Redistricting takes place every 10 census. The census is taken at the turn of the decade and the legislative boundaries are redrawn during the following year.
In Texas, the legislative redistricting committees develop the plans ture. After passage by the Legisla-
ture, the redistricting plans are subture, the redistricting plans are sub-
mitted to the governor for approval mitted to the governor for approval Because the Democratic and Republican parties try to draw the
boundaries in ways that will inboundaries in ways that will in-
crease their chances of legislative crease their chances of legislative control, the redistricting ended up
in court in 1971, 1981 and 1991, with a federal court redrawing the districts in 1991.

tion in reading I believe that
I block of our children's education. That's why I proposed the master Reading Teacher Program in 1998 and pushed for
its passage in the Texas Legislature last its passage in the Texas Legislature last
year.
A Master Reading Teacher is a teacher who has been specially trained in the latest research on effective reading in-
struction, in identifying children with reading disorders, and in instructing children whose native language is one $e$ other than English. Master Reading Teachers are trained to incorporate their knowl-
edge in the classroom and mentor fellow teachers who will benefit from their speI believe our teachers need to be
armed with a continual flow of new armed with a continual flow of new
information. Just as scientist are making
daily discories daily discoveries into how humans learn
to acquire and process knowledge, teachto acquire and process knowledge, teach-
ers must apply these new insights into the science of learning and utilize the dren learn.
But where in a teacher's day, between teaching multiplication tables to a classroom full of bright, boisterous young
children, wiping countless runny noses, next day's lesson plan and grading homework far into the evening, is there time
to sit down and learn about the latest o sit down and learn about the latest
science in reading? Enter the Master science in reading? Enter the Master
Reading Teacher to bring that knowledge to them. The State Board for Educator Certificaion (SBEC) recently approved a numbe of new Master Reading Teacher certifica-
tion programs. Those programs have been operating at various university campuses, school district facilities and regional education service centers during the sum-
mer months, and will continue training in the fall.
Researchers have found that betwee Researchers have found that betwee
10 to 20 percent of the children in ou schools today have a reading disability that kind of reading disability goes undeected simply because we haven't been able to train our teachers to properly identify it. School becomes a struggle for
those students and, eventually, they may lose interest and drop out.
Additionally, one out of every three students attending school in one of our
state's major cities state's major cities arrives at the schoolanguage. In some places, the figure is even higher. What a tremendous chal lenge that poses, and what a tremendous opportunity.

## Waterfowl, crane season guidelines little-changed from last year

Unless there is significant rainfall before their fall atrival, ducks, geese, and sandhill cranes may have no waterholes to park on in much of the Panhandle. With
the 2000-2001 hunting season proposals for waterfowl and cranes little-changed from last year, we can only hope that the hunting will be at least as good.
Subject to the approval of the Texas Parks \& Wildlife Commission on August 31, goose hunters can expect a 107 -day season and a whopping 20-bird bag limit per day for light geese, along with five dark geese in our region. Duck season is projected
for 74 days over mostof the state. In our own High Plains Mallard for 74 days over most of the state. In our own High Plains Mallard
Management Unit, we'll be looking at a more generous 89 days of Management Unit, well be looking at a more generous 89 days of
duck hunting with proposed season dates to run October 21-23 and October 28-January 21. A youth-only duck hunting weekend would be thrown-in on October 14-15, to give youngsters first crack at the birds.
The duck bag limit will remain at six, as it was last season. That bag may include no more than five mallards, only two of which may be hens. Duck hunters may take no more than three scaup, two wood ducks, two redheads, one mottled duck, and no more than one pintail or canvasback. Picking and choosing your duck species will be at a premium again this season, and with the poor fortunes of nesting pintails, it may be a good season to pass-up stickertails altogether.
There's no reason to doubt that the TP\&W Commission will give for the to moreoming season. One proposal that we deem wise and wish had occurred last year is to go ahead and establish the rules governing the special light goose conservation season now, rather than waiting into January and fouling-up everybody with sudden rule changes that negate the already-published season dates. If you'll recall, we lost a week of dark goose hunting as well as

some prime time from the sandhill crane season back in January of this year when the long-anticipated conservation season guidelines were finally announced.
The regular goose season is proposed to open statewide on October 28, and in our Western Zone would run through February. 11. Bag limit in the Western Zone would remain at five dark ge daily, including no more than one specklebelly in the daily bag. Teese special conservation season to enhance the harvest or light off February 12 in the Wese of the regular goose season, siching would close statewide on April As Alaring the past two years hunters participating in the April . As during we pauld be allowed to use electronic calls, unplugged shotguns, and would be permitted extended hunting hours, with no daily bag or possession imit on light geese.
A huge flight of sandhill cranes is anticipated for this season, projected for November 11 -February 11 in our Zone A. If sandhill numbers build up anything like they did during the closing days of last season, some excellent hunting opportunity
could be had relatively close to the Hereford area this time around. According to mid-oontinent popylation counts, sandhill crane numbers currently are in excess of the upper population threshold of the management plan.
Jay Roberson, webless migratory bird program leader with TP\&WD stiys the mid-continent population estimate for sandhill cranes is now at 500,000 . Estimates place the number of sandhills wintering in the Panhandle/South Plains at 400,000 .
While unere are more sandhill crane hunters today than there once 17,000 cranes. That means a lot of hunting opportunity that could be afforded by sandhill cranes remains under-utilized.
We haven't seen official fall flight forecasts for ducks and geese yet, and those projected numbers are, at best, somewhat controversial, if not misieading, claim some waterfowl hunters.
Waterfowl hunting guidelines are set by the feds each summer based upon the breeding success and fall flight estimates of ducks and geese.
U.S. Fish \& Wildlife Service surveys project breeding duck populations near an all-time-high at 42 million birds. That's 27 percent above the long-term average, and goose populations, for the most part, continue on an upswing. Thus, guidelines in p
All of this doesn't necessarily translate into more ducks and geese over the decoys floating on your local honeyhole or staked in a field. Weather patterns, water availability, and waterfowl movements all play into the equation, and can be frustratingly limiting factors impacting success.
