not who he seems. With a little help from Noelle's kid sister and her

smoldering, street-smart boyfriend, they frantically peel away layers of mystery surrounding Robert and a 30-year-old suicide. But they also find themselves on the path of a cold-blooded killer. It soon becomes plain that this battle is not just to regain custody, but to keep loved ones alive.

In the midst of this

heartrending crisis, the lives of each begin to change in unexpectedly wrenching ways. For Charlie and Mary, the years apart have made them realize that one's first love is often one's best love, but now new obstacles stand in their way. Noelle is astonished to discover a reservoir of strength in the midst of her struggle and, most surprising of all, the ability

to open her heart to a new love. Other new books: *Bridesmaids Revisited* by Dorothy Cannell, *Lethal Seduction* by Jackie Collins, *Nightshade* by John Saul, *Caught in a Bind* by Gayle Roper, *Hot Springs* by Stephen Hunter

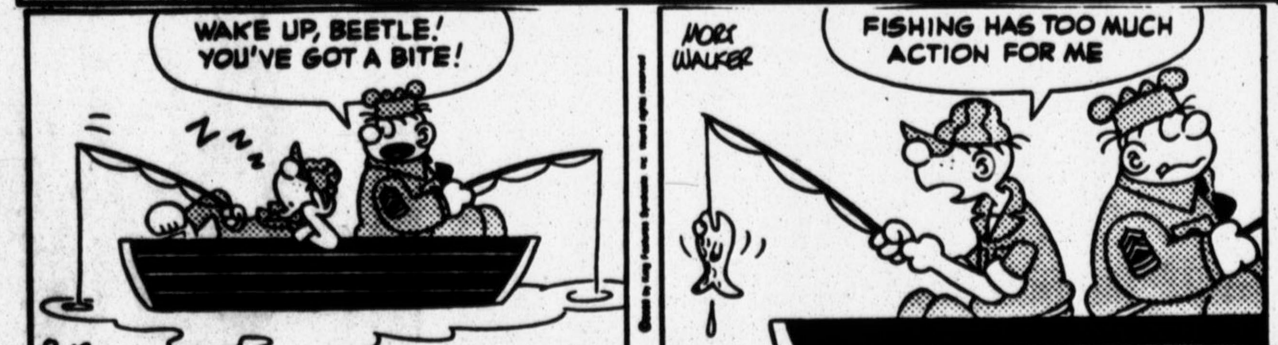

Com growers expect successful crop

Timely rains boosted East Texas production

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — The state's corn growers are getting an earful about the success of this year's crop, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service reports.

Bill Buxkemper, Extension agent in Hill County, said the corn harvest is winding down in Central Texas, where yields averaged 100 bushels per acre.

"Most of the district received timely spring rains that boosted the crop," he said. "These yields are about 20 bushels higher than the average production per acre."

Buxkemper said current high temperatures came after the crop was mature, protecting it from the heat and moisture stress that usually causes

aflatoxin problems. "This is an exceptionally good crop," he said. "These are among the best yields I have seen in the past 30 years."

Randy Upshaw, district Extension director in Dallas, said harvest in is full swing in North Texas, where yields are also being reported at 100 bushels per acre.

"These yields are above average, as this area usually harvests between 85 and 100 bushels," he said. "This is due to ideal growing conditions from planting through silking."

Upshaw said ideal conditions were present until 20 days ago, when high temperatures and dry weather arrived.

"Unfortunately, this dry weather that is ideal for harvesting, is hurting other crops and keeping stock tanks low," he said. "And of course, this is the big picture. There's a handful of corn growers who never received those spring rains and

who are not experiencing these high yields."

Jett Major, district Extension director in Lubbock, said the corn crop is in good condition, and high yields are expected when harvest begins in early September.

"Hot, sunny weather is accelerating the crop quickly through the dough stage, as the grains harden and the plants dry down," he said. "But the corn is well pollinated, and the yield potential looks good."

Dr. Bob Robinson, district Extension director in Amarillo, said corn is rated fair to good, and producers are irrigating heavily in the Panhandle.

"Some early-planted corn is beginning to dent," he said. "Spider mites have dramatically increased this week."

Robinson said most sorghum is rated poor to good.

"Dryland sorghum needs rain," he said. "Early planted fields have headed."

Robinson said range conditions also vary from poor to good.

"Cattle are in good condition," he said. "But range grasses continue to decline from the lack of moisture."

Galen Chandler, district Extension director in Vernon, said hot and dry conditions are being reported across the Rolling Plains.

"Daytime temperatures have ranged from 100 degrees to 107 degrees," he said. "No rain has been reported for the last three weeks."

Chandler said much of the cotton in dry parts of the district has reached the cut-out stage.

"Blooms are in the tops of plants, and the heavily-stressed cotton is dropping squares and small bolls," he said. "Aphids continue to increase in irrigated cotton."

Chandler said pasture conditions are deteriorating.

"Livestock conditions are holding, but producers are feeding protein supplements," he said. "Ranchers are closely monitoring tanks."

The following specific livestock, crop and weather conditions were reported by district Extension directors:

PANHANDLE: soil moisture is very short to adequate. Corn is rated fair to good; irrigation is heavy. Spider mites have increased. Cotton is fair to good; beet armyworms and cotton aphids increasing. Dryland sorghum needs rain. Range grasses declining.

SOUTH PLAINS: soil moisture is short. Pastures and ranges in fair to good condition. Supplemental feeding of livestock continues. Irrigated

cotton good to excellent, with some fields approaching cut-out. Land preparation for wheat planting continues.

ROLLING PLAINS: soil moisture is short. Beet armyworms, bollworms and aphids continue to increase in cotton. Peanuts are wilting in the afternoon. Pecans doing well; producing nuts. Rapid decline in pasture. Grasshoppers are a problem.

NORTH TEXAS: soil moisture is very short to short. Hot, dry weather has slowed things down. Grasshoppers and armyworms still a problem. Soybeans are maturing from lack of moisture. Cotton needs moisture to retain more bolls. Preparing ground for small grains.

EAST TEXAS: soil moisture is short. Pastures, pond water declining. Armyworms increasing. Cotton shedding bolls. Peanuts falling. Sweet potatoes poor. Peach yields fair. Pecan prospects fair.

FAR WEST TEXAS: soil moisture is very short. Cotton is blooming in the top and shucking fruit due to hot, dry conditions. Pink boll worm activity increasing. Pasture conditions declining. Supplemental feeding continues.

WEST CENTRAL TEXAS: soil moisture is very short to short. Growing conditions are very poor due to lack of moisture. Majority of corn crops have burned up. Cotton is stressed. Wheat fields being plowed for fall planting. Pastures in poor shape. Livestock is fair to good.

CENTRAL TEXAS: soil moisture is very short. Cattle condition declining due to drought conditions; ranges and pastures are severely stressed.

Canadian thistle thrives in northern border states

Officials concerned with rapid spread of noxious weed

CLEVELAND, N.D. (AP) — Donald Schroeder is battling an increasingly frustrating invader that officials say is spreading like wildfire through the state.

Canada thistle has been in the United States for more than 300 years, but, authorities say, seven years of wet weather caused it to take off in North Dakota and other border states.

Schroeder is mostly retired now from farming his 400 acres and teaching school. But he still has to attach a mower to his 1956 tractor to combat the pesky weed — or risk losing his Conservation Reserve Program contracts.

"I do what I can to get rid of it," Schroeder said, as he looked over the purple Canada thistle flowers standing over prairie grasses in one of his fields. "I could do better. But sometimes I look around and say, 'Donald, you're simply doing what you can.'"

Canada thistle will overtake leafy surge in the next couple of years as the state's most prevalent weed, predicts John Leppert, a noxious weed expert with the state Department of Agriculture.

"It's gotten much worse since 1993," Leppert said. "We have gone into this North Dakota monsoon period, and Canada thistle loves it."

The slender, spiny-leaved weed, believed to have come to North America in dirt used

as ballast on ships, now infects 900,000 acres of North Dakota cropland. Officials say land in the federal Conservation Reserve Program, which pays farmers to idle highly erodible acres, has been hit especially hard.

"The weed spreads primarily through its root system, expanding existing patches or by farmers inadvertently spreading it when working the land," Leppert said. Sometimes a stand can get started after just a little bit of seed falls out of a pickup truck, he said.

Herbicides can kill Canada thistle, but they are expensive, Leppert said.

He receives about six phone calls a day from people complaining about uncontrolled Canada thistle on neighboring land.

"I'm spraying it, trying to control it," said Lee Settingsgard, of Edmore. "But my next door neighbors have CRP and they just don't seem to care, sometimes."

Farm Service Agency representative Judy Becker, in Stutsman County, said CRP landholders are easy targets. She said they often get the weed from neighboring farms that do not take measures to control it.

Farmers with CRP land risk losing their contracts if the weed is not controlled, Becker said. The FSA first warns landowners, but it can fine them twice the cost of spraying the land. The agency also can terminate CRP contracts for land with weed problems, she said.

The CRP program pays out about \$40 an acre every year. The \$8 per-acre cost of spraying seems like a lot, but a \$16 per-acre bill from the FSA really gets a farmer's attention, Becker said.

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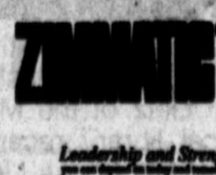

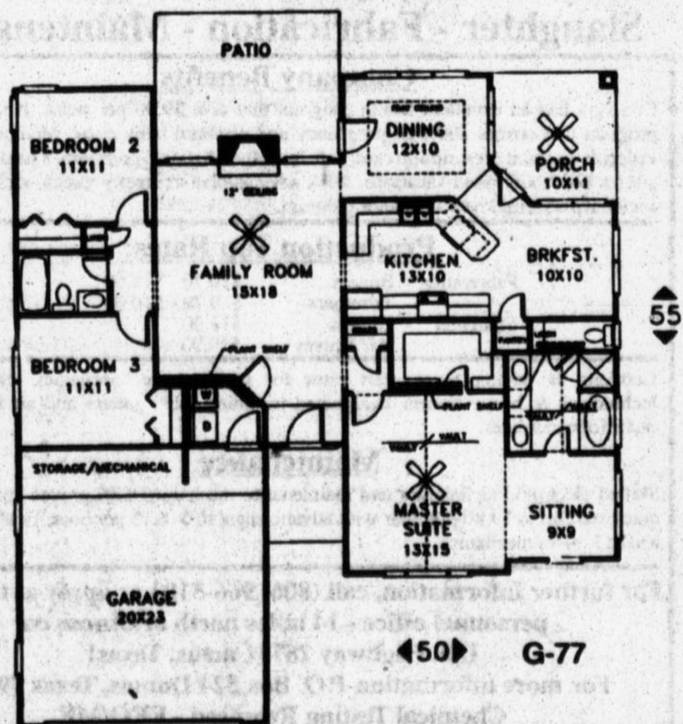

Christian music turning teens from profane to the sacred

SAN ANTONIO — Earlier this year, 11-year-old Josh Heath's father tuned all the radios in the family's home and car to Christian music stations. No more of his favorite punk rock tunes, no more Metallica for his sister Jennifer, about to turn 13.

But no adolescent rebellion ensued. Josh and Jennifer say they have come to like Christian rock, even to prefer it.

"Once you start listening to it, it is really addictive," Jennifer said. "That other music is not very good."

The selling point for a certain kind of Christian music is distaste for the secular. For decades, critics have found "that other music" too focused on drugs, sex, violence, or some combination of elements parents find unacceptable for their kids.

Many kids counter they don't listen to the lyrics they just like a particular band's sound or beat. Josh and Jennifer disputed that claim by pointing to a recent presentation at Trinity Church on San Antonio's Northeast Side by Phil Chalmers of Ohio.

Chalmers had played a "name that tune" kind of game with the 800 assembled kids. When

he read aloud the words to even the grittiest songs, a number of hands shot up, indicating knowledge of the recording artist or CD on which the song appeared.

A constant diet of secular music is depressing or conveys the wrong messages about life choices, he said, while Christian music is uplifting and provides concrete answers to problems young people face.

"If they want to listen to secular music, they're on their own. I never promote secular music," Chalmers said in an interview.

Chalmers travels the country presenting seminars on the evils of rock. And rap. And country. And just about anything else that's not Christian. He gives country music more positive marks than the other genres but says it, too, can glorify sex outside marriage and promote immoral lifestyles.

He credited a CNN survey for the finding that teen-agers listen to 5 1/2 hours of music daily but only listen to their parents five minutes a day, which he says underscores why parents should pay more attention to what's on their kids' Walkmans.

Parents are naive about the

music their kids listen to, agreed Tim Mulder, a youth pastor and business manager of the Scripture Stall, a Christian book store here.

"It strikes me how parents protect what their kids watch on TV and monitor Web sites and the friends their kids have, but they'll let them listen to whatever they want," Mulder said.

Mulder took several teens to hear Chalmers, including one youngster who had never been inside a church and who had just spent his allowance on a heavy-metal band's CD.

"He heard Phil read the lyrics (from the same CD) about having sex with dead people," Mulder said. "This kid said, 'Dude, if I'd known that, I wouldn't have bought that CD.'"

The teen was impressed enough to accept Jesus Christ that evening, Mulder said. But not everyone was converted or even convinced. Also at the event was Rod Nichols, who brought several teens along and was taken aback by others in the audience who seemed amused by violent scenes in music videos.

"Some of the music videos show people getting shot," said Nichols, a pastor with Youth for Christ and a musician himself. "Some of the kids were laughing. I found that disturbing. It's just insane."

In response to parental concerns, the Recording Industry Association of America in 1985 reached an agreement with the National Parent Teacher Association and the Parents Music Resource Center for a voluntary program to identify potentially objectionable song lyrics.

Under it, record companies decide which CDs should be plastered with a removal-resistant parental advisory decal. According to the RIAA, the average record store offering 110,000 album titles will carry roughly 500 with the advisory label.

In 1998, the last year for which statistics are available, gospel music which includes a variety of musical styles showed the greatest market growth for the top-selling genres, moving from 4.5 percent of all music sold to 6.3 percent.

But rock still rules, accounting for 32.5 percent of sales that year. And morality-based arguments against it have circulated for decades, said Kevin Vargas, program director for KISS Radio (99.5 FM).

"From the birth of rock 'n' roll in the 1950s, people have said it is the root of all evil and would corrupt generation after generation," Vargas said. "The answer is that society hasn't crumbled yet due to rock 'n' roll."

KISS bills itself as a "con-

temporary rock station" and targets the 18-to-49 demographic age bracket, but programmers are aware that younger, and more impressionable, listeners tune in, Vargas said.

"What we present is out there free of charge," he said. "You're invited to come to the party. If you don't like it and prefer not to listen, that's OK, too."

The station isn't inundated with requests for Christian rock, but Vargas said some of it is good and KISS plays it, citing groups such as d.c. Talk, Third Day and the Newsboys. The band Creed is getting lots of airtime because it produces some of the best rock around, he added.

"The main thing," Vargas said, "is that just because someone listens to rock 'n' roll as opposed to Christian rock, it doesn't make them a bad person."

Larry Magee, band leader for a local group called Los Nice Guys, is aware of the contemporary push to get kids to listen exclusively to Christian music.

"For somebody that's Christian, that's a good idea," Magee said, but his band subscribes to the Baha'i faith, which embraces all religions. He even wrote a song titled "Buddhist-Baptist-Catholic-Jew," which encapsulates the belief that all

major religions come from one God.

Baha'i members also believe that the arts can be a door to the sacred and should not be profaned, Magee said, describing his group's sound as a South Texas blend of country, light rock and Tejano music.

Nichols, the youth pastor, plays in what he described as a Christian metal band called 7 oz. Crown. The trio doesn't limit its performances to churches and often plays nightclubs, he said.

"The Bible says Jesus didn't spend a lot of time in the church. He was out there talking with people," Nichols said. "He was with the people who were out there in the world the prostitute, the tax collectors, the so-called bad people."

Still, kids like Jennifer Heath who attend public schools struggle every day with the kind of music their peers prefer. Some of it, especially songs with racy lyrics, just isn't appropriate, she said.

One school day, she said, all the kids were singing "The Thong Song," by Sinoq, an underwear-themed tune on Billboard magazine's Top 10 in recent months.

Heath said she didn't join in. "You don't need to be talking about girls wearing thongs," she said. "That's not something a 13-year-old needs to hear."

Yard art labor of love for Baytown couple

BAYTOWN, Texas — Dale Harp could make a lot of money building waterfalls, but he doesn't care.

Sculpting rock formations with waterfalls in his yard and admiring his work has been pay enough for him for about the past three years. It was then that he replaced wooden decking in his back yard with large rocks, mortar, concrete, as well as a swimming pool water pump, to simulate a waterfall.

"I've always loved nature and flowers and water running," Harp said. "It's tranquil and loosens up my nerves."

There are two small rock structures in his back yard, and another under construction. His largest project to date built in his front yard was completed after friends suggested he share his work with the community.

"I did one in the back yard, and a friend said it wasn't fair to hide these, so I did one in front," he said.

The front yard exhibit contains 30 tons of rock and brick atop six cubic yards of reinforced concrete.

It contains electric lighting for night viewing, and is enhanced by four types of palm trees, fountain grass, hibiscus plants, daisies, firecracker plants and others. The swimming pool pump recirculates 150 gallons of water per minute that eventually moves through a picturesque water wheel.

Harp said it took eight

months on weekends and evenings to build the structure by himself. By absorbing the labor costs, he spent about \$15,000 on the project.

"My cost to someone else would be \$60,000 to \$75,000," he said. "I've not had that many takers. But, it's just a hobby to me."

Harp, 56, has lived in Baytown since 1951, and has worked as a painter at Jimmy's Paint and Body Shop, Inc. since 1968.

Jimmy Hefferman, owner of the business, allows Harp to go to his land near Hondo, west of San Antonio, to pick up as many rocks as he needs.

"He (Hefferman) believed the more rocks I took off the land, the more grass a cow could eat," Harp said.

Harp's wife, Gretchen, shares her husband's enjoyment of fountains, but does not participate in their creation.

"I do like waterfalls, but he's the one that does it all," she said. "It was exciting to watch it go up (in front). People didn't know what it was going to look like when it was finished. A lot of people take pictures of it. Some just stop and look."

She said her husband has no formal training in design and construction of waterfalls.

"He just decided one day he was going to do it," she said. "He doesn't do anything in moderation. He's gung-ho on everything."

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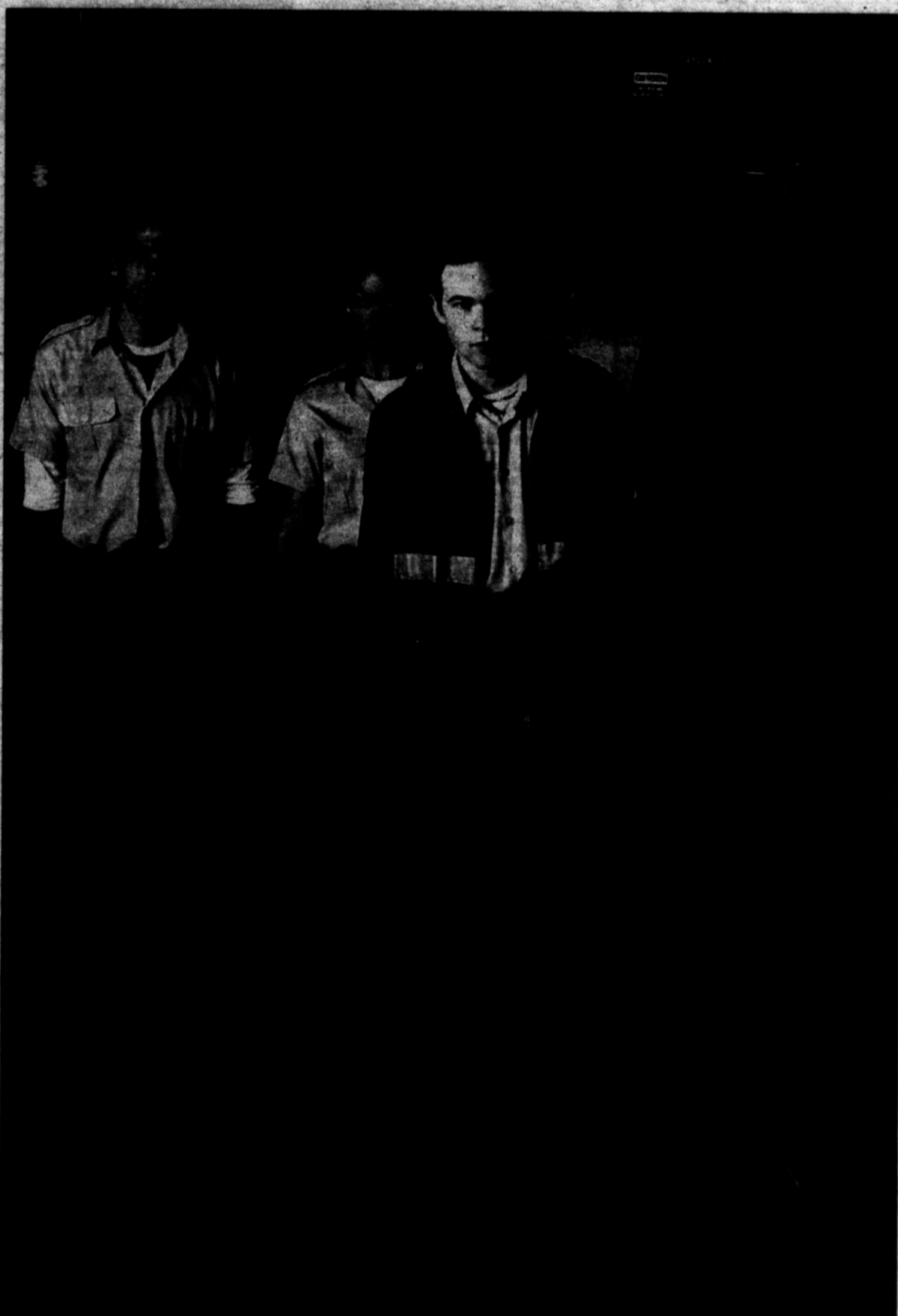

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New Disney Channel series spotlights teen-age lifesavers

When your heart's fibrillating wildly or your baby decides now is the time to be born, you want a doctor — preferably one who graduated with honors from a prestigious medical school — but you're probably willing to settle for an experienced paramedic.

As you're lying there with pain searing your body, do you really want someone who considers 'N Sync the best music has to offer, pizza a sound nutritional choice for all meals and the mall a cultural mecca?

Yet throughout the country, when people call 911, teen-agers respond in ambulances. Trained in lifesaving techniques, some are juggling honors classes and varsity sports with answering 911 calls. Others are racking up court-mandated community service hours.

Inspired by real teens, the Disney Channel premieres a new series, *In a Heartbeat*, on Saturday, Aug. 26, with a special one-hour pilot. The show then assumes its half-hour form and airs Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays, with new episodes premiering on Saturdays.

In a Heartbeat is careful to avoid gruesome scenes. Even when the characters say someone is bleeding terribly, there's nothing the squeamish can't take. It's also not overly technical the way adult hospital dramas can be.

The drama follows the lives of four young emergency medical technicians. Tyler Connell (Shawn Ashmore, *Animorphs*) and Hank Beecham (Danso Gordon, *Hang Time*) are stars on the football team, good friends and great students. Tyler's the compassionate kid whose parents divorced when he was young. Hank is the son of a surgeon and under a lot of pressure to measure

up to his family's expectations.

Val Lanier (Reagan Pasternak, *Jail Bait*) is a cheerleader who worries about her parents bickering over money. The fourth squad member is Jamie Waite (Christopher Ralph, *Animorphs*), the "bad boy" who, by most teens-gone-wrong standards, is still a pretty decent kid. He's doing community service as an EMT "because I liberated some guitar picks from a music store."

Val's unlikely best friend, Caitie Roth (Jackie Rosenbaum), is a diluted version of a Goth kid. Indeed, the pilot does an admirable job of introducing the characters and setting up relationships. In it, Val reminds Caitie that they were best friends before they were born because "our moms took Lamaze together."

The show also does a good job of keeping the drama flowing without letting it go over the melodramatic top. And unlike so many shows starring teen-agers where parents and other adults are either absent or idiots, this program depicts adults as real, multi-faceted people involved in their children's lives.

The actors, all from Canada, where the series is shot, have taken some classes to learn about CPR. "It's a lot of fun for me," Ashmore says. "What I really like is having the aspect of the EMT situations. We get to do the sort of everyday teen-ager, high-school problems, then you have the interesting aspect of going out on the calls."

Ashmore credits teen EMTs as responsible and dedicated, adding that he doubts he could ever do the job. Were he ever in a situation that required a call to 911 and teen-agers showed up, Ashmore says, "anyone who is trained to do the job, I would love the help. I would definitely let teen-agers work on me."

While he enjoys his work in daytime, he would like to get back into stage and feature films.

"I don't write, but I have a lot of friends who do," Nader says. "I'd like to collaborate with some of them on plays and see what we could do."

When he isn't working, Nader heads to his house in East Hampton, N.Y., where he tinkers with his antique cars and motorcycles.
